

**Constitution of the Harrisburg Diocesan Branch of the
Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council of the
Protestant Episcopal Church of America**



ARTICLE I

NAME

The name of the Association is the Harrisburg Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church of America.

ARTICLE II

OBJECT

The object of this Association is to carry out in the Diocese of Harrisburg by united and systematic effort, the three great aims of the Women's Auxiliary, viz: Daily Prayer for Missions, the Study of Missions, and Systematic Giving for Missions.

ARTICLE III

MEMBERSHIP

Every baptized woman in the church is eligible to membership in the Parish Auxiliary, and all the Auxiliaries in the Diocese are members of this Association.

ARTICLE IV

OFFICERS

The elective officers of this Association shall consist of a President, a Vice President-at-Large, a Vice President of each Archdeaconry, a Treasurer, a United Thank Offering Custodian, a Recording Secretary, and a Corresponding Secretary. These officers, with the Chairman and Secretary of the Church Service League, and the Chairman of the Church School Service League and the appointed officers (as Supply Department Secretary, Assistant to Recording Secretary, Educational Secretary and C. P. C. Director) shall form the Executive Board.

ARTICLE V

DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The President shall be elected at an annual meeting for a term of three years and may not succeed herself. It shall be the duty of the President to call meetings of the Association and the Executive Board, and preside at them. She shall also exercise a general supervision of all the work in the diocese and make a yearly report to the Association.

Section 2. The Vice President-at-Large shall be elected at an annual meeting and perform the duties of the President when she is unable to do so.

Section 3. Each Archdeaconry shall as soon as possible after the election of the President, elect from the three women in each Archdeaconry, previously nominated by the Bishop, a Vice President to serve three years.

Section 4. The Vice President of each Archdeaconry shall co-operate with the President in promoting local intelligence and interest, and in directing and organizing work in her own Archdeaconry.

Section 5. The Recording and Corresponding Secretary shall keep the minutes of the yearly correspondence, having charge of the writing, printing and sending out of reports and other documents, and make the yearly report.

Section 6. The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all moneys for the expense fund of the Association. Also receive and transmit to the Missionary Treasury such other moneys sent to her and make a yearly report.

Section 7. The United Thank Offering Custodian shall receive, hold and transmit all United Thank Offering moneys and make a yearly report.

Section 8. The Educational Secretary shall have general supervision of all the Missionary Educational Work carried on under the auspices of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Section 9. The term of office of all elected officers shall be limited to a term of three (3) years, and shall be without right of succession.

ARTICLE VI MEETINGS

There shall be one general meeting of this Association in each year and other meetings may be called by the Executive Board.

BY-LAWS

Section 1. A Nominating Committee consisting of one member from each Archdeaconry, shall be appointed by the President one month before the annual meeting.

Section 2. Elections shall be by ballots, and each branch shall be entitled to two votes, and an additional vote for each ten members or fraction thereof. These votes shall be cast by properly accredited delegates or their alternates.

Section 3. Delegates to the Triennial Meeting of the General Auxiliary shall be the President and four from the membership of the Auxiliary, and five alternates from the membership of the Auxiliary, to be elected by ballot.

Section 4. There shall be three delegates to the Provincial Meeting who shall be the President Ex-Officio, and two from the membership, to be chosen by ballot.

Section 5. An expense fund shall be provided by this Association for the necessary expenses, namely: Printing, postage, stationery, traveling expenses of speakers and officers, etc., to be arranged at the discretion of the Executive Board.

Rule 1. Twenty per cent. of the total amount pledged for the Expense Fund, be set aside for a Sinking Fund to be used at the direction of the Executive Board. All requisitions to be signed by the President.

Rule 2. At the Annual Meeting, the hostess branch shall entertain, over night, members of the Executive Board, Speakers on the Program and two delegates from each branch. Where more than two register from any branch, they shall pay their own entertainment.

Suggestions



Study with your Rector your year book. Take a day each month at the Parish House or meet at the home of the Church women, have a box lunch with tea or coffee provided by the hostess or a committee of three or more, and read and discuss the program:—

1. A day for the U. T. O. with the U. T. O. Litany and the leaflet. Keep up the interest in your Blue Boxes.
 2. The Supply Work Department—use your Manual and the spirit of Missions. Read letters from recipients, etc.
 3. Pledges, Diocesan and National and International to carry on the Church's Program.
 4. C. P. C. work—A very entertaining and interesting program will result in greater effort in this worthwhile work.
 5. Resume of Educational Work. The study class; what books are being read and used; the Adult and young people's classes; everything concerning greater zeal in Educational work.
 6. Have a committee to look after the Spirit of Missions and Diocesan papers and the Church at Work. To know is to achieve, through interest and willingness to serve.
 7. Discuss Domestic and Foreign work. Our share in the Indian, Negro, and foreign born work. At the end of the year, have a play or pageant and include the people we want to interest, and our churches will grow in grace and strength.
 8. Have Days of Intercessions; Quiet Hour and Corporate Communions.
 9. Visit the Shut-ins; the sick and lonely.
 10. Have offerings for Missions at your study classes.
 11. Have a Committee and arrange a program meeting each month for your Churchwomen, and you will have an interested and active Auxiliary Branch.
 12. Send all Pledges in by the 15th of May—Your Treasurer must send your pledges to the Diocesan and National Treasurer, June 1st. Be prompt, and she will be able to remit our pledges promptly.
 13. Devote part of each Auxiliary meeting to the Year Book.
 14. Because of the nature of our Auxiliary work, we must have overhead expenses, stationery, programs, year books, notices sent through cards and letters, postage, typing at certain times of the year, etc. In addition, speakers expenses to Annual Meetings, Conferences, Institutes, etc.; delegates and officers expenses to Province and General Conventions and Conferences if they are expected to efficiently do their duty; dues to the National Board and Province Board.
- Also such literature as will be of interest and material help for advancing the work, through the Diocese, to forward the work of the whole church.
- If each Parish increase their pledges proportionately, according to their Parish strength, many officers would not have expenses they can ill afford.
- Will your Branch be ready and willing to share in these pledges and the responsibility, too, that this Diocese may be able to enlarge its opportunities to further the Missionary endeavor of the Church, for the Extension of His Kingdom?

