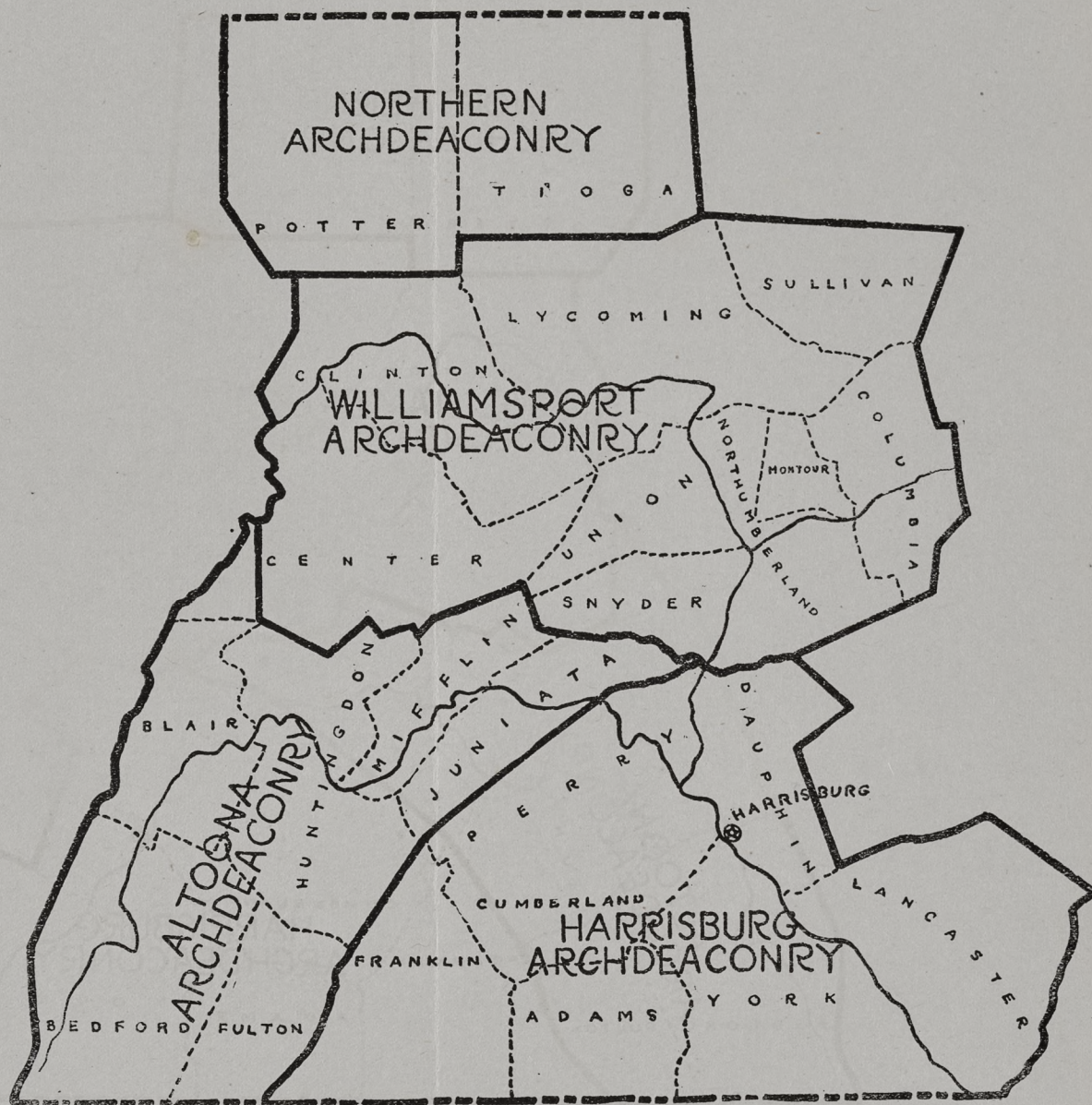

**CONSTITUTION OF THE HARRISBURG DIOCESAN
BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO
THE NATIONAL COUNCIL OF THE
PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH OF AMERICA**

**ARTICLE I.
NAME**

The name of the Association is the Harrisburg Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church of America.

