PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS.

Since our last annual meeting it has been my privilege to attend three large gatherings of women—two in London, England, and one of our own Woman's Auxiliary in connection with the Missionary Council in Milwaukee last October. The two meetings in London were in the interest of woman's work in general, our auxiliary being represented by women from twenty of our Diocesan branches.

The gatherings of the women of the Auxiliary in connection with the Missionary Council are always full of inspiration and encouragement, and those of last autumn were not exceptions to this rule. I sincerely trust that the time is not far distant when the Indiana branch may feel that it is able, and in duty bound, to send at least one delegate to these great meetings.

During last October this Diocese had the honor and the great benefit of a visit from the beloved Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary, Miss Julia C. Emery. She spoke in half a dozen towns in the State, and all who had the pleasure of meeting and hearing her, returned to their work, I am sure, with renewed zeal and courage.

On my return from the Missionary Council Miss Emery and I attended an enthusiastic meeting of the Laporte branch, at which there were several ladies present from Michigan City and two from South Bend.

The 11th of October I had the pleasure of being present at the meeting of the Auxiliary held in connection with the autumn meeting of the convocation of the Central Deanery at Richmond. It was largely attended, and all present showed great interest in the mission work of the Church.

The 19th day of January I count as one of the red letter days of the Auxiliary in Indiana. Upon that day was held the semi-annual meeting of the Auxiliary in St. Stephen's parish, Terre Haute. In every particular it was a great success. Eighteen ladies were present from parishes outside of Terre Haute, and I feel sure that every branch represented reaped great benefit from the meeting. I sincerely hope and pray that this may be the beginning of increased interest in the semi-annual meeting, so that it may become a source of strength and inspiration. Coming as it does in the middle of our year's work, it might, properly used, be to us all like a well of fresh water on our march. Here it is fitting to pause a moment to pay tribute to one who gave her ability to the

Auxiliary and added much to the success of the semi-annual meeting of last January. Mrs. S. E. Taylor, of St. Stephen's, Terre Haute, was always interested in missionary work, and did cheerfully and lovingly her Master's will. In the name of the Auxiliary of the Diocese I extend sympathy to the St. Stephen's branch and we heartily pray God to raise up many, endued with the spirit of her who is gone, to follow faithfully in her footsteps.

January 29th I had the pleasure of visiting for the first time, Peru, and meeting with the Church women of Trinity parish. Truly it did me great good, and gave me much encouragement to find fifty women interested, in this thriving parish, in the work and aims of the Auxiliary. The meeting was a most interesting one, enlivened by a delightfully spicy paper by Mrs. Coolbaugh, the wife of the rector of Trinity, Logansport. Shortly after the meeting, I am happy to say, the rector was able to organize a branch of the Auxiliary in Trinity, Peru, which is now actively at work.

In May I accepted a cordial invitation from the Muncie branch to be present at their meeting. It was not only very pleasant, but I was much impressed with their method of carrying on their monthly meetings. The plan is unique, and I would advise any one anxious to increase interest in such meetings to write to Mrs. C. J. McCullouch, Muncie, for the details and give the method a trial.

There are several matters of great importance to our Auxiliary, as a whole, to be discussed before you this afternoon. On one of these I, as your President, must say a few earnest words. As you all know, on the first of next October, in the city of Washington, will be held the triennial meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the United States. To this meeting I want every woman who possibly can to go. It will do our work the greatest possible good, more, I believe, than any other human help, to have a large number of women from Indiana take part in the sessions of this great convention, where there are thousands of women interested in and enthusiastic for the success of our common care, the missionary work of the Church. At the opening service of this triennial meeting the united offering which the women of the Church have been gathering for three years is laid upon the altar. What part shall we have in that? A larger one than ever before? I trust and pray so, for I feel, and hope that you share the feeling, that our work together during the last three years has been greatly blessed and that as a body it is fitting that we should show our gratitude by our gifts. Many mite boxes for this offering have been distributed throughout the Diocese, and have, I hope, been diligently used. If any of you have been careless in this matter, I beg you to begin now to "lay by in store," that when the Treasurer collects the contents of all our boxes there may be a sum somewhat in

proportion to the blessings we have received both individually and as an organization and a sum of which our delegates may not be ashamed.

