



RESOLUTION ON THE UNITED OFFERING OF 1919

Resolved: That the United Offering of 1919 be given to the Board of Missions, to be devoted to the training, sending and support of women for mission work at home and abroad and to the care of such workers when sick or disabled—provided that at least \$10,000 be expended for the erection, completion or renewal of a building or buildings in the mission field, approved by the Board of Missions on the recommendation of a committee composed of the President of the Board of Missions, the Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary and the members of the Conference Committee of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Also, Resolved: That to our united gifts shall be added our united and earnest prayers that God will put it into the hearts of many faithful women to give themselves or of their substance to the work of the master in the mission field.

A UNITED OFFERING PRAYER

Almighty God, Lord of the harvest, we humbly beseech Thee to send forth more laborers into Thy harvest, and especially to put it into the hearts of many faithful women to give themselves to Thy work in the Mission field, or if they cannot go themselves to give of their substance gladly, as Thou hast prospered them, and so may the bounds of Thy Blessed Kingdom be enlarged, through Jesus Christ, our Lord. *Amen.*

NOONDAY PRAYER FOR MISSIONS

Blessed Saviour, who at this hour didst hang upon the cross, stretching forth Thy loving arms, grant that all mankind may look unto Thee and be saved, through Thy mercies and merits Who livest and reignest with the Father and the Holy Ghost ever one God, world without end. *Amen.*

COLLECTS FOR MISSIONS

O God, who hast made of one blood all nations of men for to dwell on the face of the whole earth, and didst send Thy blessed Son to preach peace to them that are far off and them that are nigh; Grant that all men may seek after Thee and find Thee. Missionary Box-Work

Consult the Box Secretary, Miss Anna May Baker, The Rectory, Selin's Grove, Pa., before choosing box-work. Miss Emery sets aside certain boxes for each Diocese and these should be accepted first. A choice of letters will be provided; and when one is accepted, write at once to the Box Secretary, notifying her of box chosen and return all other letters.

Write to the missionary, whose letter has been accepted, giving time when the box may be expected. Write again when the box is sent and enclose in the box a stamped envelope addressed to the Secretary of the branch from which the box is sent. If sent by freight, enclose bill of lading in letter and if impossible to prepay charges, ask that bill for the same be returned to you, in order that you may pay it.

Please notify the Box Secretary immediately the box is sent giving destination, date of forwarding and value of the box including, freight, expressage or postal costs.

Please notify the Box Secretary at once if your branch chooses to send to some mission without consulting her beforehand. Give name of the mission, and state whether the box will contain new or second hand articles.

Never send second hand articles in boxes to clergymen without first ascertaining whether or not they will be acceptable.

All the Auxiliary officers are ready at any time to give any information you may desire about the work.

The President's Report

THE year after the United Offering is presented at the Triennial, always shows the poorest number of gifts. It is the earnest hope of all the workers that, at once, we urge the gathering of our offering for 1919, secure a United Offering Treasurer in every parish, and that every woman find some other who does not have a blue box, and that all pray for the increase of our beloved thank offering of gift and life. This year has seen two missionaries go from our Diocese and the stated intention of two others who desire to go to the mission field.

The entire personnel of the offices of the Auxiliary has changed since the time your president took office. It is sad to see the faithful ones step out of the ranks, but we welcome the new with a belief that the high ideals set by those who have laid down the work will inspire their successors to greater efforts. Mrs. Eastment has given her place as Vice President of Altoona to Miss Culbertson of Lewistown. Mrs. Wirt, whom we felt the ideal Archdeaconry Vice-President, insisted upon resigning, but with large hearted generosity came to the rescue for three months when her successor, Mrs. Reynolds, on account of her health could not fill the office. It seemed as if we could not go forward without Mrs. Wirt's encouraging presence and witty reports. Fortunately, Mrs. Stephen Hayt has consented to act. All through the Diocese where Mrs. Steacy is so much loved and admired, sympathy was expressed for her serious illness, and it necessitated the appointment of a Treasurer pro tem, and we are indeed to be congratulated that we have found one so efficient as Miss Mary Smythe.