**ARTICLE II
OBJECT**

The object of this Association is to carry out in the Diocese of Harrisburg, by united and systematic effort, the three great aims of the Woman's Auxiliary, viz: Daily Prayer for Missions, the Study of Missions, and Systematic Giving for Missions.

**ARTICLE III
MEMBERSHIP**

Every baptized woman in the church is eligible to membership in the Parish Auxiliary, and all the Auxiliaries in the Diocese are members of this Association.

**ARTICLE IV
OFFICERS**

The elective officers of this Association shall consist of a President, a Vice President-at-Large, a Vice President of each Archdeaconry, a Treasurer, a United Thank Offering Custodian, a Recording Secretary, and a Corresponding Secretary. These Officers, with the Chairman and Secretary of the Church Service League, and the Chairman of the Church School Service League and the appointed officers (as Supply Department Secretary, Assistant to Recording Secretary, Educational Secretary and C. P. C. Director) shall form the Executive Board.

**ARTICLE V
DUTIES OF OFFICERS**

Section 1. The President shall be elected at an annual meeting for a term of three years and may not succeed herself. It shall be the duty of the President to call meetings of the Association and the Executive Board, and preside at them. She shall also exercise a general supervision of all the work in the diocese and make a yearly report to the Association.

Section 2. The Vice President-at-Large shall be elected at an annual meeting and perform the duties of the President when she is unable to do so.

Section 3. Each Archdeaconry shall as soon as possible after the election of the President, elect from the three women in each Archdeaconry, previously nominated by the Bishop, a Vice President to serve three years.

Section 4. The Vice President of each Archdeaconry shall co-operate with the President in promoting local intelligence and interest, and in directing and organizing work in her own Archdeaconry.

Section 5. The Recording and Corresponding Secretary shall keep the minutes of the yearly meeting and the meetings of the Executive Board, conduct all necessary correspondence, having charge of the writing, printing and sending out of reports and other documents, and make the yearly report.

Section 6. The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all moneys for the expense fund of the Association. Also receive and transmit to the Missionary Treasurers such other moneys sent to her and make a yearly report.

Section 7. The United Thank Offering Custodian shall receive, hold, and transmit all United Thank Offering moneys and make a yearly report.

Section 8. The Educational Secretary shall have general supervision of all the Missionary Educational Work carried on under the auspices of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Section 9. The term of office of all elective officers shall be limited to a term of three (3) years, and shall be without right of succession.

ARTICLE VI MEETINGS

There shall be one general meeting of this Association in each year and other meetings may be called by the Executive Board.

ARTICLE VII AMENDMENTS

This Constitution and By-Laws may be altered or amended by a two-third vote of the whole number of delegates present at a yearly meeting.

BY-LAWS

Section 1. A Nominating Committee consisting of one member from each Archdeaconry, shall be appointed by the President one month before the annual meeting.

Section 2. Elections shall be by ballots, and each branch shall be entitled to two votes, and an additional vote for each ten members or fraction thereof. These votes shall be cast by properly accredited delegates or their alternates.

Section 3. Delegates to the Triennial Meeting of the General Auxiliary shall be the President and four from the membership of the Auxiliary, and five alternates from the membership of the Auxiliary, to be elected by ballot.

Section 4. There shall be three delegates to the Provincial Meeting who shall be the President Ex-Officio, and two from the membership, to be chosen by ballot.

Section 5. An expense fund shall be provided by this Association for the necessary expenses, namely: Printing, postage, stationery, traveling expenses of speakers and officers, etc., to be arranged at the discretion of the Executive Board.

Rule 1. Ten per cent. of the total amount pledged for the Expense Fund, be set aside for a Sinking Fund to be used at the direction of the Executive Board for all emergencies.

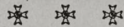

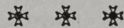
PRAYER WRITTEN BY BISHOP DARLINGTON FOR THE WOMEN OF THIS DIOCESE

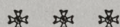

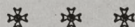

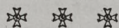

MINUTES OF THE 21ST ANNUAL MEETING

THE twenty-first annual meeting of the Harrisburg Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary was held in St. John's Church, Lancaster, Tuesday and Wednesday, February 2d and 3d, 1926.

