5. Secretaries will please send a letter to the missionary, as soon as the box has been dispatched, stating date of shipment. The address of the sender inside the box is always advisable.

6. The Secretary would consider it a special favor if all annual reports could be typewritten.

REPORT OF WOMAN'S AUXILIARY BOARD OF MISSIONS,

By the President Pro Tem.

For many weeks now the various diocesan branches of the Women's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions have been holding their annual meetings. In every instance there are many evidences of increased zeal, deeper devotion and a wider vision of the world-wide opportunities. Bishop Francis said in his address to the Indianapolis Branch: "Every Auxiliary woman ought to be of the highest type the Church can produce."

The year has brought to us many blessings in our work. Miss Emery's unexpected visit at the time of the Golden Jubilee of Missions, was a great help and inspiration. Many valuable suggestions were given at our Diocesan and Parochial Officers' Meeting, with our General Secretary.

By dear Miss Robinson's great ability and spiritual insight, a fine, strong plan was outlined under the three heads—Prayer, Study, Systematic Giving. This was used for our united work in Lent, and will be the basis of the work for the coming year in every branch in the Diocese.

Our individual work must not stop, because we are to separate for the summer. Never forget the Noonday Prayer for Missions, with frequent intercession. Read your Spirit of Missions faithfully, especially reading the Sanctuary of Missions.

Let the gifts for the United Offering be regularly made, and always with the prayer for the work and the 150 workers at home and abroad. For our special work let each of us interest one woman in the work we love so much, that she may be willing to join our branch in the fall. Can we not give one-tenth of our time to the furtherance of God's work as well as the tithe of our incomes?

Miss Emery has asked that we double our number of workers, double our number of subscribers to the Spirit of Missions,

double the number of United Offering now in use. Let us ask ourselves, individually, "Lord what wilt thou have me to do?"

MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING, WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE BOARD OF MISSIONS.

The Twenty-seventh Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions was held in the Church of the Advent on Thursday, June 1st at 9 a. m. There was a celebration of the Holy Communion, at which the Bishop spoke a few words of commendation and encouragement. The meeting then adjourned to the parish house for the business session.

The Bishop opened the meeting with the creed and prayers, after which Mrs. Woodcock took the chair. Before beginning our work, Mrs. Woodcock asked for a rising vote to instruct the Secretary to send a note to our President, Mrs. Dudley, expressing our sincere regret at her absence. The Recording Secretary then read the minutes of the last annual meeting and a report of the Board meetings and united meetings held during the year.

Mrs. Adams, the Corresponding Secretary, announced that the total of the year's work in money and boxes, without today's collection, amounted to \$3,441.97. Miss Anderson, the Diocesan Treasurer, read her report which showed the apportionment overpaid and announced that the Jubilee funds had reached \$968.89.

Mrs. Glazebrook, Custodian of the United Offering, reported \$1,600.00 sent to Cincinnati in October and cash on hand, \$217.82.

Mrs. Woodcock announced that Mrs. Leslie Brown, Secretary of the Juniors, was ill, and Mrs. Love would read her report. Mrs. Woodcock took this opportunity to say a few words of appreciation of the splendid work being done by Mrs. Brown.

Miss Semple, Secretary of the Babies, reported the apportionment paid and \$1.00 sent for a font.

Mrs. Love, Correspondent of the Church Periodical Club,

read a few extracts showing the appreciation felt by those receiving magazines.

Mrs. Payne, Chairman of the Committee on Lenten Work, reported that the value of the Lenten boxes was \$630.27.

These reports were all accepted and will be published in full in the annual report which may be had by applying to the Corresponding Secretary.

Miss Robinson, Chairman of the Program Committee, explained what is meant by the committees on prayer, mission study and systematic giving. The "Spirit of Missions" will be the text book for the coming year.

The Bishop then took the chair to conduct the election of officers. He asked Mrs. Musson for a report from the Nominating Committee. She said the Auxiliary wanted the old officers re-elected. Mrs. Love presented her resignation and suggested that Miss Alice Parker be substituted for her. This was agreeable to the committee and after the Secretary had read, at Mrs. Musson's request, a list of officers with this change, the Secretary was ordered to cast one ballot for the entire list. This resulted as follows:

Mrs. Musson moved that the constitution be amended by inserting in Article IV, the words, "and a Secretary of the United Offering." This required a two-thirds vote, but was made unanimous and the Secretary was requested to cast a vote for Mrs. Charles Mockridge, of St. Paul's Church. Before leaving the Bishop said the greatest thing he had heard was that we were trying to train the children for active missionary

service and he had no fears about the apportionment with such an auxiliary in Kentucky. .

Miss Emery's annual letter was read, in which she urged that we try to get twice as many women interested and try to double the number of subscribers to the Spirit of Missions.

