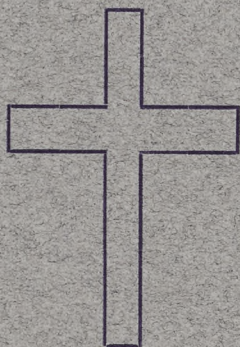

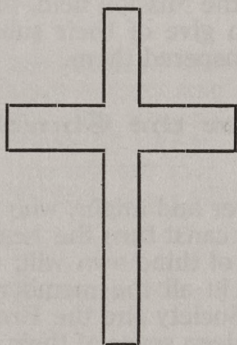

## PRESIDENT'S FOREWORD

---

"God hath made of one blood all nations of men for to dwell on all the face of the earth." (Acts 17-26.) So it has been proved by this cruel war which has thrown the whole world in shadow, but despite this and the hard times, the Board of Missions has had the wonderful joy of an almost completed Emergency Fund of \$400,000, and in our own Diocese an awakened interest in many directions.

May I suggest a few points to help us in the coming year; Spiritual, Intellectual and Financial:—

### SPIRITUAL

Let us endeavor in every branch to hold a Corporate Communion once a year, and never fail to open and close our meetings with prayer; even if rehearsing one of the Mission Plays, let us remember to pray.

### INTELLECTUAL

The aim of Missionary Education is to develop Christian character through Mission study, which should help to make us better Christians, better mothers and better citizens. Mission study is widening every day in its scope. "Jesus came, not to teach eleven, but to be a leaven." Our greatest inspiration should come from the Bible, and Miss Lindley has several books on Missions in the Bible. It is a satisfaction to know that our Mission Classes have increased from sixteen to twenty-eight, and our thanks are largely due to Miss Comstock whose interest started and fostered the Missionary Institute. This coming year, why could we not have one in Altoona or Lewistown, one in Lancaster and one in Williamsport or Bloomsburg? The new Educational Secretary, Miss Sheaffer, with her Silver Bay experience, and Miss Rich of Williamsport, who comes filled with enthusiasm from the Cambridge Conference, Miss Tillotson, Assistant Secretary of the "W. A." in New York; Miss Lucy Sturgis, Educational Secretary of Massachusetts, and Miss Ethel Hubbard, Junior Leader of Pennsylvania, besides two younger Juniors, Miss Emily Saunders and Miss Sarah Baker, have offered to help us during the winter. The Conference at Silver Bay was one of the most delightful and inspiring experiences of my life, and I never invested \$50 better. I urge you all to try to go to Cambridge or Silver Bay next summer.

### CENTER MEETINGS

The Center Meeting was suggested to arouse interest in Missions, by having a central place and a fixed date each month



throughout the year. Several branches meeting together, the strong encouraging the weak, and offering an opportunity for an individual to join in a gathering, even though there was none in the home Parish. The Diocese was divided into eighteen Centers. It would seem wise for each one to have a Director, Secretary and Treasurer, and reports should be made to the Organizing Secretaries. Help in obtaining speakers can be had from the Educational Secretary.

#### AN AUXILIARY HOUR

The anniversary at the time of the Diocesan Convention proved so successful, may we ask the privilege of having an Auxiliary Hour allotted to us, when our work may be brought to the notice of the Clergy? We need their help, and ours should be of value to them.

#### SECTION "B"

We want more of the younger women in the Auxiliary. Could we have a Special Leader to interest and start Section "B"?

#### JUNIOR AUXILIARY

To the Juniors, I would like to suggest an Annual Meeting of their own, and Special Leader for the Senior Branches.

#### FINANCES

It is strongly impressed upon many in the Auxiliary and upon your President, that our first duty is to obey the Board of Missions, assisting our Parishes to pay their apportionment. General Mission apportionment for the Diocese is \$10,338 and the Diocesan apportionment \$6,945. Please go home from this meeting and ask if your Parish apportionment to General and Diocesan Missions has been made, and make plans to see that it is this coming year. If you do not use the Duplex Envelopes, bring your influence to bear to have them used in your Parish. System in the management of your household produces best results; so it does in Church Work. We shall ask no longer to have this money, contributed through Duplex envelopes, sent through our Treasurer, but the women's with the men's offering go through the Parish Treasurer direct to General or Diocesan Treasurer. It would seem wisest at the Annual Meeting, to make our pledges for the Jonestown Home and for the Indian School at Carlisle, also Mt. Alto.