At 2:30 P. M. Tuesday, Miss Laura F. Boyer, of the Missions House, conducted a Model Discussion Class, using the book "That Freedom." Women from all parts of the Diocese attended this class and gained much useful information as to the method of leading such classes.

The Rev. Mr. Euiene Heim, of Reading, had the Quiet Hour, at 4:30. He used as his subject "Hearing and Doing" and took his text from the 6th chapter of the Gospel of St. Luke.

The Quiet Hour was attended by more than 100 women.

The first speaker at the evening mass meeting was our own Bishop Darlington, who gave an excellent address, full of helpful suggestions, to the members of the Auxiliary. He spoke of the Auxiliary as being the working force of the Diocese, and also as being one of the arms by which the Diocese spreads.

Bishop Colmore, of Porto Rico, spoke of the conditions under which the church works in that island, and how the work was carried on. He told of the plan of a native ministry, and showed that the church was just now seeing the results of three years' work.

This whole service was beautiful and inspiring.

The Holy Communion was celebrated Wednesday morning at 7:30 by the Rev. Mr. Sherwood, assisted by the Rev. Mr. Harry G. Hartman. About 60 women attended this service.

The business sessions opened at 9:30 with a roll call of parishes, followed by prayers and an address of welcome by the Rector, Mr. Sherwood. Announcements were made concerning nominations, and pledges, and the President read her first annual message.

Mrs. George Zeigler, Chairman of the Committee on Amendments, read a suggested amendment, which was unanimously adopted by the delegates present.

Reports were given by the Secretary, Treasurer, United Thank Offering Custodian, Supply Department Secretary, the C. P. C. Director, Educational Secretary, and Prayer-Partner Secretary, which were accepted and placed on file.

At the close of the Prayer-Partner Secretary's report, the President asked two of our Prayer Missionaries, who were present, to rise and be introduced to the delegates.

Miss Laura F. Boyer told how to use the book "That Freedom" in a study class. She said that leaders should make it interesting and also to make it count for the Kingdom.

Following her talk, the Archdeaconry Vice-Presidents presented their reports, and Mrs. George B. Newman, of State College, presented the subject of the Self-Denial Week Offerings for 1926 to the assembled women.

Mrs. C. M. Clement, the Chairman of the Nominating Committee, presented her report, ballots were distributed, and the delegates were instructed to hand their votes to the Tellers on their way out to lunch.

Lunch was served by the members of Section B, of St. John's. Immediately upon re-assembling, Mr. Hartman gave information as to trains, and a hymn was sung.

Mrs. Clement reported the following elected:
Vive-President-at-Large—Mrs. A. M. Drinkwater.

Secretary—Miss Albertine Batzle.

Treasurer—Mrs. C. H. Boyer.

U. T. O. Custodian—Mrs. Allen Perley Page.

Delegates to the Province Meeting—Mrs. Harry S. Knight, Mrs. C. H. Boyer.

Alternates—Mrs. James H. Spotts, Mrs. W. A. Brosious.

The offering was taken during the singing of a hymn, after which Miss Gladys Spencer, of Aomori, Japan, made the address of the afternoon. She told of the work done in St. Mary's House, and of the usefulness of this House, in the community.

Miss Spencer brought with her many interesting pictures and articles from Japan, which were exhibited in the room.

At the close of her talk, Miss Anna Watts spoke of Miss Spencer's need for a native trained helper, and moved that this Diocesan Auxiliary pledge itself to guarantee the salary of such an assistant, if one could be secured. The salary would be \$180.00 per year. This motion was seconded and carried.

Reports from the Triennial were given by the following:

The United Thank Offering—Mrs. Harry S. Knight.

The Joint Sessions—Mrs. C. M. Clement.

The Educational Work—Mrs. C. H. Boyer.

The Social Activities—Mrs. George Zeigler.

The President then called for new business, but none being brought up, she announced a meeting of the Executive Board immediately after the adjournment, and also that the 1927 Annual Meeting would be held in St. Luke's Church, Altoona.

Miss Maynard, Chairman of the Resolution Committee, presented that report, which will be found printed in full on another page.

The Rev. Mr. A. M. Judd, Executive Secretary of the Diocese, asked for the privilege of saying a few words.

