The Annual Meeting

The Annual Meeting of the Indianapolis Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary was held in All Saints' Cathedral on Wednesday, May 19, 1915.

The session opened with the service of the Holy Communion, the Bishop of the Diocese being celebrant, assisted by the Rev. W. C. Otte, the Rev. G. G. Burbank, the Rev. R. R. Sloane, and the Rev. H. C. Goodman. The sermon was preached by Archdeacon Plummer, from the text, "Behold I have set before you an open door," and was a most thoughtful and inspiring discourse. At the close of this service the Auxiliary adjourned to the Diocesan Rooms, where the President, Miss Howland, called the meeting to order. The Bishop gave a hearty welcome to those present and a few words of good advice.

Thirty-one delegates responded to the roll call.

The President named the nominating committee to prepare a ticket for the election of officers, the committee named being Mrs. O. N. Torian, Mrs. Whiteside, Mrs. Farrington, and Miss Niblack.

Reports covering the work of the year were then made by the various Secretaries and Treasurers.

After a very good and substantial luncheon, served by the ladies of the Cathedral, the President gave her address, which was quite to the point and full of good advice.

The Auxiliary women were interested to hear also of the work of the Cathedral Building Association and that of Knickerbacker Home from Mrs. Spruance and Miss Perry and something as to the history of the Church League of the Baptized from Mrs. Pratt. The question of sending delegates to the Provincial Synod to be held at Chicago in October was discussed, and, on a vote, decided in the affirmative. The delegates appointed by the

President's Address

*Right Reverend Father in God and Fellow Members of
the Woman's Auxiliary:*

Since I stood before you a year ago the whole world is changed. In a moment, in the twinkling of an eye, the humanitarianism that we thought we had made so strong for ourselves, the high intelligence that the nations have spent many years and more millions to diffuse over the face of the earth, have become agencies of doubtful value—all, in fact, of the civilization in which we trusted seems but a broken reed. Like the disciples on the Mount of Ascension, we find ourselves standing, sick at heart, gazing up into heaven after our Lord who seems to have withdrawn himself. As with them so with us: the withdrawal is only apparent, and we are witnessing, if we have but eyes to see it, the most stupendous exaltation of Christianity that history has to show; for what is more clearly manifested in the midst of this awful welter of crime than the fact that art, literature, science, material prosperity, strength, capacity, commercial integrity, do not save a nation from its own baser self; that to adopt a wholly anti-Christian philosophy means to cut off oneself from the life-giving stream, means the loss of joy, peace, safety? This fact needs emphasis, because it is obscured for us by the equally indisputable fact that if Christianity had completely triumphed there could be no war, which is merely to say that just so far as nations have failed to enter into their heritage they have suffered. Just so far as they have entered in, they have escaped degradation and have gained, by even an imperfect acceptance of Christian ideals, a vision which exalts and strengthens.

But why say this to you, women of the Woman's Auxiliary, so removed as we are, as yet, from the strife, so

remote as seem at first glance our small affairs from the struggle of states? For several reasons: because, in the first place, we all need heartening at times, and never more than when we hear on all sides that the religion which we are working to spread over the face of the earth, has failed, and when we have to admit that it has made less progress than we hoped it had. Secondly, I wish to suggest to you an answer to the eager critics of Christianity (and particularly of missions), an answer that you have doubtless long since used but your faith in which you may be glad to have strengthened by the knowledge that it seems good to another woman. Thirdly, because we need all to realize that these tremendous events that are happening are merely transitory, that while they seem so big and so important, there are less spectacular things that outlast them, that when "the captains and the kings depart" there still stands "Thine ancient sacrifice, a broken and a contrite heart," and that in them and through them and after them remains the humble handmaid, Duty. Moments of exaltation, experiences of transcendent power gain value for us only from the inspiration they supply,—inspiration to nobler living, to more serious thinking, to more self-forgetting devotion to duty. You remember that the disciples who wished to build tabernacles on the Mount of Transfiguration, there to abide with our Lord, and Moses and Elias were not allowed to do so, but instead were led down from the mountain to the prosaic healing of the rather disgusting case of the epileptic. So I would gladly help you to realize, not only that Duty awaits us at the foot of the mountain, but that we who are living, not in moments but in years of great exaltation, should be inspired by them to a devotion such as we have never known before to our religious duties of every sort, but that particularly we should be urged, driven, by every motive that stirs the heart of woman, love of God, of Home, of Country, of Children, to work, without rest, that the Kingdom of Christ may cover the earth as the waters cover the sea.

