MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING

The forty-second Annual Meeting of the Kentucky Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council was held on St. Paul's Day, January 25th, 1926, the twenty-first anniversary of Bishop Woodcock's consecration. The meeting was begun with a corporate communion in Christ Church Cathedral at nine-thirty o'clock at which the Bishop was celebrant assisted by Dean McCready and Canon Hardy. In his address the Bishop spoke of the happy years that he had spent in Kentucky. He said that the Woman's Auxiliary was the one great missionary agency that kept missionary thought, work, and service alive in this diocese. He said further, that the unconverted members of the Church were the greatest detriment to the furthering of the Kingdom, and urged us so to perfect our own conversion, that we might carry out our whole obligation to our Lord and Master, Jesus Christ.

The business session followed immediately, convening in Dudley Memorial Hall at eleven o'clock. After singing hymn 253, the meeting was opened by Miss Winston with prayer, the Woman's Auxiliary prayer being repeated in unison.

The Treasurer, as chairman of the Committee on Credentials, read a list of the branches who had paid their assessments to the Central Fund, and were entitled to a vote. This list will be found incorporated in her report. The secretary called the roll of delegates, all city parishes being represented. Out-of-town delegates were present from Christ Church, Bowling Green; St. Paul's, Henderson; Grace, Hopkinsville; and Grace Church, Paducah.

The privilege of the floor was extended to all members present. Mrs. Adams asked that all reports be made from the platform.

The president's address followed. In it she expressed her appreciation of the loyalty and co-operation of the auxiliary which had made her six years as president very happy ones. She said that the reports for the year and for the Triennium both show an increase. She said that Kentucky had been on the Honor Roll in 1923 and 1924, having paid both its Budget and Priorities, and that the Auxiliary had helped to accomplish this. She asked that the auxiliary pray, that through no failure of Kentucky, shall the Church be compelled to curtail its work. She explained the National Corporate Gift. She said that the Auxiliary had failed to reach the younger women and urged that we use the "Power of Christ" to bring them into the Auxiliary. She gave the slogan for 1926, "The Power of Christ." She asked that the loyalty that had been given to her would be given to the new president and closed with the wish that we should go forward to do greater and better things because each will use more freely that Power which our Lord has promised us.

The first vice-president, Mrs. Musson, said that she had no formal report to make.

A letter of greeting was read from the second vice-president, Mrs. Custis Fletcher of Paducah. She told of her trip to General Convention and her visit to the branches in Henderson, Hickman and Hopkinsville.

Report of the nominating committee followed. The president appointed Mrs. Browder, Anchorage; Mrs. Freeman, Cathedral, and Mrs. Young, Calvary, to serve as tellers. Election for president followed. There being only one nominee, it was moved and carried that the president cast one vote for Miss Almstedt, who was unanimously elected. Miss Winston said that in order to conserve time, reports would be read during the counting of ballots.

The Annual report of the secretary was read. She reported twenty-four branches with a total enrollment of 654. The total value of the work done during the year was \$10,277.46.

The tellers reported that Mrs. Alex. Galt Robinson was elected first vice-president, and Mrs. Arthur Reeder, of Hopkinsville, second vice-president.

The Auxiliary voted to adopt the resolution contained in the secretary's report that \$50.00 be paid to the Provincial Fund and \$50.00 to the National Fund.

Miss Winston read parts of Miss Lindley's letter relating to the resolutions on "Peace," "Co-operation with the National Council," and the "Financial Policy," adopted at the Triennial.

The tellers announced the election of Mrs. G. W. Grant as secretary and Miss N. H. Winston as treasurer. As there was only one nominee each for the offices of supply secretary, educational secretary, and custodian of the U. T. O., the secretary was instructed to cast one vote for each, and Mrs. H. S. Fagin was elected supply secretary, Mrs. Brian McCormick, educational secretary, and Mrs. H. C. Heimerdinger, Custodian of the U. T. O.

The Auxiliary voted to pledge \$1000.00 for 1926 to the National Corporate Gift, \$3000.00 for the Triennium.

