PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS.

Another year has passed and we come again to our Annual Meeting. The work has gone bravely on in spite of the war and though many have been working for the soldiers, I am glad to feel that our missionaries have not been neglected. I entreat you to remember their needs inasmuch as the price of provisions and clothing is so high it will make their living a very serious outlook for some time to come. How can we interest more numbers, would it be possible for every woman here to try and pledge herself to bring some one to the next Annual Meeting? If the Constitution is abandoned it may make the Juniors anxious to have plays and festivals, but cannot we older ones try to impress on them the inadvisability of it, as they have so long been without having entertainments, cannot we persuade them to keep it up? Let them have entertainments for other things, if they must, but not for the Auxiliary. I am very proud that Kentucky is on record as the only Diocese that has abandoned this way of raising money and it certainly would be a positive disaster if they did not keep up to their high standard. I earnestly urge your consideration and cooperation of this work. Cannot we make our meetings more interesting and helpful? Maybe it might be interesting to have Missionary Classes and give as little time as possible to business, and more to the spiritual side. I leave all these suggestions to your consideration and wish you success and happiness during the coming year.

MINUTES OF ANNUAL MEETING.

The Annual Meeting took place Thursday, January 30th, at 11 o'clock A. M., in the Cathedral House. This was preceded by a Corporate Communion in the Cathedral with Bishop Woodcock as celebrant.

The Bishop took as his subject, "Suppose that Faith Were Real," drawing a wonderful picture of conditions if faith were real; there would be no need of speaking of duty or sacrifice, no need of asking for money, but Christ would enable us through faith and love to do the work He could not do on earth.

The meeting was opened by the singing of a hymn and prayers, led by the Bishop, after which Mrs. Woodcock took the chair.

Mrs. Mason Barret, Chairman of the Credential Committee, read a list of parishes entitled to vote, asking the Secretary to take the names of the delegates.

Miss Winston moved that as there had been some misunderstanding as to when payment to the Central Fund is due, that the rules be suspended and that all parishes with representation be allowed to vote. This motion was carried.

Mrs. Adams, in the absence of the President, read her annual address, in which the President pleaded for new members and new interest in the Auxiliary.

The Recording Secretary read an abstract of all Board and Committee meetings held during the past year, also gave a resume of the six United Lenten meetings.

Miss Winston, Second Vice-President, gave an account of her trip through the western part of the diocese, asking that an Extension Committee be appointed later in the day for work both in city and diocese. She said that it was a matter of necessity to send some one out from the Board into the Diocese at least once a year.

The Corresponding Secretary gave her report, showing the Auxiliary to have twenty branches, with membership of five

hundred and seventy, two united boxes sent to missionaries and the total amount of work done in money was \$3,258.20. The United Lenten Box is to be divided, one to go to the mission at Penland, N. C.; one to be sent to St. Michael's Mission for Arapahoe Indians at Wind River, Wyoming.

Mrs. Mockridge, Third Vice-President, gave her report as President of the Junior's, showing them to have twenty branches, with three hundred and thirty-six members; three boxes were sent, to the value of \$132.00; \$126.40 had been paid to the Apportionment, \$21.43 to the United Offering, \$10.70 to the Central Fund, a special of \$13.50; one new branch formed and a branch graduated into the Woman's Auxiliary.

The Treasurer offered her report in detail which will be found elsewhere in this Report. Total paid on Apportionment, \$644.57, balance in Central Fund, \$88.59, total expenses for the Advent Call, \$126.91. She also reported that \$8.24 borrowed from the Central Fund for these expenses, had been wiped out by money received since January 1st.

The Auditor announced all accounts of Treasurer verified and checked and found correct in every respect.

Miss Robinson, Educational Secretary, reported the Normal Class of fourteen trained to be leaders. Lenten study classes were held in various parishes with eleven leaders and two hundred and ten members, St. Mark's leading with four classes led by their own leaders. Grace Church, Paducah, and the Church of Our Merciful Savior, Louisville, had the largest classes, with an average attendance of twenty-two and eighteen respectively. She announced the normal class now being trained by Miss Almstedt, the new Educational Secretary, and gave partly completed program for the lenten meetings.

