CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

WOMAN'S AUXILIARY OF THE DIOCESE OF HARRISBURG

Revised and Adopted November 16, 1932

CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I NAME

The name of the Association shall be the Harrisburg Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council of the Episcopal Church in the United States of America.

ARTICLE II OBJECT

The object of this Association shall be to carry out within the Diocese of Harrisburg the purposes and work of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council, with special emphasis on its missionary activities.

ARTICLE III MEMBERSHIP

The membership of the Harrisburg Branch shall be composed of the Parish Brasches of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of Harrisburg.

ARTICLE IV OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the Harrisburg Branch shall be the Bishop of Harrisburg ex-officio, a President, a Vice-President at large, four Vice-Presidents (one from each Archdeaconry), a Secretary, a Treasurer, and a United Thank Offering Custodian.

Section 2. All officers, with the exception of the Vice-Presidents, shall be elected at the Annual Meeting by ballot of the member branches, and serve for a term of three years. Vacancies occurring among the officers during their term of office shall, until the next annual meeting, be filled by vote of the Executive Committee. No officer (save the Treasurer) who shall have served a full term of three years shall be eligible for re-election, to succeed herself.

Section 3. Each Archdeaconry shall elect (from the three names previously nominated by the Diocesan President) its own Archdeaconry Vice-President at the spring meeting following the election of President. She may succeed herself for a second term.

ARTICLE V EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The officers, together with the United Thank Offering Custodian, the Educational Secretary, the Supply Secretary, the Chairman of Section B, or Junior Women and Girls Friendly Society, the Church Periodical Club Director, and such Chairman necessary to the work of this organization, shall constitute the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE VI MEETINGS

Section 1. The annual meeting for the election of officers and other business shall be held the Third Tuesday and Wednesday in November.

Section 2. Special meetings may be called by the Executive Committee at any time. At special meetings only such business as is specified shall be considered.

AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION

This Constitution may be amended at any annual meeting by a two-thirds vote of the member branches, provided that notice of such proposed amendment shall have been sent to each branch president thirty days before said meeting.

BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I

DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The President shall call all meetings of the Association and of the Executive Board and preside at the same. She shall appoint and fill vacancies in all committees not otherwise provided for in the By-Laws, and shall be a member ex-officio of all committees except the Nominating Committee. She shall direct the editing of the annual report.

Section 2. The Vice-Presidents shall represent the following archdeaconries:

1. Vice-President of Altoona Archdeaconry,
- II. Vice-President of Harrisburg Archdeaconry,
- III. Vice-President of Northern Archdeaconry,
- IV. Vice-President of Williamsport Archdeaconry.

The Vice-Presidents shall encourage the organization of new branches in their respective districts, visit the member branches and supervise their work. Each Vice-President shall prepare and submit a report at each annual meeting, and shall conduct at least one meeting a year in her respective archdeaconry.

Section 3. The Secretary shall make and keep, in permanent form, a record of the proceedings of the Auxiliary and of the Executive Committee. She shall prepare and submit a report at each annual meeting, assist in compiling the annual report and send out all notices.

Section 4. The Treasurer shall receive and transmit all monies (except the United Thank Offering) due the organization, and shall pay all properly approved bills and present her audited report at the annual meeting.

Section 5. The United Thank Offering Custodian shall be elected at the annual meeting immediately following the Triennial Meeting. She shall endeavor to increase and deepen interest in the United Thank Offering by sending out literature pertaining to same, and shall receive and transmit to Church Missions House all the United Thank Offering monies and make a yearly report.

Section 6. The Educational Secretary shall have general supervision of all missionary educational work undertaken by the Woman's Auxiliary and shall prepare herself for the training of parish leaders of study classes.

SECRET AND RESTRICTED

ARTICLE II

NOMINATIONS and ELECTIONS

Section 1. A Nominating Committee consisting of one member from each Archdeaconry shall be appointed by the President one month before the annual meeting.

Section 2. Each member branch shall be entitled to two votes and an additional vote for each ten members or fraction thereof. Elections shall be by ballot; the newly elected officers to assume office at the close of the meeting at which they are elected.

Section 3. Delegates to the Triennial Meeting of the General Auxiliary shall be the President and four women from the membership of the Auxiliary, and five alternates from the same to be elected by ballot.

Section 4. There shall be two delegates and three alternates to the Provincial Synod Meeting, elected by ballot from this Association. The president, a delegate by virtue of her office.

Section 5. An expense fund for all necessary expenses shall be provided by this Association.

Rule 1. Twenty per cent. of the total amount pledged for the Expense Fund shall be set aside for a Sinking Fund to be used at the direction of the Executive Board. All requisitions shall be signed by the President.

Rule 2. At the annual meeting, the hostess branch shall entertain, over night, members of the Executive Board, speakers on the program and two delegates from each branch. Where more delegates register from any branch they shall pay for their own entertainment.