One encouraging aspect of our work this year has been the efforts made by the loyal Church women in the smaller parishes and missions to organize branches of the Auxiliary, or to do in some way some missionary work. I think this is due, in a large measure, to the sense of gratitude for the splendid work done by our General Missionary. The reports from the different branches published monthly in the Church Worker have also aided greatly in encouraging these endeavors.

Before closing my review of our year's work together, I wish to express my personal appreciation of and gratitude for the kind, loyal and untiring services of the women of the Executive Board, and also particularly to record my high regard for the efficient work done by Mrs. Meredith Nicholson in the matter of the Diocesan paper. The Auxiliary is also indebted to Mrs. Nettie Ransford for her kind courtesy in doing much printing, and I take pleasure in acknowledging this debt of gratitude.

And now I wish you every one God speed in her particular work, praying God to bless you and to bless the endeavors of us all, and to increase the missionary zeal in our Diocese where it is so much needed.

The foregoing figures show that of the 27 auxiliary branches in the Diocese 23 have reported. Of the remaining five, Bristol has never reported since your present Secretary has been in office, and repeated efforts have failed to elicit any information as to the life of the branch there, which is kept on the roll as "missing," because no one has reported it dead.

The branch in Trinity, Peru, is of very recent organization, and had therefore but little to report. This is the only new branch added during the year just closed. It is strong, earnest and working along the right lines, so that good things may be expected of it. Work looking to the organization of branches has been done in Lima, Anderson and Bluffton, in all of which places it is hoped soon to make a beginning.

Your Secretary has written during the year 259 letters and 52 postals, making an average of 11 14-27 communications to each branch during the year. If such of these communications as require answers could receive them with reasonable promptness, or even at all, the Secretary's labors would be much lightened, and, what is of more importance, the work of the Auxiliary would be greatly advanced.

This inattention to letters works real hardship where they are written regarding the missionary boxes. Appeals for those are sent out with letters from the missionaries describing their needs and giving lists and measurements, with requests that these be returned promptly if the branch appealed to can not undertake the work. In the majority of cases the matter is duly and carefully attended to, but in others, as two this year, a solemn and impenetrable silence falls upon the officers of the branches. Your Secretary writes again and again to no avail. She contemplates telegraphing, and may be driven to it, but finally she subsides. Then the end of the year comes, the reports from the dumb officers arrive and there has been no box sent. In the meantime some missionary or hospital has been suffering for the supplies which the officers at headquarters are depending on Indiana to send. One would suppose that where a sense of duty and humanity did not influence, State pride would prevent such careless indifference.

There has been a marked improvement in the business methods of the Auxiliary women during the past year, but there is still room for re-

form in the matter of answering communications. Let no one fancy this is a feminine peculiarity, for the reports which were the last to arrive and the hardest to get came, with one exception, from the clergy.

Though no advance has been made along material lines, there has been what is really of more value, a spirit of unity developed in the Auxiliary and an *esprit de corps* which are a source of great strength. These manifest themselves in the readiness with which all enter into a common plan, in the entire willingness to accept suggestions from the General Board, but particularly were they apparent at our last annual meeting and at the semi-annual meeting in Terre Haute. With such a spirit our labors can not fail of success.

There is one matter on which there still seems to remain some ignorance, namely, the proper work for an Auxiliary Branch. A moment's consideration of the name of the general organization would dispel this—"The Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions." You can not be auxiliary to the Board of Missions by doing parish work, though your parish may be a mission, and yet two of our branches in flourishing parishes report that they have done only parish work. Of course, they have no real right to their name. One might as well claim the name of philanthropist for taking care of his own children because they belong to a poor man.

The guilds have gone on in the even tenor of their way, doing noble, efficient work. The fruits of their efforts have not been quite so great as last year, but this is attributable to local causes in some of our larger parishes.

If our cause admitted under any circumstances of discouragement, reason could not be found for it in this report. It calls only for humble thankfulness to Him who has given us, in some measure, "the spirit to think and to do such things as are right and grace and power faithfully to fulfill the same." In His name and strength alone can we do anything that is good, and working in His name and strength success of the highest kind is assured.

