

## The United Thank Offering of 1922

Resolved: That the United Thank Offering of 1922 be given to the Board of Missions or any organization which has succeeded, or may hereafter succeed to its functions, for women's work in the mission field, including the training, sending and support of women workers and the care of such workers when sick or disabled—provided that one-tenth of the offering be set aside as a permanent trust fund to be invested and administered by the Board of Missions, or any organization which has succeeded or may hereafter succeed to its functions, the income to be applied to the support of retired United Thank Offering workers,—also provided that the sum of not less than \$10,000 be devoted to the erection, completion or renewal of a building or buildings approved by the Board of Missions on the recommendation of the President of the Board of Missions and the Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Also Resolved: That to our united gifts shall be added our united and earnest prayers that God will put it into the hearts of many faithful women to give themselves or of their substance to the work of the Master in the mission field.

## President's Message

Certainly Church women have been given larger vision by the unusual experiences of the past few months. Who could live through the Intensive Week of the Nation-Wide Campaign without realizing at least an increased desire for spirituality?

Can those of us who were privileged to be present at the joint session on the Nation-Wide Campaign in Detroit ever forget it?

Another blessed and spiritual uplift has been the revival of the Ministry of Healing. Mr. Hickson's ministrations daily in Christ Church, Detroit—his utter obliteration of self—his declaration that the only curing force in the world is the spiritual power of Christ, exercised by his living presence" deeply impressed all who were privileged to go to him.

Interested church women have noted in the report of the General Convention the adoption of a new canon, No. 58, Paragraph 1, which reads as follows: "The Presiding Bishop and Council shall administer and carry on the Missionary, Educational and Social work of the Church of which the Presiding Bishop shall be the executive head."

1. We are now the Woman's Auxiliary to the executive committee thus created and therefor Religious education and Social service become a part of our work as well as Missions.

2. We invite all other woman's societies to join with us in creating a Church League of Service—such a League to be a federation of women's organizations, but not a merger.

3. To conduct the business of this League and to prepare for its future development there shall be formed a National Council, with three representatives from each society, and nine others elected by the Council.

4. That in view of the creation of this League, the Auxiliary shall not adopt a Constitution or By-Laws, but shall work as far as rules are concerned in much the same way as in the past, enlarging the work as suggested above.

5. To carry on the enlarged work of the Auxiliary there shall be an executive Board of Women, of which Miss Lindley is the executive Secretary, consisting of one delegate to be elected from each province and eight delegates to be elected from the Woman's Auxiliary at large.

Three of the members of the Executive Board were elected to represent the Auxiliary on the National Council of the

Church League of service, and, in accordance with Canon 58 there may be a representation of our National Committee on the executive committee of the General Convention. Such women representatives may be members of certain departments, but without seats and votes in the council.

We are quoting these details of our enlarged work from the minutes of the Triennial meeting because we are asked and expected to organize provincial, diocesan, and parochial Councils for this League. And, whereas there will necessarily be some expense connected with the work of the executive Committee, the plan is recommended that Diocesan branches of the Auxiliary shall be divided into five classes to pledge a certain sum annually for the next three years, ranging from \$20 down to \$3.00, each diocese to settle for itself to which class it wishes to belong. Class A \$20, Class B \$15, C \$10, D \$5, E \$3.00.

As an illustration of the creation of these lesser Councils, take the parochial: The Auxiliary of each parish, with the co-operation of the Rector, shall organize a parochial Council consisting of the Auxiliary, the Girls' Friendly Society, the Church Periodical Club, the Daughters of the King, the Guild of St. Barnabas for Nurses, the Church Missions of Help—all church women's societies, including the parish Guild. They shall create an executive committee made up of three women from each society, elect a chairman for a given number of years, ever having in view work for missions, for Religious education and for Social service. Miss Lindley says it is imperative that we reach all the women of the Church, that we have felt we could not persuade them to go into the Auxiliary as it was, but now with the diversified lines of interest surely the hitherto uninterested women will find the Council an inviting field for work.

