

CONSTITUTION OF THE HARRISBURG DIOCESAN  
BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY  
TO THE NATIONAL COUNCIL  
OF THE  
PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH OF AMERICA



ARTICLE I  
NAME

The name of the Association is the Harrisburg Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church of America.

ARTICLE II  
OBJECT

The object of this Association is to carry out in the Diocese of Harrisburg, by united and systematic effort, the three great aims of the Woman's Auxiliary, viz. Daily Prayer for Missions, the Study of Missions, and Systematic Giving for Missions.

ARTICLE III  
MEMBERSHIP

Every baptized woman in the Church is eligible to membership in the Parish Auxiliary, and all the Auxiliaries in the Diocese are members of this Association.

ARTICLE IV  
OFFICERS

The elective officers of this association shall consist of a President, a Vice President-at-large, a Vice President of each Archdeaconry, a Treasurer, a United Thank Offering Custodian, a Recording Secretary, and a Corresponding Secretary. These Officers, with the Chairman and Secretary of the Church Service League, and the Chairman of the Church School Service League and the appointed officers (as Supply Department Secretary, Assistant to Recording Secretary and Educational Secretary) shall form the Executive Board.

ARTICLE V  
DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The President shall be elected at a yearly meeting for a term of three years and may not succeed herself. It shall be the duty of the President to call meetings of the Association and the Executive Board, and preside at them. She shall also exercise a general supervision of all the work in the diocese and make a yearly report to the Association.

Section 2. The Vice President-at-Large shall be elected yearly and perform the duties of the President when she is unable to do so.

Section 3. Each Archdeaconry shall as soon as possible after the election of the President, elect from the three women in each Archdeaconry, previously nominated by the Bishop, a Vice President to serve three years.

Section 4. The Vice President of each Archdeaconry shall co-operate with the President in promoting local intelligence and interest, and in directing and organizing work in her own Archdeaconry.

Section 5. The Recording and Corresponding Secretary shall keep the minutes of the yearly meeting and the meetings of the Executive Board, conduct all necessary correspondence, having charge of the writing, printing and sending out of reports and other documents, and make the yearly report.

Section 6. The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all moneys for the expense fund of the Association. Also receive and transmit to the Missionary Treasurers such other moneys sent to her, and make a yearly report.

Section 7. The United Thank Offering Custodian shall receive, hold, and transmit all United Thank Offering moneys, and make a yearly report.

Section 8. The Educational Secretary shall have general supervision of all the Missionary Educational Work carried on under the auspices of the Woman's Auxiliary.

## ARTICLE VI MEETINGS

There shall be one general meeting of this Association in each year and other meetings may be called by the Executive Board.

## ARTICLE VII AMENDMENTS

This Constitution and By-Laws may be altered or amended by a two-third vote of the whole number of delegates present at a yearly meeting.

## BY-LAWS

Section 1. A Nominating Committee consisting of one member from each Archdeaconry, shall be appointed by the President one month before the annual meeting.

Section 2. Elections shall be by ballots, and each branch shall be entitled to two votes, and an additional vote for each ten members or fraction thereof. These votes shall be cast by properly accredited delegates or their alternates.

Section 3. Delegates to the Triennial meeting of the General Auxiliary shall be the President and four from the membership of the Auxiliary and five alternates from the membership of the Auxiliary, to be elected by ballot.

Section 4. There shall be three delegates to the Provincial meeting who shall be the President Ex-Officio, and two from the membership, to be chosen by ballot.

Section 5. An expense fund shall be provided by this Association for the necessary expenses, namely, printing, postage, stationery, traveling expenses of speakers and officers, etc., to be arranged at the discretion of the Executive Board.

Rule 1. 10% of the total amount pledged for the Expense Fund, be set aside for a Sinking Fund to be used at the direction of the Executive Board. ALL Requisitions to be signed by the President.

Remember that this is the year of the Triennial, at which time our United Thank Offering will be presented at the General Convention.

Take up your Offering in March, or April, and again in August, so that the U. T. O. Custodian may close her books by the middle of September.

Make your Offerings as large as possible. If each woman in the Diocese would give at least five cents a week, (which is a small sum when laid aside each week) our Diocesan Offering would be what we had hoped it would be, when presented at the Convention in New Orleans.

**DO NOT FORGET THAT THE U. T. O. CUSTODIAN'S BOOKS CLOSE THE FIFTEENTH OF SEPTEMBER, 1925.**

Send all other moneys to the Treasurer of the Woman's Auxiliary. Make your pledges high, and then work to reach that standard.

First pledges needed are for the Expense Fund, Mont Alto, and for the Bishop Tuttle Memorial, the Special asked for by the National Auxiliary at the Triennial in 1922. Make a big effort to make this pledge large, so as to make possible the two houses for Church women workers, in training or on furlough. Try and have ALL pledges paid by September so that you can bend your efforts, in the Fall to the St. Michael and All Angels Day Offering (the Self Denial Week Offering), and on your Advent Missionary Boxes.

Please use this copy of the Annual report in your monthly meetings. Let it circulate among your members so that all may know what has been done in the past, and our hopes for the future.

Do not forget to pray for all missionaries, at home and abroad; especially those who have gone out from our own Diocese, and our partners in the Prayer Partnership Plan. Also, write to them once or twice a year, that they may know that we are interested in their efforts, and stand back of what they do.

Co-operate with your Archdeaconry Vice-president, by attending the Archdeaconry meetings, and reporting to her, twice a year, the work you have done.

Do not knock, but boast.

Report to the Diocesan Secretary but once a year, and that should be as soon as your work is finished December the thirty-first.

Consult with the Supply Department Secretary about your boxes, and report to her ALL boxes sent, so that she may have a correct record.

Make an effort to have your parish branch work more, for the Church Periodical Club. In nearly every parish there are members who could send on their magazines, after they are read, and the Diocesan Correspondent will be glad to find you the person to whom to send them, if you will tell her what you have. Send them monthly, or if they are weekly magazines, send them weekly. Do not wait until they are a year old.

When you are given the name and address of some one to whom to send your magazine, look upon that person as one to whom you can write letters, and be friendly, and neighborly. No matter if you do not hear from your correspondent often, write just the same. You will be surprised how interested you will soon become.

## MINUTES OF THE 20TH ANNUAL MEETING

THE 20th Annual Meeting of the Harrisburg Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary opened in Christ Church, Williamsport, Tuesday afternoon at 4:00 o'clock, with a Quiet Hour led by the Rev. Mr. Francis B. Creamer, of St. John's Church, Huntingdon. Mr. Creamer used as his theme, the opening sentence of the Morning Prayer service, the words being taken from the 20th verse of the 2nd Chapter of Habbakuk. In his talk. Mr. Creamer spoke of the contrast often noted between the processional hymn, and these words, "The Lord is in His Holy Temple, let all the world keep silence before Him." Throughout his talk, Mr. Creamer emphasized the fact that we so often lose that feeling of quiet communion with God, and regretted that so many of us apparently did not feel the need of such communion. He said that our present form of worship seems to have lost the sense of holiness and devoutness that the early Christians had, and, like St. Paul, we are given more to words and works, and less to the mysticism that St. John had.

