### EIGHTEENTH ANNUAL MEETING.

The Eighteenth Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Missionary District of Honolulu was held on Tuesday, May 18. As usual, the activities of the day commenced with the Corporate Communion in the Cathedral at 9:30 o'clock, with the Bishop as celebrant, assisted by the Rev. E. Kau and Rev. P. T. Fukao. The offertory at this service was for St. Lioba's School, Wuhu, China, and amounted to \$21.95.

At 10:45 the delegates assembled in Davies Memorial Hall for organization. The meeting was called to order by the President, Mrs. H. M. von Holt. In the absence of the Secretary, Mrs. J. A. Dominis, who is on the mainland, Mrs. W. A. Wall acted as secretary pro tem. The roll call showed an attendance of 57 members from 17 branches. In the afternoon, 42 juniors from 8 branches responded to roll-call, making a total of 99 members from 22 branches. The President gave an interesting address, reviewing the work of the year and speaking particularly of the loss sustained by the resignation of two members—the Treasurer, Mrs. Marx, and the First Vice-President, Mrs. Folsom,—and expressions of appreciation by the President followed. She said:

"It is with great regret that I am obliged to announce the resignation of the Diocesan Treasurer, Mrs. B. L. Marx, who has held this important position for years. The condition of her health made it imperative that she should give up all outside responsibility. As an active officer we are obliged to accept it, however reluctant we may be to give her up. I propose that she be made an Honorary Member of the Board of Managers, that we may not lose her in an advisory capacity.

"It is difficult to express in a few words an adequate appreciation of Mrs. Marx's contribution to the life of the Missionary work of the Auxiliary in this District. Her gracious personality, her intelligent grasp and insight into every problem and her keen interest in the upbuilding of Christ's Kingdom here and everywhere, her generous financial help—all these qualities and many other qualities have made her invaluable as a co-worker, but we know that her interest will not lapse and that she will continue her helpfulness in other ways, and when her strength and health return we shall hope to see her again actively participating in an official capacity.

"We are indeed fortunate in securing as her successor Mrs. Thos. E. Wall, who by years of active and faithful Treasurership in St. Andrew's Branches is well prepared to take up these larger responsibilities as Diocesan Treasurer. Owing to her kind acceptance the work of the present year is going on without a break, and I know I need not bespeak for her the cooperation of every Branch, that her labors may be lightened."

Bishop Restarick spoke of the splendid work done by Mrs. Marx. It was moved by Mrs. Restarick that Mrs. Marx be made an honorary member of the Board of Managers in order that the Auxiliary might still have the benefit of her ability in an advisory capacity. This was seconded by Mrs. Wall and carried by unanimous vote.

Both the President and Bishop Restarick spoke in terms of highest appreciation of the work done by Mrs. Folsom, First Vice-President, our faithful executive who is missed at every turn. She was obliged to resign her office because of her departure from the Islands. The Secretary was instructed to write to Mrs. Folsom, conveying to her the affectionate greetings of the assembly.

The minutes of the last Annual Meeting, held May 27, 1919, were read and approved as read; also minutes of a special meeting held June 13, and the regular quarterly meeting held September 11. Both of these were approved as read. Upon the conclusion of these minutes, Bishop Restarick called attention to the splendid work that is being done in the States by Mrs. Kroll and Mrs. Dominis. They are constantly being called upon to speak at different places and give information about the work in the Islands. The Bishop keeps them well supplied with literature and data of various kinds.

While the minutes were being read, printed copies of the Treasurer's report were distributed to each person present, thus doing away with the necessity of reading this lengthy report. Mrs. von Holt called attention to the fact that reports from the different branches must be in early, so that the Treasurer could close her books by the end of the year.

Mrs. Restarick, Corresponding Secretary, gave a detailed report of Auxiliary work during the year, which showed an encouraging gain over previous years.