Resolution on the United Thank Offering of 1934

Resolved: That the United Thank Offering of 1934 be given to the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society of the Protestant Episcopal Church of the United States of America to be used as follows:

Not over twenty per cent to be appropriated for buildings to be erected in the mission field, to be selected by the Executive Board in consultation with the officers of the National Council, and

Ten per cent. of the offering to be added to the permanent trust fund, the income from which is to be used for the retiring allowances for all women workers under the Missionary Society, and

The balance of the Offering, together with all interest earned thereon, to be used by the Missionary Society for the work of women in the missionary enterprises of the Church, including their training, equipping, sending and support, and for their care when sick or disabled, the appointment of said women having been approved by the Executive Board.

The Province News Letter will come to us three or four times a year. It will contain information concerning the Province and the work of the Dioceses in the Province. If you have any plans for the work which have been successful and which might be of help to other Parishes and Dioceses send them to the President or Secretary of your Diocese who will edit them for the news letter. The News Letter is to bring items of interest and the exchange of ideas.

Any Resolution that you may wish to present at the Annual Meeting, please give a copy to the Resolution Committee Chairman the first day of the Meeting.

Letters of information sent to Branch Officers by the Diocesan Officers and Chairman of Committees should be read to the Branch members at the time of meetings.

The Annual Branch Report Blanks are very important to the Diocesan Officers. Give them careful consideration and return at the stated time to the proper officer.

The slips which you receive with your Box Supply consignment are of equal importance. Please send the slips as designated and at the stated time.

Get acquainted with the needs and work of the parish, the community, the Diocese and the General Church. Make surveys, which will be of great help in planning Programs.

Too few of our people read the Spirit of Missions, bearing, as it does, a record of the work of the Church at home and abroad, you will find it a real source of information and inspiration—always interestingly and graphically presented. The Diocesan Spirit of Missions Representative will be glad to give information concerning the work of Parish Spirit of Missions Representatives.

Study the reports of each Diocesan Officer. The reports added together constitute the yearly report of the work of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese and from which the President compiles her report to the National Executive Secretary of the Auxiliary.

Each officer or chairman of a committee will be happy and eager to help you plan for the work and explain the work.

We could have the benefit of the experience of missionaries and national officers at little expense to any one parish if several parishes would divide the expense of travel for speakers. There are great possi-

The Province Meeting will be held the 3rd Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday in October, 1933.

The Fifty-first General Convention will be held in Atlantic City, N. J., in 1934. The Diocesan U. T. O. Custodian, The President, Four Delegates or their Alternates will attend the meeting in Atlantic City.

The book every woman should have is "The Woman's Auxiliary in the Life of the Church" (10c), popularly called "The Red Book". Among the publications that will help in carrying on the work of the Woman's Auxiliary are the pamphlets—Simple Rules of Parliamentary Procedure, Parish Presidents, Treasurers, Secretaries, Supply Secretaries, Parish U. Minutes of the Twenty-seventh Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of Harrisburg and the Fiftieth Anniversary of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania and Harrisburg

The twenty-seventh Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary was called for business session in St. John's Church, York, Pa., Tuesday and Wednesday, November 15th and 16th, 1932, Mrs. Harry Hartman, presiding.

Roll call showed 19 branches represented.

Mrs. Steacy welcomed the Auxiliary guests.

At this time our hearts were saddened by the announcement of the death of Mrs. Francis Farquehar. White lilies typical of her life and love were placed on the Altar in her memory. The evening before her death she expressed her appreciation of the pleasure of entertaining the Auxiliary on its fiftieth anniversary.

Delegates were invited to dinner and breakfast in the Grill Room of the Yorktown Hotel, where all the delegates were entertained.

The following reports were read and accepted: Supply Secretary, C. P. C. Director, Prayer-Partner Secretary, Girls' Friendly Society President, Devotional and Recruiting Committee Chairmen, Diocesan Spirit of Missions Representative. Mrs. Albra Reeder read a report of the Social Service Conference which was held in Philadelphia. Mrs. Fleming presented the report of Mrs. Charles Bullock, the Junior Woman representative from the Diocese at the Province Meeting. Mrs. Reeder and Mrs. Fleming, Province Delegates presented their reports. The reports were not only reports of work accomplished but vivid word pictures of the work.

The part of the Annual Program to which all look forward is the Quiet Hour. A large number of women attended the Quiet Hour and appreciated the privilege of spending this hour under the spiritual leadership of Canon Paul S. Atkins of St. John's, York.

Canon Paul S. Atkins opened the missionary Mass Meeting with the Order of Evening Prayer. He welcomed the Bishops and assembled congregation, and gave a short historical sketch of the Parish which has association with the early history of our country. Bishop Wyatt Brown our own Bishop brought a message of love and encouragement. Bishop Hugh L. Burleson, extended greetings from the Presiding Bishop. Bishop Burleson out of the years of experience in the Service of the Master gave us a nearer glimpse of the joy to be found in life through Christ in the service to mankind. The Mass Meeting was a spiritual inspiration —through the spiritual atmosphere of St. John's, The House of God; the worship of praise in the music; and the message of our Bishop and our friend Bishop Burleson.

