MINUTES OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY OF THE DIOCESE OF KENTUCKY

May 27th, 1910.

REPORT OF RECORDING SECRETARY.

There were regular quarterly Board meetings of the Woman's Auxiliary held in October, December, February and May, at St. Andrew's Church, St. John's Church, St. Paul's Church and St. Thomas' Mission respectively, with a good attendance at each.

At the October meeting the apportionment letter was read. It was the same as last year, \$750.00 from the Women, \$100.00 from the Juniors' and \$75.00 from the Babies. The Juniors and Babies have paid theirs in full and we come to this meeting with the entire amount pledged.

The Corresponding Secretary read a letter from Miss Emery of hearty appreciation of our Silver Thank Offering. Letters of thanks from Miss Emery, Miss Lees, of St. Mark's Hospital and Mr. Roberts, of Wind River, Wyoming, about our Lenten work were read.

It was decided that the Board would meet always in one place instead of at the different churches after we had finished the present rotation.

Miss Robinson offered a resolution expressing our deep sense of loss and great sympathy in the death of the President of the Grace Church Branch, Miss Adelaide Rogers.

At the December meeting, Mrs. Muscoe Burnett, of Paducah, and Miss Jennie Glass, of Hopkinsville, were unanimously elected Vice-presidents of the Board. Both of these accepted before the next meeting. The constitution was finally finished and ordered printed.

It was decided to send our Lenten work to Alaska for the Indian Missions near Allakaket and Eagle. Miss Rob-

inson was asked to make out a program for Mission study during Lent.

At the March meeting great anxiety was expressed over the cost of the freight to the interior of Alaska, but Mrs. Woodcock asked us to take it on faith that these expenses would be met. This faith was more than justified as the boxes were all sent absolutely free through the kindness of Mr. McKellar, of the Southern Railway.

Two new branches, one of Women at Trinity Church and one of Babies at St. Thomas' Mission were reported. At the May meeting, a letter was read from Miss Emery asking that in electing Diocesan Officers only those should be elected who are competent to take part in the Triennial. The Corresponding Secretary was requested to write to the Bishop asking him to address the annual meeting. This being the year of the Triennial, it was decided that the offering at this meeting should be applied to the United Offering.

There was a united meeting on October 26th at St. Andrew's Church to hear Dr. Meyers speak on her work in China. The collection, amounting to \$14.72 was given to Dr. Meyers for this work.

Another united meeting was held at St. Andrew's on January 31st at which Mrs. George Sherwood Eddy spoke most entertainingly of her work in India. There were united meetings held on the six Fridays in Lent, at which the following talks were given:

"Missions—the Fulfillment of Our Lord's Prayer, Thy Kingdom Come," by Miss Robinson.

"The Claim of Foreign Missions and the Church in the Foreign Field," by Mrs. Johnson.

"Fields once Foreign, now Domestic," by Mrs. J. P. Love.

"Alaska under the Development of Twenty Years," by Mrs. Engelhard.

"A Flying Visit to the Respective Missions of Alaska," by Mrs. Leslie Brown.

"Missions, The Bond Between Christ and His Church,"
by Miss Robinson.

The collections amounted to \$56.48, which was sent with other money to Bishop Rowe.

Minutes of the Annual Meeting.

The Twenty-sixth Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions was held in St. Mark's Church on Friday, May 27, 1910, at 9:30 A. M. There was a celebration of the Holy Communion with a short address by the Bishop. The meeting then adjourned to the Crescent Hill Branch Library for its business session.

Mrs. Woodcock opened the meeting with the request that the Corresponding Secretary send a note to the President, Mrs. Dudley, expressing our regret that she was out of the city and the hope that she would be greatly benefitted by her trip.

The Recording Secretary read a report of the Board meetings and United meetings held during the year.

Mrs. Adams, the Corresponding Secretary, read a resume of the work for the year, which showed a total value of \$3,982.65. Miss Anderson, the Diocesan Treasurer, read her report. These reports were all accepted and ordered filed.