Bishop Restarick reported that the property on Beretania Street, which will open up the Cathedral entrance, is soon to be sold at auction, the upset price being \$60,000. While this seems a great deal of money, every person he has consulted about the matter is heartily in favor of the purchase of this property by the Board of Directors, as it is felt that it will be a civic as well as a permanent Church improvement. He asked for an expression of opinion from the Auxiliary. In response it was moved by Mrs. Robbins B. Anderson, seconded by Mrs. Alex. Lindsay, that the Woman's Auxiliary heartily endorse this action of the Board of Directors in taking steps to purchase the property on Beretania Street. This was carried by unanimous vote. At 12 o'clock all business was suspended for a short interval, while the noon-tide Mission prayers were read by the President. Mrs. Black then reported on the Little Helpers. She said that this was a particularly opportune time to talk about this department of the work, as it was because of the noon prayers that the Little Helpers were started. The founder, Miss Mary Elizabeth Hart, died on August 1, 1918, and steps are being taken to have a memorial in her honor. Mrs. Black announced that the Little Helpers were to have a party in the Parish House on Thursday, June 10, at 4 o'clock, at which time the boxes would be collected. It was moved by Mrs. Restarick that the afternoon collection be given to the Mary E. Hart Memorial. This was seconded by Mrs. Anderson and carried by unanimous vote.

Attention was called to the presence of two visitors who are officers in their respective dioceses on the mainland—Mrs. Chas. Gillette of Tampa, Florida, and Miss Murphy of Bath, Me. These visiting members were cordially greeted by the President.

In the absence of Miss Gillet, Secretary, the United Thank Offering report was read by the President. This report showed the total amount sent to the Triennial Convention to have been \$940.36. It was a disappointment not to reach the thousand-dollar mark, but this is \$300 more than any previous offering sent, which was encouraging. The amount on hand December 31 was \$69.25.

The President also read a report of the Cluett House, which showed everything going smoothly. Including the manager, there are 34 persons living in the house, and 10 more come in for meals. In spite of increased living expenses, the end of each month has found all bills paid and a balance on hand.

In December, 1919, the Cluett House Committee sent out to different friends an appeal for help to pay off part of the remaining \$10,000.00

for the land occupied by the Cluett House Annex, known as the Cleghorn property. Responses have brought in \$1,195.45 to date, making the debt stand now at \$8,804.55, which the Woman's Auxiliary still pledges to help pay interest on. We trust by another year to be able to cancel the debt.

Mrs. Howard Clarke, the new Secretary of the Church Periodical Club, was introduced, and read a most interesting report of the Club, which showed that during the past year there were 130 calls for magazines, and only 62 could be supplied, 32 of these coming from the Church Periodical Club of New York. It was suggested that money should be given Mrs. Clarke, so that she could buy the magazines needed, \$50.00 being mentioned as the amount needed to start with.

At 12:30 o'clock the meeting adjourned to the Priory, where prettily-decorated tables were in readiness for the basket luncheon.

At 1:30 o'clock the meeting was again called to order and a report of the Altar Department was read by Mrs. Restarick, who stated that all the 22 Branches except one had contributed. This report called attention to the increased cost of all linens, stoles, etc., but that all requests for vestments had been met during the year. The amount on hand January 1 was \$79.80.

Following this the report of the Educational Secretary was read by the President, as Mrs. Harrison is on her way to the mainland to enjoy a much-needed rest. The report stated that two Parishes had study classes during the Lenten sewing meetings, while St. Andrew's Branch, under the leadership of Mrs. von Holt, had held an eight weeks class which proved very profitable. Mrs. Baird gave a most interesting review of the book "Neighbors," which was used during Lent for the study classes.

