**SUMMARY OF MINUTES OF THE TWENTY-FIRST ANNUAL
MEETING, 1923, OF THE HONOLULU BRANCH.**

The twenty-first annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary was held in the Davies Memorial Hall on Tuesday, May 1st, 1923, immediately following the Corporate Communion Service in the Cathedral. The meeting was called to order by the President, and after singing the hymn "Go Forward Christian Soldier" and prayers by Bishop La Mothe, the business of the day began.

Upon a carried motion, it was decided to consider the minutes of last year's meeting as read. The Treasurer's report, which had been printed, was distributed.

Roll call showed eighteen branches represented with a total of 79 Delegates. In the afternoon 21 Juniors responded, making a total of one hundred delegates present. In all, about two hundred people filled the hall.

Mrs. von Holt gave a review of the work of the year. She called 1922 a banner year, as progress and improvements were shown all along the line—except that of the Junior Auxiliaries, which have been seriously handicapped by lack of leaders. Mrs. von Holt stated that after ten years as President, she was retiring; all regret at having to give up the work was tempered by the knowledge that the leadership was to be assumed by Mrs. Lawrence M. Judd, for whom she bespoke the same help and cooperation that had been her's since 1913.

Upon the conclusion of Mrs. von Holt's address, it was moved by Mrs. Arthur Smith that a rising vote of thanks and appreciation be given Mrs. von Holt for her inspiring leadership. This was seconded by the Bishop, who said he wished to express his personal appreciation of the splendid work Mrs. von Holt had done in the short time he had been in Honolulu. This motion was carried with much enthusiasm. After thanking the members for their demonstration, Mrs. von Holt stated that the new President had asked her to continue in the chair for today's meeting. She then called attention to the various assess-

ments and special needs on the blackboard, and that it had been voted that St. Peter's Mission House was to be our Special work for 1923. The list of assessments follows:

Apportionment.

Special needs suggested by different persons and written on the blackboard were as follows:

Cluett House Debt.

Hymn and Prayer Books for St. Peters.

Auto for the Rev. Mr. Freeman.

There being a balance of \$150.00 in the Auto Fund, it was moved by Mrs. Walter Coombs and seconded by Mrs. Thompson, that this money be divided between the Kohala and Kona Parishes. Carried.

It was moved by Mrs. Emory that the morning offering, which amounted to \$17.00, should be given to the District Expense Fund. This was seconded and carried.

REPORTS.

The first report read was that of Mrs. Howard Clarke, Church Periodical Club Secretary, which aroused much enthusiasm. Mrs. von Holt commented on the great increase in the interest and scope of the C. P. C., and congratulated the Secretary on her achievements. Mrs. Clarke gave details of the work of the National Officer, who pledged \$5,000.00 for three years for the upkeep of various College and University Libraries. As there are fifteen hundred branches of the Church Periodical Club, Honolulu's quota would be only \$3.00 per year for three years. Mrs. Clarke asked the District Branch to authorize the secretary to assume this pledge. After this had been voted on favorably, the Rev. Mr. Doty of Hilo said that Holy Apostle's Woman's Auxiliary would be glad to pay this small amount for three years, in appreciation of the library they had received from the Church Periodical Club.

Mrs. Hemenway gave a very encouraging report on the United Thank Offering. At the Portland Triennial in September, 1922, \$1,204.84 from the Honolulu Branch was put into the golden alms basin used only at the United Thank-Offering Service, every three years.

It was announced that Mrs. Harrison was ill and unable to be present or give a report as District Altar Department Secretary. As this was the first Annual Meeting that Mrs. Harrison had missed, it was

moved by Mrs. Arthur G. Smith that a message of love and sympathy be sent to Mrs. Harrison. This was seconded by Mrs. Coombs and carried unanimously.

An interesting report on box work by Mrs. Wakefield, Supply Secretary, was read by Mrs. Coombs. This showed much work done during the year.

Mrs. Robert White gave an interesting report on the Junior Auxiliary and made a stirring appeal for leadership in this important work.

In regard to the Young People's work, Bishop La Mothe announced that the last Mite Box collection from the Sunday Schools at Easter was the largest ever received and that 35% of our apportionment will have been paid by the children. If the adults gave in proportion to the children, there would be plenty of money for all needs.

Mrs. von Holt then called upon Mrs. Lowrey, Chairman of the special committee for The New Iolani for her report. Mrs. Lowrey stated that \$2,200.00 had been pledged and \$3,252.00 had been raised with more to come in. Bishop La Mothe said he wanted to express his grateful thanks to this committee for doing so much more than they had promised. Mrs. von Holt said that a feature which had particularly pleased her was the fact that every branch had helped with this fund, showing the spirit of unity which is so necessary and vital to our spiritual growth, as well as our work.