Mr. Judd told that the National Council, because there was not enough money pledged, to carry on all the work now being done, would have to close some Mission Schools, Churches, and Hospitals, now being of use. He said that the Diocese of Harrisburg would be responsible for the closing of \$4500.00 worth of work as our Diocese had failed by that sum to reach the amount asked of us by the National Council.

He asked the women if they could do anything to help that situation. After some discussion the women of St. James', Lancaster, promised to send \$200.00 over and above their quota, for that deficit, and a member of the Auxiliary of St. John's, Lancaster, promised a sum of \$100.00 for that same purpose.

Since that meeting, the Auxiliary of St. John's has pledged the second \$100.00, thus making \$400.00 towards the deficit of this Diocese from the women in Lancaster.

Women from all parts of the Diocese promised to go to their homes and try and arouse in their Parishes a desire to make up the entire sum still needed.

The meeting then adjourned to meet in St. Luke's, Altoona, February 1 and 2, 1927.

There were present at this meeting 132 women from 32 Parishes, 1 from the Church Mission House, 2 from Shanghai, China, 1 from Japan, and 1 visitor from Lancaster; 2 Bishops and 8 clergy.

The offering amounted to about \$95.00. This was used to pay traveling and printing expenses connected with the meeting.

**PRESIDENT'S REPORT TO THE WOMAN'S
AUXILIARY OF THE DIOCESE
OF HARRISBURG
FEBRUARY 3, 1926**

IT SEEMS to me, that with each Officer and Chairman reporting for her own special office, there is little left for the President to report without enroaching on the subject of some one else.

This first year has been one of learning the ways and methods of Presidential duties, of writing many letters, and of trying to adjust myself to Diocesan work.

I attended all of the spring Archidiaconal meetings, and one Council meeting in Harrisburg. It being impossible for me to attend both the Conference at Eagles Mere and the General Convention at New Orleans, I had to forego the former meeting.

There were only two Fall Archidiaconal Meetings. That of Altoona followed too closely upon our return from New Orleans for me to be able to attend it. The Harrisburg meeting was held in St. Luke's Church, Mt. Joy. This was their first Archidiaconal Auxiliary meeting, and a fine one. The most encouraging feature was the reports from the younger branches.

I thank all of the officers of the Auxiliary and the chairmen of committees for their kindness and help to me during this first year.

The report from the Triennial is long and time is short, so I shall proceed to it, as in that is outlined the new work for the next three years. The business sessions were held in the auditorium of Jerusalem Temple, on October 7th, 13th, 15th, 17th and 21st, at which Mrs. James McBride, President of the Louisiana Branch, presided. One hundred and six Diocesan branches were represented by **FOUR HUNDRED AND TWENTY DELEGATES**. Greetings, expressions of appreciation to all of the members of the Executive Board and Memorials were first in the order of business.

Then the MESSAGE. I am not going to say anything about that now, as it was spoken of last spring, when I addressed the meeting of the Auxiliary in each Archdeaconry. I shall ask each Archidiaconal Vice-President to secure copies of the Revised Message for distribution to the women at their respective spring meetings.

We were asked to carry out a constructive program of education for world peace, and to continue to have a period of corporate prayer as suggested by the Commission on Faith and Order.

The Field Department asked our co-operation in its efforts to re-organize the parish for service through a parish council covering the five fields of service, and in which every member of the parish shall be enlisted in some form of work.

The United Thank Offering of 1928 is to be given to the National Council for the work of women in the Mission Field, whose appointments have been approved by the Executive Board of the Auxiliary. The expenditure of the money is to include the training, sending and support of these women workers, and to care for them when sick or disabled. It was decided that the actual Triennial Thank Offering Presentation Service shall terminate the time for receipt of monies for each Thank Offering, so that each Parish and Diocese will have to be very prompt in forwarding its offering at the appointed time. Hereafter monies re-

ceived after the Presentation Service cannot be applied to Triennia' Offering, but will be applied to the one to be presented three years later.

The financial policy of the Auxiliary is to be in harmony with the plans of the National Council. Each Diocesan Auxiliary is pledged to help the Diocese meet its Budget Quota for the work of the General Church, and to assist the Diocese in the advance work of the program.

