PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

In the year 1917, when our really brilliant President, Mrs Bullitt, was obliged to move from the Diocese, and we reluctantly accepted the office for the one year of her unexpired term, little did we dream of retaining the office until 1922.

These years have been eventful, in that each triennial brings marked changes—new laws and rulings for the whole National Auxiliary. This year of 1921 promised great things—we refer to the Centennial and Semi-centennial of the whole missionary movement, and of the Woman's Auxiliary respectively, and also the raising of a fund of \$50,000 to be known as the Emery fund. This fund has exceeded the wildest hope, for it has grown to \$91,000 and is still growing.

Those of us who witnessed in Detroit the modesty of Miss Emery when this name was proposed, can easily picture the supreme joy she must have experienced when the Fund outgrew all anticipated bounds. And now a pall has fallen upon all rejoicings—dear Miss Emery died on January 9th. As someone has said "Miss Emery's zeal was behind all missionary activities of the Auxiliary extending throughout the world, including financial achievements."

During these fifty years of the Auxiliary's existence, its annual gifts have totaled \$14,000,000, exclusive of the United Thank offering which in itself at the last Triennial Convention reached the sum of over \$468,000. As you know, the goal set for the U. T. O. of the 1922 Triennial is \$1,000,000. A tremendous sum you will say—yes; but the crying need for more missionaries, more schools, more hospitals, both in foreign fields and domestic—the realization of the good already accomplished, and the large number of human souls still awaiting this blessed, extended hand, urge us on in feverish haste to increase our U. T. O. Every effort must be made during the next eight months if we would help make this offering in Portland reach the goal. It has been proposed, in consideration of the Disarmament Conference in Washington, to make this the great Peace United Thank Offering. The Bishop of Pennsylvania said recently, "To support work away from home is a perfect test of loyalty to our Lord. The vows of baptism are vows of world-wide service."

Just one week after the passing of Miss Emery, we were shocked to learn of the death of our beloved Treasurer, Miss Smythe. Indeed we find it difficult to think how to go on without her. As an officer she was excellent, always dependable, and as a friend she was loved by all.

We have reason to rejoice that in our first two years in office, the Harrisburg Diocesan branch succeeded in raising the \$3,500. Special, with which to build a house, to be called S. Mary's House, for our Deaconess Newbold, in Aomori, Japan. As her Bishop, Dr. McKim, said at Detroit, "to give her a decent roof over her head." Because of the stupendous cost, during the war, the actual building has had to wait, but the money has been at interest the while, and this spring the house will be begun.

In September we sent our second missionary, Miss Gladys Spencer, to Japan to join Deaconess Newbold in her work. That was a happy meeting on the other side of the world for those two from the Diocese of Harrisburg. The Auxiliaries gave her a purse of more than four hundred dollars, one hundred of which was raised in one parish. Two young women from the Harrisburg Archdeaconry also went as missionaries to China this year. Do not forget to pray for all of these brave young women.

Each year the Auxiliary has pledged to a Chinese Student Scholarship, and this last year, in addition to the Emery Fund, the Bishop Rowe Fund, Bishop Overs Fund, Mt. Alto, and to the Expense Fund.

Our supply department has been generally endorsed, according to the new methods introduced at the last Triennial, under the efficient management of our Supply Secretary, Mrs. M. R. Cowell. Do we remember that there is still great demand for hospital dressings along the lines of the Red Cross?

One long hoped for event has been realized this year, thanks primarily to the indefatigable effort of our diocesan Secretary, Mrs. Van Horne; an Auxiliary Institute for parish leaders of conferences and discussions groups, was held in Christ Church, Williamsport in early October with an attendance of more than fifty from eleven parishes. Once more Miss Laura Boyer from Church Missions House came to our aid as leader. Harrisburg is greatly indebted to Miss Boyer for Missionary inspiration and enlarged vision. We regret that our Vice-President, Mrs. Herr, found it necessary to resign because of ill health. We have missed her and have been handicapped without her. We are glad to announce that Bishop Darlington has appointed to this office Mrs. Caleb Brinton of Carlisle. It is now hoped we may be able to hold an Institute in Harrisburg and Altoona Archdeaconries this year.

It was our privilege to be one of several from our diocese to attend the Provincial Synod in Wilmington, and a feast it proved from the opening sermon by Dr. Freeman to the Sessions of the Woman's Auxiliary, ably conducted by the Provincial president Mrs. Marcellin C. Adams of Pittsburg. It is good to get together, to confer together, to gather inspiration from others. This is one reason why it is so worth while to attend such meetings. It is only they who never attend large meetings that remain uninterested. One conference on the Church Mission of Help was most convincing. In these days of over-organization one hesitates to introduce one more society, but this is a most appealing missionary work—I would that there might be a branch in every Church Community.

