**RESOLUTIONS PASSED AT THE 16TH ANNUAL MEETING OF THE
WOMAN'S AUXILIARY OF THE HARRISBURG DIOCESE**

WHEREAS, the subject of unity among the peoples, who affirm the Christian faith, is uppermost in every Christian heart, and efforts toward that end so devoutly wished for and prayed for, are making in many quarters, and

WHEREAS, with the ultimate purpose of bringing again, into one, the various branches of the historic Catholic Church, there has been created, by the General Convention of the American Episcopal Church, a "Joint Commission to confer with the Eastern Orthodox Churches, and Old Catholics," and this Joint Commission, largely through the untiring labors of its indefatigable Chairman, the Bishop of Harrisburg, has done notable work in bringing closer together than they have been for a thousand years, the Eastern Churches and Western Christianity, as represented in and by, the American Episcopal Church, and by the personal work of the said Chairman, in visiting, in person, many of the Ecclesiastical heads of certain of the Eastern branches of the Church, has brought about a clearer understanding and more sympathetic attitude toward certain points, which have hindered intercommunion and interrecognition of Holy Orders, as understood by each, and

WHEREAS, in bringing to this sympathetic point, the minds of leaders of Eastern and Western Christianity, James Henry Darlington has performed a service of incalculable magnitude to the true Catholic conception of Christianity, and has shorn it of the narrow construction which would confine it to a Western interpretation only, but has made it possible to link in that "Fellowship," which was interpreted by the Lambeth Conference, as every branch of the Holy Catholic and Apostolic Church, and thereby to lay a real foundation upon which may be brought about the fulfillment of the Master's prayer, that "they all may be One," therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that we, the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Harrisburg, do hereby express our deep sense of gratitude, that it has been given to our Bishop to perform this great work. And that we extend to him an expression of our utmost loyalty, and our full and hearty accord in his work in this matter, and tender him our cordial and sympathetic co-operation in every way within our power. And further, be it

RESOLVED, that we do most strongly condemn the recent article in the "Churchman," a periodical published in New York City, reflecting most discourteously upon Bishop Darlington, the Joint Commission of which he is Chairman, the correspondence between the representatives of the various Ecclesiastical Bodies involved, and even the great Eastern Churches themselves. And we do most earnestly protest that such ignoble and discourteous attitude, by any part of the Church press, however limited its influence, but tends to engender party animosity within the Church, and aids in keeping alive the miserable dissensions now dividing Christendom. Be it further

RESOLVED, that these resolutions be spread upon the minutes of this Auxiliary, and copies sent to Bishop Darlington, and to the Harrisburg Churchman.

MINUTES OF THE FIFTEENTH ANNUAL MEETING, HELD FEB.
11th AND 12th, 1920.

The fifteenth annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Harrisburg, met in St. Stephen's Church, Harrisburg, Pa., Feb. 11th and 12th, 1920, with Mrs. Wirt presiding.

There were 25 parishes represented by 107 delegates, with one visitor from the Diocese of New Jersey, one from the Diocese of Bethlehem, and one from Minneapolis, Minnesota.

The sessions were opened with a greeting from Mrs. Wirt, followed by her fore word for the coming year, in which, among other things, she told of the objects for which we were to work in 1920.

Miss Watts read a letter from Bishop Rowe, in which he made an appeal for help in keeping open schools in Alaska, which must be closed unless scholarships were given for their support.

Personal impressions of the Triennial in 1919 were given by Mrs. Drinkwater, Mrs. Darlington and Miss Smythe, after which a general conference was held.

Part One, led by Mrs. Browne, dealt with the Expense Fund, and Part Two, led by Miss Smythe, told of the various pledges and of the budget for the year 1920.

It was moved, seconded and carried, that instead of having a fund for the education of one particular Chinese student, the money would be sent to a general fund for the education of any Chinese student.

Mrs. Perley, chairman of the West Texas fund, urged the immediate payment of this pledge, because of the great need.

The Emery Jubilee fund is the fund being raised by the branches of the Woman's Auxiliary all over the country, to commemorate the 50th anniversary of the Woman's Auxiliary, and to honor the faithful labors of the three Emery sisters. This money will form a trust fund, the income of which will be used for missionaries home on furlough, for their board, medical care, study or recreation.

It was suggested that no pledges be asked for this fund but that all branches make the week before St. Michael and All Angels day, a Self Denial week, and present the results of their self denial at a corporate communion on St. Michael and All Angels day, the offering then to be given to the Emery Jubilee fund.