The President visited nine places, two of these as far distant as Altoona and Williamsport, and wrote about two hundred and twenty-five letters. We wish our Auxiliary to be run on business lines, and to be democratic. Surely it is better to choose Officers for their fitness, rather than a full purse. Therefore the necessity



of an Expense Fund born in proportionate amounts by all the Branches of the Auxiliary. It is unfortunate that we are unable to pay the traveling expenses of the President, Organizing Secretaries and Educational Secretary, as well as all their postage and stationery, but I would urge all the Branches to individually pay the traveling expenses of any Officer visiting them, and that the Officers have their postage and stationery paid from the Expense Fund.

When our duties are done, may we have the joy of giving to our great United Thank-Offering, being thankful for the joys which come to us as Christian women, this year particularly for the blessings of living in a peaceful land. We have 5,269 Episcopal women in the Diocese. At the last Triennial our United Thank-Offering amounted to \$2,064, averaging only thirty-nine cents apiece, or thirteen cents a year from each one. Can we not each give at least a penny a week, which would amount to over \$8,000, and those of us who are able, many times a penny a week, for as we know our Auxiliary only now numbers eight hundred, less than one-sixth of the number of the women in the Diocese. Do we need United Offering Agitators to help in increasing this fund?

#### DIOCESAN MISSIONARY

Some of us perhaps do not know that we have the privilege of having our own representative in Japan, Miss Elizabeth Newbold. Miss Newbold was ordered a Deaconess by Bishop McKim in the Missionary District of Tokio on St. Michael and All Angels' Day. We do not have the satisfaction of paying Miss Newbold's full salary, but I hope that we shall never be found lacking in remembering her in our prayers, especially at the meetings of the Auxiliary, and our constant interest in her work. The President has recently had a letter from her, for the first time making a request for assistance, and this is not for herself, but to aid in selling some of the work of the Japanese Woman's Auxiliary.

#### RESIGNATION OF FOUR OFFICERS

The personnel of the Auxiliary is very rapidly changing. Mrs. Almy, who for nearly twenty years has served so faithfully as Organizing Secretary and Vice President, feels that she must no longer remain one of its Officers. It was with great regret that the Auxiliary bade farewell to Miss Schram, our able Junior Leader, when she became Mrs. Wood and went to Illinois. You will all be sorry to know that Mrs. Gibson feels she can no longer serve as our inspiring Leader of the Little Helpers. Where can we fill her place? After the splendid results in the Mission Study work, it is sad that Miss Comstock feels she is unable to serve longer as Educational Secretary.

All our work has been made easier this year by the many helps prepared for us by our Leaders in New York, and I trust every Branch of the Auxiliary, and better still, every member, will try to own Miss Emery's Woman's Auxiliary Handbook, and every Junior, Miss Lindley's Junior Book. Throughout the year I have quoted Miss Emery's four splendid points as our reasons for Missions; you may learn them for yourselves, but may we all keep in our hearts—The Joy of the Promise—"The earth shall be filled with the knowledge of the Lord as the waters cover the sea."

## Minutes of the Eleventh Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Harrisburg

---

The eleventh annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Harrisburg was held in St. Matthew's Church, Sunbury, October 6th and 7th. The day previous to this meeting the executive meeting was held in Bloomsburg at the home of Mrs. Wirt, the Vice President of the Archdeaconry of Williamsport, who generously entertained all of the officers.

At 10:15 a. m. Wednesday the 6th, the Quiet Hour, at St. Matthew's Church was conducted by the Rev. George Israel Browne, rector of St. John's, Lancaster.

At 11:15 the delegates met in the Sunday School room. The registration showed 138 present, representing 23 parishes.

The president, Mrs. Bullitt, called the business meeting to order. Mrs. Clement, president of the hostess branch, offered hospitality of the parish and of the town to the visitors. Mrs. Bullitt replied, expressing appreciation of those present.

As all reports would appear later in the printed annual report, they were omitted; instead the officers were permitted to speak for three minutes on subjects they deemed important.

The president made the annual address, which was very suggestive and helpful. Bishop Darlington offered the prayers for missions at the noon hour.

The secretary read a letter from Miss Newbold, the only Diocesan Missionary in the field. She is now stationed in Japan, doing excellent and earnest work.

