


A United Offering Prayer

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

The change from spring to autumn has caused a long time to elapse since our last Annual meeting. For, though we had a diocesan missionary meeting last November, it was not a business meeting, and we had no reports. I am hoping now that our report of work has increased in proportion to the length of time we have had in which to accomplish it. I am glad to say that it has increased materially. We have more Parish branches, more Junior branches, more baby branches and more study classes than in our last report. And that does not tell all the tale. I find a greatly increased interest almost everywhere in the Diocese. I think we are feeling more and more that if each of us baptized members of Christ will faithfully perform our mission, the Missions of the Church will be well taken care of.

We have a great stimulus to work in the Triennial Meeting just held in New York. There was great inspiration to be gained from the business meeting of the delegates, where over five hundred women gathered in earnest conclave to determine the policy and work for the next three years. Then the daily conferences for all members, where auxiliary subjects were discussed, and thoughts and experiences were exchanged from Dioceses all over the United States. And greatest of all, from that wonderful service in the Cathedral of St. John The Divine where the United Thank Offering from the women of our Church in every Diocese and Mission, was laid upon the altar. \$307,500 seems a great deal of money to be gathered together in three years in mite boxes, and yet do you know that if every woman member of our Church gave one penny a day, it would amount to over \$1,000,000. So while we are pleased that the offering was so large, it only shows what we could do with a little more effort. Let us begin to make that effort right now for the offering of 1916. The object then will be as it was this Triennial, "for the training, sending and support of women workers, also the care of such workers when sick or disabled. Also that to our united gifts there shall be added our united and earnest prayers that God will put it into the hearts

of many faithful women to give themselves to the work of the Master in the Mission field, or, if they cannot go themselves, to give of their substance gladly, as the Lord hath prospered them." But it was decided that no part of the offering, as has heretofore been done, shall be reserved for a permanent building. You will agree that this was a wise decision when I remind you that the united offering so far has only been sufficient to support half the women workers. And there is need of just as many more women as will volunteer that greatest of all gifts, the gift of self. So in these next three years we need to double, yes, treble our efforts. And do not forget that it is a Thank offering for blessings received; and when we are moved to express in words our gratitude for a safe return of ourselves or friends from an ocean voyage, an escape from a railroad or automobile accident, or any other imminent danger, let us make that gratitude real, and remember the blue box with a Thank offering.

The Junior Department of the Woman's Auxiliary is progressing only fairly well. I cannot say that it is well until there is a working, studying branch in every parish; Twenty branches is not a good showing for thirty-six branches of the Auxiliary. We want to start a campaign to interest the older girls and young women who are not reached by the womans' auxiliary. We need to teach them why and how to give. It is from these young women we hope for the gift of life. And would it not be a joy, if from the Junior Auxiliary of this Diocese might go a volunteer to do her Master's work in the mission field. But for that army of girls and young women who cannot go, what an opportunity to make a gift of life at home; what a power they can be with their strength and enthusiasm, and clear sight into the future. The President of the Juniors, Miss Schram, is ready to give valuable help and direction, but it is the parish officers who must do the work. And where there is no Junior branch established, I must depend upon the Woman's Auxiliary officers to take steps to have one started.

The Babies' Branch of the Junior Department has grown so strong since the last Triennial that the Little Helpers have become a power; not only through their gifts, but in reminding their mothers of the obligations and privileges they have assumed through their baptism.

Very good work has been done by the Church Periodical Club in the parishes where a branch has been established. But we should have many more branches. If the many earnest appeals which come to the Church Missions House for literature of all kinds, were more generally known, I am sure those appeals would not be in vain. There is in almost every household a great waste of good material, which would be such a boon to the lonely, starved lives pining for what we are throwing away. Every year new fields are open, and the supply never equals the demand. I trust that every one who hears me to-day will determine to help in this very useful branch of the work.

