CONSTITUTION

OF THE

Harrisburg Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary

Adopted at a Meeting for Organization held at Harrisburg,
Tuesday, June 13, 1905

I.

The name of this Society is THE HARRISBURG BRANCH of the WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE BOARD OF MISSIONS.

II.

The object of this Society is to diffuse knowledge of the missionary work of the whole Church among the women of the Diocese; to increase their interest and activity in that work; to encourage the formation of parish branches of this Society, and by means of united and systematic effort to promote the work of Church extension.

III.

All Parish Societies and all individuals who have expressed a desire to help the Woman's Auxiliary shall be considered members of this Society.

IV.

The officers of this Society shall be a President, a Vice-President, a General Secretary, a Treasurer, and an Organizing Secretary from each of the Archdeaconries of the Diocese; other officers may be chosen at the pleasure of the Society.

The President, the Vice-President, the Secretary and the Treasurer shall be elected by the Society, at its annual meeting, and shall be approved by the Bishop.

The Organizing Secretaries shall be appointed by the Bishop.

V.

The duties of the President are to call all meetings, to preside at them and to have the general oversight and direction of the work of the Society.

VI.

The duties of the Vice-President are to assist the President, and, in her absence, to preside at all meetings of the Society.

VII.

The duties of the Organizing Secretaries are to form new Parish Branches in their several Archdeaconries, wherever possible, and to try to stimulate the interest of our Church folk in all missionary work. They are authorized to hold meetings within the several Archdeaconries and are free to conduct their work under the general approval of the President of the Society and the Bishop of the Diocese.

They shall receive from the Parish Branches reports of all work done by them, and also all moneys contributed by or through them, and give a receipt for the same.

Each Organizing Secretary shall send to the Treasurer of the Society all moneys received from its branches, immediately on receipt of the same, together with a detailed account designating the source from which and the object for which they were received.

Each Organizing Secretary shall send to the General Secretary, at least one month before the annual meeting, a detailed report of all work done by the Society within her Archdeaconry.

VIII.

The duties of the General Secretary are to prepare a report of the work of the Society for its annual meeting; to keep the minutes of all its meetings; to have charge of the printing

of its reports and other documents, and to conduct such correspondence with the parent Society and other branches as the President may direct and approve.

IX.

The duties of the Treasurer are to receive all moneys of the Society; to pay out the same with the approval of the President; to have oversight of all the financial transactions of the Society and to present to the Society at its annual meeting a detailed statement of all moneys received and disbursed.

X.

There shall be appointed by the President at each annual meeting a committee of two persons, whose duty it shall be to audit the accounts of the Treasurer.

XI.

Each Parish Branch shall send to the Organizing Secretary of its Archdeaconry all moneys contributed for the Society and also quarterly reports of all work done, including the furnishing of boxes for missionaries.

XII.

There shall be one general meeting of the Society in each year at such time and place as may be designated by the Bishop.

XIII.

Special meetings may be called by the President at the request of two Organizing Secretaries or of four Parish Branches.

XIV.

This Constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the Society at any annual meeting.

FOREWORD

WITH this issue we introduce to the Diocese two new Organizing Secretaries, Miss Kathleen Watts, of Chambersburg, who takes care of the Harrisburg Archdeaconry, and Miss Mary Culbertson, who has charge of the newly-organized Altoona Archdeaconry. Will the parish branches please make note of these changes, that they may apply for information and send reports to the proper officer? May we also impress upon all local secretaries the absolute necessity for accuracy in the making out of reports. The blanks mailed to each parish have allotted spaces for each variety of gift, whether boxes, regular contributions of money, or "specials." If a box is sent, valued at fifty dollars, do not place fifty dollars under the head of cash contributions. In case such a mistake is made, you can easily see that the Diocesan books will not balance. When money has been sent do not fail to add whether it was sent direct, through the Organizing Secretary, or through any other medium. This is absolutely necessary, or the Diocesan Secretary cannot correctly fill out her report to the Board of Missions. As we are an Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, we must follow their plan of work.

We close our foreword with the hope that the season of 1910-1911 may be a banner season, not only in the amount of work to be reported, but in the promptness and accuracy of the reports.

Minutes of the Sixth Annual Meeting

OF THE

Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Harrisburg

The Sixth Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Harrisburg was held in St. James Church, Lancaster, Tuesday, May 17th, 1910.

At 9.30 A. M. there was a celebration of the Holy Communion, at which Bishop Darlington was celebrant, assisted by the Rev. Clifford Gray Twombly, rector of the parish.

