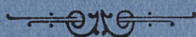

MINUTES OF THE EDUCATIONAL CONFERENCE HELD ON
MONDAY, FEBRUARY 1, 1932

The Educational Conference of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Missionary District of Honolulu was held at the Davies Memorial Hall on Monday, February 1, 1932, at 10 A. M., Mrs. Walter R. Coombs, the Educational Secretary, presiding.

The program was opened by Kamakapili Choir, under the leadership of Mrs. Martha Poepoe Hohu, singing an Hawaiian hymn.

This was followed by a ten-minute devotional talk by Mrs. Arthur Withington. The District President, Mrs. William Thompson, then gave a brief word of greeting to visitors and delegates from the outlying Islands.

Mrs. Lawrence M. Judd, who was a delegate to the Triennial in Denver read a paper on "Property and Economic Condition". This was a resume of the thoughts of able leaders, and was well presented and much enjoyed by an attentive audience. A second hymn was given by the Choir.

Mrs. Theodore Richards, a representative from the Central Union Church, who was to speak on the subject of "Morals", was ill and could not be present.

Mrs. W. R. Coombs read extracts from "Christian Stewardship" by the Rev. T. B. Kemerer pertaining to "Juvenile Crime"—its causes, and the cost to the nation. It was moved by Mrs. Arthur G. Smith, seconded by Mrs. Freeland that these extracts be submitted to the daily newspapers for publication. Carried.

Mrs. Evelyn T. Littell, who was also a delegate to the Denver Triennial presented two subjects, "Christian Family Life" and "International Relationships". New viewpoints were brought out, especially on the subject of "Christian Family Life".

A few moments of general discussion on books followed.

The program for the morning then closed with a hymn by the choir, and a benediction given by Mrs. Thompson.

The 1931 Educational Conference had a very excellent attendance, and a deep interest in the subjects presented was quite evident. An exhibition of devotional and educational literature put out by the Church House, 281 Fourth Ave, New York, was made during the morning. About sixty different types of pamphlets, cards, books, papers, prayer leaflets, etc., were spread on tables at the rear of the Hall where people might leisurely study them. There was also an exhibition of hand made articles from the Penland School of North Carolina. These articles were for sale.

MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING, 1932

The 30th annual meeting of the Honolulu Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council was held on Tuesday, February 2, 1932, in the Davies Memorial Hall, preceded by Holy Communion in the Cathedral. This was the largest meeting ever held, as the Cathedral was well filled and nearly every one stayed for the business meeting in the Parish House, which had been beautifully decorated for the occasion.

The meeting was called to order by the President, Mrs. William Thompson, who announced that the day's activities would commence with the singing of hymn 479, "The Morning Light is Breaking." This was followed by prayers by Bishop Littell. The roll call by the Secretary showed 80 delegates present, representing 20 Branches. The roll call of the Junior Branches was postponed until afternoon. The President announced that the minutes of the annual meeting held on February 10, 1931, having been approved by the Committee in charge and printed in full in the Journal, would not be read.

The Treasurer's report, printed and distributed to all present, showed that a total of \$9952.90 had passed through the hands of the Treasurer during the year.

The President read her report of the year's activities, a splendid record, showing a year full of action, with the General Convention in Denver the outstanding event. As Hawaii was represented with her full quota of five delegates from four races, as well as two alternates, it was a fine example of the harmonious condition that prevails among the church workers of various nationalities in Hawaii. In her report the President called attention to the fact that the Treasurer and Recording Secretary were celebrating the twelfth anniversary of their appointment to office, and in honor of the occasion they were presented with leis. A very interesting letter from Miss Grace Lindley, Executive Secretary, was read by Mrs. Thompson.

The President announced that the next Synod of the Province of the Pacific will be held in Sacramento on April 20 to 22 and that she hoped very much that some one might be able to go as a delegate from our Honolulu Branch.

The Treasurer announced that the morning offering was \$31.28.

A condensed report of the activities of various Branches was read by the Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. Plum.

Rev. J. Lamb Doty asked if he might digress in order to call attention to the fact that Mrs. L. E. Thayer, who was for so many years an active member of the Auxiliary is perhaps the oldest member in the city. She is now eighty-seven years of age and is unable to attend meetings but she is still very much interested in all that the Woman's Auxiliary is doing. He suggested sending her greetings from the annual meeting now in session. It was moved and carried by a rising vote, that greetings of aloha and appreciation

be sent to Mrs. Thayer. The Corresponding Secretary was instructed to write to Mrs. Thayer informing her of this action.

Mrs. Coombs, Educational Secretary, read a report, showing the splendid work done in this department during the past year. It was moved by Mrs. Kimball that, owing to lack of time the following reports be accepted as if read, and printed in full in the Journal:

United Thank Offering Secretary
Supply Secretary

This was seconded and carried.

Mrs. W. J. Forbes, President of the Woman's Board of Missions of the Pacific Islands, brought greetings from this sister organization. As Mrs. Theodore Richards, former President, is ill, it was moved by Mrs. Coombs that a message of aloha and sympathy be sent to Mrs. Richards. This was seconded and carried. Mrs. Kuykendall brought greetings from the Missionary Society of the Methodist Church and also from the Woman's Council of the Christian Church, as the President of the latter, Mrs. Kuhn, was unable to be present.