Our attention and efforts are directed to the Advance Work and the Church has asked us to do a big thing educationally and practically, to help raise a million and a half dollars for the Advance Work of the Church Program. The Advance Work Program is authorized by General Convention of 1929-1931. The Woman's Auxiliary is co-operating with the National Council in this great movement for growth which will be a Corporate Gift of the whole Church. There are 170 Projects. The Diocese of Harrisburg chose as its part in the program, first, the enlargement of the present mission building, Bayou Mayou duLarge, Terrebonne Parish, Louisiana. If we faithfully carry out our part of the program, it will bring Life Abundant to people who through no fault of their own, have been living in civilized America in pagan darkness. The second part of our project is to help raise sufficient funds to help the people of St. Barnabas Mission, Altoona, Pa., complete their fund for a Church Building. Every man, woman and child having a part in these worthy needs will surely be blessed. The March number of the Spirit of Missions—page 170—gives a very clear and concise statement of just what the Advance work Program is meant to accomplish.

Resolution on the United Thank Offering of 1931.

Resolved: That the United Thank Offering of 1931 be given to the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, to be used as follows:

One-tenth of the Offering to be added to the permanent trust fund, the income from which is to be used for retiring allowances of United Thank Offering workers.

That at least \$75,000 be held in reserve for training of United Thank Offering workers, any surplus to revert to the general fund.

And the sum of not less than two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000) to be appropriated for buildings to be erected in the mission field.

The balance of the Offering, together with all interest earned thereon to be used by the Missionary Society as directed by the National Council, for the work of women in the missionary enterprises of the Church including their training, equipping, sending and support and for their care when sick and disabled, the appointment of said women having been approved by the Executive Board.

Be It Further Resolved: That to our United Gifts shall be added our united and earnest prayers, that God will put into the hearts of many faithful women to give themselves and their substance, to the work of the Master in the Mission Field.

The Diocesan United Thank Offering Custodian requests that all offerings be in her hands September 1st, 1931. Her books will have to be closed and audited in order to be on time for the presentation at the General Convention. Please use every effort to comply with this request.

The fiftieth General Convention of the Church will convene on September 16th in Denver, Colorado. The host of the convention will be the Bishop of Colorado, the Rt. Rev. Irving P. Johnston, D.D.

The Diocesan U. T. O. Custodian, the President, and the four delegates or their Alternates will attend the meeting in Denver.

The Woman's Auxiliary of the Third Province, of which the Diocese of Harrisburg is a part, adopted the following Resolution presented at the province Meeting held in Philadelphia, Pa., Oct. 21-23, 1930. Resolved, that the Woman's Auxiliary of the 3rd Province co-operate wholeheartedly with the Daughters of the King in the observance of All Saints' Day as a day of intercession.

At the same meeting the adoption of the following resolution was passed: Moved that the Delegates, here assembled, carry to their several Parish Auxiliaries the recommendation that the Auxiliaries offer the Bishops, Clergy and Vestries their best efforts to promote a Program of Education through the Diocese in order that the Church Program, and the Advance work may be carried through in each particular Church.

The Blue Mountain Conference will be held at Hood College, Frederick, Maryland, June 29-July 10, 1931.

Minutes of the 26th Annual Meeting November 18-19, 1930



On the day appointed for the twenty-sixth annual meeting a very impressive service in memory of our late Bishop, the Rt. Rev. James Henry Darlington, PhD., D.D., LL.D., First Bishop of Harrisburg, was held in St. Stephen's Church, Harrisburg, at 4:00 o'clock, the preacher being the Presiding Bishop of the Church, the Most Reverend James DeWolf Perry, D.D. The delegates to the 26th Annual Meeting were in attendance.

The opening service of the Annual Meeting was held at 7:30 p. m. in St. John's Church, Carlisle, the speaker being the Rt. Rev. Thomas Jenkins, D.D., Bishop of Nevada, whose subject was "The Expanding Church." In early days the Church expanded; and the recent Lambeth Conference has shown that the Church is today expanding, with respect to the Eastern Orthodox and other Churches.

After the service the Diocesan President, Mrs. Caleb S. Brinton, entertained the delegates and friends most delightfully at her home, 165 West High street.

The second day of the meeting began with a celebration of the Holy Communion at 7:00 o'clock, the Rector of the Parish, the Rev. Harry D. Viets being Celebrant, and assisted by Bishop Jenkins.

Breakfast in the Parish House followed, after which the delegates assembled in the Church for the business of the Annual Meeting.

As the President of St. John's branch of the W. A. was unable to make the address of welcome, the Diocesan President, Mrs. Caleb S. Brinton performed this duty, and in well chosen words welcomed the delegates to St. John's Church, and to Carlisle.

Bishop Jenkins was then introduced, and spoke of Missions in Nevada. He began by reviewing the geography and history of the State, which is two and a half times as large as Pennsylvania. In old geographies it was marked "The Great American Desert." It is indeed a dry state, sometimes no rain falling for a period of four years, and sometimes it goes contrary to its reputation, as when a summer conference was arranged, and tents without tops provided, and it rained!

Nevada is mountainous, the mountains ranging from 3,000 to 7,000 feet, and no railroad runs North and South through it. It was brought into statehood during the Civil War, to make one more state for the Union, and provided a large part of the gold necessary to carry on the war.

The chief industries at present are sheep raising, mining, and turkey raising. Agriculture is increasing rapidly, the water from mountain snows being used for irrigation. When the Boulder Dam is completed untold power will be released, and Southern Nevada will blossom like Southern California.

But in this vast State there are only three women Church workers, who are maintained by Blue Box offerings. Many more workers are needed.

The Bishop then gave a vivid account of social conditions in Nevada, and among other things spoke of old towns, sometimes called "Ghost Towns" from which the major portion of the people have gone, and cited one in particular which formerly had 6,000 inhabitants, and has now only 600. In some such places it happens that just one woman is holding things together; in others, a divinity student. But

all of these towns have a chance to come back. Organized vice is aware of this and is investing in real estate to secure its own future.

Imagine young people growing up in churchless towns, where the only common meeting place is the dance hall, or the gambling resort. The Church needs money for workers that all these remote and scattered towns may be reached, and the young people given their right to grow into useful law abiding, and Christian citizens.

Deaconess Ransom was the next speaker, and after expressing her pleasure at being again in the Diocese, told of her work in Japan, where she is the only American in a population of 35,000.

Since the earthquake Japan has become more Western. The dress of the women is changing from the kimono to Western attire; architecture has become a combination of East and West.

Deaconess Ransom stressed the importance of the kindergarten as the best way to reach non-church homes, as the homes themselves are so difficult to approach. Confirmation classes are largely made up of those whose contact with Christianity began in the kindergarten. Three priests and six women are now at work, assisted by a trained Japanese, and the greatest need is for more workers.

The Diocesan President, Mrs. Caleb S. Brinton, then gave a very comprehensive survey of the work done by the Diocesan Auxiliary during the last three years. Her address is printed on page 21 of the Annual Report.

