



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FOREWORD OF OUR BISHOP



The Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Harrisburg is a branch of the National Auxiliary of the Church, and its President and other officers have rendered most remarkable and unusual service during this past year. I wish to express to them on behalf of the Diocese and to each and everyone of its members my sincere gratitude. Not alone have the offerings of the Churches and Missions in the Diocese for the general work of the Church in foreign lands and at home in the United States increased, but there are also more parochial branches than ever before, and more members in the branches.

I have attended the meetings of each Archdeaconry and found the Churches in which they were held filled with interested and enthusiastic Churchwomen and a number of the clergy. I wish that all the latter might put down the Auxiliary Day of their own Archdeaconry as a primary engagement. Their presence would encourage the women. I know your inspiration has been a personal devotion to the Lord Jesus Christ Himself and that all your planning and efforts have been put forth to spread the Gospel and to enlarge Christ's Kingdom on earth. You are sure of God-given success because your prayers have been and will be offered through Jesus Christ Our Lord.

**CONSTITUTION OF THE HARRISBURG DIOCESAN
BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO
THE NATIONAL COUNCIL OF THE
PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH OF AMERICA**



**ARTICLE I.
NAME**

The name of the Association is the Harrisburg Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church of America.

**ARTICLE II
OBJECT**

The object of this Association is to carry out in the Diocese of Harrisburg, by united and systematic effort, the three great aims of the Women's Auxiliary, viz: Daily Prayer for Missions, the Study of Missions, and Systematic Giving for Missions.

**ARTICLE III
MEMBERSHIP**

Every baptized woman in the church is eligible to membership in the Parish Auxiliary, and all the Auxiliaries in the Diocese are members of this Association.

**ARTICLE IV
OFFICERS**

The elective officers of this Association shall consist of a President, a Vice President-at-Large, a Vice President of each Archdeaconry, a Treasurer, a United Thank Offering Custodian, a Recording Secretary, and a Corresponding Secretary. These officers, with the Chairman and Secretary of the Church Service League, and the Chairman of the Church School Service League and the appointed officers (as Supply Department Secretary, Assistant to Recording Secretary, Educational Secretary and C. P. C. Director) shall form the Executive Board.

**ARTICLE V
DUTIES OF OFFICERS**

Section 1. The President shall be elected at an annual meeting for a term of three years and may not succeed herself. It shall be the duty of the President to call meetings of the Association and the Executive Board, and preside at them. She shall also exercise a general supervision of all the work in the diocese and make a yearly report to the Association.

Section 2. The Vice President-at-Large shall be elected at an annual meeting and perform the duties of the President when she is unable to do so.

Section 3. Each Archdeaconry shall as soon as possible after the election of the President, elect from the three women in each Archdeaconry, previously nominated by the Bishop, a Vice President to serve three years.

Section 4. The Vice President of each Archdeaconry shall co-operate with the President in promoting local intelligence and interest, and in directing and organizing work in her own Archdeaconry.

Section 5. The Recording and Corresponding Secretary shall keep the minutes of the yearly meeting and the meetings of the Executive Board, conduct all necessary correspondence, having charge of the writing, printing and sending out of reports and other documents, and make the yearly report.

Section 6. The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all moneys for the expense fund of the Association. Also receive and transmit to the Missionary Treasurer such other moneys sent to her and make a yearly report.

Section 7. The United Thank Offering Custodian shall receive, hold and transmit all United Thank Offering moneys and make a yearly report.

Section 8. The Educational Secretary shall have general supervision of all the Missionary Educational Work carried on under the auspices of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Section 9. The term of office of all elected officers shall be limited to a term of three (3) years, and shall be without right of succession.

ARTICLE VI MEETINGS

There shall be one general meeting of this Association in **each year** and other meetings may be called by the Executive Board.

ARTICLE VII AMENDMENTS

This Constitution and By-Laws may be altered or amended by a two-third vote of the whole number of delegates present at a yearly meeting.

BY-LAWS

Section 1. A Nominating Committee consisting of one member from each Archdeaconry, shall be appointed by the President one month before the annual meeting.

Section 2. Elections shall be by ballots, and each branch shall be entitled to two votes, and an additional vote for each ten members or fraction thereof. These votes shall be cast by properly accredited delegates or their alternates.

Section 3. Delegates to the Triennial Meeting of the General Auxiliary shall be the President and four from the membership of the Auxiliary, and five alternates from the membership of the Auxiliary, to be elected by ballot.

Section 4. There shall be three delegates to the Provincial Meeting who shall be the President Ex-Officio, and two from the membership, to be chosen by ballot.

Section 5. An expense fund shall be provided by this Association for the necessary expenses, namely: Printing, postage, stationery, traveling expenses of speakers and officers, etc., to be arranged at the discretion of the Executive Board.

Rule 1. Twenty per cent. of the total amount pledged for the Expense Fund, be set aside for a Sinking Fund to be used at the direction of the Executive Board. All requisitions to be signed by the President.

Rule 2. At the Annual Meeting, the hostess branch shall entertain, over night, members of the Executive Board, Speakers on the Program and two delegates from each branch. Where more than two register from any branch, they shall pay their own entertainment.

SUGGESTIONS



Study with your Rector your year book. Take a day each month at the Parish House or meet at the home of the Church women, have a box lunch with tea or coffee provided by the hostess or a committee of three or more, and read and discuss the program:—

1 A day for the U. T. O. with the U. T. O. Litany and the leaflet. Keep up the interest in your Blue Boxes.

2 The Supply Work department—use your Manual and the Spirit of Missions. Read letters from recipients, etc.

3 Pledges, Diocesan and National and International to carry on the Church's Program.

4 C. P. C. work—A very entertaining and interesting program will result in greater effort in this worthwhile work.

5 Resume of Educational Work. The study class; what books are being read and used; the Adult and young people's classes; everything concerning greater zeal in Educational work.

6 Have a committee to look after the Spirit of Missions and Diocesan papers and the Church at Work. To know is to achieve, through interest and willingness to serve.

7 Discuss Domestic and Foreign work. Our share in the Indian, Negro, and foreign born work. At the end of the year, have a play or pageant and include the people we want to interest, and our churches will grow in grace and strength.

8 Have Days for Intercessions; Quiet Hours and Corporate Com-munions.

9 Read at home and in groups, if you do not have a study class, "Roads to the City of God", and "Our Common Life". Every Church woman should have a Church Calendar. Get them from the Educational Secretary.