I am proud of the work done in the Mission study classes. We have eleven classes that kept up their work and completed the courses, much to their pleasure and interest. But I am not proud of the parishes which have no classes. I know the only trouble is the want of a leader. Will not some one from each parish represented here, go home with the determination to form a class? The educational department of the Board of Missions will supply the necessary literature at a small cost, and Miss Comstock, our Educational Secretary, is prepared to give all the assistance required to start such a class. It is the lack of knowledge about missions which explains the lack of interest or indifference of many Church women.

I have reserved for the last to speak of the General Fund, usually collected in Auxiliary envelopes. I confess to feeling greatly discouraged about this, for it has not grown as it should. I think this is because some of the parishes have not understood our system, and have made specials to the General, Domestic and Diocesan Missions; contributing nothing to the Auxiliary Fund. The General Fund, my dear women of the Church, is the great work of the Auxiliary; through it we pay our pledge to the Jonestown Home, and we pay our apportionment to the Board of Missions, which is credited to the apportionment of each parish. Then, after our expenses are paid, we can have the joy of giving to Specials; which, if they help the Board, will also count on the parish apportionments. This Fund should be very much increased, I would suggest an Auxiliary canvass in each parish to enlarge the membership. We should enroll at least five hundred more women in the next year to become active members and use the

envelopes. We must keep pace with the growing number of communicants. We must all work harder to bring into our membership the many women who now do nothing for the Missions of the Church. We want the co-operation of every woman in the Diocese.

The Diocesan Missionary Meeting held in Lancaster last Autumn, and the sectional meetings held in the Archdeaconries have been a great help and encouragement. There is always profit to be gained by gathering together. We are encouraged to continue to work. Each one of us is a missionary, our mission is Christian activity, which leads us to give as we are able.

Our Gift of Duty—to the General Fund.

Our Gift of Privilege—to the Specials.

Our Gift of Life. And last and most important is our Gift of Intercession. Prayer is sometimes the hardest, the most difficult work, but it is the only thing, nothing compares to it; it is the source of all power, the greatest force, that we can wield, the greatest talent God has granted to us. Think what the possession of such power means! It means the giving light to those that sit in darkness, and to all of God's children the fulfillment of that sentence so often on our lips "Thy Kingdom Come."

Minutes of the Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary, Held October 24th, 1912

In accordance with the resolution passed at the annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary, held in Harrisburg, May 2nd, 1912, that there should be a meeting devoted to inspirational addresses in the Autumn, the President, Mrs. J. W. B. Bausman, called a meeting to be held in the Parish building of St. James church, Lancaster, October 24th, 1912.

The opening services were conducted by Rev. James F. Bullitt, of Harrisburg, followed by preliminary remarks by the President, and a short address by the Bishop of the Diocese, in which he urged the assistance of the women of the Diocese in introducing the duplex envelope system for offerings in those parishes not already using them.

At the conclusion of the Bishop's remarks very interesting addresses were made by the Diocesan Educational Secretary, Miss K. F. Comstock—who made a strong appeal for the organization of Mission study classes in the various parish branches—and by the Rev. J. G. Meem, of Brazil. Mr. Meem's account of conditions in that country where, through vast tracts of the interior the people are entirely without religious privileges, and his description of the corruption of the Roman Catholic Church in that region, and consequent need of earnest Christian workers from our own church was listened to with such deep interest that at its conclusion a resolution was adopted urging the editors of the *Spirit of Missions* to give more space in its pages to the work of the Brazilian Mission.

After an informal box luncheon the meeting was again called to order and the roll called, showing an attendance of about 120 women.

The subject of the most desirable times for the annual meetings was then discussed, at length, resulting in the decision, by vote, to hold one annual meeting of two days in the Autumn, which should include both business and inspirational sessions.