The Fiftieth Anniversary Birthday Party with its cake and candles, its program of musical pleasure, and the delightful service in Fiftieth Anniversary costumes was staged and carried through by the Girls' Friendly Society and the Young Peoples Fellowship of St. John's.

Wednesday, November 16th. The celebration of the Holy Communion brought us together reverently in heart and mind. Bishop Brown was the Celebrant assisted by Canon Paul S. Atkins and the Rev. W. Josselyn Reed of Columbia, Pa.

A short service of prayer by Canon Atkins began the day's business.
Roll call showed 30 parishes represented.

The President, Miss Batzle, gave her message pointing out the problems of the present times and how as Christian women we might help to meet them by the better understanding of conditions through study, prayer and deeds.

The Secretary reported assistance in helping keep firm the front line of our Missionary defense by "Economy in Business."

The Treasurer's Report, The United Thank Offering Report were accepted.

Mrs. McCutchen, The Educational Secretary, presented for Auxiliary Mission Study, "Facing the Future in Indian Missions" and "Living Issues in China," suggesting one to be used for Advent Study, the other for Lenten Study.

Mrs. Spotts reported for Spirit of Missions 319 subscriptions in 54 Parishes.

Mrs. M. C. Adams of Pittsburgh, a member of the Committee on Foreign Missions, National Council, presented an interesting review of the foundation principles of the early Woman's Auxiliary organization. It is still fulfilling its purpose; building through prayer, study and service.

The Ven. A. A. Hughes of Mt. Alto and Gettysburg, Pa., led the Noon Day Prayers.

The report of the committee on the Revision of the Constitution was received with much interest. There were few changes and the Revised Constitution as printed in the Annual Report merits your careful study. The committee on Constitution, Chairman Mrs. J. H. Spotts, Mrs. George Zeigler, Mrs. Robert McCutchen, Mrs. Fred Booth.

A delightful lunch was served in the Parish House at which time we again renewed our Annual Church Friendships.

The afternoon session began with Mrs. William Rote, Jr., leading us in our music devotions in hymn 486. The Anniversary Program prepared by Mrs. Van Horne, whose living and efficient service in the Auxiliary of this Diocese made it a happy task for her to get ready the Historical Sketch of the Woman's Auxiliary Diocese of Central Pennsylvania and Harrisburg 1882-1932 and to carry through the Golden Anniversary Program.

The Meeting stood a moment in respect for Bishop Burleson. Mrs. Van Horne's greeting was most reverent—"In the name of Bishop Howe, Woman's Auxiliary, Fathers in God—Friends"—All stood silent in token of reverent esteem.

Bishop Burleson brought loving greetings from the National Council, the affectionate regard of Bishop Perry and the respect and esteem of Miss Lindley.

His theme was the understanding service of women for women; the loving ministry of Christian women linking up the loving service of this land and the land beyond and declared himself an over enthusiast for the Woman's Auxiliary, believing that the larger day God is leading us to, deepening our purposes and strengthening our foundations are days of opportunity instead of days of depression and we shall be wiser for our mistakes, holier for our sorrows and stronger for our work. Reminiscence—by letter because of inability to be present at the Anniversary Meeting from Mrs. Josephine Coleman Ames, Mrs. Robert F. Gibson and Mrs. Anna M. Drinkwater, were read by Miss Elizabeth Bonham. They took us back in heart and mind to our early church love and religious passion with loving associates in the work of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Our Golden Anniversary Thank Offering was \$82.66—The President asked for \$50.00—Again the quiet steadfast purpose of our loving Woman's Auxiliary pushed things over the top.

Offering for the Annual Meeting were: \$42.50, Evening Offering. \$5.48 Communion Alms. \$24.52 Afternoon Offering. Total, \$72.90.

We wish we could convey to you the spirit of our Bishop in his message "to give you God-Speed as you journey on"—With his blessing, the Golden Anniversary of the Woman's Auxiliary in this diocese was in the past and our faces turned toward the work of the coming fifty years.

While the Executive Board was in session a Quite Hour was conducted in Christ Church for the members of the W. A. by the Rev. T. J. Heistand, Rector of St. Paul's Church, Bloomsburg, Pa.; the subject of the Meditation being the Spiritual Preparation of the Virgin Mary.

This was followed by an informal supper at the Y. W. C. A. after which the members of the Woman's Auxiliary returned to Christ Church, when Evening Prayer was said, the clergy of Williamsport and the visiting clergy taking part. One of the hymns used on this occasion was "O Zion haste, thy mission high fulfilling" written by Mrs. Mary A. Thomson, of Philadelphia, mother of Mr. Thompson, librarian at the Brown Library in Williamsport.