In closing he urged that we all try and have a quiet communing with God, before our sleep at night, saying that such a thing could be done, if only faithfully tried.

Between three and four hundred persons attended this Quiet Hour service.

The evening mass meeting was held in the Church at eight o'clock, with an attendance of over five hundred persons. At this service the vested choir preceded a long procession of clergy and two bishops, which was most imposing. The first speaker of the evening was the Rt. Rev. Walter Overs, Bishop of Liberia. Bishop Overs first expressed his pleasure in being once more in Christ Church, where he had so often, in his younger days, held Lenten Services, being at that time the rector of St. Paul's Church, Wellsboro. He gave the early history of Liberia, telling its reason for being colonized, telling something of its geography, and the claim that Liberia had on the United States, as its real founder. In 1847 the country was made the Republic of Liberia, and since then has been struggling to exist. He told of the part played by Liberia in the World War, and the results of her acceding to the request made by President Wilson, and of the refusal of the United States at the present time, to help her regain her foothold. Then Bishop Overs told of the work the Church is now doing, and what the Church has done in the past. He told of the need of doctors, and paid high tributes to the faithful work of devoted women, especially mentioning Miss Margareta Ridgley, Miss Seaman, and Miss Lois Ford, who is from our own Diocese. He told of the difficulty he had in travelling because of the roads being only trails, over some of which not even a Ford could travel. He spoke of the schools and told many interesting incidents connected with the little lads who attend these schools. He closed by saying that the Church and the Cross are the only hope for this country. By majesty of law, and the inspiration of Love, much can be done for Liberia.

Bishop Darlington then gave a brief talk. Among the remarks he made, one that stood out, in the estimation of the Secretary, was that youth could only be kept, by being of service, and especially by doing the Master's service. He urged us to have faith enough in the work of our Church, to realize that our duty is to raise our apportionment, for the work of the Church. We must be optimists. The interest we get for what we give, is drawn on the Bank of Service.

At the early celebration Wednesday morning, the Holy Communion was administered to about 60 persons, the Rev. Mr. Hiram R. Bennett being the celebrant.

At nine o'clock, the business session opened with prayers, by Mr. Bennett, followed by a few words of welcome. The President then gave her annual message.

After the roll call, the annual reports of the Treasurer, U. T. O. Cus-todian, the C. P. C. Correspondent, Supply Department Secretary, Prayer-partnership Plan Secretary, and the Diocesan Educational report, and the report of the Mont Alto Committee were read, and accepted. These reports will be found printed, in full, in another part of this Annual.

The report of the Committee on Rules was read by Mrs. Drinkwater, and a motion was made that a resolution embodying this report be adopted, and added to Rule 1 of the Constitution. This motion was seconded and carried.

Mrs. George Biller, of the Church Missions House Staff, was introduced, and told of the Educational work of the Church, particularly that of the Woman's Auxiliary. In the beginning of her talk, she said that she had a message of gratitude and encouragement for the way in which women stand back of the work of the Church. The encouragement was because parishes are much stronger, equipment is much better, there is a growing responsibility with regards to the Dioceses, more forward work is going on, and there is getting to be more unity among the Dioceses, and among Diocesan parishes. This last is due principally to the many Summer Conferences.

Our Church has always counted for much in the life of our Nation, but never more so, than in 1924. We have, however, many weak spots, and one is the lack of funds necessary to train and equip new recruits. Mrs. Biller said that we must make the home base strong, otherwise Mission Stations at the uttermost parts of the earth, will feel our weakness. She spoke of the World Wide Missionary Educational Conference, from which she had just returned, and paid a high tribute to Mrs. Coolidge, saying that the women of the United States had a wonderful woman to represent them in the White House, because of her simplicity, and sympathy. At this Conference were speakers from every spot on earth that knew Christianity, and at this time all sectarianism was eliminated. It stood for Christian Unity, and abolishment of war, after taking Christ's message to all parts of the world. Those who want a full report of this Conference, can get it by writing to the Church Missions House, 281 Fourth Avenue, New York City.

In speaking of Educational work among our own Church people, Mrs. Biller said that the average Church man and woman, had no more knowledge of our Church, its history, its ideals, its aims, than an eight year old child in the secular schools. She mentioned three types of women which every parish has. 1st. The woman who will not think at all. 2nd. The woman who studies to a certain extent, if it does not interfere with her household cares and pleasures, and 3rd, the woman who is willing to give the best she has intellectually to learn and know about the Church's work. She asked why our young women could not come in and be given work to do, and the incentive to do that work. The only way is to go after them and get them and give them something definite to do so they will not think they are wasting their time.

The General Church has been sadly handicapped in its work in college centers. It is trying now to establish places in college towns where the Church students can be cared for. She mentioned several instances of such needs. (We have such an instance in our own Diocese, at State College).

Mrs. Biller gave a personal touch in closing by saying that the greatest encouragement that Bishop Biller had, was the knowledge that back of him, he had a strong moral, individual, and financial background. She said "We have gone a long ways, but we also have a long ways to go."

The report of the Nominating Committee was made by Mrs. C. W. Scott. This was accepted in sections, the sections regarding Diocesan officers, and Alternates to the Triennial being accepted, and the secretary instructed to cast the vote electing those persons, there being but one nominee for each office, and for each alternate. The Nominating Committee then distributed the ballots among the delegates for the election of the Delegates to the Triennial.

After Noon-day prayers, which were said by Mr. Bennett, Mr. Judd, the Executive Secretary of the Diocese, spoke briefly of plans made for 1925-26 by the Executive Secretaries of the whole Church. These plans concerned the organization of the Church at work in all its branches. He urged that all women keep such plan in mind, and co-operate in every way, if such movement be started in our parish, or in this Diocese. This plan is a program more than an organization.

The meeting then adjourned for lunch, which was served at the First Presbyterian Church.

Reassembling at 2:00 o'clock, after a hymn, our former President was called upon for a few words. Mrs. Wirt responded by briefly expressing her pleasure in meeting so many of her friends, and in hearing the reports which showed a steady growth in all lines.

During the singing of a hymn, the offering was taken. The total of all the offerings at these meetings was \$149.00, the largest amount ever given at an Annual meeting.