The afternoon speakers were Miss H. L. Schram, the new

president of the Junior Auxiliary—who presented very forcefully the conditions and opportunities of the Junior branches, and the Rev. Mr. Maguire, whose address with the key-notes, "Personal Character and Personal Service," was full of vigor and inspiration. Mr. Maguire described the splendid work being done in our industrial schools for Negroes, and literature of the "American Church Institute for Negroes" was distributed.

This address was followed by an encouraging account of our work among the Indians of the Carlisle School, by Miss Hart, who has been in charge of that work for some months past with gratifying results in the interest shown along religious lines by the girls under her care.

The meeting adjourned with a vote of thanks to the women of St. James' Parish for their kind hospitality.

Minutes of the Ninth Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Harrisburg

The ninth annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Harrisburg, was held at Trinity Church, Williamsport, November 5th and 6th. Officer's meeting at 2:30 p. m.

At eight o'clock in Trinity church the rector, Rev. Robert F. Gibson conducted the service, assisted by Archdeacon McMillan, General Missionary Rev. Leroy H. Baker, Rev. John M. Gilbert and Rev. Northey Jones.

Bishop Darlington made a strong appeal for pledges of gifts of \$1.00 or more, not to be called for oftener than five times a year for the "Bishop's Hand" to aid materially in the up-building of the church within the Diocese.

Bishop Kinsolving, with his delightful Virginia voice, charmed his audience and thrilled their hearts with his account of his love for his people and results of his work in Brazil. He has eleven churches, five having been built without aid from the United States; Twenty men, only four of them Americans; the last to go, nine years ago is Rev. Wm. Campbell Brown, a great scholar, who is translating and revising the Bible in Portuguese.

At the close of the service the congregation were invited to see the new parish house and some moving pictures on social service.

Many delegates were entertained over night in the homes of the hospitable people of Trinity Parish, Williamsport.

Rev. John M. Gilbert, of Harrisburg, conducted a "Quiet Hour" at nine o'clock, Thursday morning, Nov. 6th. "Women Worker's in the Bible."

1—Mary, who "chose the better part" and did "what she could." Women now have to choose the time for prayer.

2—The woman with the two sons wishing for good places but trained for the kingdom. Train our children for a *KINGDOM*.

3—The women at the sepulcher—Different work from what they expected. Woman's Auxiliary formerly a benevolent society but now the stone is rolled away, there must be new methods to meet larger work, the idea of expansion, the study of missions.

The Bishop officiated at the Communion service, assisted by other clergy and a choir of women, all of the Auxiliary.

Business Session

The tenth annual Business meeting was called to order at 11:30 by the President, Mrs. J. W. B. Bausman, in Trinity's beautiful new parish house.

The secretary's minutes were read and approved.

Mrs. Lightner offered a resolution that a telegram be sent the Delaware Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, meeting in Immanuel Church, New Castle, Delaware, offering greetings from the Woman's Auxiliary of Harrisburg.

The Juniors were then dismissed for a conference.

The President read her annual address. The Treasurer's report showed a balance of only \$7.28. United Offering \$2050.58.

The President urged all parishes to send their gifts to the General Fund, as this money is used first to pay our own expenses; then \$500. given as the apportionment to General Missions, \$500. to Diocesan Missions, next our pledge to Jonestown Home, and the remainder may be given to particular causes, designated by the Board of Missions, which will also count on the parish apportionments. It is more interesting to know the individual or cause whom we are to help, so that if all would give to General Fund, money could be given to causes like: St. Mary's Hall, Shanghai, China; Dr. Teusler's St. Luke's Hospital, Tokyo, Japan; or to pay Miss Newbold, our own foreign Missionary.

The Bishop endorsed this idea and then read the Mid-day Prayer for Missions.

The following motion was passed:

RESOLVED, That parishes send their money to the General Fund instead of designating it, so that after the Auxiliary expenses are paid, our apportionments be given \$500.00 to General Missions and \$500.00 to Diocesan Missions, and our pledge to Jonestown Home and the remainder given to particular causes designated by the Board of Missions, which will also count on the Parish apportionments.

