**CONSTITUTION OF THE HARRISBURG DIOCESAN
BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO
THE NATIONAL COUNCIL OF THE
PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH OF AMERICA**



ARTICLE I.

NAME

The name of the Association is the Harrisburg Diocesan Branch of the Women's Auxiliary to the National Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church of America.

ARTICLE II

OBJECT

The object of this Association is to carry out in the Diocese of Harrisburg, by united and systematic effort, the three great aims of the Women's Auxiliary, viz: Daily Prayer for Missions, the Study of Missions, and Systematic Giving for Missions.

ARTICLE III

MEMBERSHIP

Every baptized woman in the church is eligible to membership in the Parish Auxiliary, and all the Auxiliaries in the Diocese are members of this Association.

ARTICLE IV

OFFICERS

The elective officers of this Association shall consist of a President, a Vice President-at-Large, a Vice President of each Archdeaconry, a Treasurer, a United Thank Offering Custodian, a Recording Secretary, and a Corresponding Secretary. These officers, with the Chairman and Secretary of the Church Service League, and the Chairman of the Church School Service League and the appointed officers (as Supply Department Secretary, Assistant to Recording Secretary, Educational Secretary and C. P. C. Director) shall form the Executive Board.

ARTICLE V

DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The President shall be elected at an annual meeting for a term of three years and may not succeed herself. It shall be the duty of the President to call meetings of the Association and the Executive Board, and preside at them. She shall also exercise a general supervision of all the work in the diocese and make a yearly report to the Association.

Section 2. The Vice President-at-Large shall be elected at an annual meeting and perform the duties of the President when she is unable to do so.

Section 3. Each Archdeaconry shall as soon as possible after the election of the President, elect from the three women in each Archdeaconry, previously nominated by the Bishop, a Vice President to serve three years.

Section 4. The Vice President of each Archdeaconry shall co-operate with the President in promoting local intelligence and interest, and in directing and organizing work in her own Archdeaconry.

Section 5. The Recording and Corresponding Secretary shall keep the minutes of the yearly meeting and the meetings of the Executive Board, conduct all necessary correspondence, having charge of the writing, printing and sending out of reports and other documents, and make the yearly report.

Section 6. The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all moneys for the expense fund of the Association. Also receive and transmit to the Missionary Treasurer such other moneys sent to her and make a yearly report.

Section 7. The United Thank Offering Custodian shall receive, hold and transmit all United Thank Offering moneys and make a yearly report.

Section 8. The Educational Secretary shall have general supervision of all the Missionary Educational Work carried on under the auspices of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Section 9. The term of office of all elected officers shall be limited to a term of three (3) years, and shall be without right of succession.

ARTICLE VI MEETINGS

There shall be one general meeting of this Association in each year and other meetings may be called by the Executive Board.

ARTICLE VII AMENDMENTS

This Constitution and By-Laws may be altered or amended by a two-third vote of the whole number of delegates present at a yearly meeting.

BY-LAWS

Section 1. A Nominating Committee consisting of one member from each Archdeaconry, shall be appointed by the President one month before the annual meeting.

Section 2. Elections shall be by ballots, and each branch shall be entitled to two votes, and an additional vote for each ten members or fraction thereof. These votes shall be cast by properly accredited delegates or their alternates.

Section 3. Delegates to the Triennial Meeting of the General Auxiliary shall be the President and four from the membership of the Auxiliary, and five alternates from the membership of the Auxiliary, to be elected by ballot.

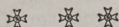
Section 4. There shall be three delegates to the Provincial Meeting who shall be the President Ex-Officio, and two from the membership, to be chosen by ballot.

Section 5. An expense fund shall be provided by this Association for the necessary expenses, namely: Printing, postage, stationery, traveling expenses of speakers and officers, etc., to be arranged at the discretion of the Executive Board.

Rule 1. Ten per cent. of the total amount pledged for the Expense Fund, be set aside for a Sinking Fund to be used at the direction of the Executive Board. All requisitions to be signed by the President.

Rule 2. At the Annual Meeting, the hostess branch shall entertain, over night, members of the Executive Board, Speakers on the Program and two delegates from each branch. Where more than two register from any branch, they shall pay for their own entertainment.

NOON DAY PRAYER FOR THE MISSION OF THE CHURCH

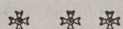

PRAYER FOR PEACE

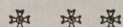

Resolution on the United Thank Offering of 1931.

Resolved: That the United Thank Offering of 1931 be given to the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, to be used as follows:

One-tenth of the Offering to be added to the permanent trust fund, the income from which is to be used for retiring allowances of United Thank Offering workers.