The report of the United Offering, in the absence of Miss Warren, was given by Mrs. Powers, showing a balance in bank at this writing of \$1,851.42.

Miss Winston announced that the leaflets of Bible Readings sent to her for us during the Advent Call, were ready for any one who wished a supply for distribution.

The Chairman of the Correspondence Branch reported \$1.25 sent to the Apportionment, seventeen prayer pledge cards sent out during the Advent Call; that Miss Winston's

visit had robbed her of many names, but also gave her two hundred to be added to her list.

Miss Youngman, Correspondent of the Church Periodical Club, stated that \$7.00 had been sent to the Treasurer; one hundred and eighty-nine periodicals were sent regularly, four boxes of books and a number of prayer books, hymnals, Easter cards, etc. sent out. Seven Diocesan institutions were aided.

Having arrived at the hour of noon, we paused for a moment to recite the noon-day prayer for missions in unison.

Roll-call followed, showing a total of ninety-five women present.

Mrs. Musson moved that all reports be accepted, filed and printed. Carried.

Miss Winston spoke of the resolution she had offered abolishing the Constitution and her reasons for wishing it adopted.

Mrs. Maury moved that this resolution be adopted, which was done.

Mrs. Musson moved that the old method of voting be followed for the day. This was carried.

Mrs. Barret offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the schedule, dividing the branches into definite classes assessing each a certain sum to be paid to the Central Fund, thus providing a fixed income for the Board, be re-adopted. Be it hereby

Resolved, That each branch notify the Treasurer which class it will accept, and that the vote of the parish shall be contingent upon payment of such pledge; that Class G be added, paying \$1.00 annually to include small branches and missions unable to accept Class F.

This resolution was carried.

Miss Winston said that she was delegated to offer, that if four parishes would advance a class, St. Andrew's would go into Class A. Advent, Grace, Calvary, St. Paul's, the Cathedral and St. Mark's immediately responded.

Mrs. Musson was called upon to explain the Canon on the House of Church Women, reading the following resolution:

HOUSE OF CHURCH WOMEN.

WHEREAS, This Council has adopted an amendment to its Canon constituting a House of Church Women, be it

Resolved, That the Bishop be requested to appoint a committee of five, either members of this Council, or from those not members of this Council, who, in conjunction with the Bishop, shall give practical effect to the Canon by at least naming tentative officers, pending the organization of the House of Church Women; and be it further

Resolved, That there be appropriated from the diocesan treasury the sum of fifty (\$50.00) dollars toward defraying the expenses of promoting this organization.

Committee:—Miss L. L. Robinson, Miss N. H. Winston, Mrs. Harry S. Musson, Mrs. Stanley Adams, the Rev. John S. Douglas and the Rev. D. C. Wright.

The innovation of having women on the Board of Missions was approved.

Miss Winston offered the following resolution:

WHEREAS, The Apportionment for General Missions of Kentucky has not been paid for several years past; and,

WHEREAS, Some persons say they do not know how their respective parishes stand in this matter;

Be it Resolved, That, at every monthly parochial meeting of the Women's Auxiliary, a report of that parish's standing on the Apportionment (amount apportioned, amount paid, possibilities of being paid in full) be read and discussed. The President, or some one duly appointed for this purpose, shall be responsible for securing this information, which may be had from the Rector or from any member of the Diocesan Apportionment Committee.

This resolution was adopted.

Mrs. Foster, of the Nominating Committee, read the names of nominees; elections resulted as follows:

Fourth Vice President—Mrs. Custis Fletcher, Paducah.

Fifth Vice President—Mrs. B. N. McCraven, Henderson.

Corresponding Secretary—Mrs. Stanley Adams, Louisville.

Educational Secretary—Miss Elsa Almstedt, Louisville.

The convention ratified the election of Miss Gilmer Robinson as third Vice-President and Junior delegate to the Triennial Convention in Detroit.

