MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING

The forty-third annual meeting of the Kentucky Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council was held January 28th, 1927. The meeting was begun with a corporate communion in Christ Church Cathedral, at nine-thirty o'clock, at which the Bishop was celebrant, assisted by Canon Nelson.

The Bishop, in his address recognized the value of increasing efficiency in religious work; and then made a plea that a constant development of spiritual growth go with it.

At the close of this service the Auxiliary immediately convened in Dudley Memorial Hall for a business session. After singing Hymn 254, the Bishop opened the meeting with prayer. He said he appreciated the Auxiliary as a telling asset in the work of the Diocese. He then turned the meeting over to the president. Miss Almstedt took the chair and extended a word of welcome to the delegates.

The Treasurer, as chairman of credentials, reported all branches had paid their assessment, thus entitling them to vote.

The Secretary called the roll of delegates, showing fourteen city parishes were represented. Six out of town delegates were present: St. Luke's, Anchorage, Christ Church, Bowling Green, St. Paul's, Hickman, Grace Church, Paducah, Grace Church, Hopkinsville, and Trinity Church, Russellville.

The President, in her address, reported two new branches and two reorganized branches. She asked that we try to live closer to our Lord, that by the example of our lives, we may bring others to Him.

The President read a letter of greeting from the Second Vice President, Mrs. Arthur Reeder, of Hopkinsville. She expressed regret at being unable to attend the Annual Meeting. The coming of her little daughter last June had prevented her activity locally, but she hoped to get back into the work this year.

The annual report of the secretary was read. She reported one new branch, twenty-five branches in the Diocese and a total membership of six-hundred and forty-two. Value of the year's work: \$9,056.05.

The Treasurer, Miss Nannie Hite Winston, then read her report which showed a balance January 1st, 1926, of \$397.41, receipts since, \$3901.16, making total receipts, January 4th, 1927, \$4298.57. Total disbursements, \$3946.71, leaving a balance, January 4th, 1927, of \$351.86 in the Central Fund. The Treasurer read a note from Mrs. Randal Whittier, saying she had audited Miss Winston's accounts and found them correct.

The Treasurer further reported that whereas confusion had arisen by contributions for the Near East being sent both to the Near East Relief Office, and the Auxiliary Treasurer, she had made arrangements whereby all contributions hereafter should be sent through the Auxiliary Treasurer. A motion to accept the Treasurer's report carried.

The postponed question: "Shall the quarterly meetings be resumed?" was well discussed and closed by the motion that sectional meetings be held, that each Diocesan officer be made responsible for calling a meeting of like officers once a year. The motion carried.

The president called attention to a protest and question sent by the Board to the Committee on The Church's Program. She read the reply of the Committee which said that the division of funds between the Diocese and General Church would be on a basis of 52.10% and 47.90% for 1927.

The President introduced Miss Carr, a young Missionary, home from China on furlough. Miss Carr has conducted a School of Pharmacy in the Church General Hospital, at Wuchang; and while she trained Chinese girls in pharmacy, at the same time, she tried to lead them to what the Chinese call "The Jesus Way." She told the story of the conversion of a slave girl, who in time, became her best friend. In imagination, we walked with her through a street in Wuchang, and pitied its

cold and hungry poor. She said she realized the justice in our criticism of China for breaking her treaty laws, but suggested we be gentle in that criticism, for could not China likewise criticize us for breaking our prohibition laws. She further spoke in warm praise of Miss Mildred Buchanan's courage, during the recent seige of Wuchang.

At the hour of noon, Miss L. L. Robinson led the prayer and meditation. She took as her subject, "The Noon Day Prayer," quoting our Lord's words, "And, I, if I be lifted up, will draw all men unto me;" she said, did we in our turn, have the spiritual uplift we might have. She questioned such an uplift, when she considered the character of plays put on our stage. She deplored their moral tone, and declared producers would abandon them, if all church members would refuse to witness them. She advised taking the same stand against the daily papers which are printing vile serials. In conclusion, she said Christianity had not failed; we had failed it.

Roll call showed 135 present. Adjournment for luncheon followed.