Letters were read from Miss Dran in China, Bishop Rowe in Alaska and from the Rev. F. W. Neve, the latter two begging for subscriptions for the "Alaskan Churchman" and "Our Mountain Work."

Mrs. von Holt then asked Mrs. Kong if she would tell of the needs at St. Peters. In introducing Mrs. Kong, Mrs. von Holt spoke of the warm Aloha the District Woman's Auxiliary felt for her and told of the esteem in which Mrs. Kong and her son, the Rev. Kong Yin Tet, are held by all the Chinese in Honolulu, even those who are not especially interested in Church work. Mrs. Kong gave a short interesting talk on the need of a Mission House for St. Peters. At present they have on hand \$4,000.00 in cash and pledges and they wish to raise \$20,000.00 more.

At twelve o'clock, an intermission was taken while the noon-tide prayer was read by Bishop La Mothe, after which Mrs. Emory read the Educational Secretary's Report. She told of the interesting and instructive study classes held during Lent and of the continued interest shown in our Church and its activities by Mrs. R. L. Houghton of Boston who visited in Honolulu last summer. She has written letters, sent various pamphlets and religious books and has requested others to be sent for the Educational work. It was moved by Mrs. Judd that the Secretary should send a letter of appreciation to Mrs. Houghton for her inspiring help. This was seconded and carried by unanimous vote.

After expressing warmest appreciation of the work of the various secretaries, especially those of the retiring officers, Mrs. Emory, Mrs. Wakefield, Mrs. Clarke and Mrs. Hemenway, Mrs. von Holt then called upon the Rev. Mr. Walker of Kohala for a few words. As usual, Mr. Walker was full of missionary zeal and enthusiasm. He told of the need of a Parish House in Kohala, saying they could raise \$1,000.00 there, but needed \$4,000.00. He told of the wonderful courage and devotion of his people who come far over rough roads to attend the services. Bishop La Mothe spoke of his recent visit to Kohala and how he went to Makapala for a Confirmation Service. It stormed so hard he felt sure that no one would be there, but in spite of the down-pour, not one candidate was missing when the time for the service arrived.

At twelve-thirty the meeting adjourned for luncheon which was served, as usual, in the Priory for nearly 200 people.

At one-thirty p. m. the meeting was again called to order. Before taking up the business of the afternoon, Bishop La Mothe presented Mrs. von Holt with a beautiful basket of flowers, a contribution from all the branches of the Woman's Auxiliary. After a few moments when Mrs. von Holt was too deeply surprised and moved to speak, she feelingly thanked the membrs for this token of their love and appreciation. Mrs. von Holt then introduced Mrs. Theodore Richards who comes each year with greetings from the Woman's Board of Missions from Central Union Church. Her first words "I feel very much at home here" brought forth applause after which she spoke of the value of Mission study classes and of the thrill she had experienced in the study of India.

Sister Olivia read a very interesting resume of the book used in our Lenten Study classes "Wanted—Leaders." She advised all the persons who had not had the privilege of attending the classes, to read this book and others on the negro question, which is such an important one, and presents such problems in America today.

The Rev. Mr. Freeman of Epiphany gave a forceful address on the 'Young People's Forum.' He told of the splendid work being done by the young people at Epiphany and said that in order to carry on the work planned, it would be necessary to have a place just twice as large as their present Parish House which could also be used as a Community Center.

Miss van Deerlin gave a report of the work at St. Mary's and told of the needs there of a bungalow school or class room. At present fourteen are living in quarters built for three. She also begged for a crib, baby carriage and high chair for the little Japanese baby recently adopted at St. Marys. These were promised by Mrs. Wakefield, Mrs. von Holt and Mrs. White.

After Miss van Deerlin had finished her plea, Bishop La Mothe said: "I wish some one would give me a million dollars! I could use it ALL as everyone needs more room.

Miss Villio gave an interesting address on the Junior Service League, illustrating by a chart the new method of interesting young people in the various departments and sub-divisions of the work.

Bishop La Mothe has appointed Canon Ault, Rev. Mr. Freeman and Miss Villio as a committee to develop this work in the Diocese.

The afternoon offertory amounted to \$50.00. It was moved by Mrs. Judd that this should be given to St. Peter's Parish House Fund. This was seconded and carried unanimously.

It was also unanimously voted that Mrs. F. J. Hons and the ladies assisting her be given a vote of thanks for the delicious luncheon.

The Rev. Mr. Kieb told of the death of Mrs. A. Thompson, author of the hymn "Oh! Zion Haste," and expressed the hope that a memorial be raised in her honor.