The meeting then adjourned for luncheon.

AFTERNOON.

Immediately after luncheon the meeting reconvened and proceeded to the election of delegates and alternates to the Triennial Convention.

Miss Anderson moved that absolute silence be maintained during reading of reports and addresses. Carried.

The minutes of the morning session were read and approved.

Mrs. Adams moved that we have an Extension Committee, as proposed by Miss Winston. Carried.

Miss Winston moved that it be obligatory to the Board to send some one out to the outlying parishes at least once a year. Carried.

While waiting for the tellers to report, Mrs. Adams read a letter of thanks from Mrs. Ruge, of Dahlonega, Ga., to whom the United Advent Box was sent. The letter showed great appreciation of the things sent to them.

The tellers reported Mrs. Woodcock, Miss Winston, Mrs. Musson and Mrs. Fletcher as elected as delegates to the Triennial Convention in Detroit.

Mrs. Adams then introduced Miss Evans, General Secretary Y. W. C. A., who spoke to us on the Mother and Daughter Banquet movement about to be inaugurated in that Association.

The tellers then reported Mrs. Adams, Mrs. Douglas, Miss Warren and Mrs. Abbott elected as alternates to the Triennial Convention.

Miss Robinson, in giving her report of the Advent Call, said that spiritual work is not to be counted in numbers. What has it accomplished? A stir of inspiration and aspiration awakened by Miss Winston in her visit through Western Kentucky bringing more women into the Missionary work of the Church.

Two hundred and twenty-three messengers and many intercessors took part in this great work inspired by the interest and help of the Rectors and fortified by the prayers of the intercessors.

The work is incomplete as yet, and Miss Robinson recommends that the messenger sent out in the Diocese before, be sent again to inspire other women and closed with a recommenda-

tion that we realize our responsibility for Church work among the Negroes, reading the plea sent out by the Secretary of the Fourth Province, Mr. Patton, in the interest of the American Church Institute for Negroes.

Mrs. Adams moved that Miss Winston make the trip again. Carried.

Miss Winston moved that we take up the plea for the American Church Institute for Negroes as a Memorial to Bishop Dudley, asking Mrs. Harry Musson to be Chairman of a Committee. Carried.

Miss Robinson then introduced Miss Elizabeth Matthews, President of the W. A. of the Diocese of Southern Ohio, who took as her subject, "Co-operation." Miss Matthews asked us to stop a minute to think just what the three words, "American Church Women," mean and how wonderful they were.

"We are on the eve of a new Renaissance led by America, as the Renaissance of old caused the Reformation, so does the new turn our thoughts toward Christian Unity, which is perhaps closer than we can realize." Miss Matthews stressed the thought of Church loyalty and the necessity for it.

After the speaker had finished the minutes of the afternoon session were read and approved.

The offering added to that taken at the Communion Service in the Cathedral, amounted to \$37.81, \$25.00 of which will be given to the Foreign Clergyman's Life Insurance Fund.

Afternoon roll-call showed twenty-six more to have come in, making a total of one hundred and twenty-one present during the day.

Word having come to the meeting of the serious illness of one of our veteran members, Mrs. Henry Pilcher, the Rev. Mr. Douglass closed the meeting by reading the prayer for a sick person and pronouncing the benediction.

REPORT OF THE RECORDING SECRETARY.

Regular quarterly meetings of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions in the Diocese of Kentucky, were held on the second Thursday of April, October and December, with an average attendance of sixteen. Each of these meetings were preceded by a Corporate Communion in the Cathedral and all were presided over by Mrs. Woodcock.

Special called meetings were held in St. Andrew's Parish House in February and in the Cathedral House in June.

At the February called meeting a motion was made to send to the representative of the Fourth Province, \$10.00 annually towards her expenses in attending conference meetings. It was also decided that the Board print its own report in 1918 and provide itself with proper stationery. Arrangements for the meeting of the Fourth Provincial Synod were discussed, leaving this matter in the hands of the Second Vice-President and her Committee.

