Remember to collect and send your United Thank Offering (Blue Box Money) twice each year to the Diocesan U. T. O. Custodian, whose name and address you will find in the list of Diocesan Officers on another page. By sending it to her twice each year, extra interest will be gained.

Remember to send all other moneys to the Diocesan Auxiliary Treasurer. Send the Expense Fund pledge as early as possible, and increase that pledge if possible, as with the growth of the Auxiliary, the expenses are heavier. One or two of your pledges will need to be met this Spring. Please keep this in mind, and pay these before your work closes in May.

Remember to notify the Diocesan Auxiliary Secretary of any changes of officers in your branch, or of changes in address.

Remember that all well rounded parish branches try to take a part in all the work of the Woman's Auxiliary. That is: Prayer, Gifts, and Study.

Remember that the Diocesan Auxiliary will gladly receive reports of Auxiliary work done by any parish Guilds or societies where no branch of the Auxiliary is formed. Some Guilds use the U. T. O. Boxes or sew for the Supply Department, or have reading or discussion groups, all of which work should be reported to the Diocesan Auxiliary Secretary.

Remember to subscribe for, and read the Spirit of Missions, and the Harrisburg Churchman, in order to keep in touch with what is going on in the Church at large, and in our own Diocese.

Remember to consult with the Diocesan Supply Secretary about your Box work, and to report to her, all Box work done by your branch, whether secured from her or not.

Remember to carry with you to your parish meetings, your copy of this Annual Report, and inform your branch members of what is recorded in it.

Remember that we have within our Diocese, one of the large Tubercular Hospitals: that at Mont Alto, and remember that our Church is the only one with a resident minister. Help him in his work, all you can, by prayers, and gifts.

We have from this Diocese: 2 young women in China, 3 in Japan, 1 in the Cumberland mountains of Virginia, 1 young woman and 1 young man in Liberia, and 1 young woman in Cuba.

Pray for them and write to them, that they may feel your encouragement. You will find their addresses in this book.

Our pledges for this year are: For the Expense Fund of this Diocesan Branch. This fund is necessary to carry on the work in a fairly

competent way. For a fund to help train Divinity students in China (known as the Chinese Student Fund), for helping the Rector of Mt. Alto make the life of the patients at that place, a little easier. For finishing paying the cost of making the rectory at LaPorte, a little more livable.

A Special asked for by the National Auxiliary, is a fund for building a house for colored women in training for helping promote Church work. This is called a "House for Churchwomen" and will be built at Raleigh.

And the last is for our own Diocese. A fund of \$300.00 for helping build a parish house at Millersburg, Penna.

This makes one fund for carrying on the work of this Diocesan Branch, three funds for use in our own Diocese, and two funds for the Church at large.

Please remember that on St. Michael's and All Angels Day, the offering at the Corporate Communions, which should be held in all parishes, goes to repay Deaconess Newbold for the money she advanced for the completion of St. Mary's House, at Aomori, Japan.

Resolutions as presented by the Resolution Committee, and passed upon by the delegates assembled.

Resolved:—That the Resolution acted upon at the Triennial meeting in Portland, which endorsed the work of the Nation Wide Campaign, and promised co-operation with the same, be unanimously endorsed by the Harrisburg Diocesan branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council.

Resolved:—That a ruling be incorporated in the By-laws of this Branch to permit taking 10 per cent. of the total amount pledged to the Expense Fund, the same to be set aside to form a Sinking Fund for emergencies.

Resolved:—That the Secretary be instructed to extend to our President, Mrs. C. H. Boyer, the loving sympathy and loyal support of the members of this Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Whereas—Since it has pleased Almighty God, to call Home, the husband of one of our delegates to the last Triennial, Mr. Cyrus LaRue Munson, Chancellor of this Diocese, who by his interest in, and encouragement of all the work of the Woman's Auxiliary, so often helped in many ways to advance the Missionary Spirit in this Diocese; be it

Resolved:—That we, the women of this Harrisburg Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, tender our heartfelt sympathy to Mrs. Munson, and family, assuring them of our prayers for their consolation and comfort: And be it further Resolved: That a copy of this Resolution be sent to the family, and the same be incorporated in the minutes of this meeting.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

My message begins with best wishes for you, in this coming year, and for all your work.

And there is such abundant hope of 1923 being a happy year of service for there is so much to do, and such a spirit of readiness to do it. We feel that we can look forward into the New Year most hopefully. There are several matters that we want to bring before you. You know that one of the things promised in Portland, was a program of service.

We promised to put our whole strength into the Nation Wide Campaign, in Educational lines as well as in other ways. We must seek ever closer co-operation, with this work. So too, must we be eager to further all efforts for the growth of the Church Service League. We must take our full share in its development.

We must insist that not Organization, but Service is the great necessity of the times. The Woman's Auxiliary is entrusted with the general work of the Church.

