**CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS**  
**WOMAN'S AUXILIARY OF**  
**THE DIOCESE OF HARRISBURG**



Revised and Adopted November 16, 1932

**CONSTITUTION**

**ARTICLE I**

**NAME**

The name of the Association shall be the Harrisburg Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council of the Episcopal Church in the United States of America.

**ARTICLE II**

**OBJECT**

The object of this Association shall be to carry out within the Diocese of Harrisburg the purposes and work of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council, with special emphasis on its missionary activities.

**ARTICLE III**

**MEMBERSHIP**

The membership of the Harrisburg Branch shall be composed of the Parish Branches of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of Harrisburg.

**ARTICLE IV**

**OFFICERS**

Section 1. The officers of the Harrisburg Branch shall be the Bishop of Harrisburg ex-officio, a President, a Vice-President at large, four Vice-Presidents (one from each Archdeaconry), a Secretary, a Treasurer, and a United Thank Offering Custodian.

Section 2. All officers, with the exception of the Vice Presidents, shall be elected at the Annual Meeting by ballot of the member branches. These officers shall serve for three years, with the privilege of re-election for another term of three years. They shall not be eligible to serve a third term in the same office. This limitation of officers shall not apply to the Treasurer. Vacancies occurring among the officers during their term of office shall, until the next Annual Meeting, be filled by vote of the Executive Committee.

Section 3. Each Archdeaconry shall elect (from the three names previously nominated by the Diocesan President) its own Archdeaconry Vice-President at the spring meeting following the election of President. She may succeed herself for a second term.

**ARTICLE V**

**CONSTITUTION**

The officers, together with the Educational Secretary, the Supply Secretary, the Chairman of the Junior Women, the Diocesan President of the Girls' Friendly Society, the Church Periodical Director, and the Prayer-partner Secretary, shall constitute the Executive Committee.



## **ARTICLE VI MEETINGS**

Section 1. The annual meeting for the election of officers and other business shall be held the Third Tuesday and Wednesday in November.

Section 2. Special meetings may be called by the Executive Committee at any time. At special meetings only such business as is specified shall be considered.

## **AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION**

This Constitution may be amended at any annual meeting by a two-thirds vote of the member branches, provided that notice of such proposed amendment shall have been sent to each branch president thirty days before said meeting.

## **BY-LAWS**

### **ARTICLE I**

#### **DUTIES OF OFFICERS**

Section 1. The President shall call all meetings of the Association and of the Executive Board and preside at the same. She shall appoint and fill vacancies in all committees not otherwise provided for in the By-Laws, and shall be a member ex-officio of all committees except the Nominating Committee. She shall direct the editing of the annual report.

Section 2. The Vice-Presidents shall represent the following archdeaconries:

- I. Vice-President of Altoona Archdeaconry,
- II. Vice-President of Harrisburg Archdeaconry,
- III. Vice-President of Wellsboro Archdeaconry.
- IV. Vice-President of Williamsport Archdeaconry,

The Vice-Presidents shall encourage the organization of new branches in their respective districts, visit the member branches and supervise their work. Each Vice-President shall prepare and submit a report at each annual meeting, and shall conduct at least one meeting a year in her respective archdeaconry.

Section 3. The Secretary shall make and keep, in permanent form, a record of the proceedings of the Auxiliary and of the Executive Committee. She shall prepare and submit a report at each annual meeting, assist in compiling the annual report and send out all notices.

Section 4. The Treasurer shall receive and transmit all monies (except the United Thank Offering) due the organization, and shall pay all properly approved bills and present her audited report at the annual meeting.

Section 5. The United Thank Offering Custodian shall be elected at the annual meeting immediately following the Triennial Meeting. She shall endeavor to increase and deepen interest in the United Thank Offering by sending out literature pertaining to same, and shall receive and transmit to Church Missions House all the United Thank Offering monies and make a yearly report.

Section 6. The Educational Secretary shall have general supervision of all missionary educational work undertaken by the Woman's Auxiliary and shall prepare herself for the training of parish leaders of study classes.



## ARTICLE II

### NOMINATIONS and ELECTIONS

Section 1. A Nominating Committee consisting of one member from each Archdeaconry shall be appointed by the President one month before the annual meeting.

Section 2. Each member branch shall be entitled to two votes and an additional vote for each ten members or fraction thereof. Elections shall be by ballot; the newly elected officers to assume office at the close of the meeting at which they are elected.

