## MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING

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The forty-first Annual Meeting of the Kentucky Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council was held on Friday, January the twenty-third, 1925, beginning with a Corporate Communion in Christ Church Cathedral at 9:30 o'clock, at which the Bishop was celebrant, assisted by Canon Hardy and Canon Nelson.

The business meeting followed immediately, convening in Dudley Memorial Hall at 10:30 o'clock, Bishop Woodcock opening the meeting with prayer. Hymn 491 was sung. The Bishop spoke words of greeting, especially welcoming the out-of-town delegates. He also expressed his great pleasure at Miss Lindley's presence in Kentucky.

He said that he felt that the Auxiliary had done much to keep alive the knowledge and spirit of missions, and that, in his opinion, the Church would be doing only half as much as it is, if it had not been for the Woman's Auxiliary. He reminded us that next in importance to creating a soul, was saving it, and that in saving a soul we became "fellow-saviors" with Christ. In speaking of his twentieth anniversary, he said that the years in Kentucky had been happy years with no regrets.

Miss Winston asked for a rising expression of love for our Bishop and pledged him our loyal support in the years to come.

Miss Winston then took the chair. The treasurer, as chairman of the Committee on Credentials, read a list of the branches who had paid their assessments to the Central Fund and were entitled to a vote. This list will be found incorporated in her report.

The secretary called the roll of delegates, all city parishes and missions being represented except Our Merciful Savior. Also all out-of-town ones except St. Paul's, Henderson and St. Paul's, Hickman. Dele-

gates from two new branches, St. Matthew's Mission, Louisville, and Trinity Church, Russellville, were welcomed by the president.

The privilege of the floor was extended to all members present. Mrs. Stanley Adams asked that all reports be made from the platform.

Miss Winston spoke of the illness of Miss Emily Tillotson, Educational Secretary. On motion of Miss L. L. Robinson, duly seconded and carried, the secretary was instructed to write a note giving affectionate greetings from the Auxiliary in Kentucky to Miss Tillotson and expressing their sincere hopes for her early recovery.

The president also announced the serious illness of Mrs. Elwood Haines, formerly Miss Martina Gordon, who had been a missionary in Liberia and had been one of the speakers at last year's Annual Meeting. On motion of Mrs. Goodloe, seconded and carried, the Auxiliary went on record, recognizing Mrs. Haines efforts in Liberia and hoping for her complete recovery.

On motion of Mrs. Muscoe Burnett of Paducah, duly seconded and carried, the secretary was instructed to write a note of loving sympathy to the Branch in Henderson from the United Auxiliary in Annual session expressing their sincere appreciation of the faithful service of Miss Mary Stewart Bunch, for many years a loyal and devoted officer of their branch, now entered into Life Eternal.

The secretary was also instructed, by a rising vote to send the love and greetings of the Auxiliary to Mrs. Woodcock, who each year for twenty years, has grown more dear.

The president's address followed. In it she mentioned the gift of life to the mission field, Mrs. Margaret P. Smith of St. Paul's Church, Louisville, having volunteered to go to China as a teacher for nine months at her own expense. She spoke of the falling off in the amount of the Supply Work, and urged that Kentucky do her fair share in this part of the Church's work. She said, further, that to reach our goal of

\$8,000.00 for the U. T. O. we must endeavor to enlist the interest of other women. She said that this was Triennial Year and that we will have to work very hard and give most generously to show any material growth during this Triennium. She stressed the developing of the spiritual life of the Auxiliary by more frequent Corporate Communions. The slogan selected for 1925 is "That we may all become faithful stewards," and she bade us all remember that stewardship means a faithful use of time, talent, thought and personality as well as money. She closed with the wish that we would grasp our opportunities and prove ourselves "strong in the strength which God supplies through His Eternal Son."

The report of the first vice-president, Mrs. Musson, followed. She said she had attended all meetings and had sent out circular letters in the absence of the president.

Mrs. Custis Fletcher, of Paducah, second vice president, was unable to be present and had sent no report.

