MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING

The Thirty-Seventh Annual Meeting of the Kentucky Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council was held on January 26th, 1921, beginning with a Corporate Communion in the Cathedral, at 9:30, at which the Bishop was the celebrant and speaker. In his address he told us to make our work a privilege and not a duty, keeping our faith, our hope, and our enthusiasm. The result would be an elevation of our spiritual character a broadening of our vision, and would bring us into the presence of our Savior. He spoke words of encouragement for what we had already done and bade us go forward keeping always our ideal of seeking God first and working for Him afterwards.

The business meeting followed immediately, convening in Dudley Memorial Hall, the Bishop opening the meeting with prayer. Hymn 252 was sung. Miss Winston then took the chair.

The Treasurer, as chairman of the Committee on Credentials read a list of the branches who had paid their assessment to the Central Fund and thus were entitled to a vote. This list will be found incorporated in her report. Roll call of delegates followed. All parishes in town were represented with the exception of Emmanuel Chapel and the Church of the Merciful Savior. We were happy to have with us delegates from St. Paul's Church, Henderson, and Grace Church, Hopkinsville.

The President asked for a motion giving the privilege of the floor without the vote to all Auxiliary members present. Motion made and carried.

The President's address followed. She said that if the year's work of trying to bring a knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ to those who know Him not, had not brought us into a closer knowledge of Him ourselves, our work would have been in vain. All reports show an increase, but more

gratifying than the increase in numbers and dollars, is the growth which we hope and believe are seen in those deeper things that can not be tabulated. She closed her address by saying that the thought she wanted carried away was not one of pride for what we had done, but a determination on the part of each one to give herself more completely than ever before to the service of Him whom we call Lord and Master.

Mrs. C. E. Woodcock, First Vice President, was prevented from being with us by illness. No meeting is ever complete without her. Our love for her and our sorrow for her absence was expressed in a rising vote.

The office of Second Vice President having been left vacant by the resignation of Miss Burnett, of Paducah, Miss Winston announced that an election to fill that office would follow later in the day.

The Annual report of the Secretary was read. She reported twenty-four branches in the Diocese, two being new ones. Total enrollment, 649. Total work done is valued at \$6278.92, an increase over last year of about \$1300.00.

The Supply Secretary reported Lenten Boxes sent to Monterey, Tenn., and Saluda, N. C., valued at \$1282.03, and Advent Boxes sent to Columbia, S. C., Winner, S. Da., and Wind River, Wyoming, valued at \$749.69. Total value of Supply work, \$2031.72.

Miss Winston spoke of the splendid work done by Mrs. Fagin in compiling this report under many difficulties. She asked that all branch supply secretaries co-operate with Mrs. Fagin. She also asked that all branch secretaries be more accurate in making out their annual reports, in order that all financial reports would balance.

The Treasurer then read her report which showed that she had received a total of \$1377.43, which had been disbursed according to her detailed report published herein. She read a note from Mrs. Albert Reutlinger, who had audited her report, stating that she had found all accounts correct. Mrs. Barret spoke of the great necessity for increasing the Central Fund. She read a letter from Mrs. Scott, of Lex-

ington, the Provincial Secretary, asking for an increase to the provincial fund of a minimum of \$50.00. As Kentucky has a representation on the National Board, thus getting direct benefit from this fund, Mrs. Barret hoped we would be able to pledge more than \$50.00. She announced the new schedule of assessments to the Central Fund.

A roll call for pledges followed, resulting in every branch advancing at least one class, and in many cases the pledges were more than doubled.

Delegates from St. Andrew's moved that \$75.00 be pledged to the Provincial Fund, they advancing more to the Central Fund if necessary. Motion carried. Miss Winston said that this action gave her great pleasure.

The hour of noon having arrived, we paused for noon-day prayer.

The Educational Secretary reported eight educational secretaries in the Diocese, eleven mission study classes, with an enrollment of 176. Nine branches had program meetings. She gave a resume of her trip through the Diocese and told what an inspiration it had been to her. She announced the plans for the year, which includes an Institute with Miss Tillotson, as leader in March.