Mrs. Hemenway reported that the Christmas Cheer Committee had received \$670.00 from 55 donors, and that this had been distributed among 18 Missions.

Mrs. Harrison, Chairman of the Advance Work Committee, reported that \$112.00 was needed to complete the \$3000.00 pledge of this District for Bishop Burleson's work.

Mrs. Arthur G. Smith told about the need for scholarships for Ernest and for Helen Seu. \$250.00 is needed for Ernest at Iolani School and \$200.00 for Helen.

The following resolutions were presented, and in order that all might hear, were read by Bishop Littell:

Resolved: That the members of the Honolulu Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, at this 30th annual meeting, record with sorrow the loss of one of its kamaaina members, Mrs. Nellie Gsmund Clark, who entered into rest September 14, 1931, and the fact that they shall hold in remembrance her long and faithful service to Epiphany Mission and the Church in these Islands, and her unselfish labors for humanity.

Resolved: That with the death of Mrs. Emma Luquiens a valued and dearly loved member of St. Clement's Auxiliary and Parish, the Honolulu Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary has lost a devoted friend.

May God grant them both continual growth in His love and service. With all standing there were a few moments of silence and then prayers for the departed were read by Bishop Littell.

Bishop Restarick told about the consecration in England of Bishop Willis, the second Bishop of Honolulu, which occurred just sixty years ago today. He said that he held in his hands the papers of consecration signed by the Bishop of London which had been brought to Honolulu to be put in the Church Archives by the Rev. Sang Mark who had worked under Bishop Willis in Tonga. Bishop Restarick asked if there were any persons present who had been confirmed by Bishop Willis and it was found that there were five. Also attending the meeting was Dr. Mildred Staley, a daughter of the first Bishop of Honolulu. Bishop Restarick, the third Bishop, arrived in Honolulu on the 40th anniversary of the founding of the Church. He told about many of the things that had been done by Bishop Willis and said that the beautiful Cathedral would not have been built if it had not been for Bishop Willis.

With everyone standing the noon-tide prayers were read by Bishop Littell.

Continuing, Bishop Restarick said that the Woman's Auxiliary was started 30 years ago today and of the charter members there were present at this meeting, Mrs. Restarick, Mrs. Marx, Mrs. Emory and Miss Ethelwyn Castle.

An interesting report of the "Book of Remembrance" was given by the chairman, Mrs. Lawrence M. Judd, who showed beautiful drawings of the cover design, made by Mrs. James A. Morgan.

The President announced that the meeting would adjourn until 1:45 and invited everyone present to go to the Blue Room of the Alexander Young Hotel for luncheon.

Afternoon Session

Promptly at 1:45 the meeting was again called to order and interesting addresses were made by the following persons:

1st by the Rev. C. Fletcher Howe of the Church of the Good Shepherd, Wailuku, Maui. He told of the need of getting the people back to a spiritual attitude and away from Sunday golf, etc., also the need of Church School teachers. He told about Mrs. Shim's work in Kula, among the Chinese, and her need of a fence to keep out the cattle which are so destructive. This will cost about \$150.00.

2nd by Mr. Edgar Henshaw of St. John's by the Sea, Kahaluu, Oahu, who told of the very happy year that they had experienced in spite of the fact that there is no equipment, as they worship in a big bare warehouse, with a portable altar and a portable organ, with none of the surroundings that most people would think necessary, but there is great joy in the service of this growing mission. After thanking the persons who had helped with the services during the year, especially the two Priory girls who help every Sunday even in vacation, Mr. Henshaw asked for prayers that they may be given grace to reach out to the many people around the mission who need to know Christ, also prayers that some day from this little mission some of these fine young Hawaiians may step out for the Lord's work. Bishop Littell said that we would have prayers for this at once, so with all standing, the Bishop prayed for the furtherance of the work of this mission which is almost entirely Hawaiian.

3rd by Deaconess Swinbourne who gave an interesting report of the work that she is starting on this island at Haleiwa, work that has already been tried by four different religious groups.

4th by Mrs. Joseph C. Mason who gave a most interesting report of the work in Hilo, which her husband has been carrying on during the time that the Rev. and Mrs. Corey have been away on furlough. One interesting announcement was that it has been decided to change the Guild into an Auxiliary, the change having been made in January.

5th by Captain Benson of the Church Army who gave a most interesting address, thanking the persons who had sent kitchen equipment, toys, magazines and many other things that had quite changed the appearance of their bachelor quarters, and had also helped in making more cheerful the very dull quarters of the Filipino laborers, as they cut out all the pictures in the magazines and cover the bare walls with them. Captain Benson told of the endless amount of opportunity for work among the Filipinos who have been very much overlooked spiritually and are responding so splendidly to the efforts of the Church Army. That their work is being appreciated by the Plantation Managers is evidenced by the fact that land has been given for a recreation center and a silver cup has been put up to promote competition. Many things show that the confidence of the laborers is being won. Captain Benson read several

letters from laborers which he gave to Bishop Littell. Already three persons have asked to be confirmed.

Mrs. Lowrey told how much the work of the Church Army men is being appreciated and stressed their need of an automobile.