The change of date of our Annual meeting has fortunately brought us this year into very close touch with the Triennial meeting.

The wish has been strongly voiced in our own Diocesan executive Committee that the current expense Fund might be so increased as to warrant three important expenditures: to send a delegate to the Triennial, to send a representative to one of our large educational summer conferences, and to pay a diocesan educational secretary. If this should come to pass the entire body of church women would greatly benefit thereby; for educational advance is imperative to growth in whatsoever line. But, since our Diocese is so large that no one person can give of her time and means to traverse the whole diocese, and until we may have a paid educational Secretary, it has been deemed wise to have an educational secretary in each

Arch-deaconry. This plan has been fairly successful the past year, and we are led to think that there will be a marked increase of interest this year. The subject of the year's study, "Neighbors," is in itself fascinating.

Our Box-work this year promises an increase of interest: the plan to make the Christmas boxes to meet the needs of our Diocesan Missionaries, leaving the Institutional boxes for the Lenten work to be sent at Easter, seems to have met with favor and we would note that we now have authority to send boxes to the United Thank Offering Workers.

A distressing calamity has overtaken the Auxiliary in the serious illness of the Junior President, Miss Hirlinger. Under her leadership the Juniors have accomplished great things. Who will accept this leadership until such time as Miss Hirlinger shall have been restored to health?

Action taken at the Triennial decrees that the Junior department shall be separated from the Woman's Auxiliary; that it shall now be Junior Auxiliary to the Executive committee of the Church, retaining one Junior officer in each diocese as a member of the Woman's Auxiliary Board, and keeping one officer of the woman's Board on the executive Board of the Juniors, in order that each shall be kept in touch with the entire work; that it shall be the purpose of the Junior Auxiliary to merge as speedily as possible into the Church School Service League, conducted under the National Central Committee, the Provincial Central Committee, and the Diocesan Central Council.

Two important changes were voted at the Triennial concerning the United Offering. First, that it shall be called the United Thank Offering. Second, that since the U. T. O. is shared in by Church-women not in the Auxiliary, the U. T. O. service in 1922 shall be planned by the national council, and planned for all the women of the Church; also that in 1922 seats shall be provided at that service for the U. T. O. Custodians. I am sure that all of us rejoice in the fact that in our own diocesan offering there was an increase of \$1000 over that of the previous triennium. Another cause for rejoicing is that the Fund for St. Mary's House is about completed, and that the house will be begun as soon as the spring opens. A committee on this Fund had an interesting interview with Bishop McKim in Detroit. He proposes that a tablet with inscription *Harrisburg House* shall be embedded in the wall of the house thus unmistakably identifying it always as the work of our diocese.

The Woman's Auxiliary has fittingly resolved to observe its fiftieth anniversary by creating a Fund to be called The

Emery Jubilee Fund, to be given over to the Presiding Bishop and Council to be, for all time, a Trust Fund, the interest of which shall be used in such way as the executive committee of the Auxiliary shall approve, for our women missionaries home on furlough. It is also recommended that the Emery Fund shall reach \$50,000, to be completed by the date of our fiftieth anniversary, October 1921. The chairman of our diocesan committee for this Fund is Mrs. J. W. B. Bausman, our former diocesan president. This being strictly an Auxiliary Jubilee it is hoped that Harrisburg will wish to do her part.

When Bishop Capers of West Texas told the Joint Session about the terrible devastation to Church property and to life in his storm driven diocese, and asked assistance, the response was immediate. While the different diocesan auxiliaries were pledging hundreds, Harrisburg pledged but fifty dollars, in order that its pledge might be quickly paid, for the urgency is great. Mrs. Allan P. Perley is the Chairman of this committee. Shall we not here and now meet this small pledge?

The Chinese Student Scholarship for Ferg Mei T'Sar has been completed. If you vote to take another Chinese student to educate in the next three years, it will be most commendable, and the sum per annum is not large. Miss Anna M. Walls, Chairman of this committee. This, and Mt. Alto, which our Bishop considers an urgent diocesan need, will complete our pledges for 1920. Mrs. Darlington has been made chairman of the Mt. Alto Committee.