Another important phase of our work is the problem of Social Service. The question has been, and is being constantly asked: "What shall the Woman's Auxiliary do for Social Service? While the Woman's Auxiliary is the Auxiliary to the National Council, and therefore rightly includes Social Service activities in its work, yet it is important that we should work with others in this work.

Other resolutions acted upon at Portland, are : Our interest in the development of an organization among young people.

Our prayers and service in maintaining a high Christian moral standard in our homes, and society.

Our interest and help in such work as Prison Reform, Adequate care of disabled veterans. Proper laws for women and children. Christian Inter-racial, and International relations; Limitations of Armament; and Christian Unity.

The head of the Central Department for Missions of the Girl's Friendly, has been made a member of the Executive Board of the Woman Auxiliary.

We are to do more work for Altar furnishings, and linens, working through the National Supply Department.

We should see that Miss Emery's book "A Century of Endeavor" is bought and read.

We undertook to study, and practice Proportionate Giving and Stewardship, and of course, we are already beginning to work for the U. T. O. of 1925. One of the most practical ways to work for this, is to see that our Offering increases this first year of the Triennium.

We are very much gratified at the very decided increase of this Offering in 1922, and for the whole Triennial ending in 1922. In 1919 the U. T. O. from this Diocese was \$3873.54. In 1922 it was \$6000.00.

The number of parishes contributing to this Offering, has increased each year as we now have several parishes using the Blue Boxes, that have no branch of the Woman's Auxiliary. Some of these branches also send supplies to the Diocesan Supply Department, or send out Missionary boxes.

The last report of the whole U. T. O. is \$681,145.09. \$15,000 of it was given for the Nurses' Home at St. Luke's Hospital, Tokyo. Dr. R. B. Tuesler has written a letter expressing much appreciation for this gift.

Our Supply Department Secretary, Mrs. Crowell, has developed that Department, until its work greatly exceeds that done in the past.

How glad and happy we are to know that our Deaconess Newbold is in her convenient, and comfortable house. It is something she has seen in her dreams, and lived in, in her imagination for many years. It was necessary for her, however to give of her own money for the completion of the house and Kindergarten, the sum of \$850.00. The price of building material, and labor had gone up so much since the war, that our money was not sufficient to finish it.

The Executive Board recommends that we begin our Fall work with the Annual Corporate Communion on St. Michael's and All Angels Day, and make a Self Denial Offering to be used to refund the Deaconess what she spent of her savings.

The Summer Conference for Church Workers at the beautiful resort of Eagles Mere was held four days in July. Conferences were held on the work of the Woman's Auxiliary, and the study book "Wanted—Leaders" outlined.

This year we have invited the Dioceses of Bethlehem, and Pennsylvania to join us in a Conference early in July. We hope that many women of this Diocese will attend the Woman's Auxiliary sessions.

This year our pledges will be for the Expense Fund, for the Chinese Scholarship, for Mont Alto, for the repairs of the rectory at Laport, and the following Specials: Homes for colored and white women missionaries in New York and in Raleigh, and in our own Diocese, the Parish House at Millersburg. We are also asked to make some special offerings to the Bishop Rowe Foundation, which they wish to complete by Easter.

You have been asked to increase your Diocesan Expense Fund, so that a sinking fund may be set aside for use in emergencies.

At the December meeting of the Executive Board of the National Auxiliary, the first Friday in Lent, was set aside for the Annual Day of Prayer, and all branches are asked to observe this day either in their own parishes, or by co-operating with the Denominational Churches in their vicinity.

We cannot close this message without a word of appreciation for our Executive Secretary, Miss Lindley. One year of close contact and co-operation, with her, has made us value more highly than ever before.

Behind us lies a record of fifty-two (52) years of service. You will remember that our Lord's reward for faithful service, was the gift of larger service.

Looking forward to rendering better service than we have in the past, we face the possibilities before us, with eagerness, and joy.

We can wish each other, and all the members of the Auxiliary, no better thing than the happiness of serving our Lord, in this spirit, all through the year we are now entering.

REPORT OF SECRETARY FOR 1922

During the year 1922, the Secretary wrote 554 letters (326 in answer to ones received, and the remainder to notify branches, or officers of meetings), prepared, and had printed the Annual Report, mailed 375 pieces of literature (including copies of the Annual Report), made 2 reports to the Church Missions House (one Educational, and one General), attended the Summer Conference at Eagles Mere, conducting the Woman's Auxiliary sessions at that place, attended 5 Archdeaconry meetings, (visiting each Archdeaconry once, and one of them, twice) visited one parish branch, other than her own, sold 100 copies of the Church Missionary Calendar for 1923, prepared the ballots for the election at the Annual meeting, kept a record of that meeting, as well as the minutes of 4 Executive Board meetings, kept a record of the attendance at the Annual meeting, and answered many questions concerning the various kinds of work that pertains to the Auxiliary.



MINUTES OF THE EIGHTEENTH ANNUAL MEETING

The Eighteenth Annual Meeting of the Harrisburg Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council, was held in St. John's Church, York, Tuesday and Wednesday February 6th and 7th 1923.