The speaker was Bishop Brown, who took as his subject the Missionary work of the Church, particularly during the last 110 years, which spans the life of the Church Missionary societies. He then contrasted this period with the first 110 years of the Church's life; and went on to say that the work of the Church women has left its imprint on every part of the world,—in China, Japan, the Phillipine Islands, eighty Western Dioceses, and that no pioneer movement has had the impact on life to compare with that of the Church.

After the service a reception was held in the Parish House for Bishop and Mrs. Brown; and all were invited to examine the Missionary Exhibit sent on from General Convention, and arranged by Mrs. Robert McCutchen, Educational Secretary.

November 18th.

Holy Communion was celebrated at 8:00 o'clock, after which a cafeteria breakfast was served in the Parish House by the women of Christ Church.

When the delegates assembled for business the President opened the meeting with prayer.

Greetings to the officers and delegates were extended on behalf of Christ Church by Mrs. H. Y. Otto.

The President then read her message, which will be found on another page of this Report.

In the absence of the Treasurer, Miss Ruth Stockton, Mrs. H. G. Hartman gave the Treasurer's report. She called attention to the fact that this Diocese now has two nurses in St. Luke's Hospital, Shanghai, China, who have been there for ten years, and the Executive Board now recommends that a pledge be made for their work. The list of pledges as adopted by the Executive Board was then presented, as follows:—

The U. T. O. Custodian, the C. P. C. Director, the Supply Secretary, the Girls' Friendly Diocesan President, and the prayer partner secretary all made reports, which are printed in this Annual Report.

The Secretary then read the following recommendation, adopted by the Executive Board:—

The Executive Board recommends to the Diocesan Woman's Auxiliary that in the future each Parish and Mission pay delegates full expenses to the Annual Meeting, and that all speakers, and the members of the Executive Board, be entertained at the hostess' parish expense.

The Secretary explained that this recommendation was offered as the result of expression of opinion from various parts of the Diocese.

On motion made and seconded the recommendation was laid on the table, to be taken up for further consideration after the proposal has received consideration by the individual branches.

The chairman then called for reports of the chairmen of appointed committees—Devotional Committee—Mrs. Ross of Hollidaysburg. Recruiting Committee—Mrs. Frear of State College. Reports on Mt. Alto, and the Corporate Gift were made by Mrs. Caleb Brinton of Carlisle. and Educational work—Mrs. Robert McCutchen.

Mrs. McCutchen outlined the text for use this year, "Building a Christian Nation" in a very attractive way, and with good promise of excellent results.

Miss Annie Park of the Mission Home in Virginia told of the work that is being done in the mountains of Virginia by Archdeacon Neve, who, a modern St. Paul, has devoted his life to the isolated mountain people, relying upon faith and prayer as his sole support in carrying on an extensive missionary program, which has brought light and cheer to hundreds of the mountaineers.

The Archdeaconry Vice-President reported the high lights of the year's work in each of the Archdeaconries.

The Diocesan 'Spirit of Missions' representative reported that there are 32 Spirit of Missions representatives in the 54 parishes of the Diocese.

The Ven. Charles E. McCoy, of Trinity Church, Williamsport then led the noon-day devotions.

The roll of Delegates was then called by the Secretary.

After roll call, the chairman of the nominating committee, Mrs. Andrew Rhodes of Williamsport, presented the names of nominees for Secretary, Treasurer, two delegates to the Province meeting, three alternates to the Province meeting.

The following tellers were appointed by the President:

Miss Elsie Williams, Trinity Church, Williamsport; Mrs. Logue, Christ Church, Williamsport; Mrs. Reidels, All Saints, Williamsport; Mrs. Yost, St. Mary's, Williamsport, and Mrs. Haye of St. Luke's, Altoona.

Ballots were distributed by the tellers, after which lunch was served by the women of Christ Church. During luncheon the Rev. H. R. Bennett, Bishop Brown, and Mrs. George Graeff spoke informally, the latter suggesting that Rectors notify the clergy in college towns of the arrival of students from their respective cures.

The afternoon session was opened by hymn 486, 'Christ for the world we sing.'

Mrs. Rhodes then announced the result of the election as follows:

Miss Gladys Spencer from Aomori, Japan, then gave a brief address on her work, she being one of four kindergarten workers in Japan.

Miss Mary R. Harris told of the Episcopal Home for the aged in Shippensburg, and asked for donations of fruit, vegetables, linens and household utensils.

The delegates to the Denver Convention then gave brief reports—

Mrs. W. U. Mussina described the service of presentation of the U. T. O. of \$1,059,000.00.

Mrs. Caleb Brinton spoke of outstanding features of the General Convention.

Mrs. J. H. Spotts described the pageant by which the three years offerings of the children was presented.

Mrs. VanHorne, chairman of the Resolutions Committee, presented her report, which was adopted as read, and may be found on another page of this Annual Report.

The President then thanked Mrs. C. W. Scott for acting as parliamentarian of this meeting.

Mrs. Rote called attention to a display of C. P. C. Christmas cards.

Mrs. McCutchen outlined the Educational supplies adopted for the current year.

