CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS
WOMAN'S AUXILIARY OF
THE DIOCESE OF HARRISBURG



Revised and Adopted November 16, 1932

CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I

NAME

The name of the Association shall be the Harrisburg Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council of the Episcopal Church in the United States of America.

ARTICLE II

OBJECT

The object of this Association shall be to carry out within the Diocese of Harrisburg the purposes and work of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council, with special emphasis on its missionary activities.

ARTICLE III

MEMBERSHIP

The membership of the Harrisburg Branch shall be composed of the Parish Branches of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of Harrisburg.

ARTICLE IV

OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the Harrisburg Branch shall be the Bishop of Harrisburg ex-officio, a President, a Vice-President at large, four Vice-Presidents (one from each Archdeaconry), a Secretary, a Treasurer, and a United Thank Offering Custodian.

Section 2. All officers, with the exception of the Vice-Presidents, shall be elected at the Annual Meeting by ballot of the member branches, and serve for a term of three years. Vacancies occurring among the officers during their term of office shall, until the next annual meeting, be filled by vote of the Executive Committee. No officer (save the Treasurer) who shall have served a full term of three years shall be eligible for re-election, to succeed herself.

Section 3. Each Archdeaconry shall elect (from the three names previously nominated by the Diocesan President) its own Archdeaconry Vice-President at the spring meeting following the election of President. She may succeed herself for a second term.

ARTICLE V

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The officers, together with the United Thank Offering Custodian, the Educational Secretary, the Supply Secretary, the Chairman of Section B, or Junior Women and Girls Friendly Society, the Church Periodical Club Director, and such Chairman necessary to the work of this organization, shall constitute the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE VI

MEETINGS

Section 1. The annual meeting for the election of officers and other business shall be held the Third Tuesday and Wednesday in November.

Section 2. Special meetings may be called by the Executive Committee at any time. At special meetings only such business as is specified shall be considered.

AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION

This Constitution may be amended at any annual meeting by a two-thirds vote of the member branches, provided that notice of such proposed amendment shall have been sent to each branch president thirty days before said meeting.

BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I

DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The President shall call all meetings of the Association and of the Executive Board and preside at the same. She shall appoint and fill vacancies in all committees not otherwise provided for in the By-Laws, and shall be a member ex-officio of all committees except the Nominating Committee. She shall direct the editing of the annual report.

Section 2. The Vice-Presidents shall represent the following archdeaconries:

- I. Vice-President of Altoona Archdeaconry,
- II. Vice-President of Harrisburg Archdeaconry,
- III. Vice-President of Northern Archdeaconry,
- IV. Vice-President of Williamsport Archdeaconry,

The Vice-Presidents shall encourage the organization of new branches in their respective districts, visit the member branches and supervise their work. Each Vice-President shall prepare and submit a report at each annual meeting, and shall conduct at least one meeting a year in her respective archdeaconry.

Section 3. The Secretary shall make and keep, in permanent form, a record of the proceedings of the Auxiliary and of the Executive Committee. She shall prepare and submit a report at each annual meeting, assist in compiling the annual report and send out all notices.

Section 4. The Treasurer shall receive and transmit all monies (except the United Thank Offering) due the organization, and shall pay all properly approved bills and present her audited report at the annual meeting.

Section 5. The United Thank Offering Custodian shall be elected at the annual meeting immediately following the Triennial Meeting. She shall endeavor to increase and deepen interest in the United Thank Offering by sending out literature pertaining to same, and shall receive and transmit to Church Missions House all the United Thank Offering monies and make a yearly report.

Section 6. The Educational Secretary shall have general supervision of all missionary educational work undertaken by the Woman's Auxiliary and shall prepare herself for the training of parish leaders of study classes.

ARTICLE II

NOMINATIONS and ELECTIONS

Section 1. A Nominating Committee consisting of one member from each Archdeaconry shall be appointed by the President one month before the annual meeting.

Section 2. Each member branch shall be entitled to two votes and an additional vote for each ten members or fraction thereof. Elections shall be by ballot; the newly elected officers to assume office at the close of the meeting at which they are elected.

Section 3. Delegates to the Triennial Meeting of the General Auxiliary shall be the President and four women from the membership of the Auxiliary, and five alternates from the same to be elected by ballot.

Section 4. There shall be two delegates and three alternates to the Provincial Synod Meeting, elected by ballot from this Association. The president, a delegate by virtue of her office.

Section 5. An expense fund for all necessary expenses shall be provided by this Association.

Rule 1. Twenty per cent. of the total amount pledged for the Expense Fund shall be set aside for a Sinking Fund to be used at the direction of the Executive Board. All requisitions shall be signed by the President.

Rule 2. At the annual meeting, the hostess branch shall entertain, over night, members of the Executive Board, speakers on the program and two delegates from each branch. Where more delegates register from any branch they shall pay for their own entertainment.

MINUTES

Minutes of the Twenty-eighth Annual Meeting of the Woman's
Auxiliary in the Diocese of Harrisburg, Bloomsburg Pa.,
November 14-15, 1933.