Mrs. Samuel Welles, of Trenton, N. J., was then introduced, and told of the work the Diocese of New Jersey was doing under the Church Mission of Help. She read, as an introduction to her talk, the 8th chapter of the Gospel of St. John, and then spoke of the gentleness and courtesy with which Jesus dealt with the sinning woman. In part, her talk was as follows: "The Church Mission of Help now has branches in 15 Dioceses, and in one Missionary District, that of Porto Rico. They work among delinquent girls, and young unmarried mothers. In every Diocese there are girls who need just such help as that given by the Church Mission of Help, and she hoped that this part of the Church's work would grow. In the National Council of this organization, there are scholarships, which enables a Diocese to train one of its own girls in Social Service work. Paid Social Service workers direct this work, and members pay dues, and aid the Director in visiting, etc. In the Diocese of New Jersey, five things are required of volunteer members. 1st, the work of organization (which is largely routine work); 2nd, motor corps workers; 3rd, the friendly visitor; 4th, Clothing Committee; 5th, Groups for intercession (those who are willing to pray for the girls). Trained workers are needed because of the Court work. The Church Mission of Help, is welfare work among girls, who are sent from hospitals before they are strong enough to help themselves, girls sent by the Red Cross, Truant officers of schools, from courts, etc. No other single agency is doing just what this organization is doing."

At the conclusion of Mrs. Welles' talk, Mr. Bennett spoke of his desire to see such an organization in our own Diocese, working under the Social Service Department of our Diocesan Council. It was moved and carried that each Archdeaconry Vice-president take up this matter of Social Service.

The report of the election of the delegates to the Triennial, was then

given, which showed, that the ones chosen to represent our Diocesan branch at New Orleans, are, the Diocesan President, Mrs. Harry G. Hartman, Mrs. C. H. Boyer, Miss Estella Bubb, Mrs. George Zeigler, and Mrs. C. M. Clement. Mrs. Boyer then introduced our new President, Mrs. Hartman, and presented her with the gavel used by the presiding officer. Mrs. Hartman, after accepting the office, gave her report of the women's meetings at the Province meeting held in Charleston, in November. After this report, Miss Anna Williams reported the joint sessions at that Provincial meeting.

Notices were given, the principal one being a notice of a proposed change in the Constitution with regards to the length of term for the elective officers. This will be presented for vote at the next Annual meeting.

It was moved, seconded and carried that our annual Self-denial Week offering, made on St. Michael and All Angel's Day, be given to further the work of Bishop Overs in Liberia.

It was moved, seconded and carried, that hereafter, all delegates, and persons attending the Annual meetings, pay fifty cents for their lunch.

Mrs. Biller then gave some practical suggestions for Auxiliary Branches. She prefaced her talk by telling the story of Bishop Burleson and the old Indian catechist who invariably made appeals for himself, when attending the annual convocation. She told of the strength of the Woman's Auxiliary and mentioned one or two things that indicated growth, among them being the Young People's work, the plan to help the isolated, the plan to allow a sum to help the Auxiliary officers in Missionary districts, and in weak dioceses, to do their necessary travelling. We were asked to help in the Japanese Emergency Fund. We have advanced in our devotional life, through the Prayer-partnership Plan, and she urged us to keep in mind our United Thank Offering. She told of the Triennial plans. In speaking of our parish programs she suggested that in making them out early in the year, we make them so elastic as to cover adequately all the work we should do, and be ready to meet any emergency. Programs should be of definite information, and yet so emergency appeals could be cared for. She told branches to co-operate with the Diocesan officers, and spoke of the delays caused by the tardy replies to letters sent out.

In speaking of the Woman's Auxiliary Special, (the fund for building two houses for Church women workers in training and on furlough) she gave as an item of interest the arrival of Miss Seaman on furlough. She urged the establishing of good religious libraries, and told of the desire of the Indian women to have study classes, and to study all about the same missions that the white women studied. These Indian women were supporting scholarships in various missions.

She said that one reason for the former weakness of our Church was that we did not know how our money was spent, or that we were really a part of the missionary work by our gifts of money. We are now becoming more intelligent in that line. She told of the tubercular hospitals in Arizona, maintained by the Church, and said that in one hospital she found many types of patients. Young clergyman, a Yale graduate, young musician, women teachers, a young society girl, ex-soldiers, and down and outers.

She said that some women of the present day protest more against training themselves for leaders, than the martyrs of old, protested against persecution and death. If we would read the history of the Church, and the history of the American Church we would see how much we have to encourage us, in comparison to Bishop Kemper, and the early Church

leaders. She closed by saying that we must get the vision, and be optimistic.

After Mrs. Biller concluded her talk, the reports of the four Archdeaconry Vice-presidents were read and accepted. These will be found printed in full, on other pages.

The Resolution Committee gave its report, which will be found in the first pages of this book.

A motion was made, and unanimously carried that the assembled women give a rising vote of thanks to the women of Christ Church parish, for their hospitality, and the meeting adjourned to meet in St. John's Church, Lancaster, February, 1926.

## PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

IT is with a feeling of mingled joy and sorrow, that I present to you my Message for the last time.

This past year has been a very busy year for the Auxiliary, and it has been one of great encouragement, because of the increased enthusiasm, gifts, and devotion to the Mission of the Church.

We are to present a report of the work of our Auxiliary for the past three years; let us not think of them merely as statistics, and facts, but as the outward and visible value, and reality of our inward and spiritual self-giving, clothing that service with eternal value, to our God, our Church, as well as to ourselves.

There were at the end of 1921, six branches in the Altoona Archdeaconry, twenty branches in the Harrisburg Archdeaconry, three branches in the Northern Archdeaconry, sixteen branches in the Williamsport Archdeaconry, with six other parishes in this Archdeaconry contributing to the United Thank Offering.

At the end of 1924, there are seven branches in the Altoona Archdeaconry, one branch having two sections; there are twenty-three branches in the Harrisburg Archdeaconry, two of them having two sections each; and one Guild doing some Auxiliary work; five branches, and one Guild doing Auxiliary work in the Northern Archdeaconry, and in the Williamsport Archdeaconry are nineteen branches of the Auxiliary, three of them having two sections, and one Church Service League and four Guilds doing some Auxiliary work.

At the end of 1921 our United Thank Offering amounted to \$3300.00; at the end of 1924 its total amount is \$5258.78.

During these three years, we have raised over \$700.00 to complete the building of St. Mary's House, at Aomori, Japan; raised nearly \$600.00 for a memorial to our beloved Mary Smythe; paid a little more than half of our pledge of \$1000.00 to the National Woman's Auxiliary Special, the fund for building two houses for Church women missionaries, in training, or on furlough; and given about \$770.00 to the Building Fund for a new Church at State College, in addition to paying all our pledges, and contributing to the Field Work Quota of this Diocese.

Under the guidance of our Supply Secretary, to whom we are deeply indebted for her splendid organizing ability, our Missionary Box work has been most successful.

So much for material growth.

In a spiritual way, we are following the Prayer-Partnership Plan, and many are faithfully keeping their obligations to this Plan.

In the Educational way, we have also progressed. In the Fall of 1921, under the guidance of our former president, Mrs. Wirt, there was held in Christ Church, Williamsport, the first Auxiliary Institute for the training of leaders for Study classes, or Discussion groups. Since then a steady growth has been noted along Educational lines. In 1924, however, the highest point yet reached by our Diocesan Auxiliary, was attained.

