CONSTITUTION OF THE HARRISBURG DIOCESAN
BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY
TO THE NATIONAL COUNCIL
OF THE
PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH OF AMERICA



ARTICLE I
NAME

The name of the Association is the Harrisburg Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church of America.

ARTICLE II
OBJECT

The object of this Association is to carry out in the Diocese of Harrisburg, by united and systematic effort, the three great aims of the Woman's Auxiliary, viz. Daily Prayer for Missions, the Study of Missions, and Systematic Giving for Missions.

ARTICLE III
MEMBERSHIP

Every baptized woman in the Church is eligible to membership in the Parish Auxiliary, and all the Auxiliaries in the Diocese are members of this Association.

ARTICLE IV
OFFICERS

The elective officers of this association shall consist of a President, a Vice President-at-large, a Vice President of each Archdeaconry, a Treasurer, a United Thank Offering Custodian, a Recording Secretary, and a Corresponding Secretary. These Officers, with the Chairman and Secretary of the Church Service League, and the Chairman of the Church School Service League and the appointed officers (as Supply Department Secretary, Assistant to Recording Secretary and Educational Secretary) shall form the Executive Board.

ARTICLE V
DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The President shall be elected at a yearly meeting for a term of three years and may not succeed herself. It shall be the duty of the President to call meetings of the Association and the Executive Board, and preside at them. She shall also exercise a general supervision of all the work in the diocese and make a yearly report to the Association.

Section 2. The Vice President-at-Large shall be elected yearly and perform the duties of the President when she is unable to do so.

Section 3. Each Archdeaconry shall as soon as possible after the election of the President, elect from the three women in each Arch-

deaconry, previously nominated by the Bishop, a Vice President to serve three years.

Section 4. The Vice President of each Archdeaconry shall co-operate with the President in promoting local intelligence and interest, and in directing and organizing work in her own Archdeaconry.

Section 5. The Recording and Corresponding Secretary shall keep the minutes of the yearly meeting and the meetings of the Executive Board, conduct all necessary correspondence, having charge of the writing, printing and sending out of reports and other documents, and make the yearly report.

Section 6. The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all moneys for the expense fund of the Association. Also receive and transmit to the Missionary Treasurers such other moneys sent to her and make a yearly report.

Section 7. The United Thank Offering Custodian shall receive, hold, and transmit all United Thank Offering moneys, and make a yearly report.

Section 8. The Educational Secretary shall have general supervision of all the Missionary Educational Work carried on under the auspices of the Woman's Auxiliary.

ARTICLE VI MEETINGS

There shall be one general meeting of this Association in each year and other meetings may be called by the Executive Board.

ARTICLE VII AMENDMENTS

This Constitution and By-Laws may be altered or amended by a two-third vote of the whole number of delegates present at a yearly meeting.

BY-LAWS

Section 1. A Nominating Committee consisting of one member from each Archdeaconry, shall be appointed by the President one month before the annual meeting.

Section 2. Elections shall be by ballots, and each branch shall be entitled to two votes, and an additional vote for each ten members or fraction thereof. These votes shall be cast by properly accredited delegates or their alternates.

Section 3. Delegates to the Triennial meeting of the General Auxiliary shall be the President and four from the membership of the Auxiliary and five alternates from the membership of the Auxiliary, to be elected by ballot.

Section 4. There shall be three delegates to the Provincial meeting who shall be the President Ex-Officio, and two from the membership, to be chosen by ballot.

Section 5. An expense fund shall be provided by this Association for the necessary expenses, namely: printing, postage, stationery, traveling expenses of speakers and officers, etc., to be arranged at the discretion of the Executive Board.

Rule 1. 10% of the total amount pledged for the Expense Fund, be set aside for a Sinking Fund to be used at the direction of the Executive Board for all emergencies.

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PRAYERS TO BE USED BY THE WOMEN OF THIS DIOCESE.

O Lord our Heavenly Father, we pray Thee to send forth more laborers into Thy harvest, and to grant them Thy special grace for every need. Guard and Guide the workers in the field, and draw us into closer fellowship with them. Dispose the hearts of all women everywhere, to give gladly, as Thou hast prospered them. Accept from grateful hearts, Our United Thank Offering of prayer, and gifts, and joyful service; and bless it to the coming of Thy Kingdom, through Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen.

