




**CONSTITUTION OF THE HARRISBURG DIOCESAN
BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO
THE NATIONAL COUNCIL OF THE
PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH OF AMERICA**



ARTICLE I.

NAME

The name of the Association is the Harrisburg Diocesan Branch of the Women's Auxiliary to the National Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church of America.

ARTICLE II

OBJECT

The object of this Association is to carry out in the Diocese of Harrisburg, by united and systematic effort, the three great aims of the Women's Auxiliary, viz: Daily Prayer for Missions, the Study of Missions, and Systematic Giving for Missions.

ARTICLE III

MEMBERSHIP

Every baptized woman in the church is eligible to membership in the Parish Auxiliary, and all the Auxiliaries in the Diocese are members of this Association.

ARTICLE IV

OFFICERS

The elective officers of this Association shall consist of a President, a Vice President-at-Large, a Vice President of each Archdeaconry, a Treasurer, a United Thank Offering Custodian, a Recording Secretary, and a Corresponding Secretary. These officers, with the Chairman and Secretary of the Church Service League, and the Chairman of the Church School Service League and the appointed officers (as Supply Department Secretary, Assistant to Recording Secretary, Educational Secretary and C. P. C. Director) shall form the Executive Board.

ARTICLE V

DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The President shall be elected at an annual meeting for a term of three years and may not succeed herself. It shall be the duty of the President to call meetings of the Association and the Executive Board, and preside at them. She shall also exercise a general supervision of all the work in the diocese and make a yearly report to the Association.

Section 2. The Vice President-at-Large shall be elected at an annual meeting and perform the duties of the President when she is unable to do so.

Section 3. Each Archdeaconry shall as soon as possible after the election of the President, elect from the three women in each Archdeaconry, previously nominated by the Bishop, a Vice President to serve three years.

Section 4. The Vice President of each Archdeaconry shall co-operate with the President in promoting local intelligence and interest, and in directing and organizing work in her own Archdeaconry.

Section 5. The Recording and Corresponding Secretary shall keep the minutes of the yearly meeting and the meetings of the Executive Board, conduct all necessary correspondence, having charge of the writing, printing and sending out of reports and other documents, and make the yearly report.

Section 6. The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all moneys for the expense fund of the Association. Also receive and transmit to the Missionary Treasurer such other moneys, sent to her and make a yearly report.

Section 7. The United Thank Offering Custodian shall receive, hold and transmit all United Thank Offering moneys and make a yearly report.

Section 8. The Educational Secretary shall have general supervision of all the Missionary Educational Work carried on under the auspices of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Section 9. The term of office of all elective officers shall be limited to a term of three (3) years, and shall be without right of succession.

ARTICLE VI

MEETINGS

There shall be one general meeting of this Association in each year and other meetings may be called by the Executive Board.

ARTICLE VII

AMENDMENTS

This Constitution and By-Laws may be altered or amended by a two-third vote of the whole number of delegates present at a yearly meeting.

BY-LAWS

Section 1. A Nominating Committee consisting of one member from each Archdeaconry, shall be appointed by the President one month before the annual meeting.

Section 2. Elections shall be by ballots, and each branch shall be entitled to two votes, and an additional vote for each ten members or fraction thereof. These votes shall be cast by properly accredited delegates or their alternates.

Section 3. Delegates to the Triennial Meeting of the General Auxiliary shall be the President and four from the membership of the Auxiliary, and five alternates from the membership of the Auxiliary, to be elected by ballot.


Section 4. There shall be three delegates to the Provincial Meeting who shall be the President Ex-Officio, and two from the membership, to be chosen by ballot.

Section 5. An expense fund shall be provided by this Association for the necessary expenses, namely: Printing, postage, stationery, traveling expenses of speakers and officers, etc., to be arranged at the discretion of the Executive Board.

Rule 1. Ten per cent. of the total amount pledged for the Expense Fund, be set aside for a Sinking Fund to be used at the direction of the Executive Board. All requisitions to be signed by the President.

