Minutes of the Annual Meeting Woman's Auxiliary

Morning Session

The Forty-seventh Annual Meeting of the Kentucky Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary was held Friday, January 27th, 1931, beginning with a Corporate Communion in Christ Church Cathedral at 9:30 o'clock. Bishop Woodcock conducted the service assisted by Dean McCready, Canon Hardy and Canon Nelson.

The business meeting followed immediately, convening in Dudley Memorial Hall at 10:30 o'clock. Bishop Woodcock opened the meeting with a short talk to the women urging them to carry on their work even more diligently, and that now more than ever, was a time to work harder and not let discouragement creep in.

The Bishop then turned the meeting over to Miss Almstedt. Miss Winston as Chairman on Credentials, stated that all branches, with the exception of Our Merciful Saviour, and Christ Church, Bowling Green, had paid their pledges to the Central Fund.

The Secretary called the roll of delegates with seventeen city parishes and two out-of-town parishes represented.

Miss Almstedt welcomed all delegates, alternates and visitors. She stated that the election of delegates and alternates to the Triennial would be the order of business immediately after luncheon.

The President's address followed. In it she stated that she had had the privilege of attending the Synod, which had been most inspiring. Our own Miss Winston had been one of the conference leaders and among the best. Miss Almstedt brought out the fact that the diocese of Kentucky was again on the honor roll for having paid in full her quota to the General Church. Because of the lack of growth of the auxiliary in the dio-

cese, she urged that we study ourselves and endeavor to see wherein we are failing. If too much emphasis was being put on the budget, Miss Almstedt asked that during the next few months we put aside material things and think only of our high spiritual aim, that of deepening our own lives and organization, to bring others into the work of Christ's Kingdom.

Mrs. Starling Fagin, First Vice-President and Chairman of the District Plan, gave her report in which she stated that the diocese had been divided into four districts with a chairman for each district. The Executive Board hopes to meet at one time or another with these districts and in that way keep in closer touch with the out-of-town branches.

The report of the secretary was given. She reported one new branch organized in Hopkinsville, making twenty-four active branches with a total enrollment of 616 and a total of work amounting to \$9606.76. The report was approved as read.

Mrs. Degavre, Chairman of supply work, reported eight boxes sent into the mission field, and five Christmas boxes to five women missionaries, making a total value of boxes amounting to \$1,372.45. Mrs. Degavre read several most interesting letters received from missionaries who had received boxes from the Auxiliary.

The Educational Secretary, Miss Persis Breed, reported that the outstanding piece of work done by the department had been the Institute led by Miss Marston and held at the Cathedral House October 28, 29 and 30th. At these classes \$35.65 worth of books and pamphlets were sold. Miss Breed mentioned that the Sewanee Conference she attended last summer brought out the fact that the Woman's Auxiliary was primarily an educational organization.

Mrs. S. M. Russell and Miss Edith Bouche were appointed to act as tellers in the election of delegates to the National Convention. Mrs. J. G. Minnegerode was asked to take charge of the mountain-made articles brought by Deaconess Williams.

Announcement was made of the Quiet Day to be conducted by Bishop Woodcock for the women of the Church in the Cathedral on Monday, February 16th, from 10:30 to 3:00 o'clock. Luncheon will be served for 35 cents.

Miss Almstedt asked Miss Bullitt to the platform and she gave a short talk on the Girl's Friendly Convention which was held in Chicago.

Miss Almstedt introduced Mrs. W. H. Johnstone, President of the Woman's Auxiliary, Diocese of Lexington, Mrs. Johnstone greeted the women of the Diocese of Kentucky, and spoke of the important work done by her diocese in the mountains of Eastern Kentucky, and asked the women to remember this work in their prayers.