In each Archdeaconry were held Study Classes, Discussion Groups, Reading Circles, and other forms of educational work; totalling in thirty-three parish branches, forty-eight Study Classes, or Discussion Groups, three Lantern Slide Lectures, one Pageant, and two Missionary Plays. In the Altoona Archdeaconry was also held in the Epiphany season, a Normal class for parish leaders. During the Epiphany season of 1925, there are also held such Normal classes in at least three Archdeaconries.

Our Conference at Eagles Mere last July, was most successful. Twenty parish leaders, were present, a Corporate Communion was held on the last day, the class making an offering for the work of the Church in China. A resolution was passed by the clergy present, to support Missionary Study Classes, and to try and introduce at least one in every parish. A Diocesan Educational Leader was appointed, Mrs. Hayward, of St. John's, York, accepting that responsibility. Mrs. Hayward, however, went to Texas in the early Fall, and therefore all the Diocesan work has been done by Mrs. A. H. Ross, the Educational Leader of the Altoona Archdeaconry. Mrs. Ross deserves our thanks, not only for the willingness with which she accepted the double duties, but for the system and efficiency with which she has filled this office.

Our first Diocesan President, the late Mrs. Bausman, once said, that we should not make our Auxiliary branches, mere sewing societies, but that we should learn of Missions, as well as give to them, and pray for them.

I would like to repeat that injunction, and urge each parish branch to take up, in a systematic way, some form of Education. Pageants, Missionary Plays, Monthly Program Meetings, or Discussion Groups; or at different times during the year, all these means of education.

I should like to also urge upon you all, a greater interest and more liberal gifts to the United Thank Offering. Miss Lindley says that in her visit to the East, the immediate need for at least fifty more women missionaries, was impressed on her. Yet, if fifty were to volunteer tomorrow, we could not send them, because of the lack of funds, and we surely could not send one, as a United Thank Offering Missionary. Miss Lindley also said that nothing impressed her more than the desire of those already in the Field, that the new volunteers should have the best training possible.

So much depends on the United Thank Offering in such matters. Let us try and increase both the number sharing in the United Thank Offering, and in the amounts we give, so that the new missionaries may be specially trained for the work that is before them, and that we can meet the need of more workers in the Field.

Let us also remember to successfully complete our gift to the National Woman's Auxiliary Special, the two houses to be used for Church Women in Training, and home on furlough. These two houses, one for colored women and one for white women, are badly needed, and the building of them was to be the Special gift of the Woman's Auxiliary during the present Triennial. This year will bring our next Triennial meeting, which will be held in New Orleans, in October. The months that inter-

vene between this time and that date, should be full of happy preparation for that meeting.

The Day of Prayer for Missions has been set for the first Friday in Lent, February the twenty-seventh. Let us meet in unity with women from other Communions, for special prayers.

May I ask each one of you, to accept from me, my heartfelt gratitude for the great help, the sympathy, and the patience that you have bestowed on me during these past three years, and I pray that God's blessing will rest upon the Auxiliary and the workers in this Diocese.

Nothing less than the best in Prayer, Study and Thought, in Work and Giving might well be our motto for 1925.

## THE TWENTIETH ANNIVERSARY MESSAGE



IT is a questionable honor to be the only available surviving member of the early organization of the Woman's Auxiliary, but such is the case with me, in having loved it, and worked in it, for so many years, under Bishop Rulison, Bishop Talbot, and Bishop Darlington, that I was proud to accept the chairmanship of the Anniversary Committee.

This year our Diocesan Auxiliary passes one of the greater milestones of its existence, and reaches its twentieth anniversary.

It was with a feeling of sadness that the division of the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania, would separate us from our friends and co-workers and from Bishop Talbot; but as in the individual, so in the corporate life, the only healing treatment in time of grief, is found in dwelling thankfully upon the blessings of the past, and looking confidently towards the duties of the future. So it was with us, when in 1904, our new Bishop Darlington, called us to Harrisburg to organize the Woman's Auxiliary in this Diocese.

The first officers elected were, Mrs. J. W. B. Bausman, President; Mrs. George Ramsey, Vice-president; Mrs. Levi Alricks, Secretary, and Miss Josephine Coleman (now Mrs. John Ames) Treasurer.

Mrs. Jere Black was appointed Organizing Secretary of the Harrisburg Archdeaconry, and Mrs. E. Almy, Organizing Secretary of the Williamsport Archdeaconry. At that time there were but two Archdeaconries. Now we have four, the Altoona, and Northern Archdeaconries having been set apart as such a few years later.

The above mentioned officers, with but few changes, served the Diocesan Auxiliary for nearly ten years.

At the end of that time, Mrs. Bausman resigned, and Mrs. James F. Bullitt was elected to this office, and Mrs. Bausman was made Honorary President for life.

The work of this Diocesan Branch of the Auxiliary has been most efficiently carried on these last ten years, by Mrs. Bullitt, Mrs. Wirt, and Mrs. Boyer as presidents, and Mrs. A. M. Drinkwater as Vice-president-at-large., with the assistance of capable secretaries.

It would be impossible in this short time allotted me on this program to follow the gradual increase of all our work, but just think of these few facts.

In 1905, we had three objects for which we worked: the General Fund, the United Thank Offering, and Specials. In 1924 I have counted nine objects, in addition to the Specials and the United Thank Offering.

In 1904, there were 16 branches in the Harrisburg Archdeaconry and ten in the Williamsport Archdeaconry. To-day we have 22 branches in the Harrisburg Archdeaconry, 7 in the Altoona Archdeaconry, 7 in the Northern Archdeaconry, and 16 in the Williamsport Archdeaconry.

Our United Thank Offering in 1904 was \$327.00. In 1914 it reached the sum of \$1293.00, while in 1924 it is \$2721.67.

We have built in Aomori, Japan, a lasting and most useful memorial to our Diocesan Branch, a house for the use of the women missionaries in that part of Japan. St. Mary's House, which was erected under the supervision of Deaconess Newbold, is doing the best kind of service to women and children in Japan. It is now occupied by another of our Diocesan girls, Miss Gladys Spencer, formerly of St. Paul's, Wellsboro.

We have also placed in the Chapel of St. Mary's School, Shanghai,

China, a Lectern, Bible, and Markers, in memory of the late Mary Smythe, a former Diocesan Auxiliary Treasurer.

We have been most fortunate in our Diocesan Auxiliary, in that we have lost but two of our former officers, by death. Miss Mary Smythe, our Diocesan Treasurer from 1919 until she fell asleep in January, 1922, and Mrs. J. W. B. Bausman who entered into rest in October, 1924.

I would suggest that all read the Annual reports as they come out, as they give fully all statistical details which will show the growth in these past twenty years.

May I quote to you from letters received from our Bishop, and some of the earlier officers, concerning the early days, and the contrast between those days and to-day.