Rule 2. At the Annual Meeting, the hostess branch shall entertain, over night, members of the Executive Board, Speakers on the Program and two delegates from each branch. Where more than two register from any branch, they shall pay for their own entertainment.





We have on hand approximately \$20,000, leaving about \$22,000 still to be paid. While this is a splendid report, we feel it will take our every effort to collect the remaining amount, as we all know the last few thousands are always the most difficult. It is the wish of your Diocesan Chairman, Mrs. C. H. Boyer, that you unite with her in definite prayer and work that we, in our Diocese may "fill full" our share of responsibility in this matter."



MINUTES OF THE 23RD ANNUAL MEETING



The twenty-third annual meeting of the Harrisburg Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary was held in St. Stephen's Church, Harrisburg, Tuesday and Wednesday, February 7th and 8th, 1928.

At 3:30 P. M. Tuesday, Mrs. E. L. Herndon, Educational Leader of the Diocese of Bethlehem led a Discussion Class, using "A Discussion Course on the Bible" by Laura F. Boyer and Marella Haif. One hundred and fifteen women attended this session, and expressed themselves as eager to complete the course under Mrs. Herndon's Leadership Wednesday morning.

The Rev. Paul S. Atkins of York led the Quiet Hour and used for his meditations the subject, "Spiritual Growth", his text being Ephesians 4-13. More than one hundred women attended the Quiet Hour.

The first speaker at the evening mass meeting was our own Bishop Darlington, who spoke of the Romance of Missions, as he found it in his visits to the Missions of this Diocese.

Bishop Sterrett of the Diocese of Bethlehem preached a very Spiritual and helpful sermon, using St. Paul's second letter to Timothy, Chapter 1, verse 7. It would be well for all who are studying "A Church Awake" to read Second Timothy, 1st chapter, beginning at the 5th verse. It was a joy to have our neighboring Bishop visit with us. This whole service was beautiful and inspiring.

The Holy Communion was celebrated Wednesday morning at 7:30 A. M. by the Rt. Rev. James H. Darlington and the Rev. Oscar F. R. Treder, D. D. of St. Stephen's. About one hundred women attended this service.

The business sessions opened at 9:30 A. M. with prayers and addresses of welcome by the Rector, Dr. Treder and Mrs. John Kunkel, President of St. Stephen's branch of the Woman's Auxiliary. The President read her third annual message, which was followed by the roll call of Branches.

Reports were given by the Treasurer, U. T. O. Custodian, Supply Department Secretary, C. P. C. Director, Acting Educational Secretary, Prayer-Partner Secretary, Diocesan Secretary, which were accepted and placed on file.

Mrs. Marcellin C. Adams of Pittsburg, Pa., gave a talk on the "Work of the Woman's Auxiliary", stressing the importance of each part of the work, and that, there is a very definite place for women of all ages in the work. She said we must create atmosphere, interest, enthusiasm, and opinion for missionary side of our work in order to increase the resources of the Church. The women of the Diocese always feel it a great privilege to have Mrs. Adams meet with them.

After Mrs. Adams' talk, Mrs. Herndon continued the Discussion Course which she started Tuesday afternoon. The course was very interesting and created a desire for further study of the Bible. The women of the Auxilliary were glad to welcome Mrs. Herndon and hope to have her visit with them again.

The Rev. A. M. Judd, Executive Secretary of the Diocese, said the noon-day prayers.

Mrs. A. M. Drinkwater, Chairman of the Nominating Committee presented the names of the nominees for President, four Delegates to the

General Convention to be held in Washington D. C., and five Alternates. The names of the nominees were placed on a black board. It was voted that the nominations be accepted as they had been presented in sections.

As only five nominations were made for Alternates and only five were to be elected, it was voted to have the Diocesan Secretary cast the ballot for the election of the five Alternates.

Ballots were distributed and the Delegates were instructed to hand their votes to the Tellers, Mrs. H. E. Jenkins, Tyrone; Mrs. Bright, Sunbury; Miss Lilly J. Rockwell, Blossburg and Mrs. Baker, Harrisburg; on their way out to lunch.