Bishop Littell told how very important it is to have officers of the Woman's Auxiliary visit the Branches that are far away from the City and who need the help and inspiration that can come to them in this way. After the Bishop had completed his talk it was moved by Mrs. Judd that beginning with the year 1932 there be added to the annual budget a district travel fund of at least \$100.00 a year to which each Branch will be asked to contribute. This was seconded and carried.

Mrs. Plum moved that the District Woman's Auxiliary go on record as endorsing the support by the National Council of work in Southern India and furthermore that the District Treasurer be authorized to accept pledges from those in sympathy with this new work, of \$1.00 per year for three years toward the support of this diocese in India. This was seconded and carried.

Miss Betty Sauerman gave a very good report of the work being done by the Young People's Service League and told of the need of an automobile for Deaconess Swinbourne in her new work, which the young people are working to supply.

Bishop Littell made an appeal for contributions to the Hawaiian Church Chronicle which has to print 1400 copies per month, in order to supply the demand for this very interesting church paper. He called attention to the many anniversaries that fall during this year. It is the 70th anniversary of the arrival of the first Bishop of Honolulu, the 60th anniversary of Bishop Willis' arrival, the 30th anniversary of Bishop Restarick's arrival and the second anniversary of Bishop Littell's coming.

Mrs. Thompson said that the question of the special work for the Woman's Auxiliary for the coming year had been given much prayerful consideration by the members of the Executive Committee. For the first time in its history, owing to the serious financial conditions, the pledge made at Convocation a year ago had not been met. Thanks to Mrs. Littell's efforts since the first of the year, the shortage will not be very large, but the fact remains that it has been impossible to raise the entire \$3000.00 by direct subscription as has always been done in previous years. As there is so much to be done on projects already underway the Executive Committee feels that it will be wiser to undertake no new building project this year, but to help in every way possible with the work the Bishop has already started. It was moved by Mrs. von Holt that the Woman's Auxiliary undertake no new building project this year but concentrate on assisting the Bishop and standing behind him in the work already started. This was seconded and carried.

It was moved by Mrs. Lowrey that we take as our special work for 1932 the raising of at least \$1500.00 for the Bishop's Purse. This was seconded and carried.

While the afternoon offertory was being received the roll for Junior Branches was called. This brought the total number of delegates responding up to 85.

The following motion was made by Mrs. Coombs: "Inasmuch as it has been the council of the executive Committee that the Woman's Auxiliary direct all of its efforts to the various branches of mission work carried on in Hawaii, by Bishop Littell, I make the motion that our pledge of \$100.00 per year toward the Leper work at Kusatsu, Japan, be discontinued at the close of 1932. After this motion had been seconded, Mrs. Thompson said that she had taken this matter up with Bishop McKim and that he agreed that it was at this time the duty of this organization to do all that it could to further the various branches of work at home, and that he appreciated very much all that had been done to help the Leper fund in the past five years. Before the question was put to vote Bishop Littell said that he objected to having this work stopped on these grounds. So strongly did he express himself that Mrs. Coombs announced that she would withdraw her motion and that she would move instead that this matter be left in the hands of the Executive Committee who could look into it further. This was seconded by Mrs. Arthur G. Smith and carried.

The Treasurer announced that the afternoon offertory was \$40.79. It was moved and carried that both offerings, amounting to \$72.07 go to the Advance Work. Should there be more than enough to make up the deficit, after the returns from the last of Mrs. Littell's lectures are in, the balance is to go to the scholarships of Ernest and Helen.

Next came the pledges. The President announced that printed pledge cards had been provided by the Treasurer and that each pledge was to be put on a separate card. The following amounts were pledged:

Mrs. Littell announced that the Junior Branch of St. Andrew's Auxiliary would serve tea in the Bishop's House and that every one was invited.

After benediction by Bishop Littell the meeting adjourned.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT TO THE THIRTIETH ANNUAL MEETING OF THE HONOLULU BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE NATIONAL COUNCIL

It is again my pleasure and privilege to welcome to the annual meeting of the Honolulu Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, the delegates from all our Branches, the Clergy and visitors. It is a great cause for rejoicing that our Missionaries in this District have, since last Convocation, been strengthened in numbers by at least fifteen and a very special welcome is extended to all the Clergy and their wives and the Church Army men who are attending our Convocation for the first time. The Woman's Auxiliary is happy to have this opportunity of becoming better acquainted with each and every one of them.

The year 1931 was a busy and happy one. Five diocesan Corporate Communion, eight meetings of the Executive Board and four diocesan meetings were held, as well as our annual party in honor of the Faculties of our Mission Schools. Given this year on December 4th at Pa Haoli, it was also a welcome home from General Convention to the District President. On May 4th a meeting was held in honor of the Rev. E. Tanner Brown, Rector elect of St. Clement's Church, and Mrs. Brown, and of Captains Benson and Roberts, the vanguard of the Church Army. On August 27 at Washington Place, a meeting in honor of our delegates to General Convention was held, at which the last gifts to the United Thank Offering were received. On October 20th at Davies' Memorial Hall, to a large and interested audience, Mrs. Littell gave an enthusiastic report of the Triennial meeting in Denver, from which she had just returned. On December 17th we came together again at Washington Place to welcome home our Bishop and to hear his report of General Convention and his extended trip.

