## MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING

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The thirty-ninth Annual Meeting of the Kentucky Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council was held on January 23, 1923, beginning with a Corporate Communion in the Cathedral at 9:30 o'clock, at which the Bishop was Celebrant and Speaker. In a very brief address, he spoke words of welcome. He said a welcome is only as large and true as the size and warmth of the heart. He hoped that ours was large enough to take in all of the diocese and all who had come to make the day one of profit and blessing. He closed by hoping that we would grow big enough to take in all the task of God.

The business meeting followed immediately, convening in Dudley Memorial Hall at 10:30 o'clock, Bishop Woodcock opening the meeting with prayer. Hymn 252 was sung. Miss Winston then took the chair. The Treasurer, as chairman of the Committee on Credentials, read a list of the branches who had paid their assessment to the Central Fund and thus were entitled to a vote. This list will be found incorporated in her report. The Secretary called the roll of delegates, all city parishes being represented, also Christ Church, Bowling Green and Trinity Church, Fulton.

The President asked that the privilege of the floor without vote be extended to all Auxiliary women present.

The President's Address followed. She spoke of the great material increase during the past three years and hoped it was the result of spiritual growth. She emphasized the great necessity for corporate communions and prayer, and praised very highly the loyalty of all auxiliary members. She spoke of the pleasure Miss Buchanan's presence gave to all. She said that opportunities greater than ever before were opening to the

women of the Church, and that the evidence that God is blessing our work will be not so much in increased reports as in the fact that He intrusts us with a larger share of His work. She closed by hoping that each one may know Him and the power of His resurrection so truly that we cannot keep this knowledge to ourselves. Then our enthusiasm will enkindle that of others and truly we will come near the ideal we have taken as the Auxiliary slogan for 1923, "That each may know the joy of service" to God in His Church.

Mrs. Musson, first vice-president had no report to give except to say that she had attended all the Executive Board meetings and responded to all calls made upon her by the president. No report from the second vice-president, Mrs. Fletcher, of Paducah, who was kept away by illness.

Miss Winston then welcomed Miss Buchanan. Miss Buchanan expressed her appreciation of Kentucky's welcome to Deaconess Hart and Deaconess Scott. Also for the \$1000.00 raised by the Auxiliary for the Chapel at St. Hilda's and the extra amount which built the cloister that connects the Chapel with the School. She presented the Auxiliary with a beautiful white-brass gavel from Wuchang. Miss Winston accepted it for the Auxiliary with words of appreciation. Miss Buchanan stressed the great value of the two houses included in the National Special for the Triennium, to missionaries at home on furlough and those in training. She asked that the women at home use more earnestly the Mission Study Class and the Missionary Sermon for the spread of interest in Missions, and intercessory prayer for more missionaries, that when we come together again in New Orleans, Kentucky will have more than one star on the Missionary Service Flag. She closed her talk with a prayer, asking that God would put it in the hearts of some of the Kentucky young women to give themselves to Him and His service.

Report of the nominating committee followed. Mrs. Foster said that thirty blanks had been sent out. The President asked Mrs. Powell of St. George's and Mrs. Hamilton of the Advent to serve as tellers. Nominations for president were put on the board. Election for president followed by ballot. Miss Winston said that in order to conserve time, reports would be made during the counting of ballots.

The Annual report of the Secretary was read. She reported twenty-four branches, with a total enrollment of 730. Total work done during the year was valued at \$12,183.45, an increase over last year of \$3,235.00. This includes an emergency fund of \$3,269.30 raised by a diocesan committee for the Near East.

The tellers were now ready to report. Miss Winston was unanimously elected President. Election of the first and second vice-presidents followed.

The Treasurer then read her report which showed total receipts from all sources, \$2,845.84. Total disbursements, \$2,614.46, leaving a balance in the Central Fund of \$231.38. Mrs. Reutlinger had audited the books of the Treasurer and found them correct.

Pledges were then called for to the Central Fund, Nation Wide Quota, and Special of \$1,000.00, resulting in \$222.50 being pledged to the Central Fund, \$905.00 to the Nation Wide and \$700.00 to the Special.

The tellers reported that Mrs. H. S. Musson was elected first-vice president, and Mrs. Curtis Fletcher of Paducah second vice-president.

