MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING.

The thirty-eighth Annual Meeting of the Kentucky Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council was held on January 24th, 1922, beginning with a Corporate Communion in the Cathedral at 10 o'clock, at which the Bishop was the Celebrant and Speaker. In his address, he spoke in tribute to Miss Julia Emery, who for forty years was organizing secretary of the National Woman's Auxiliary and who had entered life eternal, January 9th at her home in Scarsdale, N. Y. He spoke of her great service to the Church, of her wonderful ability and especially of her humility, having given of her life, self-effacingly, to the Master's service. He said that in his opinion her greatest contributions to the Church was her ability to inspire others with a love for Missions. He said further, that he was glad that she had lived to see the success of the Emery Fund.

The Bishop also spoke in appreciation of the work done by the Auxiliary in Kentucky, bidding us maintain our enthusiasm, to pray, toil, sacrifice, and serve for our Lord and Master. He told us to thank God for the opportunities that had been given us and to show our thanks by never becoming weak in faith, weary in heart, or fatigued in body, and that the test of our Christianity would be the enthusiasm that we were passing on to others, to make God known to all men everywhere.

The business meeting followed immediately, convening in Dudley Memorial Hall, Bishop Woodcock opening the meeting with prayer. Hymn 252 was sung. Miss Winston then took the chair. The Bishop announced his gratification in having about one hundred present at the Corporate Communion, a larger number than ever before.

The Treasurer as chairman of the Committee on Credentials, read a list of the branches who had paid their assessment to the Central Fund and thus were entitled

to a vote. This list will be found incorporated in her report. The Secretary called the roll of delegates, all city parishes being represented, also Grace Church, Hopkinsville, St. Paul's, Henderson and St. Paul's, Hickman.

The President asked for a motion giving the privilege of the floor without the vote to all Auxiliary members present. Motion carried.

The President's address followed. She spoke of the increase of the material work and hoped it was the result of a spiritual growth, of the increase of corporate communions, asking all branches to have at least one corporate communion during the following year. She said that our slogan for the year would be: "Kentucky on the Nation Wide Campaign Roll of Honor in 1922," that this year we would concentrate on the Nation Wide Quota and the United Thank Offering, this year's offering to be called the "Peace Offering."

She spoke of the many privileges we have had through the generosity of Headquarters, and bade us go forward determined to serve Christ more faithfully in the future.

The Annual report of the Secretary was read. She reported twenty-five branches, one being a new one. Total enrollment, 659. Total work done during the year, valued at \$8948.45, an increase over last year of \$2649.-53.

The Treasurer then read her report which showed total receipts from all sources, \$3369.17, total disbursements, \$3173.00, leaving a balance in the Central Fund of \$196.17. This report includes the Emery or M. E. A. Dudley Memorial Fund report which amounted to \$1671.00.

Pledges were then called for to the Central Fund, the Nation Wide Quota, and the Special, which is to be Miss Buchanan's salary of \$800.00. Almost all branches advanced one class in the Central Fund and increased their pledges to the Nation Wide Quota. About one half of the \$800.00 for the Special was pledged.

The hour of noon having arrived, noon-day prayer was conducted by the Rev. R. E. Campbell, O. H. C. Ft. Campbell also told of his work among mountain boys at St. Andrew's School, Sewanee, Tenn.

The following resolution was presented from the Executive Board. Resolution: "That the pledge to the National Board be raised from \$15.00 to \$20.00 and that the pledge of \$75.00 to the Provincial Fund remain the same." A motion was carried to adopt the resolution.

The Secretary was instructed to send a message of love and greeting to Mrs. Woodcock and to express the regrets of the Auxiliary at her resignation. Also to write a note of love and sympathy to Miss L. L. Robinson with the regrets of the Auxiliary at her absence.

A motion was carried that a letter of greeting be sent to Miss Buchanan from the Annual Meeting.

The report of the Custodian of the United Thank Offering showed a balance on hand of \$3074.67, receipts for the year having been \$1724.35. The Custodian urged the necessity of hard work in order to double the offering of the last Triennial, as the collection must be made a month earlier. The Annual United Thank Offering Service was held in the Cathedral House on St. Luke's Day, October 18th., Bishop Woodcock being the celebrant and speaker.