Reports by the Organizing Secretaries of the Archdeaconries of Harrisburg, Williamsport and Altoona were read and accepted.

Reports must be sent to the Secretary in the Spring, as she has to make her report to the Secretary in New York in June.

Report of Church Periodical Club read and accepted. The Bishop suggested that a barrel be kept ready and when the women attend their meetings they place in it literature they can give away. Barrels go cheaper by freight than boxes.

Bishop Darlington asked for "consecrated" automobiles and for Auxiliary women to make an occasional visit to country parishes to encourage them to start a Branch. We have ninety-eight parishes and missions and only thirty-eight Auxiliary Branches.

The delegate from Renovo asked that such a visit be paid them.

The Bishop said he had secured a house at Mont Alto, for \$4000. near the Sanatorium for tubercular patients, as no other denomination has a clergyman near enough to minister to the sick and dying.

"Little Helpers" report read by Mrs. Gibson, suggested training children in Missionary living.

Miss Schram reported for the Juniors, urging more senior work.

In Philadelphia they are forming branches for boys as Juniors of their Men's Auxiliary.

The Educational Secretary's report was read and accepted.

The meeting adjourned to the next room to partake of a delicious luncheon, after which business was resumed.

Bishop Darlington said as officers were satisfactory he would suggest Miss Watts cast one ballot for their re-election, which she did.

Mrs. Robbins, Junior Leader, from Rochester, New York, said they held four Junior conferences for teacher training during the year and recommended "Preparation for Teaching," by Charles A. Oliver.

Miss Almy, from Philadelphia, told of forty-eight leaders in their Inter-diocesan Normal classes and at the May meeting the children make on minute reports.

Both speakers showed that great emphasis is being placed on the spiritual side of their work.

The roll was called, 126 present from twenty-eight branches.

Miss Watts gave a delightful account of her impressions and the help to be gained by a visit to the Convention and Triennial Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary.

A letter of appreciation and thanks was read from Miss Emery, for our part in the gift of \$16000, which was presented, as an express of appreciation of forty years' service, to Miss Emery and her sister, for use during their life time, with the privilege of naming the missionary cause to which it shall go after their death.

A motion was passed to continue for this year our pledge to the Jonestown Home, and from the offering of this meeting to send a gift to Bishop Knisoloing and pay expenses of speakers.

A telegram was received bearing greetings from the Delaware Branch.

Miss Mary Lee, the able Secretary, being obliged to leave the Diocese—her resignation was regretfully accepted and Mrs. Jas. F. Bullitt appointed in May.

Mrs. Bullitt resigned as Chairman of the Indian Committee and Mrs. Herbert Hartman was appointed by the President.

The offerings amounted to \$97.32.

A vote of thanks was unanimously passed to the Women of Trinity Parish for their generous hospitality. The meeting adjourned.

Report of the Archdeaconry of Altoona

The past year, as the report shows, is not so good, so far as figures go, as it was last year, but all the branches seem to be working and showing an interest in the cause of missions and we ought to dwell more on a spirit of working for the cause and not for figures.

The report submitted is from May 1st, 1912 to May 1st, 1913.

There are five active branches in this Archdeaconry, with the possibility of three to be organized very soon.

On September 19, 1912, there was an Archdeaconry meeting held in Altoona, at St. Luke's. Thirty-eight delegates representing seven parishes were present.

The meeting opened with a celebration of the Holy Communion.

Business meeting was held at 2:30.

Mrs. S. B. Cooper gave a very interesting talk on the work of the Arapahoe Indians.

Mrs. Brooks of Oil City, enlightened us very much on the subject of the United Offering, speaking about the systematizing of the collection of United Offering boxes.

The evening meeting was devoted to addresses by the rectors from the various parishes in the Archdeaconry and nearby, on the general subject of Church Extension. The Rev. Jas. W. Diggles, of St. Mark's, Johnstown, spoke about the Personal Attachment; The Rev. H. J. Keyser, of Hollidaysburg, of the Church at work and the Ven. F. T. Eastment, of the needs of the Archdeaconry.

