PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS.

It is a pleasure to be with you all once more at the annual meeting as circumstances have taken me away at this time for the past two years. There is certainly cause for thankfulness when we see how every year gains are made in New Branches, larger membership, enthusiasm, and best of all, in real spiritual results. Women are realizing more and more, the inner satisfaction of belonging to, and serving with a church organization such as ours, where women feel they are taking an active part in Church and Mission work of every description and also are guided to help of a very real spiritual nature. No one who takes part in the Quiet Day service or the Intercession Days set apart by the Church, can help feeling the deepest significance in every aspect of life whether physical or spiritual, nor can one help gaining the positive knowledge that our *Life is of God*, and to be lived at high mark whatever happens.

At our last quarterly meeting in February we had an unusual impetus given to our understanding of prayer, by having Miss Forbes of the S. P. G. in England, speak to us of the Pilgrimage of Prayer as it has been conducted in England. Later she addressed many women in the different missions, and you all probably had the opportunity of hearing her. Numbers of women, both of our Church and other denominations who heard her here at this Memorial Hall, telephoned to me of how deeply she had impressed them by her sincere and vivid words.

As a result of the movement for Prayer in England, our own Church has arranged a pilgrimage of prayer of a different order. Let me quote from dear Miss Emery in her talk to our delegates at the Triennial last October in St. Louis: "We too," she said, "are to have a pilgrimage of prayer, the idea taken from our English friends, the plan our own. With them it means proceeding from place to place making intercessions as they go; with us it means the same petitions arising in place after place, until in the course of our Christian year, intercessions shall have been made from every part of the American Church. For this year we hope to make a new beginning, to pray with better understanding of what prayer is, and with a firmer belief in its power. We plan that one Course of Study shall take Prayer for its subject, and we want to make of the year a pilgrimage that shall fasten our hope *unforgettably* on the minds of all." In connection with this message from Miss Emery, just quoted, I must tell you that St. Andrew's Cathedral Parish branch has been fortunate to have had this study of prayer, of which our Educational Secretary makes a full report. I appeal to *all* the branches throughout the islands to make a great effort to form a class and get the real benefit and inspiration the study of the Rev. Dr. Fosdick's little book conveys.

Miss Emery's spiritual leadership and personal care has been following each Diocese through its week of prayer. It began on the first Sunday in Advent, December 3, 1916, in Maine and New Hampshire. This week it is being held in Fond du Lac and Milwaukee, and the wave of this wonderful movement will reach us October 14, 1917. Let us make it a tidal wave which will carry us high on the shores of *selflessness* and compel us to give all of ourselves to the great spiritual life of the Church, and its great work of Missions.

And now I must speak of our own splendid America, who has been forced to take up the burden of this world war. We will realize more and more what the mother country, England, has had to sacrifice, and now she has risen to her privileges as never before in her history, and especially in giving to Missions. So will we respond, we cannot help it;

we must, we are *impelled* to respond to all the demands made upon us in this time of dire need and suffering. As we have done better this year than ever before, so will we make a point of "Getting Together," as Ian Hay puts it in his admirable little book of that title, and nationally and internationally, intellectually and spiritually, meet and express the supreme duty, fighting the enemy whose triumph would be the defeat of our souls. Let us have no complaining of our lot. Let us be thankful that, since the great trial was to come, we are alive to do our share however great the sacrifice. It is of great significance that this meeting of ours falls this year in Whitsuntide. Let us take for our message today the promise of the week that we have with us always the Holy Spirit, the Spirit of Truth which shall guide and teach us and give us "comfort, Life, and fire of Love."

REPORT OF THE RECORDING SECRETARY.

Since the last annual meeting on May 30th, there have been two large quarterly meetings, the first on Sept. 8, 1916, at the residence of Mrs. von Holt, the second at St. Clement's Parish House Feb. 15, 1917.

The special object of the first was the final collection of the United Offering to be sent forward to the Triennial at St. Louis where we were to be represented by our full quota of delegates, Mrs. L. F. Folsom, Miss Eva M. Stevens, Mrs. John Guild, Miss Marie von Holt and Miss Edith McLeod. The treasurer announced that the amount to date was \$520.00. She also reported the result of the Cherry Blossom Fete \$2,875.45 for the building of a Home for Japanese girls. Miss Drummond gave a report of the work of the Cluett House, requesting help to repair cottages on the ground for the use of Japanese girls until their Home was built. This matter was referred to a committee.