Section 3. Delegates to the Triennial Meeting of the General Auxiliary shall be the President and four women from the membership of the Auxiliary, and five alternates from the same to be elected by ballot.

Section 4. There shall be two delegates and three alternates to the Provincial Synod Meeting, elected by ballot from this Association. The president, a delegate by virtue of her office.

Section 5. An expense fund for all necessary expenses shall be provided by this Association.

Rule 1. Twenty per cent. of the total amount pledged for the Expense Fund shall be set aside for a Sinking Fund to be used at the direction of the Executive Board. All requisitions shall be signed by the President.

Rule 2. At the annual meeting, the hostess branch shall entertain, over night, members of the Executive Board, speakers on the program and two delegates from each branch. Where more delegates register from any branch they shall pay for their own entertainment.

Rule 3. Each branch shall be assessed, in addition to other moneys contributed, the sum of three dollars per year, to be used by the hostess branch to defray the expenses of the Annual Meeting; this fund to be known as the "Annual Meeting Fund."

## 1935 MINUTES



### MINUTES OF THE THIRTIETH ANNUAL MEETING OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY, DIOCESE OF HARRISBURG

The thirtieth Annual meeting of the Harrisburg Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary was held in Trinity House, Williamsport, Pa., Tuesday and Wednesday, November 19th and 20th, 1935.

Tuesday afternoon, the Rev. Stuart Gast of St. Paul's, Bloomsburg, conducted the Quiet Hour. His meditations were based on this sentence, "And there was no room for them in the Inn 1900 years ago, would there be today in 1935?" He emphasized the need for silence and meditation.

Dinner was served the delegates at the Y. W. C. A.

Bishop Brown and the Rev. C. Rankin Barnes, Executive Secretary of Christian Social Service of the National Council, were the speakers at the evening mass meeting. Bishop Brown said in introducing Dr. Barnes, "that every sermon about Christ is a missionary sermon. The man who does not believe in missions cares only for himself and his own desires. When he has found his Saviour through surrender, the miracle is performed and he believes in missions." Dr. Barnes took for his topic "Today's Social Crisis Challenges the Church," stressing three points. First, the Church must clarify Christian responsibility for social righteousness. Secondly, the Church must improve the standards of her own social work. Thirdly, the Church must demonstrate Christian citizenship.

An informal Social Hour was held in Trinity House after the mass meeting. Refreshments were served.

Wednesday's session opened with a Corporate Communion, the Celebrant being Bishop Brown, assisted by the Rev. J. Moulton Thomas.

Breakfast was served the delegates in Trinity House.

The business session opened with the singing of a hymn, after which Mrs. E. H. Armsby, Section B, Trinity Branch, welcomed the delegates and members.

Mrs. Edward M. Fleming, Diocesan President, gave her Annual Message telling of the work as planned at the Triennial which was held in Atlantic City in October.

The President thanked Trinity for having the Annual Meeting. The Parish which had intended to entertain the Annual Meeting found it necessary to ask to be relieved from entertaining on account of an unexpected emergency.

Reports of the Treasurer and U. T. O. Custodian were read. A motion was made by Mrs. Gortner, seconded by Mrs. Johnston, to accept the reports. Motion carried.

The reports of the Educational Secretary, Mrs. McCutchen, and of the Jr. Women Chairman, Mrs. Daley, were read and accepted.

Mrs. Beverly Ober, member of the National Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary, was the speaker of the morning. Mrs. Ober, an inspired speaker, spoke on the meaning of missions.

Dr. Barnes was the next speaker and took as his subject, "The Church's New Approach to Marriage."

Mrs. W. T. Betts, Lock Haven, Pa., spoke for the Girls' Friendly Society giving her experiences as a G. F. S. leader, telling what the G. F. S. meant in the life of the Community in which she lives.



The reports of the C. P. C. Director, Mrs. Rote, the Supply Secretary, Mrs. Johnston, Prayer Partner Secretary, Mrs. Crawford, and Social Service Secretary were read and accepted.

The noon-day devotions were led by the Rev. Squire Schofield, of Muncy.

The nominating Chairman, Mrs. Burkett, Altoona, read nominations for Vice President-at-large and delegates and alternates to the Province meeting.

The following tellers were appointed: Mrs. Tyndell, Mrs. Lose, Mrs. Vaughn, Miss McMillan, Miss Evans. The Ballots were distributed after the roll call.