"Mission Work in every Parish held essential to a successful Program" and "greater activity in the field of missions in every parish of the Episcopal Church" was urged at every session of the meeting in St. Paul's, Bloomsburg.

Delegates from every section of the Diocese were present for the quiet hour which opened the first session and was conducted by Rev. Karl L. Tiedeman. Order of The Holy Cross.

His meditation was on the words of St. John "God is love."

Bishop Wyatt Brown was in charge of the evening services. Glorious inspiring music, by a congregation of Christian minded men and women—in an atmosphere of reverend devotion—he lead his people in a "Missionary Mass Meeting". In his talk, Bishop Brown said—"The National Council is doing more than its share, and it is up to the parishes to carry on their missionary work. If the missionary work dies in the parish, it dies throughout the National Church." Unselfishness in the church of God is the christian spirit.

He spoke of the splendid work of the Auxiliary and called to mind God's everlasting promise "I am with you always even to the end of the world."

With a masterly grasp of his subject, Mr. John Hartman reviewed the greatest book of the age. "Rethinking Missions."

Dr. Trapnell spoke of work in the mission fields as carried on in different countries, and emphasized the necessity for furthering the "Missionary Program."

Father Tiedeman recalled for the friends at evening service the meditation of the earlier service "Love is the desire to give the best we have." God gave His only Son and we must learn to **love** Him and **love** our fellow-men.

The program for the social hour was under the direction of our faithful Branch president, Mrs. Johnston, and her co-workers of St. Paul's.

The entertainment of the evening was under the direction of the Choir Master, S. Clair Hower, leading the Male Quartette of St. Paul's Church assisted by friends of the congregation.

Delicious refreshments were served and we again revived our Auxiliary freindships. Visiting delegates were guests in the homes of the members of St. Paul's Auxiliary.

WEDNESDAY, NOVEMBER 5

The celebration of the Holy Communion brought us together reverently in heart and mind. Bishop Brown was the Celebrant, assisted by Rev. Heber W. Becker Rector of Christ's Church, Danville, and Rev. J. Thomas Heistand Rector of St. Paul's, Bloomsburg—Practically the entire group of delegates was present at the celebration.

All enjoyed the social contact at breakfast as the guests of the parish Auxiliary.

The morning meeting opened by singing hymn No. 476—"From Greenlands Icy Mountains."

Mrs. J. W. Johnston, Branch President extended greetings to the officers and delegates on behalf of the Auxiliary and parishoners of St. Paul's, Bloomsburg—Her message "And every Man stood in his place" and "Know our strength by knowing Christ" are the bulwarks of faith and works seen through St. Paul's whole parish history; evidenced by their sturdy christian character, cultural churchmanship, and reverend devotion and worship, up to the present day.

Miss Batzle's message—"The history of St. Paul's parish since 1776" and "What the Church has done toward the building of the Nation" carried the same thought, "the responsibility of each person and acceptance of the responsibility."

Roll call showed 143 delegates representing twenty-seven Auxiliaries, the Bishop and nine clergymen.

The following reports were read and accepted. Report of Vice-Presidents, Mrs. Peck, Mrs. Spotts, Mrs. Fleming, Mrs. Reeder; Mrs. Noe, Treasurer; Mrs. Hartman, U. T. O.; Educational Secretary, Mrs. McCutcheon; Devotional Committee, Miss Cork; Social Service, Miss Williams; Self-Denial, Mrs. Spotts. Representative of Episcopal Home for Aged—Mrs. Graeff, Chambersburg.

Noon-day prayers were said by Ven. C. E. McCoy of Trinity, Williamsport.

The report of the nominating committee was accepted. Ballots were distributed—balloting began.

It was regularly moved, seconded, and carried that one person representing two parishes be given two votes.

Moved, seconded and carried that the Secretary cast the ballot for the election of the delegates to the general convention.

Tellers in the election were: Mrs. Brower, Tyrone; Mrs. Steiger, Williamsport; Miss Swartout, Bloomsburg; Miss Low, Bloomsburg; Mrs. Brady Yost, Williamsport; Mrs. Fry, Lancaster.

Miss Pickering, Chairman of the nominating committee reported the following elections: President, Mrs. E. M. Fleming, by a standing vote of acclaim. Delegates to the general convention: Mrs. Fleming, Miss Batzle, Mrs. McCutcheon, Mrs. Peck and Mrs. Albra Reeder. Alternates: Miss Laura Vaughn, Wellsboro; Mrs. J. H. Stevens, Blossburg; Mrs. J. H. Spotts, Lancaster; Miss Anna Williams, Williamsport; Mary R. Harris, Shippensburg.

The luncheon was a delightful affair at which the Bishop was the toastmaster introducing: Rev. Mr. H. St. Clair Hathaway, of Berwick, who spoke for the clergy; the newly elected President, Mrs. F. M. Fleming; the retiring President, Miss Batzle; Dr. Trapnall, member of the National Council; Rev. Mr. Schofield spoke of his missionary work in the Diocese; Mrs. John Peck, Vice-President, Northern Archdeaconry.