The opening service was the Quiet Hour conducted by the Rev. Dr. Rogers of St. Matthew's Church, Sunbury, who gave the keynote to the session by telling of the beauty of Service, and by the way in which such service could be adequately given, namely by prayers for grace and strength.

Nearly one hundred attended this service.

At 8:00 P. M. the Mass meeting was held, with the Rev. Dr. Floyd Tomkins preaching the sermon. He told the delegates three things necessary to carry on the work of the Church. Faith, Courage, and Patience, and named three characters in Bible history as representing these three phases. Noah represented the strong faith, Daniel the courage, and Job the patience, which kept God in the minds and hearts of the people.

Bishop Darlington also had a message for the delegates, after which he bade them farewell before leaving for the Near East.

The Holy Communion was celebrated at 7:30 Wednesday morning by the Rev. Mr. Atkins, Rector of St. John's.

The business sessions began at 9:15 Wednesday morning, with the Vice-president, Mrs. Drinkwater, in the chair. Mr. Atkins had prayers, and a hymn was sung after which Mr. Atkins formally welcomed the delegates. After speaking of his pleasure in having such a meeting in his parish, he told of some of the historic meetings held there, and of the part played by the parish in the war for independence.

In replying, Mrs. Drinkwater called his attention to the fact that in St. John's parish, some of the history of his Diocesan Auxiliary was made. She emphasized that nearly all the growth of this Diocesan branch had its birth in this parish.

Owing to the absence of the President on account of illness, her Message was read by the Secretary. In this Message the President said that Service should be the keynote of all branches, and that the reward given by our Lord for faithful service, was the gift of more service.

Eighteen Parishes responded to the Roll Call, with 125 present of whom 86 registered.

The reports of the Treasurer, and United Thank Offering Custodian were read and accepted.

The Supply Department Secretary gave her report, which was accepted.

In the absence of the Church Periodical Club Librarian, Mrs. Wm. Rote of Lancaster read her report. In accepting this report the Auxiliary as a whole accepted the responsibility of seeing that our Diocese send to the National C. P. C. the sum of \$45.00 as our share of the sum needed for the purchase of books for the DuBose Memorial School, and the school in Mexico.

The Educational report was given by the Secretary.

In making her report, Mrs. Cowell, the Supply Department Secretary asked helpful suggestions for getting more Advent Box work done than is now being done. Mrs. Zeigler of Phillipsburg suggested that she apportion work to branches to do at their monthly meetings all the year round, which thought Mrs. Cowell decided to carry out.

The reports of the various committees were called for. Owing to the absence of the Chairman of two of the committees, the Treasurer gave the reports of the Chinese Student Fund, and also of the Christ School, Arden Fund. Miss Bonham presented the report of the Mt. Alto Committee, as Mrs. Darlington was unable to be present, and Mrs. Wirt gave the report of the Mary Smythe Memorial Fund.

These reports will be found printed on other pages of this Annual.

The Committees were discharged, with thanks for their services, after the reports were accepted.

Mrs. M. C. Adams, of Pittsburgh, President of the Auxiliary of the Province of Washington, was then introduced, and told what the work of the Woman's Auxiliary was. In part, she said that our work took in everything, and that the growth of the Auxiliary was due to the ready spirit of service shown by the women of the Church. She said that we should remember that as an Auxiliary to the National Council, we should actively function in all its fields of service, which are, Missions, Religious Education, Finance, Social Service, Field Department, Publicity, and among the Foreign Born.

The real job of the Auxiliary is to get other women to do things, to create enthusiasm.

Among the Special duties of the Auxiliary, she mentioned the United Thank Offering, and asked that we emphasize the "Thankful" part of that Offering. If all gifts are made in a spirit of thankfulness, it will not be necessary to set any definite goal of money to be gained, as money will come if the gifts are made in the right spirit.

After Mrs. Adams' talk the pledges were called for, and the report of the Nominating Committee was made. Owing to the fact that but 18 parish branches were represented at this meeting, a full report of the pledges cannot be made at this time.

Ballots for voting were distributed, and noon day prayers for Missions were said by the Rev. Mr. Atkins.

Lunch was served in the Parish House by the women of the Rector's Guild.

At this lunch short talks were given by two former Presidents of the Diocesan Branch: Mrs. James Bullitt, formerly of Harrisburg, but now of Princeton, and Mrs. Wirt of Bloomsburg.

Immediately after lunch, Mrs. Mary Steacy, Chairman of the Nominating Committee, reported the result of the election, which was as follows:

The Offering was taken during the singing of a hymn, after which the reports of the delegates to the Triennial were called for. But two reports were made, as Miss Hale was unable to be present, and failed to send her report. Mrs. Munson was also unable to be present, but her report was read by Mrs. C. N. Tyndell. This report told of the Missionary speakers at the Triennial and was very complete and splendidly read.

