MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING

The forty-fourth annual meeting of the Kentucky Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council was held January 27th, 1928.

The meeting was begun with a Corporate Communion at which Bishop Woodcock was celebrant, assisted by Reverend J. S. Douglas, Reverend Father Reader, Reverend F. Elliott-Baker and Canon Nelson.

The Bishop in his address recognized the Auxiliary's enthusiastic and unselfish service for missions. He bid all welcome and God speed. At the close of this service the Auxiliary immediately assembled in Dudley Memorial Hall for it's business session. Hymn 143, "Jesus Calls" was sung and the Bishop offered prayer. He then spoke of his joy in seeing so many at the meeting, it being the largest attendance since he became Bishop twenty-three years ago. He lovingly wished the Auxiliary every possible success during the coming year.

Miss Almstedt took the chair and extended a cordial welcome to the convention visitors, Miss Grace Lindley, National Executive Secretary, Miss Mildred Buchanan, Missionary, and Mrs. Johnson, President of the Diocese of Lexington. She then welcomed all delegates, giving especial mention of those from out of town, Mrs. J. L. Martin and Mrs. H. E. Thixton, Henderson, Mrs. O. G. Kerlin, Hickman, Mrs. Gordon Nelson and Mrs. Bailey Russell, Hopkinsville, and Mrs. A. B. Barrickman, Shelbyville. She also gave a welcome to the representatives of two new branches. The Woman's Junior Association of Calvary and St. Martha's League of St. Andrews.

Miss Winston, chairman of credentials called the roll of delegates, nineteen city and four out of town branches responded.

The President in her address expressed her appre-

ciation for the co-operation of the members in bringing the year's work to a successful close.

The election of delegates and alternates to the Triennial Convention in October followed. Mrs. Mason Barret, Mrs. I. S. Homans and Mrs. J. G. Minnegerode, Jr., were appointed tellers. Nominations from the floor were made. Ballots were distributed. Thirty votes were cast. The vote showed the election for delegates of Miss Elsa Almstedt, Miss Nannie Hite Winston, Mrs. Alex Galt Robinson, Mrs. Starling Fagin and Mrs. Brian McCormick. Nominations for alternates followed, ballots were distributed, thirty votes were cast resulting in the election of Mrs. H. C. Heimerdinger, Mrs. Harry Musson, Mrs. Henry Ormsby, Mrs. Mason Barret, and Mrs. George W. Grant.

The Treasurer, Miss Winston read her report, she also reported as National Treasurer of the Corporate Gift that \$82,685.17 had been paid into that fund to date. Mrs. Mason Barret reported that she had audited the accounts of the Treasurer and found them correct.

The Diocesan Secretary read her report.

The President then introduced Canon Nelson who spoke in the interest of Rural Life in the Kentucky Mountains. He believed the Episcopal Church had something to offer rural life thru a social program, employing such agencies as the Girl's Friendly Society and The Boy Scouts. He bespoke the Auxiliary's aid in this endeavor.

Canon Nelson led the noon-day prayer.

The President then introduced Miss Mildred Buchanan, missionary on enforced leave from Wuchang, China, where she acted as superintendent of St. Hilda's school. Miss Buchanan took this, her first opportunity, to thank the Auxiliary for their interest in and prayers for her while in China. She said in part that the Church in China will need great help for the next ten years. She mentioned the wonderful work done in China by Deaconess Scott and Deaconess Hart, and made an appeal for some Kentucky woman to consecrate her-

self to this work, one who could have faith in the Chinese. She told of the Wuchang Hospital siege, in 1926, lasting forty days and how by March 1927 when evacuation took place only three of the mission were left. When Miss Buchanan left China she appointed a Chinese woman assistant principal of the School. Efforts will be made to re-open in September. The Church General Hospital now has a Chinese head and it is hoped soon to find a Chinese head for St. Hilda's.

At the conclusion of Miss Buchanan's talk the Educational Secretary, Mrs. Brian McCormick made her report.

A motion carried that the secretary send notes of greeting to Mrs. Woodcock, to Miss Fanny Anderson and to Mrs. Gazlay Hamilton.