The hour of noon having come, after singing hymn 101, Miss Winston led the noon-day prayers and meditation. She took as her subject the slogan for 1926, "The Power of Christ." She said that if Christ had to surrender His Life on the Cross to save the world, that if St. Paul had to surrender his life in order to receive power, then surely we too must surrender our lives to receive this power and become channels through which Power can be carried to the ends of the world.

The treasurer then read her report which showed total receipts from all sources (including a balance on hand in the Central Fund, January 1st, 1925) \$4,034.35. Total disbursements, \$3,636.94, leaving a balance in the Central Fund, January 1st, 1926, of \$397.41.

Pledges were then called for to the Church's Program, the Central Fund and to the Corporate Gift, resulting in approximately \$1,147.00 being pledged to

the Church's Program, \$308.00 to the Central Fund and \$955.00 to the Corporate Gift.

Roll-call showed 140 present. Offering at the service was \$23.80. Adjournment for luncheon followed.

The afternoon session of the Annual Meeting assembled in Dudley Memorial Hall at two o'clock. After the singing of hymn 491, Miss Winton opened the meeting with prayer. The auxiliary, standing, adopted the resolutions passed at the Triennium on the "Message" and rededicated themselves to their Saviour. The minutes of the morning meeting were read and approved.

The secretary read a note from Mrs. Reutlinger, in which she said that she had audited the books of the treasurer and had found them correct.

The educational secretary reported that eighteen of the twenty-four branches were doing educational work. She reported eight educational secretaries, and three branches using the text-book, "That Freedom." She submitted the program for the Lenten meetings.

The supply secretary reported Lenten boxes valued at \$972.67, sent to missions at Wind River, Wyoming; Stanley, Va.; Charlottesville, Va.; Java, Va.; and Covington, Va.; and a personal box to the Rev. Maldonada, Porto Rico. Advent boxes valued at \$1,178.95, included two personal boxes, to the Rev. E. D. Williams, Texas, and to Mr. Wm. Losh (Indian) Minnesota; suit and underwear for an Indian Catechist; a mission box to Elkton, Va.; and four Christmas boxes. Total value of the supply work was \$2,151.62.

The report of the Custodian of the United Thank Offering showed that the total amount given by Kentucky at New Orleans was \$7,607.89. She said that during Lent 1,400 letters were sent out into the diocese, hoping to arouse the interest of women not already giving through the U. T. O.

Mrs. C. V. Williams, chairman of the Leper work reported that \$248.46 had been contributed during the

year. She asked that all contributions to the Leper Fund be made through her.

Mrs. I. S. Homans, chairman of the National Special, thanked the women of the Auxiliary for their co-operation. Miss Winston announced that the total of the Bishop Tuttle Memorial Fund was \$102,603.40, with a pledge of \$5000.00 still to be paid.

It was moved and carried that all reports be accepted and filed.

The report of the Church Periodical Club showed 130 current magazines sent regularly. Prayer books and hymnals, old magazines, Christmas and Easter cards, pictures, games, etc., were also distributed.

Miss Winston described the house party for Oriental students held Christmas at Taylor Hall, Racine, which proved to be a real adventure in Christian Unity.

The secretary was instructed to send messages of love and greeting to Mrs. Woodcock, Miss Fannie Anderson and Miss Mildred Buchman.

It was moved, duly seconded and carried that the offering of the day be given to the Church's Program, to be applied on the deficit.

Miss Winston introduced Dr. Wm. Sturgis, the speaker for the day. Dr. Sturgis used as his subject, The Lord's Prayer. Dr. Sturgis said that the Lord's Prayer is the model of all prayer, because it is the great Prayer in the Name or Character of Christ. It is supremely the Prayer in His Name, the petitions are characteristic of Him, therefore we can offer them in the certainty that they will be granted. Prayer in His Name, issuing with power, and bringing peace and joy, is prayer which puts first things first. The climax of Christian growth is to have thoroughly learned to say the Lord's Prayer in the spirit of Him who first spoke it. In the power of this Prayer we should strive to emulate His character, in order that His Kingdom of righteousness may be established throughout the world, His will be done through us and in us, and earth become like Heaven. For His is the Kingdom, and the Power and the Glory for ever and ever.