Tea was then served in the Parish House.

The Secretary reported that 131 delegates were present, representing 34 Parishes and Missions, and that all the Diocesan officers were present except one.

There being no further business, the meeting then adjourned.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



It is a great privilege to celebrate the Fiftieth Anniversary of the organization of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania and Harrisburg in St. John's Church, York, with its historic background in the beginning of our great country, the planting of the Church in America, in Pennsylvania and our Diocese. It gives me great pleasure to welcome Bishop Burleson, representative of the Presiding Bishop, our own Bishop Brown, Mrs. Adams, Foreign Missions Committee member National Council, Mrs. Estes, National member G. F. S., the representatives of our sister Diocese of Bethlehem, President Mrs. Barger and Miss Ruddle, Province Treasurer, also the Priests, members and friends of the Diocese who have assembled to make this a memorable occasion. Last January I had the honor of being present at the Celebration of the Fiftieth Anniversary of the Woman's Auxiliary in Central Pennsylvania and Bethlehem and to carry the greetings from the women of the Diocese Harrisburg. There are facts in the early organization which have had a direct bearing on my own life since its beginning and it is with love and gratitude that I greet you.

The last three years we have been talking about a new day, a new era, a new age, and quoting about all things being made new. It is difficult to figure where we are going and how we will arrive, the question is, how shall we emerge?

Each day of our lives is a new day and it is a wonderful day which we sometimes make a good day and sometimes a bad day.

Through all the struggles of the peoples of the world today we might better pray as the Psalmist of old, "O God, renew a right Spirit within me." Psalm 51. The renewing of a right spirit within each individual will bring perhaps not a new day but a better day, a day of greater services and a day of joy in the Lord.

Our sense of values seems to be out of balance, our living is so complicated, and all the laws of life's relationships are confused.

Today, whether we want to or not, we face the problems of economy, of industry, of race, and international problems are claiming our attention. We all have a part in bringing order out of chaos and if we are true servants of Christ—are we not fitted through our knowledge of Him to bring the true and lasting elements to bear in the adjustment of conditions?

If we are coming into a new day, can we not with God's help transcend all the difficulties of social ills, race problems, international problems and at last have a brotherhood—our heritage—all of one blood in Christ—Sons of God. Thomas asked the Lord, "and how can we know the way." Jesus said, "I am the Way, the Truth and the Life." That statement gives us the rule to meet all the complications of life. I do not mean to preach, but I have said for three years, be steady and calm, hold fast to the things that are true, have faith, have courage, then we will survive as individuals and the church of which we are a

living part will be able to meet the challenge of all the forces in the world.

Sometimes I wonder if we think of the Summary of the law in the Communion Service as a reason and a motive for the efforts of the Woman's Auxiliary. If we analyze that summary we will find that it covers our aim. To love, honor, worship and serve God and to love God's children which is an inclusive term. Our aim is prayer, fellowship, work, gifts, each spiritual development has its physical complement. Can you not think of Box Supply Work, Church, Periodical Club, United Thank Offering, St. Michael and All Angels Offering, the Prayer Partner, the Pledges (for the sharing part of our blessings with God's servers here and abroad) in terms of the summary of the law?

Our St. Michael and All Angels Offering, or Self Denial Week Offering as it is commonly called, for two years has been to help the Negro work of the Diocese. Have you ever thought about the man on whose shoulders the burden of the cross was laid on the memorable journey to Calvary?

The time has come for us to do something regular and definite about this part of the work in the Diocese. Pennsylvania is a State of beginnings in our nation, many first things happened in the city of Philadelphia and how natural that in the city of Brotherly Love the first real work for the Negros was started in this country by the church. If you have witnessed the present sad plight of the Negro in this same city you would realize that we have a problem which needs our best Christian effort.

The General Church has sent an appeal for gifts of money to the deficit of the working fund of the General Church. This appeal comes from the Presiding Bishop through Miss Lindley to the branch presidents of the Woman's Auxiliary throughout the church. The Woman's Auxiliary on account of the nature of its organization is able to help in any work or emergency and serves its purpose as Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council. A copy of the appeal has been sent to each President in the Diocese. May I ask that each one give as he or she is able, not only to the General Church, but to the Diocese and Parish. Every woman in the church, in the Auxiliary Branch or Guild should use every effort to help her parish meet its Diocesan and field quotas. The Field Work Pledge of the Woman's Auxiliary is credited back to the individual parishes and counts on their field work quota. We have this pledge because we pledged with the women of the whole church to help meet the Diocesan quotas. The time for adjustment is at hand but no matter how you have felt about expenditures in the past, when the work is further curtailed—remember that the work which has been accomplished and God's Message which has been carried to the uttermost parts of the earth will never be lost from human hearts and minds.

This year I have appointed a Social Service Committee and ask that you will support its efforts. I believe each branch will welcome suggestions from the Chairman and feel that with your help, very definite service can be started and hope we may be successful in the work of bringing nearer the Kingdom of God by bringing the joy of life to men through Christ.