10 Visit the Shut-ins; the sick and lonely.

11 Have offerings for Missions at your study classes.

12 Have a Committee and arrange a program meeting each month for your Churchwomen, and you will have an interested and active Auxiliary Branch.

13 Send all Pledges in by the 15th of May—Your Treasurer must send your pledges to the Diocesan and National Treasurer, June 1st. Be prompt, and she will be able to remit our pledges promptly.

14 Devote part of each Auxiliary meeting to the Year Book.

15 Because of the nature of our Auxiliary work, we must have over-head expenses, stationery, programs, year books, notices sent through cards and letters, postage, typing at certain times of the year, etc. In addition, speakers expenses to Annual Meetings, Conferences, Institutes, etc.; delegates and officers expenses to Province and General Conventions and Conferences if they are expected to efficiently do their duty; dues to the National Board and Province Board.

Also such literature as will be of interest and material help for advancing the work, through the Diocese, to forward the work of the whole church.

If each Parish increase their pledges proportionately, according to their Parish strength, many officers would not have expenses they can ill afford.

Will your Branch be ready and willing to share in these pledges and the responsibility, too, that this Diocese may be able to enlarge its opportunities to further the Missionary endeavor of the Church, for the Extension of His Kingdom?

Resolution on the United Thank Offering of 1931.

Resolved: That the United Thank Offering of 1931 be given to the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, to be used as follows:

One-tenth of the Offering to be added to the permanent trust fund, the income from which is to be used for retiring allowances of United Thank Offering workers.

That at least \$75,000 be held in reserve for training of United Thank Offering workers, any surplus to revert to the general fund.

And the sum of not less than two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000) to be appropriated for buildings to be erected in the mission field.

The balance of the Offering, together with all interest earned thereon to be used by the Missionary Society as directed by the National Council, for the work of women in the missionary enterprises of the Church including their training, equipping, sending and support and for their care when sick and disabled. the appointment of said women having been approved by the Executive Board.

Be It Further Resolved: That to our United Gifts shall be added our united and earnest prayers, that God will put into the hearts of many faithful women to give themselves and their substance, to the work of the Master in the Mission Field.

MINUTES OF THE 25TH ANNUAL MEETING



The twenty fifth annual meeting of the Harrisburg Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary was held in Trinity Church, Williamsport, Pa., Tuesday and Wednesday, February 4th and 5th, 1930.

At 2:45 P. M. Tuesday, Miss Winifred Maynard gave a short talk on Religious Drama, after which the members of St. Mary's Guild (a group of High School Girls) presented a short play, "The Spirit of the United Thank Offering". The play was very effective, and was an appropriate opening for the meeting.

The Rev. George VanWaters, D. D., Rector of St. Paul's Church, Wellsboro, led the Quiet Hour, the theme for his meditations being the "World call to Christianity". A large number of women attended the Quiet Hour and appreciated the privelege of spending this hour under Dr. VanWater's spiritual leadership.

The Missionary Mass Meeting held at 7:30 P. M. was opened with the Order of Evening Prayer, the Rev. H. R. Bennett and the Rev. Samuel Sayre assisting the Rector of Trinity, the Rev. C. E. McCoy.

The Rt. Rev. F. M. Taitt, Bishop Co-adjutor of the Diocese of Pennsylvania, was the first speaker at the evening meeting. The subject of his talk being "The World Call to Missions". The new and old way of carrying missions was contrasted. The talk was educational and inspirational. The Bishop said in part, "Every one is needed in the carrying of the Christian Message, and it is through the co-operation of all, that it will be a force in the world."

The next speaker was the Rev. Robert McCutchen, Rector of Trinity Church, Shamokin, Pa. The Rev. Robert McCutchen was a missionary in the Philippine Islands for nine years, during which time with the help of Mrs. McCutchen, he established educational work as well as ministering to souls. Mr. McCutchen brought many first hand facts of conditions in the Philippines to our attention, and asked that the Woman's Auxiliary stir up interest in the work in the Philippines, especially in the Moro Country.

It is always a pleasure to have our own Bishop with us and to hear his message. Bishop Darlington reviewed the accomplishments of the Diocese during the past twenty-five years, and it was fine to take this mental journey with him. He announced that the whole church had met its quota this year, and that the Church would not have to make any cut this year. It is gratifying to know this Diocese was able to pay more than it had promised. Dr. Franklin, National Treasurer, will be the speaker at the next Diocesan meeting.

Bishop Darlington urged a greater circulation of the Spirit of Missions.

The two colored congregations, Holy Cross, Harrisburg and the mission at Altoona were brought to our attention by the Bishop, and how the Woman's Auxiliary might help the Altoona Mission.

The Mass Meeting closed with prayers for Bishop Anderson, and the Benediction.

Trinity Choir and Mr. Breary, Choirmaster, made a splendid offering to the service with the most glorious music. The men and boys felt a keen desire to have a part in this service and gave of their best.

A social hour was held in the Parish House after the mass meeting.

The Holy Communion was celebrated Wednesday morning at 7:30 A. M. by the Venerable Charles E. McCoy, Rector of Trinity, assisted by the Rev. Samuel Sayre of St. Mary's Church, Williamsport.

The business session opened at 9:00 A. M. with a Hymn and Prayers. The Rev. C. E. McCoy, Rector of the parish, in a word of welcome expressed the sentiment not only of himself but of the parish when he said it was a great privilege to entertain the 25th Annual Meeting of the Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary in Trinity Parish. His main thought was to make us feel that Trinity was our Church in Williamsport.

The Diocesan President, in reply voiced the appreciation of the Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary for the hospitality of Trinity Branch.

Mrs. Caleb S. Brinton, Diocesan President, read her second annual message. The full text of the message will be found on a separate page of the Annual Report. It should be read and studied as it is filled with information, and perhaps, we may catch some of the enthusiasm and interest and giving of self to the work of the Church.

The following Reports were read and accepted: Treasurer, United Thank Offering Custodian, Supply Department Secretary, C. P. C. Director, Prayer-Partner, Educational Secretary, Girl's Friendly Society.

Comments on the reports: The U. T. O., the first year of the Triennial 1925 was \$1143.16, the offering January 1st, 1930 was \$3116.41, an increase of \$1973.25.

The C. P. Director suggests that you send a paid subscription to a magazine with your Supply Box.

Mrs. H. G. Hartman, Chairman of the Devotional Committee made a very fine report. This is the first year that the Diocesan Branch has had a Devotional Committee. The Report will be found on a separate page of the Annual Report.