It was moved, seconded and carried that we pledge \$200 for an Alaskan scholarship.

At this point, the Rev. Malcolm Maynard, chairman of the Diocesan Nation Wide campaign, asked the women to help further the campaign. He asked that parishes that had not subscribed their quota, would, at least, give 50 per cent. of what they were asked.

After the offering, Miss Laura Boyer gave a most instructive talk on the "Value of Missionary Education" and the methods used in conducting classes. She said that the study class was the ideal way of imparting information as it gave one the chance to talk back.

The Nominating Committee gave its report, and the business meeting adjourned until 10:30 Thursday.

The Bishop and Mrs. Darlington, invited all the out-of-town women to their home for tea at the close of the Wednesday sessions.

At 8:30 P. M. a mass meeting was held in St. Stephen's church, the speakers being Bishop Israel, of the Diocese of Erie, and Bishop Darlington.

Thursday the Holy Communion was celebrated at 8:45, followed by the "Quiet Hour" conducted by the Rev. Mr. Judd.

At the business meeting which followed, Miss Lindley, of the Church Missions House, told of the enlarged scope of the Woman's Auxiliary, and of the Church Service League, to belong to which, a branch must work in these five fields of service: Parish, Community, Diocesan, National and World.

In the discussion that followed it was decided that parishes should make the start and then try to effect a Diocesan organization in 1921.

Miss Boyer conducted a demonstration study class using the book "Neighbors," after which the Rev. Mr. Baker had mid day prayers, and then the meeting adjourned to the Penn-Harris for lunch.

After lunch the roll was called and then Miss Maynard conducted a conference for Junior workers.

Mrs. Woolley spoke of the possibility of starting a "Missions Vestment Guild" to help poor churches to get communion linens and to teach the people the different symbols. No action was taken at this time.

In the absence of Miss Brant, Miss Rote gave a brief report of the C. P. C. and its activities.

The President announced that Mrs. Ramsey accepted the chairmanship of the Emery Jubilee fund.

The following were elected for 1920: Vice President at Large, Mrs. Drinkwater; Treasurer, Miss Mary Smythe; Secretary, Mrs. Van Horne; delegates to Provincial Synod, Mrs. Perley and Miss Watts; alternates, Mrs. Culbertson and Miss Randall.

The offerings at this meeting amounted to \$67.99.

The meeting adjourned to meet in Carlisle, February, 1921.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

The sixteenth year of the Harrisburg Diocesan branch of the Woman's Auxiliary; the fiftieth year of the whole movement of Woman's Mission Work, i. e., the organization of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions; and the final year of your President's term of office, all these in their relative importance will come to fulfillment in this year of 1921.

The most important issue in connection with the whole work this year is the celebration of our Golden Anniversary. All have been hearing and reading about the memorial that was decided upon at the Detroit Triennial, to make this splendid Jubilee, in loving appreciation of the Emery sisters whose unflagging leadership has insured such wonderful results. We are sure that every Harrisburg Diocesan Church-woman will glory in her opportunity to help make this Emery fund of \$50,000 an accomplished fact.

In this span of years, tremendous strides have been made. We have even changed our name to: "The Woman's Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council." We now work not for missions only, but in addition, for Religious Education and for Christian Social Service. But in this last department, so excellent in itself, and with such appealing, tangible opportunities, we must have a care not to let even Christian Social Services crowd out our Lord's command to "Go preach the Gospel to every living creature."

We are gradually being federated with all other woman's societies, under the title of "The Church League of Service;" we now share the United Thank Offering with all Church Women; and are adopting the reorganized Box Work, which insures a more just distribution of gifts.

Can we not present, more persuasively, the thought of the gift of self? We are all justly proud of our one Diocesan United Thank Offering Missionary, Deaconess Newbold. Do we embrace every opportunity to discuss this phase of the work, and do we pray for it?

May we turn for a moment to our own branch of the Auxiliary? There have been just three Presidents of the Auxiliary in our young diocese of Harrisburg. Mrs. J. W. B. Bausman most ably filled the office the first ten years.

When it was decided to revise our Constitution, the Executive Board voted that "the President shall be elected for a term of three years, and may not succeed herself." It has been a grief to your Bishop and to the Executive Board that so few of our Church-women are willing to accept office, and we do have many intelligent, capable and faithful women in the Harrisburg Diocese.