Roll-call showed 181 present, and the offering amounted to \$62.00.

The newly elected officers were installed by the Bishop, and after the Benediction, the forty-second annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of Kentucky, adjourned.

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

Women of the Auxiliary—again we meet in Annual Session and for the last time I address you as your President. May I say that it has been six years of true joy because of the many friendships made, the splendid co-operation you have given and the way God has blessed our united work for Him. Words would fail me if I tried to tell you what the loyalty and devotion of my fellow-officers and members have meant to me during these years. They have not been easy years for me in some ways, but you have helped me over many rough places by your thoughtful sympathy and co-operation, sometimes expressed, sometimes only felt, but oh! so keenly appreciated. Truly I can say that I know the Christ better because I have seen Him in and through some of you. I can only show my appreciation by trying to support the work under your new President as faithfully as you have supported it under my regime.

The reports that you will hear today will be most gratifying. While a few fall short of some former years, the value of the whole year's work shows growth over that of last year and this Triennium we report an increase of \$3,335.69 over that of 1919-1922. Since the inauguration of the Nation Wide Campaign in 1919 the Auxiliary in Kentucky has steadily increased its gifts to diocese and National Church through what is now known as the Church's Program. You may remember that in 1922 we took as our slogan "Kentucky on the Nation Wide Campaign Roll of Honor in 1922." We did not accomplish it that year, but one of the most encouraging things of the last three years is that Kentucky was on the Honor Roll in 1923 and 1924, having paid both its Budget and Priorities. I believe we can feel that the Auxiliary had a part in this, even greater than the money it gave. I regret that we cannot re-

port the same success for 1925, but Kentucky has paid its part of the Budget or the cost of maintenance of existing work. At least we are not responsible for piling up any part of that huge deficit which the Church is now wiping out so magnificently. The financial outlook for 1926 is not nearly so encouraging, but the entire matter will be laid before the Diocesan Convention and will then be presented to the Auxiliary at its first Lenten Meeing. Not only should we try to increase our pledges for the Church's Program, but we should pray earnestly that the Convention may act wisely in this emergency. Then throughout the year we must continue to pray both individually and corporately that through no failure in Kentucky shall the Church be compelled to recall missionaries or close mission stations. If men and women are willing to give their lives to bringing in the Kingdom of God in remote parts of our own and foreign lands, surely those of us at home ought to be willing to support them by our gifts, by our prayers and by lives that are in harmony with our professed belief. One of us failing to exemplify the spirit of Christ can undo the work of many missionaries because actions speak so much louder than words.

Instead of undertaking a Special such as the Emery Fund or Bishop Tuttle Memorial during this Triennium, The Auxiliary voted in New Orleans to raise a Corporate Gift of \$100,000.00 to be used for six strategic pieces of work chosen from the Advance Work Section of the New Program. You will hear more about this when the pledges are taken.

While we have much to be grateful for during this Triennium, I do feel that, generally speaking, we have failed to reach our younger women. If we could only make them know the joy of service through the Church, some of them would at least divide their efforts. Sometimes I fear that many of us have been so satisfied because we show material growth that perhaps we have not made these younger women feel how much we need them and how much they need that which the Church

can alone supply, especially through the varied and extensive work of the Woman's Auxiliary. We have talked a great deal about the power of Christ and our noon-day meditation today will be on that subject, but do we realize that this power can help us to win our own younger women as well as those of China and Japan? Let us try it and see if three years hence we cannot have every branch at least some of those fine young women who are doing such notable work along other lines. The National Auxiliary now has a splendid young college graduate, Miss Grace Parker, as Organizing Secretary and Miss Lindley writes that she hopes every diocesan branch will use her to enlist the interest of younger women.

