MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING

Morning Session

The Forty-sixth Annual Meeting of the Kentucky Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council was held Friday, January 24th, 1930, beginning with a Corporate Communion in Christ Church Cathedral at 9:30 o'clock, at which the Bishop was the celebrant assisted by the Rev. Mr. Elliot Baker and Canon Nelson.

The Business Meeting followed immediately, convening in Dudley Memorial Hall, at 10:30 o'clock. Bishop Woodcock opened the meeting with the singing of Hymn 105, followed by prayer. The Bishop greeted the women and stated that nothing more of praise could be said to the Auxiliary which had not already been said many times before. He expressed the great disappointment of Mrs. Woodcock in not being able to attend the meeting. A rising vote of appreciation was extended to the Bishop and an expression of hope that he will be with us to continue another 25 years.

Miss Almstedt then took the chair, and announced that the treasurer, as Chairman on Credentials, would read a list of the branches who had paid their assessments to the Central Fund. Miss Winston stated that all branches had paid their assessments except the Church of our Merciful Saviour. Miss Winston expressed the hope that a motion would be made to give the delegates of the Church of Our Merciful Saviour the right to vote. The motion was made and carried.

The Secretary called the roll of the delegates with seventeen city parishes, one mission and four out-of-town parishes represented.

The President cordially welcomed all delegates, alternates and visitors and requested the out-of-town representatives to stand. Mrs. Neel, of Henderson, expressed her pleasure at being able to attend the meeting.

The President's address followed. In it Miss Almstedt discussed the encouraging and discouraging features of the Auxiliary and urged all the women to ex-

amine themselves to see wherein they had failed and wherein succeeded. She said that all departments of the auxiliary were functioning splendidly, especially the work of the U. T. O. Custodian. Attention was called to the work done by Mrs. D. D. Taber and prayers were asked for the success of the undertaking. Mention was made of the two new chairmen to be appointed on the Executive Board. In closing, Miss Almstedt asked for the hearty support of every member of the Auxiliary in furthering the program laid out for the coming year.

The report of the Secretary was given. She reported twenty-three active branches with a total enrollment of 640 and a total of work amounting to \$9,590.93. The report was approved as read.

Mrs. Starling Fagin was asked to give the report of the Supply Work, as Mrs. DeGarve, the secretary was out of town. The report showed eight boxes were sent into the Field and five Christmas boxes sent to missionaries, the total value of boxes being \$1,485.20. Mrs. Fagin then read several letters from recipients of boxes expressing their appreciation and gratitude. Mrs. Fagin said that in an informal meeting with the out-of-town delegates on Thursday evening, mention was made as to ways and means of raising money for the supply work. Mrs. Fagin further mentioned that the Supply Work was the responsibility of the whole parish and that one parish here was giving one-tenth of its earnings to the Supply Work. She also spoke of the willing response the men of the parish had made when called upon.

Miss Almstedt then introduced Miss Twiggs, a Field Worker of the Girl's Friendly Society.

Miss Twiggs spoke on the ability of the Auxiliary to co-operate with the Girls' Friendly Society, first, by assisting with programs; second, by leading classes; and last, by extending a warm hand of fellowship to the younger girls and becoming honorary members. Our prayers were also asked.

Miss Twiggs gave a mental picture of the perfect Girls' Friendly Society with the leader a woman of such

fine Christian spirit that others would catch her spirit and bring in young women, who had never been touched.

Miss Almstedt thanked Miss Twiggs and urged that all the women co-operate more with the Girls' Friendly Society.

Miss Winston, the Treasurer, then read her report which showed: Total receipts, \$4,423.86; Total disbursements, \$4,287.00; Balance, \$136.86.

She announced that there were still copies of the "World Mission of Christianity" for sale at 25 cents per copy.

It was announced that the President of the Auxiliary had been added to the Committee on the Church's Program. Their action being taken, not only in recognition of the splendid work of the Auxiliary but because of the exceptional ability of Miss Almstedt, our President.

At the request of Miss Almstedt, Miss Winston was asked to explain the new plan of Advance Work. After giving a summary of the Emery Fund, Bishop Tuttle Memorial Fund, and the Corporate Gift, Miss Winston stated that the latter had now merged into what is known as Advance Work. Each diocese will be allotted a special piece of work and each parish branch is requested to make their pledges to it. Last year \$1,300 was pledged and this year at least \$1,250 is asked. The women were urged to increase their pledges to the Central Fund.