The Branches were reminded that the Diocesan Box Work during Lent was to be for St. Elizabeth's Hospital, Shanghai, and an interesting letter from Mrs. Graves explaining their needs, was read by Mrs. Restarick. Appeals were made for St. Elizabeth's Playground, St. Mary's Chapel, and for two Priory Scholarships.

The United Offering from the fourteen Branches present amounted to \$113.00, making a total of \$633.00.

The President then announced the Corporate Communion to be held in St. Andrew's Cathedral at 11 a. m., on October 12th, the day of the Triennial Offering in St. Louis, and the meeting adjourned.

At the meeting at St. Clement's, an appeal for the Korean work from Bishop Restarick was read and referred to a committee.

The resignation of Miss Julia C. Emery, for forty years the general secretary, was conveyed in a personal letter to the president, which touched a responsive chord in every heart, and a motion was carried unanimously "That the secretary be instructed to write a letter of loving appreciation to Miss Emery and greetings from the Honolulu Branch."

The Committee on Cluett House Repairs reported through Mrs. Folsom the sum of \$304.00 raised and expended for the purpose of preparing rooms for five Japanese girls.

Mission Study Lectures on Latin America were announced for four Mondays in Lent, which the members were urged to attend.

An appeal from the Canadian Church in the Diocese of Calgary was read by Mrs. Restarick, and the envelopes she distributed contained \$19.30 for this object. The regular offering was given to the District Expense Fund,

after which we had the great pleasure of listening to Miss May Forbes of England, representing the S. P. G., on "The Pilgrimage of Prayer," also Mrs. L. F. Folsom on the Triennial Convention at St. Louis, who informed us she had secured \$800.00 in pledges for the Home for Japanese Girls, and that our delegates had pledged our Branch to two objects: St. Agnes School, Kyoto, \$50.00, and Anvik Church, Alaska, \$25.00. This was referred to the Board of Managers to be apportioned by them. The meeting then adjourned to the Rectory, where we were delightfully entertained at tea by Mrs. Osborne and the St. Clement's Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary.

REPORT OF THE CORRESPONDING SECRETARY.

The past year has been a most encouraging and satisfactory one for the Woman's Auxiliary in every respect. The gain in members is 157. In the number of branches there is a gain of 3, St. Luke's Korean, St. Peter's Juniors, and Epiphany Juniors, making 24 branches.

Every branch but three met its apportionment. All but five contributed to the United Offering and there was but one that failed in the District Expense Fund. The Convocation pledges were promptly met and were more generous than the preceding year, and the Specials show a big increase.

In regard to Specials, let me emphasize the rule of all monies being sent to the Diocesan Treasurer (not direct to the Mission helped) by the Parish Treasurer. There have been several irregularities of this kind during the past year, but fewer than heretofore as it is better understood. Also Specials sent to places other than those directly under the Board of Missions cannot be reported through the Board as such. As we are organized as auxiliaries of the Board of Missions we can only report to it assistance given to Missions under its care. For example, scholarships raised here for an English Diocese in China or Japan would be outside of the Board's jurisdiction, therefore we cannot report them through the Board, though they will appear in our own Diocesan reports.

As a substitute for the "Japanese Hostel" the Cluett House took over the care of five Japanese girls the past year, St. Andrew's branch having contributed \$304.00 to fit up cottages in the rear of the Cluett House for that purpose, but the need of the Home is more apparent than ever and it is felt that something must be done the coming year to furnish a home for the Japanese girls by themselves. There is in the fund \$3,063.00 and Mrs. Folsom at the Triennial Convention secured pledges from branches in the States amounting to \$800.00 more, making the total \$3,863.00.

One hundred and nineteen dollars was raised for the equipment of St. Elizabeth's playground and \$65.91 for the playground at St. Mark's, Kapahulu.

I am glad to state that we have gone far beyond our pledges made at the Triennial Convention and are sending to St. Agnes School, Kyoto, \$95.50, and to Anvik, Alaska, \$39.50, total \$135.00, or sixty dollars more than we pledged.