Miss Mildred Edmunds of Dabney House, Java, Virginia, gave a most interesting talk on the work of that mission. In addition to the mission house, there are now a school, church and small hospital—All of these agencies working for God's Kingdom.

She told interesting human stories of families who came into the church which now has 150 members. The school is self-supporting. In the church children are trained in the services of the church. The newest branch is the hospital building, two wards with four beds, operating room and kitchenette. Here child birth is the specialty and there are rooms for convalescent patients, who have had free operations in the hospital of Lynchburg.

There is instilled in the heart and mind of the patients "Christ's Ministry of healing" and "the sacredness of each personality." Miss Edmunds emphasized the spiritual, healthful and mental growth of those who came under the care of the mission.

Rev. Mr. Caution of Holy Cross, Harrisburg, thanked the Woman's Auxiliary for the \$12.50 a month from the Self-Denial Offering—he told of his choir; his penny lunchroom for the school children and declared they were his mainstay.

Miss Swartout told of her community auxiliary at St. Gabriel's, Benton.

Self-Denial work reports to date \$234.80 from 28 branches closing with—"if more branches do not send in their offerings we fail our Bishop."

Memorial to Hugh Latimer Burleson—Priest and Bishop.

Appreciation of inspiration and service to those who took part in the program—Bishop Brown, Father Tiederman, Dr. Trapnell, Mr. John Hartman, Miss Edmunds, Ven. C. E. McCoy, Rev. J. Thomas Heistand and the President of St. Paul's, Bloomsburg Auxiliary branch.

The invitation to meet with St. Luke's, Altoona in 1934 was accepted.

Miss Batzle, retiring Diocesan President, greeted Mrs. E. M. Fleming her successor, assuring her of the co-operating of the Officers and members of the Diocesan Auxiliary.

Mrs. Fleming expressed her appreciation of the honor conferred on her by the Diocesan Auxiliary.

MINUTES

Minutes of the Twenty-ninth Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary, Diocese of Harrisburg, Altoona, Pa.

The meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Harrisburg opened in St. Luke's Episcopal Church, Altoona, Pa., Tuesday, November 20th with delegates from every part of the Diocese present.

The program of the opening session at 4:30 included a quiet hour service in the church with meditations and prayers led by The Rev. J. Moulton Thomas, Rector of Trinity, Williamsport, taking as his text "Be still and know that I am God," he analyzed the values of intense individual prayer life, and in his meditation he used the five blocks to God's work which come up in our lives—Preoccupation, sensitiveness, possessiveness, strain, and conscious sin.

A business meeting for organization of the nominating and resolution committees put in motion the business of the following day.

A dinner at the Penn Alto Hotel brought the delegates into delightful social contact for the rest of the meeting.

Bishop Brown was in charge of the Evening Service—with a congregation of christian minded men and women, in an atmosphere of reverent devotion led by a reverently trained choir our Bishop led his people in a missionary mass meeting—his topic was "Catch the vision of the Church's Mission," He presented a glowing report of the activities and progress of the Diocese during the past year; reporting a membership of 13,712 in the Diocese, a financial report showing \$244,141.10 spent during the year to carry on its many religious and charitable activities, \$12,170.50 being to support missions outside the Diocese.

Dr. Collett, General Secretary of the Field Department, was earnest and intense in his plea for a whole hearted acceptance of Missions in Africa, China, and Japan.

A delightful social hour followed in the Parish House—musical entertainment by the Men's Quartette—and delightful refreshments were served.

Wednesday, the early morning celebration of the Holy Communion brought us together reverently in heart and mind, with Bishop Brown as the Celebrant, assisted by Reverend William Sherwood, of Tyrone.

Breakfast was served in the parish house and the business meeting opened with prayers by Mrs. Fleming and singing of hymn 486.

A most cordial greeting was given by Mrs. Lester Burket who represented the Auxiliary branches of Tyrone, Huntingdon, and Altoona—hostess Branches of Auxiliary.

Mrs. Fleming was most gracious and sincere in her appreciation of the opportunity and joy of serving the Auxiliary as its President and Representative at the General Convention in Atlantic City. Her message will appear in the coming Annual.

Roll call showed a hundred delegates at that time. Reports of the Vice-Presidents of the four Archdeaconries were read and accepted. Mrs. Harry G. Hartman, the U. T. O. Custodian reported \$6,158.60 for The United Thank Offering of the Diocese.

The report of the Educational Secretary, Mrs. McCutcheon was read by Mrs. Hartman. Mrs. McCutcheon is "happy to report a greater interest in the Educational work of the Woman's Auxiliary than heretofore."

The report of Mrs. William Rote, the C. P. C. Director makes glad the heart of those who are able to assist in the joy of providing church papers for clergy, magazines and pleasurable reading for shut-ins, hospitals and reformatories.

The report of Mrs. William Johnston, the Box Supply Secretary, who reported boxes, clothing, and money to the amount of \$1,214.12 sent her by the Diocesan Auxiliaries was read and approved.

Mrs. J. W. Crawford, Diocesan Prayer-Partner Secretary, explained the meaning of the Prayer-Partnership Plan, and presented a very fine report of the work during the year.