At 11.30 the first business meeting of the day was held in the Parish House. Meeting was called to order by the President, Mrs. Bausman, and opened by Bishop Darlington with prayer.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

Bishop Darlington reported an increase of five hundred dollars in the year's contributions to Foreign Missions, which enabled the Diocese to meet, for the first time, its apportionment. He then made a strong appeal to the women of the Diocese to work for Domestic Missions. He stated the urgent needs of the Missionary Clergy in the Diocese, and asked that contributions to the same be sent to the Bishop for distribution, in order to avoid the publicity caused by sending directly to self-respecting but needy clergymen.

The Jonestown question was then discussed at length; Bishop Darlington stating that Jonestown is not a Diocesan mission, although a worthy object for aid.

Twenty-one parish branches of the Auxiliary responded to roll call, with one hundred and eleven delegates present.

The report of the Treasurer, Mrs. Edward E. Marshall, was then read and accepted.

Report of the Williamsport Archdeaconry was given by the Organizing Secretary, Mrs. Edward P. Almy. Report of Harrisburg Archdeaconry was read by the Organizing Secretary, Miss Mary S. Culbertson. Report of the Junior Auxiliary was read by the Directress, Mrs. George Douglas Ramsay. Mrs. Robert F. Gibson's report of the Babies' Branch was read by Miss Bonham, of York.

Noon-day prayer for missions followed.

Mrs. Lambertson's report of the Church Periodical Club was read by the Secretary. A discussion followed, which resulted in a request from Bishop Darlington that all periodicals sent be reported to Mrs. Robert A. Lambertson. The President then requested that the clergy be asked to answer all letters written to them on this subject. The Bishop made a plea for literature to be sent to the wives of the missionary clergy.

Meeting adjourned until 2 o'clock. During the intermission a short session of the Juniors was held, presided over by Mrs. Ramsay.

At 1 o'clock luncheon was served in the Parish House to the clergy present, delegates and visitors.

The second business session convened at 2 o'clock. The President, Mrs. Bausman, read her annual address. In response to questions from a number of delegates, the President made an exhaustive explanation of the two annual offerings, respectively, and their uses: the General Fund, collected by means of envelopes on April 1st, the only source from which the pledges are met; and the United Offering, by the Blue Boxes, collected September 1st, being a special for the education and preparation of women-workers in the Mission field, and for the care of the same when they are no longer able to serve.

A most interesting address was then given by the Rev. Arthur Sherman, of Hankow, China.

Upon motion made by Mrs. Clement and seconded by Mrs. Newbold, the pledges of last year were renewed, viz.:

Bishop Darlington then named the Organizing Secretaries for the ensuing year. Mrs. Almy, reappointed, for the Williamsport Archdeaconry; Miss Kathleen Watts, of Chambersburg, appointed for the Harrisburg Archdeaconry; and for the new Archdeaconry of Altoona, Miss Mary S. Culbertson.

The President reappointed the Rev. William Dorwart and the Rev. J. H. Irwin auditors.

On motion of Mrs. Almy, the officers of last year were nominated and the Secretary instructed to cast the ballot.

The collections of the morning and the afternoon amounted to sixty-four dollars and thirteen cents; this sum was added to the General Fund, from which the speaker, Mr. Sherman, was paid \$50.00.

Mrs. Clement extended an invitation to the Auxiliary to hold its next meeting in St. Matthew's Church, Sunbury.

A vote of thanks was tendered the ladies of St. James Church for their delightful hospitality.

President's Address

It is with great pleasure, my dear fellow-workers in the Woman's Auxiliary, that I welcome you here in St. James Parish to-day.

Five years ago we celebrated the completion of this Parish House, by holding in it the first annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, after its organization in the new Diocese. Now, what have we been doing in these five years?

While we can report much that is encouraging, and much that has been accomplished, the thought of all that has been left undone must present itself. In this time there should be an organized branch in every parish and mission in the Diocese. Where that cannot be accomplished, individual members working and praying for missions would do wonders.

While all church life and work has for its object the establishment of Christ's Kingdom, yet we have an especial, definite mission—the extension of the Kingdom. How to reach out and extend the work is our great responsibility. One of the most helpful facts in this work is that a woman once inspired with the missionary spirit never loses it. Once a missionary always a missionary.