On May 14th the President and Educational Secretary attended the annual meeting of the Woman's Council of the Christian Church and on June 2nd a delegation from the Woman's Auxiliary went in a body to the 60th annual meeting of the Women's Board of Missions of the Pacific Islands. We thoroughly enjoyed the interesting addresses and the reports of the splendid work being done by our sister organizations, as well as the delicious luncheons served and the opportunity to greet old friends and make new ones. The service of consecration held in preparation for the World Day of Prayer for Missions was led last year by Mrs. Littell.

I wish to take this opportunity to thank Mrs. Lowrey, our first Vice President, and all our other officers and members for carrying on so efficiently during my absence of three months on the mainland. The President wishes to express at this time her deep sense of appreciation and gratitude to our two veterans in the service of the Auxiliary and the District, our Treasurer and Recording Secretary, our two loyal "Walls". Presidents come and Presidents go but for twelve years these officers have carried on with consecrated devotion and tireless energy. I am sure all our members join with me in thanking them and hoping that the Woman's Auxiliary will continue to have the benefit, for many years to come, of their knowledge and experience. The work of our Educational Secretary, as you will see by her report, has been particularly outstanding and she has kept us all busy and working overtime to keep up with her vision for the educational work.

Last year, on account of General Convention and our desire to have a full representation in Denver, it was impossible to send any delegates to our provincial Synod held in Phoenix, Arizona in May. The President has, for several years, sent a full report of our work, which has always been well received and favorably commented upon, but this year we would like very much to have delegates. The meeting will be in Sacramento, April 20 and 21, and we would be glad to have suggestions of any members who may be in California at that time and able to represent us.

Two new Branches have been started during 1931 and another in 1932. These are Kaiulani Branch at St. John's, By the Sea, Kahaluu, Oahu, and Kapiolani Branch at Hoolehua, Molokai, as well as St. Stephen's Branch at Waiialua, Oahu. Kahaluu Branch is already a strong and lusty infant and we feel sure that they will all three grow to be sources of great help and usefulness to their own Missions, to the District and to the Bishop.

The President and Educational Secretary since last Convocation, have visited the Islands of Kauai and Molokai. According to our By-laws it is the duty of the President or some one appointed by her to visit each Branch in order to promote the interest of the work. To this end it is suggested that a District Travel Fund of not less than \$100.00 a year be inaugurated, to which all Branches be asked to contribute.

Our Treasurer's report, which has been distributed, shows a considerable shrinkage in receipts from the previous two years. Most of this shortage is in the amount given to the Woman's Auxiliary "Special", which last year was our District's share in the Advance Work Program of the General Church, \$3000.00, to be given to Bishop Burlison's work in South Dakota. The two previous years our "Specials" were particularly appealing needs of our own District. Then there has been the unprecedented financial depression, the fast increasing number of calls for help for our Missions re-

cently started, and the fact that many of our most loyal supporters of any Auxiliary special have pledged almost to their limit towards the two immense projects now under way in our District, Iolani School and St. Andrew's Parish Buildings. At the end of 1931 we were nearly one third short of our pledge to Bishop Burleson. The Woman's Auxiliary and the whole District owe a deep debt of gratitude to Mrs. Littell, who in such a delightful way, is making it possible for us to complete this pledge within the near future. Giving to others is a habit that grows and it is a fortunate thing for us that this is so. Our very existence as a Missionary District depends on this habit of giving to others on the part of the people of the whole Church. May we not, once in three years, put aside our own needs and show our appreciation of what the Church is doing for us and for these Islands by joining heartily in the programs for Advance Work sponsored by the National Council and working with vim and enthusiasm for some critically needed work outside our own District?

In the mind of your President at least, the outstanding event of this past year has been General Convention. It was her first experience and she assures you that if she has anything to say about it, it will not be her last! Next time she will be quite content to go as a visitor, but go she must! Thrills of joy and happiness come over me even now whenever I recall the enthusiasm and inspiration of it all, and particularly the United Thank Offering Communion service when I had the honor of placing on the alms basin the check for \$1726.70, Honolulu's share of the total offering. Another experience never to be forgotten, was the Mass meeting that evening, where after hearing our own Bishop's outstanding and stirring address on "The World for Christ", we waited with bated breath, to hear Dr. Franklin, vice President and Treasurer of the National Council, announce the result of the offering, \$1,059,570.12. We delegates to the Triennial meeting feel we should take home to our constituents, not only the actual reports and resolutions of the Findings Committee on the five great subjects studied there by the Woman's Auxiliary, but also the spirit and enthusiasm of these meetings, so that "everywhere the women of the Church may be aroused to consecrate their prayers, their minds and their influence to the hastening of the coming of the Kingdom of our Lord." Copies of the addresses on the five subjects are available and it is suggested by the National Executive Board that they can be used very helpfully along with the recommended study for the year, "Building a Christian Nation."