Mrs. Wirt reported the United Thank Offering meetings, and also gave the Resolutions made concerning the coming U. T. Offering.

These reports were accepted with sincere thanks to the delegates making them.

Since Miss Laura F. Boyer of the Church Missions House, could not be present, Mrs. Adams presented to the assembled delegates, an outline of the Educational work, telling of its value, its aim, and its need. She also briefly outlined the study book for this year, and suggested ways of using this book aside from a real study class.

After this conference conducted by Mrs. Adams, the reports of the four Archdeaconry Vice-presidents were given. All reported progress in all lines, and showed hopes for even greater advancement in 1923.

The Chairman of the Diocesan Church School Service League, being absent, no report of that work was given.

The report of the Resolution Committee was made by Mrs. Spotts who was Chairman. These Resolutions were acted upon separately, and all were passed. The last one was for the delegates to give a rising vote of thanks to the women of St. John's Church for their generous hospitality, which was done.

On motion, the meeting then adjourned to meet in February 1924 in a parish to be designated later.



REPORT OF THE VICE-PRESIDENT OF THE ALTOONA ARCHDEACONY

The Vice-president of the Altoona Archdeaconry respectfully submits the following report of work done in this Archdeaconry in 1922.

The Altoona Archdeaconry now has seven (7) active branches, with a Section "B" actively working in one parish. The Hollidaysburg branch has been re-organized, and a new branch has been formed in Juniata.

We held two meetings in 1922. One in the Spring in Philipsburg, which was attended by 87 visiting delegates, representing all the branches, several rectors, including one from the Williamsport Archdeaconry, and one Diocesan officer, from outside the Archdeaconry.

The principal speaker was the Rev. Mr. Maynard of Bellefonte, who had as his subject "Some Needs of the Church."

Mrs. Boyer, the Diocesan President, outlined the work for 1922, and other talks were given by those present.

Dinner was served at the Phillips House, and the meeting adjourned to meet in Altoona in the Fall.

At the Fall meeting, there were 85 delegates present including some from other Archdeaconries. Eight parishes were represented. After routine business, the Rev. Mr. Albion Ross gave an address using as his subject, "The Old Church and the New."

The Missionary address was given by Mr. Donma, a native Liberian who is a student at State College.

Mrs. Boyer, and Miss Hale gave most interesting accounts of the Triennial meeting at Portland, and the Diocesan Secretary conducted a Question Box.

The meeting adjourned to meet in Tyrone in May or June 1923. I wish to submit the following summary of the work done in this Archdeaconry in 1922.

Our U. T. O. increased over 100 per cent., being in 1922, \$404.84, as against \$202.27 in 1921. For the Triennial ending with 1922, it was \$744.61.

Fourteen (14) boxes were sent, with a total value of \$404.63, and \$10.00 in cash was sent to the Supply Department.

The offerings at the Archdeaconry meetings totalled \$102.05, which was used for special gifts to the St. Mary's House, in Japan, and also for helping Mr. Donma at State College.

Four Study Classes, and one Men's Bible Class were held in this Archdeaconry.

Seven (7) were present at the Summer Conference at Eagles Mere, and four (4) at the Triennial at Portland.

Most of the branches materially increased their membership this last year; Huntingdon branch increased its pledges, both in number, and amount pledged to each. Altoona and Philipsburg branches have increased their pledge to the Diocesan Expense Fund, and authorized their delegates to meet all pledges asked for.

I cannot urge too strongly, attendance at the Spring and Fall meetings as it is at these meetings, that you get the inspiration necessary to put life and pep into your branches, and your work.

This report cannot, because of its brevity, show you the deep interest and missionary spirit manifested by the women in this Archdeaconry. It is my hope, and prayer that we may continue to increase our interest, our membership, and our missionary zeal in 1923.

REPORT OF THE VICE-PRESIDENT OF THE HARRISBURG ARCHDEACONY

The Vice-President of the Harrisburg Archdeaconry respectfully submits the following report for the year ending January 31, 1923.

All branches have reported and the work being done is most encouraging. The increased attendance at the yearly and semi-annual meetings show a greater interest in Mission work throughout the Archdeaconry.

Miss Rose and Miss Watts have been most helpful in furthering the number of study classes and organizing Auxiliary Branches. We now have 21 branches and we hope to organize nine more in the near future. In this work I have found the smaller parishes and missions very alert, and anxious and willing to do their part for Missions and all the name implies. They need our help, and advice and our presence to encourage them and show what they can do to further stimulate their efforts in their work for Missions. It is urged that members having cars, go often to these smaller parishes and missions—on Sundays—and become interested enough to encourage these small groups of women in their work, by our presence and helpful advice.

Here is where the Church League of the Isolated, whose object is to keep church people living in communities without church privileges loyal to their church. In this way, some day they form the nucleus through which our new Mission stations must be founded.

Twenty-two parishes sent for the U. T. O.—1922—\$863.53. Last year the offering was \$442.95, making it almost double this year.