Bishop Darlington asked us to have a part in the 1900th anniversary of the foundation of the Church at Pentecost. He asked us to read, starting with the first chapter of St. Luke and read the Acts of the Apostles, one chapter a day and end on Pentecost.

The Bishop explained the work of the American Bible Society, and asked that we try to send \$5.00 during this 1900th Anniversary of the foundation of the Church.

Deaconess Eliza Christman, Chairman of the Recruiting Committee reported the results of the first year's efforts of the Committee, and announced that one young woman from Chambersburg is going to Oklahoma as a teacher, and a young woman from Christ Church, Williamsport expects to enter the work in China as a nurse. The Deaconess read a list of places where workers of all kinds are needed.

Deaconess Gertrude Stewart, Head of the Church Training and Deaconess School, Philadelphia, Pa., was a guest of the Annual Meeting. The Deaconess, in her talk, stressed trained leadership, and told of the training received at the Church Training and Deaconess School. We need trained workers wherever the Church is at work and we can receive that training near at home. The Philadelphia School should have the backing of the Province of Washington of which we are a part.

The Deaconess desires an official Diocesan Visitor from every Diocese in the Province, the visitor to be appointed or elected. Some one to be

in residence at the school for a week, attend classes, go out with the students on practical work and learn at first hand what the School really stands for and what it is doing.

Deaconess Stewart asks our prayers to help her make a right decision as to whether she should go back to China or stay in the United States recruiting and training workers for the field. The Deaconess knows the value of the work both in China and this country and as the needs are equally great, it is hard to know the right decision.

Bishop Darlington, President of the Synod of the 3rd Province (Province of Washington) said after hearing Deaconess Stewart speak, "I hereby give you the privilege to speak at the next Province Meeting or have a representative at such meeting."

Bishop Darlington thanked the women for considering the Retiring Fund for Deaconess this last year. The hope that gifts might be added to this fund now, and that it be remembered in our wills was expressed by Deaconess Christman and other members of the Auxiliary. The legal title for the fund is, "The Retiring Fund for Deaconesses", incorporated under the laws of the State of New York, 1927.

Mrs. Rudderow of St. Stephen's, Harrisburg, gave her impression of the value of Summer Conferences. She also told of the Children's Conference at Blue Mountain. The conference must have realized its purpose, when a child prefers to go to the Conference rather than a Camp. This is the expression of Mrs. Rudderow's little daughter.

Mrs. Wade, National Supply Secretary, explained the working plan of the Supply Department and the reason for the necessity of having a Supply Department. The delegates asked questions of Mrs. Wade and were glad of the opportunity to confer with the National Secretary.

One piece of work, Mrs. Wade asked us to do, was to have a store room where we may send Standard Garments, which could be used in emergencies. Three missions had suffered great losses just a few weeks previous to our annual meeting. These missions were taken care of with garments and linens from the store rooms of several Dioceses. National Officers are always welcome, and Mrs. Wade's visit was appreciated for its helpfulness along lines of Auxiliary work.

The Noon Day Devotions were led by the Rev. Clifford Stanley, Rector of Trinity Church, Tyrone, Pa., who used the meditations of "The World Call to Prayer".

The Chairman of the Nominating Committee, Mrs. J. G. Green of Lewistown, presented the names of the nominees for Vice-President-at-large, United Thank Offering Custodian, Secretary, Delegates to the Province Meeting, Alternates to the Province Meeting.

The following tellers were appointed by the President: Mrs. Knepp, Mrs. Stehman, Miss Furst, Mrs. Vaugh. The tellers distributed the ballots after the Roll Call.

A delicious luncheon was served in Trinity Parish House. The Breakfast, luncheon and tea were served by three different groups of church women of Trinity.

The afternoon session was opened with the singing of a hymn and a prayer, after which Mrs. Green announced the result of the Election, which was as follows:

Mrs. J. C. Kunkel extended an invitation to all women of the Diocese to share with them the Quiet Day led by Dr. John Suter of the Department of Religious Education of the National Council, April 10th, in St. Stephen's Church, Harrisburg, Pa., beginning at 7:00 A. M.

A motion was made by Mrs. John Weimer of Lancaster, seconded by Mrs. James Snotts of Lancaster, that the Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Harrisburg be held in November instead of in February, after discussion Mrs. Snotts called for the vote seconded by Mrs. Steacy—a rising vote was asked—The motion carried to change the time of meeting.

The work of the colored mission was again brought to the attention of the meeting.

A motion was made by Mrs. Drinkwater seconded by Mrs. Weimer, that a ten per cent increase be added to the already existing ten per cent of the Expense Fund, making twenty per cent of the Expense Fund, for the Sinking Fund. Motion carried.

Mrs. Steacy and Mrs. Snotts, delegates to the Province Meeting held at Harrisburg in October reported the meeting in a very wonderful and inspiring manner, a resolution of thanks for their work will be found under the Report of the Resolution Committee.

During the singing of a hymn, the offering was taken.

The Acting Secretary read the following reports: Vice-President of the Harrisburg Archdeaconry, Vice-President of the Northern Archdeaconry, Vice-President of the Williamsport Archdeaconry and the report of the Mt. Alto Committee. The reports are printed in full in the Annual Report.

The report of the Resolution Committee was accepted as read. The Resolution will be found under Report of the Resolution Committee, in Annual Report.

There were registered at this meeting 132 women from **28 parishes**, 1 New York, 1 Hankow—on leave in U. S., 2 Bishops, 2 Archdeacons, 9 clergy. A number were present who did not register.

After the Benediction by the Rev. Samuel Sayre, the meeting adjourned to meet in St. John's, Carlisle, Pa.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT AND MESSAGE 1930



Two years have gone by since you have entrusted to me, as Diocesan President, the great task of making opportunities, and meeting many responsibilities, in forwarding the only work for which the Church exists—Missions—the spreading of Christ's great unselfish love, and His coming to redeem the world. The first year was one of preparation, with its aspirations and hopes; with a ready and willing determination to "carry on", that His purpose might be fulfilled.

With a faithful, loyal Executive Board; the cooperation of many Branches; most of the clergy; and the Bishop's counsel, the first year's efforts resulted in the accomplishment of many objectives, and are in evidence in the 1929 Year Book of our work done throughout 1928. We had every reason to be proud of our gifts to the U. T. O.; to the Corporate Gift for Advanced Work; of the varied services rendered through gifts and boxes and monies and other phases of work; and of our growing interest in Religious Education, especially, through our study classes; groups for reading and discussion; and the great interest taken in church literature. But, more to the point, there was, and is today, a more awakened consciousness of our need for a deeper spiritual understanding that we know Christ better through a corporate prayer-life; and with it, the satisfying conviction that "leaning on Christ" means. He will be a tower of strength to us in all work for Him, and, as co-workers, with Him.