Our District Branch was proud to have at the Triennial meeting at Denver our full quota of five delegates, as well as two alternates, and particularly happy that they should be so representative of our Church and our Islands. Mrs. Judd, wife of our Governor, our District President, Mrs. Alice Chalmers, representing the Hawaiian

Americans, Miss Helen Tyau, the Chinese Americans and Miss Grace Fukao, the Japanese Americans,—these made up our quota, with Mrs. Littell and Deaconess Swinburne as alternates. May we take this opportunity to thank all who helped to send our racial delegates? We are particularly grateful to Miss Elizabeth Matthews, who, in memory of Miss Sarah Chung, made it possible for Miss Tyau to go and so inspired us with the desire to send the others. It is hoped that each succeeding Triennial will see racial delegates from our Islands, as there is no better way of bringing the possibilities of our work in Hawaii before Headquarters and the people of the Church. At the time when China and Japan as nations were straining at the leash, what better object lesson could be put before the people in Denver than for them to see our girls, daughters of these races, but born and reared in Hawaii, going everywhere arm in arm, the best of friends, with no thought of racial suspicion or hatred?

At the meeting of the delegates from the 8th Province, to the Triennial, I was asked to tell of our work here and was privileged to give a resume of the work our Bishop has been able to accomplish during the eighteen months he had then been with us. Also in Wilmington, Delaware, where I was visiting my daughter and her husband, after General Convention, I had the pleasure of speaking before the combined Bible Classes of men and women in St. John's Episcopal Church on Sunday, October 18th and again on October 20th, to a meeting of thirty Educational Secretaries of the diocese of Delaware. I believe this is an experience and a privilege shared by no one else in this District,—that of speaking in our Bishop's home town, in the Church he attended as a boy, of which his father was rector for many years, and where he was ordained a deacon, telling them of his outstanding work here and what he has already accomplished by his broad vision, his understanding heart and his boundless zeal for the Kingdom of God.

In conclusion let me ask that we keep before us our Presiding Bishop's message, "The World's Adversity is the Church's spiritual opportunity" and that Bishop Johnson said in Denver, "The Woman's Auxiliary stands for the only adventure left,—the Spiritual Adventure". Let us set forth this coming year on this Spiritual Adventure, endeavoring to make ourselves, through prayer and faith in its power, channels for God's Grace.

REPORT OF THE CORRESPONDING SECRETARY

In correlating the work of the various Branches for the past year it is a great pleasure to note that notwithstanding financial difficulties, the work in every Branch has held its own and general-

ly has shown steady gain in interest and work accomplished. Two factors have contributed to this success; First, intelligent activity on the part of all the members and secondly, a willing sacrifice of both time and money.

St. Andrew's which leads in the number of members has had a very busy and prosperous year. Eight monthly business meetings have all been well attended. The members worked enthusiastically for the Persian Garden entertainment, Bridge Party and the Thanksgiving Market. During the year it was deemed advisable to abandon the plans for restoring "Stone House" and though this had been a project long planned for, the same enthusiasm went into the renovating of the Kitchen in the Parish House and this has proven a great joy to all who use it.

St. Clement's shows a marked increase in membership during the year, now numbering 52. The first year since the amalgamation of Guild and Auxiliary has been most successful. As has been the custom for a number of years, 3 orphans at St. Mary's were supported, the Christmas Box which for years has been a joy to the Missionaries in Nenana, Alaska, was provided, and Lenten sewing was done for needy families. All this in addition to getting the rectory in readiness for the new rector and his family.

Iolani Guild also reports a fine year. Through the means of gifts, the Annual Sale, and a poi luncheon, the amount raised was sufficient to meet their regular expenses, pay 2 Caroline Clark scholarships, one at Iolani and one at the Priory and to pay \$100.00 toward the expenses of a delegate to General Convention.

St. Andrew's Jr. Branch reports increased membership and greater spirit of cooperation, thereby making it possible for them to provide clothes for an orphan at St. Mary's. Magazines were collected monthly and distributed to Leahi Home, Queen's Hospital and Seaman's Institute. A silver tea, held in September netted \$37.00. \$10.00 was donated to St. John's by the Sea through the Christmas Cheer Committee. On the Evening of December 22, a Christmas Program was arranged for those of the Seaman's Institute.

St. Peter's has fulfilled all pledges and aside from all they have done to meet these, they have generously supported churches in China. Regular meetings have been held and well attended.

Kainulani Branch formed May 6, 1931, at St. John's by the sea has a membership of 12 earnest workers. Though it is a new Branch with comparatively small membership it shows promise for a bright future. \$100.00 was given toward Bishop Burleson's work, the sum of \$12.41 was given for the U. T. O. Over one hundred dollars was raised from a concert given in October, this they hope to use toward the interior furnishings of a new chapel which they look forward to having.

Christ Church, Kona, with a very small membership has worked diligently during the year to prepare for the Annual Sale held during Easter week. This they hold, to provide for their expenses for

the year. The members sew at home and accomplish a great deal. They contributed a large amount toward the Apportionment for their mission.

All Saint's, Kapaa, reports a continued interest and loyal membership. They have helped this year in reducing their church debt and they are rejoicing that this is now entirely clear. Toys were provided for some 200 Church school children for Christmas. \$71.00 was given to provide chairs for Parish Hall School. Lenten Study Class on India was conducted with an average attendance of nine. This year the members are interested in buying equipment for the kindergarten conducted in the Parish Hall and have also helped with the salary of the teacher. Lenten sewing totaled 66 garments.

