

FOREWORD FROM THE BISHOP

"The Woman's Auxiliary is not an organization. It is a vital force in the life of the Church, offering a program of daily service for the building of the Kingdom."



It is primarily a movement, even as the Christian Church itself is primarily a movement, a forward movement in the affairs of men and women. This is true because Christianity is constructive and vital. That which is constructive and vital transcends organization, even when using it.

Perhaps this is why women respond so readily to the call of the Church, because the essential tasks of women in the scheme of things are vital and constructive. This may also explain the natural interest of women in missions, since the mission of Christ in the world is the most vital and constructive thing in all human history.

Mrs. Harper Sibley told us that she assumed she was in the section on Economics at the Oxford Conference last summer because "economics" means literally "looking after the house," or the household affairs. I trust that all our women in Kentucky will become increasingly interested in whatever concerns the welfare of the entire household of humanity—in all areas of its life—and that they will be increasingly interested in the entire household of Christ's Church—in all areas of the earth. So only, can they inspire the Church to fulfill its supreme duty, which is to make disciples of all nations.

Stand behind your clergy, your vestries and all other leaders in your congregations; let us bring the Diocese of Kentucky once again to its rightful place in setting forward the whole Program of the whole Church. Encourage them. Hold the banner of Christian service high.

MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING

The fifty-fourth Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary, Diocese of Kentucky was held Friday, February 4th, beginning with a Corporate Communion in Christ Church Cathedral at ten o'clock. Bishop Clingman was the Celebrant and was assisted by Canon Lloyd Clarke, and the Rev. Messrs. W. H. Langley and H. Campbell Dixon.

The business meeting followed immediately, convening in Dudley Memorial Hall at eleven o'clock. Hymn 480 was sung. In the absence of the President, Mrs. Musson, First Vice-President, presided and opened the meeting with prayer. She said that Miss Winston was kept away from the meeting by a death in the family, but sent her love and greetings. Mrs. Musson urged that we each do our share to make this a splendid meeting.

The Treasurer, Mrs. Rennenberg, as Chairman of the Committee on Credentials, reported that all branches had paid their pledges to the Central Fund and were entitled to vote.

The Secretary called the roll of officers and delegates, all parishes in the city and vicinity were represented, as were Christ Church, Bowling Green, St. Paul's, Henderson, St. Paul's, Hickman, and Grace, Hopkinsville. All officers answered roll-call except the President, Second Vice-President, and Director-Church Periodical Club, the last two being out of town.

The Secretary read the President's address. In it Miss Winston said that the difficulties and discouragements of the past year have been offset by the many bright spots. She said that the New Year is before us with great opportunities for service. She especially brought to our attention the Unit and Chapter Plan of Organization, which is most highly recommended by Bishop Clingman. She spoke also of the new Constitution, which is being given to the Presidents today for study in their branches. She gave as the watch-word for the year, "FELLOWSHIP," and asked that we endeavor to make 1938 the best year the Auxiliary in the Diocese of Kentucky has ever had, each doing her utmost in the spirit of fellowship, because we are the children of a common Father, and fellow-workers in a mission which our Master committed to all who bear His name.

Mrs. Musson, as First Vice-President, said she had attended all meetings of the Executive Board, and had presided at one United Lenten Meeting.

As Representative of the Woman's Auxiliary on the Executive Council she said that she had attended all meetings of said Council and had contributed to its discussions and plans. She said that the Council acts as a clearing house for all the work of the Diocese done under various departments. Of these, the Auxiliary is most concerned with the work of the Field Department. She urged that the Auxiliary lend its best efforts to stressing the Church's Program. She explained that this year thirty percent of the Fund would be sent to the National Council for the General Church and seventy percent kept for work in the Diocese.

The Annual report of the Secretary showed a total membership of eight hundred and eighty, with twenty active branches. The total value of the year's work amounted to \$6,770.61.