You have been patient under this long message, as a last word I will say that we have been asked to undertake all our new work under the inspiration of the appreciation of what the Church can do in these critical and wonderful days of reconstruction.

## Report of Altoona Archdeaconry

The Vice President of the Altoona Archdeaconry respectfully submits the following report:—

We have not organized any new branches this year, nevertheless we feel encouraged in our work. The six branches in this Archdeaconry have been working faithfully—holding study classes, sewing for boxes, earning money to pay their pledges and helping with the Nation Wide Campaign. We are expecting greater interest next year as one of the results of this great Campaign.

There were 6 boxes sent from 4 branches with a total value of \$185.50.

The Fall Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Archdeaconry of Altoona was held at St. Luke's, Altoona, November 20th, 1919. On the same date the Clergy of the Archdeaconry met, which helped make the occasion very interesting.

The Holy Communion was celebrated at 11:30 A. M., the Venerable Archdeacon Eastment being the celebrant.

A Box Luncheon was served in the Parish House, after which at 3:00 P. M., the business meeting was held with representatives from Altoona, Hollidaysburg, Huntingdon and Tyrone present. The Vice President presided and reports were given from the various branches represented. The report from Huntingdon was particularly encouraging and Altoona Branch reported great gain in interest and membership. Letters were read from Mrs. Wirt and Miss Balch and articles read on the subject of the various activities during the Triennial Convention, also report from Miss Smythe that the fund for Deaconess Newbold is almost completed. A very interesting letter from the Deaconess was listened to with much pleasure.

Notice was read of the new form of organization in which each guild appoints several members to serve in a general guild; also that the Juniors are to be a separate organization—with the recommendation that one Junior officer sit upon the Board of the Woman's Auxiliary and that one member of the Woman's Auxiliary sit upon the Junior Board, in order that the two organizations may keep in touch with the work of each other.

At 4:30, the Clergy having finished their meeting, joined the Woman's meeting. Archdeacon Eastment gave an exceedingly interesting and enlightening talk on the proceedings of

the Triennial Convention, speaking especially of the Divorce Canon and of the changes being made in the forms of church organizations.

The Rev. Mr. Compson of Huntingdon gave a talk on his work among the prisoners at the Reform School—urging the ladies to send magazines to help them pass the long hours of confinement.

The Rev. George R. Bishop said a few words of welcome and greeting and had the closing prayers.

Supper was served in the Parish House.

At 7:30 P. M., a service was held in the church at which Dean White, Domestic Secretary, was the speaker. His talk was on the Nation Wide Campaign and was most interesting and stirring.

After the close of the service, the Rev. Malcolm Maynard gave an informal and very interesting talk on the Nation Wide Campaign—its aims and the methods being followed.

## Report of Harrisburg Archdeaconry

The Vice President of the Harrisburg Archdeaconry respectfully submits the following report from February 1919, to December 1919.

There are eighteen active branches of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Harrisburg Archdeaconry this year. It was most gratifying to have fourteen of these branches represented at the Archdeaconry Meeting held in October. One branch of Section "B" has re-organized and is in a most flourishing condition. The work of preparing Missionary boxes has gone forward enthusiastically and having finished the Diocesan work first, the branches are ready to take up a new line of work for Lent, notwithstanding the fact that many of the women have given a great deal of time to forwarding the Nation-Wide Campaign. A total of thirty-five boxes were sent from fourteen branches, the total value of which was \$1703.68. Much interest has been shown in the new study class book "Neighbors" and several classes will be started.

The Archdeaconry Meeting held in October was the only one since the Annual Meeting in Williamsport. The plan of having the meeting in three sections, on three successive days, in different parts of the Archdeaconry was a success, and many more women were able to be present in this way than could have been reached by having one meeting in one place. The Vice President is planning the Spring Meeting in the same way.