Brief reports were then made by Executive Officers, which are printed in this Report; after which Miss Lindley, Executive Secretary of the National W. A., conducted a conference which led to the discussion of the following questions: The basis of membership in parish branches; the conflicting dates of the fall collection of the U. T. O.; and the self denial week offering; Pageantry; missionary exhibits; educational work. The discussion revealed great interest and the conference was very instructive. Miss Lindley conducted the noon day meditations; adjournment was made for lunch.

On re-convening, the ballots which had been deposited on the way to lunch, showed the following to have been elected:

President—Mrs. Albertine Batzle.

Treasurer—Miss Ruth Stockton.

Delegates to the Triennial Convention in Denver in September, 1931—Mrs. Caleb S. Brinton, Mrs. J. H. Spotts; Mrs. M. R. Cowell, and Mrs. J. C. Kunkel.

Alternates are Mrs. Geo. Zeigler, Mrs. W. U. Mussina, Mrs. C. M. Clement, Mrs. C. E. McCoy, and Mrs. R. M. H. Wharton.

The Resolutions Committee then presented its report which was adopted, and is printed on page 29.

Impressions of the Synod of the Third Province held in Philadelphia in October, were given by Mrs. Rudderow, of Harrisburg; Mrs. Fleming, of Altoona; and Miss Black, of Philipsburg. Miss Black had been sent as a delegate representing the "B" branches, and her report was most interesting as representing the view-point of young women.

Miss Lindley then gave a short inspirational address, in which she asked the Auxiliary to join the Master Carpenter in making the world beautiful—in the personal life, in the home, in the parish, and in the Diocese.

New business being called for, Mrs. J. H. Spotts moved that a Committee be appointed to alter and revise the Constitution. The motion having carried, the President appointed Mrs. Spotts, Mrs.

Zeigler, Mrs. Booth, and Mrs. McCutcheon as members of this Committee.

No further business being presented for consideration the meeting adjourned; the next meeting to be in Christ Church, Williamsport, at the call of the President. Following adjournment, those who were present expressed informally to the President, and the members of St. John's, Carlisle, thanks and congratulations on the great success which had attended every session.

President's Report for 1930



My final report will be a resume of work accomplished the past several years.

Nearly ten years ago, our late Bishop, The Rt. Rev. James H. Darlington, appointed me Vice-President of the large Harrisburg A. D., and it was a great pleasure and privilege to serve nearly seven years in that office; presiding at, and responsible for 13 meetings, one a two-day session at St. James', Lancaster, where Mrs. Pilsbry, Ed. Sec., of Penna. Diocese, gave to our Diocese the real impetus to know, and incentive to learn the real mission of the Church, through more interesting W. A. and parochial study classes; and Mrs. J. Alison Scott, of Philadelphia, inspired Church women to help pay their Parish and Field Work Quotas, forgetting parochialism and selfishness, and helping in every way to carry on the Church's Program.

During these past nearly ten years, two General Conventions have been attended: at New Orleans and at Washington; several Provincial Synods; twenty-nine A. D. Meetings; many conferences; twenty-four Executive Board Meetings; twenty-nine Diocesan Council Meetings; ten Annual Meetings; five summer conferences; a Diocesan Conference at Taylor Hall, Racine, Wisconsin. Many other Dioceses have been visited to get help and all suggestions for growth and progress in our own Diocese. A trip to the Missions in Latin America was taken to prepare for the study of our work in this Field. All parishes but a few scattered Missions in the Diocese have been visited, many several times, and I have spoken in nearly all of them; in several, organized in part, or wholly, Auxiliary work, and helped as Sec., Treas., and Ed., leader of Study Groups, and program work.

Because of all these contacts, and interest in the Church's Mission, you conferred on me the great honor and privilege of being your Diocesan President. These duties meant first—spiritual obligations—to fit myself for this great opportunity to advance the Church's growth through the prayers, education, service and gifts of all baptized women. It meant, too, practical obligations—awakening the interest of all women in helping to buildup the work, which could only be done by strengthening every phase of the Church's program, through a definite, systematic, united effort for cooperation of all Church women. One of the most important responsibilities a presiding officer has, is to create a **desire**, then the willingness to **serve**, in the hearts of every Church woman, young and old. Experience has taught this can only be achieved through the inclusion in every Parish or Mission in some definite program of work, of every girl and woman that she may feel **she** is helping to share with her Rector, her Parish. Through **her** prayer life, **her** membership in study or discussion classes, **her** box-supply work; (even though done at home by business girls and women; or shut-ins) **her** gifts of thank-offerings or self-denials; all work and gifts the result of a conscientious feeling of Christian stewardship. We grow in the service of the Church in proportion to the spirit of that service. The womanhood of the Church is entrusted as Auxiliary members of the National Council, with the work of the **whole** Church, in all its departments; Missions and church extensions; Religious Education; Field Work; Social Service; Publicity; and Finance. A suggestion is that attendance at the General

Conventions, Province Meetings and our own A. D. and Annual Meetings will give the inspiration because of much needed information.

Valued assistance and encouragement have been given me by our wonderful and inspiring National Ex. Sec., Miss Lindley and her capable staff at "281." You do well to include them on your program, and use their suggestions if you would successfully accomplish your program.

We have increased our Missionary activities these past few years through the splendid work and gifts of the Women of Beartown, Columbia, Holy Cross, Enola, Millersburg, Westfield, Montoursville, all small parishes or Missions, but doing pioneer work for humanity's sake, along Auxiliary lines, and expect much growth as a result.

To carry out this spirit in a practical way, every Church woman, old and young, enlisted to carry on through a great Corporate Gift, to provide adequate equipment for the Advancement of the Church's work in all the Mission Fields, at home and in foreign lands. Every Diocese sharing to help complete this big undertaking, started at the great Triennial Meeting in Washington. Miss Lindley in her Message said: "The very bigness of these wonderful undertakings gives us courage and inspiration for their achievement." This Diocese, with the others, through the self-denial gifts of the girls and women, gave their Corporate Gift this year as a Memorial to our beloved former President, Mrs. C. H. Boyer, happy in the fact that we, too, were helping to provide buildings, equip schools, hospitals, libraries; in brief, we too, were sharing "to man and equip, to be ready to attack where opportunity knocks and wherever God's messengers see their duty is apparent."