Lunch was served at the Craver Tea Room.

After lunch Mrs. Drinkwater announced the result of the Election, which was as follows:—

Mrs. E. M. Fleming, Altoona; Mrs. J. S. Stevens, Blossburg; Mrs. A. H. Wooley, Danville; Mrs. J. S. Spotts, Lancaster; Mrs. Albra Reeder, Williamsport.

The President, Mrs. Caleb S. Brinton, is a Delegate to the General Convention by virtue of her office.

Following the report of the Election, the Vice-Presidents of the four Archdeaconries gave their reports. Mrs. James H. Darlington, Chairman of the Mt. Alto Committee gave a report of the work at Mt. Alto. These reports were accepted and placed on file.

Mrs. E. M. Fleming of Altoona and Mrs. S. H. Wigton of Philipsburg gave splendid reports of the Province Meeting held in Roanoke, Va. The note of both reports was personal responsibility for the carrying out of the Church's Program.

Mrs. Reed, a missionary from Liberia, was to have spoken, but illness prevented her attendance at the meeting.

The time allotted to Mrs. Reed was given to Mrs. Adams who very generously answered questions concerning the work of the Auxiliary, and told how to make meetings interesting and gave suggestions as to how to get women to come to the meetings. She also told of the coming General Convention and of the wonderful privilege to witness the presenting of the United Thank Offering. The Special for the next Triennial will be for the Great Advance Work of the Church.

Mr. Charles H. Graves, Headmaster, Yeates School, Lancaster, Pa., presented the subject of Yates School as a diocesan Project.

The Bishop and Mr. Judd explained the Millersburg situation, and after hearing them, Mrs. William Rote offered the following resolution:—

Resolved:—That St. Bartholomew's Church, Millersburg, be authorized to draw on the funds contributed by the Woman's Auxiliary for a Parish House in Millersburg the sum of \$111.98 to pay the Paving Assessment recently levied against the Mission Congregation.

The adoption of this resolution was moved by Mrs. M. W. Van Horne, and seconded by Mrs. H. S. Knight. The motion was carried.

It was moved and carried that the following resolutions be accepted.

Resolved:—That it is with great regret we the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council in Annual session, are denied the privilege, through illness, and for other reasons of having with us, our Diocesan Missionary to Liberia, Mrs. Josselyn Reed, and our Past President, Mrs. Paul Wirt, our fellow members, Mrs. Richard R. M. Wharton, Mrs. W. E. Johnston, Mrs. Albion Ross and Mrs. R. S. Stout, and be it further

Resolved:—That we voice our regret at their absence by accepting this resolution, and that a note of cheer be sent to each of them conveying our love and best wishes.

Resolved:— That it is with a deep sense of loss that we, the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council, in Annual session, record the passing, during the past year, from the Church Militant to the Church Triumphant of three from this Diocese who gave of their best, all being truly missionary, and that we adopt this minute of respect in memory of the Rev. Messrs. Leroy F. Baker, William Dorwart and William Heakes by rising for a moment of silence and that mention be made of this resolution on the minutes of this meeting.

Resolved:—That a rising vote of thanks be given St. Stephen's Parish branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council for their kindness and gracious hospitality during our stay with them and that the same be spread on the minutes of this meeting.

There were present at this meeting 184 women from 33 parishes, 1 from the Diocese of Pittsburg, 1 from the Diocese of Bethlehem, 1 from the Diocese of New York, 2 Bishops, 9 Clergy and a number of laymen.

The offering amounted to \$117.57. After the expenses of the meeting were paid, \$32.07 was turned into the Diocesan Auxiliary Treasury.



PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE 1927



The twelve months between last annual meeting, held in Altoona in February, 1927, and this one now being held in St. Stephen's Church, Harrisburg, are the shortest twelve months I have ever spent. You know it is said that when time passes so quickly one is getting old. You may draw your own conclusions.

The past year has been a quiet one in our Diocese, with the work moving along towards the goals at which we are aiming.