Mrs. Theodore Richards, President of the Woman's Board of Central Union Church, brought greetings from this neighbor organization. After expressing the pleasure it always gave her to be present on Auxiliary Day, Mrs. Richards gave a very earnest talk upon the subject of Church Unity. She said the hopes of the world today, after the stress of years of war, is a United Christian Church, with one aim—united effort against evil, unrest, and sin. When we can show our churches united to carry the message that has been given us, then can we say of them, "The Lord is there." Mrs. Richards invited the members of the Auxiliary to attend the Annual Meeting of the Woman's Board on Tuesday, June 1st. Mrs. von Holt said that the last year had shown real progress toward this unity that is so much to be desired. She told of the wonderful Day of Prayer for World-Wide Missions that had been held in the Cathedral at the beginning of Lent, which had been attended by women from all the churches in the city. Between 350 and 400 persons were present, and the services had been most inspiring. The President gave notice of classes in Social Service which are to be started in June, under the leadership of Mrs. Arthur Withington, forty-seven having already been enrolled for these classes.

Mrs. von Holt explained the Reorganized Woman's Auxiliary, illustrating her talk by a blackboard chart, showing a large circle enclosing eight smaller ones, which represented the different departments which should be formed in each parish and mission. At present we have only three circles (or units)—Guilds, Auxiliaries, and Church Periodical Club. Later we hope to add the Girls' Friendly and various other departments which the circles represent.

At the Bishop's suggestion, Mr. Walker of Kohala was asked to read a paper which had been read at one of the Convocation sessions, on the Re-paganizing of Hawaii. This proved to be the most stirring event of the day. Mr. Walker told in an eloquent manner of the need of more church workers, unless we are to become re-paganized by the foreigners in our midst. This paper aroused so much enthusiasm that Mr. Walker was immediately voted \$100.00 for his work.

Attention was called to the following items on the blackboard, giving the needs for the year 1920, which totaled \$1,840.00:

It was moved by Mrs. Wall, seconded by Mrs. Tenney Peck, and carried unanimously, that \$50.00 for the Church Periodical Club should be added to the list. \$800.00 was pledged during the afternoon, leaving \$1,040.00 more to be raised by December 31.

Sister Olivia told the Auxiliary about St. Lioba's School in Wuhu, China. This work was started in 1914 by Sister Edith, who took a few girls into her own home. Later three sisters joined her and they plan to build a dormitory large enough to accommodate 40 girls. It is hoped that the work can be carried on in the same way as at St. Andrew's Priory.

Miss Josephine Pierce gave an account of the Valle Crucis School in North Carolina. One of the buildings was burned last June owing to faulty wiring. In these schools the pupils learn to cook, sew, read, etc., and are thus made capable and efficient.

Miss Ledbetter requested that her paper on the Girls' Friendly Society be omitted, as the subject had been so well covered by Miss Gillet at the recent nation-wide campaign meeting. Miss Gillet and Mrs. R. S. Smith have pledged themselves to organize a branch of this society in the autumn.

Mrs. Restarick read a report of the Junior Auxiliaries, there being ten branches in all. She said the past year had shown a falling off in the work, and that it was difficult to hold the interest of young girls, as we have so few women who have the gift of leadership. She hoped that Mrs. Arthur G. Smith would bring from the mainland some new ideas and enthusiasm for the young girls' work.

Mrs. Black reported that at Kapahulu she had a very promising troop of Girl Scouts—the only Episcopal Girl Scouts in the city,—and that under Miss Hilda von Holt's direction a play would soon be given to enable them to buy necessary equipment.

Mr. Kieb called attention to the fact that Ezra Crane, the Boy Scout chosen to represent Hawaii at the big Convention to be held in London, is a communicant at Epiphany Church.

The President announced that it had been found necessary to cancel the play that was to have been given Friday evening, as it could not very well be given in the Cathedral, and it needed the church surroundings to make it effective.

The afternoon offering for the Mary E. Hart Memorial amounted to \$32.12.

After benediction by Bishop Restarick, the meeting adjourned.

**EXTRACTS FROM THE REPORT OF THE CORRESPONDING  
SECRETARY.**

Although my report is supposed to begin on January 1st, 1919, we can scarcely be said to have made a beginning until the month preceding Lent, when it was discovered that we could not wait until Convocation in May to get instructions as to our Lenten box work and as to what objects we should be asked to make pledges for 1919. The President of the Board of Managers therefore called a meeting and the objects were selected. Each Branch was notified, but by May it was evident that unless greater efforts were put forward at Convocation, the sums asked for would not be raised. So it was that the blackboard was effectively used at our Annual Meeting.