These past three years we have contributed to the Corporate Gift through our Self-denials in September, just about \$2,500.00. This, my dear fellow-workers, means our Branches have helped erect seven Churches—in Brazil, Panama, Haiti, Santo Domingo, Louisiana, the Philippines and St. Barnabas, Altoona; a Hospital in Liberia, two schools in Japan and Alaska; a boy's Dormitory at Christ School, Arden, N. C.; and a water supply for St. Michael's Mission at Ethete, Wyoming. These are our Christian investments, and we are happy that the response has always been a generous one, and take pride in the thought that our returns have been and will be a "thousand fold." Our cup of happiness is over-flowing, when we realize that through the over-subscriptions of all Dioceses we were able to send the surplus to Bishop Littell, whom we know and regard most affectionately, for his work in Honolulu—a new Church for the Japanese. We should never forget systematic giving and Christian stewardship are conscientious aims of the W. A.

If every Branch has several copies of the Church's program, issued before and after each Triennial Convention, and study and discuss it page by page during each Triennium every woman would know what the Church is doing, what it stands for, the amount of her Parish Quotas; and consider it part of her Christian responsibility to influence her parish to meet its quota, so the Church may, indeed, "Go Forward."

The U. T. O. with its Corporate Communion, represents in these through words, "an appealing, personal and sacred part" of each Churchwoman's life, because it is a gift close to our hearts. We know through the gifts we put in our little Blue Boxes, we are helping to send more than 200 Missionaries to spread the Gospel of Christ's

love and redemption; to build churches and schools; provide for sick and disabled workers; pension retired workers; and how we all rejoice in sharing the salary of dear Bishop Rowe of Alaska!

We have set the goal for this coming Triennium for not less than \$12,000.00. Will this service of "United Praise and Thanksgiving" in 1931, at Denver, be a real spiritual and thanksgiving Experience for every woman in this Diocese?

We need alert, enthusiastic, custodians of Blue Boxes, who will twice each year arrange a U. T. O. program or a play; who will see that every woman gets and reads the Spirit of Missions, and her own Diocesan paper; and has a Blue Box. Our U. T. O. the three years of this administration will be about \$10,000.00.

This report would not be complete without reference to the capable and earnest work of the Director, Mrs. Rote, who has made great strides in this Department and has recently been elected Director of this Province.

Every dollar pledged to C. P. C. work means we are serving in five fields of activities: religious education, social service, Mission and Church extension and publicity; all because of a simple card, a book or magazine, through your pledges and checks; your subscriptions and remailing used copies.

During this tenure of office, 390 donors have sent in paid subscriptions, or forwarded 727 magazines, 1,108 books, over 19,200 miscellaneous pieces, and to 15 prayer-partners their favorite magazines, and in total cash receipts nearly \$900.00.

Mrs. Betticher's lantern-slide lecture on the "Spirit of Missions," enlightened us all in the whole work of the Church-at-large; the result was many additional subscriptions. How can any Church woman or man do without this official organ of our Church? I appeal for a subscription through your C. P. C. Secretary or U. T. O. Custodian in every Church Home.

We were made more conscious of our individual responsibility toward Rural Work in a splendid address by Dr. Foreman, National Sec. of Rural Work; and again in the study of "Beyond the City Limits."

We now observe the 5th Sunday after Easter as Rural Sunday and other intercessions for "Thy Kingdom Come," in Rural localities.

Through our Diocesan pledges to Mt. Alto, We are acquiring a fine church property. We will need the same \$250.00 pledge we assumed several years ago—for some time, to keep it in condition and repairs; for Chaplain and Mrs. Hughes have established the Church there and vicinity, as a permanent work, and this year a large enclosed porch has been erected to function as a Paris House for the Church School and other Mt. Alto activities, for social service work.

Two other Diocesan pledges in which, with Mt. Alto, our late Bishop was vitally interested are the Home for the Aged at Shippensburg and Camp Betty Washington below York.

At a last conference with our Bishop, he urged me to have the Auxiliary pledge to these, our only Three Diocesan institutions. At the Home there are many expenditures for supplies, household and medical service, repairs, insurance, heat and light, etc.

Bishop Darlington felt the work was so vital to the girls of our Diocese of the Girls' Friendly Society, that at the beginning of this administration he requested that Mrs. Heighes, the G. F. S. President,

become a member of the Executive Board. He assumed that added incentive and support would be given through Mr. and Mrs. Heiges' splendid work and influence over these young women, who have so faithfully cooperated in every way through Mission study classes, Box work, Blue Boxes, C. P. C. prayer-partners, recruiting and enlisting others for Church service; also having a splendid social service record in caring for the sick and needy; and in giving to Missions and to the Corporate Gift. So we are asking very liberal pledges to Mt. Alto, Home for the Aged, and Camp Betty Washington; and knowing through splendid visitations, let me appeal to every Parish to send their girls to this Camp, each summer, under the careful supervision of Mrs. Heiges and her group of capable counselors.

As to our prayer-partners, we are one hundred per cent. in this Diocese in encouraging through the daily prayers of our prayer-partners, eighteen Missionaries. A few letters each day, a gift perhaps at Christmas, Easter or a Birthday, sharing in this way their work through this spiritual movement.

Will every Branch write Miss Cook each year so she knows what you are doing, and can advise any new Branch concerning a partner, and what to do. You will find a daily mid-day prayer for Missions and our prayerpartners "in the hearts and upon the lips" of every Church woman, brings a sense of more than fellowship—the strength and will to become more efficient workers in the Master's Vineyard.

What a source of genuine happiness we have in our Supply work! Helping to send supplies in our work of uplift, support, and church extension to the needy and unfortunate we always find we have with us here and abroad!

It is my earnest hope and prayer that through the Box Supply Department, all women may learn to realize these God-given opportunities for spreading information about the Mission fields; that in your gifts of money and supplies you will learn about the people and what our Church is doing in the places to which your boxes are sent. Have an Advent and Lenten program, using Leaflets 12 and 94 W. A. Your home work will draw you closer to the real work in the Mission Field, and these closer contacts will bring desired results. The total amount of Box work done in 1928, '29 and '30 is about \$8,342.00.

The Educational Department has been steadily growing and it is earnestly desired that all clergy and Ed. Secretaries interest their parish in the study of the General Church program, the Expanding Church and the study of India, this year.

We are trying to reach the isolated, through literature, and invitations to central, parochial and other meetings; and visiting them when possible, and including them in study classes, personally or through correspondence. Deaconess Stewart of the Church Training School, Philadelphia, has visited the Diocese several times, and appealed for the right type of Young Women to prepare for Church Training. We are making every effort to enlist others for Mission activities; through conference attendance, our young people are getting the **vision** and the **zeal** to give themselves and influence others to enter the Mission Field. We have several young men preparing for the Ministry and young women for the Mission Field. We have started our Committees to help recruit and enlist others. Will every Branch help to "Go Forward?" Have you a Committee?