Two new branches are in process of being formed and we are hoping to see a branch in St. Paul's, Columbia. There are two women who generally come from there to the Archdeaconry Meetings; there is a flourishing Junior Branch in the Parish, but we still hope that the Seniors may join us some day.

There are no longer enough women in Gettysburg to sustain an Auxiliary, so we have lost that branch from our list of members. The chances of the Auxiliary re-organizing in Churchtown are good.

A vote of thanks was tendered the women of St. Andrew's for their kind hospitality. After the benediction was pronounced by the Rector, the meeting adjourned.

In this Archdeaconry one branch sent one missionary box, valued at \$27.45.

## Report of the Williamsport Archdeaconry

The Vice President of the Williamsport Archdeaconry respectfully submits the following report from February 1919, to December 1919.

Of the twenty branches in this Archdeaconry (as against seventeen listed in our last report) reports have been received from seventeen. It is gratifying to be able to announce that the Shamokin branch, from which no report was received last year, is re-organizing and we may expect to hear of good work accomplished in the near future. There has been a notable and gratifying increase in the United Offering throughout this Archdeaconry—Nine Mission Study Classes and one Reading Circle and Current Events Class were held and much interest was manifested by those who attended.

The Spring Meeting was held at Lock Haven in May. The session opened with a Church Service with beautiful music by the choir of St. Paul's, and a sermon by the Rev. Mr. Atkins, of St. John's, York, Pa. As this Meeting followed immediately upon the Diocesan Convention we were able to have with us the Rev. Dr. Browne, of St. John's, Lancaster, and the Rev. Mr. Maynard, of St. John's, Bellefonte, both of whom assisted at this Service as well as at the Corporate Communion the following morning. Our President, Mrs. Wirt, attended this meeting, and addressed us most interestingly. One very pleasant feature of this Meeting was the service by the Junior Auxiliary Members at the noon-day luncheon, giving us as it did an opportunity to meet these young people. The Vice President of this Archdeaconry wishes in this connection, to make a plea for a larger attendance at these Spring Meetings. They are important to the life of the Woman's Auxiliary and a wonderful opportunity to advance the work of the organization in the different branches. Let us try to set aside the days for which our next Archdeaconry Meeting is planned, not allowing even "house cleaning" to prevent our attendance. Our *branch house-cleaning* may receive an impetus which shall last us throughout the year and be of inestimable value. The Lock Haven Meeting, while not featured by any speakers from outside our own Diocese, held much of value for those who were there, and we deeply regreted the absence of many branch representatives. The Rev. Mr. Gateson, of Trinity Church, Williamsport, addressed the meeting, thus making a total of four

visiting clergymen, each of whom had a message for us. We have some thought of following the example of the Harrisburg Archdeaconry and holding the next Spring Meeting in sections, thus being able to secure a better attendance.

The branches report sending twenty-five missionary boxes, with a total value of \$1420.90.

The work of the Nation-Wide Campaign went forward with enthusiasm in this Archdeaconry and we trust that the aftermath will be a wonderful revival of interest in the work of the Woman's Auxiliary everywhere.

## Report of the Church Periodical Club

The Diocesan Correspondent of the Church Periodical Club respectfully submits the following report of the year's work from January 1, 1919, to January 1, 1920.

Of the twenty-three branches listed four are at the present without a Parish librarian. Some of the branches have been doing very creditable work, others have shown renewed activity and others have done little or nothing.

The work of the Church Periodical Club is beginning to swing back into its old channels of supplying the missionaries, the sick and the shut-ins, who have asked that their share of magazines should go to the men at the front. We are still forwarding magazines to chaplains and men, who have not yet

returned to civil life, and will continue to do so as long as the need remains. Through the wise efficiency of Miss Mary E. Thomas, our Executive Secretary, the Church Periodical Club holds an honored position on the war records of the Church.