The hour of noon having arrived, after singing two verses of hymn 261, Miss Corey, President of the Massachusetts Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary led the noon-day prayers, after which she gave a most helpful and devotional talk on the future of the Auxiliary. She said she was asking us to go with her on a venture of faith, in the spirit of fearlessness, with God's guidance and strength. She said that the last three years had been a period of transition as shown by, first Re-

organization of the Church's work; second, A birth of a new spirit of co-operation, namely, The Church Service League; third, The position of women in the Church. She spoke of the South's contribution to the Church in Mrs. Loaring Clark and Miss Winston. She said that the Auxiliary, with its great endowment of missionary endeavor and devotion must lose itself in the greater task of the church. To carry out the great missionary program of the Church, every member must do his part, and the part of the Auxiliary must be to extend its interest to the whole church. She bade us go forth, to lift up our heads that our hearts would be filled with the Glory of the Son of God, which Glory only, will bring peace to the world.

Roll call showed 168 present. There were representatives from the two new missions, The Church of the Redeemer, and St. Matthew's Mission. Offering at the service amounted to \$15.90. Adjournment for luncheon followed.

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The afternoon session of the Annual Meeting was held in Dudley Memorial Hall beginning at 2 o'clock. Miss Winston opened the meeting with prayer. Hymn 568 was sung. Minutes of the morning meeting were read and approved, with slight correction. Election of the Educational Secretary followed.

The following recommendation from the Executive Board was voted upon and approved. Recommendation—"That the pledge to the National Board be raised from \$20.00 to \$25.00, and the pledge of \$75.00 to the Provincial Fund remain the same."

Tellers reported that Mrs. H. L. Maury was elected Educational Secretary. Election of Secretary and Treasurer followed.

The Supply Secretary reported Lenten Boxes sent

to Blue Ridge Industrial School and Mission Home, both in Virginia, valued at \$2,300.65. Advent Boxes were sent to the Rev. Mr. Henckell and family at Birmingham, Ala., to Mrs. Brown, a clergyman's widow and her son in Wisconsin, suits to two Indian catechists in South Dakota, and a box to the Cathedral Home for Children in Laramie, Wyoming, valued at \$1,338.74. Total value of Supply work, \$3,639.39, about \$700.00 more than last year. All branches of the Girl's Friendly Society contributed to the Supply Work.

The report of the Custodian of the United Thank offering showed receipts for the year, \$2,450.67, and the total amount of the Triennial Offering, \$5,525.34, the largest offering we have given. A corporate communion service was held in the Cathedral at the same time the service was being held in Portland. The offering given in Portland was a 66% increase over the one given in Detroit.

Tellers reported that Miss Almstedt was elected Secretary and Mrs. Mason Barret, Treasurer. Election of Supply Secretary followed.

The Educational Secretary reported eleven branches having educational secretaries, three had Lenten study classes, nine held program meetings five had parish papers. Grace Church, Paducah, and St. Mark's, Louisville again lead in educational work. A study class led by Miss Tillotson will be held in the Cathedral House, beginning Ash Wednesday afternoon. A reference library has been collected in the Cathedral House. A splendid Lenten program was presented.

Motion carried that all reports be accepted and filed.

The tellers reported that Mrs. H. S. Fagin was elected Supply Secretary. Election of the Custodian of the United Thank Offering followed. Miss Winston offered a prayer for guidance in this election. It was moved and carried that the nominee receiving the high-

est number of votes be elected. Miss Mary Semple was elected Custodian of the United Thank Offering.

Mrs. C. V. Williams gave a report of the Leper Work, members of our church having contributed \$169.13 this year. She read a letter in regard to a Leper Hospital in Carville, La., which is full to capacity and having a long waiting list. Motion carried that the Secretary be instructed to write the Kentucky Congressmen urging the early passing of a Bill, appropriating \$650,000.00 for the enlarging of this work.

Mrs. Califf offered a resolution that an effort be made to secure more funds for the Near East, through the list of contributors who gave in the Spring. Resolution approved.

The Secretary was instructed to send letters of love and greeting to Mrs. C. E. Woodcock and Miss L. L. Robinson.

