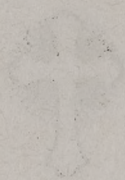

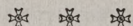

CONSTITUTION OF THE HARRISBURG DIOCESAN
BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO
THE NATIONAL COUNCIL OF THE
PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH OF AMERICA



ARTICLE I.

NAME

The name of the Association is the Harrisburg Diocesan Branch of the Women's Auxiliary to the National Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church of America.

ARTICLE II

OBJECT

The object of this Association is to carry out in the Diocese of Harrisburg, by united and systematic effort, the three great aims of the Women's Auxiliary, viz: Daily Prayer for Missions, the Study of Missions, and Systematic Giving for Missions.

ARTICLE III

MEMBERSHIP

Every baptized woman in the church is eligible to membership in the Parish Auxiliary, and all the Auxiliaries in the Diocese are members of this Association.

ARTICLE IV

OFFICERS

The elective officers of this Association shall consist of a President, a Vice President-at-Large, a Vice President of each Archdeaconry, a Treasurer, a United Thank Offering Custodian, a Recording Secretary, and a Corresponding Secretary. These officers, with the Chairman and Secretary of the Church Service League, and the Chairman of the Church School Service League and the appointed officers (as Supply Department Secretary, Assistant to Recording Secretary, Educational Secretary and C. P. C. Director) shall form the Executive Board.

ARTICLE V

DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The President shall be elected at an annual meeting for a term of three years and may not succeed herself. It shall be the duty of the President to call meetings of the Association and the Executive Board, and preside at them. She shall also exercise a general supervision of all the work in the diocese and make a yearly report to the Association.

Section 2. The Vice President-at-Large shall be elected at an annual meeting and perform the duties of the President when she is unable to do so.

Section 3. Each Archdeaconry shall as soon as possible after the election of the President, elect from the three women in each Archdeaconry, previously nominated by the Bishop, a Vice President to serve three years.

Section 4. The Vice President of each Archdeaconry shall co-operate with the President in promoting local intelligence and interest, and in directing and organizing work in her own Archdeaconry.

Section 5. The Recording and Corresponding Secretary shall keep the minutes of the yearly meeting and the meetings of the Executive Board, conduct all necessary correspondence, having charge of the writing, printing and sending out of reports and other documents, and make the yearly report.

Section 6. The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all moneys for the expense fund of the Association. Also receive and transmit to the Missionary Treasurer such other moneys sent to her and make a yearly report.

Section 7. The United Thank Offering Custodian shall receive, hold and transmit all United Thank Offering moneys and make a yearly report.

Section 8. The Educational Secretary shall have general supervision of all the Missionary Educational Work carried on under the auspices of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Section 9. The term of office of all elective officers shall be limited to a term of three (3) years, and shall be without right of succession.

ARTICLE VI

MEETINGS

There shall be one general meeting of this Association in each year and other meetings may be called by the Executive Board.

ARTICLE VII

AMENDMENTS

This Constitution and By-Laws may be altered or amended by a two-third vote of the whole number of delegates present at a yearly meeting.

BY-LAWS

Section 1. A Nominating Committee consisting of one member from each Archdeaconry, shall be appointed by the President one month before the annual meeting.

Section 2. Elections shall be by ballots, and each branch shall be entitled to two votes, and an additional vote for each ten members or fraction thereof. These votes shall be cast by properly accredited delegates or their alternates.

Section 3. Delegates to the Triennial Meeting of the General Auxiliary shall be the President and four from the membership of the Auxiliary, and five alternates from the membership of the Auxiliary, to be elected by ballot.

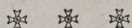
Section 4. There shall be three delegates to the Provincial Meeting who shall be the President Ex-Officio, and two from the membership, to be chosen by ballot.

Section 5. An expense fund shall be provided by this Association for the necessary expenses, namely: Printing, postage, stationery, traveling expenses of speakers and officers, etc., to be arranged at the discretion of the Executive Board.

Rule 1. Ten per cent. of the total amount pledged for the Expense Fund, be set aside for a Sinking Fund to be used at the direction of the Executive Board for all emergencies.

Rule 2. At the Annual Meeting, the hostess branch shall entertain, over night, members of the Executive Board, Speakers on the Program and two delegates from each branch. Where more than two register from any branch, they shall pay for their own entertainment.