Our study on Africa, part of this Administration's Educational work, was made most interesting and worthwhile, as we had Bishop Campbell, Miss Ridgeley, Mrs. Brownell, Mr. and Mrs. Reed (our own Lois Ford), Fr. Donovan and Fr. Stretcher, all of Liberia, speak to us of their work there and show us our responsibility. Our study class offerings were given for Liberia, to help in this great cause of humanity.

This past year we studied the result of the Jerusalem Meeting—the world's call to prayer—for a Missionary spirit, a prayerful spirit; a spirit of sacrifice, service, unity; for the gift of interpretation; for courageous witness to all moral questions and move to the point—the completion of our own conversion. Many parishes studied the Gen. Church Program with their Rector and the New Book of Common Prayer.

We have had splendid attendance at summer Conferences, but there is much room for improvement. This year one of our own faithful members, Mrs. Rudderow, was hostess at Blue Mt. Conference. We sent three young people to this Conference as guests of this Diocesan Branch. They appreciated their opportunity and were very grateful and expect to help further many young people's activities in the Church.

Make it a point in July to **send** a delegate from **every parish**.

We made a successful effort to rekindle the flames of the Pentecost of 19 centuries ago. Special services were held in most all of our Churchs and pleas made for the recognition and reassertion of the power of the Holy Spirit, by whom only can come virtue, humility, self-control, forbearance, and other of the Christian graces that will convince heathen Nations of the reality of the Christian religion.

In this age, Old-World changes and much unbelief, we can do our part by meeting on the first Friday in Lent for special prayer services in our own parishes or with other Communions. The Quiet Day, Fr. Suter, leader, at St. Stephen's, Harrisburg, when 18 parishes were represented by over 100 women, and many clergy, and Fr. Viets' meditations and address at Mt. Calvary, Baltimore, were two important events in devotional inspiration. Also, the visit of one month in this Diocese in 1929, of Mrs. Gammack, from "281," was of great benefit to the Branches, and was productive of greater effort and membership.

Our pledges the past three years amounted to \$6,850.00, and our special gifts more than \$1,350.00. These past years have been days of great activity in the five fields of service. You will be interested in knowing during this administration, more than 850 letters and cards and 20 telegrams, many phone calls were written and sent; and more than 800 letters and cards, 18 telegrams and many calls received. Also many personal visits from clergy, missionaries, executive officers and auxiliary members. During the past two years the work has been very much handicapped by the illness and resignation of officers, and has left no doubt as to the importance of an All-Day-Institute for training of Branch and Diocesan officers, so there may be effective and logical rotation in office that the Mission of the Church be not handicapped nor hindered.

We miss many of our Co-workers; many saintly women who have laid down their early work, and entered into the Higher life. And our Bishop, who entered into rest a short while ago, and several of our faithful clergy. They were all of great help and inspiration in

forwarding the work of the Auxiliary. Let us hold in loving memory our Bishop, Mrs. Boyer, Miss Anna Watts, Mrs. Wirt, Mrs. Hartman, and all the other Auxiliary members who have gone to their reward.

It scarcely seems possible I am nearing the end of a very pleasant term of office. I want to express my appreciation for the cooperation, interest and loyalty given me by so many of the Branches and officers.

The many Teas and receptions to meet the women and young people all through the Diocese, have been occasions of much pleasure; but far more, of encouragement and fellowship. They are locked in my memory with affectionate regard and sincere gratitude, for your splendid spirit manifested to constantly and consistently be Auxiliary to the N. C. in its great effort to win the World for Christ.

Through a spirit of Christian stewardship and sacrifice, you have given invaluable service, always ready and willing to "carry on," in your Devotional life; through your gifts of self denials and thank offerings; your increased interest in religious education, through additional study classes and reading circles; the reading of more good books and church periodicals; especially the "Spirit of Missions" and the Hbg. "Churchman," thus becoming intelligently interested in **your** part, **your** share, as women, of the Church's Program. It has meant **our** growth individually; the Diocesan growth; and that of the Church-at-large. As to the future! It would mean much to the Church's welfare if every parish and Mission has a definite program; an outline of work for **each month**, when **every** man, woman and child has a definite service in the Church's Program, in one or more of the five fields of service, cooperating with every Department in the National Council; and at a monthly Parish meeting, and an Annual Meeting of all parish organizations report all activities for the month or year. These close contacts; discussions; the information derived; plans and problems gone over, are bound to unite a Parish where **every** member, old and young, is enlisted in **some** service, and the result is a conscientious stewardship of prayer, service and gifts, devoted to Parish, Diocesan, Nation and World-wide activities.

Where clergy have seen the vision and the advantage of this **Program**, then only **will** it be possible, through efficient leadership, to obtain the fruition of this Vision. To the end that **we** might perfect Christ's acts and teachings, in **our** service to humanity, let **us** give to God some definite time each day. It will make our whole life different. Every morning will be a resurrection; every night, a benediction.

In submitting my last message and report, it is with a mingled feeling of relief from arduous duties and responsibilities; and again, of real regret and reluctance in ending my tenure of office. Let me appeal to each and every one to unite in a spirit of prayer, service, study and gifts, **our common task** to help the Church Awake and go Forward. This is our challenge: That **every woman** begin at once to help win the World to Christianity through our own service to our fellowmen; taking up the Cross, bearing and following it, because of a sincere desire to consider any and all service for Christ's Body—the Church—a privilege, not a burden; a joy, not a duty; an opportunity, not a responsibility. That in our helping to extend and up-build His Kingdom, we may too become more like Christ—doing something worth while each day. What a blessed compensation to know and feel at the end of each day we have **done** some service for our **Heavenly Father**; that we have shared Him with some one in the parish, Community, Diocese, Nation and World! Again, my last ap-

real is, to not allow the fleeting worldly activities—well and good in their place and time—crowd out the really **more worth while** things in our lives, which add to the comfort and happiness and future welfare of our fellowmen—through our daily prayers, service to God and mankind; our thoughtful study and interest in our Church's program; and through Christian stewardship; our cheerful and benevolent gifts.

Personal Religion and Evangelism

The following resolution was adopted at the Triennial of the Woman's Auxiliary meeting in Washington, October, 1928

1. Whereas, The Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council has felt very keenly the need for a deeper spiritual life and renewed consecration to our Lord Jesus on the part of the women of the Church, and has expressed the same through the Message of 1925, and

Whereas, We have experienced through the Bishop's Crusade the need of a more public and private witness for Christ in the life of today, and have had a real part in the preparation and carrying forward of the Crusade, and

Whereas, The National Commission on Evangelism is urging the Church through all its varying agencies to incorporate personal evangelism in the regular life of the Church,

We believe that the time has come when realizing fully our corporate strength and the fresh power engendered by these precious experiences of the past Triennium, we must set forth, as individual members of the Auxiliary and the Church, the Body of Christ, on the next steps in our task of winning the world for Christ, looking out on this world from our own homes to the uttermost parts, we find that the crux of the whole matter lies in ourselves, that the challenge comes to each and every one of us for we are the interpreters of Christ to our generation. Therefore, we believe that the first step should be that we continue to deepen our personal religious lives until we are steeped in the spirit of our Lord and Master and the practice of the presence of God becomes a necessity and next that we help others in their quest for a more complete life.