The Conference on Social Service, led by Mrs. James F. McCracken, followed. Mrs. McCracken explained the new work done by the Home of the Innocents. This work is important in that it not only takes care of the children of our own Episcopal families, but temporary aid is given to any child in need of it. Mrs. McCracken introduced Canon Nelson who is a recognized and outstanding figure in our civic Social Work as well as Executive Secretary of the Diocesan Board of Social Service. Canon Nelson spoke on "City Missions", a field which is not new to our Church as a whole. The fine work done by Father Austin at the City Hospital was particularly spoken of. Mrs. McCracken then presented Miss Geraldine Graham, head of the Children's Bureau. Miss Graham gave a very interesting sketch of "Case Work" as done by Social Workers and the part the Church plays in that phase of Civic Work. Miss Graham emphasized the fact that Case Work was adjustment work and that the spiritual part of it was all important. Mrs. McCracken brought out the fact that the Auxiliary was especially fitted to help in this branch of Christian Social Service.

Miss Winston, Treasurer, reported total receipts for the year 1930, \$3,948.59; total disbursements,

\$3,578.29; balance, \$370.30. Miss Winston spoke of how splendidly the pledges had been paid, in spite of the local financial depression. No goal has been set for 1931 but the treasurer felt that after the Bishop's talk earlier in the morning, they would come up to all requirements. The Auxiliary has asked the women if possible to again give a substantial gift to the Advance Work Program. By doing this, it is hoped that the men will be spurred on to raise the remainder.

Pledges for 1931 were then taken.

Mrs. C. V. Williams reported that the Leper Work was most encouraging, and stated that there was in the treasury only eighty-nine cents less than was given last year. The total amount of the work for 1930 was \$219.00.

Mrs. A. G. Robinson, Chairman of the Church Periodical Club, stated that ninety-three current periodicals had been sent out by the club, and added to these many old magazines, hymnals, prayer books, games, pictures, and Christmas and Easter Cards. These were sent to the various hospitals, sanitariums, and individuals. The total amount of money spent was \$10.70.

Miss Almstedt read a letter received from the Executive Secretary, Miss Grace Lindley. Miss Winston read the new pledges for 1931.

Mrs. I. S. Homans asked if any branches could do some sewing for the Community Chest and if possible to notify her and sufficient material would be sent to them.

Noon Day Prayer and Meditation was given by Miss L. L. Robinson.

The Meeting then adjourned for luncheon.

Afternoon Session

The afternoon session of the Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary assembled in Dudley Memorial Hall at 2 o'clock. After singing Hymn 240, Miss Almstedt opened the meeting with prayer. The minutes of the morning meeting were approved as read.

The election of the delegates to the National Convention followed. Those elected were Miss Elsa Almstedt, Miss N. H. Winston, Mrs. John M. Nelson, Mrs. A. G. Robinson, and Mrs. H. P. Reager, Jr. The alternates chosen were Mrs. Starling Fagin, Mrs. H. S. Musson, Miss Mildred Buchanan, Mrs. Sterling Price, and Mrs. James McCracken.

While the voting was being conducted Mrs. W. H. Johnstone, President of the Auxiliary of the Diocese of Lexington, announced the thirty-fifth birthday of their Auxiliary to be celebrated June second. An invitation to attend this meeting was extended to every woman of our diocese.

The report of the United Thank Offering Treasurer, Miss Mildred Buchanan, followed. She reported the total amount of the combined offerings for the year to be \$3,047.04 with a total number of 1,445 women givers sharing in it.

It was announced that the books of the Treasurer, Miss N. H. Winston, and of the United Thank Offering Custodian, Miss Mildred Buchanan had been audited by Mr. A. B. Semple and found correct.

A motion was passed that a note of appreciation be sent to the Auxiliaries of the Church of the Redeemer and St. George's for the delicious luncheon which was served.

The secretary was instructed to send a note of love and greeting to Mrs. C. E. Woodcock. Also a note of loving sympathy to the Rev. Werner F. Rennenberg.

Miss Almstedt then introduced Deaconess Maria P. Williams who gave a talk on her work in the Moun-

tains of South-Western Virginia. She briefly sketched the work in and around Dante, Va., how it was started twenty-three years ago by Deaconess Adams and then was continued by herself later. The community developed, from one with practically no advantages of education or religion, into one which can now boast of a good school and work supervised by men and women of high Christian leadership.

Miss Almstedt asked that the women remember Miss Clara Kieth in their prayers. At present she is our only missionary worker from this diocese. Miss Kieth is stationed at Cape Palmas, Liberia. It was moved and seconded that the president write a letter to Miss Kieth, expressing the fact that she has the prayers and co-operation of the women of this diocese.