Luncheon was served in Trinity House.

A picture of the group was taken in front of Trinity House.

The Chairman of the nominating committee announced the election as follows: Vice President-at-large, Mrs. H. G. Hartman, Lancaster, Pa.; Senior Delegate, Mrs. E. H. Armsby, Williamsport; Junior Delegate, Mrs. Frederic Witmer; Alternates, Mrs. Wyatt Brown, Harrisburg; Mrs. J. N. Crawford, Columbia, Pa.; Mrs. Francis Daley, Altoona, Pa.

The proposed Amendments to the Constitution were read, also articles of the Constitution to be amended.

The proposed amendments are as follows:

#### ARTICLE V CONSTITUTION

The officers, together with the Educational Secretary, the Supply Secretary, the Chairman of the Junior Women, the Diocesan President of the Girls' Friendly Society, the Church Periodical Director, and the Prayer-partner Secretary, shall constitute the Executive Committee.

#### ARTICLE I BY-LAWS

Section 2 No. 3. Wellsboro instead of Northern. To concur with the adoption of the Amendment to Canon XII Sec. 2 paragraph 5 by Diocesan Convention 1935.

#### ARTICLE II BY-LAWS

Section 5 Rule 3. Each branch shall be assessed, in addition to other moneys contributed, the sum of three dollars per year, to be used by the hostess branch to defray the expenses of the Annual Meeting; this fund to be known as the "Annual Meeting Fund."

A motion to adopt the proposed Amendment, Art. 5 Constitution was made by Mrs. Allan Scott, seconded by Mrs. Margaret McFall. Motion carried. No discussion.

A motion was made to adopt the proposed Amendment Art. 1 By-laws was made by Mrs. Van Horne, seconded by Mrs. H. Y. Otto. Motion carried.

A motion was made to adopt the proposed Amendment Art. II By-Laws Section 5 Rule 3 by Mrs. M. McFall, seconded by Mrs. W. Brown. Motion carried.

Mrs. Wyatt Brown extended an invitation to the Diocesan Auxiliary to hold the 1936 Annual Meeting in St. Stephen's, Harrisburg.

Mrs. Wyatt Brown, Devotional Chairman, reported the work of the Committee and gave suggestions for reading and prayers.

The Spirit of Missions Representative gave a report asking for greater co-operation.

The Vice Presidents gave the highlights of the work in their Arch-deaconries. Mrs. Peck, Wellsboro; Mrs. Bodine, Altoona; Mrs. Graeff, Harrisburg, and Mrs. Gortner, Williamsport.



At 2:30 P. M. Tuesday the meeting was opened with prayer by Bishop Brown. The Roll Call showed that nearly all of the delegates had arrived in time for the first session, all parts of the Diocese were well represented. Mrs. Wyatt Brown welcomed the assembly for Mrs. McCreath who was unable to be present at that time.

Bishop Brown and Mrs. Brown extended the hospitality of their home to the delegates and members, inviting everyone to tea Wednesday afternoon at three o'clock.

The Diocesan President, Mrs. Edward M. Fleming, presided at the session.

The Vice Presidents were given first place on the program, reporting the work as carried out in each Archdeaconry. Vice Presidents reporting: Mrs. A. W. Bodine, Altoona A. D., Mrs. George Graeff, Harrisburg A. D., Mrs. J. M. Peck, Wellsboro A. D., and Mrs. John Gortner, Williamsport A. D.

The Educational Secretary, Mrs. McCutchen, outlined the Study Course for the year, stressing the benefits derived from attendance at the Conferences and reported increased interest in the Educational Work of the Auxiliary.

### MINUTES OF THE THIRTY-SECOND ANNUAL MEETING OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY, DIOCESE OF HARRISBURG

The Thirty-second Annual meeting of the Harrisburg Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary was held in St. John's Church, Carlisle, Pa., Tuesday and Wednesday, November 16th and 17th, 1937.

The business meeting, beginning Tuesday at 2:30 P. M., was opened with prayers by the President. Miss Elizabeth McMillan welcomed the delegates and members to Carlisle.

The President called for Officers' Reports, the following officers reporting: Treasurer, U. T. O. Custodian, Educational Secretary, Box Supply Secretary, C. P. C. Director, Prayer Partner, Girls' Friendly, Junior Woman's Auxiliary Chairman. The Treasurer's report and the U. T. O. Custodian's report will be in the printed report. The reports showed greater interest in the branches and real progress is being made.