The Rev. W. C. Clapp, of Danville, held the attention of the congregation while he described his work among the Bon-toc people in the Philippines.

An offering of \$27.77 was collected and after paying the expenses of the speakers \$10.00 was given to Mrs. Cooper for work among the Arapahoe Indians.

A mission study class was organized by request at Huntingdon last year.

Report of the Harrisburg Archdeaconry

The Organizing Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Archdeaconry of Harrisburg has the honor of submitting the following report for the year from May 1, 1912, to May 1, 1913.

In the Harrisburg Archdeaconry there are nineteen active branches of the Woman's Auxiliary at present, two branches less than reported last year. The branch at Delta has disbanded because the church is closed and no replies have been received to letters sent to the following branches, Christ Church, Leacock; and S. Augustine Mission, Harrisburg, which was without a rector. Notwithstanding this loss the money returns are larger than last year by \$153.96, showing splendid work on the part of the active branches. There is a new branch at Marietta.

There are 324 active members in this Archdeaconry.

Owing to the fact that the Diocesan meeting was held last autumn in Lancaster the fall meeting of the branches was omitted. A winter meeting was held in St. Luke's, Mechanicsburg, on Feb. 13th, 1913. It was largely attended, there being present Bishop Darlington, 6 clergymen and 47 delegates. The offering amounted to \$24.05. After travelling expenses of the speaker were paid the remainder was voted to Mr. Griffith for his work at the White Pine Camp, Mont Alto.

It was announced that clergymen from all parishes in the Diocese were cordially invited and welcome to all meetings of the Woman's Auxiliary.

261 pieces of mail matter have been sent out to date.

122 pieces have been received.

2 packages of leaflets have been received.

383 pieces have been handled.

Report of the Williamsport Archdeaconry

MRS. PAUL E. WIRT, Organizing Secretary.

In making this her first report the Organizing Secretary of the Archdeaconry of Williamsport cannot but feel encouraged with the summing up of the year's work, although there are yet many parishes without an organized branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions.

The response made to requests for contributions to the different funds, such as the General Fund, United Offering and Miss Emery Fund, has been most gratifying.

We have enrolled two new branches: Muncy and Tioga, making in all fifteen contributing branches. St. John's, Catawissa, and Ascension Memorial, Kulpmont are earnestly considering organization in the near future.

Three Archdeaconry meetings have been held. The midwinter meeting at Williamsport on January 28th had an attendance of seventy-five women, Bishop Darlington and a goodly number of the clergy.

First a short service with the Holy Communion, Bishop Darlington Celebrant, was held in Christ Church, followed by the first session for business in the Parish house. Miss Hart told of her work among the Indian girls at the Carlisle school; Miss Schram spoke on her Junior work; and Mrs. Robert F. Gibson delightfully gave her impressions of "The World in Baltimore." After luncheon, served by the women of Christ Church and Trinity Church, there was a conference on the subject of The Gifts of the Women's Auxiliary. The missionary speaker was the Rev. J. A. Warden of San Juan, Porto Rico. The offering amounted to \$22.78, and after paying the traveling expenses of the speakers, a balance of \$5.00 was given to the General Fund.

The Spring meeting was held in Christ Church Memorial, Danville, on April 24th.

The session was begun with the Holy Communion, the rector, the Rev. W. C. Clapp, celebrant. This meeting was honored by the presence of our President, Mrs. Bausman, our Vice-President, Mrs. Almy, and our former secretary, Mrs. W. D. Crocker, all of whom gave excellent short talks. Mrs. Gibson, also, told of the work of the Babies' Branch; and Miss Comstock spoke on the subject of Study Classes. Owing to the serious illness of Mrs. Darlington, the Bishop could not be present; a prayer was offered for her recovery. After a delicious luncheon, the business meeting opened with a conference on:

- (a) The Parish meeting, its aims and methods.
- (b) General Auxiliary Topics.