PRAYER OF BISHOP DARLINGTON

Almighty God, our Heavenly Father, help the members of the Woman's Auxiliary not only to worship Thee in Church Service, but to also obey Thee by world wide service to our fellow men and women. We beseech Thee to enlarge our number in each parish, and increase our zeal throughout the Diocese, and the whole Church, that each year may see better and wiser plans devised and sustained, to Thy honor and glory; through Jesus Christ, our Lord. SECRETARY'S REPORT

During the year of 1923, the Secretary wrote 512 letters, mailed 253 pieces of literature, sold 112 copies of the Church Missionary Calendar, sent 2 reports to the Church Mission House, prepared the Annual Report, attended 5 meetings in 3 of the Archdeaconries, speaking or leading educational conferences at all of them, visited 4 parish branches other than her own, prepared the ballots for the Annual election, kept the Minutes of the Annual meeting, and also those of 3 Executive Board meetings, edited the Woman's Work page of the Harrisburg Churchman each month, and attended the meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Third Province at Washington in November.

NOTICES

Remember to collect and send in your United Thank Offering, to the Diocesan U. T. O. Custodian, twice each year.

Also remember that her books close the 31st day of December each year, and any money to be credited for the current year must be in her hands before that date.

Remember to send all other moneys (pledges, self-denial week offerings, etc.) to the Diocesan Treasurer. Send in your Expense Fund Pledge as early as possible, and make that pledge as large as possible. The Treasurer's books also close December 31st.

Remember that our pledges for this year are: For the Expense Fund of the Diocesan Auxiliary; For the Chinese Divinity Fund (this Fund is now completed for this year); For the Mont Alto Fund (this Fund is also completed for this year.) For the Bishop Tuttle Memorial Fund (formerly known as the Fund for the Houses for Church Women Workers on Furlough or in Training.) This Fund needs much more than is now pledged so we hope all Branches will make a special effort to give to this. The last pledge is called the Field Work Quota Fund, and is a fund to help this Diocese over pay its Quota to the National Church. All given to this pledge will be counted on your parish Quotas.

Send in your Expense Fund pledge as early as possible, and try and pay all pledges before June, or not later than September 30th.

The Annual Self-denial week Offering, which is presented at our Corporate Communion on St. Michael and All Angels Day, is to be used for the First Priority, the Church Building at State College, except what may be necessary to add to Bishop Tuttle Memorial Fund, if that does not reach the amount that our Diocesan Branch should give this year.

Please remember these pledges and bring them before your parish branches.

Remember to carry with you, and use this copy of the Annual Report, giving to your members, the information contained in it.

Remember our Missionaries, especially those who have gone out from this Diocese, pray for them, and write to them.

Consult with the Diocesan Supply Secretary about your boxes, and report all boxes sent by your branch, to her.

Co-operate with your Archdeaconry Vice-president, by sending to her reports of the work you do, at least twice each year.

Report to the Diocesan Secretary but once each year; when she sends out the blanks for you to fill and return. Do that promptly.

That a rising vote of thanks be given by the delegates assembled, to the women of St. Matthew's for their generous hospitality, and their courtesy at the time of this meeting.



PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE 1923

In submitting this message for 1924, I wish to express my deep appreciation for the close co-operation, and efficient work of all the departments of the Auxiliary, and the faith shown through this work, by which the Mission of the whole Church has been strengthened, and blessed.

The reports that follow, will present, in detail, the activities of the Harrisburg Branch of the Auxiliary for 1923, and to each and every one of the faithful officers, and members of the committee we express our most grateful appreciation for the work accomplished in the past year.

This year has been one of great encouragement, increased enthusiasm, and increased devotion, to the great cause of Missions.

During the year several new parish branches have been formed, and in other parishes, guilds, and Church Service Leagues, have taken over parts of the work of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Our hope, and aim, is, to see a branch organized in each parish and mission in the Diocese.

The plan for establishing a Sinking Fund, for emergencies, is working fairly well, and no doubt, when parish branches fully realize all that it means, they will gladly give it their hearty endorsement.

It is our special duty and pleasure, to inform you that the women of the Diocese responded, in the most whole soul manner, to the Annual Self-denial week offering, presented on St. Michael and All Angels Day, and now we can repay Deaconess Newbold the money she advanced for the completion of St. Mary's House, Aomori, Japan.

We would like to see more Auxiliary women at our Summer Conference at Eagles Mere. We know that this Conference would benefit all who attend, and urge that each branch send one more woman this coming summer.