The Triennial (Peace) Offering this year for 1920-21-22 at Portland was \$1868.33; a gain of \$552 over the offering of 1919.

From our Archdeaconry there are 2 workers in China; 2 workers in Japan; 2 workers in Liberia and 1 worker in Cumberland Mountains of Virginia.

There were five at the Summer Conference at Eagles Mere.

Boxes were sent, the total value of which was \$1356.38, a slight decrease compared with \$1401.30 of 1921.

The amount of money sent from this Archdeaconry was \$1036.84.

Two meetings were held, one at St. Paul's, Harrisburg, at which 9 branches were represented, 65 delegates and additional members present.

Mrs. Bates, Ed. Sec. of Bethlehem, spoke as well as Father Thaw, Rev. Mr. Fercken, Bishop Darlington, Mrs. Boyer, Mrs. E. Fahs Smith and Mrs. A. Wilson Norris.

At Trinity, Chambersburg, we had the pleasure of having three Diocesan officers present. The President, Mrs. Boyer, Secretary, Mrs. Van Horne, Treasurer, Miss Silliman and Ex-President, Mrs. Wirt, who gave interesting practical talks, and also on the Portland Convention.

At this meeting 14 parishes were represented by 69 women, four clergymen and the Bishop. Mrs. Persons, of Yancy, Va., gave a fine account of the work done in the Cumberland Mountain Settlement Schools. This Archdeaconry is particularly interested as Miss Harriet MacMillan, of Carlisle, is doing missionary work in these Mountains.

Our Archdeacon tells me the women of his Archdeaconry should be commended because they always come to his aid in every emergency

and give to his needs, frequently, liberally and punctually. There is much to do in our work for Missions. Let us make this year a splendid one, through more earnest efforts, many sacrifices and better work.

Let all who possibly can, go to Eaglesmere and enjoy the Conference and learn how to make good use of their lives in the great cause of Missions. It will be a week well spent. It is hoped at least one from every parish will be present this coming July.

REPORT OF THE VICE-PRESIDENT OF THE NORTHERN ARCHDEACONY

The Vice President of the Northern Archdeaconry, respectfully submits the following report.

To the three branches that have been organized a number of years (Coudersport, Wellsboro, and Tioga) have been added, in the fall of 1922, a branch in every parish in this Archdeaconry, save one.

The new ones being, Galeton, (including Brookland), Westfield, (which includes Knoxville), Lawrenceville, Antrim, Arnot, and Blossburg.

During the Bishop's visitation to the Northern Archdeaconry in May, it was my privilege to accompany him in company with the Archdeacon, Mr. Post, and others of the clergy. I was, however unable to attend the meeting at Mansfield, and the Bishop, in his press of other matters, neglected to speak of the Auxiliary to the women there.

We hope, however, to form a branch in that parish this year, and that will mean 100 per cent. for this Archdeaconry.

The interest in the work is steadily increasing, and while not as much work has been done as might be expected, still it has advanced over previous years.

Boxes were sent from Coudersport, Wellsboro, Galeton, Tioga and Lawrenceville, to the value of \$144.22. In 1921 it was \$64.70.

The U. T. O. from 2 branches in 1921 was \$64.43, while in 1922 it was \$91.36 from 7 branches. Our Triennial in 1919 was \$147.32, and in 1922 it was \$223.61.

Study classes were held in Wellsboro and Coudersport.

On June 27th, 1922, an Archdeaconry Auxiliary meeting was held in Wellsboro, with all the new branches represented. There were also present the Archdeacon, Mr. Post of Coudersport, The Rev. Mr. Ljungren, The Rev. Mr. John Oliphant and three Diocesan officers, Mrs. Drinkwater, Miss Bubb and Mrs. Van Horne.

At this meeting the principal speaker was Mr. K. Donma a native Liberian who is a student at State College, who gave a wonderful talk of his home, and the customs there.

Lunch was served by the Ladies of St. Paul's parish. At this meeting much interest was shown in the work, and all felt that it was good to have been there.

The next meeting will be held next June, at Brookland, and all are invited to attend.

May the Northern Archdeaconry, in this coming year, do much work for Christ and His Church.

REPORT OF THE VICE-PRESIDENT OF THE WILLIAMSPORT ARCHDEACONY

The Vice President of the Williamsport Archdeaconry respectfully submits the following report for the current year ending December 31st, 1922.

The work accomplished has been most encouraging in all departments.

Boxes have been sent from thirteen (13) branches valued at \$2366.82. The total value in 1921 was \$1899.49 showing a gain of \$467.33.

Eleven Parishes and Missions have contributed \$1198.96 towards the United Thank Offering. The amount in 1921 was \$1010.35 showing an increase of \$188.60.

The Triennial Offering in 1922 was \$3010.22 which is half the whole amount given by the Diocese.

The Triennial Offering in 1919 was \$1831.29 showing a gain of \$1178.93.