The Rev. P. C. Daito, Tokio, was the missionary speaker. From the offering of \$32.08 the traveling expenses of the speakers were paid, leaving a balance of \$17.00 which was devoted to the

work of Dr. Daito in Japan. There was an attendance of eighty-six women and two clergymen.

On June 25th, a special Deanery meeting, representing eight parishes in the extreme north of the Archdeaconry, was held in Lawrenceville with the fine attendance of forty women and five clergymen. A celebration of the Holy Communion was held in St. John's Church, the rector, the Rev. R. W. Nickel, celebrant. A business meeting followed, opening with a conference on: The Woman's Auxiliary, its object and methods. Mrs. W. D. Crocker of Williamsport, gave an interesting, explanatory talk on the subject. Prayer for missions. A bountiful luncheon was then served by the women of St. John's in their parish house. At the business session the Organizing Secretary talked on the Gifts expected from the Woman's Auxiliary. Mrs. Crocker spoke on the General Fund, and particularly explained in detail the United Offering, giving a history of the same. She also touched upon the Jonestown Home, and she talked about the Babies' Branch. Mrs. Knox gave a report of the Babies' Branch at Coudersport. The missionary address was given by the Rev. W. C. Clapp, of Danville, on the subject of his missionary work in the Philippines. The offering of \$11.15 was used for expenses of speakers.

Very many letters have been written and received, and quantities of printed matter handled.

Report of Junior Auxiliary

HILPA S. SCHRAM, President, Columbia

The Junior Auxiliary as a whole has shown much enthusiastic interest in its work, the branches have responded promptly to all appeals, the leaders have been devoted workers, and we have much reason to be encouraged, if we *unite* our efforts, working together with right method.

Our number of branches have increased from twelve to twenty, eight new branches having been added. In gifts we have given \$413.74,—of this \$196.10 represents the value of our boxes and \$217.64 the amount of money given. And yet right here is an example of the failure of our method. Although we gave \$217.64 in money yet we were unable to pay our \$100 in pledges of which only \$68 was paid. For the branches, instead of working together to pay that amount which they themselves had pledged, designated that their money be used for other objects. Hereafter, let us give before anything else that which we have pledged.

Our method in box giving has been better. Because of the smallness of some of the branches we decided to send one large Christmas Box in common; and so, by uniting our efforts we were able to provide Christmas gifts for all the members of St. Cyprian's School, Darien, Georgia. And this year we are going to send our box to an Indian Mission in Minnesota, providing for 180 people.

As for Mission Study, I think that attention to it has been given chiefly by the younger Juniors.

We need more Senior Branches of the Junior Auxiliary. These are organizations of younger women in the church who do not belong to the Woman's Auxiliary. Every diocese is making progress in this direction and we should too. We have added eight branches this year, why not eight more next year, and every one a Senior Branch?

We have another need,—the need of more genuine interest in Mission Study. This year you have an unparalleled opportunity to inaugurate mission study among girls,—especially the older ones,—who have never been interested before. The reason is that for this year the subject to be studied is China,—not at all remote but most prominent in the current events of the day.

You cannot imagine how interesting a mission study class is until you have one. All information on the subject can be had from our educational secretary. Why can't each parish represented here have a well organized study class during the coming Lent? Now please go home with the determination to do your best to have a class even if there are no organized Juniors in your parish. And I fell confident that when they know about China, for example,—when they know that over there there are *forty* million children wanting to go to school where only *two*

million can be accomodated,—and when they learn just as many other startling facts which give proof that our help is needed,—I feel sure they will want to be "working" as well as "studying" Juniors.