In the last three years it has been the policy of the President to call executive meetings whenever possible to have the officers meet without great expense or inconvenience to themselves. During the past year our meeting was held at the time of the Williamsport Archdeaconry meeting in Williamsport in January, in March in Harrisburg and in May at the time of the Convention in Sunbury, and this plan has been of the utmost help to the President, and she also feels to the better advancement of the work of the Diocese.

The Center Meetings have only met with limited success not having yet been tried in all parts of the Diocese. We certainly need to meet together more frequently to strengthen each other, especially in the smaller branches. Let us in the coming year have every branch meet with some other at least once, and may every one make the effort to hear any available missionary speaker. We hope for the great help of a visit to each branch of Miss

Newbold who returns from Japan in August. Be sure to get in touch with Mrs. Francis Farquhar, The Nook, Edgecombe, York, Pa., chairman of the Committee to make these plans, or with one of the members of this Committee, Mrs. John Peck, Mrs. Briggs and Miss Lyons.

Miss Emery was certainly inspired when she suggested to us the Pilgrimage of Prayer. We can testify to its help in our Diocese, and may all join in the closing week, that just before Advent, and be present at the Corporate Communion on the next Sunday before Advent when all the Church women of America will meet in this service of prayer and praise.

One week in May Miss Littell kindly visited the Diocese, starting in the Williamsport Archdeaconry, thence to Altoona and on to Harrisburg with her stirring plea for the Church General Hospital. It proved great inspiration, though not as much was given as had been hoped. At the Annual Meeting it is the plan to pledge towards this great cause. In view of the fact that with small effort we were enabled to exceed our Two Hundred Dollar pledge to St. Agnes' School, Kyoto, Japan, can we not with confidence pledge Three Hundred Dollars to the Church General Hospital?

The President had the pleasure of representing the Diocese at the Conference of officers on April 19th in New York. And made one visit to Lebanon Diocese of Bethlehem in the interest of the Auxiliary. It was a great disappointment that illness prevented her keeping a number of engagements, and that lack of strength, time and money made it impossible for her to go to every branch in the Diocese. She has loved the work, and thanks each member of the Auxiliary for their appreciative co-operation in all that they were asked to do. She leaves you with a heavy heart but the dearest memories of blessed work together, and the prayer that God will give you new life and courage to go FORWARD in this trying time of our Nation's life.

Minutes of the Thirteenth Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Harrisburg

Members of the Diocesan Auxiliary were the guests of the Auxiliary branch of St. Luke's parish, Altoona, October 9, 10, 11, 1917. There were 125 delegates present, representing 22 parish branches.

The Thirteenth Annual Meeting of the Diocesan Auxiliary began on October 9, with a Study Class and Conference, led by Mrs. H. P. Allen, Educational Secretary of the Diocese of Pittsburgh. The subject for the evening was Study Class Methods.

The Bishop spoke on the necessity for maintaining a chaplain at the Government camp at Gettysburg; also of other Diocesan mission work and needs.

A message of greeting was ordered sent to Mrs. James F. Bullitt, retiring President of the Diocesan Branch.

Following this meeting the Executive Board of the Diocesan Auxiliary met.

October 10 a model Study Class led by Mrs. Allen, was followed by the Quiet Hour. Rev. Malcomb DeP. Maynard, rector of St. John's Church, Bellefonte, led the hearts and minds of those present to a consideration of the Prayer for Missions.

Luncheon was served at 1 p. m.

Two p. m. the business meeting was opened by a brief service led by the Rev. Mr. Cady. Mrs. Drinkwater, acting President spoke a few words of greeting, after which letters were read from Mrs. Bullitt and Mrs. Steacy. Brief reports were given by the Archdeaconry Vice-Presidents, the Secretary, the Treasurer, the President of the Junior Auxiliary and the President of the Little Helpers.

Discussion of financial matters followed and said matters were referred to the Committee on Rules and Regulations.