Mrs. John E. Hill, President of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Pennsylvania brought greetings and good will from the Junior and Senior Auxiliary of her diocese.

In a very skillful and practical resume, Mrs. Hill brought to the minds of her listeners the appreciated statements—That the "Junior Woman" is one of the Auxiliary problems since so few younger women are actively identified with the work—and a better understanding between the age groups is necessary.

The Treasurer's report for the year will be printed in the Annual.

Miss Marguerite Brown, of Hollidaysburg, presented an interesting report of the Social Service Work in the Auxiliary of Harrisburg Diocese.

Mrs. Brown, Chariman of the Devotional Committee is most happy to report a "growth in devotional interest in homes and places where the Auxiliary makes a personal contact". The personal plea was "Dedicate our lives each day to God."

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



My message, first of all, is one of thanksgiving—thanksgiving that you, by electing me your president have given me the opportunity and the joy of serving you, and of doing this, I might say, fascinating work. And thanksgiving that because of my doing this work I had such a wonderful reward in being sent to Atlantic City for General Convention.

Nothing I might have conceived could have given me an accurate picture of General Convention. My wish is that you all have an opportunity of attending sometime. You know, perhaps, some of the important matters which were discussed and decided there, such as the Church's firm stand on divorce; that we keep the name "Protestant Episcopal," the election of women to a place on the National Council. Strangely enough, many of the women did not feel that this was a step in the right direction. Perhaps the men feel that women, through these years of depression have carried on with better success than they themselves have done, and so wished to have their help and inspiration.

The themes of the Triennial were "Missions in this Age" and Christian Citizenship as practical discussion topics and "The life of the Spirit" as a help to our devotional life.

Much stress was laid on the importance of forming a program for your parish or branch, and I urge you as Auxiliary women to have a program for the year—not an inflexible one, which cannot be changed, but one adopted to your needs. Make your own program to suit your branch, month by month if that is better for you. Use "Program Building" to help you. Learn about the Church's work in parish, community and diocese, what can be done to help the community, how the parish house can be used to better advantage, what the church is doing in the Mission Field, how to strengthen your devotional life. All these things in addition to raising money, although that is necessary. "These things also ye ought to have done, and not to have left the others undone."

Coming back to our own branches especially, how many parish branches have a devotional chairman or committee as was requested at the Spring Archdeaconry meetings? What are we doing to increase young people's work in our Diocese, especially Junior Woman's Auxiliary work, a subject strongly stressed at the Triennial? Have we done what we could for our Self-Denial Fund which helps to further the work so dear to our Bishop's heart? Let us think about attending or helping someone to attend our summer conference which we are fortunate to have within our limits, at Penn Hall, Chambersburg, Pa.

What can we do to help the sale of the Harrisburg Churchman, our Diocesan paper? Every family should subscribe to this most excellent paper, of greater interest now to Auxiliary women, since we have a special W. A. column.

As you know we did not have a year book this year, a lack which has now become a necessity. In 1935 we shall, I hope have a book, the contents and size of which will be governed by cost and the condition of our treasury. At least we will have a directory of officers and committees printed.

I wish to extend my thanks to the officers this year, to the new Vice-Presidents who have taken up the work so well, to the committees and to all who have helped so willingly.

May I ask your help and your prayers that we may go on to a higher,

more spiritual conception of Auxiliary work. Sometimes I feel that as the poet said,

"The world is, too much with us—
Late and soon, getting and spending
We lay waste our powers.
Little we see in Nature which is ours,"

so we can take the rebuke to ourselves in our life of the spirit, "Little we see in God which is ours."

I close with these words from the sermon broadcast by the Rt. Rev. Frederic Deane, Bishop of Aberdenn and Orkney, "That only secures a lasting peace and happiness which centers in the life of God, for as the old saint said and as it will always be true, "Thou, O God, has made us Thyself, and our heart can find no rest until it rest in Thee."

REPORT OF THE VICE PRESIDENT OF THE ALTOONA ARCHDEACONRY

1934



This Archdeaconry consists of five regular organized Senior and three Junior Woman's Auxiliaries, and three Guilds doing Auxiliary work. All Branches sent a U. T. O. Eight paid pledges, seven sent a Self-Denial Offering, and most of them made contributions of some kind to the Ship-pensburg Home. A total of twenty-one Corporate Communion were held. Three Branches had Quiet Days, and six observed the World Day of Prayer. Five had Mission Study classes, and three Program meetings; one U. T. O. pageant was given.

A very gratifying amount of box work was done the past year. Sixteen boxes, valued at \$172.73 were sent independently. In addition, Thanksgiving, Christmas, and Hospital boxes worth \$86.15 were donated locally.

Seven branches report work done with the Red Cross, Associated Charities, or other welfare agencies.

All branches but one have subscribers to the Spirit of Missions and the Harrisburg Churchman.

The Spring Meeting held at St. Andrew's, State College was most successful in every way, and about the largest ever held in this Archdeaconry. Interesting talks were given by Bishop Brown, Mrs. Brown, Mrs. E. M. Fleming and Mrs. Edward Frear. A new Archdeaconry Vice-President was elected.

