


Minutes of the Tenth Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Harrisburg

The tenth annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Harrisburg, was held in St. John's Church, York, October 26th and 27th. October 26th Officer's meeting at 3:30 p. m.

At eight p. m. Monday the 26th, the service in the church was conducted by the venerable Archdeacon McMillan, assisted by the General Missionary, Rev. Leroy H. Baker, Rev. James F. Bullitt, and Rev. A. R. Taylor, rector. Bishop Darlington was unable to be present on account of the death of one of Mrs. Darlington's family.

Bishop Funsten of Boise, spoke interestingly of conditions in Idaho, telling of the Mormon, irrigation, life of the miners, his hospital and church schools.

Many delegates were entertained at dinner and over night most generously by the people of St. John's.

October 27th, Tuesday, the Holy Communion was celebrated by the venerable Archdeacon McMillan, assisted by Rev. A. R. Taylor, and Rev. H. D. Speakman.

At 11:00 o'clock the business meeting was called to order by the President, Mrs. Bausman, who showed the Auxiliary the interesting gavel of olive wood brought from Jerusalem by Miss Schram.

A motion was made and carried to omit the reading of the minutes, as they had already been printed. The Secretary called attention to the "Bishop's Hand," barrels to be kept in Parish Houses for magazines and "Consecrated Automobiles" as mentioned in the minutes. The roll call showed 133 present, 24 branches being represented.

The President read her annual address. The Treasurer's report showed a balance of \$152.53, United Offering \$707.54.

Reports by the Organizing Secretaries of the Archdeaconries of Harrisburg, Williamsport and Altoona were read and accepted.

Miss Mary McMillan read the Junior report in the absence of the President, Miss Schram.

Mrs. Gibson being unable to attend, Mrs. John Miller read the report of the Little Helpers.

Mrs. Comstock reported for the Educational Secretary who was absent.

Mrs. Herbert Hartman, Chairman for Work at the Carlisle Indian School, gave an interesting report.

Mrs. Bausman appointed Mrs. Clement from the Williamsport Archdeaconry Miss Berghaus, Altoona Archdeaconry and Mrs. John Miller, Harrisburg Archdeaconry, as a Committee to make nominations after luncheon.

Miss Shaw offered the following:

Resolved that, the President shall not serve longer than 3 yearly consecutive terms. An amendment was offered that this apply to all elective offices. After much discussion the amendment was defeated, and the resolution was adopted in its original form.

Mrs. Comstock offered this resolution, Resolved that, the delegates to the Triennial meeting of the National Woman's Auxiliary be elected from the officers of the Diocesan Auxiliary. The five receiving the highest number of votes shall be the delegates, the remainder alternates in the order of the votes they receive.

An amendment was offered that this be made four officers to be chosen and one delegate and one alternate from the floor. This resolution as amended was carried.

It was announced that Mr. Willis Geist Newbold is willing to give lantern lectures on general missions or diocesan missions providing lantern and slides, his expenses only to be paid.

A delicious luncheon was served in the Parish House by the women of St. John's. The small tables seating six were each decorated with lovely autumn flowers.

At two p. m. Professor Goodrich spoke most briefly of his difficulties at Carlisle School but gave a picture of his finding his way to the hearts of the lonely girls and boys and making them feel his friendship.

A rising vote of thanks was given Mrs. Marshall for her faithful and efficient labors as Treasurer. Her resignation was received with deep regret.

Mrs. Marshall thanked the Auxiliary and suggested that the General Fund be given up and an Expense Fund be substituted. This was thoroughly discussed. Mrs. Drinkwater from Williamsport suggested the Expense Fund be assessed per capita.

Mrs. Drinkwater moved a committee composed of members from each Archdeaconry be formed to apportion the amount to be assessed from each parish. Mrs. McMillan asked if it would be better to ask for pledges? Miss Watts moved this be left to the Committee. This motion being carried Mrs. Bausman appointed the Organizing Secretaries and the President as the Committee.

Miss Logan made a motion which was seconded and carried to continue the pledge of \$50 to the Jonestown Home.

The nominating committee brought in their ballot: Mrs. Drinkwater, Williamsport, President; Mrs. Rose Sage, Altoona, 1st Vice President; Mrs. Olney, Williamsport, 2d Vice President; Mrs. Bullitt, Harrisburg, Secretary, and Mrs. Steacy, York, Treasurer.