The afternoon session of the Annual Meeting began at 2:00 P. M., in Dudley Memorial Hall. After singing a hymn, the President opened the meeting with prayer. The minutes of the morning session were approved as read.

The Treasurer's call for pledges resulted in \$1300.00 to the Church's Program; \$365.50 to the Central Fund; and \$1059.00 to the Corporate Gift. She assured the Auxiliary it was growing, that every branch had paid its pledges; that while this year's work had counted less in dollars, it was because less work had been sent from headquarters.

Miss Winston spoke with enthusiasm of the fine work done by the Fort Valley High and Industrial School in Georgia, one of the ten schools of the American Church Institute for Negroes.

A motion carried to again pay \$50.00 to the Provincial Fund, and \$35.00 to the National Fund.

The resolution that \$25.00 be taken from the Central Fund for the Foreign Clergy Life Insurance Fund was adopted.

The President stated that the objectives of The Corporate Gift for 1927 would be Holy Trinity Church, Port au Prince, Haiti, and St. Mark's school, Nenana, Alaska.

Mrs. John S. Douglas, delegate to the Provincial Synod, was unable to attend the meeting. Mrs. J. M. Califf read her report. Mrs. Douglas said the Synod Meeting was the largest and busiest she had ever attended, there being 200 representatives.

Bishop Darst held a quiet hour for the women, Monday afternoon. At the opening, Monday Night, the long line of Bishops in vestments, led by a choir of fifty voices, preceded the Presiding Bishop, and made an imposing sight. On Wednesday, Miss Weed, Provincial President, opened the Auxiliary and presented Miss Lindley, who spoke on "The Message." A gavel, made from wood from Roanoke Island, home of Virginia Dare, was presented by Mrs. Staton, of South Carolina.

Mrs. Douglas further said that reports showed Alabama and Louisiana well organized and Georgia doing wonderful work among the colored. The Young People of Sewanee Province gave an offering of \$1400.00 which was raised to \$1600.00.

A resolution to raise \$10,000.00 before close of the Triennium, for the Hodgson-Emerald Hospital of Sewanee raised a storm of protest. Finally, a vote carried to accept \$5,000.00 as a goal.

The Secretary of Education then read a report of her work. She said the ten speakers mentioned in her report would not be ready until Fall.

The Secretary of Supplies read her report, also letters of appreciation from recipients of boxes. She said allotments were now ready and the Lenten boxes would be packed the latter part of April.

The Custodian read a full report of her year's work.

Mrs. C. V. Williams, Chairman of Leper Work, reported contributions for the year totaled \$304.48. Reports accepted.

A rising vote of thanks was given the ladies of St. Stephen's Church for serving the luncheon.

An announcement was made that a Little Helpers' Department had been organized in St. Andrew's Church School. Schools desiring information can communicate with Mrs. J. M. Califf, 1315 Fourth Street.

Mrs. Califf announced that the Girls' Friendly Society would hold a Conference, January 28th, 8 P. M., in Dudley Memorial Hall.

The President called attention to a book entitled "A Church Woman's Outline History of the Anglo-American Church," compiled by Miss L. L. Robinson and Mrs. David Gray.

Miss Grace Lindley, the speaker for the afternoon, was unable to be present, owing to the illness of her sister. She sent her love to the Auxiliary and Miss Grace Parker, one of the younger secretaries at the Church Missions House, to fill her place. Miss Parker stressed the need of an effort to enlist more service from the younger women. She told us of her attendance at a Foreign Mission Conference held in Atlantic City. It was attended by 34 Women's Boards and Missionaries from all over the world, and was called, "The Family of Nations In The Kingdom of God." Through Miss Parker's appeal at this conference, a resolution was adopted to have a larger representation of younger women on Boards.

Roll Call showed 155 present. The offering, \$67.00, morning and afternoon, was for The Fort Valley High and Industrial School For Negroes. After singing the Doxology and offering of prayer, the meeting adjourned.

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

Dear Friends and Co-Workers of the Auxiliary:

We have come to-day for our Annual Meeting, after completing the forty-third year of our service as members of the Auxiliary. May I say that this, my first year as your president, while hard in many ways, has been made a very happy one, by the ready response that I have met from each and every one of you.