Miss Watts, chairman of the Committee on the education of the Chinese Student gave her report. It was moved and accepted that the Auxiliary educate a particular student, his name to be sent to us later.

Miss Watts also reported that the work at the Indian School, Carlisle, has been taken over by St. John's Church in that city, and will be carried on by the Rev. Mr. MacMillan. A vote of thanks was ordered sent to Mr. MacMillan.

The Committee on Deaconess Newbold's visits gave a tentative report.

Roll call and an offertory followed.

Miss Julia Emery then addressed the Auxiliary on affairs at

the Church Missions House and of the Auxiliary plans for the new year.

Deaconess Newbold of Koriyama, Japan, brought a message of her work there and of the needs thereof, especially asking for "the gift of life."

Sectional conferences brought the afternoon meeting to a close. Supper was served at 6 p. m.

Beginning at 7:30 p. m., the Rev. Charles Betticher, Editor of the Spirit of Missions, gave an illustrated lecture of Mission work in Alaska.

Bishop Darlington gave a brief address on God and Native Land, which was followed by an informal reception. Two volunteers, Miss Amelia Ewing and Miss Pratt, were accepted for work in Japan, in response to Miss Newbold's appeal.

Thursday, October 11, at 8:30 a. m., the delegates met at the Church for a celebration of the Holy Communion, the Rev. George R. Bishop, celebrant.

The business meeting followed immediately after the service. The Committee on Nominations reported, tellers were appointed and the election resulted as follows: President, Mrs. Paul E. Wirt; Vice-President, Mrs. A. M. Drinkwater; Secretary, Miss Laverda Burgart; Box Secretary, Miss Anna May Baker; Treasurer, Miss Mary Smythe; delegates to the Provincial Synod to be held in Philadelphia, November 20, 22 and 23, 1917, Mrs. Wirt, Mrs. John I. Hartman and Miss Baker. It was stated that the presidential election was to fill an unexpired term; that, although it is not so stated in the Constitution, the three-year-term of the President is supposed to begin one year before a meeting of the General Convention and to continue for two years thereafter.

While the ballots were being cast and counted a message was ordered sent to Mrs. Steacy, who had served so faithfully as Diocesan Treasurer.

Mrs. Wirt was introduced in her new capacity as President and appointed the following committees: On Gettysburg "War Chaplain," Mrs. Darlington, Harrisburg; Mrs. Bausman, Lancaster; Mrs. Dartt, Wellsboro; Mrs. Brosious, Sunbury; Mrs. N. N. Smith, Altoona. On Church General Hospital, Mrs. Steacy, York; Mrs. Perley, Williamsport; Mrs. Briggs, Altoona; Mrs. Woolley, Danville. On Chinese Student, Miss Watts, Mechanicsburg; Mrs. F. W. Culbertson, Lewistown; Mrs. Morris Smith, Miss Logan, Williamsport. On Harrisburg Churchman, Miss Mary Newbold, Harrisburg; Miss Zellers, Lock Haven; Miss Barnes, Wellsboro; Miss Shaw, Altoona. On Mont Alto, Mrs. W. F. Reynolds, Bellefonte; Miss Zook, Lancaster; Miss Henrietta Lyons. Committee on Rules and Resolutions, Mrs. Tyndell, Williamsport, Mrs. Henry Black, Huntingdon, Mrs. Fahs Smith, York.

The Committee on Rules and Resolutions reported as follows, (report accepted):

"Money in the Treasury which has not been given for a specific purpose, may be diverted at the discretion of the Executive Board, to any purpose pertaining to the work of the Auxiliary.

"A resolution has been passed by the delegates to this Annual Meeting thanking the ladies of St. Luke's Parish, Altoona, for their kind hospitality and delightful entertainment.

"We also wish to express our pleasure and delight for the privilege of having with us our beloved former General Secretary, Miss Emery; and to Deaconess Newbold, our missionary from this Diocese, who has given us such an interesting account of her excellent work in Japan, we wish to extend our thanks; also to Mrs. Allen of Pittsburgh, who has contributed so much to the success of this meeting; and to the Rev. Charles Betticher who illustrated so splendidly his work in Alaska." Committee, Mrs. E. F. Dunlap, Miss Logan and Mrs. J. H. Sommer.