This year two new objects are presented, one in the Foreign and one in the Domestic field. St. Lioba's School, Wuhu, under the Sisters of the Transfiguration is not altogether new, but it asks for aid. St. Andrew's Junior Auxiliary supports a slave girl who attends this school and last year at a Diocesan meeting at which Sister Edith Constance spoke, an offering was taken up, but not until now have we asked for *definite pledges* from every Branch. The sum on the blackboard is merely nominal, but we hope it will be oversubscribed several hundreds of dollars by the end of the year.

To Valle Crucis, a school for white girls in North Carolina, which was destroyed by fire last year, we hope to give at least \$100.00.

FOREIGN FIELD.

I am delighted to report a great gain in our giving to the Foreign field. In the Treasurer's summary you will find that we gave \$419.20, which is \$226.40 more than the previous year. This is a healthy sign and I hope we shall reach the \$500.00 mark for 1920. For Domestic Missions we gave twice as much as in 1918, and almost a hundred more to General Missions.

Our total cash disbursements were \$1,088.60 more than in 1918.

DOMESTIC FIELD.

If you remember last year our aim for the negro work was to endow St. Agnes Hospital, Raleigh, for one day or \$100. We sent \$100.50, which was an increase of \$40.00 over the previous year.

The Priory Juniors were true to their pledge again for the scholarship they have maintained so many years at St. Mary's-on-the-Mountain, Sewannee, Tenn.

St. Stephen's Hospital, Fort Yukon, Alaska, was remembered by St. Andrew's Branch sending its Lenten self-denial offering for \$120.19.

Thus we have helped three points in the Domestic field and five in the Foreign. Besides we have helped 20 Diocesan objects.

On the whole we have done exceedingly well by comparisons with 1918. Only 4 of the 22 Branches have fallen behind and 18 have exceeded their previous record. The most notable increase is Christ Church, Kona. Its offerings were over 163 per cent more, and St. Andrew's Parish Branch 85 per cent more than the previous year.

If we regard totals as our criterion, then St. Andrew's is the banner Branch, but reckoning per capita, which is fairer, Christ Church is the winner.

When I read in the Living Church recently that the Woman's Auxiliary of the Church of the Redeemer in Chicago, numbering 1,000 communicants, had completed its banner year its offerings for 1919 having been \$1,634.34, representing gifts to 18 different objects, I could not but compare our largest parish, St. Andrew's, Honolulu, with one-half that number of communicants, which gave \$1,066.31 to 20 different objects.

It is only by examining statistics and making comparisons that we can judge of our progression or retrogression or whether we are standing still. I can truly say after careful study that we are going forward every year

and that the past year has been most satisfactory in spite of changes and difficulties in our reorganization, to which it takes time to become adjusted.

I have just completed and sent a list to Miss Lindley giving our needs in this District. She will place this list on file and when the Supply Department is fully organized and established she will make allotments to the Dioceses through the Diocesan Box Secretary—who, in turn, makes the allotments to every parish Branch.

And now a word about the personal touch between the Branches who contribute to a Diocesan Box and the recipient.

I am often told that under the present system no acknowledgment has been received. This is a difficult matter to regulate, especially in the case of a Diocesan Box. Take for example the China box we have just sent. Dr. Taylor will doubtless send an acknowledgment to me, your present box secretary. It is customary elsewhere to read such a letter of thanks at the first quarterly meeting thereafter and I should publish the same in the Church Chronicle. A duplicate letter could be made and sent to each contributing Branch, but that is a good deal of work for the secretary. It is obvious that Dr. Taylor could not be expected to write a letter to all the 20 Branches, individually. In the matter of money gifts to the Foreign and Domestic fields, they must be sent by our Diocesan Treasurer to the Treasurer of the Presiding Bishop and Council and he forwards them to the destination specified. This means delay, of course. Only by the last mail did the notification come to us that the money for St. Lioba's School and the support of a slave girl attending that school, also the money we sent for St. James Hospital, Anking, had been received in New York, although our Treasurer sent these sums early in January.