There being no further business, Mrs. von Holt suggested that we sing this grand hymn, after which prayers were read by the Bishop and the meeting adjourned, thus ending a most successful day.

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS, MAY 1ST, 1923.

The past year has been quite remarkable in its peaceful progress. The Branches have done excellent work, the fellowship and social intercourse has been delightful, and altogether it has been quite a banner year for the Woman's Auxiliary as a whole.

The Treasurer's report which has been, according to custom, distributed among you, shows the receipts amount to \$8,220.68, quite a substantial increase over the \$6,836.45 of 1921. Much of this was due to the splendid work of the Committee on "The New Iolani" headed by Mrs. F. J. Lowrey, from whom we are to have a special report later.

I must also mention the work of the Educational Secretary. Her report is exceptionally interesting and the growth of the religious educational work in the Parishes is very inspiring. The only department I would like to see more "alive" is the Junior Auxiliary. I am glad to report that St. Andrew's Juniors, who, from lack of leadership in 1922 were not able to accomplish anything, have revived this last few months under the able and sympathetic leadership of Mrs. Kenneth Day. Perhaps the reason of the non-activity of the Juniors the past few years is the underlying thought that on account of changes made and being tested out by the Church on the mainland in regard to the work of the Juniors, we are uncensciously waiting for some definite working plan here. In view of this, I have asked the Rev. Mr. Freeman to give us a talk on the young people's fellowship; also Miss Villio, who is an authority on the Junior Church Service League.

As you will hear the reports from all the different secretaries about the work, I will only say that the plan for the apportionment and assessments was voted on to be continued this year, and notices to that effect sent out by the Corresponding Secretary. If any of the officers of the outlying Branches would like to confer with the Executive Com-

mittee on this subject, a meeting can be very easily arranged, and suggestions most gladly received, for next year, 1924. Some expressions have been voiced as to more interest being aroused through a "Special" in the Foreign Field, but the majority feel that the present way of working it out is the better. Of course the Executive Board does not wish to limit any Branch and each Branch must understand they may have as many "Specials" or "Designated Objects" as they wish.

There have been three Executive meetings held during the year and two Officers' Conferences. Of the latter, one held at the home of the President proved especially helpful in accentuating the "get together" spirit. It was resolved that we should have at least three of these conferences through the year. Acting on a suggestion from Bishop La Mothe, we decided to change the designation "quarterly" meetings to "special" meetings, owing to the fact that we usually call our meetings when some special speaker is to be here, and that we rarely are able to have regular quarterly meetings. At the special meeting in October last, Bishop and Mrs. La Mothe gave us a splendid resume of the Triennial Convention in Portland. Mrs. La Mothe, Mrs. Glade, Mrs. Lawrence, Mrs. John E. Baird and Sister Olivia, our five Delegates, were all present, which was very gratifying and showed our interest to the officers at large, every one of whom seem to be pleased with the results of our work here. I know you all rejoiced with me in having our United Thank Offering go over the top.

I had hoped we might have the great stimulus of having Miss Lindley with us before now, but a recent letter brings word that she will not start on her tour of the Mission work until September. When we know the exact date of her coming, plans will be made, and notices sent to you all. It will certainly be a wonderful thing to have Miss Lindley come to be with us. Her quarterly letter to all the Diocesan Presidents has just come and is full of greatest interest. As you perhaps know, the National Woman's Auxiliary pledged itself in prayer and service at the last Triennial to seven big subjects—"Prison Reform," "Care of Disabled Veterans," "Proper Laws for Women and Children," "Christian Inter-Racial and International Relations," "Limitations of Armaments" and last but not least, "Christian Unity." These are so big that we are tempted to feel we cannot "do" much, but the biggest power the Woman's Auxiliary has, is its ability to create and influence public opinion. Miss Lindley quotes the Rev. Floyd Tomkins who says: "I am quite satisfied that the Woman's Auxiliary is capable of doing more for Christian Unity than any other organ in the Church. They are always equal to **anything** and if they are once interested in this subject, will start enough to keep this office going day and night."

I know that we of the Woman's Auxiliary will do all in our power by "Look, Word and Deed," to hasten the day. We can help create that spirit of which Bishop Root spoke in one of his addresses at the

Triennial Convention, when he told of the way a Chinese leader phrased it: "That we should agree to disagree, and resolve to Love."

In closing, may I say how deeply I have felt the privilege of being your President since 1913, ten years, and I now bespeak the same loving help and cooperation given me, for my successor, Mrs. Lawrence Judd, who is no stranger to you. Her work as President of St. Andrew's Parish Branch, and as Vice-President of this Diocesan Branch, in addition to her own great interest in and love of the work and her executive ability, make her unusually fitted to be President. As I have been asked to stay on the Board, I am very happy to take up the work of the United Offering Secretary, and I look forward to a very full and wonderful year for us all. Aloha.