Miss Lindley's annual letter was read by the President. She urged special work for the United Thank Offering. She also asked that signatures be gotten to the resolution to be sent to the women of Japan, in response to one received from them in the efforts of world peace. She said that the National Executive Board had resolved to join in observing the first Friday in Lent as a day of prayer for Missions. She announced the resignation of Miss Helen Hendricks as Recruiting Secretary.

The following names were recommended by the Executive Board for nomination as Vice Presidents: Mrs. H. S. Musson, Mrs. Meade Robinson, and Mrs.

Lawrence Poston. Nominations would be in order from the floor.

Delegates to the Triennial at Portland would also be elected.

A motion to adjourn for luncheon followed.

The afternoon session of the Annual Meeting was held in Dudley Memorial Hall beginning at 2 o'clock. Miss Winston opened the meeting with prayer. Hymn 253 was sung. The minutes of the morning meeting were read and approved. The first business in order was the election of first vice president. Mrs. Swager Sherley, Mrs. Parker, Mrs. Minott and Miss Mitchell were appointed tellers. After a prayer for guidance of the Holy Spirit, the ballots were cast. The tellers reported Mrs. H. S. Musson elected.

Election of five delegates and five alternates to the Triennial at Portland followed. It was moved and carried that the five names receiving the highest number of votes be elected as delegates, and the five receiving the next highest, be the alternates. Those elected were, delegates, Miss Winston, Mrs. C. E. Woodcock, Mrs. Harry Musson, Mrs. John Douglas, and Miss Warren; alternates, Mrs. Spalding Coleman, Mrs. Heyburn, Miss Reed, Mrs. Custis Fletcher, and Mrs. Elbridge Palmer.

The Supply Secretary reported Lenten Boxes sent to mountain missions in Columbia, Tenn., and Dante, Va., valued at \$1442.04, and Advent Boxes sent to Missions Home, Virginia, and personal boxes to Rev. Vincent Lacey, Tiskilwa, Ill., and to the Rev. Chas. Wood, Webster, South Dakota, valued at \$1390.73. Total value of Supply Work, \$2832.77, \$800.00 more than last year. She said that the Supply Department could use any amount of second hand clothing.

The Educational Secretary reported nine branches having educational secretaries, three branches had Lenten study classes, twelve held program meetings. Four branches were reported as doing no educational work of

any description. St. Mark's, Louisville, and Grace, Paducah, were called the banner branches in educational work. Mrs. Maury stated that she had asked Miss Robinson to have an inter-parochial Bible Class during Lent, but because of the poor attendance last year, Miss Robinson deemed it best not to try one this year. Mrs. Maury asked each branch president to obtain a list of those who would like to become members and if a sufficient number could be gotten, Miss Robinson might be persuaded to have a class.

A tentative Lenten program was presented.

Mrs. C. V. Williams gave a report of the Leper Work, members of our church having contributed \$82.00.

A motion was made and carried that all reports be accepted and filed.

A rising vote of thanks was given the ladies of Grace Church for their delightful luncheon.

A letter was read from Bishop Woodcock endorsing Miss Winston's letter to the branch presidents.

The following resolution was passed:

Whereas the Woman's Auxiliary is deeply concerned over the fact that the Diocese of Kentucky is falling off in its payments to the Nation Wide Campaign and that its pledges from the twenty-four parishes and missions that have reported for 1922, fall more than \$4,500.00 behind the same pledges in 1921;

And, Whereas, the Woman's Auxiliary believes that this is an obligation upon the diocese which can be met if we all work and pray for it;

And, Whereas, the pledges for 1922 will not yield a sufficient amount to pay the appropriations to the organizations and institutions within our own diocese that look to us for support, to say nothing of how the general Church will suffer;

Be it Resolved, that the Woman's Auxiliary make the Nation Wide Campaign its chief work during 1922, trying in every way, by gifts, by spreading information, and by prayer, to increase these payments;

Be it further Resolved, that the slogan of the Woman's Auxiliary be "Kentucky on the Nation Wide Campaign Roll of Honor in 1922";

Be it further Resolved, that a copy of this resolution be sent to the Joint Session of the Diocesan Council and the House of Churchwomen with the request that this matter be taken under serious consideration and that every one in the diocese make a special effort for the Nation Wide Campaign during 1922.