That at least \$75,000 be held in reserve for training of United Thank Offering workers, any surplus to revert to the general fund.

And the sum of not less than two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000) to be appropriated for buildings to be erected in the mission field.

The balance of the Offering, together with all interest earned thereon to be used by the Missionary Society as directed by the National Council, for the work of women in the missionary enterprises of the Church including their training, equipping, sending and support and for their care when sick and disabled, the appointment of said women having been approved by the Executive Board.

Be It Further Resolved: That to our United Gifts shall be added our united and earnest prayers, that God will put into the hearts of many faithful women to give themselves and their substance, to the work of the Master in the Mission Field.

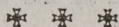

MINUTES OF THE 24TH ANNUAL MEETING



The twenty-fourth annual meeting of the Harrisburg Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary was held in St. James' Church, Lancaster, Pa., Monday and Tuesday, February 4th and 5th, 1929. The meeting was held one day ahead of the regular date of meeting, in order that the Bishop could attend both the Auxiliary Meeting, and the Diocesan Council which was meeting February 5th to elect a Suffragan Bishop.

At 2:30 P. M. Monday, Mrs. Charles E. Betticher of Baltimore gave an interesting lantern slide lecture on the Missions and Work of the Church. We saw in an intimate way the work the Church is trying to do in all lands, among all people.

Mrs. Symington, the leader of the Church Mission of Help in the Diocese of Maryland, gave a vivid picture of the possibilities of Christian Social Service.

Mrs. William Brune, Secretary of the Diocese of Maryland, brought greetings and expressed her interest in the manner in which the Diocese of Harrisburg conducts its annual meetings.

The Rev. H. D. Viets, Rector of St. John's, Carlisle, led the Quiet Hour and used as a basis for the meditations, the meditations of Walter Carey, Bishop of Bloemfontain. The whole message was one of Personal Religion, and how we might better know the mind of God in order to carry out His will. A large number of women and men attended the Quiet Hour and appreciated the helpfulness of the meditations.

The first speaker at the evening missionary mass meeting was Bishop Darlington, who brought his ever encouraging message to the Woman's Auxiliary. He spoke especially of the increase of knowledge of the meaning of missions.

The Rev. H. W. Forman, Secretary for the Rural Work, National Council, was the special speaker of the meeting. He told of the disappointments and the many privileges of the Rural Work. In speaking of the handicaps of the work, he said, the most serious is the lack of knowledge. Mr. Forman brought the Rural Work problem to our attention in a clear, concise manner and showed us that it is a workable proposition. The 5th Sunday after Easter is to be kept by all Christian Churches as Rural Sunday.

The Holy Communion was celebrated Tuesday morning at 7:30 A. M. by the Rev. C. J. Twombly, Rector of St. James', and the Rev. P. F. Houghton, Rector of St. John's, Lancaster. The beautiful setting for the most beautiful services, exemplified the words "In the beauty of Holiness."

The business sessions opened at 9:15 A. M. with prayers and addresses of welcome by the Rector, Dr. Twombly and Mrs. John A. Weimer, President of St. James' Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary. Dr. Twombly showed us by a story how those who seek Christ, find Him, although conditions make it seem impossible at times. Mrs. Weimer in her welcome spoke of the inspiration received at the Annual Meetings and the encouragement to go on with the Master's work because we are all bound together for the one great purpose of bringing the knowledge of Christ to all people.

The President, Mrs. Caleb S. Brinton, read her first Annual Message. The message was filled with information and inspiration. The full text of the Message will be found on a separate page of the Annual Report.

Roll call of Branches followed the President's Message.

The President announced that the 2nd week in Lent be set aside as a week of self sacrifice. The offerings to be sent as our share to the Corporate Gift to help complete the amount for Santa Domingo before Easter.

We were asked to observe the World Wide Day of Prayer; and not to forget the special prayers and offerings on Good Friday for the work in Jerusalem.

It was voted to adopt and comply with the following resolution: Resolved—That the Self Denial Week Offering be given to the Corporate Gift Committee in memory of Mrs. Sara M. Wirt and Mrs. John I. Hartman.

A motion was made and carried to send a telegram of greetings to our beloved Treasurer, Mrs. C. H. Boyer who was not able to be with us at this time. Telegram to be sent before noon.

Before presenting the Treasurer's Report the following Message from Mrs. Boyer was read by the Secretary:

In the four years I have served as your Treasurer I want to thank you for your kindness and promptness in paying your pledges.

It is with deep regret I cannot come to my last meeting as your Treasurer. I want to leave a last message with you.