One year ago, Mrs. Phelps of the executive board of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council presented to our Annual a very thorough and clear idea of the Church Service League. Our Bishop organized a Diocesan Council with Mrs. Drinkwater as Chairman, and other able officers. Why is it so few parish Units have been formed, and so little use made of it? The opportunity is present and if we derive little benefit the fault lies entirely within ourselves. Shall we not wake up before the next Triennial?

Miss Lindley writes that it has been resolved by the Executive Board that the Auxiliary should join in observing the first Friday in Lent, March 3, as a Day of Prayer for Missions. Please remember this authoritative request.

And now let me acknowledge the never failing co-operation and courtesy of my fellow officers, and of the women of the Auxiliary branches throughout this long term of office. We thank you one and all, and we bespeak like consideration to our successor.

MINUTES OF ANNUAL MEETING

The seventeenth Annual Meeting of the Harrisburg Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council was held in Trinity Church, Williamsport, February 14th and 15th, 1922.

The meeting was opened with the Quiet Hour conducted by the Rev. Mr. R. F. Gibson of The Church Mission House, who took as his text Luke 12-15, "And He said unto them 'Take heed and keep yourselves from all covetousness; for a man's life consists not in the abundance of things which he possesses.'" Mr. Gibson showed that happiness does not come from possessing much, but in sharing what one has with others, and gave as his main thought that the Kingdom of Heaven could not be gained by what one does for oneself, but that in giving and doing for others, without thought of self, is the way to establish the Kingdom of Heaven. He said in one part that no one can enter Heaven alone.

There were nearly 400 persons at this Quiet Hour, which was a remarkable attendance.

Immediately after the Quiet Hour, Dr. Jeffreys held his first Discussion class, using as his subject "The Aim of the Church." After this class, the Nominating Committee organized, and Bishop Darlington read to the assembled women the report of the Mt. Alto Committee, of which Mrs. Darlington was Chairman. Tuesday evening, a Mass Meeting was held in Trinity Church, at which time Bishop Burleson preached the sermon using as his text a part of the eighth verse of first chapter of the Acts of the Apostles. Bishop Burleson spoke of the need of faith and of the great faith found among Indians, with whom he works. Bishop Darlington, before pronouncing the benediction spoke most optimistically of the future. At this service the former rector of Trinity, The Rev. R. F. Gibson, was in the chancel as well as the Rev. Messrs. Barnes, Brueninghausen, Nichols, Fercken. The rector of Trinity, the Rev. D. W. Gateson, welcomed all in a most happy manner. The music was especially beautiful.

After the service an informal reception was held in the Community House, to permit all the people to have an opportunity to meet Bishop Burleson and to greet Bishop Darlington and Mr. Gibson.

At 8:00 A. M. Wednesday, a plain celebration of the Holy Communion was held in Trinity Chapel, with the Rev. D. W. Gateson as celebrant, assisted by the Rev. Mr. Morgan of Bloomsburg, Archdeacon of Williamsport Archdeaconry.

The business meeting opened at 9:15 A. M., the rector of Trinity again welcomed the delegates and visitors and then turning the meeting over to Mrs. Wirt, the President of the Diocesan Auxiliary, who gave her last annual message. This message is printed elsewhere in this report. Immediately after the message two resolutions were presented by the Committee on Resolutions, one concerning the amending of the Constitution which was carried by more than a two-thirds vote, and the second, a Memorial Resolution presented by the women of the Auxiliary in honor of the late Miss Mary Smythe, the Treasurer and United Thank Offering Custodian of the Diocesan Woman's Auxiliary. This second resolution was unanimously endorsed. The reports of the Treasurer, United Thank Offering Custodian, Supply Department Secretary and Educational Secretary were read and accepted. The resignation of the Educational Secretary, Mrs. J. G. Fisher, was read and accepted with regrets.

The Chairman of the Church Service League, Mrs. Drinkwater, took charge of the meeting for a short time and told of the aim of the Church Service League, and called upon the Church Service League

Secretary, Mrs. Knight. for reports of what had been accomplished this past year, Mrs. Knight also read the report of the Church Periodical Club Librarian, and some letters from some of the rectors, showing their attitude towards such a league.

We were glad to have with us at this meeting, Dr. Fercken, the rector at Mt. Alto, who told us in a most interesting way of his work at Mt. Alto, and also about the little children's faith in him and love for him.