We need *right method!* And better method will be ours if we have Conferences of Junior Leaders. This will mean better trained leaders, this will mean greater efficiency throughout the Diocese. Why cannot each archdeaconry, Harrisburg, Altoona and Williamsport,—have at least one Junior Leader Conference this coming year? Then our work will be better planned; and each leader, instead of feeling dependent on herself, will experience the encouragement and help that comes from co-operation.

Finally, remember the old German proverb that he who does not go forward goes backward,—and let us all help in the *forward* movement of the Junior Auxiliary.

Correspondent No. 68 reports that there are 13 Librarians in the Diocese; but all are not active, some sending no reply in response to an appeal for some report.

Librarian, Bloomsburg	sends \$5.00 in money, and five papers regularly, and 4 boxes, 325 odd magazines and has paid \$6.00 for freight.
Altoona	sent four magazines and four church papers, sent from the publishers, also 2 boxes, a barrel of magazines to Virginia and \$5.00 for freight.
Selinsgrove	sent 500 magazines, 700 pictures to a leper camp at Porto Rico, eleven periodicals sent regularly.
Lock Haven	sent six papers and two boxes of magazines.
Williamsport	sent five boxes and seven papers regularly.
St. Stepler's, Harrisburg	sent boxes containing 420 magazines, pictures and calendars to hospital and reading rooms. Ten packages sent to Panama and Alaska. Seven contributors send papers and packages to addresses furnished by the General Secretary, or to addresses in nearby towns. \$4.50 spent on freight.
St. Andrew's, Harrisburg	reports great activity and interest and sends seven papers regularly.
St. James', Lancaster	12 current periodicals sent regularly, 3 barrels of odd magazines, 1 box of picture cards and calendars, paid \$6.00 for freight.
St. John's, Lancaster	40 magazines sent regularly, \$17.50 collected and spent for magazines sent to clergymen and others.

Report of Educational Secretary

KATHARINE F. COMSTOCK.

MECHANICSBURG, PA., OCTOBER 29, 1913.

As Educational Secretary for the Diocese I have the honor of submitting the following report for the year 1912-13.

I began work in September by sending letters and circulars to 36 branches of the Auxiliary, getting names of officers from last report. Of these 36, 15 answered; 12 in the affirmative, and 3 negative. I also wrote to 12 clergymen in charge of parishes where there is no Auxiliary. Three of these answered in the negative and one in the affirmative, no word from the others at all. Out of all of these a total of 19 classes or meetings were started.

At the end of Lent, I wrote all around to inquire progress and the result was as follows:

- 4 dropped out.
- 3 did not answer.
- 1 studied subject other than missions.
- 11 reported progress.

Hence I reported 11 classes to the Educational Secretary, Mr. Gray.

I had the pleasure of speaking on the subject of study classes at Lancaster last October and in the spring at Danville.

Thinking what an advantage it would be for the Diocese to have a few trained workers with interest, knowledge and enthusiasm, I wrote to 15 young women urging them to go to the summer conference at Silver Bay. Unfortunately none could go. Perhaps, however, some of the lucky ones who went to the convention in New York, have returned primed and ready for work themselves, and willing to hand on a little of what they got to the rest of us.

I now have quite a nice start for a Diocesan library on missionary subjects and will be glad to circulate them, so I add the following list of what we now have.

Report of Committee on Indian Work in the Diocese

The work at the Carlisle School was begun in the summer of 1912 by making the acquaintance of the girls. When regular school life re-opened in September special meetings for our church girls were attempted, but school duties, parties and lectures so occupied the one free hour, that of the 63 Episcopalians, only 8 or 10 girls would be present. To overcome this difficulty the superintendent was asked to assign one evening each week for our meeting. This was granted, but ignored in the school calendar, except that Tuesday from 6 to 7 p. m. was appointed for Protestant Girls' Bible Classes. This year we were allowed to begin the class for our girls in September, the others not beginning till October.