Our pledges will be for the Expense Fund of the Diocesan Auxiliary, for the Chinese Divinity Student Fund, for Mont Alto, for the Bishop Tuttle Memorial Fund (formerly known as the Woman's Auxiliary Special for Houses for Church Women Workers), and Field Work Quota.

We should always remember that our work is laid out by the National and Diocesan authorities, and we have an obligation to fulfill, and therefore we should not make our gifts through sentiment, or without first doing our duty as outlined.

We also ask you to remember that our year is from January First to December thirty-first. Have your parish officers send in all money, boxes, and reports of boxes, before the last day of the year. The Diocesan Treasurer, and United Thank Offering Custodian must close their books on December Thirty-First.

Send reports to the Diocesan Secretary (on the blanks she sends you) as early as possible, so that her work may be more rapidly completed.

We wish to call your attention to the lack of interest in the work of the Church Periodical Club, and also the Church School Service League.

Let us try and do our part in all phases of the work of the Church.

It is most gratifying to know of the ready response of the Church to Japan's great need. The Emergency Fund was more than raised, and the good news cabled to Japan in time to be announced at the consecration of Bishop Motoda.

Plans for the raising of a Re-construction Fund, will be announced later, and we are sure that members of the Auxiliary, will do their part in this work.

The 1925 Triennial seems far in the future, but it is none to soon to begin making plans for those meetings. One thing in particular, we wish to bring before you, is, that at least one representative from this Diocesan Branch of Auxiliary, be a young woman. It is vitally important that Woman's Auxiliary interest more young women in its work, and we urge a closer co-operation with the work of the young women of the Diocese.

In doing this, we follow the suggestion made by the National Council, that each Diocesan Branch of the Auxiliary be represented at the Triennial in 1925, by five women, one of whom, is a young woman.

The young woman of to-day, with her ability, enthusiasm, tact, would do much for the spread of the Kingdom, if she could get the inspiration that comes from a great Triennial meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary.

The day of prayer for Missions has been set for the First Friday in Lent, March 7th, 1924. The subject for special consideration is "The Spirit of Power".

We hope that every parish will keep the Day of Prayer, and where it is possible, that women from our Church will meet with women of the other communions, for special prayer sessions.

Miss Lindley, our National Auxiliary Secretary, is now on a trip to Mission Stations in the East. Her last words, before her departure, were, "I hope that the Auxiliary will have the best year in its history."

One way in which we can show our gratitude for her splendid leadership, is to do our utmost, to bring into realization, this hope so fervently expressed.

MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING HELD
FEBRUARY 5 AND 6, 1924

The 19th Annual Meeting of the Harrisburg Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council, was opened Tuesday, February 5th at 4:15 P. M. in St. Matthew's, Sunbury, with a Quiet Hour, conducted by the Rev. Mr. Hiram Bennett, of Christ Church Williamsport. Mr. Bennett used as his theme, the parable of the laborers in the vineyard, following the story as told in the 20th chapter of the Gospel of Saint Matthew, and said, by way of introduction, that all the parables of Jesus, had to do with the Kingdom of God, and that this parable had reference to the character and condition of the call and the kind of citizens there were in the kingdom. The early part of this parable shows clearly, that it is the Householder, Himself, who calls, but it is the steward who makes arrangements as to the pay.

God's calls to us are personal. In this parable, the laborers were called on four different occasions, which seem to indicate that in one's life there may be four different times for calling one. In the early morning, or the message of infant baptism. This is the call to humility which is the absolute foundation for all Christian work. By baptism we are dedicated in the very beginning of our lives.

The second call is the call of Confirmation, by our memory of that gift of the Holy Ghost at Pentecost.

The third call comes in middle life, while we are in the midst of trials and temptations. He calls us then, to give Him, the best we have. He calls each woman to link herself with the work of carrying out the Mission of the Church.

The last call comes at the eleventh hour, from the throne of Heaven. It is pathos to think of all the years wasted, but beautiful to know that, even in old age the call is heard. He calls us in all sorts and conditions of life. In the midst of our sins, and in the purity of infancy. It is not a question of time, but of energy, and work done, and humility of spirit.

After Mr. Bennett finished his talk, Bishop Talbot pronounced the benediction.

Directly after this service, the Resolution Committee met and organized.

Delegates were urged to register at the proper places.

The Mass meeting was held in St. Matthew's at 8 o'clock. Dr. Rogers welcomed the delegates, by referring to the fact that he, as a small boy in the early 80's remembered of Miss Emery, coming out to Wisconsin, to tell of the work of the Woman's Auxiliary, and so he felt that all his life had been connected with that work, and he had always been interested in it.

