MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING

The forty-fifth Annual Meeting of the Kentucky Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council was held January 24th, 1929.

The meeting was begun with a corporate communion in Christ Church Cathedral at 9:30 A. M.

Bishop Woodcock was the celebrant assisted by Reverend J. S. Douglas and Canon Nelson.

The Bishop in his address expressed great appreciation for the work of the Auxiliary. He said the Auxiliary in the past year had done more for missions than the whole diocese did during the first year of his episcopacy.

At the close of this service the Auxiliary assembled in Dudley Memorial Hall for its business session.

This meeting was opened by singing hymn 105. The Bishop led in prayer.

The President then expressed her pleasure in seeing so large a meeting in spite of the very inclement weather.

The Treasurer, as chairman of credentials, called the roll of delegates, thirty-six responded from eighteen branches. Two new branches were reported, one of Trinity Church, Fulton; and the other St. Thomas, Lyndon.

The President then cordially welcomed all delegates, alternates and visitors giving especial mention to those from out of town, Mrs. J. L. Martin, Henderson, Mrs. Clarence Reynolds, Hickman, Mrs. Arthur S. Reeder and Mrs. Hunter Wood, Hopkinsville, Mrs. W. W. Powell, Paducah, Miss Ryan, Russellville, Miss Jeannie Sampson, Shelbyville, and Mrs. George Biller, Racine, Wis.

The President's address followed. In it she called attention to the spiritual growth of the Auxiliary and asked that our Slogan for the coming year be "Every woman in the Church enlisted in the Church's service".

Upon conclusion of this address Mrs. I. S. Homans, chairman of nominations, submitted the following ticket for election of officers: President, Miss Elsa Almstedt and Mrs. Alex Galt Robinson. First Vice President, Mrs. H. S. Musson and Mrs. Starling Fagin. Second Vice President, Mrs. Arthur S. Reeder, Mrs. S. H. Langstaff and Mrs. R. M. Fairleigh. Treasurer, Miss Nannie Hite Winston. Diocesan Secretary, Mrs. George W. Grant, and Mrs. Harry Reager. Secretary of Education, Mrs. Henry de Mazyck. Secretary of Supplies. Mrs. Martin De Garve and Mrs. Harry Embry. Custodian of U. T. O., Miss Mildred Buchanan and Mrs. Alex Galt Robinson.

The President appointed as tellers Mrs. J. G. Minnigerode, Jr., Mrs. Guy Meador and Miss Louisa Hadden.

The President announced that the election would be held with reports of officers intervening while ballots were being counted. Ballots were distributed for election of President. Mrs. Robinson withdrew her name and a motion carried that the Secretary cast one ballot for Miss Almstedt. This was done. Ballots were distributed for First Vice President.

Upon call from the President the First Vice President, Mrs. Alex Galt Robinson, and the Second Vice President Mrs. Arthur S. Reeder, said they had no report.

The Treasurer Miss Winston, reported that every branch except one had paid its Central Fund pledge and that this fund had a balance of \$310.24. She asked the Auxiliary to think of giving not in terms of dollars: but as a service to Christ.

The chairman of tellers reported the election of Mrs. Starling Fagin as First Vice President.

Pledges for 1929 were called for with the following result: To the Church's Program \$1212.00, the Central Fund \$302.50, to the Corporate Gift \$1193.00.

The election of Mrs. Arthur S. Reeder as Second Vice President was reported.

A motion carried that the Secretary cast one ballot for Miss Winston for Treasurer. This was done.

Ballots were distributed for Diocesan Secretary.

The Custodian of U. T. O., Mrs. H. C. Heimerdinger, read her report.

The Diocesan Secretary read her report.

The election of Mrs. Harry Reager as Diocesan Secretary was reported.

Ballots were distributed for Supply Secretary.

A report from Miss Mildred Buchanan was read saying that she had examined the books of the Treasurer and found them to be correct.

The Supply Secretary, Mrs. Fagin, gave her report and read several pleasing letters from recipients of boxes. The total supply work for 1928 was \$2036.00.

The election of Mrs. Harry Embry as Secretary of Supplies was announced.

A motion carried that the Secretary cast one ballot for Mrs. Henry de Mazyck for Secretary of Education. This was done. Ballots were then distributed for election of a Custodian.

The Secretary of Education, Mrs. McCormick, gave her report (see reports on following pages).

Announcement was made that Miss Winston would conduct a study class every week during Lent, at the Cathedral beginning February 14th 10:30 A. M. The subject for study, "The Prayer Book".

Announcement was also made that copies of Miss Lindley's meditations given at the triennial meeting were on hand and could be purchased for 10c.