The Treasurer called for pledges from the branches with the following results:—The Churches Program \$1,255.00, The Central Fund \$315.50, The Corporate Gift \$1,087.00.

Parish roll call showed 216 in attendance.

Announcement was made of an interdenominational missionary meeting at Warren Memorial Church on February 8th, 9th and 10th.

At one o'clock adjournment was made for a box luncheon.

Afternoon Session

The afternoon session was opened at two o'clock in Dudley Memorial Hall, with singing and prayer. The minutes of the morning session were approved as read.

The Custodian, Mrs. H. C. Heimerdinger read her report.

The Supply Secretary, Mrs. Starling Fagin read her report, she also read interesting thank-you letters from recipients of boxes.

Mrs. C. V. Williams, Chairman of the Leper Fund read her report showing a total contribution for the year of \$233.86.

A motion carried that all reports be accepted and filed. (See reports on following pages.)

Miss Winston gave a short talk on the Appalachian Industrial School at Penland, N. C. She said this school is recognized by the National Council. Its 65 boys and girls are trained in Christian citizenship. The needs of the school are many, good second hand blankets and warm clothing would be acceptable. Miss Winston said further that the offering of the day would be for the school at Penland and urged that the members give liberally.

The President called on Mrs. Johnson of Lexington. Mrs. Johnson brought a greeting from her diocese as of a daughter to her mother. She spoke of the great need of religious effort for the mountaineers of her diocese. She praised the work of the two U. T. O. workers sent to the mountain section thru an appeal to Miss Lindley. She besought the prayers of the Auxiliary that the Church may have a wider vision of this mountain need.

An announcement was made that Miss Maud Royden, eminent English church woman would speak in Louisville under the auspices of the American Guild of Health.

Announcement that a school on Social Service would be lead by Dean McCready at St. Andrew's Church.

Afternoon roll call showed a total attendance for the day of 245.

Upon close of business the President introduced Miss Lindley. Miss Lindley in her address first spoke of her full realization of our being, Our Father's children and of His great love for us. That while life is more difficult now than in other times, it is more wonderful, that God is making us reason out things, that while at one time Rome was the mind of the world, now mind is international, that science and literature are being expressed internationally, that everything is being thought of internationally, that the Church too is realizing an international force, and that force is crea-

tive love. She asked earnestly that we go to the Triennial City with this thought of creative love in our hearts. She had a vision of this love spreading until all cities were cities of peace.

The advent branch served the luncheon.

The offering \$86.43 was for the Appalachian Industrial School, Penland, N. C.

The Reverend Harry S. Musson offered the closing prayer. The Doxology was sung and the meeting adjourned.

ADDRESS OF THE PRESIDENT

Dear Friends and Co-Workers of the Auxiliary:

We have come together again in Annual Meeting after completing our forty-fourth year of service, and I wish to express to you my appreciation for your loyal support and co-operation. With one small exception all pledges have been paid, and show an increase over last year.

We can report two new, fully-organized branches, one in St. Andrew's and one in the Cathedral; also three others in process of organization, at Christ Church, Elizabethtown, St. James, Shelbyville, and Trinity, Owensboro. We now have twenty-four branches, and four groups contributing to the United Thank Offering, and the Supply Work.

I am sorry to have to tell you that the value of our year's work as measured in terms of dollars and cents has fallen a little below that of last year. Our total of this year, \$8,864.94, is about \$200.00 less than that of the preceding year. This can be more than accounted for in the supply work, as our allotment from headquarters grows less each year. But I do hope that in the coming year we will make this up through some other channel, for it is a new experience for us to fall behind, and we have done it two years in succession. Because I know the spirit and devotion of the women of this diocese, I am sure it will not happen again.

The Diocese of Kentucky this year not only has paid its budget to the General Church, but has overpaid it by a little more than \$3,400.00. The Auxiliary is very happy to have had a share in it.

The Educational Committee, under the secretary, has done splendid work. Their program of speakers has been of great help to the parochial branches. May I, at this time, remind you to keep abreast of what the Church is doing by reading the "Spirit of Missions" and

to see that your chairman for that publication is active. Also, I would impress upon you the inspiration to be gained by attending a summer conference and the value they are to each individual and parish.