In February, 1919, a Synod Meeting of the Province of Washington was held at Baltimore. The Correspondent not being able to attend, Miss Jeanette Rote, Librarian of St. John's Church, Lancaster, went as alternate. Mrs. Kempton, the Provincial President, appointed Miss Rote as a member of the Executive Board of the Province.

Although the Church Periodical Club of the Harrisburg Diocese was not officially represented at the Triennial Convention at Detroit, Mrs. Herbert W. Hartman, Lancaster, at the invitation of Miss Delia Warriner, Correspondent of Michigan, attended the Church Periodical Club breakfast and brought home a large quantity of Convention enthusiasm.

Every member of Church Periodical Club and especially every officer was called upon to help the Nation-Wide Campaign. As the extension of knowledge and the deepening of interest concerning all Church work are among the objects of the Campaign, each Church Periodical Club member was asked to tell the story of the Church Periodical Club to others, to show its ideals of service and the real help it has given to so many, and to explain the ways its work might develop with more members, more workers and more money. Each member was asked to give their prayers, to keep all possible time free for service and to offer to local committees any special gift for speaking, teaching or writing.

A great many of our librarians responded splendidly to the appeal for papers and magazines for the Episcopal inmates of the State Reformatory at Huntingdon, Harrisburg Diocese.

A challenge has gone out to our branches to double their lists of regular magazines and to strive for an advance in quality. In closing I should like to send out a challenge to the Diocese of Harrisburg to double her list of Church Periodical Club branches.

The public does not really know to what great proportions the Church Periodical Club has grown. It was big before the war. It is huge now. From the sending of periodicals, which was its first work, it has become—as a speaker lately said—a Christian Department Store. I wish each Parish branch could

realize this coming year that at least the small sum of three dollars is needed from each branch to finance such an organization as the Church Periodical Club.

## Report of Box Secretary

This is a report of the Box work done since the last Annual Meeting, and covers the ten months from February 12th to December 18th.

I have corresponded with 28 active branches of the Auxiliary, and occasionally exchanged letters with some that are not active; but I can say with pleasure that in general more interest has been taken in the work this year than last, although, of course, last year, conditions were very bad.

A casual glance at this Report will give the impression that all the Auxiliaries have worked solely for the Diocesan Missionaries, and I would like to explain why it seems so. Last year the Christmas boxes were almost all sent out of the Diocese, thus leaving the Missionaries of the Diocese to be supplied at Easter or later. This year we have reversed the process and most of the Christmas boxes have been sent to Diocesan Missionaries, which leaves all the Lenten work free to supply the needs of domestic and foreign missions and schools.

I have on hand a number of appeals from the Church Missions House, and hope to have many requests for them. The sooner the better!

Trinity Church, Steelton, has sent the first contribution to the Household Chest, 4 towels, 4 wash rags, 4 bath towels. This also needs a word of explanation.

Almost all the appeals ask for household supplies, but as everybody knows these things are so expensive it is almost impossible to provide them. It seems to me that if everyone who could do so would contribute one article a year, from a pair of sheets, or pillow cases, down to a duster or up to a pair of blankets, the Chest would be full to overflowing, and could be drawn on where the need arose.

At present I am jealously guarding the contribution from Steelton, hoping it will act as a nest egg for more supplies.

## Educational Work in Diocese

There being no Educational Secretary appointed for the Diocese in 1919, members from the various Archdeacons undertook to form and carry on study classes as far as possible.

In the Altoona Archdeaconry, Mrs. J. W. Briggs acted as Educational Secretary and classes were held in St. Luke's Parish, Altoona, and in St. Mark's Parish, Lewistown. At Huntingdon the weekly meetings were held by the Rector, who also gave out booklets to the women for daily reading.

In the Harrisburg Archdeaconry, Mrs. G. I. Browne looked after the Educational work. Mission Study classes were held at Carlisle, Chambersburg, St. Andrew's, Harrisburg, St. James' and St. John's, Lancaster, and a reading circle at Steelton.

Only Junior Classes were held in the Northern Archdeaconry. Those being held at Wellsboro.