The election of Miss Mildred Buchanan for Custodian was reported.

Mrs. Mazyck gave the Noon Day meditation. She first acknowledged the gracious reception given her as a new worker in the Diocese. She took for her subject the Noon Day Prayer and said in part that in repeating this prayer we commemorate the greatest sacrifice of our Lord; and that we should count it a privilege to pray, give gifts and joyful service to make Him known.

She asked us to re-dedicate ourselves to Christ. A rising vote of thanks was given Mrs. Mazyck.

Mrs. Alex Galt Robinson asked if some member could assist in finding a home for a young woman factory worker.

Roll call showed one hundred and forty-nine in attendance.

Adjournment was made for luncheon.

AFTERNOON SESSION

The afternoon session was opened at 2 o'clock by prayer and singing with Mr. J. D. Alexander at the piano.

The minutes of the morning session were read and approved as read.

Mrs. C. V. William, chairman of the Leper Fund read her report which showed a total contribution for the year of \$247.40.

Attention was called to a letter from Miss Lindley who is soon to visit Panama, Haiti, Porto Rico and San Domingo. During her absence Miss Edna Beardsley will be acting Secretary.

A letter from Mrs. Johnstone, President of the Diocese of Lexington was read. Mrs. Johnstone sent greetings and regretted that illness had prevented her attendance.

A motion carried unanimously that the Secretary send a note of loving remembrance and sympathy to Mrs. Woodcock, Miss Fannie Anderson, Mrs. Musson, Mrs. Douglas and Mrs. Mason Barret who were unable to make their attendance.

A letter to the President from Mrs. Stanley Adams was read. Mrs. Adams sent a message of love and regretted she could not be present.

Miss Winston called attention to the opening of Wyndam House, situated at W. 108th St., New York City. This house was dedicated last October. Two of its rooms are to be furnished by the Woman's Auxiliary

as a memorial to Miss Emily Tillotson, former member of the National Board.

The President spoke of the National Campaign to be put on to raise funds for St. Luke's International Hospital, Tokio, Japan. This will begin March 6th, Bishop Cook will speak here in its interest. Mrs. Davidson has been put in charge of the million dollar fund to be raised by the women of the Church. As a million is also to be asked of the churchmen it was thought best that in the Diocese of Kentucky they should work together.

Mrs. I. S. Homans took the floor and asked the branches to volunteer much needed help in making childrens' garments for the Family Service Organization of the Community Chest. Pledges to help were made by Calvary, Grace, Cathedral and St. Thomas branches.

Miss Mildred Buchanan read pleasing letters from two Chinese friends.

One from the Matron, T'sen of St. Hilda's School, Wuchang. She tells that this school has reopened with one hundred and sixty students. The other letter was from Dorothy T'so, a young girl student in a university of Peking. Dorothy has been helped in her education by the Deaconess Scott Memorial Fund.

Mrs. Reeder came to the platform and expressed her pleasure at being present and her regret that more of her branch could not be present and get the inspiration of the meeting.

Miss Henrietta Bullitt also came to the platform and spoke in the interest of the proposed chapel at Grahampton to be built in memory of Father Gorter who gave long and faithful service there. She said the chapel is to be begun February 1st, and is to be built on the plan of the Church of the Redeemer.

The President introduced the speaker of the day, Mrs. George Biller. Mrs. Biller in her address outlined the activities of the National Training Center at Taylor Hall, Racine, Wis. She spoke of the many religious

conferences held there by various communions, brotherhoods, auxiliaries, Sunday Schools and Y. W. C. A. and Y. M. C. A. organizations. In particular she described the parties given each Christmas for the past four years for the oriental students in our colleges. These parties have been successful in not only helping the oriental student to understand our religion but for oriental students to understand each others religion as well.

At the conclusion of Mrs. Biller's address the newly elected officers were installed by Canon Hardy.

Afternoon roll call showed a total attendance for the day of one hundred and sixty.

The Calvary Branch served the luncheon.

The offering, \$63.50, was for oriental students work at Taylor Hall.

THE PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

Dear Friends and Co-Workers of the Auxiliary:—

We have come together again in Annual Meeting after completing our forty-fifth year of service, and the term of office of the present Executive Board. It was with a feeling of much trepidation that I began my duties as your president. I cannot begin to express to you what your devotion and loyalty, and that of my fellow officers have meant to me. With God's help and your splendid co-operation we have been privileged to continue our work for the Master.

The reports you will hear today show, in most cases, an increase over last year's. We led the whole province in giving to the Corporate Gift, and while we did not reach the goal we had set for ourselves in the United Thank Offering, our gift was a decided increase over that of the previous Triennium.