Now that woman has come into her own, let us hope that there may be an awakening to religious responsibilities as well as to civic

responsibilities. We should like to see a real, live contest in our next presidential election in the Harrisburg Woman's Auxiliary.

We have not been without vicissitudes this year, having lost four excellent officers; three of whom have been obliged to move out of the diocese, and one, became the President of the Junior Branch. But, after many weeks of anxiety all offices have been satisfactorily filled, in fact, your President feels she must express the thought that her present staff of officers is most excellent.

The conviction is borne in upon us that we must have more so-called Center, or Neighborhood Meetings. Without doubt, any "get together" assemblies of church people prove veritable "stir up" occasions.

It was our great pleasure to be one of a number from the Williamsport Arch-deaconry to attend the summer school conference of the Bethlehem Diocese, held at Montrose last summer. Would that Harrisburg might again be able to hold a summer school, or institute.

We would urge upon all the reading of church literature. Surely subscribe for, and read, the "Spirit of Missions."

Since the area of our diocese is so great it has been found impossible for one educational secretary to cover the whole territory at her own expense of time and money. Just as soon as we feel warranted in having a paid educational secretary, we shall indeed count it a great gain. At present, we aim to reach all by having one educational secretary in each Arch-deaconry.

More interest is manifested, happily, each year in mission study and in religious education. It is our task "to interest the uninterested."

May the year 1921 prove to be a banner year.

Miss Lindley asks that we set apart Friday, February the 18th, this year, as a day of prayer for World Wide Missions. And, as she further suggests: "Each one of us must find, and undertake, that bit of work which the Master has assigned to us."

MINUTES OF THE SIXTEENTH ANNUAL MEETING

The sixteenth annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Harrisburg, was held in St. John's Church, Carlisle, Wednesday and Thursday, February 2 and 3, 1921.

The convention opened with a Quiet Hour, conducted by the Rev. Mr. H. D. Viets, rector of St. John's, on Wednesday afternoon, at 4:30.

A mass meeting was held Wednesday night at 8 o'clock, the speakers being the Rev. Leopold Kroll, who told of the conditions and problems in the Hawaiian Islands and of the work the church is doing to meet these problems; and our own Bishop Darlington, who told of the conditions of the church and people in the Near East. His talk brought to all present a greater consciousness of the great faith and Christianity of the Near Eastern peoples.

The Holy Communion was celebrated Thursday morning at 7:30 by the Rev. Mr. Viets, assisted by the Ven. Archdeacon MacMillan, of Carlisle.

The business session opened at 9:30 with prayers by the rector of St. John's, who also welcomed the visiting delegates, in a simple and sincere way.

After the singing of a hymn, our President, Mrs. Wirt, gave her Annual Message which was filled with splendid messages for us, and which will be found, in full, on another page.

At this time, the Bishop, and Mrs. Drinkwater, conducted a meeting of the representatives of the various parish societies, for the purpose of organizing a branch of the Church Service League in this diocese; this meeting being held in the Parish House.

Reports were given by the Treasurer and the Box Secretary, and a report of the Study Classes was also given. These reports will be found on other pages.

Mrs. Arthur Phelps, the Educational Secretary of the Diocese of New Jersey, gave a very instructive talk, taking up first the Survey, and then the Church Service League. She explained the cause of making these plans, and showed what each hoped to accomplish. This talk, coming as it did, just after steps were taken to form a branch of the Church Service League in our own diocese, was most helpful.

The nominating committee made its report, and ballots were given out for the election, the ballots to be handed in when going out to lunch.

Mrs. Drinkwater told of the Auxiliary of yesterday and today. In her talk she compared what had been done, with what is being done, and after showing the great strides forward made, she asked if what was done was worth while, and if it was too small an organization for any woman to belong to. In closing, she urged the women to add "D. D." to their names to signify that they would be "Doubly Diligent."

A resolution was presented by Mrs. Perley, commending our Bishop for his splendid work in re-uniting the churches in the Near East with those in the West, and expressing the loyalty and aid of the Woman's Auxiliary, and condemning the criticism recently made against him.

The Ven. Wm. Dorwart had Mid Day Prayers for Missions, after which Miss Watts told of the Church School League. The meeting adjourned for lunch at the Carlisle House.

At 2 P. M. the sessions re-opened with a hymn, after which letters were read from Miss Lindley, of the Church Missions House, and from Deaconess Newbold.