Mrs. Barret read a letter received from Paducah, expressing their very deep gratitude for Mrs. Maury's visit and of the great help and inspiration it had been to them.

The report of the Custodian of the United Thank Offering showed a balance on hand of \$1350.32. With the exception of the Victory Offering, these two offerings of 1920 were the largest we have ever had. The annual Thank Offering Service was held on St. Luke's Day, in the Cathedral, Bishop Woodcock being the Celebrant.

The Chairman of the Committee for raising the Fund for St. Hilda's Chapel, Wuchang, China, reported that

\$1410.79 had been raised. The \$410.79 more than the pledge was to be used as Miss Buchanan saw fit.

The Correspondent of the Church Periodical Club spoke of the Church Service League Prayer Leaflet, containing prayers and intercessions of the seven national women's organizations of the Church, of which the Auxiliary is one. Miss Winston suggested that the Leaflet be distributed through the Periodical Club. In her report the Correspondent showed that 127 current magazines were sent regularly, eighty-one people contributing.

Mrs. Frank Foster presented the plans for the Church League of the Isolated, which is being developed under the Mission Committee of the House of Church Women. It will take over the work of the Correspondence Branch, of which Mrs. J. J. Saunders was chairman. It plans to reach the Isolated church women in our Diocese, by writing to them and sending them literature.

A motion to adjourn for luncheon followed.

The afternoon session of the Annual Meeting was held in Dudley Memorial Hall, beginning at 2:15 o'clock. Miss Winston opened the meeting with prayer. Hymn 261 was sung. The minutes of the morning meeting were read and approved. A rising vote of thanks was given to the women of Calvary Church, for their delightful luncheon.

The election of Second Vice President followed. Two nominations had been received, Mrs. Custis Fletcher, of Paducah, and Mrs. James Breathit, Jr., of Hopkinsville. Mrs. Poston and Mrs. Homans were appointed tellers. Mrs. Custis Fletcher, of Paducah, was elected.

Miss Lindley's Annual letter was read by the President. She announced that Friday, Feb. 18, had been set aside by the Federation of Women's Boards, as a day of prayer for world-wide Missions. She expressed her hope that the United Thank Offering of 1922 would double the gift of 1919. She spoke of the privilege that was ours in being able to express our gratitude for the Woman's Auxiliary through the Emery

Fund. She closed her letter by stressing the need of work by all, each finding and undertaking that bit of work which the Master had assigned to them.

Miss Winston then introduced Miss Robinson, who presented the Emery Fund. In a beautiful talk she brought before us the great blessing of the Communion of Saints. That there is a greater realization of this, is seen in the character of many memorials. She said that a long, unbroken life of service calls for a living memorial. Fifty years of the Auxiliary are dead and gone, but the results of them goes on forever and they are to be marked by a living memorial of a gift which will provide a place where those on the "firing line" may "Come apart and rest awhile." This great memorial will perpetuate and commemorate a name always associated with the Auxiliary, the name of Emery. Dear as the memorial ought to be to us, it will have a more personal touch, focusing about a name, which in Kentucky can never be forgotten, the name of Mrs. M. E. A. Dudley. A great and beautiful offering, representing all the women of the Auxiliary. It should be in very truth, Kentucky's remembrance of their loving leader for thirty-six years.

Miss Robinson then offered the following resolution, which was adopted with a rising vote.

Resolution—"That the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Kentucky, as a body, ratify the Resolution adopted by the Executive Board—to make Kentucky's contribution to the Jubilee Emery Fund, a perpetual memorial to its late beloved President, Mary A. E. Dudley."

Mrs. Barret, Chairman of the Emery Fund in the Diocese of Kentucky, read a letter from Mrs. W. P. Cornell, the Provincial Chairman. She reminded us that only six more working months were left. She said that the Province had been commended by the National Board on its plan of asking for a definite sum for a minimum pledge. She hoped that all Auxiliary women would do their share in this anniversary celebration with the interest and enthusiasm it merits.