In the Williamsport, Archdeaconry, classes were held at Bellefonte, Bloomsburg (with people from Catawissa and Coles Creek attending), Danville, Sunbury, Christ Church, Williamsport, had two and Trinity, Williamsport, had two Study Classes and a Reading Circle.

It is hoped that in 1920 we will have a Diocesan Educational Secretary and that each branch will have at least Reading Circles, if it is impossible to have Study Classes. The book for this year is "Neighbors," and is most interesting.

# Constitution of the Harrisburg Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions

## ARTICLE I.

### NAME

The name of this Association is the Harrisburg Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions.

## ARTICLE II.

### OBJECT

The object of this Association is to carry out in the Diocese of Harrisburg, by united and systematic effort, the three great aims of the Woman's Auxiliary, viz: Daily Prayer for Missions, the Study of Missions, and Systematic giving for Missions.

## ARTICLE III.

### MEMBERSHIP

Every baptized woman in the Church is eligible to membership in the Parish Auxiliary, and all the Auxiliaries in the Diocese are members of this Association.

## ARTICLE IV.

### OFFICERS

The elective officers of this Association shall consist of a President, a Vice-President-at-Large, a Vice-President of each Archdeaconry, Treasurer, Recording and Corresponding Secretaries. These officers with the President of the Juniors, the President of the Little Helpers shall form the Executive Board.

## ARTICLE V.

### DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The President shall be elected at a yearly meeting, for a term of three years and may not succeed herself. It shall be the duty of the President to call meetings of the Association and the Executive Board, and preside at them. She shall also exercise a general supervision of all the work in the Diocese and make a yearly report to the Association.

Section 2. The Vice-President-at-Large shall be elected yearly and perform the duties of the President when she is unable to do so.

Section 3. Each Archdeaconry and Deanery shall, as soon as possible after the election of the President, elect from the three women in each Archdeaconry, previously nominated by the Bishop, a Vice-President to serve three years.

Section 4. The Vice-President of each Archdeaconry and Deanery shall co-operate with the President in promoting local intelligence and interest, and in directing and organizing work in her own Archdeaconry.

Section 5. The Recording Secretary shall keep the minutes of the yearly meeting and the meetings of the Executive Board, conduct all necessary correspondence, have charge of the writing, printing and sending out of reports and other documents, and make the yearly report.

Section 6. The Corresponding Secretary shall perform all such duties as pertains to her office.

Section 7. The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all moneys for the expense fund of the Association. Also receive and transmit to the Missionary Treasurers such other moneys sent to her and make a yearly report.

Section 8. The Educational Secretary shall have general supervision of all the Missionary Educational Work carried on under the auspices of the Woman's Auxiliary.

## ARTICLE VI.

### MEETINGS

There shall be one general meeting of this Association in each year, and other meetings may be called by the Executive Board.

## ARTICLE VII.

### AMENDMENTS

This Constitution and By-Laws may be altered or amended by a two-thirds vote of the whole number of delegates present at a yearly meeting.

## By-Laws

Section 1. A Nominating Committee, consisting of one member from each Archdeaconry, shall be appointed by the President one month before the Annual Meeting.

Section 2. Elections shall be by ballot, and each branch shall be entitled to two votes, and an additional vote for each ten members or fraction thereof. These votes shall be cast by properly accredited delegates or their alternates.

Section 3. Delegates to the Triennial meeting of the General Auxiliary shall be the President and Junior Auxiliary President ex-officio, and three from the membership of the Auxiliary, to be elected by ballot. The alternates to the Presidents to be chosen by them and the others chosen by ballot.

Section 4. There shall be three delegates to the Provincial meetings who shall be the President Ex-officio, and two from the membership, to be chosen by ballot.

Section 5. An expense fund shall be provided by this Association for the necessary expenses, namely, Printing, Postage, Stationery, Traveling Expenses of Speakers and Officers, etc., to be arranged at the discretion of the Executive Board.