And now as to Box Work. Thirty boxes is the total, not as many as last year, but larger and better ones. The Diocesan box to which almost every branch contributed and which goes to St. Elizabeth's Hospital for women and children, Shanghai, is conservatively valued

at \$268.66. Twenty-nine boxes to our own District were valued at \$135.70, total \$404.36, a gain of \$36.66 over last year.

As we look back over the year we cannot but feel that in spite of the many demands made upon the women of this district to aid the world's sufferers, perhaps because those very demands called out the highest and best in them, we record the best year the Woman's Auxiliary has ever had. Looking forward, larger opportunities spread out before us, so great as to stimulate our efforts to the utmost of our faith and powers.

ANNUAL MEETING, 1917.

The fifteenth annual meeting of the Honolulu Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary held on Tuesday, May 29th, at St. Andrew's Cathedral, Honolulu, was the best in its history.

It opened at 9:30 with a Celebration of the Holy Communion, Bishop Restarick celebrant, assisted by Rev. L. H. Tracy, Rev. Kong Yin Tet and Rev. Paul Tajima, a most helpful sermon being preached by the Rev. M. E. Carver. The morning offering, \$22.55, was given to St. Mark's, Kapahulu, for chancel furnishings. That of the afternoon, \$31.25, to the District Expense Fund.

Organizing for business at 11 a. m. at Davies Memorial Hall with Mrs. H. M. von Holt presiding, 103 delegates from 23 branches responded to roll-call with many visiting members besides in attendance. After a few words of greeting from the Bishop and the appointment by him of the officers for the ensuing year, the president made a most stirring address. The minutes of the last annual meeting were read and approved, followed by the reports of the recording secretary, corresponding secretary, secretary of the Junior Auxiliary, united offering secretary, educational secretary and directress of the altar department. Tabulated reports and the report of the acting treasurer, Mrs. Thos. E. Wall, were distributed in printed form instead of being read.

At noon the Auxiliary prayers for Missions were read. A resolution was passed that inasmuch as the Church Missionary Union had offered to give the Caroline Clark Memorial Altar for St. Mark's Mission, the \$47.00 pledged for that purpose by the Auxiliary be used to provide a silver Communion set suitably inscribed to the memory of Mrs. Caroline Clark and Mrs. Karratti.

At 12:45 adjournment was made to St. Andrew's Priory, where, under the supervision of Miss Emily Ladd, assisted by Mrs. J. F. Melanphy, luncheon was served to about two hundred guests.

Business being resumed at 2 o'clock a motion was carried "that no monies should be pledged until all the needs were presented by the speakers of the afternoon, also that all resolutions and pledges should be written and signed by the delegate making them." The kindly greetings brought by Mrs. Theo. Richards, president of the Woman's Board of Central Union Church, were enthusiastically received. A resolution carried that, since General Davis had made St. Mary's Chapel a Memorial to his wife, doing away with the necessity of the Auxiliary paying interest on \$2,000.00 as voted last year, the \$78.00 collected for that purpose be used towards chancel furnishings for St. Mary's.

By-Law 8 was changed by inserting the words "at least" after District Expense Fund. By-Law 12 was also changed to conform to the new Canon of the General Convention fixing the date of the close of the year at December 31st, instead of April 10th, and the Bishop announced that Convocation would meet the third Tuesday in April, 1918.

The President spoke of the adoption last year of All Saint's Day as the Woman's Auxiliary Day for Corporate Communion in each Parish and Mission and a motion carried that the offerings at that service be devoted to the District Altar Fund, the clergy being requested to coöperate, where practicable, and give notice to this effect.

In accordance with By-Law 7, St. Clement's Branch gave notice of discontinuation in 1918 of their pledge of \$10.00 a month for St. Mary's Mission.

The special work of the District Branch for the Diocese proposed by the Board of Managers was announced as follows: The interest on \$1500 to build a parish house for St. Luke's Korean School, Home for Japanese Girls, Hilo, and Home for Japanese Girls, Honolulu. Foreign work; Hospital at Wuchang, China, and Bishop Kinsolving's work in Brazil; Box Work to be for our own Diocesan Institutions during the war, to wit: Cluett House, Honolulu; Home for Japanese Girls, Hilo; Home for Japanese Girls, Honolulu.