Next year's apportionment for the entire Diocese will be \$7,580. There was a discussion as to how best to raise our part of this and it was decided to ask the Diocesan Committee on Assessment to let us know by fall what they consider our part. Three of the clerical members present asked that a list of our present apportionment and of our members be sent that committee so they can form some idea of how to assess us. It was decided that each branch would raise its apportionment at least ten per cent.

The Corresponding Secretary announced that a memorial of \$1,000.00 to Rev. John K. Mason was being raised in St. Andrew's Church, the income to be applied to Diocesan Missions. Any donations may be sent to Mrs. W. O. Bonnie, Treasurer.

Mrs. Goodloe moved that the collection at this meeting be sent to Bishop Aves for his work in Mexico, as we had wanted to do something for this field ever since Mrs. Kilrest was here nearly a year ago. This was seconded and carried. The collections amounted to \$58.40, which brings the total for the year's work to \$3,500.37.

REPORT OF THE RECORDING SECRETARY.

The regular Board meetings of the Woman's Auxiliary were held in November, December, February and May in the parish house of Christ Church Cathedral, except the one in November, which was held at St. Andrew's Church. This meeting was postponed from October on account of the absence of so many members at the General Convention in Cincinnati.

At the November meeting the apportionment letter was read, the same as last year, \$750.00 from the women, \$100.00 from the Juniors, and \$75.00 from the Babies. The Juniors and the Babies have each overpaid theirs and the women will have paid theirs before the books close, September 1.

A letter from Miss Emery was read, asking that we increase our apportionment, if possible, as the work grows steadily and the need of funds is great. She also asked that the annual report of the General Secretary be read to each parish branch, calling particular attention to the change in the reports sent to Church Missions House. In the future only such things will appear in this report as pass through the hands of those at Church Missions House.

The Custodian of the United Offering reported \$1,486.60 from the Women, \$94.11 from the Juniors, and \$19.29 from the Babies, making \$1,600 as Kentucky's donation in Cincinnati.

It was decided to recognize officially the Brotherhood of St.

Paul, and Mrs. Albert Engelhard was elected to represent them on this Board.

At the December meeting it was decided to send our Lenten work to All Saints Hospital, McAlester, Oklahoma, and to a school in Porto Rico. Mrs. Adams announced that 73 pounds of peroxide had been sent to the Rev. Sherman Coolidge at Fay, Oklahoma, in response to a request. Mrs. Brown announced that Miss Lindley would be here in February to conduct Mission Study classes and that she would hold two open meetings. We pledged \$50.00 to the Foreign Missionary Insurance Fund, which has been paid.

At the February meeting, Mrs. Brown announced that Mrs. Engelhard was ill and could do nothing with the Brotherhood of St. Paul for the present. Mr. John Howe Peyton is the General Director in Kentucky, and is meeting with success in his work.

The Correspondent of the Church Periodical Club reported two new branches—one at Pewee Valley and one at Trinity Church. The Club has sent several barrels of magazines and books to an isolated army post. Miss Robinson outlined the study work for Lent along the lines of the three committees suggested by Miss Emery at her visit here in January. Each branch is asked to appoint one member to serve on each committee, this member to associate two others with her and they to be responsible for the work of that committee in that branch. It was decided to put all holders of United Offering boxes on the list of members, as some can not attend meetings and we hope in this way to come nearer our ideal of having every baptized woman an active member of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Mrs. Slaughter announced that a memorial to Dr. Mason had been started by St. Andrew's branch.

At the May meeting we had the pleasure of welcoming our Vice President from Paducah, Mrs. Muscoe Burnett, to her first Board meeting. She will endeavor to incite an interest in the Auxiliary in the places near Paducah. Mrs. Brown reported a new branch of Juniors at Paducah and they hope soon to have a Babies branch there.

Mrs. Adams reported that two large boxes had been sent

from the United Lenten work to McAlister and one to Porto Rico, both sent free of charge through the kindness of Mr. McKellar, of the Southern Railway.

We are very sorry to announce that owing to illness, our President has not been able to be with us since the meeting in November.

There was a united meeting held in the Chapel of St. Andrew's Church on November 7th, immediately after the Board meetings, to hear reports from the General Convention. The speakers were Mrs. Stanley Adams on "The Opening Service;" Mrs. Woodcock on "The Conference of Diocesan Officers;" Miss Winston on "The United Offering Services;" Mrs. Leslie Brown on "The Junior Conference," and Mrs. J. P. Love on "The Church Periodical Club Work." A collection of \$26.54 taken here was used to redeem two pledges made by Mrs. Woodcock in Cincinnati, one to Mexico and one to Arizona.