The Noon Day Prayer and Meditations was led by Miss L. L. Robinson.

All women present were invited to stay for the noon-day lunch. Grace Church is in charge and everyone will be amply provided for.

Afternoon Session

The afternoon session of the Annual Meeting assembled in Dudley Memorial Hall at 2 o'clock. After singing hymn 480, Miss Almstedt opened the meeting with prayer.

The minutes of the morning were read and approved.

Miss Winston was asked to take the pledges for the year 1930. After Mrs. Neel had given her pledges for Grace Church, Hopkinsville, she extended a hearty invitation to all women to come to Henderson.

Report of the Educational Secretary followed. Mrs. Mazyck called attention to the two letters sent to each Parish educational secretary but stated that she felt there had been a discouraging lack of interest among the women. A Diocesan Institute was held in the Cathedral House in November. Mrs. Mazyck was given the privilege of outlining the work of the auxiliary of the Parish of St. Luke's, Anchorage.

The Custodian of the United Thank Offering, Miss Mildred Buchanan, reported that the offering this Autumn came from 684 women with a total amount for the year of \$2,910.88. A complete list of the work of each Parish as regards to amounts and numbers of givers was outlined. This amount was sent to Mr. Franklin, Treasurer, in New York.

Mrs. Alex. Galt Robinson, newly appointed chairman of The Church Periodical Club, had no report. A list of names of secretaries appointed in the various branches was read. An explanation of the work of the club was outlined. A donation of money was asked for to further the selected library being installed in Taylor Hall at Racine, Wisconsin. Mrs. Robinson reports that postage on magazines had been reduced to one cent for two ounces.

The report of the Leper Work, given by Mrs. C. V. Williams, showed that \$219.83 was contributed during the year.

Mrs. Beard was asked to give a report on the Jennie Cassidy Rest Cottage. She explained the place filled by the Rest Cottage and said that this time last year there was in the treasury \$2.91 with which to paper the Episcopal room. Now there is \$60.94 balance in the treasury after the necessary remodeling was done.

The offering was asked for a fund to be given to the Rev. Mr. Charles Leavell, to be used as he sees fit to further the work among students who may come under

his leadership in Bowling Green.

Miss Almstedt then introduced the Rev. Mr. Gaither, rector of Grace Church, Hopkinsville, who had served as a missionary in Alaska. Mr. Gaither expressed his thanks to the Auxiliary for the many things done for him and his family through the Supply Work. Mr. Gaither gave a splendid outline of the Colonial development of our Country. Mention was made of the work done by the Russian and English churches there. He speaks of the Alaskans as being a reading people and feels that a great deal can be accomplished by the distribution of reading material. Mr. and Mrs. Benjamin, native workers, were particularly mentioned as doing a far reaching work at Eagle. The Hudson Stuck Hospital is well anchored there. More and more the native Alaskans are taking the work of the Church in their own hands.

Mrs. I. Smith Homans asked the help of the Auxiliary with the sewing she has taken for the Family Service.

Roll-call showed 188 present. The offering for the day amounted to \$71.30.

The Good-Will Industries asked that some one be appointed to represent them in each of our branches.

Notice was given of the institute which will be held under the auspices of the Girls' Friendly Society in the Cathedral House, January 29 and 30.

A motion was made and carried that a note be sent to Mrs. Woodcock expressing our regret that she could not attend the meeting. It was voted that a message be sent to the auxiliary of Emmanuel Mission, expressing appreciation for the work done by them and regret that they found it necessary to temporarily disband. A note of thanks was voted to be sent Grace Church for the delicious luncheon served.

The doxology was sung. After the closing prayers and benediction the 46th annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Kentucky adjourned.

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

Women of the Auxiliary: another year has passed and we meet again to hear reports of what we have been able to do for Christ and His Church, and to dedicate ourselves anew to His service.

Looking back over the past year we will find much to encourage us but also some discouraging features. I will mention the latter first. A tabulation of the reports sent in, show a decided decrease in the number of members. During the year, no new branches have been organized and one of the most faithful is disbanding for the present. The value of the year's work, as expressed in terms of money, is much less than that of previous years. Our slogan for the past year was: "Every woman in the Church, enlisted in the Church's service". Let us examine ourselves and see where we have failed. Have we been true and effective witnesses for Christ? Are our habits of thought and expression centered in Christ or self? Do our friends and neighbors know the Christ through our lives? Are we filled with the joy of being co-workers with Christ that we want others to share it with us? Let us think on these things.