An address by the Rev. M. E. Carver on Latin America giving his experiences in that field covering twenty-five years, was listened to with marked attention. Miss Alice Fyock told of the needs of the Japanese work in and around Hilo, and appealed for a dormitory for girls from the country districts desiring to attend school in Hilo.

Rev. F. N. Cullen set forth his need for a new automobile, also telling of the excellent work and need of a house for the Japanese Catechist, Mr. Seno, at Paauilo.

Chaplain Winter's subject was, "What women can do to help Army Chaplains." He aroused much enthusiasm, the response being \$107.50 and fifty volumes of books for his post library. Mrs. E. C. Perry's admirable paper on the "Immediate Needs of the Korean Work" among women and girls at St. Luke's Mission was read by Miss Marie von Holt, urging the building of a Parish Hall as the most pressing need. The Bishop then announced the ordination of the Rev. John Pakk to take place on Sunday, June 3rd, at St. Elizabeth's Mission, adding that he was the first Korean to be ordained to the priesthood of the American Church. The Rev. Shim Yin Chin spoke through the Rev. Kong Yin Tet as interpreter, thanking the Auxiliary for Prayer Books and Hymnals and appealed for and received \$75.00 for desks for his school at Kula. Mrs. L. F. Folsom made a plea for the Japanese Home for Girls, which is urgently needed in Honolulu.

Pledges by the 23 Branches in response to the appeals of the afternoon amounted \$423.00. The following resolution proposed by Mrs. Restarick passed unanimously: "The Honolulu Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions places itself on record as pledging to support the measures set forth by the Government in the interests of the abolition of the liquor traffic during the war."

The meeting then adjourned for Tea, the Bishop giving the Benediction.

REPORT OF THE SECRETARY OF THE UNITED OFFERING.

The reports this year for the United Offering show an encouraging increase due, we hope, to a better understanding of what the United Offering really means, and probably due in part, to boxes and much literature distributed. As most of you know, the United Offering is a fund raised by women for women; and as it is for self-denying women, whose lives are consecrated to the work of the Master, it should in its highest sense, be raised by the self-denial of women. It takes care of

special missionaries (of course all women) known as United Offering Missionaries, of whom there are at present 205 active workers—126 in the Domestic field, and 76 in Foreign field—as well as 9 retired workers, and 6 in training, who are being helped. When every woman understands that 8 women workers on Bishop Restarick's staff are supported by this great thank offering of the women, does it not bring the subject much nearer to each one of us? Does it not appeal to us as individuals, to know that the work here would be sadly hampered were it not for Miss Van Deerlin and Miss Chung at St. Mary's, Miss Schaeffer and Mrs. Folsom at Holy Trinity, Mrs. Perry, St. Luke's Korean, and Mrs. Searle, Mrs. Kawaihoa and Miss Gaelic Richardson working for the Hawaiian Congregations at the Cathedral, and at St. Mark's, Kapahulu.

During the past year, out of the 24 Branches in this Missionary District, 19 have contributed to this offering, and of those who did not, all I think, have but lately been organized, and have held but few meetings. If you will look in the United Offering column of the tabulated report distributed today, you will find the sums given by each Branch, and the totals of the Juniors, which was \$79.25 plus the totals of the Woman's Branches \$236.30 brings the sum total up to \$338.38 for this year. Of this amount, \$113.10 (which was given before last October) was added to the amount on hand from the previous years, making \$650.00, which was sent to St. Louis as our contribution toward the great Triennial Thank Offering last October, the total offering being the splendid sum of \$353,619.76. This sum of \$650.00 is the largest offering ever sent from this District; three years before at the Convention in New York city our contribution was \$450.55.

It is gratifying to note that there were four Dioceses and 14 Missionary Districts that gave less than Honolulu at the Triennial; Oklahoma giving the same amount that we did, and Wyoming almost as much. Utah comes third, and Diocese of Sacramento, with almost twice as many communicants, is fourth; Shanghai, in the Foreign field, did as well as Utah.

Like everything else worth working for, to make it a success, systematic effort must be put forth, not by the few, but by the many. It is a *United Offering* and one of continual remembrance, and every woman should have her part in it, no matter how small.