St. Augustine's reports a number of removals from their midst during the year, yet in spite of this, they have been able to maintain about the same number of members. They have assisted the church with its apportionment, paying for minor repairs to the rectory and the painting of two rooms. Miss Doreen Bryant, now a resident of Honolulu, Secretary and Treasurer of St. Augustine's for many years, raised by means of small rummage sales, the sum of \$100.00 for the Guild and Auxiliary. Meetings held regularly and attendance very good.

Kamuela Branch numbering 6 members, has met regularly and worked to help toward their Budget Assessments. During the one year of its existence through sales carried on by individual members and by the Group, the Branch made \$220.91. As soon as property entanglements are adjusted they look forward to improving the church grounds, purchasing sign board, altar linens and a new Koa Altar.

Papaaloa has had a most successful year. Eleven meetings held during the year, membership 9, average attendance 8. The expenditures include assessments, contributions to Helen Sue's Scholarship, Bishop Burleson's work, Kusatsu Leper Fund, subscription to the "Spirit of Missions", purchase of curtains, covers and several household utensils for the Rectory at Paauilo where the Church Army men now reside, and a Christmas gift to a bedridden invalid. The members also made up a very acceptable box for the Church Army men at Christmas. A successful rummage sale was held last April and plans for another such sale are under way.

I want especially to compliment the smaller Branches on their accomplishments during the past year. The marked activity of the smaller Branches is the best evidence of an extremely healthy spirit throughout the diocese. May I urge you one and all to carry on in the same fine spirit which is manifest in the work of this past year. Let us remember that the chain is no stronger than its weakest link and we can rejoice in the fact that in this chain there is no such thing as a weak link.

REPORT OF THE EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY

The past year has been an eventful one for the Educational Department of the Diocese of Hawaii, mainly because of the valuable contributions given it by various members of the clergy and the laity. There were four outstanding features in the work throughout the year.

1st. On each Tuesday in Lent at 4:30 in the Cathedral, Canon Kieb gave us an hour of "Meditations". These were deeply spiritual and full of sympathetic understanding.

2nd. "India on the March", being our Lenten Study Book-Classes on India, were led by Mrs. Littell. The subject was most fascinating and we were carried along—vividly—through the Geography, History, Ethnology, romance and poetry of that far away land. The classes being inter-parochial, had a very large and enthusiastic attendance.

3rd. Came Dean Ault's Friday morning half-hour talks on "Church History". Beginning with the "Selection of the Disciples by Jesus Christ", and taking us step by step up to the present day Church and its modern methods. Many spoke of how much these talks meant to them personally—finding in them answers to long asked questions. The attendance was excellent.

4th In October a six week course in Bible Study, with the life of Christ as the special subject, was conducted by Mrs. Littell. Overflowing rooms each morning were proof of just how much people hungered for this particular kind of knowledge.

Other features of the work were evening classes held on "India" for those who could not come in the day time.

Two lectures on the "Old Parish Churches of England", were presented. These lectures were given by Canon Kieb at the Honolulu Academy of Arts. The manuscripts and colored lantern slides used, were sent by request from "The Lantern Slide Bureau" at 281 Fourth Avenue, New York City. We are indebted to the Academy of Arts for their co-operation in the production of these lectures, during The Advent Season.

St. Andrews Parish, being the mother-parish, perhaps received the major share of special programmes. At regular intervals there have been presented the following:

One short reading of "Christ of the Indian Road".

One complete resume of the churches' work in the Philippine Islands with illustrated maps and pictures.

One talk on "The Young People of our Parish".

Another on "Problems Facing General Convention".

Three "Church Quizzes" and a brief summing up of the "Festival Days of the Church" by your Secretary, together with entertaining talks by visitors, have made a full programme.

Through St. Andrews Guild the social hour at one meeting was spent in the presentation of a resume of "Green Pastures" by Mrs. Arthur Withington and her nephew Leonard Withington.

The library, which has been mentioned in past reports, is materializing in a very rapid manner. Mrs. Helen Short has been appointed "Church Librarian" by Bishop Littell and will follow with her report. Leaders in church work need the constant inspiration and refreshed vision which books alone can give. Frequent notices about the library should be posted on the church bulletin board, so that we may keep alive to new books received.

An Educational Conference is now an established part of the Convocation Programme. Mrs. A. S. Baker who had just returned from India spoke for thirty minutes on the subject at our last conference. Also a playlet was put on by the U. T. O. group.

Outside contact with the work has been made by a six day visit; three days as Dean of Women at Mokuleia at the Young People's Conference; several visits to Kahaluu (St. Johns by the Sea, Windward Oahu; one day at Waialua at St. Stephens' Mission, and many visits to Molokai where new work of large proportions is under way.

By request two new books of interest to church people have been ordered, and are now available, at our Public Library, "Common Sense about Religion" and "The Philosophy of the Good Life"

The coming Lenten work has been arranged—and orders from the Church Book House are as follows:

Through the lack of adequate funds in the budget, Educational work must be carried on by interested volunteers, and the field of work having so many ramifications, no volunteer can give the time necessary to face the challenge of today. The need of a salaried educational worker along general lines, with proper maintenance for such an office, we believe will be a step forward for the work in this Diocese, as now it is mainly executive and advisory, with some work thrown in for good measure.