I have been disappointed with the slowness of nearly all of the Parish Branches in complying with the requests from the National Executive Board. First—that each branch should have a representative for the spirit of Missions. We as a Diocese have fallen down very badly on that, and I have requested you all, at each Archdiaconal meeting, since the Triennial Meeting at New Orleans, to go back to your Parishes and appoint in each one a representative. I have had more letters concerning subscriptions to the Spirit of Missions, from the Church Missions House, than on any other subject. Second—that Two Collections of the United Thank Offering, one in the Spring, the other in the Fall, of each year should be established in each parish. I have never before had the courage to stress this matter, as we have not done it in my own parish until this year. During the past year we instituted the National Executive Council's plan, and in our two collections of this past year we so far surpassed our last year's offering that we were all astonished at the amount.

I have heard of only one parish that has fallen below previous years on the two collections. I urge you to go back to your parishes and to put both of these requests into effect at once, so that your new president can go to the coming Triennial at Washington, and not be ashamed of you; being forced to confess that you are not willing to comply with the very few requests that are sent to you from the National Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary.

The United Thank Offering must be in early this year, in September. As you know, the date and place of the Triennial Meeting is October 10th to 27th at Washington, D. C. Slips have already been given to each Archdiaconal Vice-President to distribute, bearing information concerning hotels and rates. Since we are so near, we should have a very large representation from our Diocese.

The World Day of Prayer for members of all Communions will be observed on the First Friday in Lent, February the 24th.

Once again, and for the last time, I thank all of the members of the Executive Board for their help and kindness to me. Our Educational Secretary, Mrs. Ross, during the past year, felt that she could no longer carry on the work. The Diocesan Secretary, Miss Batzle, was willing to add the rather heavy labors of Educational Secretary to her already heavy work as Secretary. She attended the Conference at Frederick, Md., and came through most successfully. If Miss Batzle is willing to keep the Educational Secretaryship you must all help her in every way she desires.



Several days of Intercessory Prayers and devotional meetings.

In January, 1927, Miss Laura Boyer, of the Church Missions House, held an all day session for Study Class leaders at St. Paul's, Harrisburg, on "Beyond the City Limits." In the evening a Missionary Mass Meeting was held.

In November, at Trinity, Steelton, another regional meeting for women was held for the study and discussion of "A Church Awake", with Mrs. Pancoast, of Philadelphia, as leader and instructor.

We feel that through these meetings, a greater interest and regard for the future work of our Church will be stressed, and every Parish will learn to contribute liberally and promptly what is assigned them for the extension of the Kingdom.

Eight (8) people attended Summer Conferences; two hundred and two (202) attended A. D. Meetings at Shippensburg and Millersburg.

In the spring, The Home for the Aged was dedicated at Shippensburg. and after the luncheon, a general inspection of the Home was made. At these meetings quiet hours were led by Reverend Knickel and Reverend Barton.

The Corporate Gift was stressed, also the importance of the semi-annual collection of Blue Boxes.

Mrs. Heiges, York, asked the co-operation of all mothers throughout the A. D. with the Betty Washington Camp for Girls near York.

Mrs. Phillips hopes that not only this A. D., but the others, remember The Home for the Aged in the way of furniture, linens and groceries, etc., through the year.

The Educational Secretary, Miss Batzle, spoke on "A Church Awake", in preparation for the 1928 Study Classes, at the Millersburg meeting.

Mrs. Spotts, St. John's, Lancaster, (A. D. Educational Secretary) urged the Branches to have a Study Class, and Reading Circles, using the Spirit of Missions and Church Papers, and having every Branch use part of each meeting for this Missionary information; and rather than having meetings only business ones, make them vitally alert, interesting and informative, which can be had, if an Educational Secretary is appointed in each Branch to make this monthly program.