Six United Lenten Meetings were held in the various Parishes, with an average attendance of 112; the offerings amounted to \$63.46, and were given to the Geneva Scholarship, the Lenten Box, the Foreign Clergyman's Life Insurance and St. Agnes' School for Girls, Kyoto, Japan.

The value of the Lenten Box was \$417.90, and was sent to the Indian Mission for Shoshone Indians at Wind River, Wyoming.

Speakers at the Lenten Meetings were, Miss Winston, Dean Owen, Hamilton, Ontario; Dean Johnson, Atlanta; the Rev. Mr. Budlong, Chicago, and the Rev. Mr. Wilkinson, of Lexington. At the last meeting Miss Robinson summed up the Lenten work and gave her report as Educational Secretary. There was a Normal Class of 14; 17 Mission Study Classes, with 11 leaders and a total enrollment of 210.

At the April Board Meeting a letter was read from the representatives of the Fourth Province, appealing for funds to complete the building fund for St. Agnes' School for Girls, Kyoto, Japan, and asking for \$100.00 additional from Ken-

tucky. This was done, the Woman's Auxiliary and the Juniors sending \$108.02 over and above the offering at the end of the Pilgrimage of Prayer and the Convention Pledge of \$200, making \$468.66 sent to St. Agnes, in all, from this Diocese.

The proposed amendments to the Constitution were discussed and we abolished the Semi-Annual meeting, the Church year having changed.

The Board meeting in June was called for the express purpose of providing Miss L. L. Robinson an opportunity to present the War Work of the Woman's Auxiliary, the wonderful Spiritual Drive, "The Advent Call," to take place in the first week in December. Plans were made for this and leaders appointed for the various Parishes.

At the October meeting a letter of thanks was read from the Rev. Mr. Roberts, of Wind River, Wyoming, to whom the Lenten Box had been sent; Section Three Juniors, in Paducah, was reported graduated into the Woman's Auxiliary, having formed the Tuesday Branch of Grace Parish, Paducah; definite plans were also made for the Advent Call.

A United Advent Box was planned for this year and most interesting letters were read from the Rev. Mr. Ruge, of Dalton, Georgia, describing the nature of his work. It was decided to send this United Box to Mr. Ruge and to make it most complete.

The Annual United Offering Service was held in the Cathedral, November 11th, 200 being present, followed by the Quiet Hour led by the Bishop. The glad fact that this was the day the Armistice was signed made both service and Quiet Hour the more impressive.

The United Offering so far is \$1,827.11, more for four offerings than for five offerings before the last convention.

There followed four days of meetings of instruction conducted by Miss Lindley from the Church Missions House. The women of the Church were trained as messengers and intercessors for the Advent Call so soon to take place.

At the December meeting of the Board Miss Winston spoke of the opportunity for development of the Woman's Auxiliary in Western Kentucky and the willingness of the women to work; they need only to be guided. The Chairman of the Correspond-

dence Branch reported Advent Call Prayer Pledge Cards sent to members of her Branch. At this meeting Miss Robinson resigned as Educational Secretary, and a committee of five was appointed, this committee to be composed of the old and the new Educational Secretaries, the second Vice-President and two other members to take charge of the Educational Work.

The Board voiced its approval of the proposed Canon on the House of Church Women and also voted to go on record as approving of women on the Board of Missions.

Miss Winston offered the following resolution to be read at the Annual Meeting:

Resolved, That we rescind our entire Constitution at the Annual Meeting in 1919 and that a committee composed of the delegates to the Triennial and two others be appointed to draw up another Constitution or set of standing rules in harmony with the National Constitution to be adopted in Detroit. This committee to report to the 1919 December Board meeting and Annual Meeting of 1920.

Mrs. Dudley, Miss Warren, and Mrs. Foster were appointed a nominating committee to prepare for the coming election.

The report of the Diocesan Apportionment Committee was heard and the plan proposed by the women members of that committee, to insure the payment of Kentucky's apportionment, was approved.