From Bishop Darlington: "The Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Harrisburg, has been an ever increasing power for good, since the formation of this Diocese in 1904. Mrs. J. W. B. Bausman was its first president, and served faithfully, for ten years. It was only when she was disabled by severe illness that she reluctantly resigned as President, and her prayers and interest continued through her severe illness until in October of 1924. With her loved Rector, the Rev. Dr. Twombly, I read her burial service in the cemetery, and in the Church paid a tribute to her holy, self-denying life.

In the office of President of the Woman's Auxiliary, she has been succeeded by Mrs. James F. Bullitt, of St. Andrew's, Harrisburg; Mrs. Paul E. Wirt, of St. Paul's Church, Bloomsburg, and by Mrs. C. H. Boyer, of St. John's Church, Huntingdon.

These leaders have been aided by a most loyal and efficient body of officers, and the attendance at the Archdeaconry and Diocesan meetings of the Auxiliary, has been constantly growing.

The Auxiliary has supported the efforts of the Executive Secretary and others, in all our parishes and missions, in raising the amounts required for the Field Work campaign as apportioned to us by the National and Diocesan Councils.

God bless the Auxiliary and grant it continued enthusiasm and devotion. It is teaching all the Diocese the truth of our Saviour's words: "It is more blessed to give than to receive."

From Mrs. John McEwen Ames, First Diocesan Auxiliary Treasurer.

"Twenty years is a long time, and yet short enough to begin to see the progress of work started for "The Master Builder" by some of His stewards. Fully twice twenty years ago, Mrs. Edward P. Almy, then Miss Emily White, of Williamsport, Pa., was my Church School teacher, and it may have been her teaching and able direction of her class, whose banner, "Buds of Promise," I once carried in a school procession, that I, at least, early had seeds of service planted in my mind and heart.

At Harrisburg, twenty years ago, Mrs. Almy told me I was slated for the treasuryship of the Woman's Auxiliary, and she hoped that I would honor my parish (Trinity, Williamsport) by accepting, if elected. I well remember how panic stricken I was, when chosen. Yes, keeping books did worry me a little, but the pleasure of service counterbalanced all that.

In January, 1906, sailing for Europe, I tendered my resignation, but

at the suggestion of the board, the late Mrs. James Meredith, of Williamsport, was appointed temporary treasurer.

I married in January, 1907, and resigned, as I was moving to the Diocese of New York. I have attended every General Convention of the Church in the last 24 years, first as an on-looker, later on as a delegate, except at the meeting at Richmond, Va.. It was while on my way to the San Francisco convention that I became aware of the necessity of putting "First things First." I was much impressed with an address, by one of the Church's ablest laymen, Mr. Burton Mansfield, of Connecticut, now a member of the National Council. This address was made at a stop-off, at Salt Lake City, a part of the Convention program. As an aftermath of this meeting, permission was obtained from my Rector, Dr. Foley, and on our return to Williamsport, a Junior Auxiliary was formed, almost the first parish branch in the Diocese. I attribute to the training I received as an officer, both in the Diocese of Harrisburg, and in New York, the foundation of what has been my privilege to do in woman's work in the Church. Such pleasant recollections I have of my associate officers, Mrs. Bausman, Mrs. Ramsey, and Mrs. Robert F. Gibson. To them, and to all the members of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of Harrisburg, I send my cordial greetings, trusting that the next score of years, may be rich in effort, and results forthcoming for the furtherance of God's Kingdom on earth.

It might be of interest to add, that after I moved to New York, I served as Diocesan Chairman of the Foreign Committee of the Woman's Auxiliary, holding that office for five years. Later, moving to Kansas, I served two terms as Diocesan Educational Secretary and then three years as Diocesan Chairman of the Church Service League.

During my tenure of Auxiliary office, I represented the Seventh Province on the National Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary, from the years of 1919 to 1922.

One of the most pleasing happenings of my life, is to see the dear Executive, under whom I served longest, (Bishop Talbot), by virtue of his years of service, occupying the highest place our American Church has to offer.

I am taking but a few extracts from the letter sent me by Mrs. Wirt, our Diocesan President from 1917 to 1922. She says: "It would seem a far cry from the methods of the Woman's Auxiliary as launched some years ago, and the plans, and visions we have to-day. We, for a long time, rarely planned to attend any greater meeting than our own Diocesan Annual meeting. Now many women, not only the regularly elected delegates, but others interested, attend the meetings of the Provincial Auxiliary, and also go to the General Convention. This all denotes a growth of vision, and gives to us all in the Diocese a wider scope for our efforts. Summer Conferences are also aiding in training women, and men to see more clearly the task of the Church, and giving them the training necessary to carry on that work.

There have been necessarily many changes from the old order of procedure. The Box work is a notable example of the changes made; the progress of the Educational work among women. Almost every parish, now feels the need of Lenten classes in order to keep abreast with the advancing work of the Church. Surely we have witnessed great missionary strides. Pray God that we may grow more and more in this service."

I have received messages from Mrs. Robert F. Gibson, the first Diocesan President of the Babies Branch of the Auxiliary, from Mrs. J. M. Peck, the only Vice-president the Northern Archdeaconry has had, and from our present President, Mrs. Boyer, but space and time forbids my repeating them. I do, however, wish to tell of these from this Diocese who have given themselves to the service of the Master:

The present Bishop of Liberia, was at one time, a rector at St. Paul's, Wellsboro. Mr. E. L. Haines, and Miss Lois Ford, both from St. John's, York, have both served in Liberia.

Miss Anna VanKirk, of St. John's, Carlisle, has been in Japan many years, as a nurse in one of the Church's hospitals.

St. John's, Lancaster, is, however, the banner parish in the way of having representatives in the field. Deaconess Elizabeth Newbold, served for 18 years in Japan. She is now at St. Martha's House, Philadelphia.

Miss Elizabeth Falck, the granddaughter of one of our most loyal and faithful Auxiliary women, Mrs. John I. Hartman, is now nursing in St. John's Hospital, Shanghai. Miss Anna Groff is also nursing there. Mrs. Porterfield, at one time our Diocesan Auxiliary Secretary, has in Shanghai, two sons, who are teaching in a Church School there. Her oldest son, Mr. Willard Porterfield, has been in Shanghai several years. A new recruit is Miss Mary Esther Ryder who is a nurse in Alaska.

From Wellsboro, we have Miss Gladys Spencer, who is at present at St. Mary's House, Aomori, Japan.

From Trinity, Renovo, we have the Rev. Mr. Arthur Mackie, working in a mission in the mountains of North Carolina, and his wife, formerly Miss Helen McConnell, of Trinity, Williamsport.

At the tenth anniversary service, held in Harrisburg, under the direction of Mrs. J. F. Bullitt, toasts were given to the ones who had served ten years, and who were then going out of office.