I have also appointed a Rural Committee. We are a Diocese of small cities and towns. There are groups of women doing the finest kind of parish work and community service, but for one reason or another feel they can not be a part of the larger group organization of women in the church. The committee is to try to bring the small group to the larger group and the larger group to the smaller and share the privilege of the whole work of the church. There are isolated families here and there who would like the friendly contact of a messenger of the church. It is really an extension committee, reaching out a friendly hand to individuals and groups.

The Junior Woman's Auxiliary is not a competitive or separate organization of the Woman's Auxiliary, neither is it a training for recruits to take the place of the older women. It is a movement to interest the young women of the church in the needs of the world—two thirds of the very young women are not interested in the church's work. Our job is to help them to see the need of the world and then help them to find the answer. We need each other.

There is no better place for inspiration, training and general information than the Summer Conferences. Encourage attendance at the Province Conference at Hood College, Frederick, Md., and Orkney Springs Conference, Virginia.

We note the vacant places of those who have given years of faithful service to the church's work, Miss Balch, first Diocesan Supply Secretary, Mrs. Farquehar, of this parish, Mrs. Griffiths, of Lancaster and other faithful women. God grant to them peace and rest and light and joy in the nearer presence of the Lord.

There are many kinds of work being done in the Diocese. I do not mention them as the officers who have given their time to special pieces of work have reported to you. The combined reports of all of our efforts constitutes the yearly report of the Diocesan Branch, Woman's Auxiliary.

The story of the rebuilding of Jerusalem seems to be appropriate to the present time and is really my message today.

"Jerusalem had been destroyed, possessions lost, people in captivity, a few escaping and returning to the site of their dwelling places. In the face of hinderances and out of the rubbish heap of burned out fires, they set themselves to the task of rebuilding saying, "Let us rise up and build." So they strengthened their hands for this good work, each man had his responsibility in the building, whether it was guarding against the enemy or the placing of the stone—there were evils to combat, but Nehemiah believed that God was with his people and he went ahead and prepared the way for God to help them, and God did help them. The chiefs of the fathers and the people gave to the treasury for the work."

"And they stood every man in his place."

REPORT OF THE VICE PRESIDENT OF THE ALTOONA ARCHDEACONY



January 1, 1932 to December 31, 1932



Probably the most outstanding event in the Woman's Auxiliary of Altoona Archdeaconry for the year 1932 was the acquisition, by a rearrangement of boundaries, of two parishes, St. John's Bellefonte, and St. Andrew's, State College, adding to our strength, as well as to the number of our branches.

St. John's, Bellefonte has a Junior Woman's Auxiliary, functioning in all lines of work. In St. Luke's, Altoona, a Junior Woman's Auxiliary was organized in December, starting with twenty-five young women. Altoona Archdeaconry consists, therefore of nine senior and two junior Woman's Auxiliary branches. St. Peter's Guild, Juniata, has not been able to do Auxiliary work to any extent, but sent a U. T. O., thus keeping the Archdeaconry 100%.

Our spring meeting, a most successful one, judging by numbers and interest, was held at Huntingdon on May 13. We had the pleasure and opportunity of hearing our own Bishop Brown, Miss Albertine Batzle, Mrs. Robert McCutchen and Mrs. Edward Frear. After expenses were paid the balance of the offering, \$25.16, was given to the Diocese Expense fund.

Seven branches have programs at meetings, from one to four corporate communions are held by each branch, two pageants were given, one branch had a quiet day, mission study classes were held in all but two branches, five branches observed the World Day of Prayer. Many Auxiliary women attended the Regional Conference held in St. Luke's, Altoona, in October.

All pledges were paid, the self denial offering was sent, and the U. T. O. collected and sent, in most cases twice during the year.

Seventeen boxes were sent by request of the Supply Department, and seventeen independently; the Junior Woman's Auxiliary of St. John's, Bellefonte sent a box of books and ditty bags to the Seamen's Church Institute to the value of twenty-eight dollars. Checks and gifts of linen, jellies and canned goods were sent to the Shippensburg Home. The value of all boxes together with gifts of money to recipients, was \$449.76.

During the year I attended two Executive Board meetings, the annual meeting at York in November, presided at one Archdeaconry meeting, attended the Provincial Woman's Auxiliary as a delegate in October, wrote 93 letters and cards, sent out 350 self denial envelopes.

We are aiming to form Junior Woman's Auxiliaries in other parishes and to cooperate more closely with other church organizations.

My heartiest thanks are due to the women of Altoona Archdeaconry —in these trying times they have been loyal and self-sacrificing. They have "kept the faith".

REPORT OF THE VICE PRESIDENT OF THE WILLIAMSPORT ARCHDEACONY

1931-1932



During the last two years 14 Auxiliary branches and two Guilds doing Auxiliary work have been active.