MINUTES OF THE 22ND ANNUAL MEETING



The twenty-second annual meeting of the Harrisburg Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary was held in St. Luke's Church, Altoona, Tuesday and Wednesday, February 1st and 2nd, 1927.

The meeting was opened with the Quiet Hour led by the Rev. E. M. Frear of St. Andrew's, State College, who used for his meditations the subject "God the Great Giver."

The Quiet Hour was attended by more than 150 women.

The first speaker at the evening mass meeting was our own Bishop Darlington, who gave a splendid address, taking his subject from the Book of Joshua, using the 2nd chapter and the 6th chapter—5th verse. He said the Woman's Auxiliary is ever going forward, every member wears the badge of courage and is ready to sacrifice in order to bring others to the knowledge of Christ's love.

Bishop Davenport, of Easton, Maryland presented the Rural Problem as actually experienced by him in his work, and made us feel the Challenge of the Rural Field. He said in part, "that the more you reach out into the country, the more you are building for the future."

About 300 women and men attended this service.

The Holy Communion was celebrated Wednesday morning at 7:30 by the Rev. R. A. Hatch.

Breakfast was served by the women of St. Luke's.

The business sessions opened at 9:15 with prayers and an address of welcome by the Rector, Mr. Hatch. The President read her second annual message, which was followed by the roll call of Branches.

Reports were given by the Secretary, Treasurer, United Thank Offering Custodian, Supply Department Secretary, C. P. C. Director, Educational Secretary, and Prayer-Partner Secretary, which were accepted and placed on file.

Mrs. Charles Pancoast of Germantown, Pa., gave a talk on the "Work of the Woman's Auxiliary," which was filled with information and inspiration, and also many practical and workable suggestions for the promotion of the Aim of the Woman's Auxiliary.

She brought out, that the Woman's Auxiliary is Auxiliary to the National Council, and is auxiliary to the whole work of the whole Church. If we want to serve God we can find our place under any part of the organization of the Church. "Ye shall receive power after the Holy Ghost shall come upon you."

Mrs. Pancoast suggested we read the first book of Timothy, also St. John, 17th chapter.

Following Mrs. Pancoast the Archdeaconry Vice-Presidents presented their reports, and Mrs. C. H. Boyer, in the absence of Mrs. Darlington, Chairman of the Mt. Alto Committee, gave a report of the work at Mt. Alto. These reports were accepted and placed on file.

In the order of new business the following rule to be made Rule 2 of the By-laws was presented, voted, and carried:—

"At the Annual Meeting, the hostess branch shall entertain, over night, the members of the Executive Board, Speakers on the Program and two delegates from each branch. Where more than two register from any branch, they shall pay for their own entertainment."

Mrs. A. M. Drinkwater, Chairman of the Nominating Committee presented the names of the nominees for Vice-President-at-large, U. T. O. Custodian, Delegates to the Province meeting, and Alternates to the Province meeting. The names were placed on black boards in sections. It was voted that the nominations be accepted as they had been presented in sections.

Ballots were distributed and the delegates were instructed to hand their votes to the Tellers, Mrs. Rote, Mrs. VanHorne and Miss Emma Shaw, on their way out to lunch.

The Rev. Albion H. Ross of Hollidaysburg, said the noon-day prayers.

Lunch was served by the women of St. Luke's.

After lunch Mrs. Drinkwater announced the result of the Election, which was as follows:—

The offering was taken during the singing of a hymn.

A resolution expressing the sorrow of the Diocesan Auxiliary in the death of Miss Margaret Silliman, former Diocesan Treasurer, was offered and adopted.

Mrs. Pancoast continuing the talk of the morning session said, "Service is Love in action. The measure of our service is the measure of our love, and we have a mountain of opportunity." She told of some of the Missions and Missionaries she had visited in the Philippine Islands, China, and Japan, especially mentioning the places which will receive a part of the Corporate Gift, St. Agnes' School, Japan; St. Mark's School, Alaska; The Church of the Resurrection, the Philippines, Holy Trinity Church Haiti; The Church of the Nazarene, Liveramento, Brazil; St. Timothy's Hospital, Liberia.

At the close of Mrs. Pancoast's talk, "Impressions of the Province Meeting" were given by Mrs. C. H. Boyer and Mrs. J. H. Spotts.