The session adjourned for lunch and convened at 2 p. m. in the Parish House. The resignations of the following officers were received and accepted with deep regret: Mrs. Almy, Mrs. Gibson, Miss Comstock and Mrs. Wood.

Information Cards—questions concerning missions will be printed and ready for distribution among the Branches.

Three-minute reports of the vice presidents of the Archdeaconries of Harrisburg showed great activity in the branches and untiring effort on the part of the officers. The educational secretary, Miss Comstock, being unable to be present, Miss Watts, of St. Stephen's, Harrisburg, read her report, which showed an increase of mission study classes from 16 to 28.

Miss Nanna Stewart of Trinity, Chambersburg, the new leader of the Juniors, was introduced to the members.

The following nominating committee was appointed: Mrs. Wooley, Miss Mary Culbertson and Mrs. Herbert Hartman; tellers, Mrs. Myers and Mrs. Brosius.

Miss Julia C. Emery, secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary, was the speaker of the afternoon. She vivified the weak and strong points of the Auxiliary and made a strong plea for active



labor. She answered many puzzling questions and satisfied many problems. Her visit was greatly appreciated and enjoyed.

The president urged the use of the Duplex envelopes in all the parishes and asked those present to investigate in their parish whether such envelopes were used, how much had been paid toward the apportionment, and insist that each parish member in her respective parish put a regular specified amount in the mission side of the envelope.

It was recommended that one day's wage be devoted every year to general missions.

As this is the year of the Triennial when our United Offering is offered in thanksgiving, all the members are urged to give largely as the Lord has prospered them, therefore United Offering agitators will be appointed who will endeavor to emphasize the privileges of giving toward this offering. It is hoped many will avail themselves and that the response will be generous.

The last half hour of this session was devoted to the discussion of the Constitution, revised and presented by Mrs. Drinkwater and her committee.

Thursday morning, Holy Communion was celebrated by Bishop Darlington, assisted by Mr. Pugh and Mr. Tyndell. The business meeting followed immediately in the Parish House, at which the president, Mrs. Bullitt, presided.

The Constitution was amended and finally accepted. A rising vote of thanks was given Mrs. Drinkwater for her skill in presenting this Constitution so satisfactorily.

Pledges were made,—to Jonestown Home, \$50.00; to Indian work in Carlisle, \$100.00.

A plea was made for work of the colored race in the Diocese and some pledges received. Also for the work at the White Pine Sanatorium, Mont Alto.

A resolution was offered. The Harrisburg Branch moves "that a day for a Corporate Communion be adopted by the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions." Said resolution be presented at the Triennial.

Resolved that "the Harrisburg Branch petition the Diocesan Convention for an Auxiliary Hour during the Convention at which time representatives of the Auxiliary will go to the Diocesan Convention and present its work, etc."

The Bishop's address, scheduled for Wednesday, was postponed until Thursday, at which time he spoke earnestly of special needs in the Diocese. His remarks were attentively listened to and appreciated.

All branches desiring to fill boxes must apply to Miss Watts, the Secretary, for names and addresses of worthy missionaries or of institutions that need such help.



The Conferences at the Church Missions House, New York, were announced.

The chairman of the Nominating Committee, Mrs. Wooley, presented a ticket for the election. There were no nominations from the floor.

The following officers were elected by ballot:

PRESIDENT—Mrs. Bullitt, who was unanimously elected, the secretary being instructed to cast the ballot.

VICE-PRESIDENT-AT-LARGE—Mrs. A. M. Drinkwater.

RECORDING SECRETARY—Miss Watts.

CORRESPONDING SECRETARY—Mrs. John Musser.

TREASURER—Mrs. Steacy, who was unanimously elected, the Secretary casting the ballot.

The following delegates to the Triennial in St. Louis in 1916, were elected: Mrs. Bullitt and Miss Stewart ex-officio; Mrs. Drinkwater, Mrs. Wirt, Miss Watts. Alternates: Mrs. Steacy, Mrs. Gibson, Mrs. Clement.

Delegates to the Provincial Synod in Richmond in November, were: Mrs. Bullitt, ex-officio; Mrs. Dunlap and Mrs. Perley.

The hospitality of St. Matthews could not be excelled. Every consideration was shown the guests. A bountiful and delicious supper was given the guests in the Parish House on Wednesday evening.