A few wealthy women cannot give the thank-offering for the whole parish—that does not reach the ideal of the offering, which calls for the intimate, personal, unknown gifts of self-denial and thankfulness, and from the many. And no sum is too small, for surely the story of the widow's mite should stand for all time as an encouragement to each giver of small sums. In last year's report of the Woman's Auxiliary in these Islands, the total membership was given as 521 women. If each one of these members should drop five cents a week into the little blue box our offering for the year would have been \$1354.60. This shows the wonderful value of the many small contributions. Is it not a great privilege to have a part in such a work as this?

It is hoped that this year in every branch, a United Offering Secretary will be appointed whose duty it shall be to distribute boxes and keep an accurate list of the same, and at the appointed season, to gather up the contents and report the same to me, your Diocesan United Offering secretary, the money to be sent to Mrs. Marx, the Diocesan treasurer. When such an officer is appointed, may I ask that her name and address be sent at once to me, that I may supply her with the boxes and literature, and give her what help is in my power?

And let us always remember the prayer printed on the mite box, which should accompany each small coin as it is dropped into the box—for the splendid band of women to whom we are united by so strong a bond, are looking to us for the help of our prayers as much as our gifts. Let us realize, as Bishop Burleson says: "It is distinctly personal, not the result of a tax, but the heart gratitude of a woman as a thank offering."

REPORT OF THE EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY.

There is a feeling in the educational department that the heaven is working and that a real study of missions is growing—the fruit to be more mission work and more prayer.

Dr. Gray's "New World" and "Mañana" has been used in some Branches.

At St. Andrew's Cathedral, mission study papers were prepared for each monthly meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary, and during Lent Miss Marie von Holt conducted weekly classes on the subject of Prayer.

St. Andrew's Hawaiian Auxiliary reports it was not feasible to take up any special study, and the educational work was confined to articles in the Spirit of Missions.

St. Clement's—The Rev. Mr. Tracy gave lectures on Church History, Liturgies and "The New World," those during Lent being an informal study class.

St. Peter's—The Rev. Mr. Kong gave talks from articles in the Spirit of Missions, The Chinese Churchman, and the Hawaiian Church Chronicle.

St. Elizabeth's—Miss Dran directed a study class on the Old Testament every Sunday morning. The Juniors were instructed in the book "Mañana," by Miss von Holt.

Epiphany—At the sewing meetings during Lent, chapters of "The New World" were read, and these readings will be continued until the book is finished. The Juniors took up the book "Mañana."

Church of the Holy Apostles, Hilo—Miss Fyock, worker for Japanese women in Hilo, very kindly helped in the educational work for the Woman's Auxiliary of the white congregation; they began with four members, but sickness compelled one to withdraw, the three left were teachers who knew the geography and political situation and were able to cover that phase rapidly and discuss its bearings as to the problems of the Church. Like all thinking Christians, they were amazed at the importance of the modern Church and a desire to see the true life once more manifest. The readings were continued after Lent.

St. Augustine's, Kohala—No set classes of missionary study were conducted, but readings from the Spirit of Missions or a letter from a missionary in the field preceded the business at the monthly meetings. Special study was given to the Filipinos, who are a large constituency in the Kohala district.

St. Andrew's Cathedral Juniors took for its text-book, "Mañana," acting out the first chapters and listening to the stories of the others. Review questions were asked and satisfactory answers given by the children. This Branch was also taught the meaning of the Auxiliary and how to write and read reports.

During Lent our Auxiliaries were invited to four interesting lectures on Latin America given by the various Christian ministers in the city of

Honolulu, and the personal experience given by three of the speakers who had lived in Latin-America were particularly enjoyed.

The study book for the Woman's Auxiliary for the coming year is "Missionary Aspects of the Bible," by Bishop Rhinelander, and for the Juniors "St. Peter—the Rock," by Miss Sturgis, and for the older Juniors "The Conquest of the Heavenly City," by Mrs. Cowan.

It is to be urged that each parish provide itself with an Educational Secretary and that plans be made at once and books ordered for the coming year.

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REPORT OF THE JUNIOR BRANCHES.

This year the Junior reports are far ahead of what they have ever been, despite the fact that a second vice-president could not be found, to act as secretary of the Junior department. Such an officer has been greatly needed to supervise all the Junior branches and organize new ones.