This A. D. held an hour's memorial to the late beloved Archdeacon Dorwart, and former Archdeacon Baker, of Harrisburg. Addresses were made by our Bishop, Mr. Judd, and Reverend Foulkes and the following beautiful tribute from Reverend Bennett, Christ Church, Williamsport, was read by the Vice President:

"William Dorwart was a good, a faithful friend. He was a real man, with the ability to do a man's task; and yet—he possessed a wonderful—almost feminine tenderness. He had a rare commonsense, and the great gift of humor. The mere fact that he was content to labor as a Parish Priest in a small village for nearly three decades and make his influence felt far outside the bounds of that community shows that his conception of the Church's Priesthood was truly Catholic.

Like the old Roman poet—Nothing human was alien to him. He was, indeed, God's priest, a true man, and we loved him. May he rest in peace".

The Reverend Mr. Treder, of St. Stephen's, Harrisburg, spoke feelingly and solicitously of the Mission of Christ, at the Fall meeting, and asked the women of the Church to search and find the things in life really worth while, and time for Christ's Mission to all mankind.

The Vice President explained every phase of the Church's Program and the part women of the Church could and should have in it, through the Auxiliary.

In Educational Work, there were sixteen (16) study classes, on "Beyond the City Limits"; six (6) reading and discussion groups, five (5) Bible classes; three (3) pageants and several lantern slide lectures. Reporting, too, were eighteen (18) women who read the Study Book but could not attend the classes. Our President, Mrs. Hartman, asked the Presidents of each Branch to appoint a committee to solicit subscriptions for the Diocesan paper, and the "Spirit of Missions. These Church papers should be in every home.

Nine (9) Branches in this A. D. gave two hundred and fifty-five Dollars (\$255.00) to the Oxley Memorial Fund.

The Branches that have reported, report over seven hundred (700) Churchman subscriptions and one hundred seventy-nine (179) to Spirit of Missions.

In distributing the S. D. Envelopes for the Corporate Gift of all Church women, the Vice President explained how very necessary it is to have every Branch support the National Council in its work of growth and maintenance, there being no other source of revenue for the support of the Church's Program.

Your Vice President visited eleven (11) Parishes, spent several days in the interest of our Missions at Beartown and Blue Ridge; attended four (4) Council Meetings; two (2) Ex. Board meetings; addressed at a vesper service the women of Holy Cross, and their friends, on Woman's part in the Church and its Program; attended two (2) meetings of the Yeates School (Diocesan) for Boys at Lancaster, having been elected Chairman of the Publicity Committee to the Board of Governors; attended the funerals of Newport and Harrisburg of the Reverend William Dowart and Reverend Leroy Baker; mailed 1800 envelopes (Self-Denial) and 150 post cards and 386 letters pertaining to A. D. and Diocesan work, during 1927.

REPORT OF VICE PRESIDENT OF WILLIAMSPORT ARCHDEACONRY

The Vice President of the Williamsport Archdeaconry begs to report the following accomplished during the year 1927.

We have decreased in the number of parishes doing Auxiliary work, but those parishes where women are active, have increased their activities, so that we can report growth along all lines.

Our United Thank Offering is larger than in 1926, being \$1174.92 in 1927 an increase of \$31.76.

Our pledges and money gifts have increased over \$200.00. The amount given in regular pledges and the specials asked, being \$1309.22.

The Branches in this Archdeaconry have sent 38 boxes and 3 checks at the request of the Diocesan Supply Secretary, the total value being \$912.91. There were also sent, by request 16 boxes of second hand clothing. 6 boxes and 5 checks valued at \$259.46 were sent independent of the Supply Department. Within this Diocese were sent 10 boxes with a value of \$192.82, thus making a total of 70 boxes and 8 checks with a total value of \$1365.19.

Therefore the total of money given in pledges, specials, Corporate Gift, United Thank Offering, and boxes by 17 active Branches is \$3849.37.

Our Spring and Fall Archdeaconry meetings were very well attended. We were honored at the Spring meeting with the presence of the Most Reverend John G. Murray, our Presiding Bishop, who gave us a message of inspiration and encouragement.

There were three adults and five young people from this Archdeaconry who attended the Blue Mountain Conference at Hood College, Maryland.