A most delightful lecture on Japan and China by Mr. and Mrs. Pancoast of Germantown, was given Wednesday evening. This lecture was illustrated by the most beautiful pictures, showing views of the Orient through which they traveled. This lecture awakened interest in the International Hospital in Japan and \$100.00 was voted to be sent from the Harrisburg Branch toward its building.

A vote of thanks was given to Mr. and Mrs. Pancoast for their generous kindness in giving this lecture.

The Educational Secretary, Miss Elsie Shaeffer, conducted very skillfully two mission study classes, one each afternoon.

The total offerings at the meeting amounted to \$65.90.

A vote of thanks was extended to the rector and the Parish of St. Matthews, Sunbury, for a most delightful and successful meeting.

The Nominating Committee for 1916 is, Miss Mary S. Culbertson, Mrs. Herbert Hartman and Mrs. LaRue Munson.

Some of the United Offering Agitators are, Mrs. Porterfield, Miss Sprecher, Mrs. John Newbold, Mrs. Oscar Benst, Miss Mary Selheimer, Mrs. Wooley, Mrs. Ecroyd, Mrs. Etner.

The meeting adjourned.

## Report of the Harrisburg Archdeaconry

The organizing secretary of the Harrisburg Archdeaconry submits the following report from December 1st, 1914, to September 1st, 1915:—

At present there are 16 active Branches of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Archdeaconry of Harrisburg. Newport was unable to send in a report, but we hope there will be an unusually good one this year. We regret to say that the Branch at Churchtown has disbanded with no hope of re-organizing at present.

The spring Archdeaconry meeting was held in St. Bartholomew's Church, Millersburg, March 18, with an attendance of 40 delegates, representing 9 Branches.

The Holy Communion was celebrated at 9:30 by our general missionary Rev. LeRoy F. Baker, and the sermon was preached by Rev. Jas. F. Bullitt, rector of St. Andrews Church, Harrisburg. It was impossible for the Bishop to be present, owing to the illness of his son.

A conference conducted by our president on Woman's Auxiliary topics of which the Expense Fund and the Center Meetings were the most important, followed the service.

Rev. Mr. Baker gave a splendid talk on Diocesan Missions, and made a strong plea for their better support.

The box luncheon was served at the home of Mrs. N. M. Freck, and was a most enjoyable occasion.

Miss Schram was to have given an explanation of Section B of the Woman's Auxiliary and Section III of the Juniors, but as she was unable to be present, Mrs. Bullitt spoke for her.

The address of the afternoon was given by the Rev. G. F. G. Hoyt, rector of St. Paul's Church, Columbia, and president of the Board of Religious Education, of the Diocese of Harrisburg, on "Religious Education." It was full of inspiration and practical suggestions.

The offering of \$12.25 was sent to the treasurer, she paying the expenses of the speakers from it.

The amount of work accomplished in this Archdeaconry is not so great as that of previous years owing to the fact that the Organizing Secretary did not get into touch with the different branches until the middle of February. Only three branches have been visited, but the correspondence with all of them has been most pleasant and she hopes that the coming year will see a great increase in the amount of work accomplished.

## Report of the Williamsport Archdeaconry

The Organizing Secretary of the Williamsport Archdeaconry is gratified to be able to report a marked increase in interest throughout her field of work. This she attributes largely to the frequent *coming together* of the church women.

In addition to the attendance at the regular archdeaconry meetings, very many of the women of the Williamsport Archdeaconry embraced the opportunity of attending the Conference held in St. Stevens, Harrisburg, last February, with its helpful educational trend; also the wonderful auxiliary meeting held in St. Andrews, Harrisburg, in May. These meetings were bound to inspire missionary zeal. Between the dates of these two meetings "Center" meetings, inaugurated by our president, Mrs. Bullitt, have been held in several parishes and have frequently been the means of awakening a missionary spirit in women not formerly interested beyond the local parish. As a result more blue boxes have been asked for, and a more thoughtful participation in study classes, and other missionary activities engendered.

A few parishes united in sending an educational delegate to the Conference at Cambridge, Mass., Miss Rich, of Williamsport, who holds herself ready to help us in our course of study.

The secretary is particularly pleased to report that the branch at Renova has been re-organized with live, interested officers, and a membership of thirty-nine.