I well remember one toast in which I had a personal interest. It was "The Glory of Going On." I would like to close my anniversary message with that toast. May we feel The Glory of Going On and Up in the work of our Master, not fainting by the wayside, but keeping faith with our work.

Pray God, that we may grow more and more in that service, and that He will bless our Bishop and Mrs. Darlington.

In 1911, Mr. Bullitt, four daughters and myself, went to Harrisburg with enthusiasm, and interest, and were welcomed with great kindness and sympathy, which warms our hearts to the present day, and which will always be one of our most precious memories.

The first meeting I attended was at The Nativity, Newport, and from the very first I was impressed with the cordiality, hospitality and earnestness of the workers. Bishop Darlington asked me to take an interest in the Church students at Carlisle, and a number of interesting experiences with the Indian girls resulted. Mrs. Ramsey suggested me as Diocesan Secretary, and I had the pleasure of working with Mrs. Bausman, and attending the General Convention with them, in New York in 1913.

At St. John's, York, in 1914, came to me that great honor and responsibility of being elected President. Mrs. Drinkwater as Vice-president, being the true inspirer, and leader, with her long experience, and good judgment, and clear thinking. Mrs. Porterfield and Miss Anna May Baker, being successively the best of secretaries, and Mrs. Steacy being such an unusually good treasurer.

With such a skilled band of women, the Executive committees became a true power in the Diocesan life. The meetings were held frequently, Center, or Group meetings were suggested in all parts of the Diocese, and a new Constitution, mothered by Mrs. Drinkwater, was unanimously adopted in Sunbury in 1915. It is a joy to look back on my visits to all parts of the Diocese, and a joy and an inspiration to come in contact with such responsive people. I only wish I could have made more visits. There was the three days' Institute in Harrisburg, and the first production of the "Great Trail," in which Miss Florence Newbold portrayed "Mother Church." There was the luncheon to celebrate the 10th anni-

versary of Mrs. Bausman's presidency, and Mrs. Ramsey's vice-presidency, with 250 women present at dear St. Andrew's, Harrisburg. There was Miss Helen Littell's trip through the Archdeaconries, telling of the work that Dr. James was doing in the Church General Hospital in China. The Synod, at Richmond, two visits to the Missionary Conference at Silver Bay, and going as a delegate to the General Convention in my dear home city, St. Louis. But with all these joys there were always two blessings, the joy to the one who goes, and also to the one who receives, and what would any of these blessings meant to me, if you, one and all, had not been willing to receive what your representatives brought home to you?

From the wee, struggling, but sturdy Northern Archdeaconry, with its faithful leaders, especially Mrs. Peck, to that wonderful Williamsport Archdeaconry, ready to undertake anything, with its inherited traditions, and worked into a great organization by Mrs. Wirt, the ideal of an Archdeaconry Vice-president, as she was unfailing in her efforts, giving hospitality, counsel, and of herself, without stint.

These were small beginnings, but they were healthy, as has been proved, by the growth in every direction, especially in generosity, and spirituality.

## REPORT OF THE VICE PRESIDENT OF THE ALTOONA ARCHDEACONY

THE Altoona Archdeaconry consists of seven (7) branches. Two meetings of the Archdeaconry were held, namely, a May meeting at St. John's Church, Huntingdon, and the Fall meeting at St. Mark's Church, Lewistown.

At the Huntingdon meeting, all branches sent delegates to the number of sixty-seven (67), with five ministers present. Rev. Bennett, at this meeting, gave one of his very stimulating talks on the subject of "Opportunity." Other speakers were Mrs. Boyer, our President, on "Altar Supply Work;" Mrs. Wigton, on "Bishop Tuttle's Memorial Fund;" Mrs. Ross on "Educational Work;" and Mrs. Zeigler conducted a Conference on U. T. O. during which brief but helpful addresses were made by the Ven. Archdeacon Eastment, Rev. Mr. Cady and Rev. Mr. Bishop.

The Fall meeting was represented by seventy-six (76) visiting delegates, all branches being represented, with the Rectors of all but one Parish. We decided at this meeting to have reports of work made but once a year, and this to be done at the Spring meeting. The Fall meeting to be devoted to an outline of the year's Work. At this meeting, Mrs. Ross ably outlined the work for the Study Classes. I wish to emphasize at this point, that in Mrs. Ross, we have a strong addition to our educational staff. The general discussion of the day, was archdeaconry work in all its phases. We had the pleasure of hearing from our President, Mrs. Boyer, General Vice President, Mrs. Drinkwater, and Rev. Judd, of Harrisburg. Others participated in the discussion. These talks served to awaken interest, enthusiasm and a happy spirit.

## REPORT OF THE NORTHERN ARCHDEACONY VICE PRESIDENT

THE Vice President of the Northern Archdeaconry respectfully submits the following report:

This Archdeaconry has nine Branches. I can't say active, because some of us are not.

When I speak of working for Missions, the cry is "We are all so poor, it is impossible to do for Missions." (You know we are all Missions in this Archdeaconry).

I think it is a mistake. No matter how poor we may be, we can always do a little for some one less fortunate than ourselves. I hope we are all getting in that way of thinking, and later we can give a better report.

In June we had a meeting, at Coudersport, which was very interesting; about 60 were present. All the clergymen in Northern Archdeaconry were away, with the exception of Rev. Dr. George Van Waters of St. Paul's, Wellsboro. who came to the rescue and helped in every way possible. He gave a wonderful address.

Our Diocesan Vice President, Mrs. Drinkwater, of Williamsport, was with us and gave some splendid ideas about the work.

The report of work done is as follows:

\$57.00 paid in Pledges.

\$22.50 for Self Denial offering from Wellsboro and Coudersport.

\$51.66 for U. T. O. from Wellsboro, Tioga and Coudersport.

Two Branches did some work along Educational lines.

Coudersport has a Church Service League.

Six boxes of new goods and one box of second hand clothing, amounting to \$135.41, were sent from four Parishes, Wellsboro, Coudersport, Tioga, and Blossburg. Blossburg did not understand about the U. T. O. and did not collect it in time to be sent in. However, it will come. No C. P. C. work is done and no Delegates sent to Summer Conference.

I had the pleasure of meeting with the Auxiliary in Blossburg not long ago. They seemed to be enthusiastic and much interested. They have a membership of twenty-four and I think they will do work along many of the lines this year. Let us Hope and Pray that the work of this Archdeaconry may increase in the year 1925.

## REPORT OF WILLIAMSPORT ARCHDEACONY VICE PRESIDENT

THE Vice President of the Williamsport Archdeaconry respectfully submits the following report for 1924:

No new Branches have been organized this last year, and two parishes in which some Auxiliary work had been done, have now fallen by the wayside. We have one new Branch in the making, however, and hope that we can interest more parishes in some phase of the work of the Auxiliary.

This report will not be accurate as some branches have failed to return to the Diocesan Secretary the report blanks she sent them, so there can be no comparison with the work of 1923 on that account.