Miss Gladys Spencer, of the Diocese of Harrisburg, who is an evangelistic worker in Aomori, Japan, was introduced by Mrs. Fleming.

The new Vice Presidents, Harry Fernau, Altoona, A. D., and Mrs. Andrew Rhoades, Williamsport, A. D., were introduced.

Triennial reports were given by Mrs. George Graff, Mrs. Wyatt Brown, Mrs. Howard Fry and Miss Julia Smith for Miss Katherine Comstock. The theme of the reports was Fellowship in Faith and Work.

The Rev. Gordon B. Wadhams, Rector of the Church of the Resurrection, New York City, conducted the Quiet Hour.

The officers, delegates and visitors were entertained at dinner at the Carlisle Country Club.

The Rev. Harry D. Viets of St. John's Church welcomed the Auxiliary at the opening of the Missionary Mass Meeting.

The speakers at the Mass Meeting were the Rt. Rev. D. T. Huntington, D.D., Bishop of Anking, China. The Rev. Vine DeLoria, South Dakota; Miss Anna Groff, Diocese of Harrisburg, Nurse St. Luke's Hospital, Shanghai, China. We were glad to have a greeting from our own Bishop, Wyatt Brown. Miss Caroline Gillespie, Rosborough House, Western North Carolina, was to have been a speaker but was unable to attend on account of illness. At a later time on the program the Rev. A. G. W. Pfaffko read a letter from Miss Gillespie.

Wednesday began with a Corporate Communion. The Celebrant was the Rt. Rev. Wyatt Brown. The Business Session was opened with prayer. Mrs. Edward W. Fleming, Diocesan President, gave her message using the theme of the Triennial Fellowship in Faith and Work, stressing the idea of going forward along modern lines of thought in carrying out the ideal of fellowship in faith and work.

The program from this point was conducted on the Conference plan, the delegates were divided into three groups meeting in turn each of the three missionary speakers, Bishop Huntington, the Rev. Vine DeLoria and Miss Anna Groff.

After the conferences during the singing of a hymn the offering was taken.

The Chairman of the Nominating Committee, Mrs. C. J. Langdon, presented the names of the nominees for Secretary, Treasurer, U. T. O. Custodian, two delegates, and three alternates to the Province Meeting.



The following tellers were appointed: Mrs. Dunkel, Mrs. Means, Mrs. Yost, Mrs. Prescott. The tellers distributed the ballots after the Roll Call.

The Rev. A. G. W. Pfaffko led the noon-day devotions.

Mrs. Harry G. Hartman explained the Self Denial Offering, its origin and purpose, and the reason for not having the offering in 1938. Mrs. Hartman explained the new pledge, which will be for the Negro work in the diocese. Bishop Brown told of the Negro work in the Diocese.

Luncheon was served at a hotel near the Church. The afternoon session was opened with the singing of Hymn 493, after which the result of the election was announced. Miss Albertine S. Batzle, Secretary; Mrs. Francis D. Daley, Treasurer; Mrs. W. Lowry Mann, U. T. O. Custodian; Mrs. Robert McCutchen, Mrs. Stuart Gast, delegates to the Province Meeting; Mrs. Ralph D. Noe, Mrs. Wyatt Brown, Mrs. D. W. Beckley, alternates to the Province Meeting.

The Conference plan was continued in the afternoon.

The Resolutions presented by the Resolutions Committee were adopted.

Delegates representing 36 Parishes and Missions, and five Junior Woman's Branches attended the meeting. The offering, after expenses were paid was given to the China Emergency Fund. Total offering \$102.91.

Mrs. Andrew Rhoades extended an invitation to the Diocesan Auxiliary to meet in Christ Church, Williamsport, Pa., in 1938.

After the Benediction by Bishop Brown the meeting adjourned to meet at Christ Church, Williamsport, Pa.

## PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

1937

Once more the time has come for another message, for an evaluation of our work. We must look for both strength and weakness and strive to find methods by which we can do our work more unitedly and more efficiently.