REPORT OF THE EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY.

One of my first efforts after my appointment last year was to write to Miss Tillotson, Educational Secretary at Headquarters in New York, for advice and suggestions. Her prompt reply was most inspiring—and showed a deep personal interest in all that pertained to the advancement of our little mission out here in the midst of the Pacific.

Very shortly all sorts of helpful data commenced to pour in, and my correspondence soon extended to Miss Boyer, Assistant Educational Secretary, and Miss Avery at Church House, Philadelphia, and others—all evincing the same kindly interest.

I was almost overwhelmed with literature on Study Classes—Church pageantry and drama—all of which seemed most worth while. I wrote to our outlying missions asking the various clergyman what I could do for them in stimulating study classes—as that was the point Miss Tillotson impressed upon me as of greatest importance.

Almost the same reply came from each one, that systematic or regular study would be very difficult, if not impossible, where the parishioners were so scattered, and of such varied nationalities, and races. However their courteous replies brought us in closer touch with each other, and gave me a more intelligent interest in those districts.

The book recommended for Universal Church Study this Winter was "WANTED, LEADERS," by Bishop Bratton—a book on the development of the Negro. The title did not appeal to me, but I immediately ordered it, feeling that my ignorance might be to blame for my lack of interest; this proved to be the case,—and as soon as possible after Sister O'ivia's return from the Convention in Portland where she had had an opportunity of attending the beginning of the Study classes, a few, who were specially interested, met to consider this, and alternate studies. After careful analysis we decided that Bishop Bratton's book presented a survey of an important problem which should recommend itself to all thoughtful Americans, especially Churchmen, who would appreciate the fact that the Negro Race must advance in every way

for their own sakes—as well as that of America; and above all for the sake of Him Who is the one God and Father of all.

After the holidays, a Normal Class,—with an average attendance of about ten,—was formed under Sister Olivia, who seemed to be able to draw from various quarters—especially the city library—most appropriate and helpful books,—which enabled us to follow the Negro from Africa to Liberia, Haiti, and through their history in America,—as slaves and freed men,—and review their past and present, from the point of view of education and religion,—and be deeply interested, in conclusion,—as to their future.

Unfortunately few of those who took the Normal Class were able to arrange to teach Lenten Classes,—so dear Sister Olivia again came to our assistance. She, with Mrs. Withington and Mrs. Royds of St. Clements, carried on three classes each week—with a sustained attendance of about twenty-six. Mrs. Withington's class was an innovation as it was held evenings, and the men were cordially invited to attend. Those who were able to do so, I have been assured, were more than repaid for their efforts. Another year, I trust, a mixed class may be planned still more successfully,—for our studies should appeal quite as much to Churchmen as Churchwomen. The Normal Class, and the Lenten Classes, were followed by corporate communions, at which collections were taken and sent to Archdeacon Baskerville of South Carolina to be used for the work among the Negroes in that diocese.

In the March Spirit of Missions under Educational Division it was reported that "The last copies of a total edition of 5,000 copies of 'Wanted, Leaders,' were sold on the day before Ash Wednesday." This gives us some idea of how well this book has been studied.

This was by no means the only study carried on through Lent—and also through the year. From nearly all the missions I have had most interesting accounts of educational work. Only those, however, which pertain to special Lenten Study have I time to mention.

Rev. Mr. Freeman of Epiphany Mission outlines special religious class on "Hymnology," which met every week during Lent.

From the Hawaiian Congregation at St. Andrews comes the following report: On every Wednesday, during Lent, the Rev. Mr. Ottmann held classes to study George Parkin Atwater's "The Episcopal Church With Its Message For Men Of Today." These classes were well attended and much interest was shown.

Rev. Mr. Freeman of Epiphany Mission outlines special religious Study beginning in Lent which he plans to carry on throughout the year—for a period of six to eight weeks each time. The one in Lent and the two weeks following was on "Christian Fundamentals."

At Rev. Canon Kong's request Mrs. F. J. Lowrey had a class of ten Chinese women to study the catechism and Church history—these classes were held in Canon Kong's study, with the exception of the last one at Mrs. Lowrey's home. She was deeply touched and fully repaid for her efforts when one of her dear elderly students said to her:

"You make my faith greater because you are interested in my people and want to do them good." I had hoped to form a class of Japanese girls and was disappointed in not being able to do so. Miss Yone Kawamura of Rev. Mr. Fukao's congregation offered her assistance and several other young ladies signified their desire to attend—but as nearly all hold positions a convenient time could not be arranged. Mrs. Ralph Villiers, who has been much interested in these girls, was unable to help at that time, but is now getting them organized into a little society for regular meetings.