The following motions were made:

Motion: By Mrs. MacMillan. That the Diocesan Woman's Auxiliary send to Miss Julia Emery and Miss Margaret Emery, a telegram expressing regret for their illness, and wishing them a speedy recovery. Carried.

Motion: By Mrs. Darlington. That the secretary of each parish branch write one letter a year to Deaconess Newbold, and that the diocesan secretary make out a schedule to be followed by the branches. Carried.

Motion: By Deaconess Christman. That the secretary be instructed to send to the Rev. Mr. Geo. Bishop, and Mrs. Bishop, for the Diocesan Auxiliary, a note of sympathy for their recent bereavement. Carried.

While singing Hymn 486, the offering was taken, after which conferences were held by the Church School Service League, the Church Periodical Club, and the Girl's Friendly Society.

Miss Smythe told of the United Thank Offering, using Bishop Burleson's interpretation of the initials "U. T. O." She closed her talk with a plea for another woman worker in the mission field from this diocese.

Reports were given by the four Archdeaconry Vice Presidents, and then the Rev. Mr. Judd, the Diocesan Executive Secretary, spoke of Missionary Ideals, and of the results of the Nation Wide campaign.

He suggested that the Woman's Auxiliary have one woman in each parish where there is no branch of the Auxiliary, who will be responsible for giving out the United Thank Offering boxes, and to collect the contents each year. After his talk, ten minutes were taken to discuss the points he brought up.

Pledges for various objects were asked for with the following result:

Reports were given by the chairman of the 1920 committees, Mrs. Perley, reporting for the West Texas fund; Mrs. Darlington for the Mt. Alto fund; Miss Smythe for the Emery Jubilee fund, and Miss Watts for the Chinese fund.

The President announced that the new Diocesan Educational Secretary was Mrs. J. G. Fisher, Lapark, (Lancaster county.)

The question of changing the time of the annual meeting was again brought up and it was again voted to continue holding them in February.

REPORT OF THE VICE PRESIDENT OF THE ALTOONA ARCH-DEACONRY.

The Vice President of the Archdeaconry of Altoona, respectfully submits the following report:

The Woman's Auxiliary of the Altoona Archdeaconry held its fall meeting at Trinity Church, Tyrone, Thursday, October 7th, 1920.

At the Holy Communion the Ven. Archdeacon Eastment was the celebrant being assisted by the Rev. Frank Cady.

A short business session was held before lunch, to elect a new Vice President, the former one, Mrs. Noel Smith, having removed from this diocese.

Mrs. C. H. Boyer, of Huntingdon, having been nominated by the Bishop, was elected to fill the vacancy.

Lunch was served at 12:30 in the new Wilson Memorial Parish House.

At 2 P. M. the Auxiliary was called to order by the Vice President, and after devotional exercises, Mrs. Ella Owens, of the Tyrone Branch, welcomed the visitors.

The minutes of the last meeting were read by the secretary, and the roll was called, showing 33 delegates present from 5 branches.

The reports were called for and much enthusiasm was felt when they were given.

During the year 1920 boxes and checks were sent to schools, church homes and missionaries outside of this diocese to the amount of \$396.38.

In the diocese (including supplies to the Household Chest or the Supply Department as it is now called) to the amount of \$162.58.

Besides these amounts one parish house paid through their church treasurer \$100 to their parish house fund, \$100 to the Nation Wide campaign and \$34.20 to the Harrisburg Churchman.

A second branch paid through the church treasurer \$100 to the Nation Wide campaign, and a third, through the same source, \$33.80 to the same fund, and another branch gave \$10.00 to the Archdeaconry box.

The United Thank Offering from this Archdeaconry for the year 1920 was \$137.40.

Pledges paid to the expense fund and to the other items in the diocesan budget amounted to \$137.25.

Mrs. Briggs, of Huntingdon, the Archdeaconry Educational Secretary, reported three study classes in 1920. She read a most interesting paper of her work, putting much stress on the importance of Mission Study classes. I hope in 1921 there will be six classes in the Altoona Archdeaconry.

Mrs. Ella Owens, having returned from a six months' visit to Porto Rico, was asked to tell of the work of our church in that country. She disclosed appalling conditions and emphasized the need of missionaries from our church.

The Rev. Mr. Zachary told of the church's work among the students at State College, and the Rev. Mr. Maynard spoke about the Nation Wide campaign.