The lack of a chaperone to escort the girls to St. John's Church has been supplied. The new matron, who came in July is a faithful member of our church. One teacher, new this year, is also an Episcopalian, and another was confirmed last February. There are 39 of our girls in the school this year and last Sunday 14 went to St. John's; while out of the 63 last year the average attendance was 3 or 4. Confirmation is carefully looked after. In February 5 girls, 3 boys, the superintendent and one teacher received it. Prayer books and Hymnals were given to each girl, not one of them having one before.

Correspondence is kept up with the girls who live in country homes scattered throughout Pennsylvania. Children sick in the school hospital are visited each week. The Churchman, the Spirit of Missions and the Young Churchman come regularly and fill a lack of past years.

The stand taken by us in demanding the right of direct oversight of our Episcopal Indian children has led other denominations to take steps toward securing similar rights, that religious instruction may receive proper recognition and not be set aside at the slightest provocation.

This work is done by Miss Josephine W. Hart, under the direction of the Committee.

Constitution of the Harrisburg Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary

Adopted at a Meeting for Organization Held at Harrisburg
Tuesday, June 13, 1905

I.

The name of this Society is THE HARRISBURG BRANCH
of the WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE BOARD OF MIS-
SIONS.

II.

The object of this Society is to diffuse knowledge of the
missionary work of the whole Church among the women of the
Diocese; to increase their interest and activity in that work; to
encourage the formation of parish branches of this Society, and
by means of united and systematic effort to promote the work of
Church extension.

III.

All Parish Societies and all individuals who have expressed
a desire to help the Woman's Auxiliary shall be considered mem-
bers of this Society.

IV.

The officers of this Society shall be a President, a Vice-
President, a General Secretary, a Treasurer, and an Organizing
Secretary from each of the Archdeaconries of the Diocese; other
officers may be chosen at the pleasure of the Society.

The President, the Vice-President, the Secretary and the
Treasurer shall be elected by the Society, at its annual meeting,
and shall be approved by the Bishop.

The Organizing Secretaries shall be appointed by the Bishop.

V.

The duties of the President are to call all meetings, to pre-
side at them and to have the general oversight and direction of
the work of the Society.

VI.

The duties of the Vice-President are to assist the President,
and in her absence, to preside at all meetings of the Society.

VII.

The duties of the Organizing Secretaries are to form new Parish Branches in their several Archdeaconries, wherever possible, and to try to stimulate the interest of our Church folk in all missionary work. They are authorized to hold meetings within the several Archdeaconries and are free to conduct their work under the general approval of the President of the Society and the Bishop of the Diocese.

They shall receive from the Parish Branches reports of all work done by them, and also all moneys contributed by or through them, and give a receipt for the same.

Each Organizing Secretary shall send to the Treasurer of the Society all money received from its branches, immediately on receipt of the same, together with a detailed account designating the source from which and the object for which they were received.

Each Organizing Secretary shall send to the General Secretary, at least one month before the annual meeting, a detailed report of all work done by the Society within her Archdeaconry.

VIII.

The duties of the General Secretary are to prepare a report of the work of the Society for its annual meeting; to keep the minutes of all its meetings; to have charge of the printing of its reports and other documents, and to conduct such correspondence with the parent Society and other branches as the President may direct and approve.

IX.

The duties of the Treasurer are to receive all moneys of the Society; to pay out the same with the approval of the President; to have oversight of all the financial transactions of the Society and to present to the Society at its annual meeting a detailed statement of all moneys received and disbursed.

X.

There shall be appointed by the President at each annual meeting a committee of two persons, whose duty it shall be to audit the accounts of the Treasurer.

XI.

Each Parish Branch shall send to the Organizing Secretary of its Archdeaconry all moneys contributed for the Society and

also quarterly reports of all work done, including the furnishing of boxes for missionaries.

XII.

There shall be one general meeting of the Society in each year at such time and place as may be designated by the Bishop.

XIII.

Special meetings may be called by the President at the request of two Organizing Secretaries or of four Parish Branches.

XIV.

This Constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the Society at any annual meeting.