It was our pleasure to entertain the Annual Meeting in Altoona, the Altoona, Tyrone and Huntingdon branches acting as hostesses. This new plan was found very successful. Many of our women attended the Triennial Convention in Atlantic City.

We deeply regret the passing of twenty faithful workers from this Archdeaconry.

The Vice-President has carried on all necessary correspondence and routine business during the year, and greatly appreciates the hearty co-operation given her.

REPORT OF THE VICE PRESIDENT OF THE WILLIAMSPORT ARCHDEACONRY

1934

The Spring Meeting of the Williamsport Archdeaconry was held in Trinity Church, Shamokin, May 16, 1934. The Vice-President, Mrs. Albra Reeder, declining re-election, Mrs. John Gortner, of Shamokin, was elected.

We were honored with the presence of our own Bishop Brown, at the meeting. Heard a very interesting talk "We Serve" by Miss Mary Frances Ward, Parish worker, of Williamsport, also a very able address by Miss Batzle, of Williamsport. The reports of our Educational Secretary, Mrs. McCutchen and the Blue Box by Mrs. Mussina, our Vice-President, were very interesting.

Our Archdeaconry Supply Secretary, Mrs. Johnston reported 18 boxes sent out during the Lenten Season. During Advent Season, 18 boxes, valued at \$237.75, Postage \$12.07, a total valuation of \$247.81.

I find the branches in the Williamsport Archdeaconry doing splendid work and co-operating in every way, with our Auxiliary program. There is a hopeful outlook for the future. Most branches report increase in members and finances, and are planning interesting objectives for the year 1935.

During the year, eleven (11) corporate communions were held. The World day of Prayer was generally observed, in some instances joining with other churches, in one service. Armistice Day Programs were carried out in some branches. Ten members attended summer conferences. One at Chambersburg, one at Bethlehem, six at Blue Mountain, and two at Williamsport.

All pledges made by our several branches have been paid, with the exception of one, and they have promised to pay the balance as soon as possible.

It is with a great deal of pride and pleasure that I am able to report two revived branches. Centralia and Renovo. Holy Trinity, Centralia has sent a Self-Denial offering, and is sending a mission box for the first time. They also sent delegates to the annual meeting in Altoona. Renovo also sent delegates. We are co-operating with Junior Auxiliary work. Two new Junior or "B" Branches have been organized. One at St. Mary's, Williamsport, and one at Trinity Church, Williamsport. This makes a total of four "B" Branches in our Archdeaconry. Our Educational Secretary has made an official visit to Jersey Shore, at the invitation of the Jersey Shore Branch. Christ Church, Section A also has invited her for February, and our study classes, I know will benefit by these visits.

The Loyalty Campaign sponsored by Mrs. Brown, has been generally adopted, and in most instances meeting with fine success.

We co-operated with the field department in the regional conferences at Williamsport, and had the pleasure of learning it was one of the most largely attended of the several conferences.

It is most gratifying to report that Section A, Christ Church, Williamsport have raised their pledge from \$105 to \$150, and Trinity, Shamokin have raised their pledge from \$15 to \$25. This shows a wonderful spirit of Faith and co-operation.

A number from our Archdeaconry, attended the Triennial in Atlantic City.

Since assuming office, I have written sixteen Fall letters to the branches, sent our postal cards urging attendance at the regional conferences in Williamsport, sent our 600 Self-Denial envelopes, sent blanks to the several branches to be compiled for reports and written letters and cards pertaining to my office. It was my good fortune to attend the Triennial in Atlantic City, also the regional conference in Williamsport.

I want to express my appreciation to the branches for their splendid co-operation and support. It has been an inspiration to me.

"Let us pray fervently, work diligently, for the extension of Christ's Kingdom."

The Spring Meeting of the Williamsport Archdeaconry will be held in Jersey Shore, the third Wednesday of May (May 15th) to which we urge a large representation.

REPORT OF THE VICE PRESIDENT OF THE HARRISBURG ARCHDEACONRY

1934



The Woman's Auxiliary in this Archdeaconry has done splendid work during this year as shown by keener interest, heartier co-operation, greater number of people attending the meetings, and larger gifts.

Twenty branches have reported active work; including Prayer-Partner, box work, help with all civic service work in the parish and the community, also with hospital and leper work.

Thirty-two special Corporate Communion were held, eleven quiet days, six observations of the Quiet Day of Prayer on Armistice Day, and thirteen branches observed the World Day of Prayer.

The Spring Meeting was held at St. Andrew's, Harrisburg. Twenty parishes were represented. One hundred thirty members and eleven clergy were present. Mrs. Lyman Windolph spoke very ably and interesting on "In Defense of Rethinking Missions."

At the Regional Conference at York 14 parishes were represented.

Forty-six members of the Auxiliary were at the opening sessions of the General Convention.

In this Archdeaconry are three of the diocesan missionary projects, the Shippensburg Home for the Aged, Mt. Alto Sanatorium and Chapel, and Holy Cross Colored Mission. If you are motoring in this part of the State a visit to one or all of these will repay you well for the extra time and gas you will spend.