The last hour, from four until five, was given to Miss Watts, of Mechanicsburg, and the Rev. G. F. G. Hoyt, of Columbia, who gave a most interesting explanation of what the religious training will do for our children. Miss Watts urged all our church schools to begin at once to train our children.

Supper was served at 6 P. M. and evening prayer was read at 7:30, the sermon being preached by the Rev. A. M. Judd, of Selinsgrove, the Executive Secretary of the diocese.

The offerings of the day, after all expenses were paid, went to Mt. Alto.

The Archdeaconry meeting held in November was the only one held since the annual meeting and the number of branches represented at this meeting was most gratifying.

We had with us, Miss Boyer, of the Church Missions House, who gave most interesting and instructive talks.

The value of the study book for the next two years, "The Survey" was enlarged upon, and great interest was shown. Several classes will be formed this season.

The branches reported study classes held at St. John's, Lancaster, St. Andrew's, Harrisburg, Trinity, Chambersburg, and St. John's, Carlisle, in 1920.

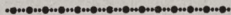
The boxes sent from this Archdeaconry to our own Diocesan Missionaries, and to the Supply Department, amounted to \$620.55.

To schools, institutions, and missionaries, outside of this diocese, amounted to \$908.80, making a total of \$1529.35.

The total United Thank Offering in this Archdeaconry for 1920 was \$452.39, while all other reports were correspondingly good.

We hope to do better work this year and trust that all branches will help make the year 1921 a splendid year in all respects.

REPORT OF THE NORTHERN ARCHDEACONRY

The Vice President of the Northern Archdeaconry submits the following report:

There are but three branches of the Woman's Auxiliary, with 98 members, in this Archdeaconry.

Being in a country district, with no large cities, and but few good sized towns, and with long distances between those towns, makes it harder to organize branches and to hold joint meetings.

Of the three branches, one sent a box to Graniteville, S. C., and also to Mt. Alto. One worked and gave clothing and other necessities to flood victims in their own community, and the third, instead of boxes, sent money to the starving children in Europe and to the Armenians.

We realize, however, that this cannot be reported as part of the Diocesan Auxiliary work.

The United Thank Offering from the three branches amounted to \$69.25. Two branches paid to all the pledges asked, by the Diocesan Auxiliary and the third paid to the expense fund and the Jubilee fund.

The total amount of money given to these pledges was \$41.00.

Only one branch had a study class, but we hope that this year there will be more.

We hope also to have a meeting of the Archdeaconry Auxiliary this year.

REPORT OF THE VICE PRESIDENT OF THE WILLIAMSPORT ARCHDEACONRY.

The Vice President of the Williamsport Archdeaconry respectfully submits the following report for the current year ending January 31st, 1921:

All branches have reported with but one exception. All of them are doing splendid work as there seems to be a spiritual awakening, the women realizing, as never before, the vital need of prayer, work, and giving either of their substance, or themselves, and are responding nobly to the church's call. Chiefly do we note this increased interest by the number of blue boxes being used for the United Thank Offering. I feel special mention should be made of Christ Church, Williamsport, with the banner record of 100 per cent. Congratulations to the President and her faithful workers in that parish.

The amount given the past year to the United Thank Offering was \$773.76. The value of boxes sent, including the chest at Lancaster, was \$1336.66. Shamokin and Exchange have no regularly organized Auxiliary, although Shamokin had a large study class and Exchange contributed to the United Thank Offering. There are indications that a branch may be re-organized at All Saints, Williamsport. There were twelve study classes in this Archdeaconry, the book "Neighbors," being generally used. Bellefonte had the ideal class consisting of both men and women. Let us hope more study classes will follow their example. We may, in this way, be able to secure laymen as class leaders.

Two meetings of the Auxiliary of this Archdeaconry were held in May—the first in Trinity Church, Renovo, beginning with a corporate communion, which was followed by the business session. The speaker of the day was the Rev. Mr. Gateson, Rector of Trinity Church, Williamsport. Miss Boyer talked on educational work. Others who spoke were Mrs. Wirt, Mrs. Hayt, Mrs. Van Horne, and Mrs. Drinkwater. Each had a message of great interest for all present. The second meeting was held the next day in Christ Church, Danville. After a celebration of the Holy Eucharist the business meeting followed immediately, Mrs. Hayt, Vice President, presiding. The Rev. Mr. Morgan, Rector of St. Paul's Church, Bloomsburg, gave the missionary address. Miss Boyer handled her subject, The Church School Service League, in a very able manner. Conferences were conducted by Mrs. Drinkwater and Miss Maynard. Mrs. A. H. Woolley was elected to succeed Mrs. Hayt as Vice President of this Archdeaconry.