While there has been much left to be desired, as a part of the program of this administration, because of the sincerely earnest desire on the part of your President, to knit the Diocese closer together for the purpose of bringing to fruition the mission of the Church, through a comprehensive understanding of a **definite program** in every parish or Mission where "two or three are gathered together in His name": with the distinct object and purpose uppermost—that each man, woman and child be a part, and help share in the responsibility and joy of privilege in carrying His command and message to every corner of the earth—on the whole, we have reason to believe many worthwhile objectives have been accomplished.

This past year of 1929 began with greater zeal because of the inspiration received first, through our religious education preparation in Epiphany, followed by the annual reports of our Diocesan officers and committees—so full of encouragement—at the annual meeting in St. James, Lancaster; and too, the educational and inspirational talk given by Mrs. Betticher on the "Spirit of Missions" aided by lantern slides, which presented to everyone a newer and wider vision of all which the Church is sent to do, and made us aware of our part and share in extending His Kingdom. In February, Mrs. Gammack, a U. T. O. worker from the Church Missions House spoke at the annual meeting on Woman's Share in the Church's Program, and spent the entire month in the Diocese. She spoke in thirty parishes and missions. Opportunity was also given other parishes and missions to meet and hear Mrs. Gammack at central meetings in nine parishes. It was most pleasing to have Mrs. Gammack include in her report to Headquarters "The Harrisburg Diocesan President is to be congratulated on the spiritual and successful meeting in Lancaster where there was gathered a very representative and interested group of women and where there was provided so fine a program and the most gracious hospitality."

At the conclusion of her survey of work and many helpful suggestions for growth and activity, Mrs. Gammack had a real response in the demand for many Blue Boxes for U. T. O. gifts; in the rededication of many branches to more consecrated service; in the readiness, because of being so thoroughly enlightened, of several clergy to cooperate with the **Woman's Work** of the program; in one instance, that of St. Mary's, Waynesboro, the Rector, at a special service of his parishioners, rededicated them to Christ and His service, and then gave to each one a definite part of parochial responsibility.

The result here has been a full attendance at Church and the Church School, and other meetings; and excellent work and a unity of spirit to uphold the Church and the program.

On the other hand, I am forced to admit, in some of our parishes, the clergy know little or nothing of Auxiliary work, or else are not inclined from purely selfish parochial reasons, to cooperate with women's work, which, if they only knew, means actual spiritual and material growth in their parishes.

Those missions and parishes need help in their educational work to help them know so they **too** will be able to achieve. Where there is a real interest in Christ and His mission there will be a real and vital response to the Church's program. This is one of our urgent tasks,—to help make our clergy realize that Missions is the **only reason for our Church's existence**, and to aid them in carrying on their real work, to inspire every man, woman and child to help establish Christ's Kingdom on earth.

I have created a Committee on Recruiting. There are many promising young girls and boys to whom the Church could and should look for real leadership as they grow older, and who, with the proper effort, and given the right enthusiasm and inspiration, will be ready for training for the Mission Field or the Ministry. Will you not have a committee in your parish or Mission to forward this important feature of the program? "The Harvest is white and the laborers so few." Let every branch ask their rectors to come to their meetings and during the year talk to them; or have some speaker, occasionally, on Adult Religious Education; Social Service; Supply Work and its Educational Value; on the U. T. O., the Corporate Gift; and your pledges explained, means many an added dollar because of knowing the why and wherefore. Have Missionary Teas and their silver offerings; present an informal program, a missionary speaker, music, lantern slides. Invite every church person, old and young. A knowing parish is an interested one. In being interested, such a parish will be a liberal parish.

We, as the womanhood of the Church, can advance or hinder God's purpose. We can be praying women, lending our prayer strength to the Devotional Committee. We can assist the splendid work of Archdeacon Hughes at Mt. Alto among our tubercular children and adults and keeping in repair our Rectory and Church there, by pledging to this fund and in sending gifts to be distributed. Another Diocesan interest is Camp Betty Washington, near York, Pa., under the able leadership of our Diocesan President of the G. F. S. Let us all be proud of this extension work and help Mr. and Mrs. Heighes to cover the thousand dollar indebtedness on the property recently acquired by sending a check to them. Do you realize the bond of sympathy between the Auxiliary and the **G. F. Society**? How they too, use the Blue Boxes; have a Study Class; do Box Work; have Prayer Partners; Corporate Communions, and so on. Some day these young women will be our Auxiliary leaders. **Urge**

a G. F. Society organization for our girls in your parish, or a central branch. Our clergy and recruiting committee are looking for just these girls.

We are asked this year to do a big thing, educationally and practically, to help raise a million and a half dollars for Advance work on the Church Program.

There are 75 churches, 9 hospitals and 24 schools to be helped right now. Can we say we will refuse to help bear witness for Christ? Will we not put every effort forth and try to meet these requests for the work of the Church to go forward and fulfill His commands?

This year the Corporate Gift will be the gift of the whole Church and we are asked to begin at once, to cooperate in every way in the promotion of this advance work program. We are studying the World Mission of Christianity and are afforded many opportunities for objectives to which to give. Let us make our gifts for this Advance Work program a great and glorious adventure, making our human relationships with one or more objectives a basis for welding friendships of great interest, by fellow service to our fellow men.

Instead of giving as we did last year to four objectives, this year we will share in the Great Corporate Gift of the Church-at-large to one hundred and seventy different enterprises for the extension of His kingdom. Have a chairman in every parish to inspire a spirit of conscientious sacrifice, through Self-denial Week in September, and make our gift of the womanhood of the Church an outstanding one for the growth of the Kingdom.

In distributing this literature and keeping in touch with the National Treasurer, Mrs. Burkham, the chairman will find this work educational and interesting. In sending your used copies of books and magazines; and through your checks sent through the Treasurer, Mrs. Small, you will be helping to send literature to isolated rural sections and elsewhere; and be able to help stress religious education as well as ethics, science, history, romance and so on, in Church Periodical Club Work.

In doing your Box work, please cooperate with the Supply Secretary. You send your boxes or checks, but do you know the objective? The history, environment, religious needs, ethical atmosphere and so forth, about the people, the locality or country? Please interest your Branch in studying the place and people, and they will be more intelligent about the Church's work; the necessity for our gifts throughout the year.