The following resolutions, drawn up by Miss L. L. Robinson, on the death of Miss Julia C. Emery, were unanimously adopted:

Whereas the Church, throughout its length and breadth, is inexpressibly sorrowing in the call to larger life and service of its faithful servant and our fellow worker, Julia C. Emery, the Woman's Auxiliary of Kentucky, at this its Annual Diocesan Meeting, would place upon its record, even as it is engraved upon our heart's its full consciousness of deep and irreparable loss.

There are lives, unique records of service, which should not, if they could, be forgotten. There are rare personalities, rare embodiments of high ideal, unwavering purpose, and height of achievement, which should be enshrined in the Church's memory to serve as beacon lights to them that come after. Such the life, such the service of Miss Emery. Consecrated in the freshness and beauty of youth, dedicated to aims unfalteringly pursued, beautifully rounded to life's full measure, truly may it be said her path was that of a shining light, shining more and more unto the perfect day. Upon the glorious light of that day she has now entered, there to rejoice, there still to serve, there still to offer unceasing intercession for those on earth, even as she prayed and served in loving fellowship below. Gladly has she heard the Advent Call to life eternal, ended here her Pilgrimage of Prayer, resting for ever more in its glad fulfillment.

God grant us grace to follow as she led, remembering her labor, and her love, and in His own good time, when we, too, having passed through the valley and shadow of death, may, with her, dwell in the House of the Lord forever.

Be it therefore, Resolved that this our memory of her be spread on the minutes of our organization, and a copy sent to her family, to the Executive Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary, and to our own Diocesan paper, *The Bishop's Letter*.

Roll call showed 147 present. The offering amounted to \$41.75, \$25.00 of which is to be used to pay the annual pledge to the Foreign Clergymen's Life Insurance Fund, the remainder added to the Central Fund.

Miss Winston then introduced the speaker, Mrs. George Biller, Field Secretary of the National Woman's Auxiliary. She introduced Mrs. Biller as her personal friend, and spoke of her pleasure in having brought her again to the Diocese of Kentucky.

After a few gracious introductory remarks Mrs. Biller spoke of the great contribution the Diocese of Kentucky was making through its President, Miss Nannie Hite Winston, and what a splendid work she is doing for the Church. She spoke in loving tribute of

Miss Emery, of her consecration, gentleness and strength.

She said that the Woman's Auxiliary was the greatest organized force in the Church to let people know that Christ is present in His Church. She described the splendid organization of the Auxiliary and the fine women who are banded together to make God known to the world.

She also explained the wonderful possibilities of the Church in the Western District, and what the United Thank Offering, through its workers can and does accomplish. She said that our Church is peculiarly fitted to contribute the dignity, restraint and reverence so badly needed at this time. She said further, that if the women at home could realize the conditions that our representatives on the mission fields must cope with, there would be no lack of spiritual or material help. The world is crying for the "Light" and our opportunities are greater than ever before. She closed with the hope that we, women of the Auxiliary, would get a vision of the world need, and then do all we can to build the Kingdom of God on earth.

The minutes of the afternoon meeting were read and approved.

After the closing prayers and the singing of the Doxology, the thirty-eighth Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary adjourned.

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS, WOMAN'S AUXILIARY.

Women of the Auxiliary: Again we come to our Annual Meeting and your Executive Board rejoices to tell you that we report the best year in our history as far as material success goes. We hope and pray that this has also been a year of spiritual growth, and we believe it has. We believe that the increase in our various funds is accounted for by the fact that we have been trying to live more closely to Christ and that in doing so, we have learned to do His work as He wants it done. Truly He has blessed us beyond our fondest hopes.