As first vice-president I have tried to do what I could and was fortunate to get Miss Marie von Holt to take charge of the newly organized branch at Epiphany and those at St. Elizabeth's also. You will see by their report they are able to give a fine account of themselves.

The Hawaiian Juniors, Section 2, have been merged into the older section, but we are hoping a St. Clement's branch will be organized to make up for the loss of this branch. A Junior branch in every Parish is most important to fit the younger women to take the places of the older ones.

The greatest gain in membership, scope of work and financial showing is in the Cathedral Juniors. They have taken on new life, and Davies Memorial Hall looks like a bee-hive when they meet to work under Mrs. A. G. Smith, Mrs. W. H. Soper and their assistants. These able leaders have patterned their organization according to the new ideas as set forth by the new general secretary, Miss Grace Lindley, at the Church Missions House, N. Y. That they have been most successfully carried out a glance at their report will show and for further proof a visit to one of their meetings will be thoroughly convincing. Their membership is 45, but the intention is to take in the whole Sunday School if leaders can be obtained.

The Hawaiian Juniors, under Mrs. Kroll's splendid leadership, is again the banner branch, having the largest report and double that of last year.

Through Mrs. Restarick's efforts St. Peter's Altar Guild decided to do Junior Auxiliary work a part of the year so that now we have 257 girls working in eleven Junior societies, a gain over last year of 55 members and 2 branches.

In cash totals from all the branches their gifts amount to \$841.76, boxes \$179.90. Total cash and boxes \$1021.66, more than twice as much as last year.

At Davies Memorial Hall on Saturday afternoon, April 28th, owing to Miss von Holt's efforts, we had a little service of blessing for the articles to fill the box for St. Elizabeth's Hospital, Shanghai, 14 branches being represented.

The Juniors were in the large majority, for while the Woman's Auxiliary branches should have been more largely represented they failed to see their opportunity and the Juniors carried the day in numbers and enthusiasm; indeed, the gifts kept coming so thick and fast we had to add an extension to the large table provided.

The jolly time which followed made us realize that our Juniors were coming to the front most beautifully.

With the help of Mrs. R. R. Raymond, who has consented to accept the office of second vice-president, we feel that the coming year will show us even greater things.

CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE I.

This society shall be called, THE HONOLULU BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE BOARD OF MISSIONS.

ARTICLE II.

The object of the society is: By systematic and united effort to diffuse Missionary intelligence, to increase Missionary activity, to promote the study of Missions, and to encourage prayer for Missions among the women of the Missionary District.

ARTICLE III.

The Church itself is the great Missionary Society, therefore all Baptized women in this District who desire it, and who work for Missions in connection with their parochial organizations, shall be regarded as members of this Woman's Auxiliary, but terms of membership in any Parish Branch may be fixed by that Branch.

ARTICLE IV.

All Parish societies of women that so desire, may become branches of this Auxiliary, first obtaining the consent of the Rector or Clergyman in charge, and notifying the President of their intention to work in unison with the Auxiliary.

ARTICLE V.

The officers shall be: A President, a First Vice-President and a Second Vice-President, who shall act as Secretary of the Junior Department. Other vice-presidents may be appointed for such divisions of the Missionary District as the Bishop may counsel. There shall be a Recording Secretary, a Corresponding Secretary, a Treasurer, a Secretary of the Babies' Branch, a Directress of the Altar Department, an Educational Secretary, a Secretary of the Church Periodical Club, and a Secretary of the United Offering. All of these officers shall be appointed by the Bishop at the annual meeting.

ARTICLE VI.

The officers of the District Branch shall constitute a Board of Managers, who shall have general charge of the work under the direction of the Bishop.

ARTICLE VII.

The annual meeting shall be held at the time of the Convocation of the Missionary District, and quarterly meetings on such dates and in such places as the President may appoint.

ARTICLE VIII.

The representatives of five parishes shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE IX.

This constitution may be amended at any annual meeting, by a vote of two-thirds of the parishes or missions represented.

BY-LAWS.

1. The duty of the President shall be to call meetings of the Woman's Auxiliary and Board of Managers, and to preside over the same. It shall be her duty to see that all new officers are informed of their specific duties.