An offertory followed.

Miss Emery, Miss Hirlinger and Miss Maynard spoke on the Junior Outlook and the New Junior Plan.

Luncheon at 12 m., was followed by a meeting of the Executive Board.

A paper "How we should pray," prepared by Mrs. George R. Bishop was read by Mrs. J. W. Briggs of Altoona. Miss Hirlinger, Vice-President of the Diocesan Junior Auxiliary, spoke on the new Junior Plan.

After a vote of thanks to the women of St. John's for their kind hospitality, the meeting adjourned.

Report from the Harrisburg Archdeaconry

The Vice-President of the Harrisburg Archdeaconry respectfully submits the following report from October, 1916, to June, 1917. There are twenty-five branches of the Auxiliary, one new one, that of Section B, in St. John's Church, York, having been organized since last October.

The work of the four branches of Section B in the Archdeaconry is most encouraging, and we cordially welcome these young women in our work for Missions.

The Winter Archdeaconry Meeting was held in St. John's Church, York. Dr. Gray, the former General Educational Secretary, made the address on Latin-America, and Mrs. A. C. Kempton of the Diocese of Pennsylvania spoke on the activities of the Church Periodical Club.

Mrs. Arthur R. Taylor was appointed Educational Secretary for this Archdeaconry, and after the meeting was adjourned the delegates were most hospitably entertained at tea at the Rectory.

Three reading classes were started in parishes where it was not possible to have a study class, and in St. John's, Lancaster, several members of Section B, attended the Section A study class.

Greetings were extended to the visitors by Mrs. M. B. Smith, President of the Coudersport Branch, which were responded to by Mrs. Peck.

Then followed an interesting talk by Mrs. Drinkwater on, The Why and How of Missions. The meeting adjourned for lunch which was served at the home of Mrs. Brown who very kindly offered her house for the occasion.

At 1:30 a fine missionary address was delivered by the Rev. Mr. Gateson of Trinity Church, Williamsport. A business meeting followed; Deaconess Newbold's coming visit was announced; papers on, The Expense Fund, What It Is, by Mrs. Covey; the Annual Pledges, by Mrs. Pinney; and How to Make Meetings Interesting, by Mrs. App, were read. The offering was \$9.00; expenses of the meeting, \$1.50. Mrs. Peck thanked the ladies of Coudersport for their hospitality and Mrs. Brown for the use of

her home, in behalf of the visiting ladies. After the benediction was pronounced by Dr. Blose, the meeting adjourned.

Report from the Williamsport Archdeaconry

It is with a feeling akin to sadness that your Vice-President of the past five years submits this her last annual report. She thanks you all for the unfailing kindness, loyalty and support shown her throughout her term of office, and she wishes to be-speak the same courtesy for her successor, Mrs. Stephen T. Hayt, Jr.

In addition to the sixteen branches it is a pleasure to report awakened interest in two more parishes—a newly organized branch in Grace Church, Riverside; also at Exchange the getting together of the Church women during the past season to make garments for a missionary box. A center meeting was held in Christ Church, Danville, in November. Two Archdeaconry meetings have been held: The mid-winter meeting in Trinity Parish, Williamsport, opened by Bishop Darlington with a stirring talk on the Spiritual Awakening of the Church. Mid-day prayers, read by the Rev. H. D. Post. Owing to the resignation of the Vice-President an election was held. Mrs. W. F. Reynolds, Mrs. G. G. Pond and Mrs. M. H. Kulp were nominated, and Mrs. Reynolds elected.