Three years ago when I attended General Convention I thought the height and depth of spiritual privilege had been reached; but the spirit of the recent Triennial and General Convention was more hopeful, more helpful and more inspiring. The feeling of unity and co-operation with each other was very marked. The theme of the Triennial was "Fellowship in Faith and Work" and perhaps I can illustrate the following out of that theme by telling you how the delegations were arranged and how distances were lost sight of in that Fellowship. Directly in front of the Harrisburg delegates was Lexington, Kentucky, to the right were delegates from Liberia, to the left New Hampshire, while Honolulu was slightly in front and Japan to the rear. At a luncheon table where seven persons were seated two were from the diocese of Pennsylvania, two from Minnesota, one from Iowa, I was from Harrisburg, and the seventh was Bishop Binstead of Japan. Loving the Japanese through his close association with them, he presented to us their side of the conflict with China and made us look upon them with, at least, more Christian charity. So much as background.

In Cincinnati as well as in summer conferences the fact again was stressed that the Woman's Auxiliary is Auxiliary to the National Council in every phase of the work of the Church. It is made up of all women united in working together for one great purpose, to extend His Kingdom, to do His work in our parish, our community and our diocese, and we should unite ourselves so as to do it more efficiently—all groups and all guilds in one parish group. This unified parish group may have many committees or chapters—Missions and Church extension, Altar work, Religious education, Choir work, Rector's Aid, Christian Social Service, etc.

This plan may not be put into operation at once, but it is a goal toward which to work, and will surely be a means of interesting more women, for certainly every woman has an interest in some part of the Church's work. Then the program of the Woman's Auxiliary will be the program of the Church, one program beginning in the individual soul and reaching through the world.

The work of the past year has been given to you in the reports of officers, and was well done by those officers. I am thankful to say there has been a fine increase in U. T. O., in Supply work, a very flourishing new branch has been organized on the unified plan at Blue Ridge Summit, more branches, among them Westfield, in Wellsboro Archdeaconry, doing supply work.

The plan of sending delegates to summer conferences using the Archdeaconry collections as means of paying the expenses has brought good results and will be continued next year. I urge you to send someone from your parish next year; we have the Blue Mountain Conference in our diocese, and a very splendid shorter one in Orkney Springs, Virginia, which I had the opportunity of attending.

Whatever of good has been accomplished has been with the aid of the devoted and faithful women of the diocese, and to all of you I extend my love and gratitude. It has been a joy to work with you and through you. I extend my thanks also to the clergy and to the Bishop who have been most kind. Let us go back to our parishes and missions resolving to make this year better than any previous year, each of us to interest some indifferent woman by finding out her inclinations and talents and so enlisting her in the work of the Church.



To come back to the Triennial. We heard much of the World Conferences at Oxford and Edinburgh; how much we find of unity with other churches and denominations, in our land and in foreign lands, agreement in communion, agreement in purpose; and it is significant of that unity that I could find no better way to close this message than with the words of that Japanese Christian, Kagawa.

We ask it for Thy Blessed Name's sake.

For this beautiful prayer we thank a priest of the Diocese and a branch Prayer Partner Secretary.

The Prayer Partnership plan was adopted at the Triennial meeting held in Portland, 1922. It was to give our missionaries the feeling of the supporting strength of the Church at home. Have them know that they are definitely and constantly in our thoughts.

During the year 1936 we had the pleasure of having three of our Prayer Partners visit the Diocese. Late in the winter Miss Annie Park paid a visit to all her Prayer Partners. At the Annual Meeting in November Miss Charlotte Brown told of her work in Nevada and Miss Elizabeth Falck spoke of the work being done at St. Luke's Hospital, Shanghai, China. At this time Miss Brown visited her Prayer Partners.

Last year one branch reported of appointing each month a different woman to write their Prayer Partner. This year several branches reported following this method.

I have requested the women to remember their Prayer Partners in their daily devotions. This is important if we want God's help in the work of the Church thru our missionaries, who know the power of prayer. One Prayer Partner in the foreign field wrote me—"Tell your women how much we do need your prayers out here, for strength of body to do our work, but most of all for inward strength to live and be as God would have us in our daily contacts with others."

Most branches report giving their Prayer Partner personal gifts and some give material aid to the work.

In July, 1936, I made the first report on the Prayer Partnership Plan and the way it functions in our Diocese, to the National Chairman, at her request, as she had to make her first report to the National Council.

I think the work among our younger girls should be carefully nurtured, more Candidate Classes should be formed. It is the "girl in the making" who can be reached and helped and if we will inform ourselves on the psychology of the adolescent girl and get close to her, I am sure we shall be blessed for our work.