Miss Winston read Miss Lindley's Annual letter. In it she mentioned the important matters before the Auxiliary, the Japanese Reconstruction Fund, the United Thank Offering and the Study of Peace Plan. She gave in detail, the plans for the Triennial. She stressed the need for completing the two houses for missionaries, the Auxiliary Special. She called attention to the Christian Year Bible Readings and urged a more general reading of the Spirit of Missions. She asked that the whole strength of the Auxiliary be put behind the United Thank Offering this year, and she closed wishing all a happy new year of joyful service for our Lord and His Church.

Election of five delegates and five alternates to the General Convention in New Orleans followed. Miss Bangs, chairman of the nominating committee, presented the list of nominees. Nominations were also made from the floor. The president announced that there would be two ballots cast, the five nominees having the highest number of votes on the first ballot would be the

delegates, those receiving the highest number on the second ballot, the alternates. Mrs. Stanley Adams and Mrs. Leslie Brown were appointed tellers. Miss Winston, Mrs. Custis Fletcher, Paducah, Mrs. A. G. Robinson, Mrs. Harry Musson, and Miss Almstedt were elected delegates, and the alternates elected were: Mrs. Mason Barret, Mrs. Tevis Goodloe, Mrs. Starling Fagin, Mrs. Muscoe Burnett, and Mrs. Harry Maury.

The annual report of the secretary was read. She reported twenty-five branches, with two new ones. Total enrollment is 713. Total value of work done through the year, \$9,805.15.

The treasurer then read her report, which showed total receipts from all sources, \$4,928.80, total disbursements, \$4,569.98, leaving a balance in the Central Fund of \$358.82. Mrs. Reutlinger had audited the books of the treasurer and found them correct.

Pledges were then called for, resulting in \$347.50 being pledged to the Central Fund, \$1,140.00 to the Church's Program, and \$953.00 to the Special.

The two following recommendations from the Executive Board were voted upon and accepted.

Recommendation—"In view of the fact that the Spirit of Missions should be in the home of every churchman, a special agent shall be appointed in every parish and mission to solicit subscriptions to same."

"That the pledges to the National and Provincial bodies remain the same."

Roll call showed 142 present and the offering at the service was \$14.17. Hymn 509 was sung. The hour of noon having come Miss Lindley led the noon-day prayers and meditations. Miss Winston said that Miss Lindley needed no introduction, being a part of us and a great inspiration to our work. She expressed her pleasure and that of the Auxiliary in having Miss Lindley with us. Miss Lindley began by reading the parable of "The Talents." She used as the subject of her meditation our slogan for the year, "that we may all become faithful stewards." She said that we were granted a great privilege in being accepted by God as

stewards. She said that God, on His part, trusted us, and that it was our part to see that we were faithful to this trust, and, as in the parable, at last receive the praise of the Master, and be bidden to the feast. She closed with a litany.

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The afternoon session of the Annual Meeting assembled in Dudley Memorial Hall at two o'clock. After the singing of hymn 253, Miss Winston opened the meeting with prayer. The minutes of the morning meeting were read and approved.

The Supply Secretary reported Lenten boxes sent to St. John's Mission, Brown Cove, Va., to the Rev. James Baynton, Peoria, Ill., and a layette to Mrs. Harris of Claiborne, Texas, valued at \$1,497.65. Advent boxes included personal boxes to the Rev. Maldonado Primitivo, Porto Rico, to the Rev. B. T. Bensted, Rugsby, Tenn., and to the Rev. Alfred Barker, Dallas, S. D., a mission box to the Shoshone Indian School at Lander, Wyoming. Also three Christmas boxes to Miss Lucas, at Anvik, Alaska, Miss Dodson at Kingston, N. C. and to Miss Duncan, at Wuchang, China. Catechist Jonas, Holy Rock, was sent a suit and underwear. Total value of Advent boxes was \$992.03. Total value of supply work for the year amounted to \$2,489.68.

The report of the Custodian of the United Thank Offering showed the 1924 offering to be \$2,244.12. Two United Thank Offering services were held in the Cathedral, one in the Spring and one in the Fall. She mentioned the goal of \$8,000.00 for the Triennium. Total collection to date, \$4,100.00.