More encouraging than the gift of money is the growth in the spiritual life of the Auxiliary. Reports show that many of the branches are having monthly corporate communions, while a few are having them weekly. All branches include a devotional period in their meetings. It is only through frequent communion with the Source of all power that we can hope to grow.

The new Triennium opens up for us many opportunities. If we are to be worthy we must take our share in the essential thing needed in the Church today,—that Christ's Church shall be Christian. Looking out into the world from our homes to the uttermost parts, we find that the crux of the whole matter lies in ourselves, and the challenge comes to each of us, for we are the interpreters of Christ to our generation.

The great Triennial Meeting at Washington, last October, should start us forward in a wonderful way. The Auxiliary has put its hand to big undertakings. I hope that in this Diocese, every branch will study

carefully and act on the minutes coming from that meeting. The suggestions and resolutions are in most cases quite definite and practical, and show how we can, as auxiliary to all departments of the National Council, include Christian Social Service, and Religious Education in our work for the Mission of the Church.

In closing, may I ask that during the coming three years, we endeavor to bring more women into the Auxiliary, especially trying to reach the younger women, and the business women. Many helpful suggestions are given in the Minutes of the Triennial. God has blessed our work, but think how much more we could do if our numbers are increased. Let our slogan be, "Every woman in the Church, enlisted in the Church's service."

May I leave with you the beautiful prayer with which the National Executive Board closed their report to the Triennial:—

"First, that we may come so close to Christ that our eyes may be opened to see Him where He is among us; and then, that we may have the call and the courage to adventure forth with Him into those wider human relationships where His further glory waits to be revealed to us, and by the mystery of His loving kindness, through us, to those whom we may bring to Him."

REPORT OF THE SECRETARY

The Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary during the past year held four meetings, all in the Cathedral House with Miss Almstedt presiding.

The total value of the year's work amounted to \$10,317.97.

Reports show a total membership of seven hundred and two in twenty-three active branches.

Six United Lenten Meetings were held with an average attendance of one hundred twenty three.

The offerings at these meetings were given to Camp Woodcock, to St. Hilda's school, Wuchang, China, to Near East Relief, to the United Thank Offering, to the upkeep of a room in the Bishop Tuttle Memorial House and to the Supply Fund.

At these meetings interesting letters were read, among them one from Ruth T'sen, Wuchang, China, and another from Miss Catherine Califf, worker in the Appalachian Industrial School, Penland, N. C. The needlework of this school was exhibited and orders solicited.

The Auxiliary of the Diocese had a full representation at the Triennial in Washington, D. C. Miss Almstedt, Mrs. Alex Galt Robinson, Mrs. Starling Fagin, Mrs. H. C. Heimerdinger and Mrs. H. S. Musson served as delegates.

The Semi-Annual Meeting was held in the forenoon of November 9th, in Dudley Memorial Hall. There were one hundred and fifty present. The meeting was entirely given over to reports from the General Convention held in October.

Mr. Dudley Musson exhibited pictures taken by him during the Convention showing views of the opening services and various scenes of the city.

The offering, \$68.38, given at the meeting, was toward a memorial to Miss Emily Tillotson former member of the National Board.

I have attended all meetings and taken the minutes thereof: and have sent out notices at the request of the President.

My term of office closes today. Let me thank you for the privilege of trying to serve as your secretary, for it has been to me a needed auxiliary education and a means of Grace.

REPORT OF EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY

Twenty-six letters and questionnaires were sent out. Sixteen of these were returned and the answers show much progress in the educational work during the past year.

A wide-spread interest was shown in Dr. Sturgis' book, "A Church Awake". All but three branches reported using the book in some way. Either at program meetings or in Discussion groups.

The Educational Secretary conducted a normal class before Lent on "A Church Awake", and during Lent she had an interparochial discussion group at the Cathedral House, using "A Church Awake", as the Text Book.

Fifty copies of the book were sold during Lent, so it was being very generally read, and by many who were not able to join any of the study classes.

One branch studied the Book of Acts in connection with "A Church Awake".

Ten branches reported using the speakers from the Educational Committee.

Three branches outside of Louisville reported using the "Spirit of Missions" to obtain subjects for their program meetings. Several reported studying the six objectives of the Corporate Gift.

Two branches reported having classes on Church History. One branch outside of Louisville reported meeting once a week during the winter for study of the Mission Field.

All but two branches reported working in the Five Fields of Service.

Members of the Educational Committee are ready at any time to speak at the parish meetings.

One subject has been added to the list. Mrs. James McCracken is prepared to give a resume of the text book for this year, "A New Africa".