The sale of the Church Missionary Calendars has been most successful—altogether seventy-seven copies have been disposed of. The largest number for any previous year I believe has been fifty. I hope we can make it at least one hundred this coming year, and I strongly recommended that each woman here present hand in her name today for one of these calendars,—whose purpose is threefold.

"First to disseminate missionary information.

"Second, to secure systematic and intelligent prayer for missions.

"Third, to encourage loyal service."

Other literature ordered and disposed of is as follows: In October I received fifty copies of the United Offering number of *The Spirit of Missions*, which were sold for 10c a copy. Half the proceeds we had the privilege of adding to our United offering for the next Triennial. One hundred copies of Dean Rousmaniere's little pamphlet "*How To Pray*." These were paid for out of the Diocesan treasury and have been distributed without charge.

Twelve books of "Prayers" from the Church Service League of the Diocese of Massachusetts. For these last two we are indebted to Mrs. R. L. Houghton of Boston, who as a visitor to our Islands, last summer, showed a keen interest in our Church and all its activities—an interest which has continued and has been a source of much help to me in frequent personal letters as well as various religious books and pamphlets, which she has sent, or has requested to be sent, for our educational work.

Not the least among these comes each week from the Cathedral Church of St. Paul's a leaflet on the *Class in Personal Religion* by the Dean of the Cathedral. These I have tried to pass on, here and elsewhere, as each holds a message of spiritual help and healing. We are also further indebted to Mrs. Houghton for interesting her Auxiliary in having gift sales—the proceeds of which are towards the payment of a monthly salary for a Priory teacher. Sister Caroline reports with deep gratitude that this has been coming from headquarters for several months—and I am sure we all combine with the Sisters in extending a sincere vote of thanks to Mrs. Houghton and those who are working with her.

In connection with our work, we hope, in the near future, to utilize the new Guild and Auxiliary Cabinet in the Guild room for a library.

We trust some practical arrangement may be worked out for receiving and distributing religious books and periodicals.

I wish I might impress upon each and every Church woman the necessity for subscribing to a weekly Church paper as well as the Spirit of Missions. In no other way can we keep in touch with all the work of our Church and its missions all over the world. In the March Churchman I read with much interest the following notice: "Miss Emily C. Tillotson, Educational Secretary for the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council, visited the Diocese of Texas in February, addressing the Church women and holding two Normal Training Classes. These classes were well attended and it is hoped Miss Tillotson's inspiration and splendid training will result in the formation of many discussion groups among Church women."

What a wonderful inspiration it would be to us if we could arrange for a visit from one of these splendid leaders to give us instruction in this most important line of work. Isn't this something to pray, to plan and work for?

In the last Spirit of Missions is a long article on the Religious Drama Movement which I hope you all may read—for it shows the very important part the Drama or Pageant holds in religious education. In this connection we have to thank Miss Emma Villio—our Junior Educational Secretary for the very successful little play, "The Great Message," showing the work of our Missions among the Alleghany mountaineers, which was given last evening, April 30th, to a most appreciative audience here in our Parish Hall.

Although I have fallen far short in carrying out many of the plans and hopes I had for this past year's work, yet, I trust I may have even in a small measure, been able to pass on some of the interest and inspiration which has come to me. It is with much regret that for the present at least it seems wiser for me to discontinue this office—but for my successor I would bespeak your hearty cooperation, and may our earnest prayer be—that God, the inspirer and teacher of men, send out his light and illumine us; help us to a growing knowledge of His world; strengthen in us aspiration towards noble and serious thinking and in good time bring us to His Holy Hill, where we shall be lifted above the clouds of prejudice and the mists of ignorance—and be filled with a true knowledge of God and His dear Son, our Saviour Jesus Christ.

REPORT OF THE CHURCH PERIODICAL CLUB, 1922.

The Church Periodical Club work within the Missionary District of Honolulu has consisted entirely this past year, of local activities.

Fifty-six direct subscriptions have been sent in, 23 magazines have been remailed through the New York office to this branch, and 13 magazines have been pledged for remailing within the Diocese. 236 books have been turned into the Secretary and redistributed. 1454 magazines have also been received and redistributed.

Augmented by a few voluntary gifts and the Annual Pledge of the Woman's Auxiliary, the International Entertainment given last May, netted funds sufficient to carry on the local work without soliciting individual subscriptions. There remains in the treasury \$36.77 to begin the work of the new year.

The C. P. C. is especially indebted to Mrs. J. W. Caldwell who has given so untiringly of her own time and the use of her car, in the redistribution of books and magazines.

The plans of the Executive Officers of the C. P. C. in New York for the workers, are so extensive that I feel you will only be able to help the incoming Secretary to carry out the program here, by having a few of the details as taken from the report of the Executive Secretary, Miss Mary Thomas, following the General Convention in Portland.