We find that personal evangelism is an attempt to render this help through the process of friendship.

And Whereas, we believe that personal evangelism cannot be carried out through set programs or meetings, alone, we offer, in all humility, the following suggestions as aids in our undertaking.

The Ministry of books—the reading and re-reading of the many simple books which have been the help and strength of others, and the wise and judicious recommending and lending of these to friends.

The ministry of prayer—the keeping of a quiet time with Christ—at the beginning of each day—talking with God in our own words and listening to Him—the use of the Prayer Book, the Prayer Leaflet and the many beautiful prayers written for special occasions and persons and the asking of others to join us in prayer, separately or in small groups at certain times and for special purposes.

The ministry of the spoken word, believing that a few words, filled with the gentleness of Christ and the power of the Holy Spirit, passed on from one re-kindled soul to another, would mean the whole gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ spread anew over our whole land.

The minister of the Holy Communion, more frequent communions with special prayers or a few chosen companions, renewed consecration of ourselves, our souls and bodies and a ready submission to the will of Christ.

The ministry of example—that through that which Christ has wrought in us others may see and believe.

"I have called you friends; for all things that I heard from my Father I have made known unto you. Ye did not choose me, but I chose you, and appointed you, that ye should go and bear fruit, and that your fruit should abide."

Therefore Be It Resolved: That we each and every one of us, return to our several dioceses from this meeting, praying that all hesitation in witnessing for Christ may be taken from our hearts, with a fervent desire to share Him with others and a sincere purpose to carry out the same.

Resolved: That we send our sympathy, and hope for a speedy recovery to Miss Margaret Cook, of Bellefonte, our Prayer partner Secretary, who is very ill, and unable to attend this meeting.

Resolved: That we express our appreciation and gratitude to the Rt. Rev. Thomas Jenkins, Bishop of Nevada; to Deaconess Ranson, of Sendau, Japan; and to Miss Grace Lindley, National Executive

Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary, for the inspiration given by their talks of work accomplished, and especially for the suggestions given of work still to be done.

Resolved: That we express our appreciation and gratitude to the Rector and Parish of St. John's Church for their cordial welcome and gracious hospitality and the many courtesies extended during the Annual Meeting, to add to our comfort and convenience.

Report of Vice-President of Altoona Archdeaconry
January 1, 1930 to December 31, 1930

There are 7 Parishes in this Archdeaconry and in 5 of these there are Women's Auxiliary Branches, in 2 are Guilds doing Auxiliary work.

All branches have had from one to four corporate communions this year.

All branches have a prayer-partner, one has also an adopted missionary to whom a gift of a magazine and a Christmas gift is sent.

5 Branches have Mission study classes during Lent, one has special Mission study in the Church School.

Deaconess Gertrude Stewart spoke at the Spring Archdeaconry meeting in Tyrone, telling of her work in China and of the Church Training and Deaconess School in Philadelphia. Rev. P. F. Houghton spoke on the Advance work of the Church. Two parishes had a Lantern Slide Lecture by Rev. Robert McCutcheon. One delegate, a young man interested in Church School work, was sent to Hood College Summer Conference by the Diocese and a young woman was sent to the Provincial Synod by special invitation from the women of the Diocese of Pennsylvania, to arouse interest in Section B work.

Women of several branches have expressed their feeling of a loss in inspiration by the omission of the Fall Archdeaconry meeting, since many women who cannot go to the Annual Meeting depend upon Archdeaconry meetings for help in their work.

Our pledges during 1930 amounted to \$441.00, specials \$126.42, Corporate gift \$158.36, and U. T. O. \$512.53.

26 boxes and a check were sent at the request of the supply department with a value of \$318.92. Six boxes were sent independently with a value of \$65.56. Total of pledges, box, work, special and U. T. O. is \$1,622.79, showing splendid cooperation on the part of every branch, having had only one collection at an Archdeaconry meeting and with the business depression at its worst.

During this year I have written 70 letters, sent out 400 self-denial envelopes, made 2 long distance calls, visited 6 branches, attended 3 Executive Board meetings and the Provincial Synod as delegate. I have had splendid help from all the branches and most cordial cooperation from all branch officers.

6 faithful women have entered into rest during the year.

Annual Report of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Harrisburg Archdeaconry



Once more it is my great privilege to review the year's work. Notwithstanding great business depression and unemployment all about us, it is with a sense of deep gratitude that I report progress. We are slowly going forward.

Five representatives at Summer Conferences; Miss Louise Seighman, of St. Andrews, Harrisburg, was our A. D. Delegate to Blue Mt. Conference, the guest of the Diocesan branch. She was most grateful for the opportunity to study in this Training School.

Several Parochial classes on "The Church's Program," text book used: Road to the City of God, by Oscar Buck; and The Common Life, by Karl Block, used in our Lenten and Epiphany classes. Also "Findings of the Jerusalem Conference," issued by Ed. Dept. of Nat. Council; The Spirit of Missions; and several classes on the New Prayer Book by the clergy and a Deaconess of one of the parishes.

The Quiet Day with Rev. John Suter, Jr., Religious E. Secretary of Nat. Council as leader, at St. Stephen's, Harrisburg, was an outstanding event in our Archdeaconry. Eighteen parishes represented. Would that we could have more quiet days or hours of intercession!

Social Service programs have been started in eight parishes. Speakers from the Welfare Federation and Social Service agencies have been secured. Flower Funds started in three parishes; and St. Luke's, Mechanicsburg, outfitted an old lady to enter the Home for the Aged at Shippensburg.

St. John's Lancaster, held a Missionary Tea at which our Diocesan President, Mrs. Brinton, and Miss E. E. Winegar, Secretary of the Blue Ridge Mt. Mission, spoke. The former, stressing the need of young women to enter the mission field and enlist others; and Miss Winegar telling of the interesting and varied work done for the Mountaineers of Virginia, asking for our sympathy, prayers and gifts until they can be made self-supporting.

It is impossible to state number of subscribers to Spirit of Missions; we need more Parish Secretaries for this important work of soliciting subscribers to same. The Auxiliary at Camp Hill subscribes for this magazine and passes it among its members. Let us have it in every Church family.