In January, the Golden Jubilee of Missions was held in our city. The Episcopal rally was held in St. Andrew's Church on Friday, January 27th, having been preceded by a celebration of the Holy Communion. Miss Emery came from New York to attend this Jubilee and she with the Bishop and Miss Robinson were the speakers at this service. The offering from the Episcopalians at this Jubilee was \$968.89 and was sent to the Board of Missions to be used for the Forward Movement. The next day Miss Emery held a conference for Diocesan and Parochial Officers at St. Paul's Church, at which she said that after such an experience as this Jubilee we ought to do something more than we had ever done before. She said we should go into our work with renewed vigor by emphasizing definite prayer, definite study and definite advance in giving. Immediately committees for these purposes were appointed, Miss Robinson, Chairman of Committee on Prayer; Mrs. Leslie Brown, on study; and Mrs. Woodcock on systematic giving. After Miss Emery had spoken of the United Offering, a collection amounting to \$10.66 was taken and applied to the United Offering of 1913. There were united meetings held on the six Fridays during Lent at which there was an opening service of fifteen minutes, consisting of a hymn, the creed and prayers; a

fifteen-minute business session, and fifteen minutes each for talks on prayer, study and systematic giving.

There was a meeting at St. Mark's on Tuesday in Holy Week, at which Miss Robinson spoke on "Personal Service in Missions."

The collections during Lent amounted to \$53.00, fifty dollars of which was used to pay our pledge to the Foreign Missionary Insurance Fund.

REPORT OF THE CORRESPONDING SECRETARY.

It was suggested at Cincinnati that the annual report of Miss Emery, Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, be condensed until only the money passing through the treasury of the Board of Missions and the boxes sent through the Secretary of the Auxiliary be reported.

This means that if this Diocese of Kentucky wishes to appear to do as much as it does do, every parish secretary must secure through the Diocesan Secretary letters for the fall boxes and every Parish Treasurer must send to the Diocesan Treasurer every cent of money that goes from her branch, excepting, of course, the United Offering. Then and then only will Miss Emery's report show the actual work done in Kentucky.

The Auxiliary numbers 544 members, a slight decrease since last year. Is it not possible before another year to have twice that many more? No new branches have been added and at their own request the Intermediates of Advent have been absorbed by the Woman's Auxiliary. About three hundred letters have been written and received and \$7.50 spent for postage and stationary.

Two boxes, one valued at \$75.00 and one at \$50.00 were sent to Uniontown. One box to Fairbanks valued at \$5.00 and \$29.41 sent direct to missionaries. Eight parish boxes valued at \$738.75 were sent through the diocesan secretary. When all reports have been read the total for the year for Women, Juniors, and

Babies will be \$3,500.37 not including the \$820.64 given to the Jubilee. In the early part of March the Secretary received from Mrs. Luther, of San Juan, a box of Porto Rican articles, valued at \$95.00 A check for \$33.00 has been sent to Mrs. Luther. The remaining articles, drawn work and fine laces, are for sale at the store of A. Levi & Co. Without any remuneration Mr. Levi gladly and graciously assumed this responsibility for the sake of the establishment of a "kitchen" where Mrs. Luther hopes to supply soup for poor Porto Rican children.

REPORT OF THE JUNIOR AUXILIARY.

The financial report gives only a meagre idea of the work of our faithful Directors and to them the success of the year is due. With such a splendid year to look back upon, one scarcely knows where to lay the greater stress. Three new branches have been added to our number; a second branch at St. Paul's, and two at Grace Church, Paducah. These branches have made the apportionment their first consideration and we are most proud of their reports.

Beginning the year, as we did with a representation of six, at the General Convention (four of whom were taking advantage of the missionary study course) and then carrying this good work forward to the extent of organizing a most successful conference of our own—conducted by the General Secretary, Miss Grace Lindley, of New York—and closing said conference with a balance in Bank of \$23.45, which amount will be devoted to a similar conference at some future time. Could our year have proven anything but a success? And so the reports have shown.

A letter of recent date from Miss Lindley asks of us many questions and among them may be found the following: "How many study classes have you had in the Diocese and what text books were used?" "Has anything been done to train the Junior Leaders?"

Our Board meetings we try to make in every particular a training school for leaders and during the coming year the work along this line will be a little more advanced than heretofore, and a Corporate Communion will be our first gathering in the fall.

For each Board meeting (and there are always open meetings) a pre-arranged program will be presented consisting largely of a discussion of the many difficult questions which are constantly confronting us, such as "The most forceful way of presenting the Apportionment to children" and "How can we increase, in our little ones, their interest in the United Offering." Each topic will be presented by one of the Directors, as

though she were presenting the subject to her Juniors. These talks will be followed by general discussion.

At our last Board meeting, May 8, Miss Lindley's questions were read, and the following reports were made:

To increase the interest in the United Offering, one branch has organized a Birthday League, and the "Thank Offerings" are deposited in "the little blue box." Four other branches use the individual boxes during the summer. In one branch a reward of merit is given (at the first fall meeting) for the best stories presented on the subject of "The little blue box;" some of these stories are beautiful and well worthy of publication.