Twenty-five Dioceses were represented, either by Secretaries, Correspondents or interested supporters of the work.

The C. P. C. pledged itself to raise \$5,000.00 for three consecutive years for the upkeep of various College and University libraries. Among these are Boone University, Wuchang, China; Dubose School, Monteagle, Tennessee; St. John's College, Shanghai, China; Cathedral School for Girls, Havana; St. John's Industrial School, Cape Mount, Liberia; and St. Luke's International Hospital in Japan. This latter is the only American hospital in Japan and its Training School for Nurses together with its Resident Students and Staff, makes its appeal very urgent.

There now being 1500 branches of the C. P. C., the levy on the Honolulu branch will be only \$3.00 for each of the three years. I ask the Woman's Auxiliary as now assembled, to authorize the Secretary to assume this pledge.

A uniform book plate for C. P. C. books was decided upon. The first one has just reached me. It is in the hands of the President and I hope that you will all have an opportunity of seeing it.

In the future there will be published a leaflet to be known as "The Message," which is to be the means of a closer touch between the C. P. C. and its donors. Two copies only have reached me, but later there will be a sufficient number on hand for distribution throughout the Diocese.

In closing my last report, I wish you to know of the final result of the Fund collected for St. Paul's College Library, to which this Mis-

sionary District responded so very generously. Out of 83 contributors, giving \$17,506.19 in place of the \$15,000.00 asked, Honolulu, with a donation of \$308.93 to her credit, stands number twelve on a list of eighty-three.

REPORT OF THE UNITED THANK-OFFERING SECRETARY.

At the risk of being tiresome I want to give you a few figures in regard to the United Thank Offering, as they are most encouraging. We sent to the 1919 Triennial Convention approximately \$946.00. We were asked if it would not be possible to increase our offering to \$1000.00 during 1922. I am sure you will be glad to know that Mrs. La Mothe was able to take with her to Portland \$1204.84, this being a little larger sum than shows on the Treasurer's book owing to a contribution which was given to Bishop La Mothe when he was in San Francisco en route to the Convention. These figures show an increase in our offering over that of 1919 of about \$250.00, which I believe was favorably commented upon at the Convention and which should encourage us to renewed effort. To me, however, the most encouraging feature of the work this past year is the fact that I have had requests for literature, boxes and information regarding the United Thank Offering; I have also received a few entirely unsolicited contributions, all of which point to a steady growth in interest. Collections are sent in to the Treasurer regularly from all the Branches contributing, which fact seems to assure us that the United Thank Offering is now accepted as a proper part of our responsibility and not regarded as a special or unusual demand. This changing attitude is due in large measure to the talks and explanations of the work given during the past two years by Bishop La Mothe, to whom I extend my most hearty thanks.

Only four branches of the Junior Auxiliary were active in 1922. Since then it is encouraging to note that the St. Andrews has resumed work. It is a sad indictment of the Woman's Auxiliary that only five leaders have been found for the young girls of this Missionary District. I hope that more women both here, and on the other islands, will realize the importance of this work, and offer themselves as leaders. How can we expect to have faithful workers in the Woman's Auxiliary, if we neglect the training school, the Junior Auxiliary? One hears on every side the wail "Why don't the young girls take more interest in Church work?" Simply because they know and hear nothing.

ing about it, and so few are willing to give the necessary time to training them in the way they should go.

The contributions of the four branches, St. Andrew's Priory, St. Elizabeths, St. Peters, and St. Marys, amounted to \$324.07, with the contributions to the box work of \$11.50, brings the total to \$335.07.

The total last year was almost a thousand dollars more than this!

St. Mary's was the banner branch for 1922, giving per capita \$4.17. St. Peter's was next with a per capita of \$2.87. St. Andrew's Priory gave the largest amount.

REPORT OF THE DISTRICT ALTAR DEPARTMENT.

Linen left by Mrs. Folsom in the care of Mrs. Coombs has been given as follows: To the Rev. Mr. Kieb for St. Elizabeth's, to Canon Kong a fair linen cloth for St. Peters. To Mrs. Black, a coarse piece of linen for a dust cover for the altar at St. Marks, to the Rev. Mr. Freeman for a fair linen cloth for the Church of the Epiphany, and the remaining piece has been promised to the Rev Mr. Fukao for a fair linen cloth for Trinity Mission.

A group of St. Andrew's women made five cottas for women, and three for men, for the choir at St. Augustine's, Kohala. A pattern, and the material with which to make three cassocks, were sent to the Rev. Mr. Walker at Kohala. Eucharistic vestments of linen for the Church of the Epiphany arrived in time for use at Easter, also a linen surplice for St. Peters. A cassock of sateen has been made for the Rev. Mr. Kieb at St. Elizabeths, while red cloth for dosal hangings for Christ Church, Kona, has been ordered, but has not yet arrived.