Bishop Darlington was the first speaker. He used as his text, the parable of the sower, and said that this parable could be read in the most encouraging or the most discouraging way, and in like manner, we can look upon the missionary cause, as either most encouraging or most discouraging.

No matter in which way we look upon it, we should sow plentifully, and not feel sad if we think some seed is wasted, but rather, rejoice over what bears fruit. If we sow plentifully, more will bear fruit, and while we may not see the harvest, yet the harvest will surely come, and will benefit some one. Bishop Darlington's talk was very good, and most apropos.

Bishop Talbot told of some of his experiences as Bishop in the West. He expressed his pleasure in being with some of his former people, at this time and said that now both the Diocese of Harrisburg, and the Diocese of Bethlehem had nearly double the number of clergy that the old Diocese of central Pennsylvania, had; this indicating large growth on the part of both Dioceses. He also said that nearly all the clergy in the Diocese of Bethlehem had been ordained by himself, so that he felt that he had been training men of his own Diocese for the ministry.

The music at this service was especially good, and there were over four hundred in attendance.

At the early celebration, Wednesday, the Rev. Dr. Rogers was the celebrant assisted by the Rev. Mr. Bennett, of Williamsport. There were about sixty communicants at this service.

The business session opened at 9:30 with a hymn, followed by prayer by Dr. Rogers.

Dr. Rogers again expressed his pleasure in having so many women come to his parish, and Mrs. Vance, the Vice-president of the Saint Matthew's branch welcomed the delegates in the most cordial manner, Mrs. Boyer responded to the welcome, and then read her Annual message. This message will be found printed in full on another page of this report.

A motion was made at this time, that the Resolution Committee prepare a Resolution of loving sympathy for those who were absent because of illness either of themselves, or of members of their families, namely: Mrs. Drinkwater, Miss Silliman, Miss Batzle, Deaconess Ransome and Mrs. Munson.

It was also moved and carried that a Resolution testifying to the loving regard in which they are held, be sent to our former Diocesan Presidents, Mrs. J. W. B. Bausman, Mrs. J. E. Bullet, and Mrs. Paul E. Wirt.

The reports of the Treasurer, and U. T. O. Custodian were read and accepted. The Treasurer's report being read by Mrs. A. H. Ross, in the absence of the Treasurer.

The U. T. O. Custodian reported that the Offering did not quite come up to the goal set by her for 1923, nor was it quite as large as the Offering for 1922.

The C. P. C. Librarian reported that the activities of the Harrisburg Branch exceeded those for 1922. She also emphasized the fact that our Diocese was responsible for \$48.00 for the purchasing of books for libraries in certain schools, and that one place where they were most needed, was the DuBose Memorial Library at Mont Eagle, Tenn., which was totally destroyed by fire early in January. These books (text books, etc.) should be in the hands of the Faculty, by March 20th. in order that they may re-open the school with some equipment.

In asking for a motion concerning the acceptance of this report, the President made clear that in accepting it, we also accepted the responsibility connected with it. A motion was made, seconded and carried that the report and the responsibility connected with it be accepted.

The report of the Supply Department Secretary, the Altar Supply Secretary and the Prayer Partnership Plan Chairman were read and accepted.

The President commented on the failure of many branches to co-operate with the Prayer Partnership Plan, although it carried with it, no arduous work, merely asking that each Branch co-operate with the work of some special missionary, by praying for her and her work. She expressed a hope that 1924 would find every branch sharing in this plan.

The report of the Mont Alto Fund was read by Mrs. Darlington, after which the President asked Bishop Darlington to explain the new status of the work there, which he did, and said that this year he felt that the Woman's Auxiliary need not give more than \$50.00 for the extras needed.

Owing to the fact that the Vice-president of Williamsport Arch-Deaconry was called home, her report was given at this time so as to enable her to take the next train.

Mrs. Boyer then introduced Mrs. Pilsbry, the Educational Secretary of the Diocese of Pennsylvania, and her assistant Miss Fisher.

Mrs. Pilsbry's topic was religious education, and first she defined Religion, as being a man's effort to get to, and remain in, a closer relationship with God. She named these three elements as necessary for carrying on education: First, Capacity, second, Stimulus and third, Growth. She defined the Mission Study Class as being the special form for education that Woman's Auxiliary created and brought into use.