Even in our own Diocese each Branch cannot expect to receive a personal acknowledgment of its gifts. Let us take the scholarship at Iolani to which we will say every Branch contributes something to make up \$150.00. It would be manifestly impossible for the principal to write a note of thanks to every Branch that contributed.

And now I must speak a word about the packing of a box. In the box shipped last week to China, on each parcel was placed the name of the Branch, the number of articles and their value to the recipient; that is, to the cost of materials was added a nominal sum for the labor. This is only right and just, as we know that materials have one value and finished garments another.

Three lists are made out stating the contents. One is filed by the box secretary, one was sent in the letter to Dr. Taylor, and one was placed in the box. The box was insured, the freight prepaid and the shipping documents forwarded to Dr. Taylor. In order to insure it, the value of the box had to be stated. This was difficult for the box secretary, as few gave her the value of their contributions. I hope that every Branch will bear this in mind next year for whoever is box secretary will need this information.

Next year the new plans will probably be tried out. It is expected that a donation of one dollar from every Auxiliary member in most dioceses will be asked, for sufficient funds to establish a Bureau of Supplies in each Diocese. Like other new methods—they can only be learned by practical experience—and the more I look into them, the more I feel that there has not been so great a revolution of methods as an evolution—a working out gradually from the best economic methods and an elimination of all waste and duplication to a broader and larger conception of Woman's Work and the Church's needs covered by the Woman's Auxiliary.

## REPORT OF THE RECORDING SECRETARY.

A special Diocesan meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary was held on Friday, June 13, 1919, at 3 p. m., in the Davies Memorial Hall, the President, Mrs. H. M. von Holt, presiding.

Dr. John W. Wood, Secretary of the Board of Missions, New York, en route from the Orient to the States, addressed the meeting, as did also Bishop Tucker of Kyoto.

Bishop Restarick introduced them and made an address of welcome, expressing regret that they could not remain over a steamer and visit the different Missions.

Dr. Wood gave an interesting account of the Church's work in China, Japan, and the Philippine Islands. Everywhere he found the native Christians alive to their opportunities and anxious to become self-supporting.

Bishop Tucker expressed his interest in the work being done for Japanese in Hawaii. He had felt the influence in Japan of the spirit which was being awakened in the Japanese who were making their homes in these Islands for a time and who were carrying the spirit of our institutions back with them, thereby breaking down the barriers of racial feeling and overcoming the anti-Christian propaganda of the Buddhist and Shinto religions. Bishop Restarick said the Church in Hawaii felt the importance of its missionary work in relation to that of the Orient, and had many problems to solve in Christianizing Orientals.

The last special Diocesan meeting for 1919 was held at the home of the President on Thursday, September 11, at 3 p. m. Mrs. von Holt read an appeal from Dr. Harry B. Taylor which stated that St. James Hospital, Anking, China, was in debt over \$2,000 Mex., due largely to advance in prices of hospital supplies. A request was made to interest the Chinese in Honolulu in raising money for this debt and to support a bed at \$50 a year.

Mrs. Restarick spoke of the Alice Mackintosh Memorial Bed in this hospital and suggested that Dr. Taylor's appeal provided an opportunity to specialize in the Foreign Field.

Miss Lindley's letter was read, explaining the part that the Woman's Auxiliary would be expected to take in the Nation-Wide Campaign.

The President announced the following names of delegates to the Triennial Convention in October at Detroit: Mrs. Leopold Kroll, Mrs. J. A. Dominis, Mrs. R. R. Raymond, and Mrs. J. A. Tiffany.

She also announced a Corporate Communion and special intercessions on October 9th at 10 a. m. at St. Andrew's Cathedral, on which date the United Offering would be presented in Detroit.

It was resolved that the offering at this Corporate Communion be given to the next Triennial United Offering.