St. Paul's, Bloomsburg, has this year had the two sections, A and B. Section B numbers sixteen members and has done excellent work.

There are yet many parishes without a branch of the Woman's Auxiliary; may the following year record many new branches. Will each organized branch help to bring this about in a neighboring parish?

The mid-winter Archdeaconry Meeting was held in the beautiful new Trinity House, Williamsport, on January 26th. At 9:30 a. m. there was a joint Holy Communion service, for the clergy, then holding an archdeaconry meeting, and the Woman's Auxiliary—Bishop Darlington celebrant. The sermon preached by the Rev. G. F. G. Hoyt, of Columbia.

The business session convened at 11 o'clock and was favored by the presence of the Diocesan president, Mrs. Bullitt, who gave an excellent talk on the present system of finance employed by the Woman's Auxiliary.

Excellent papers were presented by Miss Lyon and Miss Logan, the influence of which has been most noticeable throughout the year in behalf of Mt. Alto Sanatorium, and the Jonestown Home.

The Conference on: "Why do not all the women of the Par-



ish belong to the Auxiliary" was ably opened by Mrs. Pugh, followed by Mrs. Ecroyd and others.

The Conference on: "How far am I personally responsible for the strength or the weakness of my own branch," was well opened by Mrs. Clement, followed by others.

The Rev. Charles Noyes Tyndell read the mid-day prayers for missions; and the General Missionary, the Rev. L. F. Baker, gave a valuable talk on missions in our own Diocese.

Luncheon, served to the two bodies in convocation, afforded a delightful social hour.

Bishop Darlington, happy, as always, in an informal talk, then introduced Bishop Wells of Spokane, the missionary speaker of the day; his subject was, "Missions of the Pacific Coast."

A paper on the educational side of the Woman's Auxiliary was read by Mrs. James Irvin Steele, of Columbia, and Miss Schram presented the Junior work. The offering, amounting to \$22.17, was used to defray the traveling expenses of the speakers.

A rising vote of thanks was tendered the women of Trinity for their bountiful hospitality. Meeting adjourned.

The spring meeting, scheduled to be held in Bloomsburg, was omitted for the reason that in May all roads led to Harrisburg in honor of the tenth anniversary celebration of the Diocese.

On June 1st—a perfect day—an archdeaconry meeting was held in the Northern Deaconry in the beautiful church of St. Paul's Parish, Wellsboro. There was an attendance of seventy-three women, representing Antrim, Blossburg, Coudersport, Tioga, Wellsboro, Williamsport, Renova, Muncy, Danville and Bloomsburg. Who shall say that the automobile has not become a missionary factor? Most of those present motored to the meeting, there being two cars from Christ Church, Williamsport, and one car came a distance of more than a hundred miles.

The meeting opened with the Holy Communion, the Rev. Mr. Tyndell celebrant, assisted by the Reverends Mr. Torkington and Mr. Kitchin.

A business session followed at which conferences on the aims and methods of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions were heartily entered into by the different women present.

Mrs. Drinkwater briefly urged the more frequent coming together of auxiliary women for inspiration, and also to become better acquainted.

Mrs. Wooley gave an earnest talk on Intercessory Prayer. Mrs. Ecroyd on study classes.

The Rev. Charles Noyes Tyndell of Christ Church, Williamsport, was the speaker of the day. He gave an excellent address on "The Missionary Work that Women Can Do."



A pleasant feature of the day was the social hour in the parish house, where a most bountiful luncheon was provided. The offering was \$15.59.

With a rising vote of thanks to Mr. Tyndell for his inspiring address, also a rising vote of thanks to the women of St. Paul's, Wellsboro, for their hospitality, the meeting adjourned.

At 7:30 in the evening of the same day, St. Paul's women were asked to assemble at the home of the president, Mrs. Dunsmore, for a further consideration of the work of the Auxiliary. After many questions were thoroughly discussed, an election of officers was held, and we trust, a fresh impetus given the branch of this parish—a parish made up of splendid workers.

There are nineteen branches in this Archdeaconry. More than four hundred letters and cards have been sent out; several by special delivery.

## Report of the Educational Secretary

The Educational work in the Diocese is growing. During the last three years there has been a small but steady increase in the number of classes reported each year, beginning in 1913 with 11, growing to 16 in 1914, and this year I am glad to report that 28 classes have been organized and successfully carried on. I correspond with and made an effort to start study in 45 parishes. I had reports from 33 of these, 19 announcing classes, 14 being unable to do anything, almost always giving as a reason the lack of a leader.