We had the unexpected pleasure of having with us Mrs. Marcellin C. Adams of Pittsburg, the President of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Third Province (Province of Washington) who told us of some of the actions taken at a recent meeting of the National Executive Board, from which she was returning. She also told of the memorial Thanksgiving Service for Miss Lindley held in the Church of the Incarnation in New York. Dr. Jeffreys had his second discussion class immediately after Mrs. Adam's talk, using as his subject "The Philosophy of Obedience." Much interest was aroused in Dr. Jeffreys' classes and his manner of handling them was a revelation to many of those present. It was a splendid thing for all leaders of discussion groups to have had the advantage of hearing Dr. Jeffreys, and the Auxiliary extends its grateful thanks to Mrs. C. LaRue Munson, who made it possible to invite him here.

The Rev. Robert Morgan, Archdeacon of Williamsport, had noon-day prayers, after which the roll was called and ballots distributed for the election, and pledges made. The pledges made were as follows:

Christ School, Arden, is the new pledge made this year. No definite amount was pledged but it is thought \$150.00 should be definitely promised. This pledge and Mt. Alto pledge should be paid as early as possible, as these places are in immediate need of funds. Send all checks through Diocesan Auxiliary Treasurer.

Lunch was served in the Community House at 12:45 P. M. by members of Trinity Auxiliary and St. Agnes' Guild. Many men attended the lunch and were also present at some of the business sessions.

Bishop Burleson gave a brief talk during lunch, and told particularly of his work among the Indians and of the great help given all Missionary Dioceses by the Woman's Auxiliary. He also told that all the Indian women in his Missionary Diocese contributed to the United Thank Offering and are glad and proud to do so.

Business sessions were renewed at 2:00 o'clock. The Church School Service League and Church Service League held separate conference while the reports of the Archdeaconry Vice-Presidents were made and reports made by the chairmen of different committees. Mrs. Caleb Brinton gave a most complete report of the Provincial Synod meeting, at Wilmington, in November. Her report was the most interesting and full report ever made from a Province meeting.

Mrs. A. P. Perley told of her three most vivid impressions of this meeting, saying that Mrs. Brinton left nothing for her to report. Mrs. Perley's impressions were:

First—Bishop Cook as a host,

Second—Mrs Adams as a presiding officer,

Third—The report of the work of the St. Barnabas Guild for nurses.

Letters were read from Miss Lindley, Gladys Spencer. and Miss Houghton, a teacher in St. Mary's school, Shanghai, China. Miss Lindley urged that special effort be made to get as large a United Thank Offering this year as possible. The offering this year is to be known as a "Peace

Thank Offering." She also told all to observe as a Day of Prayer for Missions the first Friday in Lent, March 3rd. The President urged all women to remember and obey these requests.

A resolution was presented by the Executive Board to the effect that the Self-Denial week offering of 1922 be used as a memorial to Miss Smythe in placing the altar in the chapel of St. Mary's School. This resolution was unanimously adopted. The Resolution Committee also announced that they recommend that the Harrisburg Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary go on record as unanimously endorsing all that has been said of the late Miss Julia Emery. This recommendation was adopted.

At this point, Mrs. Drinkwater, the Vice-President-at-large, took the chair, and Mrs. Almy, expressed, for all the Diocese, appreciative thanks for the faithful service of the retiring President, Mrs. Wirt.

She told how she first became interested in Auxiliary work, and developed the Diocesan Auxiliary, along all lines.

When Mrs. Almy proposed a vote of thanks to Mrs. Wirt for the women stood, almost before the words left her mouth, in order to show their love and esteem for Mrs. Wirt.

Mrs. Wirt then resumed the chair, and thanked all, for the appreciation, and for the loyal way that all branches stood by her during her term of office.

The Rev. A. M. Judd, Executive Secretary of the Diocese, spoke to the women a 3:15 on the "Relation of the Woman's Auxiliary to Diocesan Missions."

After his talk, an interesting discussion took place, participated in by the officers of the Auxiliary, and by the rectors present.

A vote of thanks was given to the women of Trinity for their hospitality, and the meeting adjourned, to meet at St. John's York, February 1923.

There were present at this meeting (as registered) 175 women, two Bishops, nine clergy, and fourteen laymen.

The offering was \$111.23.

The total amount sent from this Diocese for the Emery Jubilee Fund was, \$1076.72.

At the conference held by the Church Service League, a new Chairman was elected, to succeed Mrs. Drinkwater.

Mrs. Olmstead of St. Stephen's, Harrisburg, was elected.

Mrs. Harry S. Knight, of Sunbury, was reappointed Secretary of this League

REPORT OF THE VICE-PRESIDENT OF ALTOONA ARCHDEACONRY

The Vice-president of the Altoona Archdeaconry, respectfully submits the following report.

This has been a most encouraging year. All of the five branches are doing splendid work, and there seems to be a spiritual awakening for the great need of workers.

The Altoona branch has formed a Section B, and has placed a number of United Thank Offering boxes.