Three persons attended the Summer School at Geneva, and, at least twenty the Summer Conference at Eagles Mere. There were seven Study Classes, three (3) Program meetings and three (3) Bible Classes for men.

A very successful Spring Meeting of the Archdeaconry Auxiliary was held in St. John's Church, South Williamsport, May 18th. There were Fifty-five (55) delegates and five (5) Priests present. The information gained regarding our work from the various speakers was most beneficial.

The sermon preached by the Rev. Malcolm DePui Maynard of Bellefonte, and the "Half Hour Devotion" conducted by Dr. B. Talbot Rogers of Sunbury, were of great Spiritual help to all and I feel, by thus laying stress upon the devotional side of the Woman's Auxiliary, we are developing all our activities along the right lines. Worship and Prayers to God first, then work and gifts for His dear sake.

The Fall meeting of the Auxiliary was held November 16th, in St. Matthew's Church, Sunbury. Ten parishes responded to roll call.

Eighty-Four (84) delegates, including Deaconess Christman, and Five (5) Priests were in attendance.

We had the honor of Bishop Darlington's presence. He addressed the meeting at the close of the celebration of the Holy Eucharist which was conducted by the Ven. R. R. Morgan, A. D. of this Archdeaconry, assisted by the Rector Rev. B. Talbot Rogers. The Bishop, in his address told us of the great need of women's support in every parish concerning missions.

The speakers of the day included Mrs. C. H. Boyer, Diocesan Pres., Mrs. J. K. Miller, Educational Secretary, Mrs. A. M. Drinkwater, Vice Pres. at large, Mrs. Charles Clement, and Mrs. Paul E. Wirt. The programme of the day was concluded in the Church where the Rev. Charles Everett McCoy conducted a "Quiet Hour." No one could have attended this service without gaining strength and inspiration. It was truly a fitting end to a perfect and wonderful day.

I attended and addressed a meeting at Coles Creek. Nineteen (19) members of the Auxiliary were present and at this time the Parish House was dedicated. It is indeed a great credit to this Mission and will fill a long felt want.

It is with great regret I am not able to report any new branches in this Archdeaconry. But two Guilds are doing some Auxiliary work and I hope soon they will organize branches.

May God bless and answer our prayers, prosper our work, and increase our gifts, in this New Year of endeavor, for Him, His Church, and the spread of His kingdom.

EDUCATIONAL REPORT FOR YEAR 1922

There have been held, in the four Archdeaconries of the Diocese of Harrisburg in 1922, 34 Discussions and Reading Groups, meeting weekly during Lent and using these subjects: "How Can We Know the Way," "Alaskan Missions," "The Survey," and the Old Testament.

There have been monthly Program Meetings in 3 parishes.

Men's Bible Classes in 4 parishes, and Illustrated Lecture in 1 parish. These reports are from 3 parishes in the Altoona Archdeaconry, 2 parishes in the Northern Archdeaconry, 4 parishes in the Harrisburg Archdeaconry, and 7 parishes of the Williamsport Archdeaconry.

The Study Book for 1923 is "Wanted—Leaders," a study in the negro development, by Bishop Bratton, of Mississippi. This book should be used only by groups that have met for study other years.

The book that is recommended for Groups just beginning this work is "The Program Presented" prepared by the National Council.

Since it is almost impossible for our Diocese to have one Diocesan Educational Secretary, there has been appointed in each Archdeaconry, one Educational Secretary, who will look after the work in her own section.

It is the aim of these Educational Secretaries to have at least one phase of Educational work done in each parish. If you cannot have group meetings, during Lent, with a leader to discuss with you one of the books mentioned, have, at least, monthly Program meetings, and report to your Archdeaconry Educational Secretary, all the Educational work you have done this year.

REPORT OF SUPPLY DEPARTMENT SECRETARY, 1922



I am very much pleased with the progress made by the branches of the Auxiliary this last year.

Several new branches have been organized, two or three other societies have been formed, that are doing good work for the Supply Department. We hope they will soon become regularly organized branches of the Auxiliary.

Yet with this new help, we have fallen a little behind of our work of 1921.

Some of the branches have thought it necessary to give up their Advent work, feeling that they must work for bazaars in their own parishes.

The Advent work is for the missionaries in our own Diocese, and they do need warm clothing, at this time of year. What will we do about this Advent work?

REPORT OF THE CHURCH PERIODICAL CLUB

PRAYER

O Lord Jesus Christ, who art the Light of the World, pour out, we beseech Thee upon all Thy servants, Thy Holy Spirit of Wisdom and Understanding, that they may know the hope of Thy calling, the riches of Thy inheritance in the saints, and the greatness of Thy power to us who believe. More especially we pray Thee to direct and prosper the Church Periodical Club, that in all its prayers and labor, it may be enabled to make the light of Thy glory shine forth in the dark places of earth. And do Thou of Thy mercy, and grace establish Thy Church in the truth of Thy Gospel, who livest and reignest with the Father and Holy Spirit, ever One God, world without end. Amen.