A splendid center meeting was held in St. Gabriels Church, Coles Creek, in August. There were three priests and about fifty men and women in attendance. Rev. Mr. Shipley, of Hoboken, N. J., celebrated the Holy Communion, assisted by Rev. Mr. Morgan and Rev. Mr. Ake, priest in charge. The business meeting was called to order by Mrs.

Wirt, the diocesan President. After giving a splendid talk on the work accomplished at the last Triennial she introduced Mrs. Woolley, the new Vice President, who spoke about the necessity of educational work through the formation of study classes and reading circles. Miss John, from Bloomsburg, read a paper on the Girl's Friendly Society. She showed clearly the great advantage of such an organization for the moral and social welfare of girls.

A delightful luncheon was served in the grove near the church. After a social hour, vespers were said and the meeting adjourned.

In October an informal meeting of the Presidents of the several branches of this Archdeaconry was held in Trinity Parish House, Williamsport. It was a "get together" affair to talk over, and plan, the work of the Woman's Auxiliary for the season. All present felt they had received an inspiration for better things in the future, and with God's blessing upon this wonderful work it should enlarge beyond our expectations.

REPORT OF EDUCATIONAL WORK FOR YEAR 1920

The Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Harrisburg has had no Diocesan Educational Secretary, but in each Archdeaconry, there has been one appointed to look after such work, in that Archdeaconry.

For the year 1920 there were 19 classes started throughout the diocese, but one was discontinued, and one had but two members when finished, so that but 17 were really faithful.

Three classes were held in the Altoona Archdeaconry, under the supervision of Mrs. J. W. Briggs.

Four classes were held in the Harrisburg Archdeaconry. One of these four, that of St. John's, Lancaster, at once put into practical use the message they received from the study book, "Neighbors," by visiting the foreign born in their vicinity, and entertaining them at their parish house.

One class was held in the Northern Archdeaconry, and 9 were started in the Williamsport Archdeaconry, but one was discontinued at the third session.

One class in the Williamsport Archdeaconry (that of Bellefonte) was conducted on the ideal plan, in that it was started in Epiphany season and was composed of both men and women.

During the years of 1921-22 the study is to be of The Survey. For the information of leaders of classes, Miss Boyer, of the Church Missions House, has prepared a Manual of Suggestions to Leaders which covers the two year period. This book may be obtained from the Educational Department of the Church Missions House.

For classes who wish to take up some specific study of the church's work or fundamentals of it, there are two books published by the Church Missions House, either of which may answer their purpose. One is the last book by the late Archdeacon Stuck, of Alaska, "The Alaskan Missions," and the other is Dr. Sturgis' new book, "The Church's Life."

Each of these books have "Helps for Leaders" and each is most interesting and instructive.

It is most earnestly hoped that during this year, every parish will try and have a study class of some sort; in the church school, possibly at the Wednesday evening service, where the Rector may take up the work of the Survey, if not possible to have classes otherwise. But it is the opportunity of the church to study the Survey under most pleasant conditions.

It is also hoped that it will, in the future be possible to have classes for leaders each fall to go over the outlines of the Mission study for the year and thus have uniform lessons throughout the diocese.

If each parish will try and get one leader trained in their own parish each year, the study classes will be assured.

REPORT OF BOX SECRETARY

This report covers the work of the former Box Secretary, Miss Balch, from January 1st, 1920, until August, and the present Box Secretary, from August to the end of the year.

I have sent out the new literature to 25 branches of the Auxiliary and have corresponded with the same number.

Now I will send out the literature to the smaller branches.

According to the new rules, all the Christmas boxes were sent to missionaries in our own diocese.

Miss Balch started what she called the "Household" Chest but what is now called the "Supply Department."

A number of Auxiliary branches have sent generous and beautiful household supplies and I trust that other branches will follow their good example. The department has been somewhat reduced, as I filled some urgent needs, so I am anxious to fill these gaps.

I am glad to have the privilege of doing this work, and I thank all who have helped me. My full report follows:

The Diocesan Correspondent of the Church Periodical Club respectfully submits the following report for the year from January 1st, 1920, to January 1st, 1921:

The year 1920 marks an epoch in the life of the C P C.