Two Spring meetings were held, one in All Saint's, Williamsport, when A. R. McKechnie of Long Island, (a returned missionary from Japan) gave a splendid address. The other in Christ Church, Berwick, when the Rev. Jocelyn Reed of Columbia once a missionary in Liberia told us of the great need of the church in that field. Both meetings were especially well attended.

Many of our women took advantage of the oportunity to hear the inspiring address and discussions at the two Regional Conferences. One was held in St. Paul's, Bloomsburg, and one in Trinity, Williamsport. These Conferences were held under the direction of the chairman of the Field Work Committee.

A number of branches observed the World Day of Prayer by meeting in one central parish for intercessions and inviting the women of nearby parishes to take part. Twenty corporate communions were held. Most branches open their regular meetings with devotions.

The following Five Point Program—(Family Life, 2—Economic and Property Rights, 3—International Relationship, 4—Interracial Relationship, 5—Religious Thinking of today,) which was recommended at the last Triennial, was carried out in one of our larger parishes. Women were presented and took part in the program from the nearby branches.

Five women attended the Summer Conference at Hood College and two at Bethlehem.

Much credit should be given to the branches for the box work done during the last two years. During the year 1931 the value of the Lenten and Advent boxes was over \$700. In 1932 it amounted to nearly \$600, with two of our strong branches having been transferred to the Altoona Archdeaconry and three other branches not able to send boxes.

On another page of this issue you will find the report of the C. P. C. director and the U. T. O. Custodian giving the amounts given during the last two years for those projects.

We have two (B) Branches or Junior Woman's Auxiliaries both doing a splendid work.

Your Vice President presided over two Archdeaconry meetings, attended two Annual meetings, was a delegate to the Province meeting in Pittsburg, sent out the Self Denial envelopes, and wrote the many letters and cards necessary for carrying on the work.

The branches are to be commended for their faithful work during the last two trying years. Let us hope that conditions will soon be better, but anyway keep on praying and working.

Hughes, the Greek Priest, nine Priests of the Church and four of St. John's vestrymen. At the request of our president the subjects used for Discussion at Denver, Colo., were used. The paper on International Relations, by our President was intensively interesting—

Mrs. Lyman Winidolph's talk on Family Life, will not soon be forgotten.

Miss Winnefred Moore's paper—Religious Thinking Today—read by Mrs. Steacy, was a rare treat. Mrs. Ruby Bohee—executive from Lancaster's Colored recreational Centre Discussed Mordecai Johnson's paper—Interracial Contacts in a most helpful manner—'Twas a difficult Task—'Twas done in a wonderful spirit.

17 parishes represented—144 delegates present, offering \$40.55. After deducting program cost, and president's travelling expenses—over balance of \$28.08, on motion, was given to the Pledge deficit.

Our pilgrimage to the Episcopal Home at Shippensburg was a great success. We received a royal welcome. Father Graeff and his charming wife met us at the home. We all lunched together. After lunch Father Graeff had a beautiful inspiring service in the Church for the House Guests and the Pilgrims. We are planning to accept Father Hughes' invitation for a pilgrimage to the Prince of Peace, Gettysburg and Mount Alto, next spring.

Some prominent speakers have come to us during the year. Chief of whom is Dr. and Mrs. Grafton Burk of Hudson Shieek Memorial Hospital, Ft. Yukon, Alaska at St. James', Lancaster. Father Shaw, Tokio, Japan—St. John's, Lancaster. Mrs. Ruby Bohee, St. John's, Lancaster.

Have written 98 letters, 106 postal cards. Sent out our 300 Self-Denial Week envelopes, and 23 Questionaires. With the assistance of the President of St. John's, Carlisle I have gladly financed this part of the program.

The special study for the year 1931, "India", was studied and discussed in most of the branches. A number of branches studied "Our Expanding Church."

The Educational work for the year 1932 was most satisfactory and encouraging.

REPORT OF THE CHURCH PERIODICAL CLUB

1932 With Report of 1932 Synod Included

In offering my report, and bringing you greetings from the Church Periodical Club, it is my purpose to dispense with the usual statistics so as to curtail it in length because of the Synod Report being included. I will say, however, that the regular routine work is in progress, your Missionaries from this Diocese, at work in the Field, are receiving the magazines they ask for, your Chaplain at Mt. Alto has been given twelve (12) paid subscriptions to the "Witness" for distribution among his Church patients at the Sanatorium, all other Church Institutions in the Diocese, and many of those, secular are receiving aid in the form of literature, the work for the orphans in the Mining District in this Diocese is taken care of, Libraries in formation are being assisted and much miscellaneous work goes on all of the time. The usual number of official reports were compiled, 376 letters were written and among the yearly meetings attended was that of the Synod which convened in Pittsburgh, October 18, 19, 20, 1932, a report of which I have been asked to give at this time. My first official act, after the Synod was declared in session, was to tender greetings, on behalf of the Church Periodical Club, to the delegates and guests present at an informal reception held after the Quiet Hour. I felt proud to be called on to do this, not from any personal feeling but because it put the Diocese of Harrisburg, our Diocese, one of thirteen (13) in this Providence, in the foreground at that particular time.