She commented on a remark made by Dr. Rogers, to the effect that the Woman's Auxiliary was Auxiliary to the Church's Program, by saying, that to her mind, that way of stating it, was far better, and conveyed far more, than by saying, "Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council."

She quoted St. John 6th Chapter, and 56th verse, as the authority, for what Jesus said about the function and value of education, and urged the study of the whole program of the Church in order to see just what share, each part of our Church's work has, on the countries in which that work was done.

She then asked Miss Fisher to tell what the conditions of industry, without Christianity, were.

Miss Fisher used as her subject the third chapter of the book "Creative Forces in Japan," and gave very graphic pictures of the life of a woman worker in the factories and mines of Japan, that were operated by non Christian owners. She brought out the point, that the health of the whole nation was imperiled by the menace of tuberculosis, as it was spread by worn out employees when they returned to their homes, ill with that disease.

Mrs. Pilsbry then took up her talk, by saying that we had certain responsibilities in connection with such conditions, and defined the word "responsibility" as meaning "the ability to respond." Our Churches, schools, hospitals and kindergartens are character builders, and our education with regards to our work in such places helps us to better know the faith, the messengers, and the places to which the message is carried.

When she finished, Bishop Darlington had the mid-day prayers for Missions, after which Dr. Rogers, the Chairman of the Religious Education in this Diocese announced that he was fortunate enough to secure Mrs. Pilsbry for the Woman's Auxiliary work at the Eagles Mere Conference next July, and urged that each parish send someone who would be trained for leadership.

The Nominating Committee then reported that all the former officers were nominated, for the same offices, and no other nominations made for those offices. Therefore Mrs. Boyer asked Dr. Rogers to cast the ballot electing them, which he did. The Nominating Committee further reported that the nominees for delegates to the Provincial meeting were: Mrs. Harry G. Hartman, of Lancaster and Miss Estelle Bubb, of Williamsport, and Mrs. George Ziegler, of Philipsburg. The alternates nominated being, Mrs. H. S. Knight, of Sunbury and Miss Anna Williams, of Williamsport. During the roll call for pledges, the ballots for voting were distributed, the delegates being instructed to hand them to the tellers on their way out to lunch. The Roll Call showed that there were 155 delegates present, as well as the Bishop of the Diocese, six rectors; and one lay man, and one Bishop, one Deaconess, and two visitors from outside of the Diocese.

The pledges were made for the Expense fund of the Diocesan Auxiliary, Chinese Divinity Student Fund, the Mont Alto Fund, the Bishop Tuttle Memorial Fund, and the Field Workers Quota Fund. The Chinese Divinity Student Fund was soon completed, the sum asked being, \$100.00, and \$102.00 being pledged. The Mont Alto Fund was also soon completed, as but \$50.00 was asked for this year. The remaining funds are not yet completed, but it is hoped that every parish will contribute to these funds.

It was announced that the Self-Denial week offering, this year, would be used for the First Priority assigned by the Diocesan Council, it being that of State College. This Offering is presented at the Corporate Communion on St. Michael and All Angel's Day, Sept., 29th. Whatever is needed, however, in the judgement of the Executive Board, to complete our quota for the Bishop Tuttle Memorial Fund, will be deducted from this Offering before being given to the State College Fund.

Lunch was served at the Presbyterian Church on Market Street, and the meeting adjourned until after lunch.

The meeting was called to order at 2:00 o'clock after singing a hymn.

The President of the Christ Church, Williamsport, invited the Auxiliary to hold its 1925 Annual meeting in their Church, which invitation was accepted.

Dr. Rogers called attention to some samples of Christmas cards displayed in the Sunday School room, as being examples of the sort of Christian cards that should be used instead of the ones now commonly found.

The program for the afternoon was somewhat changed in order to permit those who had to leave early, hear Mrs. Pilsbry again; therefore the first topic was a Conference by Mrs. Pilsbry. She opened the conference by asking how one could interest a Church Woman in the Woman's Auxiliary, who had always thought it nonsense; and in the answers given she brought the points that more publicity should be given the work of the Auxiliary, that we should give reports of work done, at monthly meetings, so that those present could see that something was being accomplished, have short missionary stories told, and then get those present to promise to re-tell the stories at least four times during the month; instead of sending for women to come to the meeting, go and bring them there; that the Church grows intensively, and extensively. By getting people to come to the Church is the extensive growth, but by faithful work in the Church, and by each member inspiring hope in some one else, is the intensive way. She defined hope as being the Flower of our Faith.