Instead of assuming a special outside of the program, the Woman's Auxiliary is to make a National Corporate Gift of \$100,000 for advance work included in the new program.

We were requested to take more interest in the rural work, and work amongst the foreign born.

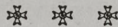
We were urged to encourage rotation in office as the wisest plan for development and progression in Auxiliary work.

To sum this all up briefly—we were to bring back to our Diocesan and Parish Branches these seven aims:

1. The payment in full of all general church quotas.
2. The overcoming of lukewarmness by deeper spiritual understanding and greater consecration through prayer and sacraments.
3. The awakening of the women of the Church to more effective service for Christ.
4. United Parish effort.
5. The strengthening of our rural and foreign-born work.
6. Closer relationship with the missionaries in the field.
7. The carrying out of a constructive program for peace.

Let us take as our motto for the next three years, "Faith and Prayer," realizing that if we will pray hard enough, and work hard enough, success is absolutely certain. It has been proven hundreds of times. Only a praying Auxiliary can accomplish anything, and to a praying Auxiliary nothing is impossible.

REPORT OF VICE PRESIDENT OF ALTOONA ARCHDEACONRY FOR YEAR ENDING DECEMBER 31, 1925

This Archdeaconry has seven (7) Branches and one Section B in Altoona. The first semi-annual meeting of the Auxiliary was held May 7th at Juniata. Celebration of the Holy Communion at 11 o'clock A. M. Archdeacon Eastment, celebrant, assisted by Rev. Ross, Rector of Juniata. This was followed by a business meeting. Roll call showed the presence of 95 delegates and 5 Rectors. First business was the introduction of our President, Mrs. Harry Hartman, who thereupon occupied the chair and conducted the election for Vice President. Mrs. George W. Zeigler, of Philipsburg, was re-elected. Luncheon was then served by the Juniata women. Meeting resumed at 1:30 P. M. Branch reports of work done were given, followed by reports of the Treasurer, Educational Secretary, and Church Periodical Club. Mrs. Van Horne gave instructive ideas of Auxiliary officers. Rev. Bennet, of Christ's Church, of Williamsport, spoke of "The Church Mission of Health." Committees were appointed looking to the organization of a Branch of Church Mission of Health. Mrs. Zeigler gave a summary of the work of the Auxiliary covering her three years in office, and found a strong growth in

membership and of work accomplished. Her report was followed by an interesting conference on United Thank Offering, in which ministers and delegates joined. Collection amounted to \$45.42, and was given to the Bishop Tuttle memorial. Benediction by Rev. Ross. The meeting adjourned to meet at Philipsburg for the fall meeting.

The fall meeting was held at Philipsburg on October 28th. Celebration of the Holy Communion by Rev. Eastment, assisted by Rev. Heiks, of Lewistown. Six Branches were represented by 68 delegates and 7 Rectors. Luncheon was served by the Presbyterian women. Reconvened at 1:30 P. M. We then had brief discussions on the Auxiliary work for the coming year. The Educational Secretary announced three sessions of Study Class for leaders would be held in Tyrone during the month of January, 1926. Miss Mary Hirlinger gave report of the Church School Service League meeting which she had attended at New Orleans.

Rev. Judd, Field Secretary of the Diocese, gave a most comprehensive outline of the Church Program. Mrs. Zeigler gave a short talk on the Triennial at New Orleans. Collection, \$43.25. \$38.25 of this amount was given to the State College priority. Adjournment to hold spring meeting in Altoona.

One Branch has a Visiting Committee. Huntingdon sent two girls for a week to Girls' Friendly Society at York Camp. Educational Secretary conducted three classes for leaders at Tyrone, five Branches represented.

May we all have grace given to do more and better work in the field of our labors.

A very interesting interparochial study class representing fifteen Parishes met each Friday during Epiphany Season at St. Stephen's Church, Harrisburg, and studied and discussed China's real revolution with Mrs. Ross, Diocesan Educational Secretary, the first two sessions, and the Vice President the other four sessions.

The result, an awakened interest in the study of our church's work in the field here and abroad.

The Vice President was fortunate to be able to visit a number of Missions in Cuba and the Canal Zone, and the knowledge gained will help in the study of Latin America very materially, with her discussion groups.