Mrs. Barret stated that a minimum pledge of \$500.00 had been made to the Province, and called for pledges from the various branches. \$860.00 was pledged, including \$15.00 from the Girl's Friendly society of the Cathedral.

Miss Winston asked for a motion from the floor that the Executive Board be permitted to approve the minutes of the afternoon session. Motion made and carried.

Roll-call followed, showing 128 present. The offering amounted to \$31.85, \$25.00 of which is to be used to pay the annual pledge to the Foreign Clergymen's Life Insurance Fund, the remainder added to the Central Fund.

Miss Winston then introduced Miss Corey, President of the Massachusetts Auxiliary, Chairman of the Church Service League, in the Diocese of Massachusetts, and in the Province of New England. She said it gave her great pleasure to introduce her to a Kentucky audience, as her personal friend and co-worker.

Miss Corey in her address, "Looking Forward in the 'Woman's Auxiliary,'" said that in looking forward, we must at first glance back and see clearly what experience lies back of us. She said that the Auxiliary was the oldest and largest body of women, of every station in life and many nationalities, bound together by a common tie—devotion to Jesus Christ and His Cause. She said that the record of the spirit of the women of the past was a precious heritage, and that we were responsible for the Future. We must translate this heritage into terms of today. The Church is passing through a period of reconstruction and is trying to adjust itself. Every loyal Christian must take part to make the Church of Christ one-hundred per. cent. The purpose of the Church Service League, is to interest all the women of the Church in the work of the Church as a whole. The Auxiliary as the great missionary body in the Church today, must act as a leaven of the Master's Spirit—"His Kingdom come, His Will be done." The need is great and the opportunities endless. We sing, "Lift high His Royal Banner, it must not suffer loss," and it is the work of the Auxiliary to see that that Banner

does not suffer loss. In closing Miss Corey repeated the Master's words, "For whosoever will save his life shall lose it, but whosoever will lose his life for my sake, the same shall save it."

After closing prayers by the President, the meeting adjourned.

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS.

Women of the Auxiliary—We come again to our Annual Meeting. What has this year meant to us, corporately and individually, in our efforts to bring a knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ to those who know Him not? If, in trying to make others know Him, we have not come to know and love Him better ourselves, I fear our efforts will have been in vain—something will necessarily have been lacking. The Church has been adjusting itself to its re-organization and the Auxiliary has multiplied its machinery. Has this increased machinery made us more efficient and if so, has this greater efficiency deepened our spirituality? If not our work has been in vain, but, thank God, I believe we are living closer to Him than we were a year ago. Rarely does anyone have the privilege of working with a more devoted, loyal group of women, than are the officers with whom you have strengthened your President. I believe the same is true in a large measure of our parochial officers also. It has been my privilege to visit eight parochial branches, some more than once, in the last year and I find this same loyalty in the parish branches. May I take this opportunity of thanking the parochial branches for the splendid way in which they have upheld the Board and responded to every request? We have asked big things of you in 1920 and we hope to ask even bigger in 1921. An organization that does not grow is apt to stagnate and your Board desires no stagnation in Kentucky. We report two new branches formed this year, one at St. Clement's, Henderson, and the other at St. Thomas, Louisville, with an evening branch in the process of forming at Grace Church, Louisville. Both of the new branches co-operated splendidly in the Advent boxes. No branches have been discontinued, but it has seemed wise to unite the two branches at St. Stephen's Church. We are looking to this combined branch for even greater results

than we formerly had from the two for we believe that "in union there is strength."