Mrs. Bullitt, Miss Watts and Mrs. Hartman were nominated from the floor for president. Miss Watts and Mrs. Hartman withdrew their names.

Mrs. James F. Bullitt was elected President by ballot. A motion was made and carried to next elect the Secretary. Miss Kathleen B. Watts of Chambersburg was nominated and elected by standing vote.

Mrs. Drinkwater, Miss Watts, Mrs. Wooley, Mrs. McMillan, and Mrs. Rose Sage were nominated for 1st Vice President. Miss Watts name being withdrawn when she was elected for Secretary. Mrs. McMillan withdrew her name. Mrs. Drinkwater was elected 1st Vice President by ballot.

Mrs. Almy was the only nominee for 2d Vice President. She was elected by a rising vote.

Mrs. Steacy of York and Mrs. Wooley of Danville, were nominated for Treasurer, Mrs. Steacy being elected by ballot.

A motion was made by Mrs. John Miller to show by a rising vote our love and appreciation of the faithful, loyal and devoted leadership of the retiring President Mrs. Bausman, who founded the Auxiliary in the new Diocese and cared for it during its early infancy and struggles for ten years.

Great regret was also expressed by many of the retirement of Mrs. George D. Ramsay from the Vice Presidency. She had worked side by side with the President, and was President and founder of the Juniors until two years ago when her resignation was regretfully received.

Miss Higgins of the Elizabeth Bunn Memorial Hospital, China, told many interesting details of her work, especially pathetic is the condition of the children caused by the ignorance of the young mothers.

Mr. Speakman of Mont Alto, made a strong appeal for clothing for the patients and urged a visit from some members of the Auxiliary. Mrs. Drinkwater was appointed Chairman of a committee of her own choosing to redraft the constitution and report at the next annual Meeting.

The offerings amounted to \$59.85. A vote of thanks was unanimously passed to the women of St. John's parish for their generous hospitality.

The meeting adjourned after the benediction by the venerable Archdeacon McMillan.

Explanation for Treasurers

Treasurers of Auxiliary Branches should send all moneys to the Organizing Secretary of her Archdeaconry. She in turn shall send all money received to the Diocesan Auxiliary Treasurer. The ~~Diocesan~~ Treasurer will forward it to its destination whether to the Treasurer of the Diocese or to the General Treasurer in New York or to a special object, keeping the Expense Fund for the expenses of the Auxiliary. Money sent in this way is credited on the apportionment for General or Diocesan Missions of the parish from whence it comes by the Treasurers in New York or Lancaster.

An Executive meeting of the new officers was held and a resolution adopted, to petition the next Annual Meeting, to make Mrs. J. W. B. Bausman honorary President for life, in recognition of her founding this branch of the Woman's Auxiliary and having given it her fostering care and untiring devotion and love for ten years.

PRESIDENT'S ANNUAL ADDRESS

We are meeting again, my dear fellow workers, in yearly conclave, to read our reports, go over the work of the past twelve months, and to plan and map out our work for the coming year.

You will learn from the reports which will be read to you, and which will very soon be printed, that there is much encouragement all along the line of our activities. I am greatly pleased with the increase in Mission Study classes. How happy I should be if there could be reported one in each parish.

The United Offering is the largest we have ever had in the first year of the Triennial. I am looking forward with confidence to seeing a cheque for at least \$4000 laid upon the plate in 1916, which will be almost double that of 1913. Our motto should be "Attempt great things for God, expect great things from God." I am sure we all realize that the United Offering is not only a thanksgiving for the blessing of our religion, but for all the blessings which God is constantly bestowing upon us. I doubt if there is a woman here who has not uttered words of thankfulness in the last few months, that this blessed country of ours is not engaged in a horrible war, where she might have sons, brothers or husband in mortal danger. Do not I pray you forget that the only real, sincere gratitude is that which finds expression in deeds.

The General Fund appears to be growing less, although our money gifts have increased. This, I think, is because some of the clergy desire that the money be sent in a different way, which has caused our present methods to become unsatisfactory. I would therefore suggest to the Auxiliary that we adopt an entirely new system of collecting and distributing money, which will satisfy the parishes, and also meet the requirements of the board of Missions.