Mrs. Hartman, Diocesan President, announced the Committees to serve for the coming year and also that the meeting for 1928 will be held in St. Stephen's Church, Harrisburg.

A resolution was made to give a rising vote of thanks to the people of St. Luke's, Altoona for their most gracious entertainment.

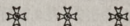
Tea was served after the close of the meeting.

The offering amounted to \$79.39. This was used to pay traveling and printing expenses connected with the meeting.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE 1926



The Second Year of my term as your President has passed even more rapidly than the first one. Much of importance has transpired in the religious life of the Church. The message, of which we have heard a great deal, has now become merged into the Bishop's Crusade. In this Diocese we are in the midst of the Crusade. Let us as an Auxiliary carry on with our prayers, and with such other assistance as we may be called upon to give.

There are a few important subjects I should like to bring before you today. Some of you were fortunate enough to have attended the All Day Institute for Leaders, held by Miss Laura Boyer, in Saint Paul's Church, Harrisburg, on the Eleventh of January. We were not all Leaders who attended, but we all received valuable aid for our Study Class work. At that meeting Miss Boyer suggested that we give the Offering of that day toward sending a Rural Priest to a Conference in Rural work, and that each Parish Study Class should add its Study Class Offering to the Institute Offering, and make it a worth while one. She said, as we have always said at St. John's Church, Lancaster, that if you do not tie up the lesson of the Study Class with some definite work in, or contribution to, the subject studied, a large part of the value of the study is lost. Each Parish Treasurer should keep a separate record of the study class offerings, and at the end of the sessions send a check for the amount, designated for the Rural Priest fund, to our Diocesan Treasurer, Mrs. Boyer. She will see that it gets to the headquarters from which the Rural Clergy are sent to the conferences.

We have had a request from the Rev. A. B. Parsons of the Church Missions House for two teachers for the Hooker School in Mexico; young women between the ages of 30 and 35 years; "young enough to have retained their enthusiasms, and old enough to have poise." Can you help to find them? They are needed at once.

The clergy make free use of quotations in their sermons, so I am going to quote Miss Lindley on the United Thank Offering. She wrote in her quarterly letter to the Diocesan Presidents as follows: At the last meeting of the Executive Board, Mr. Franklin told us that there remained about \$50,000 in the one-third of the United Thank Offering applicable to the 1926 work. In view of the resolutions that the United Thank Offering of 1925 should be used "for the work of women in the mission field whose appointment has been approved by the Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary, including the training, sending and support of women workers, and the care of such workers when sick or disabled," and "that the women of the Church should not aim to provide the support of all women workers in the Mission Field, through the United Thank Offering," the Board felt that the money should be used; first, to transfer a number of missionaries already at work to the United Thank Offering list; second, to care for certain pieces of work carried on by the United Thank Offering workers. At the request of the Board, the National Council has so designated the available balance. So once again the United Thank Offering furnishes us cause for happiness. As we remember those days in New Orleans when we rejoiced over the size of the Offering, realizing that it would do its share toward carrying on the Church's mission, it is good to know that that was done in 1926 by not only taking care of a number of new appointments, but by paying the salaries of about thirty women already at work and well worthy of being United Thank Offering workers, and not only

by doing so much for salaries, but also by helping to support some of the work done under United Thank Offering workers. In choosing the places to help in this way we have taken bits of training under United Thank Offering missionaries; for instance, the Training School for Bible Women at Sendai, Japan, the Nurses Training School at St. Luke's Hospital, Tokyo, etc. This is a matter for us not only to rejoice in at present, but a challenge to increase the 1928 United Thank Offering. If we can do more to give our representatives the tools which they need, and if perhaps some day we could give them new equipment, what possibilities open to us through our blessed United Thank Offering! Certainly such possibilities should insure a much greater offering in 1928 than any in the past.

There are two requests I should like to make:

Will the parish Secretaries please fill out the report blanks sent to them by their Archdeaconal Vice-Presidents **MOST** promptly, and return them to her that she may assemble her report, and get it into the hands of the Diocesan Secretary, that she in turn may get her report ready to send to Miss Lindley by January. Two years ago it was decided that each Archdeaconal Vice-President should fill out her own Archdeaconal report, and send it to the Diocesan Secretary ready to be copied into the report to be sent to Miss Lindley. Not many of you realize the amount of work the Diocesan Secretary has to do, and this is one of the ways in which each Parish Secretary can help ease the burden of the Diocesan Secretary. Please remember this next Fall when the blanks are sent to you to be filled in: fill them in at once, and return them to the Vice President of your Archdeaconry.