Miss Sarah Morrison, editor of the G. F. S. Record, has been granted a leave of absence, it is interesting to know that her travels have taken her to Yangchow to see Florence Moore and St. Faith's School for Girls. The new mission object being the salary of a worker for St. Faith's, Yangchow, China.

There are five active branches and three candidate branches. Due to lack of leadership no new branches were organized in 1935.

At a Diocesan council meeting held at St. John's Parish House, York, Pa., December 18, 1935, there was an election of officers for 1936, Miss Mary Heiges, of York, was elected President succeeding Mrs. J. Charles Heiges.

I know that I shall miss the work very much, my interest will not be diminished because of my departure from the Presidency.

## REPORT OF DIOCESAN EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY



1935-1936-1937

Madam President and Women of the Woman's Auxiliary:

The purpose of Missionary education is to present the need of the world for the life giving power of the Gospel of Christ and the bringing of individuals into harmonious and creative adjustment to God, to man and to life on a Christian basis. This development may be most fully realized by participating in the work and worship of the Church.

Judging from the demands for the addresses, reports and Meditations from the Triennial meeting 1934 and for the program suggestions to help in the follow up, the theme "IF WE BE HIS DISCIPLES" is meeting with a ready response in our Parishes and Missions. The FORWARD MOVEMENT is also stressing DISCIPLESHIP and we are eager to co-operate in every way with the educational plans of this Commission.

The special phase of "Missions in this Age" is LATIN AMERICA. The source book, "THAT OTHER AMERICA," by John A. Mackay, is an analysis of the Latin American situation, treating the relation of the Christian Church to the social and intellectual movements stirring in the countries to the south of us. It is a deeply religious book and deserves wide circulation among men and women of the Church.

Many excellent programs on Latin America were given throughout the Diocese and much worthwhile reading done. In many parishes those who had either lived or traveled in Latin American countries contributed pleasing and worthwhile travel talks. Some costume programs were given with many beautiful specimens of handicraft on display. Here were told the stories of our Churches work, outstanding missionaries, etc. There were plays and pageants—Rector's Book Shelves for Lenten reading—Regional meetings—Archdeaconry meetings—World Day of Prayer—Corporate Communion—Prayer and Meditation on Armistice Day.

I should like to recommend also two study courses for the younger women's groups. "IS WAR THE WAY?" by Lobinger, and "THE GHOST OF CAESER WALKS," by Leiper.

For the Winter of 1936 and '37 we have been given two themes for our study—A Preface to Racial Understanding by Johnson which is the source book for *The Negro in America* and *Consider Africa* by Matthews. Both of these topics are of unusual significance and timeliness. Quoting from *Forward Day by Day*: "Both are fine and we need both. The temptation will be to choose far away Africa. What we greatly need is to understand and live in Christian love with the great race which forms one-tenth of our Nation. The first step is by understanding."

We want in our study to secure facts about the Negro with the hope for a greater sense of understanding and better relationships.

Among the outstanding speakers in the Diocese during 1936 were Bishop Hobson, Dr. Hart, Dr. Glazebrook, Mrs. Beverly Over, Mrs. Harper Sibley, Mr. John Hartman, and Miss Sallie Dean.

As your Educational Secretary, I make the following report for 1937:

I have edited the Woman's Auxiliary column in the Harrisburg Churchman—written over a hundred letters in reply to questions on literature—programs—book sales, etc.; have planned programs for the year for several branches and have sent out an educational letter to each branch.

I addressed the Spring meeting of the Archdeaconry of Altoona on "Mos-



lems in the Southern Philippines." This is the only Mohammedan work under the American flag, having been established by my husband for Bishop Brent.

I attended the meeting of the Harrisburg Archdeaconry and spent several days and evenings at the Blue Mountain Conference. I attended the Shrine Mount Conference at Orkney Springs, Virginia, at which our Diocese was well represented. This is a four days conferencee sponsored by the Woman's Auxiliary of the Third Province.

This conference for Auxiliary women is within the reach, both in length of time and money, of many women who would find it impossible to attend a more expensive and longer conference.

The theme of our study this past winter was "A Preface to Racial Understanding." With this as a text there were study and discussion groups, plays, pageants, program nights with outside speakers—Rector's book shelves with special Lenten reading.