Before closing I would like to say one more word about the whole-hearted support and devoted loyalty that you have given to the work during my six years as President and would thank you most earnestly for it except that I realize it is done because of the love you bear to our Lord and Master rather than from loyalty to an earthly leader. Nevertheless I do realize that I could not have fulfilled in any measure the task that He and you have laid upon me except through your devoted co-operation. If you will only let this same love to Him and same loyalty to your President direct you in the future as in the past, no one need fear to take the presidency of the Auxiliary in Kentucky. Our slogan for 1926 is "THE POWER OF CHRIST"—what untold possibilities that carries with it! Through that power we can accomplish all things. May we go forward to do greater and better things for Him than we have ever done before because each of us will use more freely that power which He has promised us is the wish of

REPORT of the SECRETARY

The Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary, during the past year has held three meetings, all of them in the Cathedral House with Miss Winston presiding. Reports show that the total value of the year's work is slightly in excess of last year's, but there is a decrease of about sixty in the number of members. No new branches have been reported, while two are temporarily disbanded, although all pledges for the year were paid. No reports were received from Trinity, Russellville, St. Clement's, Henderson, Good Shepherd, Hopkinsville, St. Matthew's, and Our Merciful Saviour, Louisville. Total number of branches is twenty-four.

Six United Lenten Meetings were held with an average attendance of 115. The total sum of offerings was \$158.40 and was given to the United Thank Offering; to the Lenten Supply Fund; to the Leper Fund; to the Diocesan Board of Religious Education, for the Racine Conference; to the Rev. C. B. Cromwell, Southern Illinois, Mission Work and Tornado Relief; and to the Young People's Service League for their Summer *Conference* Scholarship Fund. Speakers at the Lenten meetings and their subjects were: Miss Mary Youngman, "United Thank Offering Missionaries;" Mrs. G. K. B. Wade, National Supply Secretary, New York, "The Supply Department;" Miss Margaret Nash, "Responsibility of the Church toward Industrialism;" Mrs. Arthur Reeder, Hopkinsville, "Obligation of Stewardship and Proportionate Giving;" Mrs. Tevis Goodloe, "The Dependence of Inter-National Friendship and World Peace on the Church." The program for the final meeting was a pageant, "Stewardship," presented by the Junior Circle, Daughters of the King, of St. Mark's Church, under the direction of Mrs. J. H. Brown.

Through the efforts of Miss L. L. Robinson, a very

helpful Interdenominational Discussion Group was held at the Y. W. C. A. for six weeks in the interest of Christian Unity.

A conference with Mrs. Wade in regard to the Supply work was held in the Cathedral House in March, about twenty-five parish presidents and supply secretaries attending. The Girl's Friendly Society was also represented.

Two meetings were arranged in March to discuss the "Message" sent from the National Executive Board to the National Council.

The Bishop Tuttle Memorial Service was held in the Cathedral on May first at nine-thirty o'clock. Dean McCready was the celebrant and speaker. Total offering from the Diocese of Kentucky to this fund was \$2,100.00.

The Woman's Auxiliary, Diocese of Kentucky, had a full representation at the Triennial in New Orleans, Mrs. Woodcock, Miss Winston, Mrs. Fletcher, Mrs. A. G. Robinson, Mrs. Heimerdinger and Miss Almstedt serving as delegates. A Corporate Communion was held in the Cathedral on the morning of October eighth, corresponding with that of the great United Thank Offering Service in New Orleans.

A Post Convention Meeting was held in Dudley Memorial Hall of the Cathedral House on Thursday afternoon, November 12th. Most interesting reports were made by the delegates. Miss Almstedt gave a resume of the Business Sessions, Mrs. Heimerdinger described the wonderful U. T. O. Service and the Mass Meeting which followed at night; Mrs. Robinson reported the Joint Sessions and the conferences arranged by the Field Department; and Miss Winston in an inspired address gave the substance of the meditations of the Quiet Day and the closing Quiet Hour.

Lenten Boxes valued at \$972.67 were packed and shipped from the Cathedral House on May first. Advent Boxes were sent from the Cathedral House, December eighteenth and were valued at \$1,178.95.

The Auxiliary again contributed to the Near East

and to the American Mission to Lepers. It also sent contributions for Tornado Relief to the Rev. C. B. Cromwell, in the Diocese of Springfield and to the Christmas House Party for Oriental Students at Taylor Hall, Racine.