For the first time the support of the work at its headquarters, comes from the whole church, as a result of the Nation Wide Campaign. The Diocesan Correspondent, however, is still dependent upon the contributions from parish librarians for her expense fund.

The most important task of the C. P. C. just now, is the library for St. Paul's College, Ikebukuro, Tokyo, Japan. In order to secure a license as a university of the first rank which it needs if it is to continue its development, St. Paul's must meet the requirements of the new university regulations of the Japanese Department of Education. One of these is a library the value of which is \$15,000. The task of providing this naturally falls to the C. P. C. and three years have been allowed for the fulfillment of the condition. Two parishes of this diocese have thus far answered the appeal.

A check for \$22.00 for the purchase of seven books, accompanied by the signed, specially designed book plates was sent to the Executive Secretary as a contribution from one parish, and a pledge for four books ranging in price from \$1.25 to \$10.50, has been made by another parish. Other parishes are sending in inquiries and stating their willingness to help. This is the most ambitious task ever undertaken by the C. P. C. and it will take the co-operation of every parish in this diocese to do our part in putting this C. P. C. task "over the top."

One of the other tasks is to re-gain the personal sending of magazines that was stopped by the war. There has been quite a falling off in this phase of our work. The sending of a magazine, or book, is a very simple thing but at the receiving end, it may mean light in darkness. Let us trust that 1921 will find each parish co-operating and doubling up the figures of the items that follow:

CONSTITUTION OF THE HARRISBURG BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE BOARD OF MISSIONS

ARTICLE I.

NAME

The name of this Association is the Harrisburg Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions.

ARTICLE II.

OBJECT

The object of this Association is to carry out in the Diocese of Harrisburg, by united and systematic effort, the three great aims of the Woman's Auxiliary, viz.: Daily Prayer for Missions, the Study of Missions, and Systematic Giving for Missions.

ARTICLE III.

MEMBERSHIP

Every baptized woman in the Church is eligible to membership in the Parish Auxiliary, and all the Auxiliaries in the Diocese are members of this Association.

ARTICLE IV.

OFFICERS

The elective officers of this Association shall consist of a President, a Vice President-at-Large, a Vice President of each Archdeaconry, Treasurer, Recording and Corresponding Secretaries. These officers, with the President of the Juniors, the President of the Little Helpers shall form the Executive Board.

ARTICLE V.

DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The President shall be elected at a yearly meeting, for a term of three years and may not succeed herself. It shall be the duty of the President to call meetings of the Association and the Executive Board, and preside at them. She shall also exercise a general supervision of all the work in the Diocese and make a yearly report to the Association.

Section 2. The Vice President-at-Large shall be elected yearly and perform the duties of the President when she is unable to do so.

Section 3. Each Archdeaconry and Deanery shall, as soon as possible after the election of the President, elect from the three women in each Archdeaconry, previously nominated by the Bishop, a Vice President to serve three years.

Section 4. The Vice President of each Archdeaconry and Deanery shall co-operate with the President in promoting local intelligence and interest, and in directing and organizing work in her own Archdeaconry.

Section 5. The Recording Secretary shall keep the minutes of the yearly meeting and the meetings of the Executive Board, conduct all necessary correspondence, have charge of the writing, printing and sending out of reports and other documents, and make the yearly report.

Section 6. The Corresponding Secretary shall perform all such duties as pertains to her office.

Section 7. The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all moneys for the expense fund of the Association. Also receive and transmit to the Missionary Treasurers such other moneys sent to her and make a yearly report.

Section 8. The Educational Secretary shall have general supervision of all the Missionary Educational Work carried on under the auspices of the Woman's Auxiliary.

ARTICLE VI.

MEETINGS

There shall be one general meeting of this Association in each year and other meetings may be called by the Executive Board

ARTICLE VII.

AMENDMENTS

This Constitution and By-Laws may be altered or amended by a two-thirds vote of the whole number of delegates present at a yearly meeting.

BY-LAWS

Section 1. A Nominating Committee consisting of one member from each Archdeaconry, shall be appointed by the President one month before the annual meeting.

Section 2. Elections shall be by ballot, and each branch shall be entitled to two votes, and an additional vote for each ten members or fraction thereof. These votes shall be cast by properly accredited delegates or their alternates.

Section 3. Delegates to the Triennial meeting of the General Auxiliary shall be the President and Junior Auxiliary President ex-officio, and three from the membership of the Auxiliary, to be elected by ballot. The alternates to the Presidents to be chosen by them and the others chosen by ballots.