Miss Winston was asked to carry a message of greeting to the women of the Diocese of Tennessee from the women of the Diocese of Kentucky.

The offering for the Annual Meeting, amounting to \$77.30 was given to Deaconess Williams for her work in the Mountains. Roll-call showed 180 present.

Father Austin closed the meeting with prayer.

THE PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

Again I welcome you, my dear friends and co-workers, to this, our Annual Meeting. May God, the Holy Spirit, guide and direct us in our work, today and through the year. May I also express my great appreciation for your loyal support and co-operation.

I have, during the year, visited many of the branches in Louisville, and it has been a pleasure and privilege to get to know better the many consecrated women who are sharing in the work. It is a great disappointment to me and to the other members of the board, that none of us has been able to visit the branches out in the diocese. We are hoping to do this during the coming year.

The most encouraging report of the year has come to us from Hopkinsville, where a Junior Branch has been organized. I hope others will follow this fine example.

I had the privilege of attending the provincial synod meeting of the Auxiliary as your delegate. It was a most helpful meeting. There were many inspiring addresses and conferences. Of the latter, one led by Miss Winston on the Inter-Racial Problem was among the best. The reports given by the presidents of the various dioceses of the province were most interesting and helpful and made me feel that Kentucky must be up and doing.

I am very happy to be able to report to you that the diocese of Kentucky is again on the Honor Roll, having paid in full her quota to the General Church.

But I regret exceedingly that I can't report a year of general progress in the Auxiliary. Some of the individual branch reports are splendid. The pledges, for the most part, have been paid, which, under existing conditions, is a fine record. But the value of the year's work has fallen much below that of previous years, in

fact. the last five years have been marked by a steady decline. I don't wish to put too much emphasis on the financial side of the work. Money is only a thermometer by which the interest and devotion to a cause is measured. Why is the Auxiliary in our diocese losing ground? With the exception of the junior branch before mentioned, there have been no new branches organized during the last several years, and many of the existing branches are reporting a steadily decreasing membership. Where are we failing? Our slogan for the Triennium is "Every woman in the Church enlisted in the Church's Service". What have we done individually to bring this to pass? Let us study ourselves and conscientiously find out if we are really making our service count. Are we putting first things first? A criticism that is coming to me constantly is that the auxiliary is emphasizing money too much, that the meetings are a continual drive for money. This should not be. Much better to cut our givings in half than to kill the spirit of the auxiliary by over-pledging. If we pray enough and love enough, the money will be forthcoming.

The whole theme of the meetings at Washington, "Christ and Human Relations", brought us the realization that we must take Him into all our relationships with others. The need is—to deepen our spiritual life individually and as an organization—to the end that Christ's Kingdom may come upon earth. This is the whole end and aim of our work. This is why we must seek others to work with us. This is the reason for the existence of the Woman's Auxiliary, the reason for our meetings, for our study, for our giving. Not simply to raise a budget, but to bring Christ's Kingdom upon earth.

With this aim before us, how shall we begin our work of enlisting others? Here we come face to face with the fundamental need. In order to bring Christ's Kingdom upon earth, we must first deepen our own spiritual life, both individually and as an organization.

We cannot share with others that which we have not felt ourselves, and we cannot bring them into an organization of the church from which we have not gained spiritual strength. We may gain this for ourselves through a rule of life that includes time for prayer and study and communion, and for our organization through a program of prayer and corporate worship that will draw us into fellowship with our Lord.

We are entering the last year of the Triennium. Let us strive, during the next few months, to put aside material things. We have had our troubles this year, because of the financial depression, and the resulting difficulties all about us, and yet as I stand before you and know of the powerful spiritual incentive in the Woman's Auxiliary which has sustained and strengthened us through many trying conditions, I cannot feel despondent. I have chosen for our motto, at this time a little phrase from one of St. Paul's Epistles, "Rejoicing in Hope", praying earnestly that we, radiating the joy of service, may, like the Epiphany Star of old, guide others in ever increasing numbers, to come to know Him and serve Him,

"Until every nation,
Whether bound or free,
Neath Thy starlit banner,
Jesus, follows Thee."