We held two Archdeaconry meetings this year. The Spring meeting was held in St. John's, Huntingdon, beginning with the Holy Communion, celebrated by the rector, the Rev. Mr. Pielow, assisted by the Rev Mr. Atkins, rector of St John's, York, who was the speaker of the day.

Each branch has some responsibility for the success of these meetings, and each branch is represented by a member who has a topic to discuss.

The Fall meeting was held at St. Mark's, Lewiston.

The Holy Communion was celebrated by the Ven. F. T. Eastment, assisted by the Rev. Frank Cady of Tyrone. The speaker at this service was Bishop Darlington.

We had the pleasure of having with us two Diocesan officers; Mrs. Wirt, and Mrs. Van Horne, both of whom gave most encouraging reports.

Miss Anna Watts was the speaker of the day, and she gave a most comprehensive account of the working of the Church School Service League.

We had a good attendance at both meetings. Reports were called for and much enthusiasm was felt when they were given.

During the year, boxes were sent from this Archdeaconry, to schools and to Diocesan rectors, amounting to \$593.42. In addition to this, one branch paid, through their Church treasurer, \$165.00 for their Parish House fund, \$5.00 to St. Paul's Library fund and \$100.00 to the Nation Wide Campaign Fund.

All five branches sold Chinese Life Saving stamps to the amount of \$77.35.

Pledges paid to the Diocesan Expense Fund, and to the items in the Diocesan Auxiliary budget, amounted to \$173.00.

The Auxiliary at Lewistown deserves special mention, as they gave to the Bishop Overs Fund, \$35.00.

The United Thank Offering reported from this Archdeaconry amounted to \$202.27.

The Emery Jubilee Fund \$121.18, the Gladys Spencer Fund, \$98.00.

The Special Funds amounted to \$28.00.

All branches report Study Classes held, and an increase in the number of copies of the Spirit of Missions sold.

We hope to make 1922 a splendid year by doing better work.

Report of the Vice-President of the Williamsport Archdeaconry

The Vice-President of the Williamsport Archdeaconry respectfully submits the following report for the current year ending January 31, 1921. Reports from all the branches have been received and are most encouraging. Increased interest is plainly shown by the increase in offerings and values of boxes sent. I regret to be obliged to report a decrease in the number of Mission Study Classes and program meetings only eight being held this year in comparison to twelve last year. The number of delegates sent to summer conference was three. The amount of the United Thank Offering was \$1010.36. Personal boxes sent amounted to \$1055.20. Given outside the Diocese \$709.32. To the Supply Department \$184.77—Total \$1899.29.

At a Centre Meeting held in Bloomsburg this fall \$12.00 was contributed, said amount to be used for repairs on the Rectory at Laporte.

The spring meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Archdeaconry of Williamsport was held at Christ Church, Berwick, Thursday May 12, 1921. It was opened with the celebration of the Holy Eucharist, the Rev. M. H. Ake being the celebrant assisted by the Rev. Mr. Morgan of Bloomsburg and the Rev. Dr. Appleton of Danville.

Mrs. Arthur H. Woolley of Danville, Vice President of the organization, presided at the business meeting. Rev. Mr. Ake welcomed the delegates in behalf of the parish and Mrs. Lawrence I. Clewell in behalf of the Auxiliary. There were fifty-one delegates and six Priests present representing eight parishes. The speakers, each and every one did full justice to their subject allotted them and imparted a great deal of information to their hearers that was both instructive and valuable. The Rev. Mr. Judd, ex secretary, who was not on the programme, gave a very instructive talk about the convention at York, and of the work that is being done among the negroes of the diocese. The reports from most of the parishes and missions were very encouraging, especially the work that is being accomplished at Coles Creek, Berwick and Sunbury.

Miss Swartout of Coles Creek gave an interesting account of the work being done in their little mission and of the wonderful enthusiasm shown in the advancement of the Woman's Auxiliary. A cordial invitation was extended to all to come to St. Gabriels in July at which time the rite of confirmation will be administered by the Rt. Rev. James Henry Darlington, and it was hoped there would be a large attendance to encourage the faithful people working in this farming district.

Dr. Milbank of All Saints Church, Williamsport, gave an eloquent address on Loyalty to the Episcopal Church and its work.

Archdeacon Lascelle, St. Matthew's Church, Sunbury, spoke on the Mission Work of the Diocese.

Mrs. Johnson, President of the Bloomsburg branch, talked of the Church Periodical Club, and Miss Morgan of Christ Church, Berwick on the Girls Friendly Society, which organization, by the way, is doing a wonderful work in Berwick.

Miss Anna Watts of Mechanicsburg, Penna., in her address gave us much information and help in connection with the Church School Service League.