Many of you know that we have taken the word "Co-operation" as our slogan this winter and I can truly say that so far as I know every branch has co-operated. As you hear the various reports read, you will see that in practically every department we report an increase. The total value of our year's work for 1920 is \$6298.98, as compared with \$4907.14 for 1919, a gain of over \$1300.00. This is very gratifying. But even more than the increase in dollars and cents is the growth which we hope and believe we see in those deeper things which cannot be tabulated. I believe this growth, both tangible and intangible, has come from this earnest co-operation, first with each other, then with our officers, parochial, diocesan and national and above all co-operation with our Divine Lord and Master who has made it possible for us to be co-workers with God. The Woman's Auxiliary has completed its first year with a National Executive Board and I sincerely believe that this Board has proven its worth. At least there are sixteen women who know and are facing the problems that confront the Auxiliary all over the country. It seems providential that we had such a Board during this year, for without it, the Auxiliary might have been lost in the Church's re-organization. On October 16th, 1921 the Auxiliary will celebrate the 50th, Anniversary of its organization and will mark this Golden Jubilee by a gift of \$50,000, to be known as the Emery Fund. Dear as this Anniversary ought to be to our hearts, it will have a more personal touch with us for our Executive Committee has decided to make Kentucky's gift to this Fund a memorial to her who was our devoted and beloved leader for thirty-six years, Mrs. M. E. A. Dudley. Of course, dollars and cents cannot express what she meant to Kentucky and its women, but we do believe we can show our love for her by contributing in such measure as we are able, to a fund in her memory which shall carry on so exactly the work for which she did so much while here on earth. I will not say more

about this for Miss Robinson will present it to you in detail later at which time pledges will be made.

You have also heard of the necessity of increasing our Central Fund, and after the Treasurer presents her report she will ask for increased pledges to that Fund. The Supply Department has organized a bureau of supplies for second hand garments to which the two Social Service visitors of the House of Churchwomen will have access. For this purpose we are sorely in need of an old wardrobe or trunk in which we can keep these things. If anyone has either of these that they can give us, please communicate with the Supply Secretary or myself. Likewise please remember that we want all of the second hand clothing of any kind that you can send us. We have only sent off one box under the re-organized Supply Department but the plan seems most acceptable. It is not very different from the way in which we have managed our Lenten work for years, except that instead of sending what we thought would be acceptable we are now told just what is needed and asked to supply those articles. When we get it really to working, I think we will wonder how we were ever willing to do the old way. It will mean some re-adjustment, but any pain it may cause us will only be growing pains and we should always welcome those.

We are about to recommend to you two new features of work. First that the work which was formerly known as the Correspondence Branch be turned over to the Committee on Missions of the House of Churchwomen and be developed as a Diocesan Branch of the Church League of the Isolated. Mrs. Frank Foster, has kindly consented to take charge of this and will explain it more fully later. For the present she will work through the parochial branches of the Auxiliary, so please give her co-operation whenever possible. The second is that we try to get more people to use the Church Service League Prayer Leaflet which is issued quarterly and contains a resume of what the Church is doing today and

where the work is being done. Miss Youngman will develop this in connection with the Church Periodical Club.

The thing which gives me most pleasure in connection with this year's work, I believe, is that another of our Diocesan officers has made a tour of the Diocese visiting Paducah, Princeton, Hopkinsville, and Henderson. Mrs. Maury, our Educational Secretary, returned from this trip wonderfully impressed with the possibilities of Western Kentucky and keen about the women who were doing the Church's work there. The reports of what her visit meant to those places were most gratifying and I hope each year some officer may visit all our branches outside of Louisville. We, in the city, need this as much as those outside do. An address of this kind is necessarily full of facts and figures, but the thought I want you to carry away with you, is not one of pride for what we have done, although we are thankful to God that He has blessed our efforts so abundantly; not one of machinery for doing the work more efficiently, although we do believe our organization is more effective than formerly; not even one of plans for the future, although we must plant and water if we expect God to give the increase, but a determination on the part of each one of us to give herself more completely than ever before to the service of Him whom we call Lord and Master. We ask not only your co-operation in giving your money and your service, but we most earnestly ask your prayers for the work which is so dear to all of us, and especially do we ask prayers for those of us who have been called to positions of leadership.

May God grant us a year full of even greater opportunities of service for Him and then the further blessing of strength and willingness to seize these God-given opportunities, is the wish and prayer of your President.