In closing I wish to express my deep gratitude for the co-operation given the educational work through so many avenues, and especially to our Parish President, Mrs. Von Holt, our Diocesan President, Mrs. Thompson, for the sane and wise counsel of Bishop and Mrs. Littell, and for the privilege in having an humble share in carrying on God's Holy Work.

REPORT OF THE UNITED THANK OFFERING SECRETARY

I have received a letter from Miss Grace Lindley containing a copy of the resolution on the United Thank Offering passed at our Denver meeting and she says:

"There are, I think, two thoughts in our hearts as far as the money part of our 1931 United Thank Offering is concerned. We wish it might have been larger and we are very thankful that it is as large as it was. We are right in believing, I am sure, that it was a greater gift than that of three years ago even if it was a lesser figure."

I will now read you the following resolution:

RESOLVED: That the United Thank Offering of 1934 be given to the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society of the Protestant Episcopal Church of the United States of America to be used as follows:

Not over twenty per cent to be appropriated for buildings to be erected in the mission field, to be selected by the Executive Board in consultation with the officers of the National Council, and

Ten per cent of the Offering to be added to the permanent trust fund, the income from which is to be used for the retiring allowances for all women workers under the Missionary Society, and

The balance of the Offering, together with all interest earned thereon, to be used by the Missionary Society for the work of women in the missionary enterprises of the Church, including their training, equipping, sending and support, and for their care when sick or disabled, the appointment of said women having been approved by the Executive Board.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: That all diocesan and district custodians of this consecrated money be urged to turn it over to the Treasurer of the National Council for safe keeping at least semi-annually.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: That we recommend to the National Council that no money for building from the United Thank Offering shall be paid to the field until the plans have been approved by the National Council; also that if within three months of the following Triennial, the money for any project has not been called for and the project begun according to the accepted plan, the money shall automatically revert to the National Council to be added to the amount to be appropriated for buildings from the next United Thank Offering, and we also

RECOMMEND: That through the National Council a fixed retiring allowance for women workers be established as soon as possible.

Since our last annual meeting, we have two new branches with 48 new blue boxes given out.

The different branches have done well, as we sent to the last Triennial \$1,726.70. We are hoping to make a 10% gain by the next Triennial.

The total sum received in Denver last September amounted to \$1,059,570.12. From this amount \$8,000.00 has been given to Iolani School, for a home for the principal.

Those gifts on September 17th were presented joyously and we turn now in the same joyous spirit to plan and work for our Gift of 1934.

Here I would like to make a strong plea that our Japanese interest themselves in this splendid work started by one of their own boys. I will so gladly meet with them and tell them of it and send on any money that they or any others interested may wish to give.

I would like to stress the missionary and spiritual value of the Christmas celebrations by all the missions and to bespeak the continued interest not only of the fifty odd who this year made them possible but of every man and woman in the Church. Go next year to one of them and never again will you willingly stay away nor resist the privilege of contributing to them.

REPORT OF THE CHURCH PERIODICAL CLUB FOR 1931

During 1931 we have subscribed to 65 magazines as against 58 in 1930, and about 17 are being passed on after having been read.

About 1500 miscellaneous magazines and papers were distributed among hospitals, Seamen's Church Institute and our various Island Missions.

No doubt many of our people do pass on their magazines and books after reading, but do not report them. If some one woman in each parish might have this as her special care, those who believe in the work of the Church Periodical Club could report to her when sending their books, etc., and she keep the record and report yearly to the diocesan branch.

As the Church Periodical Club is, in Hawaii, a part of the Woman's Auxiliary, all parishes and missions give money each year through their parish treasurers, but the oversight of magazines, music, records and books needs a parish officer to keep watch on what is being done in that line.

It need not be an arduous task but just a feeling of loyalty to the organization that is responsible for that work in the diocese.

This year, 1931, 135 books have been distributed by St. Andrew's branch in various directions in addition to the 1500 magazines, etc.

Our financial report for 1931 falls about one hundred dollars short of that in 1930, but remembering the many and heavy calls on diocesan purses during the year, we accept that cheerfully, but, of course, cannot do as much in the way of book-buying, etc., as we should like.

REPORT OF THE YOUNG PEOPLES' SERVICE LEAGUE

President and members of the Woman's Auxiliary:

The District Council is a representative body composed of four officers and two representatives from each of the Leagues of the Episcopal Churches of Honolulu. Progress has been the keynote of the year. The financial condition of the Council is the best in its history. We have increased our membership and feel we have encouraged a better understanding and fellowship between the Leagues through our Lenten suppers, the series of eleven Summer Sunday Evening Forums, the Conference at Mokuleia and our winter forums held on the first Sunday of each month. Throughout the year, the District Council has fostered more than twenty opportunities for the young people of the Church to meet under one roof at one time. We were able to contribute \$40.00 to missionary work this past year.

The Young Peoples' Service League is an organization that is active in most of our churches. Worship, Service and Fellowship are the objectives of the Leagues. They have done much to lighten the work of the parish by cleaning brass, assisting in the parking problem, and in some missions, doing all the altar work.