Also we have had a special blessing dropped right on our doorstep the Blue Mountain Conference has been moved to Chambersburg. The time of the conference has always been from the Monday before, until the Friday after the first Sunday in July. Not enough people took advantage of this wonderful opportunity to meet with and be influenced by the leaders in the Church's work. Now is the time to begin to plan to come to the conference. You will not be disappointed, but will be inspired to go forward more zealously with Christ in the work for His Kingdom.

That the Younger Women are feeling the need of organization is a tribute to the older women who have worked for the Master. May the inspiration of those branches now formed arouse the young women of other parishes to go and do likewise.

During the year I have attended the Blue Mountain Conference and the opening sessions of the General Convention at Atlantic City, also the Regional Conference at York and the Annual Meeting in Altoona. I was the guest speaker at one branch meeting. I have written six letters, have sent out 500 Self-Denial Week envelopes, 27 fall letters and 29 postal cards.

Twenty-five women have entered into eternal rest. May their souls find peace.

Let us pray; let us rededicate ourselves; but above all let us "go out into the world and preach His gospel" that by our influence and our inspiration we may bring new Disciples to Christ and share with them the wonderful blessings of His love.

REPORT OF THE SECRETARY OF THE PRAYER PARTNERSHIP PLAN



A Prayer for a Prayer-Partner

Almighty and most merciful God we humbly beseech Thee, for the merits of Thy dear Son, to pour out Thy Holy Spirit upon all our Missionaries, especially upon our Prayer-Partners; and to crown their labors with success in the gathering of souls into Thy Kingdom, to the honor and praise of Thy glorious Name, who art Father, Son and Holy Ghost, one God, without end. Amen.

My report begins with the prayer which I hope all Branches are using.

Since new Branches are being organized, especially among the Junior women of the Church, I feel now is the time for an outline of the Prayer-partnership Plan.

For some time before the Triennial Meeting held in Portland in 1922 there had been a feeling that we of the home Church might do more for our missionaries in the way of giving them the feeling that they are definitely and constantly in our thoughts and we had been thinking how this contact could be made and systematically carried out. Miss Lindley had been studying the Prayer-Partnership Plan of the Woman's Missionary Society of the Church of England in Canada, and in the spring of 1922 when she was in Toronto at a meeting of the Canadian Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary she became convinced that this plan was of great value and that it would be helpful not only to our Auxiliary but would give our missionaries the feeling of the supporting strength of the Church at home. The matter was discussed at Portland Triennial Meeting and the following Resolution was passed:

"Resolved: That the plan for the Prayer-Partnership used by the Woman's Auxiliary in Canada be commended heartily for use in our own Woman's Auxiliary, and that such steps be taken by the Executive Board as will make possible its use."

The missionaries are assigned to the Diocese by the Church Missions House, New York. These missionaries need our prayers and ask for them. They should be assured that they can write confidentially to their prayer groups about any matter for which they wish their prayers. Through prayer great things can be accomplished.

I have written to forty-two Branches and received answers from twenty-one. I wrote to thirteen missionaries, who are Prayer-Partners of the Diocese. Have received the following news from two of the missionaries: Miss Charlotte Brown has a Correspondence Church School of almost two hundred pupils, boys and girls. Her work is among the isolated, and educational work with the women of Nevada.

Miss Gertrude Heywood writes how happy she is to receive from Tyronne Branch the Churchman, and the Literary Digest from Philipsburg. Miss Heywood reports four students were accepted as catechumens or inquirers at the Christmas Service. She explains, that means their first step toward Baptism. Let us all pray earnestly that those four may go forward to a Christian goal. This is St. Margaret's School, Tokyo, Japan.

REPORT OF THE EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY IN THE DIOCESE OF HARRISBURG



Madam President, and Women of the Auxiliary—

As your Educational Secretary I am most happy to report what I feel to be a much greater interest in the Educational work of the Woman's Auxiliary than heretofore.

During the past winter nearly all the Auxiliary Branches had study classes. There were plays, pageants, program nights, Rector's Book shelves or Lenten reading, Regional meetings, Archdeaconry meetings, World Day of Prayer, also Prayers and Meditation on Armistice Day.

Following the last annual meeting in Bloomsburg, Miss Mildred Edmunds, of Dabney House, Java, Virginia, made a tour of the Diocese, speaking at group meetings in Tyrone, Sunbury, Harrisburg and Lancaster.

Your Educational Secretary has written over 100 letters, spoken at meetings, attended the Blue Mountain Conference at Chambersburg and the early part of the Trienium at Atlantic City.

We are very happy to have in our own Diocese the Blue Mountain Conference. The Conference has been moved from Hood College at Frederick, Maryland to Penn Hall, Chambersburg, Penna. We were glad to see so many in attendance from our own Diocese. Father and Mrs. Graeff, in whose Parish the Conference was held, were most hospitable and were both enrolled in classes for the entire conference.