REPORT OF THE SECRETARY.

The Womans' Auxiliary in the Diocese of Kentucky has completed its first year of work under the new policy. The Executive Board has appreciated the honor conferred on it, and has felt the responsibility placed upon it. The slogan for the year has been "co-operation." During the year the Executive Board has met six times in the Bishop's Room of the Cathedral House. Two changes have been made. Mrs. Charles Mockridge, elected at the Annual Meeting of last year, supply secretary, resigned in April, and Mrs. Harry Williams was elected by the Board to take her place. In September Mrs. Williams' resignation was received and Mrs. H. S. Fagin, the present supply secretary was elected to the office. In November, Miss Burnett, of Paducah, sent in her resignation as second vice-president. It was decided to fill that office at the Annual Meeting.

During the year two new branches have been added to the list, one at St. Thomas' Mission, Louisville and the other at St. Clement's Mission, Henderson, making the total number of branches 24. The total number of members enrolled is 649, an increase over last year of 33. This does not include St. Clement's, Henderson, or Mission of the Good Shepherd, Hopkinsville, from whom no reports were received.

Representatives from the Auxiliary were appointed on the three committees of the House of Churchwomen Missions, Mrs. H. S. Musson, Religious Education, Mrs. Chas. Mockridge, and Social Service, Miss Gorin.

A committee for raising a fund of a \$1000.00, pledged at the Triennial, for a Chapel at St. Hilda's, Wuchang, China, where Miss Buchanan has been teaching for four years, was appointed, with Mrs. C. E. Woodcock, Chairman and Miss Mary Semple, Treasurer. \$1410.79 was raised, many personal friends of Miss Buchanan, who are not members of the Auxiliary, contributing to the fund.

Mrs. C. V. Williams was appointed chairman of work for Lepers, in our Diocese. She reported that our church was doing work among Lepers in Japan, Anking, China, and San Juan, Porto Rico.

On October 16, 1921, the Woman's Auxiliary will have completed fifty years of active service for the extension of Christ's Kingdom. At the Triennial at Detroit, it was decided to mark this fiftieth anniversary by a gift of at least \$50,000.00 as an expression of our gratitude for the half century of the work of the Woman's Auxiliary. This fund is to be given to the Presiding Bishop and Council to be for all time a trust fund—the income to be used for the benefit and pleasure of missionaries on furlough, for study, health and recreation. It will be called the Emery Fund, in grateful recognition of the devoted labor of three sisters, Mrs. Twing, Miss Julia Emery and Miss M. T. Emery. Our own President, Miss Winston, has been made National Chairman and has appointed Mrs. Mason Barret, Diocesan Chairman. A minimum of \$500.00 has been pledged by the Auxiliary in the Diocese of Kentucky, to this fund.

Because of the increased expenses, a new schedule of assessments to the Central Fund has been arranged, with the hope that all branches will increase their contributions, at least advancing one class, and more, if possible. The annual assessment to the Province has been increased to a minimum of \$50.00

Plans have been discussed as to the best method of reaching and interesting the business women. Several night branches have already been organized.

Six United Lenten Meetings were held with an average attendance of 106. The total sum of offerings amounted to \$81.36 and was given to the Lenten Box Expenses, the Fund for St. Hilda's Chapel, Wuchang, China, and a Summer Conference Scholarship. Speakers at the Lenten Meetings were, Miss Youngman, Miss Anderson, Miss Parker, Mrs. David Gray, Mrs. Gazley Hamilton, Mrs. C. V. Williams, Mr. Millner, Miss Wanless and Miss L. L. Robinson. The

Lenten Boxes were sent to the mountain missions in Monterey, Tenn., and Saluda, N. C., and were valued at \$1282.03. A barrel of magazines was sent by the Church Periodical Club, to Sheltering Arms Hospital, Hansford, W. Va.,

The Educational Secretary reported eleven Mission Study Classes, with a total enrollment of 76. Nine branches had program meetings during the year.