A second request has come from Headquarters that the Diocesan presidents again speak of the SPIRIT OF MISSIONS. There are now over 1,000 Parish Representatives soliciting subscriptions for this magazine. We have something like 4,000 Parish Branches of the Woman's Auxiliary. Miss Lindley thinks we could have a representative in each of the 4,000 branches. Do we in the Diocese of Harrisburg have one in each of our branches? I fear not. Cannot each President at her first meeting after this Annual Meeting appoint a woman, or ask for a volunteer, to solicit subscriptions during March, as the March number will contain articles on the United Thank Offering, and the Lenten Offering.

The children in the Church Schools sell this number and it would be a wonderful opportunity to interest women in the United Thank Offering and its work. The sale of the Lenten number of the Spirit of Missions has fallen off greatly during the last few years. Let us try to make our Diocese do unusually well this year.

I am saying nothing about the Pledges, or the Corporate Gift because Mrs. Boyer will tell you about them, and her plans for the Corporate Gift, of which she is Diocesan Chairman.

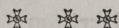

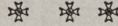

In this Archdeaconry there are Four (4) C. S. Service Leagues, Two (2) Girls' Friendly, and Two (2) Young Peoples Fellowship Societies. We have had sixteen (16) corporate Communion in fourteen (14) Parishes. Several Parishes have had Intercessions, Carlisle regularly.

St. John's, Lancaster held a Quiet Day conducted by Father Harrison of the Order of the Holy Cross.

In this Archdeaconry Fifteen (15) Branches have only business meetings, Eight (8) both Program and Business. However, our women are learning that Auxiliary work to be on a right basis and to really follow its Constitution must begin and end with all women sharing in the real duties and privileges of Auxiliary work, prayer and gifts, and including reading and study.

In Educational Work, we had twenty (20) Branches with interesting study classes on Latin-America, using "That Freedom" as their text book, with the Story of the Program, The World and I, and Miss Boyer's Handbook as references.

There were Six (6) Discussion Groups and Three (3) Reading Circles, Four (4) Bible Classes, Five (5) Pageants were given, and a number of Lantern Slides with lectures. More Branches are having Devotional and Missionary Program Meetings, using The Spirit of Missions, and The Church at Work, and in this way learn the inspiration of prayer, and to use their gifts and money more intelligently and wisely. I am glad to report 468 subscribers to the Harrisburg Churchman and 135 to the Spirit of Missions.

In securing the means to further their work the Branches use various methods, among which are Food and Rummage Sales, Luncheons, Teas, Donations, Dues, Valentine and Card Parties, Pageants and offerings at Study Class Meetings during Lent.

This Archdeaconry has taken a most active interest and pride in its two meetings this year, and was also represented at the Blue Mountain Conference and at the Provincial Synod.

On May 20, 1926, the Spring Meeting was held at St. John's, York, Archdeacon Steel, who lived in Cuba for over twenty-five years, gave a splendid insight into Church conditions there, and spoke of the many difficulties and problems Bishop Hulse and his faithful Missionaries daily meet, and use their best efforts to solve. Mr. Victor Holly, a grandson of Bishop Holly of Haiti, brought greetings from the church people there, and told what a great hold the Episcopal Church had on his people and the Haitians. Mrs. Rote, C. P. C. Director, spoke of the need for more C. P. C. work, and money and books for St. Luke's Medical School, Japan, and the Kuling School, China. Mrs. Cowell gave a brief outline of the

Box Work being done by our Branches for the Mission at Bear Mountain under Miss Pierce. Bishop Darlington, unable to be present, asked Rev. Mr. Ogburn to speak of the work being done among the colored people in Harrisburg and Altoona. Rev. Mr. Judd, Executive Secretary, announced the Blue Mountain Conference at Frederick, Md. and urged all to go who could.