Another gratifying year has come to a close, and I thank you all for your co-operation and generosity. It is not absolutely necessary that all moneys be sent to your Treasurer; but unless they are so sent, there is no way to have a complete record of what our Auxiliary workers are doing. I would not curb your generosity which prompts giving on the spot; but I often wish at the close of the year for a full record of our work. While I know of hundreds of dollars which have gone to the worthiest causes, it is not possible to include them in the report that goes to headquarters. Nevertheless the good work has been done, and it is with appreciation and gratitude for this work of the past year, that we turn with cheerfulness and faith to the work of the year to come. The C. P. C. Director and Supply Secretary were present and gave their reports.

Mrs. C. J. Hieges, Diocesan Girls' Friendly President, read a report of the work of that branch of work.

Miss Margaret Ridgley of the House of Bethany, Cape Mount, Liberia, told of the work in Liberia and the opportunity for Christian Leadership. Miss Ridgley has been in the work in Liberia for nearly twenty years. It was an honor and a privilege to have Miss Ridgley with us during the Annual Meeting.

Mrs. Arthur L. Gammuck, a U. T. O. Field Worker, told of the opportunities for service the women have in the Church's Work.

The noon day meditations and prayers led by the Rev. H. G. Hartman were in keeping with the spirit of the occasion.

Mrs. John Kunkel, Chairman of the Nominating Committee presented the names of the nominees for Secretary, Treasurer, Two Delegates and two Alternates to the Province Meeting.

The ballots were distributed and the Delegates were instructed to hand their votes to the Tellers, Miss Furst, Mrs. Miller, Mrs. Wells, Mrs. Brosious, on their way out to lunch.

Lunch was served at the Brunswick Hotel.

The afternoon session was opened with the singing of a hymn after which Mrs. Kunkel announced the result of the Election which was as follows:

Mrs. Gammuck again presented the work of the Church and each one's share in it. She especially stressed Personal Religion and personal effort. Mrs. Gammuck's talks created a great deal of interest and finally ended in a Conference on general work, the U. T. O. and Supply Work.

Mrs. Peck was with us and brought cheer, encouragement and useful helps for the work.

Mrs. J. H. Darlington, Chairman of the Mt. Alto Committee presented a detailed report of the committee.

Mrs. John Miller of Chambersburg, a member of the Mt. Alto Committee gave a very graphic description of the kinds of work the Rev. and Mrs. Hughes are doing at South Mountain.

Mrs. A. M. Drinkwater gave a report of the high lights of the Publicity of the General Convention.

Mrs. Logue of Williamsport read the report of the General Convention prepared by Mrs. Reeder of Williamsport, a Delegate to the Convention.

The President read Mrs. Boyer's report and the Secretary read Mrs. Allan Page's report.

The reports were well worth hearing and we all lived over again the wonderful days of the Convention.

The Secretary presented the Prayer-Partner Report also a summary of the Educational work. The Secretary also had an exhibit and a Book store at the Annual Meeting.

A motion was made and carried to dispense with the reading of the Archdeaconry Reports at this meeting. The reports are printed in full in the Annual report.

The report of the Resolution Committee was accepted as read. The Resolutions will be found under Report of Resolution Committee in Annual Report.

A motion was made and carried to give St. James' Parish Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary a rising vote of thanks for kindness and hospitality during our stay with them.

There were registered at this meeting 118 women from 25 parishes, 3 from Diocese of Maryland, 1 New York, 1 Liberia, 1 Bishop, 1 member of the National Council, 1 Archdeacon, 5 clergymen. A number were present who did not register.

The offering was \$100.00

After the Benediction the meeting adjourned to meet in Trinity Church, Williamsport, the first Tuesday and Wednesday in February in February 1930.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE 1929



In assuming the office of Diocesan President of the Women's Auxiliary, one realizes its many privileges, but far more its great and varied obligations and responsibilities.

In accepting this splendid office with all its opportunities and possibilities, I felt that with the wholehearted and prayerful cooperation of all the Church women, as well as the clergy in this Diocese, I would be assured too, of both guidance and strength from the Heavenly Father, for Whom and with Whom, we are all trying to serve.

There is so much for which we are, as Churchwomen, aiming; so much that is truly inspiring, that all the disappointments are overbalanced by the results accomplished.

In going over the Diocese, speaking at the various Archidiaconal, Branch and Central meetings; in attendance at Branch Meetings, Conferences, and Conventions; the personal contacts one has with workers in this Diocese and others, and from other Provinces; with Missionaries home from the Domestic or Foreign Fields; with outstanding clergymen and speakers; means mutual encouragement, interest, and prayers for this great spiritual adventure and endeavor for the world's redemption.