In all save the business sessions this was a joint meeting with the clergy, thus affording to all the privilege of the Holy Communion, the benefit of the sermon by Archdeacon Musser, and the enjoyment of the social hour at luncheon. Alas, from two o'clock until 3:30, when many must take trains home, is all too short a time to accomplish any discussion of Auxiliary methods, and if we mistake not it is for such discussions and conferences that we hold Archdeaconry meetings. What can be done about it? A number of very brief talks by the heads of their respective departments were enjoyed: Miss Baker, diocesan secretary on missionary boxes; Miss Rich, on Educational work; Miss Maynard, on Junior work, and Mrs. Zahn, on the Girls Friendly. Mrs. Drinkwater gave a fine, though brief, explanation of the Pilgrimage of Prayer, and Mrs. A. E. Ketchum, organizing secretary from Scranton Archdeaconry, told of the part that the Woman's Auxiliary took in the General Convention at St. Louis. The missionary speaker was Bishop Tyler from North Dakota, who delighted his hearers with his fascinating story of missionary work in the Northwest. With a rising vote of thanks to the Auxiliary women of Trinity for their bountiful hospitality, the meeting adjourned.

The spring meeting was held in St. John's parish, Bellefonte, on May 15 and 16. So generous was their invitation that, for the first time, the feeling of hurry was eliminated.

The meeting was opened on Tuesday afternoon at three o'clock by the Rector, the Rev. Malcolm De Pui Maynard. Words of welcome were extended by Mrs. W. F. Reynolds, President of St. John's branch. Mrs. Wirt, who had consented to continue in office until after this meeting, opened the Conference on the "Why and How" of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions. The three aims: Gifts, Study and Prayer were then taken up in turn by Mrs. Bullitt, Diocesan President; Miss Rich, Educational Secretary and by Mrs. A. H. Woolley. The discussions on: How to prevent meetings from being stupid and ineffectual; and on, How may we utilize the summer months for the Auxiliary, brought out a number of good ideas. We wish to pay tribute to the women of the Williamsport Archdeaconry for always being sufficiently interested to enter freely into the discussions.

Miss Mary Hirlinger, Diocesan Vice-President of the Juniors, gave a fine talk on the New Junior plan, and what it hopes to accomplish. Miss Littell spoke briefly of the terrible suffering in China, and of the power of evil; she asked every woman to redouble her missionary efforts, despite the present great demands of the war. At 7:30 p. m. after a short service in the church, the Missionary Speaker Miss Helen Littell, former Missionary in China, held the undivided attention of all present by her graphic description of the physical suffering, and of the unsanitary condition of the Chinese people; and she told of the splendid work being done by the Woman's Hospital in Wuchang; but also of the sore need for repairs, and for better equipment. The offering at this service was donated to this cause. The Rev. C. N. Tyndell gave an excellent address on: "Am I my brother's keeper?" This service was followed by a most enjoyable reception in the Parish house.

On Wednesday at 7:30 a. m. Holy Communion was celebrated by the Rector.

At 9:30 a business session dealing with Parish branch methods was conducted. St. Michael and All Angels was the day chosen for the annual Archdeaconry Corporate Communion. The expense fund was thoroughly explained, and each branch urged to contribute its quota. A number of the branches pledged money to send an archdeaconry educational delegate to a Summer Conference. Mrs. Drinkwater defined the Periodical Club so clearly that several parishes decided to form branches of this important work. Reports were made by the Spirit of Missions Secretary; Juniors of our Archdeaconry; and the Little Helpers by their respective Leaders; also reports from each branch present. Seventy-five delegates, representing eleven parishes, were present, and eight diocesan officers. Mrs. Bullitt read Miss Lindley's first encyclical letter, also the circular on The Two Wars, Spiritual and Material. She also gave many words of wisdom, suggestion, and helpfulness throughout all the sessions.

Letters of sympathy were sent to our Bishop and to our

Diocesan Treasurer because of their serious illness. Mrs. Stephen T. Hayt, Jr., was appointed Archdeaconry Vice-President. A rising vote of thanks was tendered the women of St. John's for their generous hospitality. Mid-day prayers were read by the Rev. Mr. Tyndell, and the Rector pronounced the benediction.