"CHURCH WORKER" REPORT.

In the early fall Bishop White announced to the Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary that he had entered upon an agreement for the printing of the Diocesan paper, which he hoped would prove advantageous in several ways. For several years Dean Hunter had labored most faithfully, both in editing and managing the circulation of the "Church Worker," but for some time he had been unable to make the amount paid in for subscriptions cover the expenses of publication. Year after year there was a deficit which the Bishop had to meet. Therefore, he welcomed the proposition which was made to him by one of the local printers to take the problem of the cost of publication off his hands. A contract was entered upon whereby the printer was to secure a sufficient number of advertisements to defray his own expenses, and all money received in subscription was to be left to the disposition of the Bishop.

At this point Bishop White was prompted to ask the aid of the Woman's Auxiliary. The Auxiliary is, as we all know, primarily a missionary society, and the Bishop believed that in its hands the "Church Worker" might become an efficient missionary agency. Certainly those who know most about the Church's work are those who are most interested in the Church, and the object of all good Church papers is to stimulate and arouse such interest. Among the 7,000 or 8,000 communicants in the State it is safe to say that only an insignificant number ever see a Church periodical or know anything about current Church matters outside of a single parish or mission. The "Church Worker" is designed to keep all in touch with the fuller life of the Church at large (with its monthly bulletin of Church conditions in Indiana and its clippings from the more ambitious publications). Bishop White feels that it should be read in every Church family in the State, and he has hoped that the Woman's Auxiliary could do much toward bringing this about.

He therefore asked the Executive Board to take charge of the "Worker's" subscription list and to use every effort to increase its circulation. At the same time he was enabled by his new printer's contract to give to the Auxiliary all the receipts from paid subscriptions, with the understanding that these be devoted to the most important single object now before the Auxiliary, the Archdeacon's salary.

The effort has been made to secure the services of some one devoted woman in every parish and mission in the State—of some one who would make every effort to bring the people of her Church home to an appre-

ciation of the importance of informing themselves about the Church in Indiana and of the value of a monthly Diocesan paper as a means to this end.

Upon the mailing list of the "Church Worker" are many people who have never paid a subscription, but whose names have been added from time to time in the hope of interesting them. It is not the purpose of the Board to remove anyone from the list, although there is no doubt that those who pay the exceedingly small subscription price care more for the paper and its news than those who get it for nothing. But the Board has wished to appeal individually to everyone, hoping that many would be moved to subscribe and thus indirectly to add to the Archdeacon fund—or whether they paid a subscription or not if the "Worker" came to them that they would receive it graciously and read it.

Within the last three months a department of parish notes has been added through the efforts of the Board. This also has been done by enlisting the aid of some one woman as correspondent in each parish or mission. It is hoped that this will add materially to the efficiency of the "Worker" as an index of Church activity in the State.

Because the Board thoroughly appreciated the efforts of the faithful women who have made the appeals and the collections for the "Church Worker" during the past winter, I read the names of those who have charge of the subscription list in the several parishes and missions; and I wish to express to them gratitude for their help. Their task has been no easy one. It has had to be in a large degree educational, for in many places there seems to be no conception of the value or the aims of a Diocesan paper. By the end of next year it is to be hoped that the entire Auxiliary will be interested in the effort to secure for the "Church Worker" a careful monthly reading in every household connected, however remotely, with the Church. Such an effort falls well within the province of the Auxiliary, which is missionary, not only in the sense of providing support for those who go forth to preach the gospel, but also in the matter of spreading information concerning the work that is being done by the Church in Indiana or elsewhere.

A great deal of correspondence has been entailed by the effort to secure local collectors. I have written 357 personal letters, 21 postal cards and I have sent out 200 printed circulars. The postage has amounted to \$11.10. I have secured some one to take charge of the list in 56 places. I have failed to do so in Frankfort, South Bend, Aurora, Franklin, Lima, North Liberty, Crawfordsville, Valparaiso. Is there not some one who can tell me to whom to turn for assistance in these towns? From the Auxiliary everywhere the Board would ask hearty co-operation in this effort to increase the effectiveness of the Diocesan paper.