As we look back over the past year we have many things for which to be thankful. First for the spirit of harmony that prevails in our Executive Board and for the loyal and faithful manner in which each officer does her part. No one knows what this means to a president and I want to take this opportunity to thank each of them for the support they have given me and to tell you how splendidly they are serving the cause which you have entrusted to them. I honestly believe that this same harmony and spirit of unselfish service exists in the parish branches also. Another thing which makes me thankful is that more branches seem to be having corporate communions than formerly and I think this accounts in large measure for our successful year, because it is only as we receive strength from our divine head that we can really do this work. During the coming year, I trust each branch will arrange at least one corporate communion and I sincerely hope that there is no branch of the Auxiliary in our diocese that does not at least open or close its meeting with prayer. No matter how much prayer individuals put into the work, we need the corporate prayer of the group. May we

always remember that only as our work is begun, continued and ended in prayer can we hope to succeed!

Last year, our reports showed an increase of about \$1300.00 over our best previous year and this year we report an increase of \$2600.00 over last year. The success of the Emery Fund in diocese and nation was phenomenal. We were asked for \$500.00, we pledged \$800.00, and we gave more than twice that amount. It was fitting that the largest amount we have ever given as a special should have been this memorial to our former beloved President. It speaks volumes as to the place she held in the hearts of Kentucky churchwomen. Then the national fund had as its goal \$50,000.00 and it is now more than \$90,000.00. Truly the churchwomen of America appreciate lives of disinterested service and grasp the opportunity of expressing this appreciation in a tangible way. May we also emulate these lives by following their examples! This brings me to an announcement which many of you have already heard—that Miss Julia C. Emery entered into life eternal on January 9th at Scarsdale, N. Y. We rejoice that Miss Emery knew the great success of the Emery Fund and that she had the joy of sharing in our 50th Anniversary Celebration.

One of the sad things which I have to announce to you to-day is the resignation of our first vice-president, Mrs. Woodcock. As many of you know, Mrs. Woodcock took this office under protest and now feels she must give it up because of her health. Words fail to express the regret of the Board at this decision, but knowing that she was not well we felt we could not urge her to retain it. I can hardly think of an Auxiliary Board in Kentucky without Mrs. Woodcock for, humanly speaking, she has been my support ever since I have been a member of such a Board and I know that I but express what is in each individual heart, when I say that we shall miss her kindly tact and good judgment more than she will ever know.

So much for the past—let us look for a few moments at the future. We can report no new branch this year except one in process of formation at St. James, Pewee Valley. We hope that this will come to full grown vigor during 1922. Since last January, I have visited only seven branches (some more than once) but during 1922 I hope to be invited to every branch in the diocese. I also hope that at least one of our diocesan officers may have the privilege of visiting our branches outside of Louisville. May we all work with that end in view and pray for it and then probably it will be possible for some one to go.

This year we want to concentrate our efforts on the United Thank Offering and the Nation Wide Campaign. We have had a very encouraging increase in the United Thank Offering but we have not doubled what we had given at this time three years ago. If the whole Church is to reach the goal of \$1,000,000 named in Detroit, every diocese will have to more than double what it gave in Detroit. In 1919, we presented what was called our Victory Thank Offering and victory should have made us all very thankful, but at our last meeting of the National Executive Board, we felt that the Conference in Washington had made such progress that we were justified in calling the 1922 offering, the Peace Thank Offering. Surely the women of America will prove that they are more thankful for world wide peace than they were for the victory of the allied forces. That victory should have been just a step toward the peace which we hope and believe is coming and for which we shall express our thankfulness in this Peace Thank Offering of 1922. The Nation Wide Campaign needs all the help the Woman's Auxiliary can give. Pledges toward this in our diocese were less in 1921 than in 1920 and are even smaller in 1922. Each year the diocese has paid less than it pledged and at the present rate, we shall not be able to make our payments to our diocesan organizations and institutions, to say nothing about how the general work will suffer. Your Exec-