Members of the Church of the Epiphany have furnished emblems with which to adorn antependiums for the lectern Bible markers, and Prayerbook markers for the four Church seasons, but these articles have not yet been gotten, owing to samples being unsatisfactory, and to my illness.

St Marys has the materials for veils, and burses, and Bible markers in red and green. St. Peters had new Bible and Prayer book markers for Easter.

Where the funds come from is of interest. First always is the assessment of \$1.00, for each branch of the Auxiliary, and 50 cents for the Juniors, but close to our hearts lies the All Saints Day offering, where we have the privilege of commemorating the life and death of "all saints who now from their labors rest." On the Sunday before All Saint's Day, the Bishop made a beautiful appeal, and after the service brought me a man, who wished to give \$5.00 to our fund.

At a St. Andrew's Guild meeting last fall the Bishop had also so strongly set before the members the Rev. Mr. Walker's plea for vest-

ments, for his choir, that they voted to have \$50.00 laid in the offering on All Saints Day, as a memorial to their members who had joined the Church Expectant, to be used first for the needs of St. Augustine, and then for those of other missions.

I cannot close my report without pointing out several ways in which the work of the District Altar Department could be helped. It seems only right that when the money is furnished for materials, the work should be done as far as possible by members of the mission thus benefited. Those capable of doing any fine work might make it a part of their Lenten work, but those who are not able to, but can pay to have it done, I know can find Priory girls capable of doing it, and very glad to earn money for their Easter offering. Might I suggest that the gift from the St. Andrew's Guild of last year, as a memorial to its dead members, would be a good precedent for them, and for other Guilds to follow? And always there is the opportunity for a beautiful memorial.

REPORT OF THE SUPPLY SECRETARY FOR THE YEAR ENDING DECEMBER 31, 1922.

Box work for the year 1922 began rather disappointingly for your new Supply Secretary, owing to the arrival of Lent and the Lenten Sewing Season before our apportionment of box work sewing reached us from the Mainland.

At the February meeting of the St. Andrew's Woman's Auxiliary the question of what Lenten sewing should be done whilst waiting for our appointment was discussed. It was decided that during the interval of waiting, all Woman's Auxiliary members get busy and see what they could do to raise money by sewing or making any other saleable articles they could so as to have money available for materials when the apportionment came—this because the funds of the Woman's Auxiliary were very low and money would be needed for that purpose.

About the middle of Lent a request came from the Eighth Province asking if we could take part of the allotment for the Church General Hospital, Wuchang, China. Your Supply Secretary accepted this work, sewing meetings were started and were well attended and kept up until all the work was finished.

In July the box containing hospital garments and supplies was packed, insured and sent to China. Later, a very pleasant letter was received from Dr. Mary L. James acknowledging its receipt and thanking the Honolulu Woman's Auxiliary for the contents.

Dr. James particularly spoke of the warm pajamas and the comfort they would be, saying she had "never been able to get enough." The

sheets and pillow slips also came at an opportune time as they were adding new beds to the hospital.

In October, 1922, your Supply Secretary visited the Church Mission House in New York, and had a very pleasant visit with the General Supply Secretary, Mrs. Wade. I was able to tell her just what we were doing in Honolulu and she seemed very pleased that our Woman's Auxiliary were so interested in Missionary work outside our own Diocese and were willing to work for it. I asked particularly that all requests for work reach Honolulu in good time to do the work during Lent and she said she would advise the Eighth Province to that effect.

REPORT OF "THE NEW IOLANI" BUILDING FUND COMMITTEE.

After the annual meeting last year (1922) at which time the District Branch had pledged itself to raise \$2,200.00 for a unit in The New Iolani, our Bishop at the request of the President, appointed me chairman of the New Iolani Building Fund Committee. A few days later, we called a meeting, and the campaign was launched. First, we sent out several hundred letters containing pictures of the proposed new buildings and setting forth the urgent need for the same.

There were some very generous responses, but as we did not get the amount we had hoped for, we decided to do some personal canvassing; at this we were quite successful. Next we arranged an organ recital, and these three enterprises netted us \$2,699.81. On learning from the Bishop that the building unit was to cost \$3,000.00, we renewed our efforts, and gave a concert, the net proceeds amounting to \$543.75, bringing our total at the end of August, 1922, up to \$3,232.06, which sum was handed over to Bishop La Mothe.