I have stressed the importance of Personal Religion through individual and corporate prayer-life in the home and parish. The past year we have done pioneer work in creating a Devotional Committee, feeling that, if we cared to obey our Master's will, we must know Him better through closer companionship and communion with Him. To give us the impetus we need for the consummation of His work, we have advocated more Quiet Days and Hours, more private meditations in the Home, in the Church, in our Parishes; encouraging the use of prayer corners in our homes, among the children as well as adults. If many of our small missions could meet in center groups, at homes especially, having hymns, prayers, meditations, using the prayer books, and having a missionary, layman, or clergy add a spiritual thought or two, it would mean the spiritual growth which gives impetus to the Church's growth.

It has been gratifying to know the steady increase in Corporate Communions and intercessions; in Quiet Days and Hours, and the interest taken in reading good religious books and church literature; particularly, the Church's Program; and it is evident that our women are learning

their share and part in the program for church extension. To know is to achieve; and an awakening of mind brings conscientious endeavor in the right direction.

It was most encouraging to find in my many visitations to the Missions, and especially at Blue Ridge and the Northern Archdeaconry, the splendid work being accomplished, having at these places a real spiritual background as a basis. Human relationship; our theme for this Triennium, is surely preached and practiced in these parts of our Diocese. How I would that every clergyman could be so close to his people in their daily lives; and that through his own human efforts he could make of his calling a glorious adventure, for Christ's sake, as it should be! After all, it does one good to get away from the hustle and bustle of the secular world, and find the peace the world cannot give; and I don't much wonder that, up in the hills and mountains, with their groves, streams and unsullied skies, the clergy and laity find a closer communion with their Creator, and know so well how to reach others.

Very briefly, the work accomplished this year has been such as to unite the Diocese in a common task, working toward a set goal of prayer; in pledges; study and service.

Our pledges we assumed for the past year are met; the goal of \$1,000, set for the Corporate Gift was paid in November. Our U. T. O. \$3,116.41. Our special gift sent through the Diocesan Auxiliary Treasurer for Field Work and to the Treasurer of the National Council and through the Diocesan Treasurer Mr. Wharton, amounted to \$3,130.00. Our Box Work through the Supply Department \$1,074.87. Through sales of educational material the Field Secretary was able to send to the Treasurer of this Auxiliary Branch, \$24.87, to be used for Rural Scholarship Funds. Our gifts for C. P. C. work through Mrs. Rote about \$300, making a total of all monies expended about \$7,650.00.

The report of the various departments and committees will be found for your observation and study in the year book, and you will then conclude that the work shows a loving service of good will to our less fortunate neighbors at home and abroad; fellow service to our fellow men.

I wish to express the appreciation of the work done by our retiring officers, to the U. T. O. Treasurer, Mrs. Page, the Vice-President-at-large and Mrs. Drinkwater, in their labor of love and devotion to the Church; and also to express our regret in the resignation of one of our Vice-Presidents, Mrs. Van Horne, a few months ago owing to ill-health. Mrs. Van Horne and Mrs. Drinkwater have been active in Diocesan and Parish work for many years, attending regularly auxiliary, committee, executive and other meetings. Their faithfulness and devotion to the Church have been a constant inspiration to others in the Diocese, and their splendid service will be greatly missed, and I take this occasion to pay them this tribute.

In July, the Educational Secretary and your President attended the provincial summer conference at Frederick, Maryland. With everyone there I, too was most enthusiastic about the educational and inspirational values of this conference, and all it does for the young people. So I asked Mrs. Rudderow, who is a devoted churchwoman and who, with her daughter, was at the conference and was so pleased and inspired, that I felt Mrs. Rudderow was the one to inspire others and to tell you all about the Conference and to urge you to attend this year, and to send young people from every Parish.

In March and April attended meetings in three other Dioceses and had study classes in two small missions. In May, spoke at two Archdeaconry Meetings in Carlisle and Phillipsburg, and in June addressed

the Diocesan Meeting of the Girls' Friendly Society at Camp Betty Washington. In June also, I visited the various missions and parishes in the Northern Archdeaconry and addressed the Archdeaconry Meeting at Westfield on the aims and ideals of the Woman's Auxiliary through a definite program; attended the Racine Conference in Wisconsin for Diocesan officers in the spring and was so benefited that I hope to return in May.

I delivered over one thousand self-denial envelopes to branches in my own A. D. enjoying very much the personal contact with the parish officers and members. September and October gave me little or no time for a vacation, as I was kept busy with the affairs of the Provincial Synod, which met in October in Harrisburg, and I felt the responsibility as Diocesan Hostess to the women delegates. It was my pleasure to have our Provincial President, Mrs. Adams, of Pittsburgh, as my guest in September, and to entertain several of the executive officers from southern Virginia during the Provincial meeting.

The opportunity to address an autumn meeting of the Williamsport A. D. in Shamokin, was given me, on the cooperation of the womanhood of the Church with the National Council through a definite program of work; and to send a report to the Altoona A. D. on the Auxiliary sessions of the Provincial Synod. At the autumn meeting of the Harrisburg A. D., I spoke at Trinity Church, Chambersburg, on woman's part of the Church's program. At the close of this meeting, the Harrisburg A. D. Vice-President and I motored over to Blue Ridge Summit as Miss Dickey's guests and spent several days visiting the missions there. I have traveled over seven thousand miles in my auto, over six hundred by train, visited thirty-six parishes and missions. Sixty-three visits altogether. With Mrs. Gammack, I drove over one thousand miles in the Harrisburg A. D., and she made a deep impression and was a great help in inspiring the women to service. At the end of her visit, I invited to my home representatives from nineteen parishes to meet her and she gave a resume of her work and the program for the Triennium for the women to accomplish. After brief talks by Bishop Darlington and eight of the clergy of the Diocese, I served a buffet supper to the one hundred and three present, and everyone had an opportunity to tell Mrs. Gammack their appreciation and good-bye.

I have written over four hundred twenty-six letters, and forty cards, sent twelve telegrams, a number of 'phone messages, and one dozen of Miss Lindley's Noon-Day Prayers to Missionaries in eight foreign fields of work and correspond with them during the year, together with six others in our Domestic Field in whom I am interested.

You will observe your President has not been idle. There have been many discouragements and hindrances but we grow stronger in meeting and overcoming them. It has given me the greatest joy to work with you. It is my fervent hope to accomplish first things first, and with your cooperation in Auxiliary work in its every phase in this, my last year in office, we will be able to reach our goal in establishing some phase, if not all, of Auxiliary work in every parish. I am always at your service, as are all of the executive officers, but, my dear friends, it is the concerted efforts of all church women that bring results, and I want to express my appreciation for the fine work and gifts of the Branches.