It is in these Annual Meetings we gain this mutual information which acts as an incentive to further inspiration in all the five fields of service in which every baptised woman is to serve; is so much needed, and wanted, to help share in a mutual service to our Father for His sake. With these interchanging of ideas and methods we find our own interest and our own work stimulated.

It is our immediate duty as faithful, loyal churchwomen to become more active and more interested in the Program of the Church. The way to begin is to educate our rising generation in the duties, opportunities, and responsibilities of the Church, existing, for this sole purpose—the spreading of the Gospel of Christ's love, and his coming to redeem the world.

In the Church's work three things are essential—fellowship, cooperation and responsibility. The Church needs more than just assurance. Our faith must enter into our work; our work, part of our faith; and to gain and win the goal for which we as Christian women are aiming, we must have high aspirations, great zeal and strong vision; and with this certainty of purpose, much patience, and hard work, in helping to support the National Council, the Executive Body of our whole Church in its great endeavor, begun by Christ nearly two thousand years ago, to proclaim the revelation of Christ's coming and the world's redemption—our efforts as auxiliary women will be crowned with victory.

I would urge that every one of us realize the necessity to influence our young women in this Diocese, to enter the Mission field; to encourage our young men to enter the ministry. Let us begin by cooperating with the work in our Church-Schools; Boarding-Schools and Colleges, that through our prayers and our interest we will gain recruits from our young people to work in the Master's Vineyard.

At the Convention in Washington we were impressed with the splendid opportunities offered at the official training centers:

1. Wyndam House, N. Y. City, for college students; and missionaries taking post graduate training, under Miss Lathrop.
2. St. Margaret's, Berkeley, Calif., under Deaconess Newell.
3. Bishop Tuttle Training School for colored women workers, Raleigh, N. C.
4. Taylor Hall, Racine, Wis. under Mrs. Biller, a center for devotional and Christian service conferences.

And our three Deaconess Schools in N. Y. City, Philadelphia and Chicago.

It was made apparent in Washington of the increasing demand and need for consecrated trained workers for every department of our Church's work, and especially was it urged that the Women's Auxiliary should help to meet the situation, by emphasizing work in the Missionary Field; our Rural Work; and in the Schools and Colleges. Let us pledge ourselves this coming Triennium to help find the right workers in our Diocese, and also assume our share in the upkeep of these training centers, especially the Tuttle Memorial Houses.

We are urged to have more quiet days and hours; to encourage more private meditations, family prayers, Bible readings in our homes; to ask our clergy to have more intercessory prayers, more corporate communions; and to emphasize the great need and value of parochial study classes and discussion groups; to have more pageants through which we gain enthusiastic workers from our young people; lantern slides with their beautiful pictures showing our work in the Mission Fields. By information we awaken the conscience. I would ask that each Branch have a Membership Committee whose duty it is to enlist every baptized woman in the Master's service through Auxiliary work; interest every woman through Committee work; or Christian service on the Visitor's or Shut-in Committee, whose duty it is to visit the sick and bereaved; and nearby rural churches; to encourage and help these small parishes in their arduous task to further the work of the Church.

The larger Parishes should have committees to go and encourage the small Branches; to have them realize that even though two or three women are gathered together in His name, they, too, can help support their Parish, their Diocese, the whole Church through their prayers, gifts, and service—and, too, in reading the Spirit of Missions and their Diocesan church paper, learn to know the Church's Program.

We are especially asked to stress the importance and need of a C. P. C. Secretary in every Parish whose sole duty is not merely to get subscriptions and renewals for magazines for our rural and isolated church families, clergy, boys and girls and Missionaries, but to make it their real missionary effort to put the Spirit of Missions and the Diocesan Churchman into every Church home, to be read by every Church family.

Let us help to make known our Church Program—the conditions and needs of our Church; its progress in the Field; its opportunities, problems and responsibilities; its anxieties and perplexities; the struggles and the victories of our faithful workers; and everyone of us learn to make the work of our Lord and Master “a joyful and spiritual adventure” for Christ's sake.

We are asked to appeal to you to have real Auxiliary meetings. **Have** your business meetings, but **follow** them with a real Auxiliary program—tell of the work in your Parish; **your** part in the Diocese; **your share** in the work of the National Council to help win the world for Christ.

May I also appeal to you as Churchwomen, to be more liberal with your pledges, to each and every activity of the Auxiliary? They mean more abundant harvest through an increased number of laborers in the Master's Vineyard, and better and more equipment to forward and further the real mission of the Church—the redemption of the World; the spreading of His Kingdom.