I have, during the year, visited many of the branches in Louisville and it has been a great pleasure and privilege to get to know better the many consecrated women who are sharing in the work.

I also had the privilege of attending the provincial synod meeting of the auxiliary as your delegate. It was a most helpful meeting. There were addresses by Miss Lindley, Miss Boyer, Miss Weed, Bishop Bratton, Bishop Guerry, and Bishop Mikell. Bishop Mikell, in a very wonderful way reported on the Lausanne Conference. The reports given by the presidents of the various dioceses in the province were most interesting and helpful, and made me feel that Kentucky must be up and doing, especially in the Rural work. The provincial representative on the National Executive Board elected at this meeting to take the place of Miss Weed whose term of office expires this year, was Mrs. John M. Wheeler of Nashville, Tenn.

We are entering the last year of the Triennium. At the beginning we re-dedicated ourselves to Jesus Christ and His Church, to make the strength of our deeds, the measure of our faith. Have we done it? Let us examine ourselves, and try during the coming year to live more closely with our Lord and Master through prayer and sacrament. Besides our personal dedication, there are the eight objectives of the "Message". The answers I have received to the questionnaire show that we have been trying to carry out these objectives to the best of our understanding and ability. Let us concentrate on them these next nine months, for carrying out the Spirit and letter of the "Message," will be our best preparation for the coming Triennial.

In thinking of the Triennial, let us not forget the United Thank Offering, which, to the women of the Church, is such a great part of the Triennial. The goal

we have set for ourselves in Kentucky for this Triennium is \$10,000.00, and we have only nine months more to reach it. If we can get every woman in every parish and mission to take a little Blue Box and use it, I am sure we will go to Washington with our full amount.

I have taken for the slogan for 1928, another of the objectives of the Crusade—"Not only with our lips but in our lives." That we may so live, that those about us may catch the vision of His great love, and be brought at last into His Heavenly Kingdom, is the wish and prayer of

REPORT OF THE SECRETARY

The Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary during the past year has held four meetings in the Cathedral House, with Miss Almstead presiding.

Reports show a total membership of 665, an increase over last year.

Six United Lenten Meetings were held with an average attendance of 130. The total sum of the offerings at these meetings was \$205.95. The offerings were given to the Lenten Supply Fund, towards the expenses of a Priest at a summer conference, the Hodgson Emeral Hospital, Sewanee, Tenn., The Kuling School, China, The Pharmacy of the Church General Hospital, WuChang, China, and for Camp Woodcock.

The semi-annual meeting was held in Dudley Memorial Hall on the afternoon of October the eighteenth. Miss Edna Beardsley U. T. O. worker was the speaker. She told of her experiences in the Kentucky Mountains and stressed the fact that the mountaineers utter lack of any kind of religious services in many places was our churches great opportunity.

On October the thiry-first, Mr. L. B. Franklin, Vice President and Treasurer of the National Council addressed the Auxiliary on the subject "The Churches Program."

A congratulatory telegram was sent to Bishop Lloyd upon the occasion of his seventy-fifth birthday.

A door plate was put on in the Bishop Tuttle Memorial House, in memory of Harold Percival, colored Priest.

The Board authorized the payment of the President's traveling expenses to the meeting of the Synod held in Columbus, Ga.; and sent our delegates, Miss Almstedt and Miss Winston uninstructed.

At the Semi-annual meeting the question was raised, "Shall time be taken to read and correct minutes a year

old?" The Board recommends that such minutes be briefly written and read as heretofore. The Board also recommends that the objectives of the Corporate Gift for this year be, St. Timonthy's Hospital, Cape Mount, Liberia and the Church of the Ressurection, Baguio, P. I.

I have attended all meetings and taken the minutes thereof, have sent out letters and notices at the request of the President and have made ready the Charts for the Annual Report.

Report of the Educational Secretary

We feel that the report of the Educational Department is most encouraging. Although we have not quite reached the goal set at the last annual meeting, a decided forward step has been taken.

Of the twenty-five branches of the Auxiliary in the Diocese, twenty have reported an Educational Secretary.