Let us aim to have study classes in every parish. The clergy are ideal instructors, but, if not available, there are always leaders to give others a world vision of the Church at work. Your Educational Secretary will supply you with all material and good religious books and literature.

I wish the Missionary Calendar were more used. Your Educational Secretary will get it for you, at your request.

It is only through this information that we get real inspiration, and, as some one has said, that means action, in other words, deeds. Let us pray that all hesitation in witnessing for Christ may be taken from our hearts and that we will have a fervent desire to share Him with others.

Our work, constant and consistent, a part of our faith;
Our faith, always entering into our work.

PERSONAL RELIGION AND EVANGELISM

The following resolution was adopted at the Triennial of the Woman's Auxiliary meeting in Washington, October, 1928

1. Whereas, The Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council has felt very keenly the need for a deeper spiritual life and renewed consecration to our Lord Jesus on the part of the women of the Church, and has expressed the same through the Message of 1925, and

Whereas, We have experienced through the Bishop's Crusade the need of a more public and private witness for Christ in the life of today, and have had a real part in the preparation and carrying forward of the Crusade, and

Whereas, The National Commission on Evangelism is urging the Church through all its varying agencies to incorporate personal evangelism in the regular life of the Church,

We believe that the time has come when realizing fully our corporate strength and the fresh power engendered by these precious experiences of the past Triennium, we must set forth, as individual members of the Auxiliary and the Church, the Body of Christ, on the next steps in our task of winning the world for Christ, looking out on this world from our own homes to the uttermost parts, we find that the crux of the whole matter lies in ourselves, that the challenge comes to each and every one of us, for we are the interpreters of Christ to our generation. Therefore, we believe that the first step should be that we continue to deepen our personal religious lives until we are steeped in the spirit of our Lord and Master and the practice of the presence of God becomes a necessity and next that we help others in their quest for a more complete life.

We find that personal evangelism is an attempt to render this help through the process of friendship.

And Whereas, we believe that personal evangelism cannot be carried out through set programs or meetings, alone, we offer, in all humility, the following suggestions as aids in our undertaking.

The Ministry of books—the reading and re-reading of the many simple books which have been the help and strength of others, and the wise and judicious recommending and lending of these to friends.

The ministry of prayer—the keeping of a quiet time with Christ—at the beginning of each day—talking with God in our own words and listening to Him,—the use of the Prayer Book, the Prayer Leaflet and the many beautiful prayers written for special occasions and persons and the asking of others to join us in prayer, separately or in small groups at certain times and for special purposes.

The ministry of the spoken word, believing that a few words, filled with the gentleness of Christ and the power of the Holy Spirit, passed on from one re-kindled soul to another, would mean the whole gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ spread anew over our whole land.

The ministry of the Holy Communion, more frequent communions with special prayers or a few chosen companions, renewed consecration of ourselves, our souls and bodies and a ready submission to the will of Christ.

The ministry of example—that through that which Christ has wrought in us others may see and believe.

"I have called you friends; for all things that I heard from my Father I have made known unto you. Ye did not choose me, but I chose you, and appointed you, that ye should go and bear fruit, and that your fruit should abide."

Therefore Be It Resolved: That we each and every one of us, return to our several dioceses from this meeting, praying that all hesitation in witnessing for Christ may be taken from our hearts, with a fervent desire to share Him with others and a sincere purpose to carry out the same.

REPORT OF THE VICE PRESIDENT OF THE ALTOONA ARCHDEACONY 1929



The Vice-President of the Altoona Archdeaconry submits the following report of work done in 1929.

There are 7 branches, 5 being strictly Auxiliary and 2 being guilds doing Auxiliary work.

All branches have one corporate communion, 2 have 2 and one branch has 3 during the year.

6 branches have a prayer partner.

We have the distinction of being 100 per cent. in C. P. C. work, all seven branches paying C. P. C. dues and doing active work in that part of our Auxiliary work.

One parish has a Sir Galahad club, 2 have Girls' Friendly societies, 2 Young Peoples' Fellowship.

5 Branches have mission study classes, 4 have programs at meetings. There are 240 subscriptions to the Harrisburg Churchman and 40 to the Spirit of Missions.

Mrs. Gammack spent almost a week in Altoona Archdeaconry, holding well attended center meetings at Phillipsburg, Altoona and Lewistown.

There have been fourteen boxes sent at the request of the Supply Department Secretary valued at \$285, and 4 sent independently with a value of \$25.

Pledges and specials amounted to \$727.28. Our U. T. O. this year was \$548.07. Total of box work, pledges, specials and U. T. O. was \$1,585.35.

Two Archdeaconry meetings were held, in May and November at Phillipsburg and Altoona, respectively, both well attended. In the spring we had the pleasure of hearing our newly elected secretary, Miss Culbertson, also Rev. Stanley of Tyrone, who gave a fine talk on "Rural Work". Mrs. Adams, our beloved provincial president gave us some of the high lights in Auxiliary work at our fall meeting.

I have mailed 73 letters, 300 self denial envelopes, had 6 long distance calls, attended 2 executive board meetings.

10 faithful women have entered into rest during the year.

I cannot speak too highly of the loyalty and co-operation of every branch—no request for money or service has been neglected or denied.

Several Lectures and addresses on Mission Work at three Missionary Mass Meetings at Lancaster, Harrisburg and Carlisle, at which Bishop Darlington, Rev. Dr. Foreman of "281", Bishop Campbell, Bishop Ward, Bishop Reifsnyder, The Rev. H. J. Stretch of Liberia, and Deaconess Stewart, spoke.

Also Mrs. Gammack a U. T. O. Worker from "281" visited 14 Parishes and Missions in this Archdeaconry and her work and influence was an outstanding event. She brought helpfulness and information and joy everywhere she went.

St. James, Lancaster and St. Luke's, Mt. Joy, had thier first Corporate Communion in September.

13 Parishes have Corporate Communions, several, two to four times annually.

One Missionary Tea was given at the home of our Diocesan President, Mrs. Brinton, at which 100 women from 18 Parishes, and the Bishop, 8 clergy and Mrs. Gammack, spoke, and a buffet supper followed with much sociability.

We have had 3 Reading Circles, 7 Bible Classes, 14 Study Classes, 12 Parishes with Program Meetings, 8 Parishes with Parish papers or Bulletin Boards.

