



CONSTITUTION
OF THE
Harrisburg Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary

Adopted at a Meeting for Organization Held at Harrisburg
Tuesday, June 13, 1905

I.

The name of this Society is THE HARRISBURG
BRANCH of the WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE
BOARD OF MISSIONS.

II.

The object of this Society is to diffuse knowledge of
the missionary work of the whole Church among the
women of the Diocese; to increase their interest and
activity in that work; to encourage the formation of
parish branches of this Society, and by means of united
and systematic effort to promote the work of Church
extension.

III.

All Parish Societies and all individuals who have ex-
pressed a desire to help the Woman's Auxiliary shall be
considered members of this Society.

IV.

The officers of this Society shall be a President, a Vice-
President, a General Secretary, a Treasurer, and an Organ-
izing Secretary from each of the Archdeaconries of the
Diocese; other officers may be chosen at the pleasure of
the Society.

The President, the Vice-President, the Secretary and
the Treasurer shall be elected by the Society, at its annual
meeting, and shall be approved by the Bishop.

The Organizing Secretaries shall be appointed by the Bishop.

V.

The duties of the President are to call all meetings, to preside at them and to have the general oversight and direction of the work of the Society.

VI.

The duties of the Vice-President are to assist the President, and in her absence, to preside at all meetings of the Society.

VII.

The duties of the Organizing Secretaries are to form new Parish Branches in their several Archdeaconries, wherever possible, and to try to stimulate the interest of our Church folk in all missionary work. They are authorized to hold meetings within the several Archdeaconries and are free to conduct their work under the general approval of the President of the Society and the Bishop of the Diocese.

They shall receive from the Parish Branches reports of all work done by them, and also all moneys contributed by or through them, and give a receipt for the same.

Each Organizing Secretary shall send to the Treasurer of the Society all money received from its branches, immediately on receipt of the same, together with a detailed account designating the source from which and the object for which they were received.

Each Organizing Secretary shall send to the General Secretary, at least one month before the annual meeting, a detailed report of all work done by the Society within her Archdeaconry.

VIII.

The duties of the General Secretary are to prepare a report of the work of the Society for its annual meeting; to keep the minutes of all its meetings; to have

charge of the printing of its reports and other documents, and to conduct such correspondence with the parent Society and other branches as the President may direct and approve.

IX.

The duties of the Treasurer are to receive all moneys of the Society ; to pay out the same with the approval of the President ; to have oversight of all the financial transactions of the Society and to present to the Society at its annual meeting a detailed statement of all moneys received and disbursed.

X.

There shall be appointed by the President at each annual meeting a committee of two persons, whose duty it shall be to audit the accounts of the Treasurer.

XI.

Each Parish Branch shall send to the Organizing Secretary of its Archdeaconry all moneys contributed for the Society and also quarterly reports of all work done, including the furnishing of boxes for missionaries.

XII.

There shall be one general meeting of the Society in each year at such time and place as may be designated by the Bishop.

XIII.

Special meetings may be called by the President at the request of two Organizing Secretaries or of four Parish Branches.

XIV.

This Constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the Society at any annual meeting.

Minutes of the Eighth Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Harrisburg

The Eighth Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Harrisburg was held at St. Paul's Church, Harrisburg, May 2nd, 1912.

There was a celebration of the Holy Communion at 10.30 A. M., at which Bishop Darlington was celebrant, assisted by Rev. John Mills Gilbert, rector of the parish.

At the close of this service all delegates adjourned to the Sunday School room, where the first business meeting was held, the President, Mrs. Bausman, presiding.

It was on motion resolved that as all present were familiar with the minutes of the last meeting in their printed form, they should not be read.

As the Secretary was unable to be present, the President appointed Miss Watts as Secretary pro. tem. The roll call showed a representation from 28 parishes, and a total of 118 present.

Reports by the Organizing Secretaries of the Archdeaconries of Williamsport, Harrisburg and Altoona, were then read and accepted.

The report of the Junior Auxiliary was read by the Director, Mrs. George D. Ramsay, and accepted. In concluding her remarks the Director alluded to the fact that it was her last report for this branch of the work, she having definitely decided to resign after serving fourteen years. Her resignation was received with great regret, and a rising vote of thanks was given Mrs. Ramsay for her long and efficient service.