We report ten Prayer Partners. They are in Africa, China, Japan, the Philippines, Cuba, Alaska, Liberia and the United States. We welcome St. James, Enola, and Holy Cross, Harrisburg, into our Partnership of Prayer and are glad to report 100% in this part of our Program.

The Spring Archdeaconry meeting at Camp Betty Washington was a Red Letter day for your Vice-President. A perfect day, a lovely out-door meeting place and a wonderful attendance. At this meeting we used the hymn written by our Diocesan President, Mrs. Caleb S. Brinton.

In June it was my joy and privilege to drive with our President through the Northern Archdeaconry and meet the Church women in that part of the Diocese. We attended Mrs. Peck's meeting at Coudersport, and spoke to a very animated and interested audience.

There are twenty-three active Auxiliary branches; one Section "B," York, Pa.; three guilds doing Auxiliary work—Marietta, Elizabethtown and Beartown; fourteen Discussion groups in connection with study classes; four Reading Circles; eleven Bible Classes; twelve Branches Program meetings (wish I could report **every** Branch having them); eight Parishes having Parish Papers or Bulletin Boards; four Plays and four Pageants; three Exhibits; \$1,034 through Supply Sec. **Total** Box work amounted to \$1,185; U. Report of the Vice-President of the Williamsport Archdeaconry, 1930



The Vice-President of the Williamsport Archdeaconry presents the following report of work done during the year 1930.

We have (19) nineteen active branches, some working as Guilds doing Auxiliary work, others as regularly organized Auxiliary Branches.

An interesting and inspiring meeting was held in the spring at Lock Haven, with 120 women present. The Rev. Robert McCutcheon, of Trinity Church, Shamokin, showed lantern slides of his work in the Philippines. Mrs. Brinton talked on "The Life of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Church," and also explained the Advance Work program. Miss Winifred Maynard gave a splendid talk on "Religious Education." The Rev. Squire Schofield, of St. James' Church, Muncy, addressed the meeting on "Christian Social Service."

After the expense of this meeting was paid the balance of the offering was used for the Advance Work.

The Educational work is steadily advancing in the Archdeaconry, due to the untiring efforts of the Educational Secretary. Ten women have attended conferences during the year. Thirteen branches had mission study groups, five had discussion groups, and eleven had program meetings. There were four Bible classes, two lantern slide lectures, five pageants, and one play. Five branches use the bulletin board for educational notices. There were two exhibits and two missionary mass meetings. Many women have read and circulated devotional and study books and magazines, such as The Spirit of Missions and The Expanding Church.

Box Work:

In this Archdeaconry 44 new boxes, 19 second-hand boxes, and one check were sent by request of the Diocesan Supply Secretary. Sent independent of the Diocesan Supply Secretary, one check for \$20.00 and two blankets to Prayer Partners. Three boxes of second-hand clothing and patches for quilts were sent to Bear Mountain Mission. One barrel valued at ten dollars was sent to Shippensburg Home, one box valued at ten dollars to the Red Cross, one box to St. Agnes Preventorium, and one check for ten dollars to Lunenburg. One check for \$50.00 and vestments valued at \$30.00 were sent to a missionary in the West. Summary: Amount sent in boxes and checks through the Diocesan Supply Secretary, \$732.97. Sent independently, \$50.00. Making a total of \$782.97.

Much credit is due Mrs. W. E. Johnston, the supply secretary of this Archdeaconry, for the splendid work she has done during the past year.

C. P. C.

In the Archdeaconry there were 23 paid subscriptions, 55 forwarded magazines—making a total of 78. The amount of money given for this work was \$49.00.

U. T. O.

The United Thank Offering was \$1,128.62. Our pledges and specials amounted to \$767.50, and Corporate Gift \$195.30, which makes a total of \$2,874.39 given during the year for Box Work, C. P. C., U. T. O., and Corporate Gift.

Your Vice-President presided over one Archdeaconry Meeting, attended one Executive Meeting and the Annual Meeting at Carlisle, sent out more than 700 Corporate Gift envelopes, and wrote the many letters and postals necessary to the carrying out of the work. Addresses were given during the year by our late Bishop Tate, Deaconess Stewart, Deaconess Young, and Mrs. George Graff.

Splendid work is being done by the different branches, and I hope we shall all become better acquainted during the coming year.

Many faithful women have entered into the Eternal Life during the past year. Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord for they rest from their labors.

Report of Devotional Committee



Dear Co-Workers:

We are all Christian Pilgrims, journeying along, trying to reach the City of God. Ahead of us, in this endless Procession, have gone many earthly saints, in Church and State, many are travelling with us now. Think for a moment of those who have passed on, in our own Diocese, our own Parish, and especially, our own Bishop Darlington. How can we "follow in their train!" May the Lord give us grace to follow their good examples!

The Bishop's Crusade is a call to each individual for Rededication, to sing or say "Awake my soul, Stretch every nerve and Press with vigor on." (Hymn No. 111.) We must realize we are only "Strangers and Pilgrims here." (Old Hymnal.) We must long for "A closer walk with God." (Hymn No. 305) thereby so can each increase and enrich her devotional life, trying to attain the Holy City. We study itineraries and secure passports for foreign lands; pour over road maps and have the automobile looked over for motor trips; should we not just as carefully prepare for the Heavenly journey? We must remember our Prayer Partners, to encourage and bless their work, our Prayers to bless our Church Envelope Money, our Boxes, and those who receive them. To interest our younger members to become Future Leaders. How can we work for others without first asking for Divine Guidance? Our Common Prayer is rich in Intercessions. Leaflets, Prayer Cards, Literature, our Spirit of Missions and other splendid Magazines, Books, all may be secured from the Church Missions House, 281 Fourth Avenue, New York City. Two splendid books are "Life and Religion," by Dr. Franklin (25cts.) and "A Faith for the World," by Wm. Patton (1.00).

3. PARISH LIFE

Do we have a children's corner for their special services? A Corporate Communion for the newly confirmed class? Auxiliary members can in turn serve them a Breakfast. In families, we gather for joyful and sad events in our homes, should we not as a Church Family come in Groups for Corporate Communions? Prayers to begin and bless our work, not only in presenting our U. T. Offering, but during the year, and this year a special effort to observe Lent, Pentecost, and the service for a Unity of Christianity, the World Wide Day of Prayer.

4. QUIET HOURS AND DAYS

Do we take time to get away from the busy world for a few hours or a day, to feel "Round our restlessness His Rest?" We come away after Prayers and Meditations, in "a calm serene frame" realizing "He is with us, even to the end of the World." There is so much to pray for, our problems are world wide, the strong must help the weak, and cheer and encourage the faint hearted.