utive Board has decided to bend its efforts toward increasing these payments this year. Our slogan is "Kentucky on the Nation Wide Campaign Roll of Honor in 1922," and Bishop Woodcock heartily commends our efforts and feels that the Auxiliary can be of great assistance in stimulating interest and arousing enthusiasm for this cause. Of course, we can pay only a small part of the money, but we can talk about it and pray for it. Because of our desire to do all we can for this, we have chosen as our special this year something that will apply on the Nation Wide Quota. Dr. Wood has very kindly given us something which should appeal to all of us. We are going to ask pledges this morning toward Miss Mildred Buchanan's salary which is \$800.00. This will mean that she is distinctly our missionary, having gone from Kentucky and now her salary paid by Kentucky. If we should receive more than \$800.00, it will be applied to the salary of another Kentucky girl, Miss M. C. Gordon, who has recently gone from our sister diocese of Lexington to Liberia.

Just one word about the Supply Work. We realize that the allotments were rather heavy this fall and we are sorry if it has worked a hardship on any branch, but we are trying to get this work systematized so that we can tell more accurately what the various branches can do. Our allotments are necessarily larger than formerly for the whole supply work has greatly increased, but remember that these are now parish allotments and not just for the Woman's Auxiliary. The whole parish, G. F. S., guilds, etc., should now have a share in filling these allotments and in helping to finance them. Until we do undertake this work in this way, I fear they will be burdensome for that is the way the National Church expects them to be filled.

In thinking over the year's record, my heart is filled with gratitude for the splendid work you have accomplished and for the spirit in which you have done it. Truly each one lived up to our slogan of "co-operation." If we will only do as much for our slogan about the

Nation Wide Campaign this year! The growth all along the line seems to me to be healthy and yet not so great that we should not expect to exceed it this year. We want to go forward a little each year because lack of growth will eventually mean death. I believe the thing that pleases me most is the fact that we have been able to share some of our good things with Paducah. Miss Boyer conducted an Institute there in November and Mrs. Biller goes from us to Paducah. Headquarters has been more than generous with Kentucky and I rejoice greatly that these privileges have not been confined to the see-city. Let us take courage and go forward, determined to serve the Christ more faithfully in the future than we have done in the past, realizing always that it is not we who do the work, but Christ working in us and through us to accomplish His great purpose. May He continue to guide and bless us and give us even larger opportunities for service to Him and to our fellow men is the wish of your President.

REPORT OF THE SECRETARY.

During the year the Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary has met four times in the Bishop's Room of the Cathedral House, Miss Winston presiding. The personnel has remained the same until January, 1922, when a letter of resignation as Vice President was received from Mrs. Woodcock. This letter brought great sorrow and regret to the members of the Board. It is almost impossible to express what Mrs. Woodcock's love and interest has meant to the whole Auxiliary, and what an inspiration her presence has been to the Board. It was only after being convinced that it was absolutely necessary because of her health, that her resignation was accepted with very deep regret. The office will be filled at the Annual Meeting.

The Auxiliary has had a very successful year, all reports showing an increase. One new branch has been added, St. James, Pewee Valley, making the total number of branches 25. The total number of members enrolled is 659, an increase of 10. This does not include St. Clement's, Henderson, or Good Shepherd, Hopkinsville, from whom no reports were received.

The celebration of the Fiftieth Anniversary of the Auxiliary has been the important feature of the past year. The culmination of the celebration was on October 16th, when each parish was asked to have a celebration of the Holy Communion, at which the women were to dedicate themselves afresh to their Lord and Master. As resolved at the last Annual Meeting, Kentucky's thank offering to the Jubilee Emery Fund was given as a memorial to our late beloved President, Mrs. M. E. A. Dudley. On Tuesday morning, May 3rd, her birth month, the Emery Fund Celebration and Memorial Service for Mrs. Dudley was held in the Cathedral. Bishop Woodcock was the Celebrant and was assisted by Archdeacon Benton, Dean Emeritus Craik and the

Reverend Mr. Musson. Bishop Woodcock spoke in loving terms of Mrs. Dudley and of what she had done for the Auxiliary and the Diocese. He said that he felt it was most appropriate that in this memorial the name of our beloved leader was being associated with that of Miss Emery, long friends and co-laborers. He said that he felt that the women of Kentucky could offer still another and finer memorial to Mrs. Dudley, that of emulating her example of loyal, generous, self-effacing service," to spend and be spent for the Master."