If we are to do any effective work to this end more than

we have done in the past, it seems to me that we must undertake some sort of personal aggressive missionary work each in her own field. This is the step I should like to see the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of Indianapolis take immediately. Just what the work shall be and how it shall be done must be decided in each parish by those who work therein, but that opportunities offer themselves everywhere to those who are willing to improve them there can be no doubt. Nor is it more doubtful that if we will not do the thing that lies ready to our hand, we have not the true missionary spirit, and that what we do for missions afar off shall take on a commercial character that will greatly lessen its value as a spiritual force. We discuss from time to time the reason for the very limited interest in the work of the Auxiliary and the slowness of its growth in numbers. The blame is laid frequently at the door of the clergy, where I am firmly convinced it partly belongs, since I have never yet known a parish where the rector was in earnest about the work of missions which had not a comparatively flourishing Auxiliary. Many reasons for the sad facts are given, all of which contain some truth; but after years of observation and of thought I have come to the conclusion that the work we try to interest people in is, in a sense, too much in the air. That this at least partly explains our difficulty is proved by the experience common everywhere in regard to securing contributions for a missionary box. There is rarely any difficulty in getting ample supplies for any box undertaken by a parish, and this is not because women are more interested in supplying material wants than providing that the other needs of humanity may be attended to; but because, when a box is to be filled, they know exactly what they are doing, where their contributions go, what the needs of the people are in that place, and just how far the help sent has relieved the need. There is nothing new about this idea for we have been told for years that if people knew about missions there would be no trouble in getting them to give for missions, which is perfectly true; but how are we to get

people to know about missions? You can not make grown people study a subject that does not interest them, and just here is the rub concerning all missionary literature, all study classes. They furnish information and inspiration to the people who are already partly informed and inspired; the indifferent let them severely alone. I wonder if we could not do more by getting people to work as a means of interesting them in missions instead of, as we have been doing, interesting them in missions as a means of getting them to work? Comparatively few women can leave the places in which they have been set to go to a distant missionary field, but ignorance, want (both spiritual and physical), are at our very doors, and are no less worthy of our attention than the work in foreign lands or work which can be made to show in our reports. I am not forgetful of the fact that we are Auxiliary to the Board of Missions; I am only suggesting such work as an addition to what we are doing and as a means of education for ourselves that we may do the work the Board asks more fully and readily, and may attract more women to the great campaign.

When I say that I am suggesting this as something additional, I am fully aware that by that admission I shall raise antagonism, that there will immediately arise the immemorial chant, "We haven't time, we haven't time. We are doing all we can, we are doing all we can." In most cases I will admit that we have no time is perfectly true; but why have we no time? Isn't it because we mismanage or misapply what we have? To a very great extent the American woman has allowed herself to become enthralled by a machine, and to be dominated by things. The social machine, the domestic machine, have caught her in their tireless wheels and round and round she is whirled so fast that she has lost all sense of direction and does not realize that she is getting nowhere. That she is moving and moving rapidly she is fully aware, so, since she does not realize that by her own volition she could stop the mad whirl, she is perfectly honest in telling those who appeal for her time and in-

terest that she has no time. Neither does she realize how she is dominated by things: "Late and soon, getting and spending, we lay waste our powers. We have given our hearts away, a sordid boon," until it sometimes seems as if the mass of our countrywomen were deteriorating into a kind of human things. The situation is humiliating, that children of God should carelessly give up their freedom. I do not mean to urge upon you a narrow or an arid life; all sides of our nature need development, the intellectual, social and æsthetic as well as the spiritual; but do you not yourselves realize that most of us spend so much time and strength in getting ready to live that we never really live fully at all? So I beg of you that before you say that you have not time to undertake any more work for the Kingdom of God, you will study well how you are using what time is given you and will dominate the situation; not be dominated by it.

Whether it is this feeling of being overworked or whether it is modesty that deters women it is hard to say, but there certainly is a growing and a most embarrassing unwillingness on the part of most of you to accept office in the Diocesan Auxiliary. There is much work for a conscientious member of the Diocesan Board, whether or not she is able to attend many of the monthly meetings. She can serve as a center of light and heat—in short a power plant—not only for her own parish but for the neighboring towns, and thus enable the Board to reach places it otherwise can in nowise affect. By correspondence such a non-resident member can give the Board the benefit of her advice and suggestions, if they must be deprived of the inspiration of her presence. But to do this the woman who accepts office must not do so with the idea that she is going to be a figurehead, but she must be earnestly desirous of not only filling the place assigned her but of making much of that place. The Board feels greatly the need of such help, and even more deeply the fact that woman after woman annually declines to give it. Don't, therefore, I beg you, if your name appears on the list soon to be presented by the nominating

committee, immediately begin to think of some excuse for withdrawing it; but instead, plan as rapidly as possible how you can manage to do what may be asked of you, remembering that each of us is bound by the most solemn vows to work and to work hard. There is very little danger that any of us will overwork—that is an almost impossible thing to do if one but keeps serene at her task and does not weaken herself by self-pity. There ought to have grown up among us in all these years a desire for the honor of hard places, a willingness to work beyond the first fatigue to the point where the modern psychologists tell us one gets her second wind. Instead of this soldierly hardness there seems to be a growing desire to avoid labor and responsibility and to think that to say one is tired is sufficient excuse. It is the poorest of poor excuses. Of course one is tired—that is merely a sign that one has worked, not that one should stop.