Report of Diocesan Educational Secretary, 1930

† †

Almighty God, most humbly we beseech Thee, that we who especially desire to dedicate our minds to Thy service, may by Thee, be enriched in all utterance and in all knowledge; that, using Thy gifts to Thy glory, we may be blameless in Thy sight, through the merits of our example, Teacher, and Saviour, Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen.

Jesus, our Master and our Friend, who claimest our services through the needs of our neighbors; Grant us so to see Thy image in all our fellow creatures that in serving mankind we may minister to Thee, the living Saviour of the world. Amen.

The Aim of Missionary Education quoted from the Introduction to the Leaders Manual to "India Looks to Her Future": "The aim of Missionary education in general is to help us to see the world as God sees it, to acquire for it something of His love and purpose, to act toward it more as He would have us act. If our God is nothing less than the Father of all mankind, we must believe that He is concerned for the best welfare of His children of every race, and especially for kindly feeling of fraternity on the part of all. Missionary education has the double purpose of helping those who are nominally apart from Christ to have an adequate opportunity to know Him, and of helping those who are nominally followers of Christ to prove that the profession they make has vitality. Christian experience and growth comes not from saying, "Lord, Lord," but from sharing in the depth and breadth of Christ's sympathies."

The work this year was difficult to launch, as many people formed ideas of the subject of the Mission Study without investigating. It took a great many letter and discussions to get a start, after which the work was more than satisfactory, and most encouraging.

The Educational Secretary did not make as many visitations this year but was more than busy helping to plan for study classes and program meetings. Especially planning the use of the World Mission of Christianity in connection with the study of the General Program.

Educational Programs were carried out in all of the active branches. In one parish a very successful study group included both men and women. One branch has a study program covering all but two months of the year. Many books on religion and missions are read during Lent. Several branches report: "Our Rector keeps a table full of books at the back of the church and they are well read." Deaconess Gertrude Stewart of the Church Training and Deaconess School, Philadelphia, Pa., visited the Diocese on several occasions and had the opportunity of speaking to groups of College Students at Pennsylvania State College.

An Educational letter was sent to each branch outlining the work for the year. A letter explaining the Advance Work Project was sent to a number of women.

The sale of books was not quite up to last year but the profit was nearly the same.

The Summer Conferences were not as well attended as other years but we had representation at Wellesly, Blue Mountain, Bethlehem, a National Social Service Conference and an international conference.

The Educational Secretary is asked for all sorts of information and is kept busy, trying to meet the requests. The work is varied,

doing a little of this and a little of that along with the prescribed Educational lines, and the results as we perceive are greater activity along all lines of work. More regional meetings, Institutes and training classes are needed. We hope within the year to find some means of meeting this need.

Camp Betty Washington after eight weeks of activities, closed September the first, having a most successful season and having accommodated three hundred twenty-one girls.

Guests at the Camp were from Altoona, Chambersburg, Danville, Harrisburg, Huntingdon, Lewistown, Lancaster, Philadelphia, Red Lion, Swarthmore and York.

May the twenty-first the spring meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary was held at the Camp.

June the fourteenth the Diocesan Council and Conference of the Girls' Friendly Society was held at the Camp.

The choir from St. John's Church, York, spent six days at the Camp.

St. John's choir, Lancaster, sent the girls of the choir to camp for one week. They were a fine group of young people. We enjoyed thoroughly their stay with us.

The Mothers' Assistant Organization entertained fifty mothers and children at the Camp the last week of August.

This summer the Camp received a lovely piano as a gift. This was greatly appreciated and enjoyed by all at the Camp.

The Girls' Friendly Society was represented by six delegates from the Harrisburg Diocese at the Provincial Synod which met in Philadelphia. The Diocesan President attended two meetings of the Executive Committee of the Woman's Auxiliary during the year. Our new branch has been organized recently at Shamokin.

Chairman Holiday House.

The outlook for the G. F. S. in this Diocese seems more than ever encouraging. In some of the Branches new Candidate groups have been started, the one at St. Luke's, Altoona, showing the largest growth, having a new group of forty-five this Autumn. It is sincerely hoped that more and more Parishes and Missions will begin their G. F. S. organization in this way, whenever possible, for it is from these same Candidates that the future well trained leaders must come, in the natural course of events. It is during this young age period that they learn to love the Society, and it is the age of great religious feeling. It is entirely erroneous, this idea that only girls over twelve must be the necessary age group for the beginning of an organization within the Parish. In many cases, the Candidates are the group, and often the more essential.

Within the year we report one new Branch at Shamokin. This Branch was organized at the time of a special visit from Miss Fifield, Field Secretary.

June 14th, 1930, the annual G. F. S. Diocesan Council meeting was held at Camp Betty Washington, York. Several Branches were represented, among them a new one, at Greencastle. About fifty were in attendance; eleven Branches, with a total of 329 members, were reported. Now the number is considerably more than that, and will be properly reported next year. Mrs. J. Charles Heiges was re-elected Dioc. President, Mrs. Richard Allen, Secretary-Treasurer, Mrs. Caleb S. Brinton, President of W. A., made a very splendid address, giving in a most interesting way her impressions of the relationship of G. F. S. to girls, and the responsibilities placed on the girl, with its place in the religious life, dwelling especially on the ideals of the Society as set forth in its object and aim,—the formation of Christian character.

Since it is manifestly unfair that the Dioc. President should be expected to bear the full burden of the Camp, with its great financial responsibility, complicated by the fact that all money-raising for the Camp has devolved on Mr. and Mrs. Heiges, with the exception of Fifty Dollars yearly from the Social Service Dept., the matter was referred the Dioc. Exec. Council on September, with the result that a committee was appointed then to visit the Camp and to take some steps leading to a more general responsibility for its continued existence. It does seem as though the burden of responsibility should at least be lightened in some way, particularly as the whole Diocese is privileged to send girls there each summer. It is really a Diocesan, not a local, project, and very well worthy of the greatest support of all. While the Camp does maintain itself during the season, there are extra repairs, etc., interest on mortgage loans, to be taken care of, and it all takes financial support. We earnestly commend this to your prayerful consideration, and sincerely hope that some solution of this problem be obtained at a very early date. If you could see the enthusiasm of girls returning from a week or more there, you would feel an impetus to help in any way. The girls are always most properly chaperoned at all times, and always under the guiding eye of Mrs. Heiges, who has given herself unsparingly to this particular work.

Several Branches report U. T. O. offerings as Branches, and one reports ten boxes in use in its Branch, and a share in the Advent and Lenten box work.

We are deeply grateful for the interest shown by the W. A. and for allowing the inclusion of our report.