Mrs. Glazebrook, Custodian of the United Offering, reported \$1,066.98 on hand, which with the two collections of this meeting makes \$1,114.59.

Mrs. Woodcock, Chairman of the Extension Committee, reported 24 branches, 3 of which are new this year. There are 577 members of the Woman's Auxiliary in this Diocese.

Mrs. Brown, Secretary of the Juniors, read a detailed report of this department. Its apportionment is paid.

Miss Semple, Secretary of the Babies' Branch, reported the apportionment paid.

Mrs. Love, Correspondent of the Church Periodical

Club, made a report and a short address on this branch of the work. She urged all members to send their periodicals promptly and regularly.

Mrs. Adams, Chairman of Committee on Lenten Work, read a report of the things sent to Alaska.

These reports were all accepted and will be published in full in the annual report which may be had by applying to the Corresponding Secretary.

Mrs. Woodcock announced that the election of officers was now in order. Miss Robinson asked that the clause about election in our constitution be set aside this year, and that the present officers be re-elected in a body. This was seconded and then made unanimous and resulted as follows:

Miss Emery's annual letter was read. It was full of congratulation for the work already done and of encouragement for the future.

The election of delegates to the Triennial meeting in Cincinnati was discussed and the resolutions of the Connecticut branch read. This provides for five delegates to be appointed by the Bishop or elected by the Diocesan officers. We decided that we would vote for these resolutions when the question came up in Cincinnati instead of offering others. This will be the last year that this question will be left to each Diocese to decide for themselves, so Mrs. Musson suggested that all Diocesan officers be considered delegates this year. This was approved.

The business was hurried so as not to rush Mrs. Hopkins, who had come from Chicago to make an address. She spoke most enthusiastically about the United Offering, how it had increased from less than eighty-two dollars (\$82) in 1886 to over two hundred and twenty-five thousand dollars (\$225,000) in Richmond in 1907. She urged Kentucky to raise fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500.00) for the offering in Cincinnati in October.

When she had finished, Mrs. Woodcock asked Dr. Hopkins to have the noonday prayer for Missions and to make a short address.

REPORT OF CORRESPONDING SECRETARY.

Several hundred letters have been received and answered. Five hundred copies of the Annual Report of 1909, and five hundred copies of the Constitution distributed.

Received from Treasurer, for postage and stationery, \$6.10.

The Alaska box, valued at \$1,035.25 and fourteen boxes at \$588.11, have been sent during the year; also, \$179.00 that has not passed through the hands of the Diocesan Treasurer.

These with the Apportionment, Specials, United Offering, the Juniors and the Babies, make a total of \$3,982.65, the amount of work done by the Auxiliary in the past year.

LENTEN WORK.

Much interest was taken in the Alaska box. First, because our old friend, Miss Carter, at Allakaket, was to be the recipient, as well as Mr. Burgess, at Eagle.

Nineteen of the twenty-three branches contributed, and nearly every organization of women in the Church, through its Auxiliary, sent a liberal donation.

There were seven large boxes, valued at \$1,035.25, and through the exceeding kindness of Mr. R. L. McKellar and Mr. E. L. Oliver, of the Southern Railroad, we were enabled to send these boxes free of charge. Four went to Deaconess Carter, two to Mr. Burgess, and some few articles of second-hand clothing, that the committee did not consider warm enough for Alaska, were sent to Uniontown.

The packing was done at St. Andrew's, and the committee wishes to thank, not only every woman, who so kindly helped, but Mr. Lee Lewis, of the John C. Lewis Co., for all the boxes, and the packer, without whom we would have been completely at sea.

Miss Emery writes, "You have certainly done well by

Alaska," and adds that she will think up a fine general box for us for next Lent. So, dear women, be prepared.

REPORT OF THE JUNIOR AULIXIARY.

The work of the Juniors during the past year, thanks to our faithful Directors, has been more than satisfactory, and in order that the leaders may speak for themselves, the Secretary's report will be but brief.