Now for the encouraging facts: All departments of the Auxiliary are functioning splendidly. The new plan adopted by the United Thank Offering custodian is proving most worthwhile, a fine course of study has been arranged by the educational Secretary, the Treasurer reports all pledges paid, and the mission boxes sent in Lent and Advent were lovely and will surely bring pleasure and happiness to the recipients.

The Auxiliary, in co-operation with the Committee on Small-Town and Rural Work, was responsible for bringing Mrs. D. D. Taber, a United Thank Offering Field Worker into the diocese. Mrs. Taber's report, after two months of traveling through the diocese, has opened up many new and important opportunities for service, and has made us realize how we have failed to carry the Gospel to those so near to us. At her suggestion, the Board plans, during the coming year, to divide the diocese into four districts, with a central or-

ganization in each, whose responsibility will be to enlist every woman in that district into active service for the Church, and twice yearly to arrange a district meeting where all may gather for inspiration and the hearing of reports, just as we have come here today. I am asking your prayers for the success of this undertaking.

At the last executive board meeting it was decided to enlarge the membership of the board by the appointment of a secretary of social service, which appointment will be made in the near future. Our Lord Himself laid upon us the responsibility in this field of human relations and taught us that service to Him must include service to our fellowman.

Our Bishop has appointed Mrs. Alex. Galt Robinson, director for the Church Periodical Club in our diocese. For several years this branch of the work has been neglected. I hope that all branches will give Mrs. Robinson their hearty co-operation.

We are beginning a new year. Shall we not again adopt the slogan used last year, "Every woman in the Church enlisted in the Church's service", each and everyone of us feeling individually responsible to make it come true? We are all missionaries, the "Sent-Ones" of the King. Let us bind ourselves together in a real and holy fellowship with Him and each other, ready to serve at home or abroad, in large ways or small, with equal devotion, and with a deep consciousness of the Emanuel-God with us.

The Church needs the mind and heart and hands of every one of us, the Church has a big program to carry on, and we of the Auxiliary are to help this program to success. First, by beginning in Jerusalem, which is our parish; going out into Judea, which is our diocese; and then unto the uttermost parts of the world.

Let us commend ourselves to the guidance of the Holy Spirit, asking that "He may show us what things we ought to do, and grant us grace and power to fulfill the same, through Jesus Christ our Lord".

REPORT OF SECRETARY

The Executive Board of the Women's Auxiliary for the year of 1929 has held five meetings in the Cathedral House. Miss Almstedt, President, presided at four of the meetings and Miss N. H. Winston at one.

The total value of the year's work amounted to \$9,590.93. There are twenty-three branches with a combined membership of 640.

Six united Lenten meetings were held with an average attendance of 115. The total offering was \$182.85.

The offerings at these meetings were given to The Chapel at Grahamton; Camp Woodcock; Rest House, Porto Rico; St. Luke's International Hospital, Tokyo; Corporate Gift and Supply Work. The Speakers for the meetings were Miss L. L. Robinson, "The 100th Anniversary of the Episcopal Church"; Mr. Charles Estes, "Camp Lfie at Camp Woodcock"; Mr. J. D. Alexander, "Camp Woodcock"; Miss Grace Lindley, "Personal Religion and Evangelism"; Mrs. Starling Fagin, "St. Luke's International Hospital, Tokyo"; Miss N. H. Winston, "The Corporate Gift", and Mrs. James McCracken, "Africa".

The Semi-Annual Meeting was held in the Dudley Memorial Hall, Thursday, November 14, 1929. Miss Almstedt presided and Mrs. Harper Sibley made the address. Mrs. Sibley, who had attended the Jerusalem Conference in Jerusalem gave an inspiring account of the Conference. The offering of \$50.51 was given to furnish screens for the Missionary House in the Philipines.

One of the outstanding pieces of work done by the Auxiliary in co-operation with the Committee on Small Town and Rural Work, for the year 1929 has been the survey made by Mrs. D. D. Tabor. Mrs. Tabor visited all the smaller towns and rural districts in the diocese and gave a detailed report of their work to the Board.

Two new offices have been added to the Executive Board, that of Chairman of the Church Periodical Club and Chairman on Social Service Work. Mrs. Alex Galt Robinson was appointed by the Bishop to fill the Chairmanship of the Church Periodical Club and no one, as yet, has been selected to take the place of chairman on Social Service.

The minutes of each meeting have been recorded and letters and notices have been sent out as requested by the Board.