Several Parishes and Missions had lectures on the New Prayer books; one worthy of mention, St. John's, Carlisle, by Father Viets.

Many more women are reading the Church Program and Church papers, and other religious educational literature.

In Camp Hill, Carlisle and other places, the young people made scrap books and colored pictures for the study classes to use.

The offering from our classes, about \$120, was sent to Bishop Campbell, for work in Liberia.

Mrs. Sarah Brownell of Liberia, addressed the spring meeting on her work among the children there and told of the training she was having in America to go back and do Kindergarten Work.

We sent to Elizabethtown \$26.00 for Church fund; \$7.00 to Rural Scholarship Fund after Archdeaconry expenses were paid, in May.

Rev. Mr. Bennett addressed the Fall meeting at Chambersburg, on "A Tenderfoot goes West," and spoke of Bishop Cassaday's work there.

\$20.00 was sent to the Deaconess Retiring Fund and \$20.00 to Kuling School, after this Meeting.

The Corporate Gift was nearly \$280.00.

The total value of the Box Work in this Archdeaconry including boxes, check and barrel was \$1,009.27.

Our U. T. O. \$1,363.03.

Our C. P. C. in pledges and paid subscriptions \$105.35.

We observed the World Day of Prayer in most of our parishes, as well as having many hours of intercession or quiet hours.

There are 4 subscribers to Prayer Leaflets, and Findings.

Visited with the Diocesan President, Mrs. Brinton, the Mission at Blue Ridge Summit and Waynesboro and Beartown. I shall never forget the early morning service at Calvary Chapel, Beartown, on All Saints Day, 1929.

During the year 1929, eighteen of our faithful women have passed from the Church Militant into the Church Triumphant. "Grant unto them, O Lord, rest eternal, in Thy presence."

REPORT OF THE VICE PRESIDENT OF THE WILLIAMSPORT ARCHDEACONY 1929



The Vice-President of the Williamsport Archdeaconry submits the following report of work done during the year 1929.

Women worked along Auxiliary lines in 18 Parishes, some as organized Auxiliary Branches, others, as Guilds doing Auxiliary work.

The Spring and Fall meetings were well attended. In the Spring our principal speakers were, the Venerable Charles E. McCoy, Chairman of the Diocesan Department of Religious Education, speaking of the "Educational value of the Summer Conference". The Rev. Robert McCutchen, Rector of Trinity Church, Shamokin, told of the work of the Church in the Philippines. Mr. McCutchen was a missionary there for eleven years. Mr. J. M. Miller, Secretary of the Speakers Bureau, Church Missions House, N. Y., told of "Our Church among the Indians". The Diocesan Educational Secretary also had a part in the program.

The Fall Meeting was in the form of an Educational Meeting. The Diocesan Officers were present and each explained her particular line of work. Mrs. Graeff, wife of the Chaplain of the Shippensburg Home for the Aged, gave a short history of the Home, and told how we might encourage those in charge of this work. The Diocesan President, Mrs. Brinton gave a splendid talk on the "Aims and Ideals of the Woman's Auxiliary".

After the Expenses of these meetings were paid, the offerings were given to the Deaconess Retiring Fund, Diocesan Expense Fund, Corporate Gift and Native Assistant Fund (Gladys Spencer).

Educational.

Last year we said that we regretted that so few from this Archdeaconry attended the Summer Conferences. We have the same regret this year as only five from the Archdeaconry attended the Blue Mountain Conference, and three, the Bethlehem Conference. Our hope is that we will realize the importance of the Conferences. The Educational Secretary and your Vice-President held eight center meetings. Educational work was stressed at these meetings. Fourteen branches had Study Groups, eleven have Program meetings, there were five Reading Circles, four Bible classes, three Lantern slide lectures, four Pageants, five have Parish papers, ten have Bulletin boards. There were two exhibits, one Institute, three missionary mass meetings. There is one circulating library of devotional and study books. Many women have read and circulated devotional books and books on the Church's Program. In every parish from two to twenty subscribers to one or more weekly Church papers. 115 subscribe to the Spirit of Missions. There are subscribers to the Harrisburg Churchman in every branch—three branches report a 100% subscription for their parishes. There were two days of Intercessory Prayer, Thirty-two Corporate Communions, six Quiet Days. Five Parishes have the Young Peoples Fellowship, four have girls' clubs, three have Girls' Friendly Societies.

Box Work.

In this Archdeaconry, 29 new boxes and 3 second hand boxes and 2 checks were sent by request of the Diocesan Supply Secretary. Sent independent of the Diocesan Supply Secretary, 2 boxes sent to Prayer Partners, 5 boxes, value \$44.00 sent to St. Anne Preventorium, 1 box, value \$3.00 sent to Lunenburg, 2 contributions, \$4.50, sent to the Marine Hospital, New Mexico, 1 barrel and 1 box of candy sent to the Shippensburg Home. There are probably more branches doing independent work. Total in boxes and checks \$527.27 sent through the Diocesan Supply

Secretary. The Supply Work of the Archdeaconry as distributed by Mrs. W. E. Johnston of Rupert, Pa., has been very successful.

C. P. C.

In the Archdeaconry there were 20 paid subscriptions, 49 forwarded magazines—making a total of 69. Eight calendars and 200 Christmas cards were sold. Money given for this work \$58.00.

U. T. O.

The United Thank Offering for the year 1929 was \$1,139.65.

Our pledges totalled \$604.41, Specials \$21.27, and Corporate Gift \$201.70.

This makes a grand total of money spent for Box work, given to Pledges and Specials, and U. T. O. \$1,354.65.

Actual work of the Vice-President.

Your Vice-President made 17 visits to Parish Branches, presided over 1 Archdeaconry Meeting, and eight center meetings, attended two meetings of the Diocesan Council, being a member of the Diocesan Department of Religious Education, attended two Executive Board Meetings, attended the Northern Archdeaconry meeting and had a part in the program, attended the Diocesan Convention at Trinity, Williamsport. Conducted a model class at a Church School Institute, led a study class. Went to Huntingdon on official Diocesan Business. Attended the Annual Meeting at Lancaster. Had Intercessory Prayer at a City Missionary Union Meeting. Wrote notes for the Harrisburg Churchman.