The Educational Secretary was authorized to send to the Church Missions House for more literature for distribution, those being able to do so being asked to contribute their share towards the expenses.

The President read Miss Gillet's report on the United Offering from the last Annual Report.

The final collection for the United Offering was made and the total amount to be presented at the Triennial was announced to be \$940.36. A social hour with the hostess followed.

## REPORT OF THE CHURCH PERIODICAL CLUB.

The Church Periodical Club of the Diocese of Honolulu furnishes periodicals to its clergy and church schools. During the past year there were requests for 130 magazines from 12 clergymen and 9 schools and missions. In response, 16 generous souls in the diocese donated 32 of these magazines; 30 more were supplied by the Church Periodical Club in New York, but rather more than half are still unsupplied.

This terse statement has perhaps reminded you that you have, on your library table, magazines which, when you have read, you might remail to some of the clergy or to some mission school. Remember that a new magazine means more to them in an isolated district than it can possibly mean to you or to me.

One of our clergy from another island wrote: "If you can supply me with the magazine 'Asia' I should like it very much. I need it to a better understanding of my Oriental congregation." Another clergyman wrote: "If I could have the Youths' Companion, I could use it for my eighteen boys." Again, a call came to supply a clergyman with magazines along Americanization lines. All were vital requests, all were urgently needed, and all should have been supplied immediately from a diocesan fund. With your support we hope to establish such a fund the following year. Many dioceses not only take care of their inter-diocesan requests, but send periodicals as well to foreign stations, but we are not yet able to answer our calls at home.

One contributor, who is absent this year, wrote: "Will you kindly renew my subscription for the Youths' Companion? I do sincerely hope that the school is having a full share of wholesome reading matter, for it exerts such a life influence." That is the keynote of our plea to you to share your new magazines and your new books with others to whom good literature is a "life influence." Will not YOU, individually, help to relieve this need? Could not each of you agree to pass on promptly or subscribe for one magazine a year for the Church Periodical Club? Think what that would mean! Every request from any of the clergy, the school or missions could be supplied at once. If the Nation-Wide Campaign has meant anything to you, it has meant that you are going to help the Master's cause wherever you can, and not let any call pass unheeded if you can answer it. Quite humbly and prayerfully we ask you to aid the cause of the Church Periodical Club to render better service within the Diocese.

**REPORT OF THE JUNIOR AUXILIARY FOR THE YEAR ENDING  
DECEMBER 31, 1919.**

We report the same number of Branches this year, ten in all, with a gain of 10 members.

The cash total is \$200.96 less than in 1918 and the cash and box total is \$249.26 less.

I am sorry to report that there has been a falling off in the Junior work as a whole, although St. Andrew's Juniors have greatly increased their total, as have several others.

Owing to the illness of Mrs. Kroll and absence of Mrs. Kroll and Mrs. Dominis, the Hawaiian Juniors have reduced their totals by more than half of the preceding year.

Yet they are still the banner *Junior Branch*. It could not be expected under the circumstances that their previous high record could be kept up. Not only did they always hold the highest record of the Juniors, but for some years their totals exceeded even the largest Woman's Branch in the Diocese, St. Andrew's, to which they must yield the palm this year, for St. Andrew's has almost doubled its total of 1918.

The difficulty everywhere is to get leaders to interest young girls. After all the reasons and excuses given about girls not being able to give the time to it on account of school duties, we know the real reason is that we cannot find women who have the gift of leadership, who know how to interest and train the young in Churchly ways and are willing or able to so sacrifice their own time and pleasure as to give the amount of thought and time required.

If the children are to have a part in Christianizing the world, there must be many men and women willing and ready to lead them. To quote a Junior leader in Massachusetts: "The time has come, thank God, when we are beginning to be ashamed to offer to the children of our Church Schools any less carefully prepared leadership than we demand of their Day School teachers; but this leadership must be largely voluntary, and it looks as though most of the volunteers would have to come from the ranks of the Woman's Auxiliary, and if these leaders must be equipped both with missionary zeal and with the knowledge of how to conduct week-day work, many of them must be willing to enter training classes and prepare for serious work."