For your study for 1934 and 1935 you are offered two themes—Japan and Orientals in the United States. In the text book "Suzuki Looks at Japan" Willis Lamotte tells of Suzuki—a typical—well educated Japanese Christian. Through him, we see the complex life of Japan and the work of Church and Mission. The Leaders course for adult groups on Japan is by T. H. P. Sailer. Suzuki Looks at Japan, price 60 cents. Handbook, price 25 cents.

The Book on Orientals in American Life is by Albert W. Palmer. "Dr. Palmer—out of his long experience among Orientals living in the United States and Hawaii has shown how the relations between Americans and their neighbors of Oriental origin are bound up with Far Eastern problems of the most critical importance." The Leaders course is by Miss Margaret Marston, our Educational Secretary for the Woman's Auxiliary at the Missions House in New York.

The pamphlet "The Way of Vision" used as a preparation for the Triennial Meeting in Atlantic City should be in the hands of every Woman of the Auxiliary.

In my Fall Letter—which will be sent to each Branch within the next few weeks—will be much information to help you in planning your study classes.

Let your Educational Secretary be of service to you and order your books through her.

JUNIOR WOMAN'S AUXILIARY COMMITTEE

1933



Our work on this committee has been more a foundation for future activities than actual accomplishments, since Jr. Woman's work in this diocese is comparatively new, or at least as a diocesan organization it is new.

The importance of the work has been stressed in letters and wherever possible by urging the formation of Jr. Branches, Altoona A.D. has two and Williamsport A.D. has two.

The Junior branch in St. Luke's, Altoona, gave a very beautiful U. T. O. pageant in October at the fall evening meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary.

A very successful get together meeting of branches of Altoona A.D. was held in St. John's, Bellefonte in September, in the form of a supper. This was planned and worked out by the president of the Jr. Woman's branch of St. John's. Representatives of eight Jr. and Sr. Branches of Altoona A.D. were present, also three women from All Saints, Williamsport, and one from St. Mary's, Williamsport.

Our reason why more branches have not been formed lies in the fact that in some parishes at least, there is an organization of younger women already functioning in some lines of Auxiliary work, and these groups do not wish to change their name or organization even though they do help in Auxiliary work.

Our best plan is to "make haste slowly" and by "Precept, here a little, there a little," draw these younger women into the full joy of Auxiliary work, letting them use their own individuality, their own ideas, guiding but not coercing, urging them to join us in serving our Lord faithfully and "doing good in their generation."

REPORT OF THE GIRLS' FRIENDLY SOCIETY OF HARRISBURG DIOCESE

1934



Report 5 active branches and 3 candidate branches with prospects of one branch being organized shortly. Active branches have done social service work and much work for parish objectives.

I have tried to keep the G. F. S. work constantly before our Rectors, what a splendid opportunity the church has to offer the girlhood of the community through the church.

At the Provincial conference held at Richmond, pioneering was the theme of the conference. The comparison was shown, how we pioneer in meeting the needs of young girls', not in regard to social class, not seeking to build up the organization but the value offered is spiritually greater. Our branches are using the blue boxes in a small way, the branch presidents are being asked to explain more fully what an important part they have in the church program.

The missionary objective this year is Orientals in America. The new mission object being the salary of a worker for St. Faith's School, Yanchow, China.

This promises to be one of the most interesting objects we have had as we will be assisting an individual person in an most important piece of work without aid.

The Diocesan conference of the G. F. S. was held at St. Stephen's Cathedral, November the 3rd, Bishop Brown met with us, is heartily in sympathy with the work, I know any parishes wishing to organize branches would have his sincere support and co-operation.

Do not forget we are a National and International Organization and while some objection may be raised to paying national dues, we must not lose sight of the fact that the National offices are a means of service to the branches.

It is the first year that the camp has closed with a deficit. It has always been self sustaining besides taking care of many improvements. In 1933 there were 118 girls in camp, in 1934 there were 93.

At the Girls' Friendly Diocesan conference held at St. Stephens Cathedral November 3rd, plans were formulated for the creation of an Advisory Council for Camp Betty Washington to work with Trustees and Housing committee, elected for the promotion of camp program. The following resolutions were adopted:

Resolve: That an Advisory Council be established consisting of the Bishop, Archdeacons and other clergymen, laymen and laywomen, to the number of twenty-four, three from each Archdeaconry and twelve at large to co-operate with the authorities of Camp Betty Washington at York for the promotion of its program.

Be It Further Resolved: That the Diocesan President of the Girls' Friendly Society be and is hereby authorized to appoint the members to serve until the next annual meeting at which their successors shall be chosen.

The council shall meet at the call of the President of the Diocesan Girls' Friendly Society at least once a year and organize by the election of a President, Vice-President, or Vice-Presidents, Secretary and such other officers as they shall deem necessary. Its purpose shall be to work in every possible way with the authorities of Camp Betty Washington to promote the welfare of the Camp and to extend its usefulness throughout the Diocese.