Section 4. There shall be three delegates to the Provincial meetings who shall be the President Ex-Officio, and two from the membership, to be chosen by ballot.

Section 5. An expense fund shall be provided by this Association for the necessary expenses, namely, Printing, Postage, Stationery, Traveling Expenses of Speakers and Officers, etc., to be arranged at the discretion of the Executive Board.

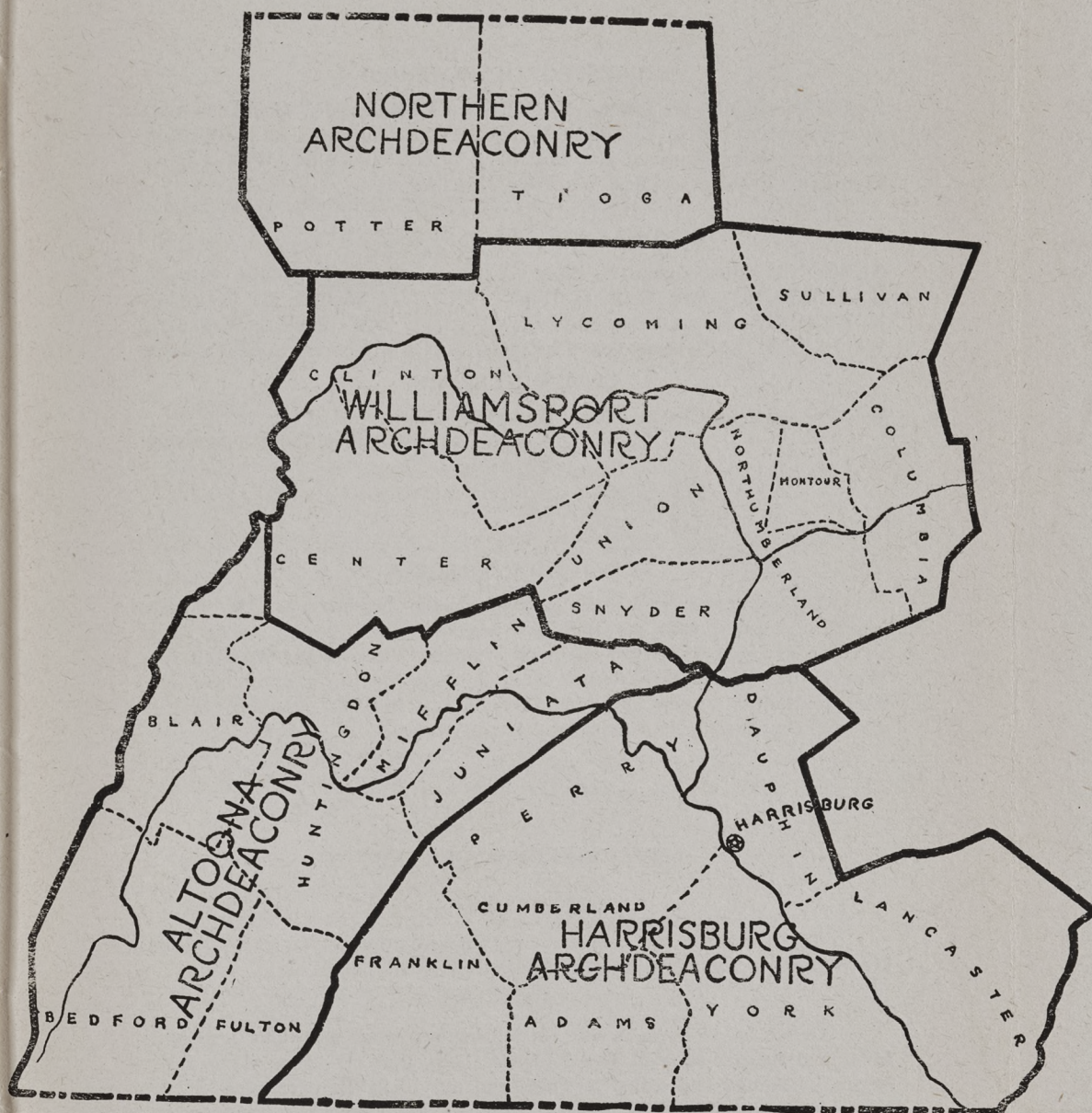