Miss Winston explained the U. T. O. chart. She asked that the parish custodians bring to the first United Lenten meeting, a list of names of the women in their parishes to whom they would like letters sent to stimulate interest in the final offering of the Triennium, the names to be divided into two classes, first, those who have given at times but are not regular con-

tributors, and second, those who have never given, but might become interested.

The educational secretary reported all parishes but two, doing educational work, with Grace Church Hopkinsville, rapidly taking first rank in educational progress. She reported twelve educational secretaries. Six branches held mission study classes, twelve used program meetings, and two, group discussion meetings. She said only five branches, however, were using the study book, "China's Real Revolution." She urged the use of "Our Father's Business" as a study book during the coming year. She presented the program for the Lenten meetings.

Mrs. I. Smith Homans, chairman of the National Special reported all pledges paid. She urged that the payment of the pledges to the Special be made the first business of the year, as May the first is the time set for the closing of the Bishop Tuttle Memorial.

Mrs. C. V. Williams, chairman of the Leper work reported \$215.37 contributed through the year.

Miss Mary Lee Warren, chairman of the Prayer Partnership Plan said in her report that five missionaries have been allotted to the Auxiliary in the Diocese of Kentucky for adoption, our own Miss Buchanan being among the number. Each branch uses a special prayer for the missionary of its adoption and her work.

It was moved that all reports be accepted and filed.

Miss Winston called attention to the chart of The Church's Program. She asked that the name of the special representative for the Spirit of Missions appointed in each parish and mission be sent to the secretary as soon as possible. She also asked the prayers of the Auxiliary for the meetings of the Diocesan Council and the Foreign Missionary Convention.

A rising vote of thanks was given the ladies of St. Mark's Church for the delightful luncheon served by them.

Roll call showed 225 present. The offering for the day amounted to \$47.00, \$25.00 of which is to pay the annual pledge to the Foreign Clergymen's Life Insur-

ance Fund, the remainder, added to the Central Fund.

Mrs. Muscoe Burnett, of Paducah, expressed her appreciation of the work of the Executive Board, and moved that a vote of thanks be given them. Motion carried.

Minutes of the afternoon meeting were read and approved.

Miss Lindley expressed her pleasure in being with us and added her thanks for the prayers of the Auxiliary during her trip through the mission stations. She said that after Miss Emery's death she had been given a silver drinking cup which had been presented to Miss Emery by the Auxiliary in Kentucky on the occasion of Miss Emery's trip around the world, and that this cup made a second trip with her. In her address Miss Lindley spoke most eloquently of the impressions she had gained from visiting Hawaii, the Philippine Islands, China, Japan and India. The glimpses she gave of her trip were fascinating and the information contained in her address was most valuable and stimulating. She described her visit with Miss Buchanan and told of the splendid work she is doing at St. Hilda's. She closed, quoting the Wise Men, "We have seen His Star in the East and do worship Him."

After the closing prayers and benediction, the forty-first Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of Kentucky, adjourned.

## PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

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Women of the Auxiliary, another year has rolled around and we meet again to hear reports of what we have been able to do for Christ and His Church, but even more to dedicate ourselves afresh to His service. While we cannot report such great material progress as in some former years, it is with deep gratitude that we tell you of two new branches, one at Trinity Mission, Russellville, and another at St. Matthew's Mission, Louisville, besides the re-organization of the one at St. Thomas' Mission, Louisville, which the priest-in-charge had thought wise to disband last spring. If our women had been asked to make their contributions to the Japan Reconstruction Fund through the Auxiliary, as they did for the Japanese Emergency in 1923, our financial reports would show great increase, but the National Council thought that these gifts should be made as members of parishes rather than through any organization. Greater than the gift of money is the gift of life and we can report one recruit for the field for a limited period. As a result of Deaconess Hart's appeal at one of our united Lenten meetings, Mrs. Margaret P. Smith, of St. Paul's Church, volunteered to go to China as a teacher for nine months at her own expense. We hear splendid reports of the work that Mrs. Smith is doing there and we rejoice in having given our second missionary to China, even if one is for such a short period.