She urged that each Study Class have a Corporate Communion before its last session, and have the group plan, at the last session, what they will do as a result of the class. The whole objective of the Study Class is to learn how to be missionaries. She also urged that each class, or group, have an intercessor who will pray for the class while it is in session. This intercessor may be from the same parish, or town, or may be from a distance.

Miss Fisher then told of some books that would help with the classes this year, among them being, the Encyclopedia Britannica, the article on Japan, the Story of the Program, A Gentleman in Prison, as translated by Miss McDonald, the Historians History of the World, Unbeaten Travels in Japan and New Life in the Oldest Empire, Handbook No. 2 of the Episcopal Church, and Missionary Policies and Problems in Japan.

Mrs. Pilsbry in closing said, to remember that the Incarnation was the whole of our belief, and the whole of our belief was Missionary.

At this point, it being the hour of the funeral of the late President Wilson, prayers were said in his memory.

Mrs. Cressinger reported that Mrs. Hartman and Miss Bubb were elected as delegates to the Provincial meeting, and Mrs. Knight and Miss Williams the alternates.

Deaconess Newbold told of her experiences in Japan, and of the joy the house built by the Woman's Auxiliary of this Diocese, is giving to, not only Miss Spencer, and herself, but also to all the Japanese women and children.

She told several stories showing the many ways in which St. Mary's House is being used.

Impressions of the Province meeting were given by Mrs. Peck, and Mrs. Van Horne and the report of the Archdeaconry Vice-presidents were read and accepted, after which the Resolution Committee presented the Resolutions prepared by them. These will be found printed on another page.

Dr. Rogers had the closing prayer, and the meeting adjourned to meet in Christ Church, Williamsport, the first Tuesday and Wednesday in February.

REPORT OF THE VICE PRESIDENT OF ALTOONA ARCHDEACONY

The Altoona Archdeaconry has seven (7) Branches, with one section B in Altoona. The Altoona Archdeaconry held a Spring and Fall meeting during the year. The Spring meeting was held at Tyrone, June 12th. and the second meeting at Hollidaysburg on October 9th.

The Spring meeting was opened with Holy Communion, celebrant, Rev. Mr. Heakes of Lewistown assisted by Rev. Malcolm D. P. Maynard, of Bellefonte. This was followed by a business meeting, at which all the Branches were represented by delegates, numbering a total of 42 Delegates and 3 Ministers. Rev. Maynard gave the principal talk. Our Diocesan Vice President, Mrs. Drinkwater of Williamsport, was with us at this meeting and joined in the discussions at the meetings. The Auxiliary decided to have a class for leaders. Very satisfactory reports were read from the different Branches.

The Hollidaysburg meeting was opened with Holy Communion, celebrated by Arch Deacon Eastment, assisted by Rev. Albion Ross, the local rector. All Branches were represented with one hundred delegates and four Ministers. We had our President, Mrs. C. H. Boyer at this meeting. Deaconess Newbold was present and gave a very interesting talk on the subject of her work in Japan.

The report of work done and collections are as follows:
12 boxes were sent out, valued at \$566.78
This was a gain of \$162.15 over the year prior.
U. T. O. was \$422.33. This was a gain of \$17.49.
The Corporate Communion of St. Michael and All Angels, amounted to \$131.36.

Total pledges given at Annual Meeting, \$212.00
Total amount given, not pledged \$207.00, making a total of \$992.69.
This added to the total of the boxes made a grand total of \$1,559.47.

Mrs. Van Horne held a class for leaders at the Hollidaysburg meeting and this work is now being continued by our Educational Secretary, Mrs. Albion Ross, of Hollidaysburg, in Altoona.

The Auxiliary sent 16 delegates to the Summer Conference at Eagles Mere. Six Branches increased their United Thank Offering, and all Branches increased their membership. Each Branch appointed a Secretary for Altar Supplies.

I visited each Branch during the year and found a spirit of work, service and co-operation most gratifying.

I feel this report can fittingly close with a prayer of thanksgiving for the work accomplished this year, with the hope and prayer of increasing our usefulness for the coming year.

The Vice President of the Harrisburg Archdeaconry respectfully submits the following report for 1923.

This Archdeaconry has twenty-one (21) active Branches including 2 B Sections, expect to add three more in the Spring.

Two splendid meetings were held, one in the Spring at Carlisle, May 24th, when eighteen Branches were represented by one hundred and four women, the Bishop, Archdeacon, Executive Secretary of the Diocese, and six of the clergy, Deaconess Ransome and Miss MacMillan of the Virginia Settlement School at Yancy.