You can't know the joy it gives me to be able to say that we have had an Institute! And such a successful one as it turned out to be! It was held in February, in St. Stephen's Church, Harrisburg, and about seventy-five delegates attended from all over the Diocese. Three Normal Mission Study Classes were held, and were largely attended. Among the speakers at the various meetings were Bishop Wells, Dr. Bratenahl, Miss Lindley, Miss Gertrude Ely and Mrs. Van Harlingen. The conferences led by Miss Ely and Miss Lindley on Woman's Auxiliary and Junior work were to my mind one of the most helpful features. They are both so practical and full of good ideas that have been worked out other places, and have proved their worth. The discussion was animated and general.

As an example of how pageants and dramatic representations can be utilized in educational work, a missionary play was held in Fahnestock Hall under the very able direction of Mrs. Oen-slager. There were about fifty in the cast, and it was truly an inspiring occasion. So much so that one clergyman who saw it wished it might be given in every parish in the Diocese. It aroused much enthusiasm in both actors and audience, and was a worthy example of what can be done for the cause of missions in this line.

On the whole our first Institute was a great success, as much, I hope, in its far-reaching help and guidance as in its pleasure and inspiration to those who attended. We have, incidently, learned a few points about organizing and carrying on a thing of this kind, and will be glad to put our experience at the service of other parishes who may contemplate holding an Institute.

Four delegates attended the Conference on Missionary work at Silver Bay, Miss Shaeffer from St. Mark's Church, Lewistown, Miss Hilleary from St. Stephen's, Harrisburg, Mrs. Bullitt and Miss Bame from St. Andrew's, Harrisburg. One of these delegates was sent with a fund raised by a Mission Study Class of three young girls, and another was sent by a member of St. Stephen's Auxiliary. The Diocese, however, did not confine itself entirely



to Silver Bay this year. I am happy to say we were also represented at the Cambridge Conference for Church Workers, Miss Rich being sent there by the Archdeaconry of Williamsport. This ought to give an impetus to all the work, and especially to Mission Study.

I am sorry to say that this is my last report as Educational Secretary. After three years in an office which I have most thoroughly enjoyed, I find it best to give it up, for a while at least, and it is with real regret that I take this opportunity of tendering my resignation to the Bishop, the President, and the members of the Auxiliary. I hope you will give my successor all your help and loyal support, and please be sure that I will always be ready to do anything in my power for her or for you, and above all for the Kingdom.

## Report of Center Meetings Held in the Williamsport Archdeaconry

If each Center would hold *one meeting* the stimulus of these meetings would be realized and many more would follow.

In the Bloomsburg Center, two meetings have been held in St. Paul's parish house, Bloomsburg, and a third meeting was held at St. Gabriell's, Coles Creek. At each meeting brief talks on the different phases of Auxiliary work were given. The second meeting was made more especially a Junior Day, with also a fine paper on the Girls' Friendly, read by the Bloomsburg president of that society. At one meeting Mrs. Wooley of Danville gave a most impressive talk on Intercessory prayer.

It is usual to have a speaker of the day whose traveling expenses are paid from the day's offering. At one meeting, Mrs. Ecroyd, of Muncy, talked on the Southern Mountaineers. At the second meeting the Rev. Mr. Tyndell was a most inspiring speaker on the subject of *Mission*.

Sixty women, representing the parishes of the Center, and a few invited guests from other denominations attended. At St. Gabriell's the missionary address was given by the Rev. F. O. Musser, of Bloomsburg. Subject: "The Mechanical Spirit of Missions." Father Clapp added an interesting description of some of his experiences in the Philippines, exhibiting some curios. On this occasion the offering was given to St. Gabriell's.

In this instance the usual social cup of tea was supplanted by a box luncheon, partaken of in the grove, with coffee supplied by the women of the parish.

Perhaps a word about St. Gabriell's may be not out of place. A little church, quite more than one hundred years old, near to the North Mountain, having only seven communicants; the bell, which hangs in a tree, is rung by a woman; the small organ is pumped by a woman; the work of the church done, and the congregation held together by these faithful women. They have sometimes one, sometimes two services a month, the missionary clergyman—the Rev. C. C. Kelsey, of Berwick—crossing the mountain to officiate. People come to this meeting in motors and carriages, few living near enough to walk, and there were forty present.