Mrs. Wirt conducted a questionnaire.

The invitation to Coles Creek was accepted and representatives of the Church from Catawissa, Riverside, Danville, Bloomsburg and

Berwick were present to greet Bishop Darlington and to meet the hospitable people of St. Garbriel. After the service a delightful luncheon was served in the grove. This was followed by informal talks the speakers being the Bishop, the 3 Priests present, Mrs. Wirt and Mrs. Woolley.

I attended a Conference at St James Church, Exchange, this summer, and spoke to the congregation on Woman's Work in the Church. They showed great interest and I hope an Auxiliary branch will be established there this year. I also visited St. John's Church, La Porte, for a conference, and spoke on the same subject. This is one of our missions and sadly needs the prayers, support, and interest of us all. The Church has a splendid work to do on this mountain-top, to preach the Gospel and give the Sacraments to the isolated children of God in that region. So let us do our part to help keep alive this weak but necessary member of Christ's body.

It is with regret that I mention Mrs. Wirt's retirement as President of our organization. Her interest in the auxiliary has been of the untiring kind, and her devotion to the work has been crowned with success under her wise leadership, God bless her for all she has done.

The death of Miss Smythe, our Diocesan Treasurer, has cast a shadow over the whole diocese but especially do we feel her loss in this Archdeaconry. Her home was here and many of us had the privilege and pleasure of meeting her personally. Her devotion and loyalty to the Church and particularly to the Woman's Auxiliary are a monument to her character and will always remain a bright spot in the history of our Auxiliary. "May she rest in Peace and may Light Perpetual shine upon her."

May our prayers and efforts this year bring many more women into active service and work in the Church and Auxiliary and let us do our utmost to establish a branch in every Parish and Mission in this Archdeaconry. Just as we plant so will God give the increase. May next years' report be a harvest of great achievement and advancement for God and His Church.

REPORT OF HARRISBURG ARCHDEACONRY

Owing to the fact that the Vice-president of the Harrisburg Archdeaconry resigned, in June, because of ill health, no proper report can be given of all the work done, in that archdeaconry.

REPORT FROM THE NORTHERN ARCHDEACONRY

No meeting was held in the Northern Archdeaconry, in 1921, but the three branches that compose this archdeaconry, kept steadily at work. Boxes to the value of \$64.70 were sent out, as well as work done locally by each branch.

The United Thank Offering amounted to \$64.43 for the year 1921.

It is hoped that we can have a meeting this coming summer.

REPORT OF BOX SECRETARY FOR 1921

The work of all the Auxiliaries in this Diocese, has been very encouraging, and I feel all are growing more interested in Missions.

Here is an instance, last Lent an appeal came from a Mission in the South, the answer was twenty boxes of new and second hand clothing, the total value amounted to \$855.76.

A number of other Missions received substantial help.

This fall our own seven or eight Missionaries have had fine boxes and all were appreciated, but I sincerely wish they did not have to humiliate their dignity by asking for help. Their needs seem imperative to me, then as I am Supply Department Secretary I want its shelves kept full; so I am at a loss how to advise the branches in selecting their work, their conscience will have to guide them.

I feel that the Fall work is very important as the needs of our Missionaries should be filled before cold weather. At that time every woman is busy getting her own family ready for cold weather, therefore it requires some planning and sacrifice to accomplish all that must be done.

I want to thank those branches who have donated so generously to the Supply Department.

The 26th of September a list from Mrs. Wade Church Mission House took every article out of the Department. Now I have a beautiful and large supply.

It may interest you to know, boxes have been sent to Alaska, Oklahoma, Minnesota, Kansas, North Carolina, Kentucky, Texas, Virginia, Utah and South Dakota.

Report of Educational Secretary, with Additions by Auxiliary Secretary

A serious operation followed by many months of slow convalescence and a mental condition far below normal, has made it impossible for me to attend to any of my duties as Educational Secretary. I feel that it has been a great detriment to the work along educational lines, in the Diocese, as there is great need of efficient, untiring effort to bring this work up to a satisfactory standard, and that as every minute counts, one not used, is just so much time lost.

Many parishes are making absolutely no effort to advance. Some admit that they take no interest in the educational work, while others, are apparently indifferent. No doubt, there are many parishes ready for the work, but the leadership is lacking.

I do hope that at this meeting, some one will speak of the importance of attending Summer Conferences. Oh, the visions! The wonderful awakening of the missionary interest, the insight our members would gain of the task of the Church if we could see a member from every branch of the Auxiliary, coming back from a Conference, to start a Discussion Group in her parish. I am very sure that Miss Boyer's visit to the Diocese was a great help, and it would be of additional service to have her come again. The best reports in answer to the questionnaire, I sent out, have come from parishes, in or near Williamsport, and I do feel that we must grant Miss Boyer full credit for this. If she could visit in the southern part of the Diocese, her influence would probably be felt where it is certainly needed. There are churches in Harrisburg and Lancaster that have done no work along educational lines, and there are no doubt, able leaders in these parishes, that when, developed, would be of great assistance in advancing the work of the church.