2. The duty of the Recording Secretary shall be to give notice of meetings, to keep a record of proceedings, to prepare an abstract of the minutes for the annual report and if so ordered to issue and distribute, with the assistance of the Corresponding Secretary, the annual report.

3. It shall be the duty of the Corresponding Secretary, under the direction of the President, to correspond with the General Secretary of the Auxiliary and with the various branches of the District, to furnish them with work, to collect their report, to prepare an annual report and to assist the Recording Secretary to issue and distribute the same.

4. The Treasurer shall have the custody of all money received by the District Branch and shall collect, if necessary, all sums payable to the same, in pledges made. She shall pay out money on the order of the President, and Secretary, except such sums as may be received for a definite purpose, which sums she may dispose of without formal direction. All moneys received for purposes outside of the district, shall be forwarded to treasurers empowered to receive the same.

5. The Secretary of the Junior Department, Babies' Branch, Directress of the Altar Department, Educational Secretary, Secretary of the Church Periodical Club, Secretary of the United Offering, shall superintend, foster, and develop by correspondence and otherwise, their several departments on consultation with Diocesan officers.

6. It shall be the duty of the President, or of some person appointed by her, to visit, if possible, the Parochial Branches in order to promote the interest of the work.

7. It shall be the duty of any parish branch before it discontinues a pledge, which has been made for salary or interest, and which continues year by year, to give a year's notice of its purpose at the annual meeting.

8. Each Parish Branch shall pay yearly to the District Expense Fund at least the sum of \$1.00, and Junior branches 50 cents. This will entitle them to seat their delegates and to vote.

9. Each Parish Branch shall pay yearly to the Diocesan Altar Fund at least one dollar from the Woman's Auxiliary and fifty cents from the Junior Auxiliary.

10. Each parochial branch is entitled to five delegates. If it is impracticable to get women as delegates who live in the parish or mission, it is permissible to elect delegates who are resident in Honolulu.

11. The Secretary and Treasurer of each parish branch are to make yearly reports to the Corresponding Secretary and Treasurer of the District Branch, of all work done and money given to Missions inside and outside of the Diocese, and of the value of boxes sent.

12. The year of the Woman's Auxiliary shall end on December 31st of each year, the date on which the Parish and Convocational Year end, and all Auxiliary reports shall be made up to that date.

13. These By-Laws may be altered or amended by a majority vote at each annual meeting.

Branches are asked to consider the pledges and to contribute to them early in the year, thus saving much work and anxiety to the Treasurer, and making it possible to have an earlier report.

Remember her books close this year December 31st and reports will be from May 1, 1917, to December 31, 1917.

Remember the Corporate Communion in every parish on All Saints' Day and the offering that day for the District Altar Fund.

DIRECTIONS FOR PARISH SECRETARIES.

1. Apply to the Corresponding Secretary when your branch is ready to work for a box. She will send you a list of needs of Missions and Missionaries to choose from.

2. When your branch has undertaken the work for which your selected letter calls, notify the Secretary at once, sending her the name and address in such letter, and your own address and parish.

3. Write to the Missionary at once, stating when and from whom he may expect a box.

4. Write to the Missionary as soon as the box has been despatched, also to the District Corresponding Secretary with statement concerning value of box.

5. Blanks will be sent for a report of the year's work. Read them carefully and fill them out fully. Return to the Corresponding Secretary at once. All boxes of books, single books or magazines should be reported through the Church Periodical Club Secretary.

6. Always notify the Corresponding Secretary of the names and addresses of new officers elected, or changes, if any have occurred during the year.

Foreign Missions are those beyond the jurisdiction of the Government of the United States.

Domestic are those within that jurisdiction, which includes Porto Rico, Honolulu, Philippines, Alaska.

Diocesan are those within our own Diocese or District.

ADVICE OF MISS EMERY.

The Missionary box should be valued according to *its value to the receiver*. That is to say, articles should not be valued that are not exactly what the receiver needs, or that are added for the pleasure of the recipient, as, at Christmas, toys and candy for the children. And let us remember that these "boxes are missionary, to help in the effort to spread the Kingdom of Christ throughout the world, and to bear His mark in every particular." Then the missionary boxes will reach their greatest efficiency.