The Missionary Education Movement is offering you two books for your 1937 and 1938 Missionary Theme. The Moslem World by Watson, and The Church in Rural America by Dauber. Either or both of the books mentioned for adults will be useful as background reading for our Church groups. Both are 60c each.

Miss Teague's book "Forward in Rural America," is written from the point of view of our own Church—the other two are interdenominational. This book on Rural America will include not only suggestions for procedure in presenting and discussing the subject but also source material in the form of extracts from many books and pamphlets.

I would suggest that each Woman's Auxiliary branch procure from the Church Missions House, 281 Fourth Ave., New York, a mimeographed copy of the Findings of the 1937 Triennial meeting. This may be had for the asking, and should be incorporated in your winter's program.

On November 22, 1937, under the leadership of the Right Reverend R. E. L. Strider, D.D., Chairman of the Commission on Religious Education of the Third Province, a meeting was held at Saint Mark's Church, Washington, D. C., for the purpose of arranging an Advanced Provincial Conference. The Board was organized and elected Bishop Strider as President; the Very Reverend Wallace E. Rollins, Dean of Virginia Theological Seminary, as Vice-President; the Reverend L. Carter Harrison, as Secretary; the Reverend Nathaniel B. Groton, as Treasurer. The Reverend Malcolm E. Peabody was chosen Chairman of the Program Committee, the Reverend Oliver J. Hart Chairman of the Publicity Committee, the Reverend R. A. Magill Chairman of the Executive Committee. The new Provincial Conference will be held at Sweet Briar, Virginia, July 5 to 15, 1938. This conference will take the place of the Blue Mountain Conference and, in addition, bring in many others from all over the Province.

Your Educational Secretary edits for you a Woman's Auxiliary column in the HARRISBURG CHURCHMAN. Have a representative appointed in your branch whose duty it is to send items to Mrs. R. T. McCutchen, South Mountain, Pa., by the 5th of each month.

Please send your book orders to the Educational Secretary, as by so doing the Diocesan Auxiliary has the benefit of the commission.

Educational information is disseminated each month through the Woman's Auxiliary column in the HARRISBURG CHURCHMAN, please read your column.

## REPORT OF THE CHURCH PERIODICAL CLUB



1937

Once again it becomes my happy privilege to bring you warm greetings from the Church Periodical Club and to offer a condensed report of its activities in this Diocese during the past year, together with some of the highlights of the Convention meetings held recently in Cincinnati, Ohio.

It is encouraging to note that more magazines have been forwarded during the year than heretofore. Not all of them have been sent through the mail, however, but some have been passed on to neighbors and to members of our families or taken to hospitals and other institutions. In doing so, many delightful contacts have been made and reported. This helps to put into action the motto in use since the early days of the C. P. C., namely, "A little time, a little work, a little prayer to go with every gift." The routine business connected with the office has been performed including, several hundred letters written in the interest of the work, renewals taken care of, new subscriptions entered, meetings attended, reports compiled and much miscellaneous work completed.

It is difficult to know just where to begin when reporting on our activities during the Convention. The meetings were numerous and the contacts made were many and varied. Some one said to me, "Your C. P. C. is certainly on the map during this Convention"—and it was!

The three most important events to my mind, were: The Corporate Communion, attended by several hundred persons and followed by a breakfast for the delegates and the invited guests, at which time we were addressed by Miss Lillie Hill, on her evangelistic work in and around Leaksville, N. C.; the Mass Meeting, presided over by Bishop Reinheimer, himself a recipient of the C. P. C. when doing missionary work in the West Indies, and a most delightful Tea, held at the Cincinnati Country Club, where we indulged in pleasant conversation and bid adieu to our associates in the work, as most of us were leaving the next day for our homes.

Our speakers at the Mass Meeting were: Bishop Kroll, of Liberia, who drew a comparison between the work there and that in Haiti, where he formerly served; Captain Conder, of the Church Army, who told of many ways in which the C. P. C. helped him in his work, and Professor Paul B. Rusch, who arose from a sick bed to tell us in a very entertaining way of his work among the young men and boys in Japan. A teacher in St. Paul's School, Tokyo, and head of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew, he praised us for our valuable help in keeping the school library up to government requirements. He told how one book sent by the C. P. C. was the means of converting a whole fishing village of three hundred people to Christianity.