In our Diocese we have the splendid work being done at Mt. Alto to which we pledge. Individually we are all interested in Betty Washington Camp for Girls at York, and the sending of groceries and supplies and checks for upkeep of the Home for Aged at Shippensburg. We are asked to include this year Kuling School in our pledges. This is a school for the education of the children of missionaries in the far off Fields. It gives to the children a sound education, keeps them near their parents until prepared for college and prevents the breaking of home ties. This school means relief from anxiety for the parents and keeps many workers in the field who would otherwise be obliged to return home.

Best of all, this school serves the Young people in China until they appreciate the significance of Missionary enterprise, and many dedicate their lives to this service. They learn the language and understand the people. Kuling needs a \$25,000 school building—at present the basement in a dormitory is used, and air and light are not adequate; a heating plant to cost \$15,000—thirty-two coal and wood stoves are now in use showing a menace to the safety of both pupils and buildings, and a constant source of anxiety to those responsible.

Will you not pledge to this worth-while work in China? Through greater use of our Blue Boxes filled with grateful offerings and prayers we aim to give in 1931 a greater evidence of additional gratitude to God.

Our Corporate Gift must of necessity be a real united effort of self denial on the part of every woman old and young, of the Church; one Body; one Gift. Only through this effort of our Churchwomen will every Parish, every Diocese, insure the triumphant completion of our Advance Work program which we authorized at the Convention recently, and pledged our help and share in this Gift as our part in extending His Kingdom.

In asking for a Native Assistant for Miss Gladys Spencer, it is because of greater evidence that increased provision for helping our American missionaries must be made if they are to carry on. See pages 105 to 109. "Our work in Japan"—General. Church Program, 1929-31.

Rural Conferences have done much for Rural work. They have given every evidence of the greatest usefulness in towns and villages and through the Countryside. Every Diocese is sending clergy to these Conferences; many through Scholarship Funds, because of the conviction that the Episcopal Church is vitally contributing to the moral, religious and social life of the nation. They return to their rural field of work with a wider vision of awakened opportunities, much inspiration, and certainly greater enthusiasm and interest in Rural Life and Work. Let us cooperate, too, with this phase of the program and send clergy and delegates to these worthwhile Conferences through our pledges.

In summing up the message from the Triennial Convention, we are impressed with the emphasis on three specific points:

1. The Auxiliary, through cooperation of all the clergy should extend its work in every Parish until every Churchwoman even in village and country is enlisted and enrolled in the Master's Service.

2. We must educate the Church. As Churchwoman of this Diocese, let us enlist all the uninterested women and clergy, and win the youth of our Church for service in helping to win the World for Christ, through study classes, and interest in the Church's Program.

3. The next three years our theme is to be: "Christ and human relationships." We are told to weld humanity into godliness; and Miss Lindley, our inspiring executive leader, asks us to pray that our Lord's will may be understood in all our human relations, and then fulfilled. This means—that service to Him must include service to our fellowmen.

Do not forget the Day of Prayer for members of all Communions will be observed on the first Friday in Lent.

The Woman's Auxiliary at the last Triennial meeting pledged its influence to promote interest in and help establish the Good Friday Offering for work in Jerusalem.

Finally, let us rededicate ourselves to Christ's service; first, by making the strength of our deeds the measure of our Faith; second, through a sincere and simple effort in our daily living, to follow with humility the example of our Lord. Let us pray for wisdom and strength, and all things necessary for carrying out God's will, each day.

I would like to say, we have met with the loss of our beloved former President, Mrs. Paul E. Wirt, I am sure her memory is enshrined in our hearts and her life, so beautiful and inspiring, will be to us all a real example to grow in Auxiliary work, and continually share in our Master's service.

PERSONAL RELIGION AND EVANGELISM

The following resolution was adopted at the Triennial of the Woman's Auxiliary meeting in Washington, October, 1928

1. Whereas, The Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council has felt very keenly the need for a deeper spiritual life and renewed consecration to our Lord Jesus on the part of the women of the Church, and has expressed the same through the Message of 1925, and

Whereas, We have experienced through the Bishops' Crusade the need of a more public and private witness for Christ in the life of today, and have had a real part in the preparation and carrying forward of the Crusade, and

Whereas, The National Commission on Evangelism is urging the Church through all its varying agencies to incorporate personal evangelism in the regular life of the Church,

We believe that the time has come when realizing fully our corporate strength and the fresh power engendered by these precious experiences of the past Triennium, we must set forth, as individual members of the Auxiliary and the Church, the Body of Christ, on the next steps in our task of winning the world for Christ, looking out on this world from our own homes to the uttermost parts, we find that the crux of the whole matter lies in ourselves, that the challenge comes to each and every one of us, for we are the interpreters of Christ to our generation. Therefore, we believe that the first step should be that we continue to deepen our personal religious lives until we are steeped in the spirit of our Lord and Master and the practice of the presence of God becomes a necessity and next that we help others in their quest for a more complete life.