The meeting of the Fourth Provincial Synod, which was to have been held in November, has been postponed until 1920.

REPORT OF CORRESPONDING SECRETARY.

As Chairman of the Box Committee the Corresponding Secretary wishes to report:

On Tuesday, April 2nd, (1918), the United Lenten Box was packed at St. Paul's Church, St. Paul's Auxiliary women lending valuable assistance. The box was sent to the Shoshone Indians at Wind River, Wyoming, under the care of the Rev. John Roberts, and was valued at \$417.90. We have letters of appreciation from Mr. Roberts and from Miss Marian Roberts. Mr. Lee Lewis, of the John C. Lewis Co., furnished the packer and the boxes, hauled them to the station and attended to the shipping. This same he has done for the past ten years.

Mr. Frank Maus, of the Pennsylvania Lines, franked the box (weighing 300 pounds) to Chicago, but was unable, on account of war conditions, to get free transportation to its destination. The freight was \$9.15.

In the early fall when the influenza epidemic was at its height and there was sickness in almost every family, it was decided to have a United Advent Box instead of each branch sending an individual one. The letter of the Rev. Ferdinand Ruge, of Dahlonega, Ga., was selected. The ban on meetings has prevented the women from sewing for the box so the branches have contributed mostly money. Although articles to the value of \$119.68 have been given, \$169.75 has been received and \$142.43 spent. The balance will be used early in February. Part of this box will have to appear in next year's Report, because it could not be finished before this meeting. The Ruge family has shown the greatest appreciation and we have most interesting letters from them which will be read.

The Tuesday Branch of Paducah, formally Juniors, but now of the Woman's Auxiliary, sent Christmas gifts to each of the six members of the Ruge family.

The Lenten Box for 1919 will be divided, part going St. Michael's Mission, Wind River Wyoming, the same place, but a different Mission from last year. These Indians are the Arapahoe, and Mr. Balcom is in charge. The other station is

Penland, N. C., the Appalachian School, under the care of Mr. C. T. Wyatt.

St. Agnes' Branch of Calvary has consolidated with the Senior Branch. We now have twenty branches, with a membership of 570. Where are the other 83 that we reported last year?

The amount of work done by each branch is as follows:

We have no branch at Russelville, but they always contribute to the U. O., and some half dozen women who belong to old St. John's still send their U. O. as from "St. John's."

The Secretary has received and spent \$10.00 for postage, etc.

REPORT OF THIRD VICE-PRESIDENT.

This is the time of change in the Junior Auxiliary. The meeting of a few girls of an afternoon to work for Missions or to study about Missions is past and in place of it we find the week-day sessions of the Church School. The Junior Plan is now no longer a dream, it has become reality. Those of us who have prayed and worked for this, feel most encouraged. It means work, yes, hard work, but it also means keeping the older girls and young married women. In the past we had one leader, now we have ten or twelve helpers, then our boys are working as well as our girls.

In spite of the epidemic, we sent three splendid boxes at Christmas. One to St. John's, Corbin, Ky., one to Franklin, N. C., and another to Graniteville, S. C.

One new branch at the Cathedral has been formed. Section Three, at Grace Church, Paducah, has gone into the Woman's Auxiliary.

In May we had the pleasure of having with us our new

Secretary, Miss Frances Withers, of New York. This was her first visit to Kentucky, and it was one of great help and inspiration to the Juniors.

After three years as President of the Junior Auxiliary, I now give up the work to Miss Gilmer Robinson, our new President. She carries with her into the work the heartfelt prayers and sincere love of the Junior Board.

EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY.