Roll call showed 181 present. The offering amounted to \$40.00, \$25.00 of which is to be used to pay the Foreign Clergymen's Life Insurance Fund, annual pledge, the remainder added to the Central Fund.

Miss Winston then introduced Mrs. Wade, National Supply Secretary, from the Church Missions House. Miss Winston spoke of the splendid work done by Mrs. Wade in reorganizing the supply work. Mrs. Wade explained very explicitly the allotment of the supply work. The allotment made each diocese is based upon its previous annual report, and every diocese is expected to do to the limit of its ability. Mrs. Wade urged that the auxiliaries work only for such persons and places as they have received through the National Supply Department. Both personal boxes and general missionary boxes are included in each allotment. Place and kind of work is changed from year to year. All clothes placed in personal boxes must be new and chosen with care, and second hand clothes used in the general missionary boxes must be clean and good. She explained

the use of a central store-room, which can be called on in case of necessity. She urged the use of the leaflets describing the stations to which boxes are sent, and also the poster showing the mission stations receiving assistance through the Supply Department. She said that there were many appeals for altar supplies and vestments, and asked that any such that could be given, be reported to the Supply Secretary. Mrs. Wade very graciously answered many questions regarding the supply work.

A rising vote of thanks was given the ladies of St. Andrew's Church for their delightful luncheon.

The minutes of the afternoon session were read and approved. After the closing prayers, the thirty-ninth Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary, adjourned.

## PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS, WOMAN'S AUXILIARY, JAN. 23RD, 1923

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Women of the Auxiliary—again we come together with hearts full of gratitude for the way in which God has blessed our efforts during this year. In presenting the report for 1920, we expressed a hope that we should go forward a little each year and we have succeeded in doing so. The total value of our work for 1922 shows an increase of \$3,235.00 over that for 1921. While we are greatly pleased with this, there is a warning in it because \$3,269.30 of that increase is due to the offering for the Near East Relief, which is credited to the parish branches because it was raised by your diocesan Executive Board, but a large part of it came from those who are not members of the Auxiliary. This means that without this emergency appeal we should have had no increase over last year. Let us take heed and increase our pledges to our regular work so that we may go forward in 1923.

Today the terms of your present officers expire and therefore it seems fitting that we should render an account of our work for three years. We realize that the biggest things for which the Auxiliary stands—development of spiritual life and deepened devotion to the Church and its Living Head—cannot be tabulated but we believe that there has been a decided growth along these lines. Indeed we feel that the increased amount of our material gifts is only an indication of a greater appreciation of the ideals of the Auxiliary and a closer co-operation with each other and with Him for Whose sake we do this work. The total value of the work of the Auxiliary in Kentucky for the three years, 1917, 1918 and 1919 was \$11,794.37 while that for this Triennium, 1920, 1921 and 1922 is \$27,430.82 an increase of \$15,636.45. This increase is due not only to

the prayer, thought and effort which your officers have put into the work but more largely to the loyal way in which you of the parish branches have caught the vision and supported the plans outlined to you.

May I say here that no one need hesitate to take the presidency of the Auxiliary in Kentucky if you continue to give to your president the loyal co-operation and support which you have given me during these three years. I cannot ask more for my successor. Words would fail me if I tried to tell you of the untiring devotion of the other members of this Board and of their ready response to every call I have made upon them. This same hearty co-operation is true of the parish officers—at times they have not seen where the money was coming from, but generally speaking, they have accepted what was assigned to them and made a venture of faith, which, of course, has been rewarded by success. Our blessed Lord Himself told us “Whosoever ye ask believing, that shall ye receive.”

While we are very grateful to God for this material growth, there are many other things for which we are thankful. First, that we have our own Miss Buchanan with us again and will hear from her to-day and again at one of our Lenten meetings. Secondly, that while we regret that none of our officers has been able to go through the diocese this year, except one visit that Miss Warren made to Paducah, we are glad that we have been able to share our good things with them. Last January, Mrs. Biller went to Paducah, in Lent Deaconess Scott, of St. Hilda's School, Wuchang, China, spoke in both Paducah and Hopkinsville and Mrs. Wade, one of our speakers to-day, has just come from a meeting in Paducah and Miss Buchanan has been to Henderson and has promised to make a tour of the diocese in the spring. Two other things that make us very happy are that the attendance at our Lenten meetings has increased and that more branches are putting the emphasis where it belongs and having corporate

communions. As we look back over the years, we feel that the weakest point in our work lies along educational lines. This is due to the failure on the part of the branches to undertake this phase of the work rather than to any lessening of effort on the part of the Educational Secretary for Mrs. Maury has struggled to get people into classes. Information has been spread through program meetings but we need more of the intensive work that comes only through study classes. Miss Tillotson will be with us in February for an Institute and we hope every branch will select at least one woman who will attend faithfully and then serve as parish educational secretary.