The most discouraging feature of our work this year is the falling off in the amount of our Supply Work, which is nearly \$1,000.00 less than last year. Part of this may be due to more conservative valuation of our boxes, but this fact cannot account for so great a decrease. We constantly hear remarks about how the allotments are heavier and more costly each year and yet your own figures show that we are doing less

along this line than in any year since 1920. The Supply Secretary reports greater difficulty in having allotments accepted than formerly and she did not receive enough in cash last fall to complete the Advent boxes. Mrs. Wade, National Supply Secretary, has promised to come to us March 6th, and I hope all who have been troubled about their Supply Work will make a point of talking over their difficulties with her. We must do our fair share of this part of the Church's work for Kentucky does not like to be delinquent at any point of the line.

I am sorry to say that again no diocesan officer has been able to visit the branches outside of Louisville, but we were so pleased by the reports of those who came to our Annual Meeting last year that we have again made the same offer to pay the traveling expenses of one delegate from each branch and to provide entertainment for all. As President, I have attended meetings at 13 of the 17 branches in Louisville and vicinity and hope that during this my last year as President, I may be invited to each one. This reminds me that each and every one of us must be praying earnestly and looking intently throughout this year for our new officers. Next January all officers are to be elected, but your President, Treasurer, Secretary and Educational Secretary are ineligible for re-election. Kentucky has only had two Presidents and while the women's loyalty and devotion to the cause are so great that the work is a joy, we must be sure to get the right woman in each of these officers as well as any of the others in which changes may be made.

This is Triennial year which means another milestone in the Church's history. We will have to work very hard and give most generously in 1925 if we are to show material growth during this Triennium. As a diocese, Kentucky has the enviable record of having met in full her Quota to the general Church for these two years, but it is going to be more difficult to do it this year as it is larger. The Auxiliary can help greatly in this, not only in the amount of money it gives,

but even more in arousing interest and in stimulating parishes to meet their Quotas. We must keep this matter ever before our people and more important still we must pray about it. This year we want to concentrate much of our strength on the United Thank Offering. We have set \$8,000.00 as our goal. So far we have little more than half of it. It will be difficult to reach this goal if we confine it to our present membership, but easy if each active member of the Auxiliary enlists the interest of one other woman. There are several other matters in connection with the Triennial that I want to discuss, but I think it is better to wait until we hear Miss Lindley's letter.

You will hear in detail gratifying reports from the various officers, but I want to remind you of what I said last January about developing the spiritual life of our Auxiliary. We cannot grow as Christ would have us grow unless we start from Him and strengthen our work by frequent communion with Him. I am pleased at the increase in the number of corporate communions held by branches and would urge that each branch have at least one such service during the year. During this last year of my Presidency, I ask you to stress the development of the spiritual side of our work as never before. I firmly believe that if we keep in close communion with our Lord and Master, we need not worry over the future, except, that, of course, He expects us to use our minds and hands for Him. He has given us our talents, not for ourselves but to use as stewards for Him. Our slogan for 1925 is "that we may all become faithful stewards." Let us remember that stewardship means a faithful use of time, talent, thought and personality as well as money. If we understand and practice this stewardship then the money will be forthcoming with which to do the work He has committed to us. We can do no greater work for Him than to help the members of His Church to become faithful stewards and the place where we should begin is with ourselves. As I look back over the year that is just past, I find much that is encouraging and

as I look forward to the years ahead, I find opportunities for us as women greater than we have ever had before, but opportunity always carries with it responsibility. May God help us to grasp those opportunities and prove ourselves strong in the strength which He supplies through His eternal Son is the wish of your President.

## Report of the Secretary

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The Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary, during the past year, has held four meetings, all of them in the Cathedral House with Miss Winston presiding. Reports show a successful year although the total value of the year's work has not come up to that of last year, the last year's total being increased by the Japanese Emergency Fund. Two new branches have been reported, one at St. Matthew's Mission, Louisville, and the other at Trinity Mission, Russellville, making a total of twenty-five branches, with a total enrollment of 713. This does not include Good Shepherd, Hopkinsville, and St. Clement's, Henderson, from whom no reports were received.

During the past year the Auxiliary has lost by death, one of its most faithful and devoted members, Miss Mary Stewart Bunch, for many years secretary and treasurer of the branch in St. Paul's, Henderson.