Blue boxes and literature were asked for, and we have reason to hope that it may prove to have been a real "stir-up" day.

A meeting of the Sunbury Center was held in All Saints Church, Selinsgrove, on June 18th, at 2:45 p. m.

Mrs. Bullitt gave the principal address on "The Center Meetings, What and Why." Mrs. Brosious spoke on "What I Found Most Interesting in the Last Spirit of Missions." And there were a few impromptu talks by women from another "Center."



The offering was \$5.55. This was added to the fund for the sending of an educational delegate to the Cambridge Conference.

A most refreshing fruit punch and wafers were afterward enjoyed at the rectory.

## Constitution of the Harrisburg Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions

### ARTICLE I.

#### NAME

The name of this Association is the Harrisburg Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions.

### ARTICLE II.

#### OBJECT

The object of this Association is to carry out in the Diocese of Harrisburg, by united and systematic effort, the three great aims of the Woman's Auxiliary, viz; Daily Prayer for Missions, the Study of Missions and Systematic Giving for Missions.

### ARTICLE III.

#### MEMBERSHIP

Every baptized woman in the Church is eligible to membership in the Parish Auxiliary, and all the Auxiliaries in the Diocese are members of this Association.

### ARTICLE IV.

#### OFFICERS

The elective officers of this Association shall consist of a President, a Vice-President-at-Large, a Vice-President of each Archdeaconry, Treasurer, Recording and Corresponding Secretaries. These officers with the President of the Juniors, the President of the Little Helpers and the Educational Secretary, shall form the Executive Board.

### ARTICLE V.

#### DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The President shall be elected at a yearly meeting, for a term of three years and may not succeed herself. It shall be the duty of the President to call meetings of the Association and the Executive Board, and preside at them. She shall also exercise a general supervision of all the work in the Diocese and make a yearly report to the Association.

Section 2. The Vice-President-at-Large shall be elected yearly and perform the duties of the President when she is unable to do so.

Section 3. Each Archdeaconry and Deanery shall, as soon as possible after the election of the President, elect from the three women in each Archdeaconry, previously nominated by the Bishop, a Vice-President to serve three years.



Section 4. The Vice-President of each Archdeaconry and Deanery shall co-operate with the President in promoting local intelligence and interest, and in directing and organizing work in her own Archdeaconry.

Section 5. The Recording Secretary shall keep the minutes of the yearly meeting and the meetings of the Executive Board, conduct all necessary correspondents, have charge of the writing, printing and sending out of reports and other documents, and make the yearly report.

Section 6. The Corresponding Secretary shall perform all such duties as pertains to her office.

Section 7. The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all moneys for the expense fund of the Association. Also receive and transmit to the Missionary Treasurers such other moneys sent to her and make a yearly report.

Section 8. The Educational Secretary shall have general supervision of all the Missionary Educational Work carried on under the auspices of the Woman's Auxiliary.

## ARTICLE VI.

### MEETINGS

There shall be one general meeting of this Association in each year, and other meetings may be called by the Executive Board.

## ARTICLE VII.

### AMENDMENTS

This Constitution and By-Laws may be altered or amended by a two-thirds vote of the whole number of delegates present at a yearly meeting.

---

### BY-LAWS

Section 1. A Nominating Committee, consisting of one member from each Archdeaconry, shall be appointed by the President at one annual meeting to serve the following year.

Section 2. Elections shall be by ballot, and each branch shall be entitled to two votes, and an additional vote for each ten members or fraction thereof. These votes shall be cast by properly accredited delegates or their alternates.

Section 3. Delegates to the Triennial meeting of the General Auxiliary shall be the President and Junior Auxiliary President ex-officio, and three from the membership of the Auxiliary, to be elected by ballot. The alternates to the Presidents to be chosen by them and the others chosen by ballot.

Section 4. There shall be three delegates to the Provincial



meetings who shall be the President Ex-officio, and two from the membership, to be chosen by ballot.

Section. 5. An expense fund shall be provided by this Association for the necessary expenses, namely, Printing, Postage, Stationery, Traveling Expenses of Speakers and Officers, etc., to be arranged at the discretion of the Executive Board.