The present Educational Secretary having accepted only the unexpired term of her predecessor, has but that period of work to report, undertaken with but scant plan or preparation. Early during the year, however, one Normal Class was held in a six-weeks course on "Missions According to the Bible," the text book recommended by the Educational Department of the Board of Missions. From this class, numbering fourteen, eleven went forth as leaders of parochial classes conducted during Lent. Sixteen such classes were held in the various parishes in Louisville, besides one inter-parochial class, conducted by Miss Winston. As for several years St. Mark's Branch led in this matter of Parish Classes, four having been conducted, by as many leaders, supplied from the Branch. Another class deserves special mention, as conducted by Mrs. Maury, of the Advent Branch in the Church of Our Merciful Savior, with appreciation on the part of the members and an interest most gratifying. Three classes were reported from other parts of the Diocese, Paducah, Hopkinsville, and Hickman, respectively, the one in Paducah proving especially fruitful as resulting in the organization of a permanent Bible Class in the Parish, and general meetings in the interest of Missions. Other work along educational lines has been accomplished, such as the Monday Morning Bible Class enlarging the scope of the Diocesan School of Religion Education; also the various meetings con-

nected with the work of the Advent Call, of which a detailed report will be made later; but that this work was indeed educational, in the best sense of that word, we well realize, and particularly in the literature that it brought forth and freely distributed. In this connection, special mention would be made of the circulating library of valuable books, generously provided by Miss Winston, and widely loaned. And may I ask here that those who still have these books as borrowed, will kindly return them, as others are awaiting their perusal. A list was made at the time of distribution, but is not at present at hand.

In order to enhance and further promote the interest of this department of our work, at the fall meeting of the Diocesan Board, an Educational Committee was appointed, consisting of the Educational Secretary as Chairman, assisted by the Second Vice-President of the Auxiliary, and the retiring Educational Secretary. This committee will confer on all matters relating to general work of the department, such as the arrangement of special meetings, progress, etc. At the request of this committee, hopefully forecasting her election to-day, Miss Elsa Almstedt, of Grace Church, has already organized the Normal Class for instruction of leaders, using as the course of study Bishop Burleson's book "Our Church and our Country," as commended by the Educational Department of the Board of Missions.

In addition to the many classes which it is hoped will evolve from this instruction, there will be two other inter-parochial classes, one conducted by Miss Winston, on "Prayer," and one by Miss Gilmer Robinson on the "How and Why of Foreign Missions." It is asked that all wishing to enroll in these two classes will give their names early to the respective leaders that they may the better prepare their work accordingly.

The Educational Committee has also met for the purpose of arranging a tentative program for the United Lenten meetings of the Woman's Auxiliary, and which it would now submit to the present meeting for approval, or discussion. Speakers for the various topics have not, as yet, been entirely secured, but as arranged, the program stands as follows:

 " Mar. 14—"The Fourth Province and What It Is Doing for Missions."
 " Mar. 21—"The United Offering, Its Message and Its Messenger"—Mrs. Allen Hite.

The Educational Department reports a very successful year in its study work. A normal class, with ten members representing six parishes, was held for the six weeks preceding Lent. The attendance at this was perfect, every member attending every session and each leading a class during Lent. We tried the experiment of sending the leaders to other than their own parish and it worked very well.

The Educational Secretary conducted a class on "Simon Peter, Rock" in St. Paul's during Lent. The Diocesan Board of Religious Education co-operated with this department in arranging a meeting held on May 24th, at which Miss Withers, the new Junior Secretary, explained the Christian Nurture Series and the New Junior Plan.

The Normal Class planned for this winter had to be given up because the leaders are largely University girls and it was impossible to find a time when they could meet, but we hope to have a study class in each parish during Lent. Two parishes, St. Andrew's and St. Paul's, are trying the New Junior Plan and so far have found it very satisfactory.

The report from the Box Committee showed that the three Christmas boxes sent were valued at \$132.00. The President gave her message as follows:

The Junior Plan has become a reality, and we who have worked and prayed for it, have much to encourage us. The reports show strength and growth. One new Branch at the Cathedral has been formed. Section III at Grace Church, Paducah. Our new President, Miss Gilmer Robinson, takes up her work with our prayers and sincere love.

The cold and snow of last winter prevented many meetings and the quarantine this fall has been a dreadful set-back to the work, but we are still going on and hope for good work during the coming year.