We find that personal evangelism is an attempt to render this help through the process of friendship.

And Whereas, we believe that personal evangelism cannot be carried out through set programs or meetings, alone, we offer, in all humility, the following suggestions as aids in our undertaking.

The ministry of books—the reading and re-reading of the many simple books which have been the help and strength of others, and the wise and judicious recommending and lending of these to friends.

The ministry of prayer—the keeping of a quiet time with Christ—at the beginning of each day—talking with God in our own words and listening to Him,—the use of the Prayer Book, the Prayer Leaflet and the many beautiful prayers written for special occasions and persons and the asking of others to join us in prayer, separately or in small groups at certain times and for special purposes.

The ministry of the spoken word, believing that a few words, filled with the gentleness of Christ and the power of the Holy Spirit, passed on from one re-kindled soul to another, would mean the whole gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ spread anew over our whole land.

The ministry of the Holy Communion, more frequent communions with special prayers or a few chosen companions, renewed consecration of ourselves, our souls and bodies and a ready submission to the will of Christ.

The ministry of example—that through that which Christ has wrought in us others may see and believe.

"I have called you friends; for all things that I heard from my Father I have made known unto you. Ye did not choose me, but I chose you, and appointed you, that ye should go and bear fruit, and that your fruit should abide."

Therefore Be It Resolved: That we, each and every one of us, return to our several dioceses from this meeting, praying that all hesitation in witnessing for Christ may be taken from our hearts, with a fervent desire to share Him with others and a sincere purpose to carry out the same.

RESOLVED:

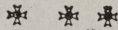

REPORT OF THE VICE PRESIDENT OF THE ALTOONA ARCHDEACONRY 1928



The Vice President of the Altoona Archdeaconry submits the following report of work done during the year 1928.

There are 7 branches in this Archdeaconry, 5 being strictly Auxiliary and 2 being guilds doing Auxiliary work.

6 Branches have a prayer-partner secretary.

6 Branches have an active C. P. C. and pay C. P. C. dues. 4 parishes have Church School service programs, one has a Young Peoples' Fellowship and one a Girls' Friendly Society.

There have been 11 boxes sent at the request of the supply department secretary with a value of \$340.14 and 8 sent independently with a value of \$84.47.

Pledges and specials amounting to \$664.23 have been paid. Our U. T. O. collections amounted to \$611.41. The total of box work, pledges, specials and U. T. O. for seven branches is \$1700.25, an increase of more than \$63.00 over last year.

4 Branches have mission study classes and have programs at meetings, for at least part of the year.

All branches have one corporate communion, one has 2, one has 4, during the year.

There are 185 subscriptions to the Harrisburg Churchman and 40 to the Spirit of Missions. Several branches buy the special Christmas and Easter numbers of the Spirit of Missions and dispose of them, in this way spreading information about the church's work.

The Spring and Fall Archdeaconry meetings held in Lewistown and Juniata respectively were well attended. At the spring meeting we were fortunate in having Bishop Campbell of Liberia, also Bishop Darlington and several visitors from Harrisburg. At the meeting in Juniata we had our newly appointed educational secretary, Mrs. Briggs, give a splendid review of our Mission study book. Also we were happy to have Miss Batzle and Mrs. Boyer, who conducted an officers' conference.

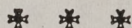

It gives me pleasure to state that:

- 23 Parishes are doing active work
- 2 Parishes have two branches each—Sec. A and B
- 25 Working branches
- 5 Parishes have Girls' Friendly Society Branches
- 1 Girls' Friendly Camp
- 1 Young Peoples Fellowship
- 2 Parishes have the Church Service League
- 20 Parishes have Corporate Communion—six of them have two each year.

The world wide day of prayer was observed with special services. There were Quiet Days and a Day of Intercessory Prayer, with a group of women continuously at the Altar Rail from 10 A. M. to 2 P. M.

There were two Missionary Mass Meetings, one at St. Stephen's, Harrisburg, the speaker being the Rev. H. Littell, D. D., the other at St. John's, Carlisle, Bishop Campbell of Liberia was the speaker. At Carlisle 18 Branches were represented.