The Juniors have done splendidly this year. I am especially pleased that out of twenty branches, seventeen have done Mission Study work. I need scarcely say that we have some fine enthusiastic young women working in various parts of the diocese. But, the goal is not yet reached. In every parish there are quantities of girls and young women ready to do good work, if only some one can be found to lead them. Does not this appeal to the young women trained in the Church to the knowledge that Spiritual blessings grow by sharing.

In the last year Mrs. G. Ross Eshelman has been appointed to represent the Spirit of Missions in the Diocese. She has com-

municated with every parish. I hope this will result in a decided increase in the subscriptions to this excellent magazine, which should find a place in the home of every Church family.

I wonder if you all know that this branch of the Auxiliary has reached the mature age of ten years; and that I have been your President from the beginning. I helped to organize the branch, nursed it through the trying time of babyhood, upheld and sustained it in the experimental years of early childhood, encouraged it to stand alone and acquire strength and independence. It would not have been possible for me to do all of this, had I not had the help and co-operation of the most devoted and competent officers.

Now the time has come for another to take the head, and lead you to the larger and greater things which you are going to achieve.

I have been very happy in my work, and through it have learned to know and love my Church more intensely than ever before, and have come to realize each year the great opportunities given to women to help extend the kingdom of God, through prayer, work and love.

Report of the Altoona Archdeaconry

There are five active branches.

The winter meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Archdeaconry of Altoona was held in St. John's Church, Huntingdon, on January 9th. It was a well attended meeting, all branches being represented.

The session was begun with a celebration of the Holy Communion. The Ven. Franklin T. Eastment, of the Altoona Archdeaconry preached the sermon.

The topic for discussion was the General Convention and Various Phases of Church Work: The attitude of the Church in General Convention as to religious Education, Social Service and Christian Unity. The speakers were the clergymen from our Archdeaconry.

The members of St. John's Auxiliary provided luncheon which was a great success.

After the expenses of the meeting were paid, the remainder, \$11.00 was devoted to the work among the Deaf Mutes in the Diocese.

The next Archdeaconry meeting is to be held in Lewistown.

St. Mark's, Lewistown; St. John's, Harrisburg; Trinity, Tyrone; and St. Luke's, Altoona, have conducted Mission Study classes and are looking forward to establishing similar classes for the coming winter.

Report of the Harrisburg Archdeaconry

The Organizing Secretary of the Women's Auxiliary of the Archdeaconry of Harrisburg has the honor of submitting the following report from May 1, 1913, to date, October 27, 1914.

At present there are eighteen active branches of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Archdeaconry of Harrisburg. A branch was organized in St. Mary's, Waynesboro, January, 1914.

The Secretary regrets she has received no response to letters or notices sent to St. Paul's, Columbia, for over a year.

The branch organized at Marietta in 1913 has been doing splendid work. The branch at Manheim has been re-organized and is in a flourishing condition.

In all there are 365 members, forty more than reported last year.

The winter meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary in this Archdeaconry, was held in Trinity Church, Steelton, February 5, 1914. This was the most largely attended meeting that has been held since your Organizing Secretary has been in office, there being 66 delegates and innumerable visitors.

At the Holy Communion service, Bishop Darlington was the celebrant. Bishop Tyler, Missionary Bishop of North Dakota, preached a scholarly sermon at morning service. The Box Lunch, as always, was a great success. At the afternoon session, the Rev. Mr. Roelker, Italian Missionary of Bethlehem, spoke enthusiastically of the work among his countrymen in Bethlehem. As a result of his address, work among the Italians was started in Steelton and Harrisburg. The offering amounted to \$30.00 less expenses, which was apportioned as follows:

\$15.00 to Mr. Lollis—to buy Prayer-books for Italians.

\$1.00 to General Fund.

\$5.00 to Bishop Darlington's "Helping Hand."

A neighborhood meeting of the branches in the Cumberland Valley was held in St. Andrew's, Shippensburg, April 22, 1914. There were about fifty persons present. The Rev. Mr. Woodard celebrated the Holy Communion at 10:30 a. m. Dr. Floyd Appleton of St. Paul's, Harrisburg, preached an excellent sermon at the morning service.

Many vital questions were discussed without reserve, and problems were settled in many hearts and minds so that one felt repaid for making the effort to attend. At the afternoon session, Prof. Goodrich, recently of China and Japan, gave a most delightful talk on these countries from a layman's point of view and invited questions which increased the interest. The offering amounted to \$12.88 and was given to the General Fund.