Mrs. Robert F. Gibson, Director of the Babies' Branch, read an interesting report of the work of the Little Help-

ers, emphasizing the importance of the early training of children in the habit of praying for, as well as giving to, the missionary work of the church.

The report of the Church Periodical Club, read by Mrs. Robert A. Lamberton, Diocesan Correspondent, showed that much more work had been done in that department during the past year.

The Treasurer, Mrs. Marshall, read a brief summary of her report, and urged that money should be sent in more promptly, explaining the difficulty of making out her statement for the Annual Meeting when branch reports were so late in coming in. Mrs. Almy suggested, as a means for maintaining the General Fund, that envelopes be distributed and called Epiphany envelopes.

The election of officers followed, Mrs. Almy taking the Chair.

The resignation of the Secretary, Mrs. William D. Crocker, who was unable to hold office longer on account of illness in her family, was accepted with regret, and Mrs. Bausman made a request for additional officers, stating the need for an educational secretary, and a second vice-president. Mrs. Gibson made a motion that these two officers be added to the Board. This motion was carried.

On motion, the President and Treasurer were re-elected, and the following officers were nominated and elected to serve during the ensuing year: Mrs. George D. Ramsay, First Vice-President; Mrs. Edward P. Almy, Second Vice-President; Miss Mary Lee, Secretary.

The Secretary pro. tem. was instructed to cast one ballot for all the nominees.

An adjournment was then taken for a box luncheon, supplemented by tea and coffee, served by the ladies of St. Paul's parish.

At 2 P. M. the President opened the afternoon session by reading her annual address, following this by reading a letter from Mrs. Warren Walpole, of New York, outlining the plan for making Miss Julia C. Emery a substantial gift in 1913, in recognition of her long term of faithful service as National Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Mrs. Warren advised that some one should be appointed in each parish branch of every diocese to act as treasurer for this fund, and on motion of Mrs. Logan, Mrs. Marshall was appointed to take charge of the fund for this diocese. This motion was seconded and carried, and Mrs. Almy suggested that each branch should donate the offering made at its first Fall meeting to this object.

The President next read a letter from Bishop Rowe, of Alaska, describing the utter lack of health regulations in that country, and urging all members of the Auxiliary to interest themselves in pushing a bill, which is to be presented to Congress in regard to taking steps to check the epidemics of contagious diseases so prevalent in that diocese.

Mrs. Almy presented the following resolutions, which were adopted, and the Secretary was instructed to notify the branches at the proper time to send the letters :

“Resolved, That the Woman’s Auxiliary of the Diocese of Harrisburg endorse the recommendations of Bishop Rowe of Alaska, and urge the members to exert their influence upon their representatives in Congress to vote for the pending bill referred to by the Bishop.”

“Resolved, That a copy of this resolution, together with the Bishop’s letter, be sent to each parish branch of the Auxiliary, with the request that they make an appeal to the representatives of their congressional district to vote for said bill.”

The Secretary was also instructed to send telegrams to the proper representatives when the bill comes up.

A general discussion on the present apportionment system followed, at the close of which Mrs. A. Rollin Sawyer presented the following resolution which was carried :

“Resolved, That all money be sent to the Diocesan Treasurer of the Auxiliary, and that after paying the expenses of the Auxiliary, and the specified pledges, the remainder be equally divided between the General and Diocesan Boards of Missions, each parish being credited in proportion to its gift, and the receipt sent to the Parish Treasurer.”

At Mrs. Bausman's request, Bishop Darlington gave a brief description of the immediate need for work among the Indians of Episcopal parentage at the Carlisle School. The Bishop stated that through Bishop Garland \$500 had been pledged by the Indian Hope Association of the Philadelphia Auxiliaries, and that several hundred dollars had also been raised by a joint committee of the Y. M. C. A. and several religious bodies, the proposed plan being to have a Y. M. C. A. Secretary, who should be an Episcopal clergyman, in constant charge of the work among the boys, and a trained woman worker to devote two days each week to the girls. This object was presented as one for which the Auxiliary of this diocese should give some financial support. Mrs. Bullitt, Chairman of the Committee on Work among the Indians in the diocese, followed the Bishop and said that one encouraging result of the work done during the past winter, was the increased attendance of Indians at the church services. At the close of Mrs. Bullitt's report it was, on motion, resolved to donate \$100 to this object, and pledges were made by the parish branches amounting to \$145 for the Indian work at the Carlisle School.