I have not reviewed the past year's work because you have heard the main points of that work rehearsed in the various reports from which you can draw your own conclusions, about which you will have your own emotions. I only hope that you will not indulge in two deadening feelings, discouragement and content. Looking backward, we have much to be thankful for, some things to be proud of; looking forward, we see tasks so numerous and so important as to call out and stimulate to their utmost all our faith and powers. We can see as never before how the fate of nations depends on the Christianizing of the world. Already in the midst of the whirlwind men are listening for the still, small voice. How can they hear without a preacher. How can they preach except they be sent?

Think, I beseech you, on these things when in a few moments you make your pledges, and throughout the year when you make your plans.

MAY, 1914—MAY, 1915

September 29—The Michaelmas Luncheon. The speaker was Octave Thanet, better known to some as Miss Alice French, of Davenport, Iowa.

February 26 to March 26—The Lenten Study Class, Friday mornings. Subject, "Noted Women of the Bible."

Lenten Work—The idea of a diocesan missionary Lenten box came to us from the Diocese of Kentucky, and proved a great success, the box going to Epiphany Mission, Sherwood, Tennessee.

The Union meetings of the year were held at St. George's Church, with Miss Tillotson as the speaker; St. David's Church, with an address from Mrs. Goodman; St. Paul's Church, with stereopticon views of the United Offering field of work, and Christ Church, with the Reverend Doctor Morro, of Butler College, as the speaker.

May 20—A generous courtesy was extended the Auxiliary by Mrs. Edward F. Hodges, who entertained at the Claypool Hotel the members of the retiring Board, and the delegates to the Annual Meeting.

Lent, February 19—Quiet Day at the Cathedral. The Bishop of the Diocese conducting.

Miss Emily L. Upfold, daughter of Bishop Upfold, and founder of the Woman's Auxiliary, died on Monday, July 19, 1915, at the age of eighty years.

Report of the Corresponding Secretary

Report of the Junior Auxiliary

1914—1915

The past year has been, in many ways, a most encouraging one in the Junior Auxiliary. Two new branches have been formed, one in Trinity Church, Anderson, and one in Grace Church, Muncie, making the total number of branches fourteen. The Juniors of All Saints' Cathedral have been reorganized, under the efficient leadership of Mrs. Francis, and now have the three sections, with two divisions of Sec. II. Christ Church, Indianapolis, and St. John's, Lafayette, also have the three sections. St. George's, Indianapolis, has Sections I and II, Sec. III in this branch working with the Woman's Auxiliary. St. David's, Indianapolis, has a flourishing Boys' Branch. The total membership is two-hundred-forty-seven, a gain of thirty-one during the year.

On Friday and Saturday, January 15th and 16th, an Institute for the Junior Leaders and older Juniors was held in the Cathedral. Eight branches were represented, with an attendance of sixteen. Each day began with a celebration of the Holy Communion; Miss Grace Lindley, Associate Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary, conducted study classes in "Building the City" and the "Gospel of St. Matthew"; a conference on "Methods of Junior Work" proved of great help to the Leaders; and the "Quiet Hour," with a talk on the "Spiritual Life of the Junior" by Bishop Francis, was a fitting close to two very helpful days. The luncheon on both days was served by the Cathedral branch of the Woman's Auxiliary.

The fifth Annual Meeting of the Juniors was held in St. David's Church, Indianapolis, on Saturday, May 1st. The number of delegates was seventy-nine, representing all the branches in Indianapolis, Muncie and Lafayette.

The Bishop, two of the clergy, and several members of the Woman's Auxiliary were also present. The meeting began with a short service conducted by the rector of the parish. Roll call followed, then the secretaries of the different branches gave most interesting reports of the year's work.

The rector gave the Juniors a most cordial welcome to St. David's, then followed addresses by Miss Howland, President of the Woman's Auxiliary, on the "Relation between the Woman's Auxiliary and the Juniors"; by Mr. Stanley, the rector of Christ Church, on the work of the Juniors, and by the Bishop on St. Luke's Hospital, Tokyo, for which the Juniors are going to work during the summer. Luncheon was served by the Juniors of St. David's and, during the noon hour, a most helpful conference for the Leaders was held.

At the beginning of the afternoon session, upon nomination by the Bishop, Miss Deborah D. Moore was unanimously elected Treasurer of the Juniors. All money given by the Juniors will be sent to her, and by her sent to its proper destination. Having a separate treasurer for the Junior Auxiliary is an experiment, but it is hoped that, in this way, the reports of the officers in the Woman's Auxiliary and in the Junior Department will coincide.

Mrs. Goodman then gave the Juniors a most interesting talk on "Child Life in Mexico," illustrating her talk with articles of Mexican wearing apparel. The meeting adjourned to meet next year, either in Christ Church, Indianapolis, or in St. John's, Lafayette.

We are still far from our aim of having a branch of the Juniors in each parish and mission in the Diocese, but this year we have no lapses to report, and, if we can have a distinct gain of two new branches each year, the time will not be far distant when our aim will be realized.