The total paid for pledges was \$491.00, for Specials \$17.00, for Self-denial week offering \$376.42, and for the United Thank Offering \$1234.80.

Nine parishes had some form of Educational work, three of these parishes having two Sections each in their Auxiliary Branch. 58 attended the Summer Conference at Eagles Mere in July, for all, or for part time.

Nine parishes do active Church Periodical Club work, or pay to the quota assigned our Diocese.

Five parishes have Church School Service Leagues, and Eight share in the Prayer-partnership Plan. Since we have in this Archdeaconry 24 parishes with 18 doing Auxiliary work, this is a very low percentage in all these lines.

This Archdeaconry sent 35 boxes of new clothing and 14 boxes of second hand clothing, and 2 checks to Mission Stations at the request of the Diocesan Supply Secretary, the total value of these gifts being \$1027.07.

Our Spring meeting was held in Bloomsburg, at which time we had the pleasure of hearing the Rev. Mr. Bennett, of Christ Church, Williamsport, speak on "Opportunity." The Fall meeting was held at State College, and was a most unusual meeting, the parish of St. Andrew's showing the visitors the great need of a building suitable for our Church to carry on its work among the students. Bishop Darlington attended both our Spring and Fall meetings. The offerings at these meetings, after expenses were paid, amounted to \$91.40, which was divided among the Diocesan Expense Fund, Mt. Alto and the First Priority for 1924.

The Vice-president was appointed, by the Bishop, and the Diocesan Auxiliary President, to serve on the Diocesan Council, which meets at the See House, four times a year, and she attended three such meetings in 1924, finding them of great benefit in her work in the Auxiliary.

## REPORT OF THE VICE PRESIDENT OF THE HARRISBURG ARCHDEACONY

THE Vice-president of the Harrisburg Archdeaconry, respectfully submits the following report for 1924:

In May the Spring meeting was held in Trinity, Steelton, at which time eleven parishes were represented, by many women and eight clergy.

Mr. Maynard told of the Summer Conference at Eagles Mere, and aroused much interest, that twenty-six persons from this Archdeaconry attended this Conference in July.

In October, an unusually large meeting was held at St. Luke's, Mechanicsburg, there being 123 women, sixteen clergy and fifteen guests present, representing 22 parishes. All branches reported pledges paid, and all promised to take up Mission Study, in some form in 1925.

Mrs. Ross, the Acting Diocesan Educational Leader, spoke of the great benefits derived from Study Classes, as a means of informing the mind, and thus awakening the conscience.

In December, Mrs. Ross again met with about fifty women from all parts of this Archdeaconry, and organized, in St. Stephen's, Harrisburg, a Normal class for leaders, which will function in Epiphany, 1925.

The reports sent in from parish branches show larger attendance at the regular monthly meetings, more real self-denial offerings, more voluntary work, more partaking in the Prayer-partnership Plan, and better than all, a more sincere giving, and thankful spirit in the U. T. O., all of which seems to point out that we are awakening to the real Mission of the Church.

During the year 1924, the Vice-president has visited nearly every parish and mission in this Archdeaconry, and new branches, and some parish Guilds taking on some form of Auxiliary work, is the result of these visits.

We hope, in 1925 to report a 100 per cent Archdeaconry with regards to Auxiliary work.

In 1924, the branches in the Harrisburg Archdeaconry sent 46 boxes of new clothing, 9 boxes of second hand clothing, and 2 checks to Missionaries, through the Diocesan Supply Department, the total value being \$1065.42. This is an increase over 1923. Fifteen parishes reported to the Vice-president as having had Mission Study classes, or as having done some educational work. The Archdeaconry Educational Leader received reports from but eleven. All branches are asked to be accurate in their records and reports, so that reports sent to different persons may be identical.

Between May 1924 and October 1924, the Vice-president has distributed over 100 Little Blue Boxes, with the result that the U. T. O. for 1924 is \$909.28 as against \$752.48 in 1923. Another gain.

The total of money paid in pledges was \$602.00, for Specials \$99.00 and our Self-denial week offering was \$133.83.

The total offerings at our two Archdeaconry meetings, after expenses were paid, was \$37.00 which was given to the Diocesan Auxiliary Expense fund.

The greatest thing that is noticed in this Archdeaconry, is the growing interest shown by women and the clergy, in the work of the Woman's Auxiliary, and particularly along Educational lines.

Let us endeavor, this year, to achieve greater results in all phases of

our work. Keeping before us the idea of MORE sacrifices, MORE constant prayer, MORE sincere almsgiving, having a truer and a larger sense of the spiritual side of all that we do in prayer, work and gifts.

Let us be mindful of our vows at baptism, and our pledges made at the time of the Eucharist, and give to our Master, ourselves, and do the will of our Father in Heaven.

## REPORT OF Mt. ALTO COMMITTEE FOR 1924

THE Committee of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Harrisburg to report on the progress and needs of the Church work at the State Tuberculosis Sanitarium at South Mountain, Mont Alto, would respectfully report; that the property and grounds have been much improved; that a roadway into the garage which has been built for the Chaplain's car, has been opened; that a foot pathway has been made from the front gate to the porch; and that the line fence, separating the church property from the state grounds, has been neatly painted, and the Chaplain's house has been painted on the outside, for the first time since it was built.

A considerable sum was collected by earnest and devoted members of the little group of Church people at Mont Alto for this purpose, but a debt of \$200 was incurred which several of the individual members are carrying on as a personal loan. This should be paid soon as possible.

The Chaplain, Rev. Mr. England, has been constant in his attendance on the sick, and also held regular ministrations at Emmanuel Chapel, Bishop Henry C. Potter Memorial, adjoining the Forestry School at the foot of the mountain. A special service was held there recently, at which the Rev. Mr. Graeff, of Trinity Church, Chambersburg, assisted, when a large framed and engraved portrait of Bishop Potter, presented by the Rev. Canon Nelson of the Cathedral of St. John the Divine, New York, and for many years Bishop Potter's secretary, was hung on the church walls, near the bust of the Bishop which had been previously donated by a member of his family.

200 children afflicted with tuberculosis have recently been added to the list of patients at the Sanitarium. The Chaplain wishes that members of the Diocese, travelling by automobile, would visit him and see the work he is doing; and also the large general chapel which is used for worship by all the religious bodies in common; given, built and furnished by the wife of Dr. Dixon, a communicant of this church and former Health Commissioner of the State.

Donations of shoes, stockings, underclothing, and other clothing, and reading matter, both religious and secular, will be gladly received by the Chaplain.

## REPORT OF EDUCATIONAL WORK IN THIS DIOCESE DURING 1924

### PRAYER

At the Eagles Mere Conference, an Educational Leader, or Secretary for the whole Diocese was appointed.

In the Fall, I was asked to substitute for our Diocesan Leader, and places were made on the programs of the Fall Archdeaconry meetings, for me to present plans for our Educational work.