The question of renewing the pledge for the Jones-town Home next came under discussion, and the Bishop stated that although the Home was in the diocese of Bethlehem, he thought it right to continue to send something towards its support while there are children there from this diocese. It was on motion resolved to appropriate \$50 from the General Fund for this object, and the Treasurer was instructed to include this sum in pledges for diocesan missions.

The following appointments were then made : Bishop Darlington appointed Mrs. S. M. Wirt, of Bloomsburg, to fill the position of Organizing Secretary for the Archdeaconry of Williamsport, left vacant by the resignation of Mrs. Almy, at the same time thanking the latter for her long and efficient term of service. The Organizing Secretaries for the Archdeaconries of Harrisburg and Altoona were reappointed ; Miss H. S. Schram, of Columbia, was appointed to take Mrs. Ramsay's place as President of the

Junior Auxiliary, and Miss Katharine F. Comstock, of Mechanicsburg, was appointed Educational Secretary.

The question of meetings was then brought up for discussion by the President, who said that the present plan of an annual meeting of only a few hours made it impossible to transact the necessary business without curtailing the missionary address which was felt to be so helpful a part of the program. After a free discussion of the relative advantages of lengthening the annual meeting to two days or of holding two meetings a year, it was on motion resolved that there should be an annual business meeting in the spring, followed by a meeting in the fall devoted to addresses for missionary inspiration.

The Auxiliary was invited to hold the meeting in the coming autumn, at St. James Church, Lancaster.

At the close of the business meeting interesting addresses were made by Mrs. Hargreaves, from the Philippines, and Rev. J. L. Prevost, formerly of Alaska, and during the early part of the afternoon an inspiring conference for the Juniors and their officers was led by Miss Anne M. Hubbard, Educational Secretary of the Philadelphia Diocese.

The joint offerings, made in the morning and afternoon, amounted to \$43.87.

After tendering a vote of thanks to the women of St. Paul's Parish for their kind hospitality, the meeting adjourned.

President's Address

My dear members of the Auxiliary and friends: There is so much important work to be done today, that I shall only engage your time for a word of greeting and to mention a few questions which will come before you for consideration at this meeting.

It is good for us to come together for help and encouragement. To listen to the reports of what we have been able to accomplish for Christ's Kingdom, and to take courage to reach out farther into our new fields, and to work harder, until every baptized member of the church shall realize her obligation to pray, work, give and study in the interests of the progression of the religion of Jesus Christ.

I am sorry that we cannot yet report a branch of the Auxiliary in every parish of the diocese. There is no Church or Mission Station so small that it cannot do something, and I shall never be satisfied until there is a branch organized in every parish.

We are altogether certain that what the world needs is the religion of Jesus Christ. Is every individual member of the Church trying her best to win the whole world to Him?

If we have not yet been successful in establishing a branch of the Auxiliary in every parish, I am hoping to have in the coming year, a study class in every parish of the diocese. The Board of Missions, through Mr. Gray, its educational Secretary, has outlined a most excellent course, and they have published literature which will be sent on application. They ask that an Educational Secretary be appointed in every diocese. We shall make that appointment today, and I trust that the appointee will find a warm response in every parish when she enters into her work. I am sure we all need education as to the needs and labors of our missionaries, and I hope for a great interest in this branch of the Auxiliary work.

I deeply regret to have to announce to you that our able Secretary, Mrs. Crocker, who has so generously given us of her time and strength and interest for the past six years, is obliged to resign her post because of ill-health in her family. I bespeak a warm welcome to her successor, whom you will elect today.

Ever since the apportionment plan was adopted by the Board of Missions, the Woman's Auxiliary has been asked to give \$100,000 to the Board, which amount was apportioned among the dioceses, the diocese of Harrisburg being apportioned \$500. At the last General Convention it was decided that the apportionment of each parish be increased, and that the money from the Auxiliary, which helps the Board in its appropriations, be credited on the apportionment of the parish from which it is sent. How to carry out this plan will be discussed today.

I will say here that I hope to see the day when every parish shall adopt the duplex envelope system, and that every woman in the Church will give just as much as she possibly can in that direct way, which seems to me the most perfect way of all. Then there will be no more occasion for this part of the work in the Auxiliary.