Shortly you will be asked to make pledges to the Central Fund, the Nation Wide Campaign and the Annual Special. The Triennial in Portland authorized the raising of \$75,000.00 in this Triennium which is to be used to further the training of women who volunteer for the Church's service. The first \$10,000.00 of this will be used to establish a Training School for Colored Women, which for the present, at least, will be connected with St. Augustine's School at Raleigh, N. C. The next \$65,000.00 will be used to buy a house in New York where women who are taking training in any branch of the Church's work, may live under a strong Church influence in close proximity to the Church's headquarters. Beside this the Province of Sewanee has undertaken to raise \$10,000.00 to erect a school in the interior of Liberia as a memorial to Rev. Wm. Hoke Ramsaur, who with his wife had died in doing the Church's work in Liberia during this past year. We are recommending for our Special this year at least \$1,000.00, the first \$500.00 to be our part of the Ramsaur Memorial and the rest to go towards the Training School for Colored Women. During the next two years of the Triennium we hope the diocese will concentrate on the New York house. Mrs. Musson will have charge of the Ramsaur Memorial here and at our first Lenten meeting we hope

to announce the name of the person who will be chairman of our diocesan committee for the National Special.

As we look back over these three years we feel that the Auxiliary should take courage and go forward. Opportunities greater than ever before are opening to women in the Church to-day and God will use us in Kentucky in the future as He has in the past if we will only listen to His voice. As a member of the National Executive Board, I can assure you that the work before us during the coming three years is stupendous but each must say with St. Paul, "I can do all things through Christ, who strengtheneth me." We know that without Him we can do nothing, but with God all things are possible, even to using you and me to win the world for Christ. The evidence that He is blessing our work will be not so much in increasing reports as in the fact that He entrusts us with a larger share of His work. May each one of us know Him and the power of His resurrection so truly that we cannot keep this knowledge to ourselves. Then our enthusiasm will enkindle that of others and truly we will come near the ideal that we have taken as the Auxiliary slogan for 1923" that each may know the joy of service" to God in His Church.

## REPORT OF THE SECRETARY

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The Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary has met during the past year, four times in the Cathedral House, Miss Winston presiding. The Auxiliary has had a very successful year, showing improvement in all lines. While no new branches have been added, all reports show an increase, and the number of members enrolled, 730, is an increase over last year of 71. Total number of branches is 24. Very encouraging is the cooperation of the Girls Friendly Society in the Supply Work, all branches contributing liberally to the Lenten and Advent Boxes. Also six Missions in the Diocese where there are no branches of the Woman's Auxiliary, made splendid contributions to the Supply work.

During the year, Mrs. Wm. A. Robinson, one of the best-beloved and devoted members of the Auxiliary was called to Life Eternal. The Auxiliary feels greatly the loss of her unfailing interest and kindness.

The Special for the year will be a sum of \$1,000.00, pledges for which will be asked at the Annual Meeting. \$500.00 of this sum will go towards a \$10,000.00 pledge made by the Auxiliary of the Province of Sewanee to erect a memorial to the Rev. Wm. Hoke Ramsaur, who with his wife, died in the Church's service in Liberia during the past year. The remaining \$500.00 will be the first payment on the \$75,000.00 National Special for the Triennium. Mrs. H. S. Musson was appointed Chairman of the Provincial Special, to serve one year. The chairman for the National Special will be appointed later.

The following recommendation from the Executive Board will be presented at the Annual Meeting.

Recommendation—"That the pledge to the National Board be raised from \$20.00 to \$25.00, and the pledge of \$75.00 to the Provincial Fund remain the same."