The Northern Archdeaconry having no Fall meeting, that was the only section in which I did not speak. At each of the other three meetings, a plan was presented, looking forward to the organization of Interparochial classes for the training of Leaders. These classes to be promoted during the Epiphany season, and the Leaders thus trained to lead groups in their own parishes during Lent.

The text-book to be used was "China's Real Revolution" and the assignments, or outlines, to follow those worked out by the class led by the late Mrs. Pilsbry, at Eagles Mere.

The organization and conduct of these Interparochial classes were to be left to each Archdeaconry Educational Leader, and the results will be reported with our 1925 work.

On December 19th, 1924, a special meeting was held in St. Stephen's Parish House, Harrisburg, to make plans for a Leaders' class to be held at that place during Epiphany. About fifty women attended this meeting, and nearly all the parishes in, and around Harrisburg, were represented.

A leader was chosen, and one or two from each parish pledged themselves to attend the Epiphany classes. The result of these sessions will also be reported with the work for 1925.

If a strong center for Educational work could be made in our See City it would do much for this work throughout the Diocese.

The co-operation, and help, of every parish, and member of the Auxiliary is necessary for the successful carrying on of Educational work in our Diocese.

## REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN CORRESPONDENT OF THE C. P. C. 1924

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IN submitting my report to you I want to express my appreciation, first of all, for the cooperation and courtesy of the executive board, secondly of the librarians of the various parishes, in which the Church Periodical Club has representation, and lastly, of all the members of the Woman's Auxiliary, with whose help the work about to be reported on was accomplished. Beginning with the year 1923, the main objective of the Church Periodical Club was to raise the sum of \$5000.00 yearly to furnish books for Saint John's and Boone Universities, China; Saint Luke's Hospital, Japan; Hooker Memorial School, Mexico, and DuBose Memorial School, Tennessee. This diocese had for its object in 1924 DuBose Memorial School, and was apportioned the sum of \$48.00. I forwarded to Miss Thomas within the last few days the remaining amount on that quota, which pays us in full.

One other special was the refurnishing of a medical library for Saint Luke's Hospital, Japan. Dr. Tuesler, calling at the executive office in New York in September, said "Saint Luke's now has a better medical library than it had before the fire." This means that we have made a splendid start and gives us fresh courage to go on with the task.

The regular sending of magazines has increased greatly in the past year. The number forwarded being 177 as against 126 the preceding year. The number of donors, too, has increased from 68 to 121, which all goes to show an increased amount of interest. In four parishes where the work had lapsed, it has been renewed, namely, Saint Andrew's, Harrisburg; Saint John's, Huntingdon; Saint Paul's, Philipsburg, and Christ Church, Danville, while in Trinity Church, Tyrone, and Saint Peter's, Juniata, librarians have recently been appointed, and are at work. Another advancement during the past year, was the number of paid subscriptions that were ordered sent from the publishers. I cannot speak too highly of this phase of the work, as it ensures a regularity that cannot otherwise be obtained. Twenty periodicals were reported to me sent in that way, and I have no doubt there may be a few others that have not been reported. One librarian reported sending fifty prayer books. The sum of \$97.40 passed through my hands during the year which was expended as follows. DuBose Pledge, \$48.00; paid subscriptions, \$34.00; sent Miss Thomas \$6.70; for Christmas cards received, expenses of correspondent, \$6.20, leaving a balance on hand of \$2.50. There were 243 letters written and sent during the year, together with C. P. C. manuals, and report blanks. I have itemized the report of each librarian, which will show the individual work done in their respective parishes. I would ask of the delegates here that in reporting to your branch at home, you include the C. P. C. quota, and take action on it so that I do not have to make a special plea at the end of the year, rather than report a deficit. Of the librarians, I would ask that you keep in the minds of your people the work of the C. P. C. As most of it is done through the members of the Woman's Auxiliary, a brief report could be given from time to time of the work done in your parish, all of which would tend to keep up interest.

There has been a growth in the work during the past year—a gain in the periodicals forwarded regularly, in subscriptions entered for the less usual magazines, in books given direct and in money given for new books, and other similar objects. More can be done to further the work in this

diocese; and to you, who do not have representation in your parish, could you not find some one to volunteer? This, then, is our aim for the New Year—increased representation.

Our obligation for 1925 is \$51.00, to be given to DuBose Memorial School, Tennessee, and Boone University, China.

Let us thank God today for closer bonds of fellowship, for keener joy in service, for clearer recognition of the value of the small gift and the simple effort plus personality. May He give us a clear vision of the opportunities that lie before us, and steadfast courage to respond to every call.





## REPORT OF SUPPLY DEPARTMENT SECRETARY FOR 1924

ANOTHER year of activity in nearly all the branches of the Auxiliary in this Diocese, but for some reason, the number of boxes, and their values, are not up to the standard of 1923.

Do not think that I am complaining; I am not, but I am very anxious that we should increase our work.

Last year the Altoona Archdeaconry sent 23 boxes, and one check; in 1924, that Archdeaconry sent 14 boxes of new clothing, 5 boxes of second hand clothing, and 3 checks, the total value being \$349.57.

In 1923 the Northern Archdeaconry sent 11 boxes and 2 checks. In 1924 they sent 6 boxes of new clothing, 1 box of second hand clothing, total value of the seven boxes being \$133.41.

In 1923 the Harrisburg Archdeaconry sent 44 boxes, and 4 checks, and in 1924, they sent 46 boxes of new clothing, 9 boxes of second hand clothing and 2 checks, the entire value being \$1065.42.

In 1923 the Williamsport Archdeaconry sent 36 boxes, 2 barrels, and 8 checks. In 1924 they sent 35 boxes of new clothing, 4 boxes of second hand clothing, and 2 checks, the entire value being \$1027.07.

I am not laying any stress on the fewer checks, as in 1924 we did not have the call for them.

I am sorry to say that in 1924, four rectors in our own Diocese needed boxes. In 1923 but two were asked for. All who received boxes were most grateful, but it must be very hard for them to make their needs known in our own Diocese and we hope the time will come when our own clergy are paid enough salary to make such requests unnecessary.

Will all the parish branch secretaries please send the Blue Slips to me not later than the 30th of December. I have mentioned this before, and must emphasize it again. I know it is a busy time for every one, but I am sure that if the secretaries realized that by keeping back their box reports, they hold back the work in the Diocesan reports. These reports should be sent to the Church Missions House by the 10th of each January.

One more thing, we have a few small branches of the Auxiliaries, and

Guilds that do some Auxiliary work, that have sent boxes in the past. I hope that all these groups of women will do some such work each year. They will enjoy it, I am sure. If, however, when they receive the lists I send them, they feel that they cannot do any of the work, I wish they would let me know at once, so that the lists may be sent to some other group. We are most anxious to fill all the needs sent us from the Church Missions House.

I thank you all for the good work you have done.