In conclusion, I want to remind you that we are entering upon the last year for collecting the United Thank Offering, to be presented at our Triennial Meeting in New York, in October, 1913. We must make a strenuous effort if the offering from the Harrisburg Diocese is at all in proportion to the interest which we have in the object of the gift ; the training and support of women in the missionary field, and also in our thankfulness for mercies received. It is a thank offering from each individual, and is only a complete United Offering when every woman has a part in it.

The Auxiliary stands for the extension of Christ's Kingdom, and I am sure that in view of the many sad disasters which have occurred in the past year ; when those who truly love Him and sought comfort and help from the only source from which such comfort and help can come, and were not sent away comfortless, we have been made to realize the blessedness of spreading the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

Report of the Harrisburg Archdeaconry

The Organizing Secretary of the Archdeaconry of Harrisburg has the honor of submitting the following report for the year from May 1, 1911, to May 1, 1912:

As helpers to the Board of Missions, the Woman's Auxiliary is doing, working, and giving whatever and wherever it can to promote interest and activity in the cause of Missions,

Owing to the severity of the winter and illness in many of the branches, the money returns are not so large as last year, but the membership has increased by 104.

Three branches have been organized, one at St. David's, Delta, one at St. Paul's, Columbia, and one at St. Augustine's Mission, Harrisburg. One branch has withdrawn.

There are nineteen active branches.

The Annual Fall Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary, in the Harrisburg Archdeaconry, was held in Newport, October 31st. It was largely attended. The offering, \$26.77, was divided equally between the General Fund and the Bishop's Purse.

A special meeting was held in St. Paul's, Columbia, on March 7th. The attendance was also large. Miss Emery, Secretary of the Board of Missions, was present and held a very interesting and instructive conference on "Giving to Missions; How, Why and What." The offering amounted to \$24.46, and after expenses were paid it was divided equally between St. David's, Delta, and St. Augustine's Mission.

Two Committees were appointed at the fall meeting, one for work among the colored people and one for work among the Indians at the Carlisle School. Both Committees have been at work during the winter, trying to first investigate, then to instruct and improve conditions. The reports from both show that progress along these lines is slow, but there is also reason for encouragement, and the Committees will be continued.

265 pieces of mail matter have been sent out to date.

137 pieces have been received.

3 packages of leaflets have been received.

405 pieces have been handled.

Report of Williamsport Archdeaconry

The past year, as the report shows, has been a very good one; some new branches having been formed and the old ones working well, as usual.

Report of the Junior Auxiliary 1912

The past year has not been an encouraging one to the Junior Department. We have some new branches, but several in large parishes, which I had hoped to have resurrected, have failed.

The usual meetings have been held, and we have had some new study classes—the branches have been divided with good results. We were so glad to have a meeting at St. Paul's—Columbia, in March—which was very enlivening, as it had been impossible to have a meeting there for some time. The Christmas boxes were a great success, and must have been a joy to those who received them. We must try to send more gifts this coming year, as so many seem to depend upon them. Our scholarships for Little May have not been fully collected, but the fund for General Missions has increased, and the Jonestown Home was remembered with boxes and money. We are most anxious to have the different branches make *annual pledges*. If we can do this we will assume something really definite. Although we have tried very hard to arrange for the money being sent direct to the Treasurer, it has sometimes gone to the missionary, or the Board of Missions, which causes a great deal of trouble, complicating our annual reports. Will not each Parish Branch try to help us in this matter? I would like to remind each branch, when they organize in the fall and begin their work, of the importance of sending the addresses of their officers to the Directors. It would help so much. You can easily see the difficulty of communicating with a branch, when one does not know to whom to write.

Seventy-five letters have been written and ninety cards, to various branches on many subjects, and no letter that is received remains unanswered. Visits have been made to different branches, since the last meeting, but I regret not having been able to arrange for a visit to each

branch during the year. We are at the time encouraged to think great results will follow, but this does not always happen. In looking to the future we want to grasp all our possibilities, if we succeed every victory must be the result of constant prayer. We may not be able to attain great results, but we can attain to the acceptable greatness of being faithful.

Although you were kind enough to wish it otherwise, this is my final report as President of the Junior Auxiliary. The feeling of sadness as I write these lines is deepened by the remembrance of how I came among the Juniors, as their first President, and for the kind sympathy I have ever received from my fellow workers in the fourteen years of my service I am most grateful. For your many acts of kindness and lenient judgment I thank you, and pray they may be continued to my successor.