Two Center meetings were held one at Chambersburg and one at Carlisle.

Miss Anna Watts gave an inspirational talk at St. John's, Lancaster in October.

Archdeacon Atkins visited the Blue Mountain Conference with members of his family.

Two young women and one young man were registered at the Conference.

The Educational work of the Archdeaconry is reported in the Education Secretary's Report. You will note the greater activity along Educational lines.

There are 348 subscriptions to the Spirit of Missions, the same number is used as an estimated figure for subscriptions to the Harrisburg Churchman.

This work is steadily growing. One parish, who in past years did little work along this line, has sent 24 paid subscriptions, 13 forwarded magazines, and money to amount of \$20.55. They have a vision. Would that every Parish could catch it.

The pledges in this Archdeaconry for 1928 were increased by \$156.49.

The custom of having two collections of the "Blue Box" is growing—these parishes have two Corporate Communions a year—the others only one.

At the Fall meeting at St. Lukes, Mt. Joy, The Rt. Rev. Robert E. Campbell D. D. O. N. C., Bishop of Liberia, was the principal speaker—at this meeting our first officer's Conference was conducted by Mrs. John Weimer, Pres. of St. James branch, Lancaster.

REPORT OF THE VICE PRESIDENT OF THE WILLIAMSPORT ARCHDEACONRY 1928



The Vice President of the Williamsport Archdeaconry presents the following report of work done in 1928.

Women worked along Auxiliary lines in 19 parishes, in some cases as regularly organized Auxiliary Branches, in others, as Guilds sharing some part of the Auxiliary work.

We held two Archdeaconry meetings, both being very well attended. In the Spring we had as our guests, our Diocesan Auxiliary President, Mrs. Brinton, and our G. F. S. Diocesan President, Mrs. Heiges.

Our principal speaker was Bishop Campbell of Liberia.

In the Fall our guest was Miss Esther Fifield, a Field worker for the G. F. S., and our principal speaker was Bishop Thomas of Southern Brazil.

In the Fall we changed our usual plans of meeting, to permit us to have an evening Mass Meeting.

After expenses of these meetings were paid, the offerings were given to the Corporate Gift, Camp Betty Washington, Mt. Alto, and to a Memorial for Miss Tillotson.

Educational.

We regret that so few from this Archdeaconry attended summer conferences, there being but three women, two men, and five young people. All of these were from Williamsport. We hope this year that many more will go to Blue Mountain, and from all parts of the Archdeaconry.

Our Archdeaconry Educational Secretary, Miss Batzle, and your Vice President held five Center meetings, in as many different sections. Educational work was stressed at these meetings.

Ten Branches had Program meetings, one Guild which meets weekly, devoting one evening each month to an Educational program.

There were eleven Mission Study, and Discussion Groups, four persons who did not attend classes read the book "A Church Awake"; One Institute was held, Four Pageants given, One Exhibit, Two days of Intercessory Prayer; Thirty Corporate Communions (one Parish Branch having thirteen); Six Quiet Days, Five Bible Classes; 687 subscribe to the Harrisburg Churchman about 74 subscribe to the Spirit of Missions; in every parish there are from two to twenty who subscribe to one of the weekly Church papers; Three parishes have Bulletin Boards, and Five have parish papers; three carry out the Church School Service Program; Three have Young People Fellowship; Three have Girls Friendly Societies; Two have Girls Clubs.

Box Work.

In this Archdeaconry, 27 new boxes, and 6 second hand boxes were sent by the request of the Diocesan Supply Secretary, and 12 were sent independent of that Department. The total spent in boxes and in checks for that work was \$861.17.

Church Periodical Club.

In this Archdeaconry, 55 magazines are sent by 29 persons, and a total of \$55.00 given in cash.

United Thank Offering.

Our U. T. O. from this Archdeaconry for 1928 was \$1550.76.

Pledges etc.

Our pledges totalled \$832.62, and Specials \$89.00, and our Corporate Gift amounted to \$279.51.

This makes a grand total of money spent for Box work, given to pledges and Specials, and U. T. O. of \$3668.06.

Actual work of Vice President.

Your vice President made 15 visits to Parish Branches, presided over two Archdeaconry meetings, and five Center meetings, attended four meetings of the Diocesan Council, being a member of the Diocesan Department of Religious Education, attended two Auxiliary executive meetings, and spent one week at the General Convention attending a Study Class there. She therefore travelled in the interests of the Auxiliary, 1558 miles in this Archdeaconry, and 350 miles outside its limits, or a total of 1918 miles.