REPORT OF THE CHURCH PERIODICAL CLUB

1934



With Report of 1934 General Convention Included

In submitting this, my twelfth yearly report, for your approval I shall dispense with some of the routine matters, so as to curtail it in length, in order to incorporate a report of the C. P. C. meetings held during the General Convention, in Atlantic City, recently. I will say, however, that the yearly work goes steadily on; all obligations have been met and in addition, a new phase has been included—the translation of several standard works into the Braille System used by the blind. Too much praise cannot be given this donor for her splendid contribution and the letters of acknowledgement bear testimony to her noble offering. Another item worthy of mention is the gift of a full set of "Child's Book of Knowledge" which goes to Kuling School, China, and is the direct outcome of a visit to the C. P. C. Publicity Booth at the General Convention. Both of these gifts are credited to St. John's Church, Lancaster, Pa. Yet another item of importance is that a paid subscription to "Child Life" is now going to the Hudson Stuck Memorial Hospital, Fort Yukon, Alaska, in recognition of the volunteer work done by our Bishop's son, Wyatt Brown, Jr.,—and, now to proceed with the Triennial Report—

According to the custom of previous years a Corporate Communion preceded the C. P. C. meetings, the Celebrant being Bishop Matthews, of N. J., assisted by the Rector of St. James' Church and two visiting Priests. More than one hundred persons made their communion and the offering amounted to \$172.30, one hundred dollars of this amount being sent with the delegates from the Diocese of Colorado marked especially for the Endowment Fund which now totals \$43,000.00. During the quiet of the early morning St. James' Church made a beautiful setting for this very impressive Service. Delegates from 35 Dioceses responded to the first roll-call and the attendance at all of the meetings was augmented by many interested friends and visitors. Questions of importance were discussed and decided on at the first days' conference and various committees appointed—your Director being named Chairman of the Findings Committee on Libraries. On Tuesday evening we had a public meeting with four outstanding speakers. The first speaker, Bishop Jenkins, of Nevada, whom it is always a joy to hear, told of the many and various ways in which the C. P. C. was helping. He stressed the importance of Church Papers and the fact that after becoming used to reading them his people often are ready to become subscribers. From another part of the world came Canon Bridgman, of St. George's Cathedral, Jerusalem, to tell us what the C. P. C. meant to the students enrolled in the Armenian Seminary and expressed much gratitude and appreciation for the gift of one thousand books sent to complete the English section of the Seminary Library. Bishop Reifsnider from Japan gave us a word picture of St. Paul's Library and asked that we continue our help for three years more, then he expected that the endowment from the Japanese Government would carry them on. He told what the Library meant to the students and how its excellence had encouraged a grant from the Imperial Government. He called our attention to the fact that, for the first time, an **American** Priest has been added to the Faculty of the Central Theological College in Japan. Last, but not least, Bishop Matthews, our host, testified to the co-operation of the C. P. C. with the Social Service Commission in his own Diocese of New Jersey. Next day we were privileged to hear Deaconess Bedell now at work among the Seminole Indians in the Everglades of Florida. Having completed fifteen years in Alaska and before that ten years in Oklahoma she recalled

the friendly help that had been hers in all those years. Miss Louise Starr, doing student work in the University of Georgia, told what good books meant to the students in their homesickness—far from home for the first time. Miss Lillie Hill, doing evangelistic work in the Appalachian Mountains testified for the receiving line. The Rev. Val. Sessious told of the Libraries started in his many missions in Mississippi saying that the children having access to the church Libraries rated the highest in their school work of any in the district—a very good reason why we should continue our support. One other very interesting speaker was the Rev. William Weston of the Seamen's Church Institute of America who told of the needs for the seventeen reading rooms under his care. Two hundred and fifty thousand magazines and one hundred thousand books are needed yearly—the National Geographic being the seamen's first choice with Collier's and Literary Digest taking second place. It was rather surprising to hear of the high type of reading matter chosen by the seamen. Favorable action was taken at a meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary to have C. P. C. representation on their National Executive Board and our elected representative—Mrs. James Keeley, of the Diocese of Newark, sat with the Board for the first time at the Dinner Meeting on Friday, October 19, 1934. My report would not be complete without mention of our National President—Mrs. Otto Heinigke, of the Diocese of Long Island, a very active woman, eighty-three years of age, who at the Woman's Auxiliary Meeting on Thursday, St. Luke's Day, was paid a high tribute for fifty years of devoted and active service in the Church. I quote Miss Matthews in her introductory speech—"We are proud to honor Mrs. Otto Heinigke not only for the remarkable record of glorious achievements of the past fifty years, and her present responsibilities which she carries so nobly, but because of her purity of spirit and steadfast faith. She has held the torch of high endeavor before us through her work for the Church, her country and the world, and has won the deep love and esteem of countless numbers of people through the persuasive power of her sweet and gentle nature, shown forth in her unflinching patience and unselfish thoughts of others. Truly our hearts thrill with the privilege of doing homage to 'Christ's faithful soldier and servant,' Mrs. Heinigke." The women rose en-masse as this tribute was paid. Your Director made many pleasant contacts with recipients both in the home missions and in those abroad who are receiving literature from this Diocese and estimates the outlay expended in attending the General Convention as a guaranteed investment which will bear a high rate of interest in the future and for all time.