Your Secretary has visited many of the branches. Appoint-

ments were made for various visits that had to be postponed for good reasons. She would like to visit all of the branches if possible, and she takes this opportunity to invite the members to call upon her if at any time she can render them a service in their work.

Report of the Williamsport Archdeaconry

The Organizing Secretary of the Williamsport Archdeaconry submits the following report for the year 1913-1914.

Number of active branches, seventeen.

Number of newly organized branches, two—St. John's, Catawissa, and Trinity, Shamokin. Number inactive branches, One—Renova. Several letters have been written to the old officers of this branch without response; but we still hope, and therefore have not crossed them off our books.

Four visitations have been made by train, trolley, or automobile: the first resulting in an Archdeaconry Meeting, the second and third, in newly organized branches; and on October 13th an automobile party visited a branch that considers itself weak, some forty miles distant. It was a beautiful day in every particular, a royal welcome, including luncheon was given us by a large number of the women of the parish, and the Rector; Auxiliary matters were thoroughly discussed, and if the visited reaped as much benefit as the visitors, results may be hoped for.

The Mid-Winter Archdeaconry meeting was held in St. Paul's parish, Lock Haven, on January 29th with an attendance of about fifty women. At 10:30 the Holy Communion was celebrated by the Rector, the Rev. Lewis Nichols. A box-luncheon proved a success, and afforded a pleasant social hour.

The business session opened with a conference on Woman's Auxiliary topics. Two excellent papers were read, followed by animated discussion—educational work, Mission Study classes—both ably presented.

The Missionary address was given by Dr. Mary S. Glenton of Wu-Chang, China. An offering of \$18.18 was used to defray the speaker's expenses, and the balance voted to Dr. Glenton's work in China.

The Spring meeting, held in All Saints Church, Selins Grove on April 23, was opened with a celebration of the Holy Communion, the General Missionary, the Rev. L. F. Baker, officiating, assisted by the Rev. Robert F. Gibson.

A delightful hour followed in the rectory where luncheon was served. At the Business Session sixty-one responded to roll call, representing ten parishes. This meeting was particularly favored by the presence of our Diocesan President, Mrs. Bausman, and by three clergymen. The Rev. Dr. Gibson opened this session with a most inspiring address on the subject "Prayer." This was followed by a conference on: How definitely should prayer be used in Parish Auxiliary meetings, and on other Auxiliary subjects. Several very good papers were read that called out earnest discussion. It has been most gratifying to the Organizing Sec-

retary that the women in her Archdeaconry do enter so heartily into these conferences, thus evincing real interest.

Mrs. Bausman told us that she was going to fulfill her part in the program by "preaching a sermon" which she proceeded to do in a most convincing manner, taking as her text St. John: "What I do ye can do and more, if ye believe in me."

The Conference on: How can the Auxiliary be made a vital force in the community, led up to the final subjects, viz: The Juniors and the Little Helpers—the workings of which were ably portrayed by the President of the Little Helpers. In response to a request from Bishop Darlington for fifty dollars toward the salary of a resident Missionary in the Carlisle Indian School, eight branches pledged \$5.00 each, and upon motion of Mrs. Gibson it was voted to donate \$10.00 of the day's offering to the same. The balance of the offering—\$16.75 was voted to Bishop Darlington for Diocesan use at his discretion.

It is a matter of regret and disappointment that the meeting arranged for the Northern Deaconry had to be postponed. Wellsboro has kindly extended the invitation to next Spring when it is hoped that a good meeting may be given them.

We think that the amount of money contributed by this Archdeaconry, this year, highly commendable. May the Spiritual returns be even greater, for the material and the Spiritual must go hand in hand.

Annual Report of the Junior Auxiliary

The report of the Junior Auxiliary for the year 1913-1914 is a good one because in every item we have done better than in the previous year of 1912-1913. Last fall I was obliged to confess we had raised only \$60 of the \$100 that we had pledged. This year I am glad to say, that although we raised our pledges from \$100 to \$150, yet they are paid in full, and instead of a shortage we have the very nice little balance of \$16.75. Fifty dollars of this money went to St. Hilda's, China, fifty dollars to Nenana, Alaska, and the remaining fifty dollars to an Indian Reservation School in Wyoming. The boxes of this year amounted to \$250 in comparison with \$185 of the previous year. And the same good advance has been made in the matter of the United Offering and Diocesan Missions.