Programs are carried on in nearly all the Branches in this Archdeaconry.

10 Branches had Lenten Study Classes; all Branches had one Corporate Communion. 2 Branches had 2, and one Branch had one Corporate Communion each month.

3 Branches had a day of Intercessory Prayer; one Branch had 8 Quiet Days. There were 2 Center meetings, and 1 Lantern Slide Lecture.

8 Branches share in the work of the Church Periodical Club; 4 Parishes have Parish Councils; 3 have Girls Friendly Societies; 4 follow the Church School Service Programs; and 5 have Young People Fellowships.

As far as we can ascertain, about 130 persons subscribe to, and read the Spirit of Missions. This number does not include the clergy.

During the year 1927, I made visits in 7 parishes other than my own, wrote 424 letters to Branches, and to individuals, mailed 22 packages of literature, and 3 long distance calls, and led 2 Lenten Study Classes, one in our own parish and one out of town.

We regret the departure of the Rev. Mr. and Mrs. Asheton Martin from our Archdeaconry and Diocese, and wish them the best of everything in their new field.


During the year 1927, I made visits in 7 parishes other than my in this Archdeaconry, 29 faithful Church women from 10 parishes.

We greatly enjoyed having four Diocesan officers with us. Something quite unusual for the Northern Archdeaconry. Mrs. Hartman, the President, brought us a Message. Mrs. C. H. Boyer, Treasurer, told of the Corporate Gift. Mrs. Page, U. T. O. Custodian, outlined the work of the United Thank Offering, and Miss Batzle, Secretary, presented the different kinds of work of the Woman's Auxiliary, especially stressing the Educational Work, and telling something of the Church's Study Book for the Year, "A Church Awake", by Dr. W. C. Sturgis.

Deaconess Paine of China was with us and told many interesting things about her work.

We are glad to report that Westfield has started a branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, with new officers, and a good report will be expected from it in 1928.

Let us hope and pray for more and better work in 1928.



REPORT OF THE SECRETARY OF THE PRAYER- PARTNERSHIP PLAN FOR 1927

A Prayer for a Prayer-Partner

Almighty and most merciful God, we humbly beseech Thee, for the merits of Thy dear Son, to pour out Thy Holy Spirit upon all our Missionaries, especially upon our Prayer-Partners; and to crown their labors with success in the gathering of souls into Thy Kingdom, to the honor and praise of Thy glorious Name, who art Father, Son and Holy Ghost, one God, world with out end. Amen.

My message this year deals, not with the Prayer-Partnership Plan, familiar to us all, but with our Prayer-Partners.

Three of our Prayer-Partners have had to resign their posts because of ill health: Archdeacon Drane of Fort Yukon, Alaska, has spent more than a year in a tubercular sanatorium in Asheville, North Carolina. He is better, but not able to resume his mission work. His address is 6 Coleman Avenue, Asheville, N. C. Mr. Paul Hartzell our Philippine missionary has been in Clifton Springs Sanatorium for a number of months. His permanent address is Muncy, Pa. Mr. and Mrs. Frank Persons have left the mountains in Virginia, and after a rest, are now doing rural work in New Jersey. We are glad to retain them as active workers. Mr. Persons writes as follows, "We most decidedly and emphatically do need and want our Prayer-Partners Prayers. Neither of us are well, I was completely broken down, and while better, still have far to go. Our three small (almost defunct) missions all need your prayers. It is an awful up hill bit of work, but all is slowly growing."

Let us not forget to pray for our resigned partners, for whom inactivity is hard to bear. They probably need our prayers as much in their convalescence as in their mission fields.

Several new partners have been given to us. Miss Bertha M. Beard, care of the Rt. Rev. G. F. Mosher, D. D., 567 Calle Issac Peral, Manila, Philippine Islands; Miss Annie Park, All Saints House, Elkton, Va., Route 4. Miss Beard is our Philippine Missionary, and it is hoped Mr. Hartzell's partners will be interested in her. Miss Park, a nurse, was described as a heroic young Englishwoman, who has managed to fight successfully, to keep alive the sanatorium for tubercular children. We hope that all who are interested in the mountain work will pray for Miss Park, and her work.