Out of 43 letters I sent I have received replies from but 18. During the year 1921, there have been 18 educational groups, or classes in the form of program, meetings, Discussion groups, Lantern slides, or Lectures, among 14 different parishes, some parishes having two or more groups.

Eight persons attended Summer Conferences, at Geneva, or Montrose.

I hope that 30 will attend such conferences this coming summer, as it is through Conferences and Institutes, that we will get new leaders, new speakers and an awakened spirit that will lead us into broader channels for an enlightened Diocese.

ADDITIONAL NOTES BY AUXILIARY SECRETARY

An institute for Educational purposes and for training leaders, was held in Christ Church, Williamsport, Oct. 5th. and 6th., 1921, with an attendance of 47. This is the first time our Diocesan Auxiliary has sponsored such an Institute, and we hope that this coming year we may have two or three such meetings, in as many different sections of the Diocese. This, of course, depends upon the willingness of the Rectors, and women to co-operate with the movement.

The work of the Woman's Auxiliary is, as you know, Praying for, Giving to, and Studying about Missions, and therefore this is a legitimate part of the work.

The course outlined by the Educational Department of the Woman's Auxiliary recommends the study of The Survey, for the second year, for those who have already given one season to this course.

For those who have not yet studied any part of the Survey, it is suggested that the programs issued by the Educational Department of the Church Missions House, be used in program meetings, there are also a few programs, taking up in a very brief way, the whole Survey, in seven lessons, which may be secured from the Diocesan Auxiliary Secretary. These adapted from outlines given by Miss Boyer.

Some books recommended for reading and discussion, are Dr. Jeffery's book "How Can We Know the Way?", and Archdeacon Stuck's last book "Alaskan Missions," and Dr. Sturgis' book, "The Church's Life." All of these books may be obtained from the Church Mission House, and all have the "Help's for Leaders."

The Educational Secretary for the Diocese for 1922 is Mrs. J. W. Briggs of Huntingdon, who will gladly help any branch in any way. In each Archdeaconry, Educational leaders will be appointed, whose names may be secured from Mrs. Briggs. These leaders will do personal work in their respective Archdeaconries.

In case your own Archdeaconry Educational Secretary cannot, for any reason, give you the information, or assistance you ask for, you may write to the Diocesan Educational Secretary.



REPORT OF CHURCH PERIODICAL CLUB

PRAYER

O Lord Jesus Christ, who art the Light of the World, pour out, we beseech Thee upon all Thy servants, Thy Holy Spirit of Wisdom and Understanding, that they may know the hope of Thy calling, the riches of Thy inheritance in the saints, and the greatness of Thy power to us who believe. More especially we pray Thee to direct and prosper the Church Periodical Club, that in all its prayer and labor, it may be enabled to make the light of Thy glory shine forth in the dark places of earth. And do Thou of Thy mercy, and grace establish Thy Church in the truth of Thy Gospel, who livest and reignest with the Father and Holy Spirit, ever One God, world without end. Amen.

The year of 1921 does not mark any special anniversary of the Church Periodical Club, as it has a number of organizations, in the Church; but the Spirit of Missions paid a great tribute to our missionary work, in giving us a place in the Centennial number of that magazine.

The C. P. C. founded in 1888 by Mrs. Mortimer Fargo, has now after 33 years, branches in 67 Dioceses, and in 1920 supplied more than 5,000 persons among the clergy and laity in the United States, and in Missions in China and Japan and other places, with the good literature they could not have otherwise received.

It affords me great pleasure to report that many branches show an increase in the matter of forwarding current magazines. While we rejoice over every gain in quantity, the most pressing task of the C. P. C. is to develop a corresponding gain in the quality.

The call for up-to-date scientific literature, and research material, for our mission hospitals, and medical missionaries, is ever most insistent.

The C. P. C. ministers to starving intellects, and the personal interest behind the sending, and the personal relation established between the sender and recipient, help to make Christian fellowship a reality.

The C. P. C. always has special efforts which supplement, but not supplant, the service in which we are already engaged.

Our special effort, this year, must still be for the library of St. Paul's College, Tokyo, to which we are pledged.

University rank of St. Paul's, depends upon us. The empty shelves in the beautiful library, are the chasm that still yawns, between St. Paul's being a college, or a university, and the books to fill those shelves will be the bridge to the desired goal.