She also led one Study Class in a parish, wrote 416 letters, 44 postals, sent one telegram, mailed 126 packages of literature to Branches, and made four long distance calls.

Memorial.

Again we report that many faithful women from this Archdeaconry entered into the Higher Life.

Chief among them was our beloved former Archdeaconry Vice-President and Diocesan President, Mrs. Paul E. Wirt.

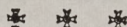
The number who passed from this life to the next was 35. We ask your prayers for their perfect rest.

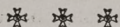

REPORT OF DIOCESAN EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY FOR 1928

Almighty God, most humbly we beseech Thee, that we who especially desire to dedicate our minds to Thy service, may by Thee, be enriched in all utterance and in all knowledge; that, using Thy gifts to Thy glory, we may be byameless in Thy holy sight, though the merits of our example, Teacher, and Saviour, Jesus Christ, our Lord. 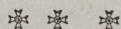

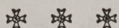

REPORT OF THE CHURCH PERIODICAL CLUB JAN. 1, 1928 TO JAN. 1 1929



Another year's report of the work done for the Church Periodical Club in the Diocese of Harrisburg shows much material increase. Splendid work was accomplished in each Archdeaconry and in the Diocese as a whole. In the reports received from the various Secretaries, 210 periodicals have been given by 125 donors and of this number 121 are going as paid subscriptions. All missionaries in the foreign field who have gone out from this Diocese are receiving the magazine of their choice furnished by the Parish to which they belong. Additional miscellaneous matter was sent to schools, hospitals, army and navy chaplains, individuals, etc. Religious Christmas cards were again sent but the sum realized totaled only \$6.55. The shortage in this item can be attributed to the flooded market for the sale of this merchandise. Of the money received \$69.00 was sent to Miss Mary E. Thomas, Executive Secretary; \$23.00 to the Rev. A. A. Hughes, Mt. Alto, for paid subscriptions to the "Witness", and birthday gift; \$152.50 for paid subscriptions; \$8.20 for postage; leaving an unexpended balance in Treasury of \$35.18 from which several subscriptions must be paid. The method used the past year to finance this organization, that of contributing through the pledges, was most satisfactory and you are asked to continue that support. I am not thinking only in terms of money but it was the means of creating better representation which means more publicity and more publicity means greater activity. From the reports at the C. P. C. conferences in Washington during the Triennial an encouraging increase in the number of Parish branches and of new members in existing branches was shown. At all these meetings better representation was stressed, and each Director was urged to try and have every Parish branch contribute to this work if only in a small way. Every branch president should include a C. P. C. Secretary when appointing her committees and the name of the person appointed sent to me so that instructions may be given her pertaining to the office. Several "B" branches appointed their own Secretaries this past year and did especially good work among the young people at Mt. Alto and elsewhere. As in the past, Father Hughes will be grateful for your continued support.

You are, I know, taking care of the spiritual needs of your Prayer-Partners but are you thinking, too, of their mental needs? You can render them this service by providing good reading matter for them—a book, perhaps, or a paid subscription—which is always appreciated by those away from home.

Aside from all you do, remember, always, that the main object in forming the C. P. C. was, and is, the sharing of your periodicals with others—AND DO IT. I would welcome more frequent opportunities to meet with and explain to the branch members of this Auxiliary the aims and ideas connected with the work of this organization.

Finally—are your prayers keeping pace with your material gifts? Only as they do so can you look for the fulfilment of the C. P. C. prayer, "That your gifts may be blessed to the enrichment of individual lives and to the hastening of the Kingdom of Christ, your Lord."

Dear Mr. and Mrs. Heiges:

It was a great pleasure to learn from you yesterday that you had raised \$1,000 of the \$2500 required and paid it to purchase the new commodious dwelling fully furnished beside your present Betty Washington Girls' Friendly Camp. I promised to give you 1-10 of the \$2500 required, when the money was all raised. As you have raised \$1,000, I will not wait until the end but send you my \$100. so that you may go on and raise the remainder—when the other \$150 will be ready, as the last payment.

I met, coming from Frederick, Md. yesterday a young girl communicant of our Church from Tyrone. She said she enjoyed being one of your campers last summer and that the food provided was so excellent she gained 4 or 5 lbs. in the week that she was with you. and enjoyed every minute of it. I thought you ought to know this, and that the girls you are benefitting appreciate what you are doing. Perhaps the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese may be willing to help the Girls Friendly and raise a portion of the \$1500 remaining so that the property can be deeded to the Incorporated Trustees of the Diocese to keep in trust, so that it could not be mortgaged.