Two meetings of the A. D. were held during the year.

The Spring Meeting at the St. Paul's, Harrisburg, on Ascension Day, May 24th. Twenty-five Parishes were represented showing the interest taken by some of our very small Mission Stations, in being represented.

There were 132 women present, 11 clergy, 5 Diocesan officers and 5 guests. Miss Sibson, Wu-chang, China, told of her work in that city among the women and showed a number of beautiful things made by our mission women there.

Rev. Mr. Bennet spoke on Church Mission of Help. Mrs. Boyer and Mrs. Van Horne gave some suggestions as to the prompt payment of pledges and sending of reports. Mrs. Hartman spoke about the leaflet "Learning to Know Jesus Christ Through a Study of the Gospel." Mrs. Rote urged more co-operation in C. P. C. work and Mrs. Cowell gave helpful suggestions concerning box work, new, second-hand and checks.

In November, St. Luke's, Mt. Joy, welcomed the A. D. meeting. The day was very inclement but while there were only 75 present representing 14 Parishes, a very enthusiastic and enjoyable day was spent. The Rev. England said good bye as he was going South to live and work. Bishop Darlington spoke on phases of Auxiliary work, and General Convention ideas. Mrs. Hartman presented the Auxiliary Message from the Convention. Mrs. Rote, the C. P. C. work, and Mrs. Cowell, a talk on our Board Work.

The Vice President brought a message from Latin America, having arrived the night before from a visit to Cuba and Panama and the Canal Zone.

The offerings at these two meetings were \$31.85 and \$19.83 and after expenses were paid the balance, \$27.53, was sent to the Treasurer for the Expense Fund.

The U. T. O. for 1925 was \$1094.22; for the Triennial, \$2755.98. A gain of \$887.65 over 1922.

Educational work was done in 10 of the Parishes.

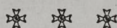
We had out one meeting this past year, the fall meeting being omitted because of a misunderstanding as to dates.

Almighty God, most humbly we beseech Thee, that we who especially desire to dedicate our minds to Thy service, may by Thee, be enriched in all utterance and in all knowledge; that, using Thy gifts to Thy glory, we may be blameless in Thy holy sight, through the merits of our example, Teacher, and Saviour, Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen.



One of the three aims of the Woman's Auxiliary, is STUDY. This largest woman's organization in the church holds that in order to work for, and give willingly to, any object, we must first know something about that object. Therefore, all over the country, year by year, women study some phase of the church's work. This makes their prayers intelligent, and their gifts the gifts of willing and eager hearts. We cannot be interested in a thing of which we know nothing. The Auxiliary started the educational feature of its work long before the National Church took it up. When Dr. Sturgis was made the Educational Secretary of the National Council, he found the Auxiliary well established in the work. Today, the Auxiliary stands out in the National Church as leading along that line of work. It is well to remember, however, that the books recommended for study each year, are gotten out for the whole church, and not alone for the Woman's Auxiliary.

REPORT OF THE SECRETARY OF THE PRAYER-PARTNERSHIP PLAN 1925

The Prayer-Partnership Plan is now in its third year. The number of missionary partners has now increased, so giving us workers in many fields, but the home partners have not grown as we had hoped.

Seven new branches have been added this year, making a total of thirty-five now in our Diocese, out of sixty Parishes where there are organized groups of women working either as branches of the Auxiliary or Guilds doing some Auxiliary work.

Our problem for the coming year is to so interest the remaining twenty-six that each Parish branch of the Woman's Auxiliary and Guild will be praying for a missionary partner.

This is a plan which ought to fire the imagination of every woman in the Diocese, who, as members of the Woman's Auxiliary, pledge to "pray fervently" and whose pledge might be deepened by the privilege of praying for a special missionary as well as for all missionaries.

We women who must stay at home, and who live sheltered lives, should take pleasure in doing all we can to help those who are doing active work for our Master. God bless all who are doing such work, at home or abroad.

The number of boxes of new clothing and goods sent, this year, is less than the number sent last year, but we were called upon for more second hand boxes, which we may not value, except for postage.