A Fall United Meeting was held in the Dudley Memorial Hall of the Cathedral House on the afternoon of October the tenth, with an attendance of ninety. A United Thank Offering pageant, written by Mrs. Harry Maury and arranged by Mrs. Heimerdinger was given by young people from the various parishes. The offering of \$21.75 was given to the United Thank Offering.

Six United Lenten Meetings were held with an average attendance of 121. The total sum of offerings was \$126.50 and was given to the Lenten Box Expenses, the Community Chest, the Deaconess Scott Memorial Fund, the Diocesan Board of Religious Education and the Young People's Service League. Speakers at the Lenten Meetings and their subjects were: Mrs. H. L. Maury, "A Great Enterprise;" Deaconess Hart, "St. Agnes School, Hankow, China;" Miss Nell Roach, "Japan;" Miss Adelbert Thomas, "China;"

Miss Mary L. Cook, "Value of Christian Education for Children;" and Miss Winston, "Stewardship."

The Lenten Boxes were packed and shipped from the Cathedral House on April 24, and were valued at \$1,497.65. The Advent Boxes were sent from the Cathedral House on December 11 and were valued at \$992.03, making the value of the Supply Work, \$2,489.68.

The Auxiliary again contributed to the Near East Relief and the Leper Fund. A contribution of \$50.00 was also made to the Community Chest of Louisville.

Two United Thank Offering services were held in the Cathedral at 9:30 o'clock, one on April 24, and the other on St. Luke's Day, Oct. 18.

The Annual Special for 1925 will be divided, \$500.00 being pledged to the Colored Training School at Raleigh and the remainder to the reconstruction of Girl's Schools in Japan.

Pledges to the National and Provincial bodies will remain the same, \$25.00 to the National Fund and \$50.00 to the Provincial Fund.

The following recommendation will be presented to the Annual Meeting from the Executive Board. Recommendation—"In view of the fact that the "Spirit of Missions" should be in the home of every churchman, a special agent shall be appointed in every parish and mission to solicit subscriptions to same."

The Auxiliary has paid during the year \$1,165.00 on Kentucky's assessment to the Church's Program. Total amount of work done during the year is valued at \$9,805.15.

One Institute, One Illustrated Lecture, One Quiet Hour, One U. T. O. Meeting, One Inter-parochial meeting also reported.

The comparison of the report of 1923 with that of 1924 is on the whole most encouraging, though interest in the text-book chosen for this year's study, "China's Real Revolution" seems indifferent.

Surely no more thrilling or more absorbingly interesting book could have been given us for study, yet we find only five parishes using it. With Miss Boyer's "Suggestions for Discussion Groups" and the three splendid reference in the Diocesan Library, excellent programs can be planned and executed.

The Diocesan Library has been moved to Miss Cook's office and books may be borrowed there.

Last year there were eight branches which were doing no sort of educational work; this year there are but two; four more branches have reported elections of Educational Secretaries making twelve for this year against eight of last year.

Six Lenten Study Classes were held and five Auxiliary women were responsible for the publication of parish papers; one branch held an Institute; one a Quiet Hour and an Inter-parochial Epiphany meeting; and one held an especial United Thank Offering Meeting.

In a small branch, roll call is answered by a current Church event; in three others readings from Missionary papers, principally the Spirit of Missions are given; and in two parishes, pageants were sponsored by the Auxiliary.

Hopkinsville is rapidly taking first rank in the educational progress of the Church in Kentucky. As a result of the visits of the delegates to the Annual Meeting last January, an excellent weekly Lenten program was worked out by the Auxiliary, in which the men of the parish took an active part. In St. Mark's two members are leading Mission Study classes of young girls.

"Creative Forces in Japan," "Christian Stewardship," "The Task of the Church," and "The Program Presented" are still being used for study.

In Ecclesiastes 12, 12, we are told "of making of many books there is no end; and much study is a weariness of the flesh," but we feel there cannot be too much study of the book chosen for this year's Lenten study. "My Father's Business," prepared by the Reverend Mr. J. M. Gill, is the 1924 supplement to the "Story of the Program;" it will also be the basis of the program outlined for the United Lenten Meetings.