These young people have looked further than their parish. St. Andrew's Sr. League gave \$20.00 to St. Mary's Children's Home for their Thanksgiving dinner. The Jr. group gave the children of St. Mary's a delightful party at Easter. This same group contributed \$170.00 to the Lenten offering, \$150.00 of this amount was raised by selling brown bread. St. Mary's raised enough money to have the kindergarten piano repaired and purchase fresh sand for the children's sandbox. St. Andrew's Sr., Jr., and St. Lukes Leagues each serve supper at the Seaman's Church institute once a month.

I am going to ask that you help further the greatest service the young people have attempted this year. Deaconess Swinburne simply must have a car in her new work. Through the efforts of St. Andrew's Sr. League, \$161.00 has been raised for this purpose. The Jr. League has contributed \$25.00. There is still \$225.00 needed. Won't you help swell this fund? We must realize that this is not for Deaconess Swinburne alone; but look further to the great work she is doing in the advance Mission field. You will help this work, won't you?

CONSTITUTION

Article I

This Society shall be called, **THE HONOLULU BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE NATIONAL COUNCIL.**

Article II

The object of the Society is: By systematic and united effort to diffuse Missionary intelligence, to increase Missionary activity, to promote the study of Missions, and to encourage prayer for Missions among the women of the Missionary District.

Article III

The Church itself is the great Missionary Society, therefore all Baptized women in this District who desire it, and who work for Missions in connection with their parochial organizations, shall be regarded as members of this Woman's Auxiliary, but terms of membership in any Branch may be fixed by that Branch.

Article IV

All Parish and Mission societies of women that so desire, may become branches of this Auxiliary by first obtaining the consent of the Rector or Clergyman in charge, and notifying the President of their intention to work in unison with the Auxiliary.

Article V

The officers shall be: A President, whose term of office shall be three years, and who may be reappointed at the discretion of the Bishop; a First Vice-President, a Second Vice-President and a Third Vice-President. There shall be a Recording Secretary, a Corresponding Secretary, a Treasurer, a Secretary of the Little Helpers, a Directress of the Altar Department, an Educational Secretary, a Secretary of the Church Periodical Club, a Secretary of the United Thank Offering, a Supply Secretary, an Assistant Supply Secretary, and a Secretary for Oriental Work. All of these officers shall be appointed by the Bishop at the annual meeting.

Article VI

The officers of the District Branch and the Presidents of the Parish Branches, or some one appointed by them, shall constitute the Executive Board, which shall have general charge of the work under the direction of the Bishop.

Article VII

The annual meeting shall be held at the time of the Convocation of the Missionary District, and quarterly meetings on such dates and in such places as the President may appoint.

Article VIII

The representatives of five Branches shall constitute a quorum.

Article IX

This Constitution may be amended at any annual meeting, by vote of two-thirds of the Branches represented.

BY-LAWS

1. The duty of the President shall be to call meetings of the Woman's Auxiliary and the Executive Board and to preside over the same. It shall be her duty to see that all new officers are informed of their specific duties.
2. The duty of the Recording Secretary shall be to give notice of meetings, to keep a record of proceedings, and to prepare an abstract of the minutes for the annual report.
3. The duty of the Corresponding Secretary, under the direction of the President, shall be to correspond with the Executive Secretary of The Auxiliary and with the various branches of the District, to collect their reports, to prepare an annual report, and to issue and distribute the same.
4. The duty of the Supply Secretary shall be to furnish each Branch with work, and to keep a record of the number and the value of Boxes sent. She shall also present a report at the annual meeting.
5. The Treasurer shall have the custody of all moneys received by the District Branch and shall collect, if necessary, all sums payable to the same, in pledges made. She shall pay out money on the order of the President, and the Recording Secretary, except such sums as may be received for a definite purpose, which sums she may dispose of without formal direction. All moneys received for purposes outside of the District shall be forwarded to treasurers empowered to receive the same.
6. The Secretary of the Little Helpers, the Directress of the Altar Department, the Educational Secretary, the Secretary of the Church Periodical Club, the Secretary of the United Thank offering, and the Secretary for Oriental Work, shall superintend, foster, and develop by correspondence and otherwise, their several departments on consultation with Diocesan officers.
7. It shall be the duty of the President, or of some person appointed by her to visit, if possible, each Branch in order to promote the interest of the work.
8. It shall be the duty of any Branch, before it discontinues a pledge, which has been made for salary or interest, and which continues year by year, to give a year's notice of its purpose at the annual meeting.
9. Each Branch shall pay yearly to the District Expense Fund such sums as it shall be assessed therefor by the Executive Board. Such payment shall entitle it to seat its delegates and to vote.
10. Each Branch shall pay yearly to the District Altar Fund at least one dollar from the Woman's and fifty cents from the Junior Auxiliary.
11. Each Branch is entitled to seven delegates. If it is impractical to get women as delegates who live in the parish or mission, it is permissible for each Branch to appoint delegates who are resident of Honolulu. If a Branch fails to appoint delegates one week before Convocation, they shall be appointed by the Executive Board.
12. The Secretary and Treasurer of each Branch shall make yearly reports to the Corresponding Secretary and Treasurer of the District Branch, of all work done and money given to Missions within and without this Missionary District, and the value of Boxes sent.
13. The year of the Woman's Auxiliary shall end on December 31st, of each year, the date on which the Parish and Convocational year ends, and all Auxiliary reports shall be made up to that date.
14. These By-Laws may be altered or amended by a majority vote at each annual meeting.