Fourteen Parishes and Seventy-six (76) women responded to Roll Call. On October 16, 1926, The meeting was held at St. Andrew's, Harrisburg. Twenty-three (23) Parishes were represented by 114 women and Nine (9) Clergy. After the early celebration by Rev. Judd, assisted by Rev. Berghaus, the meeting held in the Parish House, was addressed by our Diocesan President, Mrs. Hartman, who spoke on The Message adopted at New Orleans, and urged all Branches to open their meetings with prayer, and to select a prayer partner. Mrs. Page gave a splendid talk on her work as U. T. O. Custodian, and asked every woman to take a Blue Box and use it often. Mrs. Ross, our Dio. Ed. Sec. conducted two demonstration study classes on "Beyond the City Limits," which were instructive, interesting and entertaining. She told the women how they all could help these isolated Missions and Church people, and suggested a centre meeting for trained leaders in Harrisburg with an all day Institute with Miss Laura Boyer as leader. The V. P. appointed Miss Watts, Mrs. Stacy and Mrs. Spotts as a Committee to secure the Church, name the date, and arrange for a good attendance. Rev. Mr. Graeff spoke on the proposed Home for the Aged at Shippensburg, and Bishop Darlington also spoke of the Home and urged the Archdeaconry to take a live interest in it. He also told the women our quota Harrisburg Archdeaconry toward State College was subscribed and paid.

A quiet hour with intercessions and addresses conducted by Rev. G. J. MacCormick, of Palmyra, N. J. was one of spiritual uplift, and made a deep impression. I am sure it helped to overcome any lukewarmness among the members, in religious thought and activity, and awakened a deeper realization of a better spiritual understanding, and a resolve for greater service through prayer and sacraments, and more effective service for Christ.

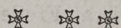

REPORT OF THE ARCHDEACONRY OF WILLIAMSPORT FOR 1926



There are in this Archdeaconry, 16 parishes that have women who do work through the Auxiliary either as organized branches, or as Guilds taking up some part of the Auxiliary work.

Three of these parishes have two sections in their Auxiliary branches thus making 19 groups of women actively engaged in the work of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Williamsport Archdeaconry. Spring and Fall meetings were held in 1926, both being well attended. Our Bishop, Executive Secretary and several clergy were present at both Spring and Fall meetings, as well as representatives from many parish branches of the Auxiliary.

Three from this Archdeaconry attended Summer Conferences. One at Geneva, one at Frederick, Md. and one at Bethlehem. One parish also sent two of the younger girls to the Blue Mountain Conference for special training.

During Lent of 1926 Mission Study Classes were held in 11 branches in this Archdeaconry. In addition to this, there were 1 Pageant, 1 Lantern Slide Lecture, 2 Lectures on work in Cuba. 2 Woman's Bible Classes, and 10 branches have regular programs at their monthly meetings.

One young man from this Archdeaconry is now in the Mission Field: The Rev. Mr. Paul Hartzell, of St. James, Muncy, who is in the Philippine Islands.

9 Branches had one Corporate Communion in 1926, One Branch had 4, and One Branch had one each month. One branch had two. 2 Branches had special day of Intercessory prayer.

We are sorry to report that in this Archdeaconry, but 4 Branches are active in the Church Periodical Club work. One or two other Branches contribute a little to that work, but do not have a regular Secretary.

10 Branches have a Prayer-Partner, and a Secretary to write regularly to that Partner.

There are Church School Service Leagues in 4 parishes, Young Peoples Fellowship in 3, and 3 Parishes have a Girl's Friendly Society.

We have not a complete record of the names of those faithful women who were called Home in 1926, but we wish to mention those of whom we know.

Building Fund at State College.

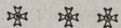
Therefore, the total amount given by the women of this Arch-

Educational work was carried on in two branches, Wellsboro having a Study Class and Program Meetings, and Coudersport a Study Class.

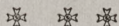

REPORT OF SUPPLY DEPARTMENT SECRETARY FOR 1926



I am very glad to meet my co-workers again, and I wish them a very Happy New Year and a Prosperous one also.

The work this past year has pleased me very much, you did good work, and the boxes sent were exceptionally fine, and I know were much appreciated.

I think it is due women to know a little more about the work, so will give you a few figures.

In our Diocese we have fifty-two (52) Auxiliaries, two (2) Guilds and one (1) Church Service League, the latter does some good work.

During the year 1926, in Lent and Advent, twenty (20) Auxiliaries sent out sixty-three (63) fine boxes, twenty Auxiliaries sent twenty-three (23) during Lent only; twenty-three boxes, one (1) Barrel and one (1) carton of good second hand Clothing were sent, three (3) Auxiliaries did not send during Lent and three (3) sent no boxes at all.