The fund to provide an adequate library for St. Paul's College, now St. Paul's University, Tokyo, Japan, has been completed and more.

The amount required was \$15,000.00 but that limit has been passed by \$2000.00. The total of \$17,847.00 has been secured within two years. The completion of this fund means the fulfilment of the last requirement necessary to university rank for St. Paul's.

In the financial statement of August, 1922, sent out by the New York office of the Church Periodical Club, the Diocese of Harrisburg is credited with contributing \$134.45 to the fund—\$5.00 was contributed by one librarian after August—the date set for the completion of the fund. Our Diocese ranked 29th in the list of 75 contributing Dioceses. A rather creditable position when we consider some dioceses have over one hundred Church Periodical Club branches while the Diocese of Harrisburg has but fifteen, some of which are quite inactive. We practically went beyond the quota set for us.

It was recommended at the Convention at Portland, Ore., that the policy of providing new books for schools and college libraries be continued and extended, and that the aim should be \$5000.00 worth of such books every year for the next three years. For example: A Diocese with 15 branches would secure books to the value of \$45.00. These, it is suggested, be divided equally between the school in Mexico and the Du-Bose memorial Training School at Mont Eagle, Tenn.

A check of \$5.00 and \$2.00 in cash have been forwarded to the Executive Secretary and credited to the above Diocesan objective. A portion of the balance on hand of \$12.92 will more than likely be used for the same objective.

Our new efforts must not supersede or interfere with our old and tried activities. We must continue our regular sending of magazines. This year 75 magazines have been reported by the librarians as being sent regularly. One librarian reports having secured a two years' cash subscription for the Atlantic Monthly sent to Tennessee. This method is worthy of imitation as paid subscriptions always ensure a regular sending of the magazine from the publishing office.

The Church Periodical Club offers an opportunity to serve in all departments of the Church's work. The simple service of sending a book a magazine or a post card has its place in the development of the Kingdom. Does this suggest that opportunities for service are hidden away in your book shelves or thrown away in your waste basket? Why not send to your Church Periodical Club officer for the C. P. C's. "Program of Service in Christian Social Service," "In Missions and Church Extension," "In Religious Education" and discover that you can serve in the five fields of service by serving the Church Periodical Club?

UNITED THANK OFFERING REPORT



The records show the Harrisburg Diocese contributed \$3,873.64 United Thank Offering at the Triennial Convention in 1919. During 1920 1921 and 1922 this amount was increased 55 per cent., the offering presented at Portland, Oregon, this last October being \$6,000.

Of this \$6,000, the Altoona Archdeaconry contributed \$744.61; the Harrisburg Archdeaconry \$1,868.33; the Northern Archdeaconry, \$223.61 and the Williamsport Archdeaconry \$3,010.22, the remainder being made up by the interest item of \$153.23 for the time the various amounts were on deposit.

For the 1919 Triennial six branches of the Altoona Archdeaconry contributed \$358.96. In 1922 the same number of branches contributed \$744.61, showing a gain in the three years of a little more than 100%. This Archdeaconry in 1922 doubled their offering of 1921, contributing \$202.27 in 1921 and \$404.84 in 1922.

Sixteen branches of the Harrisburg Archdeaconry contributed to the 1919 Triennial \$1,316.43. In 1922 the number of branches contributing had increased to twenty-one and the offering to \$1,868.33, showing an increase in the three years of almost 42 per cent. In 1922 this Archdeaconry almost doubled their offering of 1921, contributing \$442.95 in 1921 and \$863.53 in 1922.

In the Northern Archdeaconry, three branches contributed to the 1919 Triennial \$147.32. In 1922 the number of branches increased to seven and the offering of \$223.61, or a gain of 50 per cent. in the three years. In 1921 this Archdeaconry contributed \$64.43 and in 1922 \$91.36, a very substantial increase considering that the new branches had been but very recently organized and just started the United Thank Offering work.

Seventeen branches of the Williamsport Archdeaconry contributed to the 1919 Triennial \$1,831.29. In 1922 the same number of branches contributed \$3,010.22, being a gain of 64 per cent. in the three year. In 1921 this Archdeaconry contributed \$1,010.36 while their offering for 1922 was \$1,198.96. While this Archdeaconry's increase of 1922 over 1921 is not very marked, it will be noticed they contributed a trifle more than one half of the full amount of the offering of the Diocese to the 1922 Triennial.

During the past year, I have sent to the various branches, more than 1,000 of the Little Blue Boxes, most of them being requested. The past month I had five requests for Boxes, four of them coming from branches just beginning to take up the work. All this indicates the increased interest and activity in this good work and is the best evidence that you are going to meet the goal of \$10,000, set for the Triennial in 1925. You went over the top of the goal set for 1922 Triennial and with every woman in the church doing her bit in the next three years, you will do the same in 1925.