We were asked to send to but one rector in this Diocese, and we think that we soon may be able to eliminate all such boxes to our Diocesan Rectors, and have only Mt. Alto on our list of Diocesan Boxes, that work requiring only second hand boxes.

There were 4 boxes of new goods, and 3 boxes of second hand goods sent independent of the Supply Department. These, of course, may not be added to our report that goes to New York.

About ten Auxiliaries failed to send any report to me. Had they done so, what a grand total we would have had to present this year.

Speaking of Auxiliaries who have not reported, I am forced to say again, please send to me the blue slip report, not later than JANUARY FIRST. I am obliged to send my report to the Church Missions House by January 4th and any delay by branches causes extra work for our Diocesan Secretary.

Advent Season is a very busy season for all of us but if I send a requisition to an Auxiliary Branch that feels that it cannot fill all of it, if that Branch would take a part of the work assigned and return the remainder to me, it would be a great help, and I know the women will feel happier for having done something to help.

Let us all redouble our efforts, and send out more boxes, as requested in 1926.

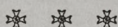

REPORT OF THE CHURCH PERIODICAL CLUB JAN. 1, 1925. TO JAN. 1, 1926

It is both a privilege and pleasure to report to you again on the work of the Church Periodical Club; a privilege because it is work for the Master and a pleasure because of the splendid co-operation afforded me from the Executive Board down to the individual members of the Auxiliary.

With the year 1925, just closed, we slightly overpaid our Diocesan quota for furnishing books to the library of Boone University, China contributing the sum total of \$54.25. The continuance to carry on the plan of the last three years of furnishing books to the major and minor Church Schools and Colleges at home and abroad was advocated and adopted at the General Convention in New Orleans. The furnishing of books for the Medical Library of St. Luke's Hospital, Tokio, Japan, is included in this plan and our Diocese is apportioned the sum of \$50.00 for that purpose for this year of 1926.

There is a slight decrease in the regular forwarding of magazines and also in the number of donors. This is due largely to the increased postal rates. The number of re-sent magazines is reported at 174 against 177 last year, the number of donors 100 as against 121. I am sorry to say that all the report blanks sent out were not returned otherwise the figures might be somewhat different. Activity has been resumed in Holy Trinity Parish, Chambersburg, while St. Paul's, Harrisburg, and St. Elizabeth's, Elizabethtown, have been added to the C. P. C. family. In six Parishes without C. P. C. representation some work has been done namely: Christ Church, Coudersport; St. Paul's, Wellsboro; All Saints, Paradise; St. Luke's, Mt. Joy; St. Paul's, Manheim, and St. Mark's, Lewistown. One real advancement made during the year was the number of paid subscriptions sent direct from the publishers totaling 36. This phase of the work is most commendable and already shows an increase for 1926. An addition to C. P. C. work recently is the selling of Religious Christmas Cards. The sending out of these cards by the C. P. C. is a means for the distribution and use of religious cards and a promotion for the spread of Christianity right in our midst. The

sum realized from the sale of these iards was \$12.00, sold by a few of the secretaries only. It is hoped that next year more of the C. P. C. secretaries will express their willingness to help dispose of these cards which, I am sure, will be procurable at an earlier date than heretofore.

The sum of \$127.55 was received by me during the year, expended as follows: Boone pledge, \$54.25; paid subscriptions from publishers, \$46.50; Christmas cards sold, \$12.00; postage for Diocesan Director, \$6.50, leaving a balance on hand of \$8.30, which includes \$5.00 for a subscription to Miss Lois Ford, our missionary to Liberia. There were 252 letters written and sent during the year in the interest of this work, aside from literature and report blanks sent. One special aim last year was increased representation which was attained.

This year, aside from raising our quota for St. Luke's Hospital, we are going to try and supply each of our Diocesan missionaries with a paid subscription to a good magazine, thereby helping to keep a resolution made by the Woman's Auxiliary in New Orleans, viz: "That we go back to our Parish Branches dedicated and committed to a closer relationship with our missionaries in the field."

May I ask each of you to help further the work in your Parish, especially by praying that the C. P. C. may be an instrument of service to the Master making this a sincere and simple effort in your daily lives for, as Browning says:

"All service ranks the same with God,
There is no last or first."