Mrs. Mason Barret was appointed Chairman of the Emery Fund in the Diocese of Kentucky, and her committee was composed of representatives from each of the branches. The offering amounted to \$1671.00, which was far in excess of the original pledge of \$500.00. The total amount of the Emery Fund is \$90,000.00. Our President, Miss Winston, served as National Chairman.

During the past year, the Auxiliary has lost by death, two of its most faithful and devoted member, Mrs. R. H. Peters, who served for many years as president of her branch at St. Luke's, Anchorage, and Mrs. Marcus Allmond, U. T. O. Custodian of Emmanuel Mission.

Miss Winston, Mrs. Harry Musson, Mrs. Alex Galt Robinson and Mrs. William A. Robinson were appointed delegates to the Provincial Synod which met at Savannah, Ga., in November.

The Auxiliary "Special" for the year will be in the form of a designated offering in order that it may be applied on Kentucky's Nation Wide Quota. Very appropriately, the privilege of paying the salary of our own missionary, Miss Buchanan, has been given us, the amount to be raised being \$800.00.

Regular quarterly meetings of the Diocesan Board have been held in the Girls Friendly Room of the Cathedral House, preceded by Corporate Communions in the Cathedral. The programs at these meetings consisted of reports and conferences. The average attendance was 20.

Six United Lenten meetings were held with an average attendance of 110. The total sum of offerings was \$198.15, and was given to the Lenten Box expenses, United Thank Offering, the Library of St. Luke's College, Tokyo, Japan, Speaker's Expenses, and to the China Famine Fund. Speakers at the Lenten meetings and their subjects were, Mrs. H. S. Fagin, "Mission Stations to which our Boxes are to be sent," Mrs. Harry Maury, "Diocesan Missions," Miss L. L. Robinson, "Value of Personal Service in Missions," Miss Winston, "An Account of the National Executive Board Meetings in New York," Mrs. J. Rice Cowan, of Danville, Ky., "Missionary Education along the line of Dramatics," using the "Blue Box Convention" as an illustration, Miss Tillotson, Educational Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary, Church Missions House, N. Y., "What the Nation Wide Campaign has done for the Church," and Miss Helen Hendryx, Recruiting Secretary, Church Missions House, N. Y., "An Account of her Trip among the Southern Colleges in the Interest of the National Student Council."

At the first Lenten meeting the following resolution was adopted by a rising vote: "That a message of love and greeting be sent to Miss Buchanan from the United Woman's Auxiliary and that the United Thank Offering prayer be used at each of the Friday Lenten meetings especially remembering Miss Buchanan and her work.

The Lenten Boxes were packed at the Cathedral House on May 3rd and were sent to Mountain Missions at Columbia, Tenn., and Dante, Va. The total valuation was \$1442.04, nearly \$200.00 more than the previous Lent.

The Advent Boxes were sent from the Cathedral House on December 14th. to the Rev. Vincent Lacy, Tiskilwa, Ill., the Rev. Charles Wood, Webster, N. D., and the Missions Home in Virginia, the first two being personal boxes. The total value of these boxes was \$1390.73, an increase over last Advent of nearly one hundred per cent.

Mrs. Harry Dumesnil, Mrs. I. Smith Homans, Mrs. Joseph Jones, and Mrs. Quarrier were appointed to serve with Mrs. Fagin on the Supply Committee.

A most successful Institute was held in the Cathedral House March 9th. to 12th., with Miss Tillotson, the Educational Secretary as the leader. It began with a Corporate Communion, and classes were held each morning, the book for study being Dr. Sturgis' "The Church's Life." The book proved most spiritual and helpful, and Miss Tillotson an inspired leader. The Institute closed with a half hour devotional service. There were 48 enrolled with an average attendance of 35.

Miss Tillotson also led an open conference on "Adult Education," which was most interesting and helpful.