It is a source of very great pleasure and thankfulness to me, that I can report two new branches, one at Trinity Church, Fulton, and the other at Christ Church, Elizabethtown, and also the reorganization of the branch at St. Thomas', Louisville.

We have been stressing the spiritual side of our work, and our reports show an increase in the number of corporate communions and devotional meetings. It is only by living in closer communion with our dear Lord, through prayer and the sacraments, that we can hope to attain the goal towards which we are all working, the coming of the Kingdom.

The value of our year's work measured in terms of money, has fallen much below that of last year. Our total of this year, \$9056.05, is a little more than \$1300.00 less than that of the preceding year. This is caused in part by the decrease in the United Thank Offering, which is always less the first year of the Triennium. Whatever may have been the cause, let us do our utmost this coming year to keep pace with our past records, for it is new experience for us to fall behind. Because I know the spirit and devotion of the women of this Diocese, I am confident of the future.

We have again helped the Diocese of Kentucky to be on the honor-roll for paying in full its budget to the General Church. While no advance work has been undertaken this year by the diocese, we hope it will in the future, and that the auxiliary may have a share in it.

We have tried to make a beginning in the work for the foreign-born, and hope to announce the appoint-

ment of a chairman for this work at one of the Lenten meetings. Many of our branches are studying "Beyond the City Limits." Rural work is to-day, one of the most important issues before the Church. If we look at the map of our Diocese and observe how much of it is untouched by our Church, we can begin to realize how we have failed to carry the message of the Gospel to those who are so near to us. Let us this coming year, by prayer and personal service, try to develop this very much needed work of the Church.

We are now beginning a new year, and what a year 1927 may be for the Church! The days are here, when we, with all other members of the Church are being called by our leaders to reconsecrate ourselves to Jesus Christ in life and service. Let us try to live very close to our Lord, as we give ourselves to the work of the Bishops' Crusade.

I have taken for our slogan for this year a passage from the fifth chapter of the Gospel according to St. Matthew, the forty-seventh verse, and one of the objectives of the Crusade: "What do ye more than others?" To us to whom much has been given, much will be required. That God will fill our hearts with such love towards Him, that nothing may seem too hard for us to do, no sacrifice too great; that thus loving Him, we may become daily more like unto Him, that through us, and the example of our lives, others may come to know Him, and to serve Him, is the wish and prayer of

REPORT OF THE SECRETARY

The Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary, during the past year, has held four meeitngs, all of them in the Cathedral House, with Miss Almstedt presiding.

One new branch is reported.

Total number of branches, 25; total membership, 642.

No reports were received from Christ Church, Bowling Green, Our Merciful Savior, Louisville, and St. Luke's, Anchorage.

Reports show that the total value of the year's work is \$9056.05.

Six United Lenten Meetings were held with an average attendance of 105. The total sum of offerings was \$196.82, an increase over last year.

The offerings were given to Camp Woodcock, to the Lenten Supply Fund, to the repairs on the Church Missions House, to the Kuling School in China, to the American Guardian Association, Manila, and to the Lenten Supply Fund.

Speakers and their subjects at the Lenten Meetings were:

Mr. Morris Bachman, "Camp Woodcock."

Miss Nannie Hite Winston, "The Church In Action, and The Church's Inactivity;"

Mrs. Henry Tilford, "The General Church Program for Alaska;"

Miss L. L. Robinson's impromptu talk on Auxiliary conditions thirty-seven years ago;

Mrs. Margaret Proctor Smith, "The General Church Program For China;"

Miss Winston, "The Kuling School;"

Mrs. James McCracken, "The General Church Program For the Foreign Born;"

Mrs. Alex. Galt Robinson, "A Plea for the Part American Children of the Philippines;"

Mrs. Custis Fletcher, "The General Church Program For The United Thank Offering."

The First Vice President, Mrs. Alex. Galt Robinson, arranged with Canon Nelson to include in the noon-day prayer a prayer for Peace.

The Board urged that each Branch President appoint a solicitor for "The Spirit Of Missions," and a Treasurer for the Corporate Gift.