The United Thank Offering Service was held in the Cathedral, St. Luke's Day, October 18th., at 9:30, Bishop Woodcock being the celebrant and speaker. The offering for the year is \$1350.32.

A service of Intercession was held in the Cathedral on December 2, beginning with a Corporate Communion at which Dean Emeritus Craik, was celebrant, assisted by the Rev. C. E. Craik, Jr., and followed by a quiet hour, three meditations being given by the Rev. L. E. Johnston.

The Advent boxes, the first to be undertaken under the newly organized box work, were sent to Columbia, S. C., Winner, S. Da., and Wind River, Wyoming. The new plan proved very successful. The total value was \$749.69, a gain of nearly \$200 over last year.

Regular Quarterly meetings of the Diocesan Board have been held in the Girl's Friendly Room of the Cathedral House, the programs being educational and inspirational. Archdeacon Stuck, whom God has since called Home, spoke most interestingly at the April meeting of his work among the Indians in the "Land of the Mid-night Sun." An offering was taken for his work amounting to \$85.50. Some interesting and helpful Conferences have been had at the other meetings.

The Auxiliary has paid during the year on Kentucky's Assessment to the Nation-wide quota, \$808.40. Total work done by the Auxiliary, \$6298.92, a gain over last year of \$1391.78.

Seven Branches did no educational work at all.

During the past year no normal classes were held though there were eleven Lenten study classes with 176 members enrolled. The strongest of these classes were the two Inter-parochial classes, Miss Winston's Bible Class, Miss Almstedt's on Neighbors. Mention should also be made of Mrs. Maury's class at the Church of the Merciful Savior, the most faithful in regular attendance. Two Mission Study Classes were reported from Paducah, one from Hopkinsville, one from Hickman. The Educational Secretary has visited, by invitation, nine different branches in the See City, and out in the Diocese, giving at each branch a short talk on the Survey. Paducah is an inspiration to the whole Diocese, for there one finds a whole branch entirely composed of young women, all vitally interested in the Auxiliary. The branch at Hopkinsville, though smaller is much alive and keenly interested in the Survey. Henderson is a rather small branch but most devoted in their service.

The Educational Committee deemed it wise to omit a Normal class again this year, determining to throw the entire strength of the Auxiliary on the Lenten Study Classes. The Missions House is urging the use of the Survey until 1922 and there has been prepared for us such a number of excellent manuels and sets of program meetings that normal classes seem unnecessary. Lent has much in store for us. Miss Robinson will lead a class on the "Psalms," Monday

mornings at 10.30, Miss Almstedt will hold a class for employed women, Friday nights at 7.30. On March 9, 10, and 11, Miss Tillotson, of the Missions House will come to us for a two days Institute. I ask for and rely on the aid of each officer in every branch to promote her classes. The subject will be announced later.

Our annual United Thank Offering service was held St. Luke's Day, Oct. 18th, at Christ Church Cathedral. Bishop Woodcock gave us an unusually strong talk—we do not feel as if it were our United Thank Offering service unless he is with us—and was the celebrant at our corporate communion. We are deeply indebted to Mrs. Alec Barret for our music.

One new branch has been started at Good Shepherd's, Hopkinsville. Many of the older branches show a decided increase in the number of women giving, and in interest in the offering and in the Missionaries. With the exception of the Victory offering in Sept. 1919 the two offerings this

year were the largest we have ever had. The United Thank Offering conference, held during the Synod, by Mrs. Cowan, of the Diocese of Lexington, aroused much interest and caused an unusual number of requests for boxes and literature. Many boxes and much literature have been distributed during the year.

Mrs. Saunders, Secretary of the Correspondence Branch, left the Diocese last summer and her work was turned over to me until the annual Woman's Auxiliary meeting. In September I wrote to the twenty-seven women who gave last year, and sent them the blue boxes, asking them to use them instead of coin cards.

On account of illness the annual meeting of the Treasurers had to be postponed until it was too late to have it before the annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary. Instead I wrote a letter to each Treasurer, taking up all the points which we would have discussed at the meeting.