We enjoyed many informal talks, daily, from missionaries and other recipients. Some came to the meetings by invitation, while others dropped in to voice their appreciation of help given them through the years. Canon Bridgeman related in a most interesting way his connection with the Armenian Theological School in Jerusalem, Palestine, and voiced his appreciation for the excellent library in English furnished for that institution. He said that the city is to be divided into three sections—Moslem, Jewish and American, but that only a small area is to remain Christian, although the Christians set the "tone" in the Church School for boys.



For press of time, I will but mention some of the other speakers giving a leading thought from each one—

Deaconess Bedell, at work among the Seminole Indians in the Florida Everglades, spoke of reading matter as a medium of friendly relations resulting in baptism.

Mrs. Demby, wife of Bishop Demby, said: "Reading matter gives the Bishop a chance to help Clergy and Schools in six states."

Miss Ethel Robinson, Puerto Rico, told of the educational benefits received from a memorial library placed in the Peggy Rogan Camp for girls at Ponce.

The Rev. David Clark, Crow Creek Mission, S. D., thanked the C. P. C. for magazines and books used in the Community House by Indians and whites.

Miss Bowden, San Antonio, Texas said, "St. Philip's Junior College owes its accredited standing to the library provided by the C. P. C."

Miss Gifford, Hocking Valley, Ohio, told of the encouragement library supplies give to a mining district where living is drab and hopeless.

Mr. Arthur S. Kean, formerly a teacher in Central China University, now in Carson City, Nev., considers his missionary service a life work. He told us of a small stamp club which he started, giving him contacts all over the world.

The Rev. J. F. Pritchard, a retired priest eighty years old living in Seattle, Wash., has received help from the C. P. C. since 1899. It has helped to make friends for him and for his work. He said that he holds the record as a recipient, having received magazines regularly from Miss Anne Randolph, Chestnut Hill, Pa., since his call to the Field in Montana, forty-eight years ago.

On January 10, 1938, the C. P. C. will celebrate its fiftieth anniversary. Plans are being formulated to suitably observe this event. Our object—the Endowment Fund! Our goal—\$50,000! Our slogan—"Fifty Thousand in Fifty Years!" Each Diocese is to have a share in the celebration and it is hoped that in all parishes there will be a Corporate Communion on Sunday, January 9, and that an entertaining feature celebrating the birthday itself will be held sometime during that week. The Endowment Fund as it is now totals \$47,365 and the offering of \$212.26 given at the Corporate Communion in Cincinnati, will be added to this sum.

Just one week after our return home, we were shocked upon receiving news of the sudden death of Mrs. Otto Heinighe, National President of the C. P. C. for thirty years. Due to her advanced years—eighty-seven—she refused re-election and at the last business meeting an address of appreciation was tendered her and a standing vote passed making her honorary president for life. She conducted the meeting with charm and dignity, endearing herself to all with whom she came in contact. It was the culmination of a life of service in the C. P. C. and the closing act of her earthly service. We are grateful for her gracious leadership and our prayers do follow her in that Heavenly Life. May her soul rest in peace!

I hope that I have succeeded in emphasizing the benefits derived from the personal contacts with those in the Field and the spiritual inspiration and fellowship gained by the exchange of ideas and experiences.

## JUNIOR WOMAN'S AUXILIARY



1935-1937

The number of Junior Woman's Auxiliary branches has varied through these three years, some branches being active for a time, then through lack of leaders or from some other cause, disbanding.

The work grows slowly, partly because of the character of the diocese, the branches being scattered over a large area; and it would seem younger women need the inspiration of occasional meetings with other branches, to exchange ideas, to discuss difficulties, and to have the stimulation of numbers.

Another reason for the slow development of branches is the fact that there are few parishes large enough to have many organizations. However, one encouraging sign of interest in Woman's Auxiliary work on the part of younger women is the growing number of these young women taking part in the work of the Senior Auxiliary. As a suggestion for senior branches a good method for drawing younger women into the larger work of the church is to have them act as secretary or treasurer.

There are now six branches of Junior women in the diocese, with several more in the process of forming. Work along all lines has been done, helping in parish projects, plays, pageants, U. T. O. plays, supply work. U. T. O. has been collected in most cases twice a year. Several women, including the chairman for this year, attended the Junior Woman's Auxiliary conference at Orkney Springs.

In spite of slow growth of branches, it is certain that younger women are taking their part in increasing numbers in the work of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council.