Arrangements were made and Miss Elizabeth Mathews brought on to conduct a class at the Cathedral House, her subject being "The Message of The Women of the Auxiliary To the National Council."

A Day of Intercession for the Women of the Diocese was arranged for November 30, St. Andrew's Day. Branch Presidents were requested to have intercessors in their respective churches from 10 A. M. to 12, and from 12 to 3 P. M.

At Miss Lindley's request, steps have been taken to put the work for the foreign born under one Diocesan Chairman.

Lenten Boxes valued at \$1136.09 and Advent Boxes valued at \$1081.75, were packed and sent from the Cathedral House.

Two United Thank Offering services were held in the Cathedral, one on April 9th, the other on October 18th, St. Luke's Day.

The Auxiliary again contributed to the Near East Relief and to The American Mission to Lepers.

The Corporate Gift of \$1052.52 was for the Church of The Nazarene, Livramento, Brazil, and St. Agnes School, Kyoto, Japan.

Mr. J. D. Alexander, Chairman of the Committee on The Church's Program, made the address at the Semi-Annual Meeting. There were forty-seven present, and the offering, \$28.50, was for St. Hilda's School, China.

Mrs. J. S. Douglas was sent to represent the Auxiliary at the Meeting of The Synod in Jacksonville, Fla.

At the last Lenten Meeting, action on the question,

"Shall the Quarterly Meetings Be Resumed," was postponed to the Annual Meeting.

The Board recommends that the objectives of the Corporate Gift for 1927 be Holy Trinity Church, Port Au Prince, Haiti, and St. Mark's School, Nenana, Alaska.

During the year, \$1244.00 was paid to the Church's Program. According to publicity made by the Committee On The Church's Program, this sum should be divided between the Diocese and the General Church on a fifty-fifty per cent. basis. As the Board learned this was not to be done, they unanimously agreed to send a statement to the Committee protesting such action and also asking the question: "On what basis will like funds be divided next year?" A copy of this protest and question was sent to the Bishop.

Twenty-five letters and questionnaires were sent out. Ten of these were returned with the questions answered. This report, therefore, is compiled from these answers.

It was hoped that at this meeting we would be able to report a parish Educational Secretary in every branch in the diocese, however we feel that a forward step has been taken in that sixteen branches have reported the election of an Educational Secretary, and four other branches have promised to elect one at their next meeting.

Ten reported using the text book for the year, "Beyond the City Limits," three are using the "World Call to the Church," two branches reported studying the objects of the Corporate Gift, three branches reported discussion groups using the "Spirit of Missions" as the text book, three branches reported assisting the young people of the Church School in putting on pageants, one branch reported supplying a leader for a Mission Study Class for a group of children of the parish.

St. Mark's Auxiliary sponsored a class on the "History of the Anglo-American Church." This course has been printed in book form, a copy of which has been presented to the Diocesan Library. Only two branches reported no educational work. We regret that there are two, but we feel certain that at the next meeting every branch of the Auxiliary in the diocese will have some sort of educational work.

The outstanding feature of the year's educational work was a class on "The Message of the Woman's

Auxiliary to the National Council" led by Miss Elizabeth Matthews. It was deeply spiritual and most inspiring, and those who availed themselves of the privilege of attending the classes felt that the effort was most worthwhile.

A Diocesan Educational Committee has been appointed, consisting of ten members. The duties of this committee are as follows:

1. To guide and develop education in those branches of the Woman's Auxiliary where it already exists, and to introduce such education where it has not yet found a place.

2. To arrange a yearly program for the Diocese based upon the plans sent from Headquarters. This program will be subject to change to meet the need of any individual branch.

3. Each member of the Educational Committee will be prepared to speak on some phase of the Mission Field, and the entire missionary work of the Church will be covered by these ten speakers, who may be called upon to address any of the Parish meetings.

A committee has been appointed to take charge of the Diocesan Library. This committee will see that the library is kept up to date, and will establish a "clipping" department, where information may be gotten on any field of the Church's work. These will be kept in envelopes—an envelope for each field.

We believe that the educational department has constructive suggestions to make, and a worthwhile program to offer to the branches and we earnestly ask that every parish will co-operate with the educational committee in furthering a better understanding of the Church's Program.