As the term of office of the present Executive Board expires with this meeting, a nominating committee was appointed with Mrs. Frank Foster as Chairman. A motion carried that at least two names must be nominated and each vote must be by ballot.

In March, the Auxiliary in Kentucky was asked to secure support for fifty starving children of the Near East, representing an amount of \$3,000.00. The appeal came from National Headquarters, endorsed by the Presiding Bishop and the Executive Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary. It was decided to undertake this work, the Diocesan Board constituting itself a Near East Relief Committee. Through the efforts, mainly of the President, Miss Winston, \$3,269.30 was raised.

Bishop Woodcock asked that the Auxiliary make some contribution to the Bishop Rowe Foundation Fund. A sum of \$100.00 was pledged at once, and the amount raised was \$169.00.

The amount pledged at the previous Annual Meeting for the 1921 "Special" was \$800.00 and has been overpaid by \$10.00.

Regular quarterly meetings of the Diocesan Board have been held in the Girl's Friendly Room of the Cathedral House, preceded by Corporate Communions on two occasions. Programs at these meetings consisted of reports and conferences. The average attendance was 20.

Six United Lenten Meetings were held with an average attendance of 148. The total sum of offerings was \$200.80, and was given to the Lenten Box-Expenses, United Thank Offering, St. Hilda's, Wuchang, for a Library, The Young People's Service League Scholarship Fund, and Archdeacon Robinson for work in the Diocese.

Speakers at the Lenten Meetings and their subjects were: Mrs. H. S. Fagin, "Mission Stations to which Our Boxes are to be Sent;" Rev. J. H. Robinson, Archdeacon of Western Kentucky, "A Trip with the

Church Van;" Mrs. Allen R. Hite, "Some Facts in Church History;" Deaconess Scott of Wuchang, China, "St. Hilda's School;" and Miss Straeffer, "Armenia and the Near East." For the program at the last meeting, the Young People's Service League presented a Pageant, which was written by one of their members.

The Lenten Boxes were on display and packed at the Cathedral House, April 27. The boxes were sent to Blue Ridge Industrial School an Mission Home in Virginia. Value of the Lenten Boxes was \$2,300.65.

The Advent boxes were sent from the Cathedral House on December 6, to the Rev. C. Henckell, Birmingham, Ala., Mrs. C. H. Brown, Wisconsin, two Indian Catechists in South Dakota, and Cathedral Home for Children, Laramie, Wyoming. Value of the Advent boxes was \$1,338.74. Total value of Supply Work for the year, \$3,639.39, is an increase over last year of \$732.97.

The Diocese of Kentucky had a full representation at the Triennial in Portland, Mrs. Woodcock, Miss Winston, Mrs. Musson, Mrs. Douglas, and Miss Reed serving as delegates. A Corporate Communion was held in the Cathedral on the morning of September 7, at the hour corresponding with that of the great United Thank Offering Service in Portland. Prayer circles were held in all parishes during the time of the business sessions of the Auxiliary in Portland.

A Post-Convention Meeting was held in the Dudley Memorial Hall of the Cathedral House on Thursday afternoon, October 19, at three o'clock. Most interesting reports were given by all the delegates. Mrs. Musson told of the great Opening Service, Mrs. Woodcock gave a resume of the Business sessions, Mrs. Frank Foster, who presented Kentucky's offering, described the wonderful United Thank Offering Service. Miss Reed described the Missionary Mass Meeting which followed, Mrs. Douglas reported the Conferences, and Miss Winston closed the meeting by giving the "High-

lights" of the Convention. There were 75 present and the offering amounted to \$10.80.

A very successful inter-parochial Bible Class was led, during Lent by Miss L. L. Robinson. This class, as all of Miss Robinson's, was very helpful and devotional.

A Circulating Library of Mission Study books has been placed in the Cathedral House by the Educational Secretary.

No United Thank Offering Service was held this year, because of the early collection of the Fall Offering. Kentucky's offering at the Triennial was \$5,525.34, the largest we have ever given. The offering for the year amounted to \$2,294.70. The Auxiliary was very sorry to learn of Miss Warren's decision not to stand for reelection as Custodian of the U. T. O. In consideration of her health, her decision was accepted with much regret, and appreciation of what she, through her devotion and effort, has done for the United Thank Offering.