Our Mission in Porto Rico was in need of so many drugs, that one Auxiliary could not take that box, so thirteen (13) Auxiliaries sent checks covering the cost of drugs and transportation which amounted to \$71.21; the sum total for boxes and checks as reported to me is \$713.53.

I am interested in and love this work, for it gives us an insight and intimacy with the Missionaries and their work, and we become friendly with them.

Quite a number of the Auxiliaries have reported boxes and monies they have sent to Missions, to their Vice Presidents, but not to me. You may not realize that the Vice-Presidents reports and mine must have the same number of boxes and the values total the same, so you may realize the extra work, which must be done to correct these lists before the Annual report is read here.

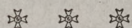

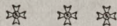

REPORT OF THE CHURCH PERIODICAL CLUB JAN. 1, 1926, TO JAN. 1, 1927



Once again it becomes my privilege to report to you on the work done, during the past year, for the Church Periodical Club. Before the recounting of achievements must come thanksgiving—thanksgiving for faithful officers through the Diocese, for equally faithful donors, those sending paid subscriptions and others forwarding magazines, regularly, year after year, and sharing not only their reading matter, but themselves with the faraway friends whom they serve. Without all these the Church Periodical Club could not exist.

The furnishing of books for the Medical Library of St. Luke's Hospital, Tokio, Japan, was the main objective of the C. P. C. for the year 1926. The Diocese of Harrisburg was apportioned \$50.00 toward this object, which was overpaid by \$1.00. We have Boone University, Wuchang, China, assigned for this year's work and I have been asked if we might possibly raise \$57.00 toward this object. I wrote Miss Thomas that I accepted the challenge feeling sure that the Parish Branches would stand with me.

Noted Progress was made in all phases of the work this year, the number of periodicals sent being 180 by 102 donors. The greatest advancement is shown in the number of paid subscriptions sent direct from the publishers, which totals 70 as against 36 for last year. This is most commendable, not so much that last year's figures are nearly doubled, but that it assures us that 70 friends are receiving their magazines regularly and systematically.

Mt. Calvary, Camp Hill and All Saints', Paradise have been enrolled and are now active in the work. while St. Luke's, Mt. Joy, St. Paul's, Manheim, Nativity, Newport, St. Matthew's, Sunbury and St. Paul's Lock Haven, have contributed to this year's work.

It is most gratifying to note that the sum realized from the sale of Religious Christmas Cards was doubled this year, the sales amounting to \$24.55. The C. P. C. realizing that year by year there is a growing demand for the Religious card at Christmas time, endeavors to fill this want with the help of the Branch Secretaries. These Cards imported from England, selling for five and ten cents, with a few priced at fifteen cents. I ask you to remember this phase of the work when you are planning your order cards for next Christmas and interview the C. P. C. Secretary of your Parish Branch.

The amount of money expended in the work was as follows:— to Mary E. Thomas, for St. Luke's Library, \$51.00, to Bishop Carson's work in Haiti, \$5.00, to one book for St. James' School, Wuhu, China \$2.50, to Christmas cards purchased \$12.47, to paid subscriptions from publishers \$68.95, to postage for Diocesan Directors \$8.65, leaving an unexpended balance in the treasury of \$5.73.

The attainment of our special aim for last year was fulfilled as every Missionary going from this Diocese into the foreign field was supplied with a paid subscription to the magazine of her choice.

There were 264 letters written and sent during the year in the interest of this work aside from the report blanks and numerous pieces of literature.

Mt. Alto was taken care of to the best of our ability—a birthday gift box, paid subscriptions entered for three of the patients, cards and gifts sent at Christmas time and the Chaplain supplied with two yearly subscriptions to the Young Churchman for use in the Kindergarten department which has lately been opened under the supervision of the Chaplain's wife, Mrs. A. A. Hughes. Too much praise cannot be accorded Mrs. John Miller, the C. P. C. Secretary of Trinity Church, Chambersburg, for her valuable services in collecting magazines and taking them to Mt. Alto for distribution among the patients. Much more can be done for this Institution, right in our midst, and I shall endeavor and make it our aim, this year, to look after, and provide for, the wants of the Chaplain in his work that he may carry on and instruct those under his care.

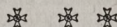