Mrs. Gammuck, a Field Worker, visited this Archdeaconry and held five center meetings, which brought together 14 parishes. Mrs. Gammuck led Conferences and discussion groups and explained the Church's Work and our part in it. A visit from headquarters is always inspirational and profitable and Mrs. Gammuck was a welcome visitor. Mrs. Madge Miller of Chile visited the Archdeaconry as did a missionary from India. Deaconess Stewart, Head of the Church Training and Deaconess School, Philadelphia (on leave from China) visited the Archdeaconry in October after the Province Meeting.

The Vice-President in her official capacity travelled 1456 miles from January 1st to June 13th. She wrote 237 letters, 31 postals, 18 box allotments, 1 special delivery letter, made 4 long distance calls.

Mrs. M. W. Van Horne our beloved and honored Vice-President was unable to continue her work after the month of June on account of ill health. There are no words adequate to express our regret that she had to lay down her work for awhile, and our earnest prayers are that she may be restored to health and be able to resume her place among us.

The Educational Secretary took over the work until October 10th when Mrs. Albra Reeder of Williamsport was elected to fill the unexpired term of the Vice-President. Our best wishes are for Mrs. Reeder, and we offer her our co-operation in her effort to uphold the high standard of this Archdeaconry which Mrs. Van Horne set for us, through years of untiring zeal and the generous giving of herself and her time.

Mrs. Reeder has visited several parishes at their request, she sent out the Archdeaconry Report Blanks, and attended all routine business that comes at the close of a year's work.

Mrs. Reeder is recovering from an attack of Grippe and the Educational Secretary is preparing this report for presentation at the Annual Meeting.




Miss Anne Furst of Flemington was elected Diocesan Secretary. We wish her success and happiness in the work, and pledge ourselves to give her hearty co-operation.

REPORT OF DEVOTIONAL COMMITTEE FOR 1929



Our President, Mrs. Brinton, has asked me as Chairman of the Devotional Committee, to speak to you briefly concerning its purpose.

Its aim is the spiritual advancement of the members of the Auxiliary and their families, through various mediums, such as Grace at meals. If you have a child, let the child say the grace; or, if you have children let them take turns in saying the grace. I have a friend in Lancaster who has a son who insists upon saying grace before he eats, whether it be in a tea room, in a hotel, at a picnic, or at a bridge party. I was at a party in this home lately and when the refreshments were ready to be served, the hostess said, "I hope you don't mind Willie saying a blessing." In our own home we never have a bridge luncheon or supper without a blessing. We like to think of our Lord as being with us at our parties, as well as when we are alone.

Another avenue of spiritual advancement is through Daily Prayer and Bible Readings. Again, let the children do the reading, and perhaps by the time they are old as we are now, they won't be scared to death to get up and read a prayer and a few verses from the Bible in front of a small group of women whom they have known for years.

We had a devotional committee at Saint John's a few years ago when I was president, with our friend, Mrs. Rote as chairman, and three times out of four she had to have the devotional portion of the meeting herself, because the women simply could not read a prayer and five or six verses from the Bible. It is really pathetic, and I confess frankly, I would rather conduct ten business meetings than one devotional meeting. If we teach our children when they are young, to do these things, they will do them later in public without embarrassment.

It should be the duty of the Devotional Committee to arrange Quiet Hours or Days; the Corporate Communions of the Auxiliary; to present Religious Dramas or Pageants. Of course, every branch could not do all of these things, but each branch can arrange its programs according to their individual ability.

The Committee thinks that the best way to get this request from the National Executive Board to each branch is through the Spring Arch-deaconry meetings, and by having the Vice-presidents present it in their spring letters to the branches. Then the branch president can appoint a Devotional Committee with her other committee to begin work in the Fall of 1930.


This request comes from our National Executive Board, and as a part of the organization, we hope every branch will at least try to comply with the request.

A Call to Prayer

A call to prayer from the Jerusalem meeting of the International Missionary Council has more than ordinary interest for members of the Anglican Communion throughout the world. In the autumn of 1925, gatherings were held in the Jerusalem Chamber of Westminster Abbey to pray for the overseas work of the Church of England. From this group came the Jerusalem Chamber Fellowship of Prayer, which formulated eight objectives of prayer. These objectives were widely used and by August 1927, eighty-five thousand persons in all parts of the world had pledged themselves to set apart some time daily for intercession for these objectives. The Committee of the International Missionary Council meeting at Rattvik, Sweden in 1926 used these same objectives in the leaflet entitled *Prayer for Spiritual Revival*. And when the Jerusalem Conference wished to send out from the Mount of Olives a Call to Prayer that would reach the ear of the world, it took the words, framed in the Jerusalem Chamber, already familiar to thousands, and commended them to the Churches represented there as embodying those needs upon the meeting of which the coming of the Kingdom waits.

For a Missionary Spirit. That the Church may see the whole world's need of Christ, and may be ready for any sacrifice in order to make Him known to all mankind.

For a Spirit of Prayer. That Christian people may learn to pray as Christ prayed and taught His disciples to pray; and that an ever increasing number of intercessors may be raised up until the whole Church is awakened to prayer.

For a Spirit of Sacrifice. That the Church may be willing at whatever cost to follow and to bear witness to the way of Christ as she sees it.

For a Spirit of Unity. That the whole Church of Christ may desire and experience a new unity in Christ.

For the Gift of Interpretation. That the Church may learn to preach the eternal Gospel by word and life in terms that the men and women of this age will understand.

For Courageous Witness in Moral Questions. That the witness of the Church in the moral questions of our day may truly reflect the mind of God and may be known and felt throughout the world.

For a Spirit of Service. That a great number of men and women may offer themselves unreservedly to do Christ's work at home and abroad in our generation.

For the Completion of Our Own Conversion. For the removal of all hindrances in our lives to the manifestation of God's redeeming love and power.

The interest in the Educational work the past year has been very encouraging. The work has been general rather than the study of one book during the Lenten Season.

The Branches nearly all have Educational Programs. There is keen interest on the part of the women in the young people of the parishes, and they are supporting in various ways the Educational Program of the Church.

The Study of the General Church Program was as enthusiastically studied in a number of branches as the New Africa. In fact two branches have voted to use the General Church Program for programs at all regular Auxiliary meetings throughout the year.

Larger numbers are subscribing for, and reading the Church Periodicals. A few parishes have Spirit of Missions Representatives.

In a number of branches the women earn money to send women and young people to the Summer Conferences in order that they may receive training for leadership.

Through the endless efforts of the Educational leaders, past and present, the Educational work of the Woman's Auxiliary in this Diocese is on a firm foundation. May God bless our efforts and give us renewed strength to always go forward in the cause of Jesus Christ, our Saviour.