As we said last year, the new Junior Plan is to coordinate the Church School and the Junior Auxiliary and that both boys and girls were to be included in the week-day work as well as the Sunday work. Measures were to be taken whereby every boy and girl in the Church might be given a chance to have an active part in every sort of Christian service. The Church School guided by the Board of Religious Education in New York is slowly and steadily moving towards the goal which was set for the Junior Department at the Triennial in St. Louis in 1913 and at Detroit last October.

We here in the Islands have not the opportunities of summer conferences and other summer schools for the study of religious subjects, but we

could bring speakers here to give us a course of lectures on these subjects we are so anxious to learn about, that we may fall in line with the Dioceses on the mainland, especially in this increasingly important matter of the Church School Service League, which is to take the place of the Junior Auxiliary.

#### THE UNITED THANK OFFERING.

The great Thank Offering in Detroit last October was \$468,060.41. From this was deducted the four gifts for buildings of \$5,000 each, the salaries of forty-nine workers were increased and twenty-two new workers were appointed, making a total of 183 women workers that are being supported by this fund. One hundred are in the domestic field and 83 in the foreign field. Sixty-eight are in evangelistic work; 64 in educational; 31 medical; 14 industrial and social center work; 4 are not listed and one is doing secretarial work. Three volunteers are in training and twelve are retired and pensioned. We have 8 United Offering women workers in this Missionary District and hope to have more. Our share of the great offering at Detroit was \$940.36, and we hope to send \$1,000 at least to the next Triennial at Portland, Oregon, in 1922.

#### TAKE NOTICE.

Every Branch should take up an offering twice a year for the United Thank Offering, and May is the month chosen by several. Then again in September. Not only Auxiliary members, but every woman in every parish and mission should be asked to contribute to it, as is done elsewhere. The Secretary of All Saints, Pasadena, writes that she has 30 women to canvass for it in her parish and automobiles promised to take these women to collect the offering in time for Ascension Day, when it is presented on the altar.

This would be a good plan for us to adopt another year in Honolulu. United Offering envelopes are issued in some places for the canvass. May we be able to lay on God's altar in 1922 a worthy offering from many grateful hearts in Hawaii.

## THE MARY E. HART MEMORIAL.

Miss Mary E. Hart's death has been a great loss to the Church at large as well as to Western New York. She has been a remarkable Junior leader, and it was she who founded the Little Helpers. The results of her consecrated life are incalculable, but the importance of it is shown in the efforts being put forth by the Auxiliary as a whole to erect a memorial to her in the mission field.

It is seldom that the Auxiliary as a whole has so honored any of its members. Only twice before has this happened, Mrs. Twing, the first Secretary, and Miss Sallie Stewart, for so many years President of the Virginia Branch, being so remembered.

At the Triennial in Detroit the delegates voted that the memorial should take the form of a School for Navajo Indians at Farmington, N. M., and \$5,000.00 is the sum to be raised for that purpose. Every Branch is asked to contribute something, and I am sure that the Diocese of Western New York, which has so often helped this District generously, would greatly appreciate an offering from us. We here have never been moved as a whole to help the Indian work of New Mexico, and we should have a part in the uplift of that race. Miss Hart was a dear and close friend of Mrs. Folsom's, so that her name and her work are familiar to us.

It has been customary to give the afternoon offering to some Diocesan fund which is in arrears, but this year I move that the offering be given to the Mary E. Hart Memorial Fund.

## CONSTITUTION.

---

### ARTICLE I.

This Society shall be called, THE HONOLULU BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE BOARD OF MISSIONS.

### ARTICLE II.

The object of the Society is: By systematic and united effort to diffuse Missionary intelligence, to increase Missionary activity, to promote the study of Missions, and to encourage prayer for Missions among the women of the Missionary District.