The Annual Special of \$1,171.56 was divided, \$523.81 being given for St. Margaret's School, Tokyo, and \$548.50 to the Bishop Tuttle Memorial Fund for the Training School for Colored Workers at Raleigh. The latter was given as a memorial to the Rev. Harold F. Percival, priest-in-charge of St. Matthew's Mission, who departed this life, February twenty-eighth, 1925.

As the term of office of the present Executive Board expires with this meeting, a nominating committee was appointed with Miss Mary Lee Warren as chairman, Mrs. J. D. Winston and Mrs. Henry Ormsby serving with her.

The following recommendation will be presented to the Annual Meeting from the Executive Board: "That the pledge of \$50.00 to the Provincial Fund remain the same and the pledge to the National Board be raised from \$25.00 to \$50.00."

The Executive Board is recommending to the new Board, that a \$1000.00 a year be pledged to the National Corporate Gift, and concentrating on two of the six objects included each year. For 1926, St. Agnes School, Kyoto, and Church of the Nazarene, Livramento, Brazil, are recommended.

The Board also recommends that a committee be appointed to raise funds for the Kuling School.

The Auxiliary co-operated with the Institute held in the Cathedral House, January 1924, bringing Mrs. H. D. Butler of Chicago, to lead a class on "World Peace through the Power of Christ."

During the year \$1,212.87 has been paid to the Church's Program, and \$3,473.01 to the United Thank Offering. The total value of the work done during the year is \$10,277.46, a slight increase over last year.

In closing this report, I want to express to you the joy it has been to serve on the Board, and my gratitude

to you for giving me the opportunity. Miss Winston has ~~already~~^{ways} been most generous in praise of the members of the board, but she never mentions that what we have done is due largely to her leadership. She has given of herself most unsparingly and has been an example and inspiration to us all. It has indeed been a blessed privilege to work with her, and I am deeply grateful.

REPORT of the EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY

We had hoped to make this final report of our service as Educational Secretary, a glowing one; yet when we compare the 1925 report with that of 1924, we feel far from satisfied.

We sent out 22 questionnaires; of that number sixteen were returned. One was returned without a question answered, another had only the name of the branch and president inscribed thereon. The rest were not returned. This report therefore is compiled from fourteen questionnaires and from what information we could glean by use of the telephone.

There are now eight branch educational secretaries, four less than last year; only three branches are using the text-book "That Freedom," last year five branches used "China's Real Revolution" throughout the year and four used it as Lenten Study. This year six branches are doing no study work, last year there were but two.

We are always glad to read the splendid reports from St. Mark's, Christ Church Cathedral, and Grace, Louisville; Grace, Paducah, and Grace, Hopkinsville, for in these branches programs and study work always go steadily forward.

With the knowledge of the earnest work of these branches, the news of the election of three new educational secretaries and the promise of immediate study by four other branches of the text-book "That Freedom," we feel content to leave the work in other hands.

Six Lenten study classes were held, some using the Spirit of Missions as their subject; Grace, Paducah, made a study of Miss Boyer's "The Search for Peace," while the Merciful Savior, Louisville, used "My Father's Business."

One branch answers roll-call with an item from the Spirit of Missions, another has Current Events in the Mission field besides the regular program. One small branch has reading, sewing meetings; one had an illustrated lecture, one held a Quiet Hour and in five parishes, the parish paper was edited by Auxiliary women. One branch invited the officers of the Diocesan Board to address them at their meetings and in four parishes pageants were sponsored by Auxiliary women.

In St. Mark's, a group of younger women made a real contribution to the Auxiliary by presenting the Pageant, "Stewardship," in their own parish house for one of the Lenten Programs.

A number of wonderful new books have been placed in the Diocesan Library and can be obtained by applying to Miss Cook in the Diocesan office.

The Lenten program will be based on the General Church Program for 1926-1928 and will be worked out on valuable suggestions given to us by Dr. Wm. C. Sturgis.

We wish to thank you for your co-operation in the past six years, we give up the work with sincere regret and we bespeak for your new secretary your help, a study group and an educational secretary in every parish branch.