We have gained five new branches and lost two, making the total number of branches twenty-one. Eight of these are Senior Branches of older girls; last year we had but one Senior Branch. Furthermore 17 of these 21 branches report Mission Study.

We have made great advance in the matter of Christmas gifts and all because of the good work of Miss McMillen who has undertaken the supervision of the Junior Christmas Boxes. One hundred and eighty people were supplied with gifts last year, this year we shall bring Christmas cheer to 284. I think that is a splendid increase.

So much for statistics. For this increase in the number of Christmas gifts teaches us a good lesson and tells us the reason why. It shows that much better results can be obtained when there is *one* person to take charge and organize one of the many departments of Junior Work. We are learning the lesson of co-operation, now we need more leaders to direct our united efforts. I am sure we could have the same increase in the number of branches if one person in each archdeaconry will make it her special interest to do all she can to get new branches. We need an organizing secretary in each archdeaconry. That is something we must have if our Junior Auxiliary is to grow.

For we must grow and this good report must not make us contentedly self-satisfied but rather more alert to grasp all opportunities for advancement.

We must *work* harder. Can we not add at least ten new branches? Can we not pledge \$250 instead of \$150?

We must *study* more. Can not every branch report mission study next year?

We must *pray* more. For it is our prayers that will help us convert our enthusiastic good intentions into real accomplishments.

Before I conclude I must confess one absolute failure in 1913-1914. We had *no* Junior Auxiliary Institute or Conference. We wanted to have one but we did not succeed. Can we have one this coming January? I sincerely hope so.

And now let me sum up for you our aims for the coming New Year. I should like each person interested in Junior Work to write them down and to remember them. We want archdeaconry organizing secretaries, we want \$250 to be pledged and ten new branches, we want a Junior Auxiliary Conference in January. If next year's report is to be as good as this one, it must be *better!* That sounds like a paradox, but it is true. For each year is successful only when it is in advance of the previous one. Ours must be a processional and let "Forward! be our watchword!"

Report of the Educational Secretary

It gives me pleasure to submit to the Women's Auxiliary the following report of Mission Study work in the Diocese of Harrisburg, during the past year.

Small as this sounds as a matter of statistics, I do feel that the idea of the necessity for studying missions has taken root, and if watched and tended, will, one of these days, grow and flourish beyond all our hopes.

One point I would like to impress on every parish is that if they have a study class of any kind, they should report it. Only a day or two ago, I had a letter from a branch asking about the work for this year, and saying that they had studied China last year and Japan the year before, and I had never had an answer to any of my letters in those two years. Of course that means that their classes have never been reported to headquarters.

We were fortunate enough this year to have not one, but two delegates at Silver Bay. The money was raised by contributions from classes and individuals throughout the diocese, and by a sale organized and successfully carried out by a Harrisburg Study Class. Fifty-five dollars thus raised was a little more than enough for the expenses of one delegate, so another was chosen who with the help of the small extra amount could also go. Miss McMillan of Carlisle, and Mrs. Steel of Mechanicsburg, were our two delegates, and from present indications, I think we will find them a very good investment.

Now, instead of having *diocesan* delegates next year, can't we have *parish* delegates? Think how the work would grow with the stimulus that would give it.

The course of study for this year is "The Social Aspect of Foreign Missions," by Dr. Faunce, President of Brown University. Beginning with a discussion of the origin of social life, the book shows how human welfare has satisfactorily increased and developed only in those places where the Incarnation has been made known to men. It is a vivid and fascinating book, and is now on sale. To go with this book, there are suggestions to leaders, both for classes and meetings. They will sell for five cents each. There are four additional books collateral reading. These, together with the text book and both sets of "Suggestions," can be had for \$2.00. The Junior book is called "Building the City," and has its own "Hints to Junior Leaders."

Report of the Committee on Indian Work

The Committee on Indian Work in the Diocese respectfully reports that Miss Josephine W. Hart, who had charge of our work at the Carlisle School, resigned in the Spring to return to her home in Massachusetts. Her work had been very efficient and the Committee regretted to have to part with her valuable services.

Naturally, there was very little that could be done during the months of June and July, as the students at the School were scattered abroad during the holiday recess.