### ARTICLE III.

The Church itself is the great Missionary Society, therefore all Baptized women in this District who desire it, and who work for Missions in connection with their parochial organizations, shall be regarded as members of this Woman's Auxiliary, but terms of membership in any Parish Branch may be fixed by that Branch.

### ARTICLE IV.

All Parish societies of women that so desire, may become branches of this Auxiliary, first obtaining the consent of the Rector or Clergyman in charge, and notifying the President of their intention to work in unison with the Auxiliary.

### ARTICLE V.

The officers shall be: A President, a First Vice-President, and a Second Vice-President, who shall act as Secretary of the Junior Department. Other vice-presidents may be appointed for such divisions of the Missionary District as the Bishop may counsel. There shall be a Recording Secretary, a Corresponding Secretary, a Treasurer, a Secretary of the Babies' Branch, a Directress of the Altar Department, an Educational Secretary, a Secretary of the Church Periodical Club, and a Secretary of the United Offering. All of these officers shall be appointed by the Bishop at the annual meeting.

### ARTICLE VI.

The officers of the District Branch shall constitute a Board of Managers, who shall have general charge of the work under the direction of the Bishop.

### ARTICLE VII.

The annual meeting shall be held at the time of the Convocation of the Missionary District, and quarterly meetings on such dates and in such places as the President may appoint.

### ARTICLE VIII.

The representatives of five parishes shall constitute a quorum.

### ARTICLE IX.

This Constitution may be amended at any annual meeting, by a vote of two-thirds of the parishes or missions represented.

## BY-LAWS.

1. The duty of the President shall be to call meetings of the Woman's Auxiliary and Board of Managers, and to preside over the same. It shall be her duty to see that all new officers are informed of their specific duties.

2. The duty of the Recording Secretary shall be to give notice of meetings, to keep a record of proceedings, to prepare an abstract of the minutes for the annual report, and if so ordered to issue and distribute, with the assistance of the Corresponding Secretary, the annual report.

3. It shall be the duty of the Corresponding Secretary, under the direction of the President, to correspond with the General Secretary of the Auxiliary and with the various branches of the District, to furnish them with work, to collect their report, to prepare an annual report and to assist the Recording Secretary to issue and distribute the same.

4. The Treasurer shall have the custody of all moneys received by the District Branch and shall collect, if necessary, all sums payable to the same, in pledges made. She shall pay out money on the order of the President, and Secretary, except such sums as may be received for a definite purpose, which sums she may dispose of without formal direction. All moneys received for purposes outside of the district, shall be forwarded to treasurers empowered to receive the same.

5. The Secretary of the Junior Department, Little Helpers, Directress of the Altar Department, Educational Secretary, Secretary of the Church Periodical Club, Secretary of the United Thank Offering, shall superintend, foster, and develop by correspondence and otherwise, their several departments on consultation with Diocesan officers.

6. It shall be the duty of the President, or of some person appointed by her, to visit, if possible, the Parochial Branches in order to promote the interest of the work.

7. It shall be the duty of any parish branch before it discontinues a pledge, which has been made for salary or interest, and which continues year by year, to give a year's notice of its purpose at the annual meeting.

8. Each Parish Branch shall pay yearly to the District Expense Fund at least the sum of \$1.00, and Junior branches 75 cents. This will entitle them to seat their delegates and to vote.

9. Each Parish Branch shall pay yearly to the Diocesan Altar Fund at least one dollar from the Woman's Auxiliary and fifty cents from the Junior Auxiliary.

10. Each Parochial Branch is entitled to five delegates. If it is impracticable to get women as delegates who live in the parish or mission, it is permissible to elect delegates who are resident in Honolulu.

11. The Secretary and Treasurer of each parish branch are to make yearly reports to the Corresponding Secretary and Treasurer of the District Branch, of all work done and money given to Missions inside and outside of the Diocese, and of the value of boxes sent.

12. The year of the Woman's Auxiliary shall end on December 31st of each year, the date on which the Parish and Convocational Year ends, and all Auxiliary reports shall be made up to that date.

13. These By-Laws may be altered or amended by a majority vote at each annual meeting.