During September and October we got out some Iolani stamps, the design being the work of Miss Hilda von Holt and the cost of printing, \$56.50, being given by St. Andrew's Woman's Auxiliary. With a donation of \$30.00, and the sale of the stamps to the end of the year, we realized \$443.00, which is in the Savings Bank. When the remaining stamps are disposed of (and we have a scheme by which we hope to do this), the fund will go well over the \$4,000.00 mark.

CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE I.

This Society shall be called, THE HONOLULU BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE NATIONAL COUNCIL.

ARTICLE II.

The object of the Society is: By systematic and united effort to diffuse Missionary intelligence, to increase Missionary activity, to promote the study of Missions, and to encourage prayer for Missions among the women of the Missionary District.

ARTICLE III.

The Church itself is the great Missionary Society, therefore all Baptized women in this District who desire it, and who work for Missions in connection with their parochial organizations, shall be regarded as members of this Woman's Auxiliary, but terms of membership in any Branch may be fixed by that Branch.

ARTICLE IV.

All Parish and Mission societies of women that so desire, may become branches of this Auxiliary by first obtaining the consent of the Rector or Clergyman in charge, and notifying the President of their intention to work in unison with the Auxiliary.

ARTICLE V.

The officers shall be: A President, a First Vice-President, a Second Vice-President and a Third Vice-President, who shall act as Secretary of the Junior Department. There shall be a Recording Secretary, a Corresponding Secretary, a Treasurer, a Secretary of the Little Helpers, a Directress of the Altar Department, an Educational Secretary, a Secretary of the Church Periodical Club, a Secretary of the United Offering and a Supply Secretary. All of these officers shall be appointed by the Bishop at the annual meeting.

ARTICLE VI.

The officers of the District Branch shall constitute the Executive Board, which shall have general charge of the work under the direction of the Bishop.

ARTICLE VII.

The annual meeting shall be held at the time of the Convocation of the Missionary District, and quarterly meetings on such dates and in such places as the President may appoint.

ARTICLE VIII.

The representatives of five Branches shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE IX.

This Constitution may be amended at any annual meeting, by a vote of two-thirds of the Branches represented.

BY-LAWS.

1. The duty of the President shall be to call meetings of the Woman's Auxiliary and the Executive Board and to preside over the same. It shall be her duty to see that all new officers are informed of their specific duties.

2. The duty of the Recording Secretary shall be to give notice of meetings, to keep a record of proceedings, and to prepare an abstract of the minutes for the annual report.

3. The duty of the Corresponding Secretary, under the direction of the President, shall be to correspond with the Executive Secretary of the Auxiliary and with the various branches of the District, to collect their reports, to prepare an annual report, and to issue and distribute the same.

4. The duty of the Supply Secretary shall be to furnish each Branch with work, and to keep a record of the number and the value of Boxes sent. She shall also present a report at the annual meeting.

5. The Treasurer shall have the custody of all moneys received by the District Branch and shall collect, if necessary, all sums payable to the same, in pledges made. She shall pay out money on the order of the President and the Recording Secretary, except such sums as may be received for a definite purpose, which sums she may dispose of without formal direction. All moneys received for purposes outside of the District shall be forwarded to treasurers empowered to receive the same.

6. The Secretary of the Junior Department, the Secretary of the Little Helpers, the Directress of the Altar Department, the Educational Secretary, the Secretary of the Church Periodical Club and the Secretary of the United Thank Offering, shall superintend, foster, and develop by correspondence and otherwise, their several departments on consultation with Diocesan officers.

7. It shall be the duty of the President, or of some person appointed by her to visit, if possible, each Branch in order to promote the interest of the work.

8. It shall be the duty of any Branch, before it discontinues a pledge, which has been made for salary or interest, and which continues year by year, to give a year's notice of its purpose at the annual meeting.

9. Each Branch shall pay yearly to the District Expense Fund such sums as it shall be assessed therefor by the Executive Board. Such payment shall entitle it to seat its delegates and to vote.

10. Each Branch shall pay yearly to the District Altar Fund at least one dollar from the Woman's, and fifty cents from the Junior Auxiliary.

11. Each Branch is entitled to five delegates. If it is impractical to get women as delegates who live in the parish or mission, it is permissible for each Branch to appoint delegates who are resident of Honolulu. If a Branch fails to appoint delegates one week before Convocation, they shall be appointed by the Executive Board.

12. The Secretary and Treasurer of each Branch shall make yearly reports to the Corresponding Secretary and Treasurer of the District Branch, of all work done and money given to Missions within and without this Missionary District, and the value of Boxes sent.

13. The year of the Woman's Auxiliary shall end on December 31st of each year, the date on which the Parish and Convocational year ends, and all Auxiliary reports shall be made up to that date.

14. These By-Laws may be altered or amended by a majority vote at each annual meeting.