On August 17th, the Committee, acting in conjunction with Bishop Darlington and Archdeacon McMillan, secured the services of Professor Joseph K. Goodrich of Carlisle to act as Spiritual Advisor to the Indian boys and girls of our Church, who were in attendance at the Carlisle School. Prof. Goodrich began his labors at once and has been giving constant and faithful attention to his duties ever since. Just what he has accomplished and is doing can be best told by himself, and as he is in attendance at this Convention your Committee asks that he be given a short time during this session to speak of his work.

At the time of Miss Hart's resignation, there was an unexpended balance of \$17.07 in the Treasury, and early in August your Committee was delighted to receive from the Indian Hope Association of Philadelphia, through Bishop Darlington, the sum of \$300.00. As the services of Prof. Goodrich are to be paid at the rate of \$8.00 per week for 50 weeks and as there will be some other expenses, it is evident that the Auxiliary must provide at least \$100.00, if Prof. Goodrich is to be retained for so long a time, and it would be a great pity, as well as a loss to the students, if his services were to be dispensed with before the close of the present school year.

Your chairman, for some time past, has taken charge of the funds of the Committee, and has paid Mr. Goodrich through Archdeacon McMillan; but it has been thought advisable to make payments hereafter through Mr. G. N. Reynolds, Treasurer of the Board of Missions to whom the balance in hand has been turned over.

Constitution of the Harrisburg Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary

Adopted at a Meeting for Organization Held at Harrisburg
Tuesday, June 13, 1905.

I.

The name of this Society is THE HARRISBURG BRANCH
of the WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE BOARD OF MIS-
SIONS.

II.

The object of this Society is to diffuse knowledge of the
missionary work of the whole Church among the women of the
Diocese; to increase their interest and activity in that work; to
encourage the formation of parish branches of this Society, and
by means of united and systematic effort to promote the work of
Church extension.

III.

All Parish Societies and all individuals who have expressed
a desire to help the Woman's Auxiliary shall be considered mem-
bers of this Society.

IV.

The officers of this Society, shall be a President, a Vice-
President, a General Secretary, a Treasurer, and an Organizing
Secretary from each of the Archdeaconries of the Diocese; other
officers may be chosen at the pleasure of the Society.

The President, the Vice-President, the Secretary and the
Treasurer shall be elected by the Society, at its annual meeting,
and shall be approved by the Bishop.

The Organizing Secretaries shall be appointed by the Bishop.

V.

The duties of the President are to call all meetings, to pre-
side at them and to have the general oversight and direction of
the work of the Society.

VI.

The duties of the Vice-President are to assist the President,
and in her absence, to preside at all meetings of the Society.

VII.

The duties of the Organizing Secretaries are to form new Parish Branches in their several Archdeaconries, wherever possible, and to try to stimulate the interest of our Church folk in all missionary work. They are authorized to hold meetings within the several Archdeaconries and are free to conduct their work under the general approval of the President of the Society and the Bishop of the Diocese.

They shall receive from the Parish Branches reports of all work done by them, and also all moneys contributed by or through them, and give a receipt for the same.

Each Organizing Secretary shall send to the Treasurer of the Society all money received from its branches, immediately on receipt of the same, together with a detailed account designating the source from which and the object for which they were received.

Each Organizing Secretary shall send to the General Secretary, at least one month before the annual meeting, a detailed report of all work done by the Society within her Archdeaconry.

VIII.

The duties of the General Secretary are to prepare a report of the work of the Society for its annual meeting; to keep the minutes of all its meetings; to have charge of the printing of its reports and other documents, and to conduct such correspondence with the parent Society and other branches as the President may direct and approve.

IX.

The duties of the Treasurer are to receive all moneys of the Society; to pay out the same with the approval of the President; to have oversight of all the financial transactions of the Society and to present to the Society at its annual meeting a detailed statement of all moneys received and disbursed.

X.

There shall be appointed by the President at each annual meeting a committee of two persons, whose duty it shall be to audit the accounts of the Treasurer.

XI.

Each Parish Branch shall send to the Organizing Secretary of its Archdeaconry all moneys contributed for the Society and also quarterly reports of all work done, including the furnishing of boxes for missionaries.

XII.

There shall be one general meeting of the Society in each year at such time and place as may be designated by the Bishop.

XIII.

Special meetings may be called by the President at the request of two Organizing Secretaries or of four Parish Branches.

XIV.

This Constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the Society at any annual meeting.