The Woman's Auxiliary cooperated in the Institute held in St. Andrew's Parish House, in November, under the auspices of the Board of Religious Education. The class on the Survey led by Miss Boyer, Assistant Educational Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary, was fundamentally Auxiliary work.

A very successful inter-parochial Bible Class on the "Psalms" was led by Miss L. L. Robinson during Lent with an enrollment of 30. This class, as always, was very instructive and devotional.

The United Thank Offering Service was held in the Cathedral House on St. Luke's Day, October 18th., at 9:30 o'clock, Bishop Woodcock being the celebrant and speaker. The offering for the year was \$1724.35, making the total amount on hand \$3074.67.

The Auxiliary has paid \$992.03 during the year on Kentucky's assessment to the Nation Wide Quota, \$184.00 more than last year. The Treasurer reported receipts to the Central Fund, \$304.14. Total work done during the year amounts to \$8948.45, an increase over last year of \$2649.53.

REPORT OF THE EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY.

Reviewing the work of the last year, the Educational Committee feel encouraged, yet often we feel that Kentucky, forty-fifth in illiteracy in all the states of the Union, is falling to that level in the Educational work of the Church. Mission Study classes have fallen from eleven to three, yet in reading our Questionnaires, we find more Parochial Branches studying the Survey throughout the year. Of the three Mission Study classes held, two were held in Grace Church, Paducah; one at St. Stephen's, Louisville. An inter-parochial class on The Psalms, led by Miss Robinson, had a membership of twenty-five with an average attendance of fifteen. One Girl's Friendly class was also led by Miss Robinson. This was held in St. Andrew's Parish, Louisville.

Grace Church, Paducah, and St. Mark's, Louisville, are the two bright educational spots in the Diocese. Grace Church, Paducah, arranged and conducted a two day's institute in November, bringing Miss Boyer from the Missions House as leader; while St. Mark's has sent us a complete program of the year's work, all papers to be given by members of the branch.

After Miss Boyer's visit in November, when the Board of Religious Education held its Institute, we felt it useless to conduct a Normal Class before Lent, hoping that enough leaders would come forward from her class, inspired to conduct classes during Lent, in their own parishes. The Educational Secretary has on file a list of study courses and text-books, suggested by the Missions House, and will be glad to furnish this list on request.

Acting on the suggestion from the Church Mission House, on April 1, 1921, I sent \$2100.00 to Mr. Lewis Franklin, the treasurer, as he could get a higher rate of interest than we could get from any Louisville bank. In August, 1922, he will send me a check for the \$2100.00 plus the interest so we can place it with the rest of our offering on the alms basin in Portland. Although the banking law is that on any money drawn out of a saving account between January 1st and July 1st, or between July 1st and January 1st, no interest is paid, the Bank of Kentucky gave us the interest on the part of this money that had been in the bank for three months at the usual rate of interest.

The Correspondence Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary was merged into a Diocesan Branch of the Church League of the Isolated, but some of the women who gave to the United Thank Offering through this branch now send their offering direct to me and I still list them as "Correspondence Branch."

As the Cathedral was undergoing repairs our Annual United Thank Offering Service was held in the Cathedral House on St. Luke's Day, October 18th. The Bishop made the address and was the celebrant at our corporate communion.

Two new branches have been started during the year, Trinity, at Owensboro and St. Thomas', Louisville. The Evening Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary of Advent Church now have their offering separate from that of the senior branch.

At the Union Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary held at the Advent during Lent "The Little Blue Box Convention" was given under the direction of the Educational Secretary, Mrs. Maury, and the offering at this meeting was given to the United Thank Offering.

In April 500 letters were sent to women in the diocese who were not contributors to the offering in the hope of interesting them in this splendid work. I spoke at two

parish branches and sent out over 200 boxes and many prayer cards and leaflets.

We lost by death one of our most faithful treasurers, Mrs. Marcus Allmond, of Emmanuel Church. Her love of and her interest in the offering was immeasurable and the diocese as well as her own branch greatly feel her loss.

On January 9th, 1922, the annual meeting of the treasurers was held and plans for the coming year were discussed.