The placing of one stone, in the building of a bridge is a small matter, yet, the sum of all the stones, when properly placed, makes the bridge.

Our Diocese's part in the building of this bridge, has been the sum of \$127.95, contributed by ten parishes, in amounts ranging from \$1.25 to \$25.65. There are 52 parishes, 12 organized missions, and 31 mission stations in our Diocese. Did each of these take part in the building of this bridge? Let each answer for itself. If you did not, come now, and take your part in the blessed privilege of making St. Paul's the instrument for the propagation of Christian education in Tokyo, and for promoting international understanding and amity. The gift of one book, seems a small thing in the face of so large a task.

Let us not do it grudgingly, or of necessity; not looking for appreciation or reward, but freely and gladly, in the spirit of our Master.

RESOLVED: That the United Thank Offering of 1922 be given to the Board of Missions or any organization which has succeeded, or may hereafter succeed to its functions,, for women's work in the mission field, including the training, sending and support of women workers and the care of such workers when sick or disabled—provided that one-tenth of the offering to be set aside as a permanent trust fund to be invested and administered by the Board of Missions, or any organization which has succeeded or may hereafter succeed to its functions, the income to be applied to the support of retired United Thank Offering workers—also provided that the sum of not less than \$10,000 be devoted to the erection completion or renewal of a building or buildings approved by the Board of Missions on the recommendation of the President of the Board of Missions and the Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary.

ALSO RESOLVED: That to our united gifts shall be added our united and earnest prayers that God will put it into the hearts of many faithful women to give themselves or of their substance to the work of the Master in the mission field.