Six of our branches are doing regular systematic work in the study of missions, and four are closing the year with some form of examination, while several have presented the little missionary plays, which have proven of such practical merit and are most attractive to our little ones. The children of one branch (during the coming summer) will dress dolls for the Christmas Box—our united gift to the Indians of Idaho.

One Director has planted a dime in each of many flower pots. These pots she presented to her Juniors at their closing meeting. A picture postal will be sent monthly as a reminder of the necessary watering and in the fall each child will report upon the growth of the seed entrusted to her care.

From one of our smallest and most struggling branches, comes this report: "We are sending a check of \$4.50; \$2.50 is to be paid toward the Apportionment, and \$2.00 is for the work in the foreign field. We hope to be more successful next year. Pray for us, and ask the other branches to aid us by offering special prayers. We have had many things to hinder our progress and we feel the need of spiritual help."

Is not this suggestion a most pertinent one? If the stronger and more prosperous were always praying for our weaker and less fortunate members, what a wonderful change there would be in the result attained. Last but not least, we wish to call your attention to our Annual Meeting, which is held each year in the Sunday-school room of the Cathedral, on the afternoon of November 30. Won't you try to be with us? The children will make their own reports and I'm sure you will be

both surprised and pleased to know what our little ones are doing? The Bishop will be with us too on that eventful day, for to us, it is truly an event worth recording. It is our work to train children to be missionaries, to develop Christian character and to so fill the lives of the young people with the spirit of the missionary that they will pass on into older societies, or go into the field, equipped with all the love, interest and enthusiasm necessary to carry the work forward. In closing this report, my plea is, that you who represent branches of the Woman's Auxiliary where the Junior work lies dormant, will make it your duty to see that your branch is re-organized at the opening of the coming year.

REPORT OF THE BABIES' BRANCH.

In addition to the tabulated report I want to add a few words about the "Babies." One new branch has been added during the year—Grace Church, Paducah. The boxes were given out last month, but they could make no report this year. Every baptized child should be a member of the "Babies' Branch." The "Babies' Branch" is intended to teach, that membership in Christ's Church means membership in the great Missionary Society. Every child by baptism becomes a member of Christ's Church and the baptized members of His Church form the Missionary Society. The "Little Helpers" are expected to place a gift in their mite box each Sunday, and so to form the habit of systematic giving. And then we have our Memorial Circle. The children learn that if God calls any of them to Paradise, they do not cease to be members of the Church, and neither does their work cease. Those who loved them here, still love them and can still say their prayers for the Missionaries and keep their little boxes filled in memory of them. We are the Kindergarten and our teaching is by symbol and story. It is one thing to place 50 red or blue boxes, but it is another to

get 10 women or little children to give a penny with meaning, who knows what it is doing in the world, who say a prayer for missions every day or at least once a week. And perhaps the little red box may help to make the blue box fuller and "A little child shall lead them."

REPORT OF LENTEN WORK.

The United Branches of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions have reason to be pleased with their Lenten work, which consisted of three generous boxes—each one weighing about 250 pounds.

Though the value was not nearly as large as for the previous year, because it was deemed wise, not to allow enthusiasm for the United Lenten Work to conflict with the contributions which the individual parish branches were accustomed to provide for the laborers in other fields, also doing their best.

Two boxes of hospital supplies were sent to McAlester, Eastern Oklahoma; and the third one, containing school supplies and children's clothing, to San Juan, Porto Rico.

The packing was done at Grace Church, where the attentive hospitality of Mrs. Johnston and the able assistance of Mrs. Adams and Mrs. Woodcock enabled the work to go merrily on and be ready for shipment on Easter Tuesday, April 18th, over the Southern R. R., free of any freight expense, owing to the courtesy of Mr. R. L. McKellar, manager of the freight department, and to Mr. Lee Lewis, who not only furnished the boxes and the services of the packer, but volunteered to do the hauling.

With one exception every branch contributed and the total value amounted to \$630.27.

In response to the Oklahoma supplies, Dr. Johnston writes of his appreciation with warmth and tells of the rapid growth of the work and its possibilities.

The Porto Rico box has not been heard from, except through

the Shipping Co. of its safe arrival. Doubtless it will be as acceptable, particularly to the lady in charge, when her glance falls on the various packages marked "for Mrs. Luther."

The personal remembrances to her, from the respective branches, were so useful as well as attractive that her pleasure in receiving must be as genuine as ours in the sending.

The committee wishes to thank each branch of the Auxiliary for the promptness with which their contributions were sent in, and also each and every one who were so willing to lend a hand.

Expression of our appreciation has been sent to Mr. McKellar and Mr. Lewis, thanking them not only for the substantial assistance, but for their kind interest in our Missionary Work, and they seem ready to repeat the service for the Cause.