The meetings of the Advisory Board have been but four, instead of eight as heretofore, but a full attendance at each meeting speaks of the interest and earnestness of our members. The Bible instruction has been continued under Miss Tyler's splendid leadership and all have greatly enjoyed the course. Our Junior Day, November 30th, was a marked success. The gifts for the United Box, several hundred in number, were sent to the Cathedral in the forenoon, where they were arranged for exhibition. At 3:15 the children assembled for their first Annual Meeting. There were 150 present. The roll was called by parishes and each tiny Secretary gave her own report. At 3:45 the children were dismissed for a short recess and at 4:00 they re-assembled for their Annual Service. 'Twas splendid! The music was full of enthusiasm and the Bishop's address was an inspiration.

On the following morning the gifts were packed and shipped to the Sunday-school of the Holy Cross, Valle Crucis, N. C.

We are welcoming, this year, four new Directors, two of whom are starting new work. One branch is among the younger girls of Calvary, and one among the boys of St. Mark's and these added to the lay helpers already in the field make quite a goodly number.

Our boys! And what Missionary work have we awaiting them when they are no longer tiny. In a few years they will resent being classed as Juniors.

Because our Junior Day was such a success, we have closed our work this year, with a united effort in the form of a Missionary Play, in which each branch was represented. 'Twas given in the new Parish House of the Church of the Advent, May 21st and 23d. A description of the play, "The Little Pilgrims and the Book Beloved," would be wholly inadequate to give one the faintest conception of its beauty and helpfulness. 'Tis hoped that many of our people were so fortunate as to see its presentation. The children certainly entered into the spirit of the play heart and soul and to most of us I believe 'twas nothing short of a revelation.

In our former reports, we have offered only a tabulated form of money expended; but to me, this is such a very small part of the work, that I've asked each Director to tell of her progress along educational lines; and this is what came in response to the appeal:

ADVENT.

The course of Mission study is as follows: Each week for five minutes before closing, we have a lesson on the Missionary Catechism. This is omitted on the last Thursday of each month, for this is our open meeting. At this time we take the life of one of our Missionary Bishops--usually in the form of a story, which we try to have memorized; this is followed by something about his work. At the close a Missionary Play is given, the object being, to

make more realistic this work for others. To this meeting we invite all who are interested, but especially the parents of the children. The study work in St. Thomas' Mission is very similar to that of the Mother Church.

CATHEDRAL.

Several stories have been read from the Young Christian Soldier and during the Lenten season, a course of Missionary instruction was pursued.

GRACE.

Our children have been divided into four classes; each class taking the name of a Missionary Bishop and endeavoring to learn as much as possible, about the people, the country, and the Missionary Work being done in the district. The last meeting of each month is given entirely to Missionary instruction, the classes, in turn, taking charge of the meetings, each having an opportunity to send a messenger, in costume, to tell of the work being done by his Bishop.

We have had two Missionary plays during the year, to impress the children with the spiritual side of the work. One of these was given at the time of the packing of the Xmas box and the other, at the end of the Auxiliary year.

OUR MERCIFUL SAVIOUR.

We have divided the course of study into five parts: The History of the Church, The Missionary Catechism, The Life and Work of Bishop Ferguson, The Prayer Book and The Study of Missions in General.

ST. ANDREW'S.

The course is divided into three parts. The Missionary Catechism, A Study of the Work in the Fields to Which We Contribute and a Study of the Work in the Mountains of Our Own State, particularly at Corbin.

ST. MARK'S.

The girls are preparing a course of reading on the work of the Missionary Bishops, supplemented by work upon Missionary scrap books.

The boys are taught as much as possible about the Mission for which they are working; the name of the Bishop, the condition of the people and the country where the Mission is situated and as many interesting facts as are obtainable.

And here we have the splendid record of 258 children, who are receiving definite Missionary instruction, and isn't this worth while. Our heartiest appreciation to the faithful leaders.