The Auxiliary has paid during the year, on Kentucky's assessment to the Nation Wide Quota, \$1,028.25, a slight increase over last year. The Treasurer reported receipts to the Central Fund, \$293.26. Total amount of work done during the year is valued at \$12,183.45 an increase over last year of \$3,235.00.

## REPORT OF THE EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY

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In the fifteenth verse of the second chapter of St. Paul's second Epistle to Timothy are found these words, "Study to show thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of God." With these words before us, surely there can be no excuse for neglecting the educational work of the church, yet sometimes it seems that our interest is taken up with the tangible work of the Auxiliary without our turning our attention to the reasons and necessity for that work.

During the past year eleven branches have elected Educational Secretaries, a gain of two, three only have reported Lenten Mission Study Classes, Grace Church, Hopkinsville and both branches of Grace Church, Paducah. It is always a pleasure to read the returned questionnaires from Paducah and St. Mark's Church, Louisville, the former having studied the Survey and "How Can We Know the Way" in one year, and now are beginning "The Program Presented;" the latter has had a number of programs on the Survey and some on Bishop Bratton's book, "Wanted-Leaders." The class in the senior branch at Paducah was also a normal class, its object being to train leaders.

Many Auxiliary women attended the conferences held in October by Dr. Loaring Clark, this being in itself an Institute for the training of leaders.

A reference library has been collected at the Cathedral House for use in preparing programs, study classes etc. For the out-of-town branches a small fee will be charged for mailing. At the first Lenten Meeting each branch will be provided with an envelope bearing the name of a Mission Field and will be asked to fill this envelope with clippings of interest from magazines and

church papers, concerning the particular field assigned them. These will be placed in the Library at the Cathedral for further reference. We call your attention to Miss Emery's book, "A Century of Endeavor," copies of which may be found in the Main Public Library and the Woman's Auxiliary Library.

It is with a feeling of joy that we report the instant and willing co-operation of all branches when the Educational Secretary arranged groups of intercessors for those in session at Portland. Not a minute passed there while business sessions were going on that some women here at home was not at prayer for our delegates at Portland. Perhaps the two most beautiful services were, the hour held at the Church Home, led by our venerable Sister Susan, and the hour kept in solitary prayer by dear Miss Robinson, who, knowing that St. Andrew's was being repaired, preferred to hold that hour in her own room.

For Lent we believe there will be five Mission Study Classes, three in out-of-town branches and one at Advent and one at St. Stephen's.

For the future we promise an Institute on the "Program Presented," to be held from the afternoon of Ash Wednesday until the First United Lenten Meeting. This Institute will be led by Miss Emily Tillotson of the Missions House. We now of no better way of starting Lent than by having the privilege of attending these classes.

Beginning the third Monday in September a normal class will be conducted for educational secretaries and leaders, the subject being, "The Church of Today and The Church of Tomorrow."

The Educational Secretary has on file a number of suggested programs, lists of study courses and textbooks and is ready at all times to furnish these lists on request.

As I was not able to go to the Triennial in Portland Miss Winston appointed Mrs. Frank Foster of St. Paul's Church, Louisville to place Kentucky's offering on the alms basin at the United Thank Offering service on September, 7th. The amount was \$5,507.10. On November 8th, I sent to New York \$18.24 which had come in too late to go to Portland, making a total of \$5,525.34. This was the largest offering we have given.

We did not have our annual United Thank Offering service this fall as the offering had to be sent the last of August but on the morning of September 7th, we had a corporate communion service at the Cathedral at the same time the service was being held in Portland. Canon Hardy was the celebrant.

One new branch at Trinity, Fulton was started last spring.

In May I went to Paducah to a meeting of the Western Convocation as a representative from the Board of the Woman's Auxiliary and spoke on the United Thank Offering and the work of the Auxiliary.

A meeting of the treasurers was held to discuss the best means of getting before the women the change of date for collecting the fall offering on account of the early date of the Triennial.

In July I sent out about 500 letters about the offering to women who have never given to the offering and to those who have ceased giving. Over 200 hundred Little Blue Boxes and several hundred pieces of literature were given out.

The fact that the offering given in Portland was a 66% increase over the one given in Detroit in 1919 gives some idea of the growth of interest in the offering.