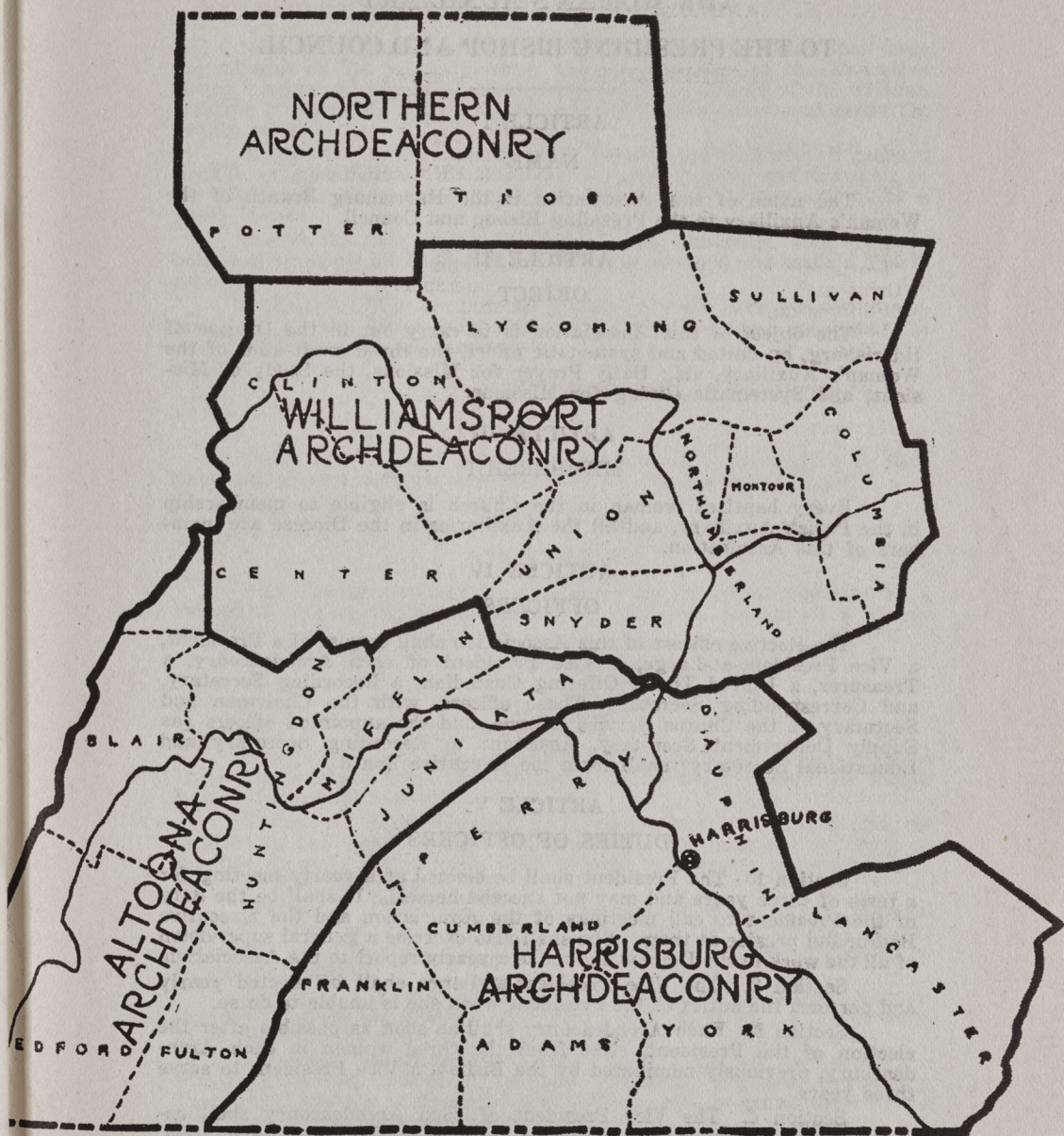

**CONSTITUTION OF THE HARRISBURG BRANCH OF
THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY
TO THE PRESIDING BISHOP AND COUNCIL**

ARTICLE I

NAME

The name of this Association is the Harrisburg Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council.

ARTICLE II

OBJECT

The object of this Association is to carry out in the Diocese of Harrisburg, by united and systematic effort, the three great aims of the Woman's Auxiliary, viz.: Daily Prayer for Missions, the Study of Missions, and Systematic Giving for Missions.

ARTICLE III

MEMBERSHIP

Every baptized woman in the Church is eligible to membership in the Parish Auxiliary, and all the Auxiliaries in the Diocese are members of this Association.

ARTICLE IV

OFFICERS

The elective officers of this Association shall consist of a President, a Vice President-at-Large, a Vice President of each Archdeaconry, a Treasurer, a United Thank Offering Custodian, a Recording Secretary, and Corresponding Secretary. These officers, with the Chairman and Secretary of the Church Service League, and the appointed officers (as Supply Department Secretary, Assistant to Recording Secretary and Educational Secretary) shall form the Executive Board.

ARTICLE V

DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The President shall be elected at a yearly meeting for a term of three years and may not succeed herself. It shall be the duty of the President to call meetings of the Association and the Executive Board, and preside at them. She shall also exercise a general supervision of all the work in the Diocese and make a yearly report to the Association.

Section 2. The Vice President-at-Large shall be elected yearly and perform the duties of the President when she is unable to do so.

Section 3. Each Archdeaconry shall as soon as possible after the election of the President, elect from the three women in each Archdeaconry, previously nominated by the Bishop, a Vice President to serve three years.

Section 4. The Vice President of each Archdeaconry shall co-operate with the President in promoting local intelligence and interest, and in directing and organizing work in her own Archdeaconry.

Section 5. The Recording and Corresponding Secretary shall keep the minutes of the yearly meeting and the meetings of the Executive Board, conduct all necessary correspondence, have charge of the writing, printing and sending out of reports and other documents, and make the yearly report.

Section 6. The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all moneys for the expense fund of the Association. Also receive and transmit to the Missionary Treasurers such other moneys sent to her and make a yearly report.

Section 7. The United Thank Offering Custodian shall receive, hold, and transmit all United Thank Offering moneys, and make a yearly report.

Section 8. The Educational Secretary shall have general supervision of all the Missionary Educational Work carried on under the auspices of the Woman Auxiliary.

MEETINGS

ARTICLE VI

There shall be one general meeting of this Association in each year and other meetings may be called by the Executive Board.

ARTICLE VII

AMENDMENTS

This Constitution and By-Laws may be altered or amended by a two-third vote of the whole number of delegates present at a yearly meeting

BY-LAWS

Section 1. A Nominating Committee consisting of one member from each Archdeaconry, shall be appointed by the President one month before the annual meeting.

Section 2. Elections shall be by ballot, and each branch shall be entitled to two votes, and an additional vote for each ten members or fraction thereof. These votes shall be cast by properly accredited delegates or their alternates.

Section 3. Delegates to the Triennial meeting of the General Auxiliary shall be the President and four from the membership of the Auxiliary, and five alternates from the membership of the Auxiliary, to be elected by ballot.

Section 4. There shall be three delegates to the Provincial meetings who shall be the President Ex-Officio, and two from the membership, to be chosen by ballot.

Section 5. An expense fund shall be provided by this Association for the necessary expenses, namely, Printing, Postage, Stationery, Traveling Expenses of Speakers and Officers, etc., to be arranged at the discretion of the Executive Board.

Section 1. The Executive and Legislative Committees shall keep the minutes of the Society, and the minutes of the Executive Committee shall be kept in the office of the Secretary, and the minutes of the Legislative Committee shall be kept in the office of the President.

Section 2. The Executive Committee shall have the right to call for the minutes of the Executive Committee, and the minutes of the Legislative Committee shall be kept in the office of the President.