BELLEFONTE.—“Early Communion service Sunday. Friday evening, sermon by the Rev. Mr. Tyndell, of Christ Church, Williamsport. \$2.98 given to our Treasurer.”

BLOOMSBURG, A. AND B.—“Service at 4 p. m. each afternoon. Rev. F. O. Musser gave helpful short addresses. The services were well attended. Two Study Classes were formed. One meeting conducted by the women.”

CHAMBERSBURG.—“Corporate Communion, February 11th; daily intercession. Wednesday, 7:30 p. m., and sermon on Sunday, for missions. Thursday we had a day of perpetual intercession, from 8 a. m. to 6 p. m., the members taking a half hour each.”

Constitution of the Harrisburg Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions

ARTICLE I.

NAME

The name of this Association is the Harrisburg Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions.

ARTICLE II.

OBJECT

The object of this Association is to carry out in the Diocese of Harrisburg, by united and systematic effort, the three great aims of the Woman's Auxiliary, viz: Daily Prayer for Missions, the Study of Missions and Systematic Giving for Missions.

ARTICLE III.

MEMBERSHIP

Every baptized woman in the Church is eligible to membership in the Parish Auxiliary, and all the Auxiliaries in the Diocese are members of this Association.

The elective officers of this Association shall consist of a President, a Vice-President-at-Large, a Vice-President of each Archdeaconry, Treasurer, Recording and Corresponding Secretaries. These officers with the President of the Juniors, the President of the Little Helpers and the Educational Secretary, shall form the Executive Board.

ARTICLE V.

DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The President shall be elected at a yearly meeting, for a term of three years and may not succeed herself. It shall be the duty of the President to call meetings of the Association and the Executive Board, and preside at them. She shall also exercise a general supervision of all the work in the Diocese and make a yearly report to the Association.

Section 2. The Vice-President-at-Large shall be elected yearly and perform the duties of the President when she is unable to do so.

Section 3. Each Archdeaconry and Deanery shall, as soon as possible after the election of the President, elect from the three

women in each Archdeaconry, previously nominated by the Bishop, a Vice-President to serve three years.

Section 4. The Vice-President of each Archdeaconry and Deanery shall co-operate with the President in promoting local intelligence and interest, and in directing and organizing work in her own Archdeaconry.

Section 5. The Recording Secretary shall keep the minutes of the yearly meeting and the meetings of the Executive Board, conduct all necessary correspondence, have charge of the writing, printing and sending out of reports and other documents, and make the yearly report.

Section 6. The Corresponding Secretary shall perform all such duties as pertains to her office.

Section 7. The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all moneys for the expense fund of the Association. Also receive and transmit to the Missionary Treasurers such other moneys sent to her and make a yearly report.

Section 8. The Educational Secretary shall have general supervision of all the Missionary Educational Work carried on under the auspices of the Woman's Auxiliary.

ARTICLE VI.

MEETINGS

There shall be one general meeting of this Association in each year, and other meetings may be called by the Executive Board.

ARTICLE VII.

AMENDMENTS

This Constitution and By-Laws may be altered or amended by a two-thirds vote of the whole number of delegates present at a yearly meeting.

By-Laws

Section 1. A Nominating Committee, consisting of one member from each Archdeaconry, shall be appointed by the President one month before the Annual Meeting.

Section 2. Elections shall be by ballot, and each branch shall be entitled to two votes, and an additional vote for each ten members or fraction thereof. These votes shall be cast by properly accredited delegates or their alternates.

Section 3. Delegates to the Triennial meeting of the General Auxiliary shall be the President and Junior Auxiliary President ex-officio, and three from the membership of the Auxiliary, to be elected by ballot. The alternates to the Presidents to be chosen by them and the others chosen by ballot.

Section 4. There shall be three delegates to the Provincial meetings who shall be the President Ex-officio, and two from the membership, to be chosen by ballot.

Section 5. An expense fund shall be provided by this Association for the necessary expenses, namely, Printing, Postage, Stationery, Traveling Expenses of Speakers and Officers, etc., to be arranged at the discretion of the Executive Board.