SECRETARY'S REPORT

The Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary for the year 1930 has held six meetings with Miss Elsa Almstedt presiding.

The total value of the year's work amounted to \$9,606.76. There are 24 active branches with a combined membership of 616.

Six United Lenten meetings were held in the various parishes. The average attendance at these meetings was 112. The total offering was \$161.14.

The offerings at these meetings were given to: Commission on Faith and Order; Camp Woodcock; the remodeling of the room in the Tuttle House, Raleigh, N. C.; and a special fund which was used to help pay for a full time Educational Worker in the province of Sewanee.

The first lenten meeting was given over to a service for, "The World Day Of Prayer"; the second meeting included a colorful pageant and two short talks, one given by Miss Dice, from St. Hilda's School, Wu Chang, China, and the other by Mr. Gorin. Speakers for the other meetings were Mrs. Henry Mazyck, "World Call To Christianity"; Miss Eleanor Carpenter, "The Changing World"; Mrs. J. R. Gray, "Where and Why The Church Has Succeeded, Where And Why The Church Has Failed".

The semi-annual meeting was held in the Dudley Memorial Hall, October 31st. Miss Margaret Marston was the speaker and her subject, "The Task Of The Woman's Auxiliary Today". She presented four problems to the Woman's Auxiliary to pray over and lend their influence to, to help make for a better world. They were: World Peace, Christian Unity, Race Problem and Family Relationships. The offering at this meeting amounted to \$26.05 and was sent to Mrs. Wylie for reconstruction work in Santa Domingo.

The Auxiliary for the year 1930 has laid especial stress on a program for education, thereby hoping to interest a large group of women. Miss Marston held an Institute at the Cathedral House October 28th thru October 30th, with morning and afternoon sessions. The morning classes were given over entirely to the study of India and the afternoon, discussion and study of Adult Education.

The delegates to attend the synod in Jackson, Miss., Nov. 11, 12, 13, were: Miss Almstedt, Miss Winston, Miss Breed and Mrs. Alex. G. Robinson, of these only Miss Almstedt and Miss Winston were able to attend.

Miss Persis Breed was elected the new chairman of Education and Mrs. James McCracken, chairman of Social Service. Mrs. Starling Fagin, Vice President, was appointed chairman of the District Plan.

The minutes of each meeting have been recorded and letters and notes have been sent out as requested by the Board.

Report of Educational Secretary

As my term of office began with my appointment last May, my contacts for the latter months of 1930 have been limited to the branches of the Woman's Auxiliary in Louisville and Anchorage. If the scope of the work accomplished seems narrow, my motive has been to do one thing thoroughly in a little space rather than to cover much ground.

The outstanding project of this period has been the conference for potential leaders held at the Cathedral House on October 28, 29 and 30, led by Miss Margaret Marston, Educational Secretary of the National Woman's Auxiliary. The morning session was devoted to India and the afternoon session to "Adult Education in the Church Today." Miss Marston's use of the conference method rather than the lecture method, brought out interesting discussion. Those who attended found stimulation also in buying from the Book Table, which was supplied from National Headquarters with the latest material. The fact that we disposed of \$35.65 worth of books and pamphlets indicates that a real need was met. The books varied in character from the mission study type, such as Buck's, "India Looks to Her Future", to more general subjects such as "The Turn Toward Peace", or "Our Expanding Church", to such a sociological viewpoint as that of "Building Family Foundations", and to the psychological study of "The Child's Approach to Religion".

I have held two morning conferences for the Branch educational secretaries of Louisville and Anchorage, on October 3rd and November 6th, respectively, at the Cathedral House. I appreciated very much the good attendance and the spirit of co-operation that met me. My object in these conferences was to give an opportunity for the exchange of ideas among fellow workers,

and on my own part to share with them the idea I had received at the Sewanee Conference of last August, namely that the Woman's Auxiliary is primarily an organization for religious education and that its potential field covers every group: child, adolescent, adult, in parish and extension work.

It is a steadying thought that in a time when our financial difficulties tend to oppress our minds and threaten to tie our hands, we can always function, if we will, in the way I have just indicated, as an organization for the promotion of religious education. Here at the very heart of the Auxiliary is a spiritual force through which we can move forward in hard times.