And how can we help being stirred when we think of our opportunities and the joy that can be ours if we will but take a little part in the carrying out of the great commission? When Dr. Lloyd told the Woman's Auxiliary nine years ago, that they ought to give \$100,000 toward the undertakings of the Board of Missions, he started us on a definite task that we have been working at ever since. Miss Emery helped us by apportioning to each Diocesan Branch its reasonable share of the \$100,000. Of this our part this year was \$500.

And now a few words as to our hopes and plans for the coming year. First, we hope to renew our pledges, and if

possible to increase them, so that we may meet our apportionment to the Board of Missions. Then our Bishop, always ready with his counsel and encouragement to come to the help of the Woman's Auxiliary, has asked us to assist him in the large scheme of his chain of missions in the Diocese. Can we not establish a Bishop's Auxiliary pocket, into which he may put his hand when he sees some new opening for missionary work? Let us remember that we are all members of one Diocesan family, with our Bishop at the head, and that he needs the co-operation of each one of us to carry on the work he has in mind. Let no one feel too small or too insignificant to take part in the general Missionary work.

A large increase in the General Fund is the only means of increasing our gifts to the Board of Missions, or of helping our Bishop. I am sure that many of you do not realize the importance of the envelopes, which is our only method of accumulating a General Fund from which our pledges are paid, and also our Diocesan work, which we are anxious to increase. If there are any parishes which can use the envelopes and have not had them, will they please send to the Organizing Secretary, and she will supply them.

The parish officer in charge of the envelopes should see that they are distributed to all the members, and also, which is most important, see that they are returned. They will often have to be called for, not only once, but several times. This means work, but if we read *The Spirit of Missions*, and learn from its pages what the men and women whom we send out to represent us are doing, and then allow ourselves to forget that we have sent them, our small efforts will seem like play. Remember that the responsibility lies with every baptized person to do with their might what their hands find to do.

And you who receive the envelopes will you not try to be as generous as possible when you use them? I am sure it is a lack of interest rather than a lack of means which has caused the deficit each year. If only the *many* were interested instead of the precious few, there would be a different showing.

The boxes of clothing and household goods which have been sent during the year, carrying cheer and encouragement to the families and institutions receiving them, have been especially good. I wish we could print the letters of acknowledgment in our report. They would cause many a moist eye to the reader.

I would again suggest that the boxes for family use be sent before Christmas whenever possible. It is a great pity for a family to be obliged to wait until Easter for clothing which they have needed all winter. Then let your sewing for institutions, hospitals, &c., be done during Lent.

In behalf of the Junior Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, allow me to say that I am so much impressed with the importance of instructing the young people of the Church on the subject of Missions, that I believe nothing will do so much for the future growth of the Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Harrisburg, especially in the smaller places, as the organization of a Junior Branch, even if there is only one Church woman to start it; and only one child to be a member. It means life, it means planting a seed and watching it grow until God is ready to give the increase. What is more beautiful than to see these joyous young lives trained to be good soldiers of the Cross, and to bear the banner of the Church? So let it be a special work of the Seniors during the coming year to see that a Junior Branch is formed in every parish where one does not already exist, where our girls will be educated to love and work for Missions.

In many parishes there should be two branches of Juniors—one for the children and one for the young women. There is a vast army of the latter who do no missionary work whatever. Perhaps because there is no place for them, they do not seem to feel at home with the Seniors, but want a society of their own, which they can manage themselves. All they need is some one to direct them.

The Babies' Branch, which makes of our little ones, as soon as they are baptized, Little Helpers in the great work of

Missions, is dear to my heart. Each tiny hand that drops a penny into the small red box is helping some other hand outstretched for succor.

I have reserved the United Offering to speak of last. This is a special, and is never expected to interfere with the regular work of the Auxiliary. "This ought ye to do and not let the other undone," is our Saviour's command.

The United Offering is a Thank-offering in acknowledgment for blessings received, and is presented at every Triennial service of the Woman's Auxiliary. Let us see to it that when the great United Offering is made in Cincinnati on October 5th, that the offering of the Harrisburg Branch is much larger than our offering was in Richmond in 1907, which was \$1,574.36. Our ambition is that the next one shall be \$2,000. We have now in hand \$1,100, leaving us a balance of \$900 to raise in the next three months. Are we going to do it? I know we can if we try. But it will take individual effort. It will take enthusiasm and work. I shall be greatly disappointed if we do not accomplish it. Let each parish see that every woman, young, old, rich and poor, is asked to give something as a Thank-offering for the blessings which have been showered upon her. Do not confine yourself to asking those women who *call* themselves members of the Woman's Auxiliary. All are members by virtue of their baptism. And let us make an effort to interest every single Church and Mission Station in the Diocese to give something to this fund, if it is only twenty-five cents; then it would show a *unity* beautiful in its completeness and perfection.