At Lancaster, twenty-one Branches were represented by one hundred and twenty-two (122) women at an overnight meeting where Mrs. J. Alison Scott, of Philadelphia, spoke on "The Church's Program" and Mrs. Pilsbry and Miss Fisher added decidedly to the spiritual enthusiasm and inspiration by their convincing and instructive talks on the method of study classes and group conferences as a means of religious education.

Throughout the Archdeaconry the women are showing keener interest in their work and attendance at the different conferences and meetings. I do hope at the next meeting every Parish and every Branch will answer to the roll call, because through these meetings we receive the inspiration, and will do the many things asked of us in the field of Auxiliary endeavor.

Seven (7) Parishes had Study Classes and discussion groups,

There was one Quiet Day;

Two Lantern Slide Lectures and one (1) New Branch organized and one new leader.

Ten Blue boxes have been asked for in a small Parish never using before.

There were eight (8) delegates to the Eagles Mere Conference.

Our total given in pledges this year, (including the expense account of the Diocesan Auxiliary) is \$448.50. Total sum given in our offering on St. Michael and All Angel's Day for Deaconess Newbold is \$284.74. To specials, we gave \$321.85. This includes our money gifts to Rev. Mr. Dorwart, the Japanese Relief and gift to Missionaries.

In our box work we have a good report. Forty-four (44) boxes were sent from eighteen (18) Branches, and four (4) checks, totalling \$1,474.54, an increase of over \$150.00 over last year.

Twenty-one (21) Parishes sent for the United Thank Offering \$752.48. I am sorry to have to report a deficit of over \$111.00, in this Archdeaconry and I urge a more thankful spirit for 1924 that will more than make up for this shortage. Eleven (11) Branches have fallen below the amount they gave last year.

Let us remember that part of our Auxiliary Prayer when we ask "that we may give liberally to make Him known to all nations," and our U. T. O, prayer when we ask that our hearts are disposed to give gladly as He prospered us."

I am sorry to have to report a deficit of over \$111.00 in this Archdeaconry and I urge a more thankful spirit for 1924 that will more than make up this shortage. Eleven (11) Branches have fallen below the amount they gave last year.

Let us be thankful and in our gratitude be liberal and increase our offerings for His sake. Let us, this year through more earnest efforts, more work, continuous prayer, many sacrifice and larger gifts do our part in the great work for Missions.

REPORT OF THE NORTHERN ARCHDEACONY VICE PRESIDENT

The president of the Northern Archdeaconry respectfully submits the following report:

The report of the Northern Archdeaconry is not what I would like it to be; we have accomplished some things.

Many of the Branches have needed so many things in their own parishes in the way of repairs, etc., that we have done little mission work outside of our own boundaries. You must remember that this Archdeaconry is composed of nearly all Missions, and even the incorporated parishes are not entirely self supporting. It is, in truth, a Missionary Archdeaconry.

Boxes were sent from Coudersport, Galeton, Tioga and Wellsboro, to the value of \$102.46; the United Thank Offering was \$63.02, from five Branches. Pledges paid by the Branches in this Archdeaconry amounted to \$61.00 and the Self-denial week Offering presented on St. Michael and All Angel's Day was \$25.30. Two Branches held Monthly Program Meetings, and one Branch does some C. P. C. Work.

In June we had our Archdeaconry Meeting at Galeton, at which five Branches were represented by fifty members, and three Rectors. Two Diocesan Officers were also present.

Dr. Van Waters, of Wellsboro, gave a most interesting missionary address, Mrs. Drinkwater told of the Church in Galeton twenty years ago, and of the progress made since that time; Mrs. Van Horne gave a talk on the Educational work of the Auxiliary.

We hope that in 1924 more women will become interested in the work of the Auxiliary, and show that interest, by helping along all lines of service, not only at home, but in the Church at large.

REPORT OF THE VICE PRESIDENT OF THE WILLIAMSPORT ARCHDEACONRY

The Vice-president of the Williamsport Archdeaconry respectfully submits the following report, for the year 1923.

Two new Branches were organized in July, under the direction of the Bishop, Miss Watts assisting. One of these, (the one at LaPorte) say they have not done, nor can do at present, any Auxiliary work as their energies and time are entirely taken up with their own parish.

The Branch organized for Nordmont, is working actively and taking an interest in the work.

We now have in the Archdeaconry fourteen Branches of the Auxiliary doing active work, and five other parishes where the women contributed to the U. T. O. and also do some work for the supply Department.