UNITED THANK OFFERING RESOLUTIONS FOR 1923-25

Resolved: That the United Thank Offering of 1925 be given to the National Council for the work of women in the mission field whose appointment has been approved by the Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary, including the training, sending, and support of women workers and the care of such workers when sick and disabled; provided, that one-tenth of the Offering be set aside and added to the permanent trust fund to be invested and administered by the National Council, the income to be applied to the support of retired United Thank Offering workers. Also provided that the sum of not less than \$25,000 be devoted to the erection completion or renewal of buildings approved by the National Council on the recommendation of the Executive Secretary of the Department of Missions, and the Executive Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Resolved: That to our united gifts shall be added our united and earnest prayers that God will put it into the hearts of many faithful women to give themselves, or of their substance, to the work of the Master in the Mission Field.

Resolved: That the box in which the United Thank Offering of the women of the Church, is gathered, be called and spoken of as "The Little Blue Box;" that this title be changed in literature, plays etc., which now mention it as a "Mite Box."

Resolved: That instructions on "The Little Blue Box," regarding the opening of the boxes be changed to read as follows: "This box should be opened each Spring and Fall and the contents sent, through the Parish Custodian, or Treasurer, to the Diocesan Officer for the United Thank Offering.

CONSTITUTION OF THE HARRISBURG DIOCESAN
BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY
TO THE NATIONAL COUNCIL
OF THE
PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH OF AMERICA

* * *

ARTICLE I

NAME

The name of this Association is the Harrisburg Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church of America.

ARTICLE II

OBJECT

The object of this Association is to carry out in the Diocese of Harrisburg, by united and systematic effort, the three great aims of the Woman's Auxiliary, viz: Daily Prayer for Missions, the Study of Missions, and Systematic Giving for Missions.

ARTICLE III

MEMBERSHIP

Every baptized woman in the Church is eligible to membership in the Parish Auxiliary, and all the Auxiliaries in the Diocese are members of this Association.

ARTICLE IV

OFFICERS

The elective officers of this association shall consist of a President, a Vice President-at-Large, a Vice President of each Archdeaconry, a Treasurer, a United Thank Offering Custodian, a Recording Secretary, and Corresponding Secretary. These officers, with the Chairman and Secretary of the Church Service League, and the Chairman of the Church School Service League and the appointed officers (as Supply Department Secretary, Assistant to Recording Secretary and Educational Secretary) shall form the Executive Board.

ARTICLE V

DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The President shall be elected at a yearly meeting for a term of three years and may not succeed herself. It shall be the duty of the President to call meetings of the Association and the Executive Board, and preside at them. She shall also exercise a general supervision of all the work in the diocese and make a yearly report to the Association.

Section 2. The Vice President-at-Large shall be elected yearly and perform the duties of the President when she is unable to do so.

Section 3. Each Archdeaconry shall as soon as possible after the election of the President, elect from the three women in each Archdeaconry, previously nominated by the Bishop, a Vice President to serve three years.

Section 4. The Vice President of each Archdeaconry shall co-operate with the President in promoting local intelligence and interest, and in directing and organizing work in her own Archdeaconry.

Section 5. The Recording and Corresponding Secretary shall keep the minutes of the yearly meeting and the meetings of the Executive Board, conduct all necessary correspondence, have charge of the writing, printing and sending out of reports and other documents, and make the yearly report.

Section 6. The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all moneys for the expense fund of the Association. Also receive and transmit to the Missionary Treasurers such other moneys sent to her and make a yearly report.

Section 7. The United Thank Offering Custodian shall receive, hold, and transmit all United Thank Offering moneys, and make a yearly report.

Section 8. The Educational Secretary shall have general supervision of all the Missionary Educational Work carried on under the auspices of the Woman's Auxiliary.

ARTICLE VI

MEETINGS

There shall be one general meeting of this Association in each year and other meetings may be called by the Executive Board.

ARTICLE VII

AMENDMENTS

This Constitution and By-Laws may be altered or amended by a two-thirds vote of the whole number of delegates present at a yearly meeting.

BY-LAWS

Section 1. A Nominating Committee consisting of one member from each Archdeaconry, shall be appointed by the President one month before the annual meeting.


Section 2. Elections shall be by ballot, and each branch shall be entitled to two votes, and an additional vote for each ten members or fraction thereof. These votes shall be cast by properly accredited delegates or their alternates.

Section 3. Delegates to the Triennial meeting of the General Auxiliary shall be the President and four from the membership of the Auxiliary and five alternates from the membership of the Auxiliary, to be elected by ballot.

Section 4. There shall be three delegates to the Provincial meeting who shall be the President Ex-Officio, and two from the membership, to be chosen by ballot.

Section 5. An expense fund shall be provided by this Association for the necessary expenses, namely printing, postage, stationery, traveling expenses of speakers and officers, etc., to be arranged at the discretion of the Executive Board.

Rule 1. 10% of the total amount pledged for the Expense Fund, be set aside for a Sinking Fund to be used at the direction of the Executive Board for all emergencies.