I am adding a part of a letter from Miss Browne. "I spent most of last year in Ontario, Oregon, which place I left in November, with a happy heart, seeing them with a building of their own, a combined parish house and enclosed sanctuary, and a resident minister. Now I am tackling the most pioneer piece of work, I have yet undertaken, in Beems, Oregon, a little town up in the mountains (4900 feet high), where we have no building of any kind, in which to carry on our work. Our Church School is conducted in the upper hall of a private home, the house of a teacher. We have a fine little group of sixteen boys and girls, as interested and eager children as I have ever had the pleasure of meeting.

We have only an occasional service by the Archdeacon, held in the Masonic Hall. We have organized a nice Guild, and had eleven women at our first meeting. They voted to have two meetings a month, and at each meeting to have a study program, which pleased me very much.

It is so hard to get these women out here to have study groups. This is an unattractive little town, but very charming people live here. It is an isolated place, off of the main railroad line, and it takes one all day to travel on a mixed freight and passenger train to get here."



REPORT OF THE CHURCH PERIODICAL CLUB JAN. 1 1927 TO JAN. 1 1928

As a result of another year's efforts in the work of the Church Periodical Club, it might be of interest to sum up a few of the achievements gained. Our Library Quota of \$57.00 was met in full, due to a response of a number of S. O. S. letters sent out toward the end of the year. The report blanks, received from the Secretary, show that 175 periodicals were forwarded by 94 donors, and that of the number sent 89 were paid subscriptions. All our Diocesan missionaries are being furnished with paid subscriptions and the letters of acknowledgment received show how truly grateful they feel. About 5,000 miscellaneous articles, including books, Christmas, Easter and Birthday cards, calendars, odd magazines, Postcard booklets, banners, blotters, etc., were sent to schools, hospitals and individuals. The sum realized from the sale of Religious Christmas Cards totaled but \$12.00 this year as only a few Secretaries had the time to give to this work. Money received by me during the year was expended as follows: Miss Mary E. Thomas for the Library Quota, \$57.00; To Christmas Cards purchased, \$14.25; To paid subscriptions from publishers, \$101.92; To the Rev. A. A. Hughes, Mt. Alto, to subscriptions to "Witness" and birthday gift, \$13.25; To postage for Diocesan Director, \$9.12; Leaving an unexpended balance on hand of \$12.88.

As always, the correspondence during the year was heavy and much valuable time was bestowed without any result whatever. Of the report blanks sent out only ten were returned so that in many cases it was necessary to wade through my yearly records to get figures for this report, as well as the one sent to the executive office in New York. May I ask, in the future, your cooperation so that a report truly accurate may be given?

The help given to the Chaplain at Mt. Alto was greatly appreciated and I would ask your continuance in supplying him with church literature for distribution among his patients. The spiritual education of these unfortunates is his work and we ought to do our part in assisting him in that work.

I would suggest the advisability of having a C. P. C. Secretary in every Section B, as well as Sections A of the Auxiliary (to work in conjunction with each other) who could try and interest her fellow-members in this work by having them send magazines, and birthday and holiday greeting cards to the young girl patients at Mt. Alto and elsewhere. There are numbers of schools and children's hospitals in which scrap books and postcard work can be used to great advantage.

My special plea is that you remember your Prayer Partners with a paid subscription thereby bringing them into closer bonds of fellowship by adding a personal touch to your Prayers. It can be given by an Auxiliary branch, or by an individual member, or by several members clubbing together.

Finally: I would ask that you do not neglect forwarding your finished magazines. While many donors have felt that the postage was prohibitory and have withdrawn their magazines, it has been encouraging to find others who count this sending as part of their missionary work and continue it at more or less sacrifice.

May I close by quoting from the Massachusetts branch of the C. P. C.?

"Friends who have good books to spare
Please bear us in your mind,
Send them to the C. P. C.
And a place for them we'll find."