The U. T. O. contributed this year shows a slight increase over that of last year, being \$1,217.74 in 1923 as against \$1,198.96 in 1922. Eighteen parishes contributed to the Offering in 1923, three being new contributors.

The value of the boxes sent out in 1923 is decidedly less than what was sent out in 1922; the value in 1922 being \$2,377.99, while in 1923 the value was but \$1,820.77.

The total amount given in pledges was \$392.00, in special offerings \$52.43, for St. Michael and All Angel's Day Offering (to re-pay Deaconess Newbold) \$241.65, the Japanese Emergency Relief Fund \$55.00.

Thirty four persons attended the Eagles Mere Conference for a part of the whole time. We have six parishes doing Church Periodical Club work, and about four in this Archdeaconry, have Church School Service Leagues. Seven Lenten Study Classes were held in five parishes, and three parish Branches have Monthly Program Meetings. In one or two parishes provision is made for the training of Church School Teachers.

The Spring meeting was held in Lock Haven, May 15th, at which time Deaconess Ransome was the principal speaker, and Dr. Tyndell gave the closing talk, and benediction.

This was the last meeting at which Mrs. Wooley presided, and by a rising vote, the women expressed their gratitude for the splendid work she had done in this Archdeaconry.

The present Vice President was elected at this meeting, and in October, held her first meeting in Trinity, Williamsport. This meeting was featured by Educational Conferences at which time Mrs. J. K. Miller, conducted classes using the book, "Creative Forces in Japan."

The offerings at this Fall meeting were given to the Japanese Relief Fund.

There were present at this meeting 115 women and 5 Rectors from 15 parishes, and also our Diocesan President and Treasurer, and four other Diocesan Officers from out of town, besides the four who reside in Williamsport.

Our own Deaconess Newbold was the principal speaker at this meeting, this being the first appearance in our Diocese since her return to this country.

The present vice President asked for the help and co-operation of all the parishes in this Archdeaconry, and prays that the mantle of the former devoted, and faithful Vice President, will cover her, and keep her from making too many mistakes.

CHURCH PERIODICAL CLUB REPORT

Since the last annual meeting held in St. John's, York, Miss Lillian Brant, your former correspondent of the Church Periodical Club, was obliged to resign after six years of faithful and excellent service. I was appointed to fill that office and herewith beg to submit my first report.

The main objective of the Church Periodical Club for the year 1923 was to reach its quota of \$5,000.00, the sum being designated at the last general convention to be the amount raised for three successive years, towards producing new books for each of the following libraries, namely:

St. John's and Boone Universities, China, the medical library of St. Luke's Hospital, Japan, Hooker Memorial School, Mexico, and Du Bose Memorial School, Tennessee.

The apportionment of the Diocese of Harrisburg toward the above named sum was \$45.00, devoted to Hooker Memorial School, and I am very happy to report the full amount in the hands of Miss Thomas. The quota given our Diocese for the year 1924 is \$48.00, with Du Bose Memorial School as the object. The fire which destroyed the main building of the Du Bose School, during the Christmas vacation, destroyed also the school library and all the text books. They are planning to reopen the School March 20th and unless the text books and reference books are replaced by that time, the work will be seriously hampered. I urge it upon the delegates present to take up this pledge with your respective Branches at the earliest time possible.

Another special this year is the private library of our missionaries and the Japanese Clergy who lost everything in the earthquake and fire that can be a very big item as some of the libraries were very large and valuable.

In addition to this special work, the regular sending of magazines must not be forgotten. Last year's activities in that line exceeded that of the year 1922, 126 magazines being reported sent by 68 donors. A miscellaneous collection of scrap books, Christmas cards, calendars, odd magazines, 1 lectern Bible and cash for five new subscriptions sent direct from the publishing house was also reported.

Following is an itemized report of the various librarians. While this report was taken as a whole, is good, it could be much better. Our Diocese is not represented in this part of the Church's work as it should and ought to be represented. The sending of magazines to someone who is our representative in the field is not to be thought of lightly. I ask the cooperation of you, here present, and hope that next year's report may include those parishes in which the work has elapsed and also many new ones. Interest is the first thing needed; books, periodicals and personal help will follow.

Let us set our goal higher and higher every year and we will have no trouble reaching the mark if we never miss an opportunity to speak of the United Thank Offering and if we never tire until we have educated every one of our women to know and understand the meaning and use of the little blue box.