In conclusion let me say that we shall soon be parting for vacation days. But though many of us need a rest, let it not be an empty rest; but rather let us find in change of scene and companionship some one thing to do for the cause of Missions. And how blessed if it may be to add one enthusiast to the cause from among the women about us, indifferent because it has not been shown to her in a different light.

There is some work in the world for every Christian man,

woman and child to do, and we must all try to keep in mind the *spirit* of our work, not the size of the reports we have to make, but the doing the very best we can at all times and in all places, in a cheerful and even joyful spirit. Do not forget how often the words occur—"Be joyful in the Lord."

Report of Junior Auxiliary

We are glad to say the Junior Auxiliary has closed the year with its pledges paid and some money in the treasury. We think it a great pleasure to have our annual meeting held in the Spring, when everything is so bright and beautiful, instead of in November, as then it always seemed to rain and keep away the very people we are so anxious to have present with us.

The various objects which have claimed the attention of the Juniors have been well supported. We have a new scholarship at St. Mary's on the Mountain, Sewanee, Tenn., as we did not realize the little Mountain Maid, in twelve years, had grown to woman's estate, and no longer needed our care. We gave her up with regret, but we now have a dear little girl whom they call "Little May," ten years old, to whom the different Junior branches contribute both clothing and money for her support.

Two branches have had to suspend work for need of competent leaders, we hope temporarily; and another branch, which laid dormant for a time, has started up with great vigor and seems to be a very wide-awake circle of young people—both boys and girls. They have made a fine beginning and done a great deal of work. I allude to St. Luke's, Altoona.

Words of highest praise must be spoken for some of the smaller parishes. Nickel Mines always stands out in my mind when reviewing the work of the Junior branches, as it is a widely scattered community, but with a few faithful workers. In another branch nine girls worked during Lent under great disadvantages, making a fine box for Alaska, valued at thirty-five (\$35) dollars, which we report with great satisfaction. This was from St. John's, York.

The statistics show an increase in branches and work. All seem to be faithful, but although we are learning the "Lesson

of the Ages" in sending aid to the Mission field, the question arises, Is it the best we can do? There is much to be done and the time is short. If progress means life, we are alive, but are our Juniors living up to their fullest opportunities. As our President said in her report of last year, the little the small branches and Missions can do is just as acceptable as the greater work done by the larger parishes. We are told that in the Diocese of Connecticut every girl who is confirmed enters the Junior Auxiliary and pledges five cents a month for its work. Can we not emulate this example and try to do the same?

The Harrisburg Juniors sustained an irreparable loss, last year, when our dearly loved Treasurer, Mrs. Bertha Todd, passed to her Heavenly home. Full of love for her work and always serving others, forgetful of self, she has now entered the rest, which remains for the children of God. May she "rest in peace and light perpetual shine upon her."

Report of the Church Periodical Club

The correspondent of the Church Periodical Club would like to arouse more interest in the Diocese of Harrisburg, in the work of the Club, in sending out papers and magazines. At present there are but five parishes that do anything in this line, while there certainly are many more that might do much good if they were told how they might assist.

In a small parish it would be advisable first to try and send to some address *every week* a paper, not necessarily a Church paper. Addresses will be gladly furnished by the Correspondent. The Bishop has asked that papers such as the "Churchman," the "Living Church," the "Literary Digest," and the "Saturday Evening Post," or any papers of that nature be sent to clergymen of our own Diocese, who cannot afford to take them.

It is very desirable to send boxes to the schools in the South for the poor white children, but these should contain picture papers largely, and only a few Church papers.

An excellent plan is to make up a package of small magazines or publications with interesting pictures, tying it up tightly, and giving the name and address of the sender, and to send it by mail to places in the Canal Zone, such as Ancon and Panama, or to Archdeacon Stuck at Fairbanks, Alaska, or to a clergyman at Tokio, Japan; this is sure to give pleasure to the recipient, who will send a post-card in acknowledgment. The postage on regular periodicals is very reasonable, and this method of sending papers is more expeditious than waiting until a box accumulates.

Good reading matter is desired, but not always religious papers.

A record of every box and package should be kept, and an account of the same sent every April to the Correspondent, Mrs. R. A. Lamberton, Harrisburg, Pa., so that the same may be reported to the Society as work done in our Diocese.