The next morning at an early celebration of The Holy Eucharist we were privileged to receive with our Bishop as celebrant at that Service. At 9:15 A. M. the first business meeting was called to order and at a given time we were invited to meet in joint session with the Woman's Auxiliary to hear our guest speakers tell of their work in the Field. The first speaker, the Right Reverend Frank W. Creighton, Bishop of Mexico, gave us a clear and concise explanation of the complicated situation in which the Church in Mexico finds itself at the present time. Assuring us that, when the time of grace expires which has been allowed us by the Mexican government, there would be a sufficient number of native clergy, aside from the newly consecrated Suffragan Bishop, the Right Reverend Tfrain Salinas Y. Velasco, to carry on the work.

Miss Mildred Edmunds, one of the staff at Dabney House, Java, Va., was the next speaker to give an account of her work among the people in that district especially the children for whom a Mission Chapel is being built from logs already cut. This Chapel is to be used exclusively by the children and toward its equipment. Miss Edmunds asked for fifty (50) Prayer Books and fifty (50) Hymnals. Your Director obligated herself, for the Diocese of Harrisburg, to the amount of five (5.00) dollars toward the purchase of these books and I am happy to report that amount in hand sent to me by St. John's branch, York, Pa.

We next heard from Miss Helen Skiles, originally from the Diocese of Pittsburgh, but now of Kyoto, Japan, home on furlough at the present time. She made known her needs to us during our business meeting the next day and, because the value of the yen at this time is so low, she explained to us that money would be of greater value to her than gifts bought in America as Japanese Religious Pictures, which she needs for school work, could be bought right at home. She was promised a money contribution as well as some beautiful scrap-books made in the Diocese of Pittsburgh.

Our next speaker was Mrs. G. L. Campbell, a Social Service worker on the mountains of W. Va., near Harpers Ferry. Because of the diffi-

culties of communication she and her brother, with whom she lives, pass many lonely hours during the Winter months and she asked us, at our meeting on Thursday, to try and procure a battery radio for her. The matter was given consideration and left in the care of the Director of the Diocese of Erie.

Aside from the help given to the above persons the sum of fifty (\$50.00) dollars was voted, from our Treasury, to Miss Mary E. Thomas, for purchase of children's books for a Mission in S. C. We feel that in making a Corporate Gift at our Provincial Meetings it shows a concrete result and gives us just another personal touch from such action.

We hurriedly adjourned to leave by Bus for a Pilgrimage to St. Barnabas' Home, Gibsonia, a distance of about twenty-five miles from Pittsburgh where we lunched while listening to Brother Hans, the House-Father and founder of the Lay Order of St. Barnabas, describe the beginnings of his work after which we were guided through the building and lastly into their beautiful Chapel to worship during a Quiet Hour conducted by our own Bishop Brown.

The meeting was both inspirational and educational and I am sure the benefits derived therefrom will enable us to pray more earnestly and labor more diligently for the upbuilding of the Church's Mission.

They need new records; a radio—to bring the outside world into lives so utterly isolated.

The Church School is held in "The Hospice", where the children of the mountain side and from the Department of Forestry receive instruction in the Word of God. It is great to be able to give them a little gift at Christmas—who will help? Father and Mrs. Hughes are always eager to welcome members of the Diocese at Mt. Alto and show the work to be done, and what has been accomplished. Clothing, jellies, canned goods, candies, books, magazines, all are needed. A lawn mower (power) is badly needed to reduce the cost of keeping our property in an attractive and presentable manner.

I regret to say we have decreased in the number of branches in the Diocese due to I think to the unusual wage condition. Some branches were reported inactive the past year leaving the total number of (7) seven branches.

The total number of dues sent to the National office for branches the past year was \$141.00. Provincial dues, \$3.75.

Last fall a very successful Provincial conference was held at St. John's, York.

The Girls' Friendly Diocesan conference was held at St. Stephen's Cathedral, Harrisburg, through the kindness of Dr. Treder, October 24th. Bishop and Mrs. Brown were present. Bishop Brown has a real interest in the work and Mrs. Brown gave us many fine suggestions of branch work in parishes she was connected with.

During the early spring letters were sent to branch presidents in response to an appeal from the Box Work Secretary, Mrs. Cowell of the Woman's Auxiliary for clothing and hospital supplies, the response was very gratifying to me. The branches are urged to use the blue boxes, while the amount received is not large it represents a fine spirit of co-operation. Each branch is asked to work for parish objectives and contribute toward parish support.

The Girls' Friendly endeavors to visualize the girl and young woman in the needs of her daily life, both personal and social, and provides a program which satisfies those needs.

The dues are low, within the reach of almost any girl.

I trust after you hear Mrs. Estes tell of the work being done by the Girls' Friendly Society many parishes will wish to share in this work.