The Treasurer, Mrs. Rennenberg, announced that mimeograph copies of her detailed report had been distributed. She gave total receipts from all sources, \$2,252.17. All special funds had been disbursed. Balance in the Central Fund, \$425.21. Her books had been audited by Mr. H. S. Fagin, and found correct. The Treasurer then called for pledges to the Church's Program and Central Fund, resulting in \$772.50 being pledged to the Church's Program, and \$144.50 to the Central Fund. Due to the organization of the new St. Andrew's, the President of Calvary-St. Paul's Branch would not make a pledge. The Bishop explained that he had asked all members of the Auxiliary to remain in the Branch at Calvary-St. Paul's until the summer months. He felt that the pledges could very safely be made.

Mrs. Rennenberg said she had received a very appreciative letter from the Rev. Robert Fletcher, to whom last year's offering had been given.

A letter was read from the Rev. and Mrs. Custis Fletcher of Paducah, expressing regrets that illness had kept the Grace Church Branches from being represented and extending a most gracious invitation for all to attend the Diocesan Convention Meeting in Paducah in May.

The Educational Secretary in her report recommended the reading of a pamphlet, "RE-THINKING RELIGIOUS

EDUCATION" procurable from the Church Missions House, which contains the findings of the Seminars held during General Convention and spoke especially of Dr. McGregor's name for Religious Education—"THE LIFE OF THE CHURCH." She gave the programs for the Lenten Meetings and of the Annual and Semi-Annual Meetings. She said that the key-note of all reports from the Oxford and Edinburgh Conference was "A UNITED CHRISTENDOM." She said that she had worked in the "SCHOOL OF CHRISTIAN LIVING" held in Louisville, October 31st to November 3rd. She reported that the Speakers' Bureau had proved invaluable. During the year, she met with all city branches but one, and with three out in the State.

She announced that the United Lenten Meetings would be held each Friday afternoon during Lent in the Cathedral House, except the First Friday, when we would unite in the World Day of Prayer at Warren Memorial Church. She also gave the list of speakers, and said that the meetings would last one hour, beginning at three o'clock. The Rev. C. E. Craik is to furnish a short musical program at each meeting.

Mrs. Wilder then gave her report as Supply Secretary. Boxes during Lent were sent to Rocky-Bar Mission, Elkton, Va., and Transfiguration and St. Bartholomew's Mission, Puerto Rico, valued at \$439.50. In Advent, personal boxes were sent to the Rev. Neville Joyner, Pine Ridge, S. D., and the Rev. Robert H. Thomas, Mineral, Va., suit and underwear to Catechist Allen Last Horse, Allen, S. D., and Christmas boxes to four women missionaries, total value \$264.35, making total value for the year, \$703.85. She read interesting letters of thanks from the Rev. Messrs. Joyner and Thomas. She announced that the Lenten work for 1938 will go to Holy Cross Mission, P.I., and mission of the Good Shepherd, Splashdam, Va., and Bishop Randall Hospital, Wyoming.

Mrs. E. F. Horine, representing the Community Chest, spoke to us on the subject of the "CHRISTIAN WOMAN'S RESPONSIBILITY TO HER COMMUNITY." She said we do need to know the physical needs of our community, but if we are really concerned, our primary need is to get closer to Christ, to learn more nearly the compassion of Christ—so that we can look beyond the physical needs of our underprivileged brethren and provide for them a security of self-respect. She said that we as Christians have a

responsibility to the Social Program of today, to further the security of a World Peace.

The report of the Custodian of the United Thank Offering showed that the total amount given by the Diocese of Kentucky at Cincinnati was \$7,815.96. The total offering for the year amounted to \$2,783.33. She called attention to the fact that during this Triennium we would have only six offerings and urged the necessity of getting more givers.

A very interesting letter received by Miss Buchanan from Miss Tompkins, United Thank Offering Worker at St. Hilda's School, Wuchang, China, was read by Miss Semple. It described Christmas Day spent in the midst of air raids.

Mrs. Maury reported for the Constitution Committee. She said they had met eight times and once with the Executive Board, and had given much prayerful and earnest thought to the matter. She called special attention to the article on Finance and asked the branches to make a careful study of it and report their reactions to it through their Presidents.

At this point, the Chairman announced that resolutions on the death of Mrs. Charles Edward Woodcock had been adopted by the Diocesan Board at its meeting on December 9th. It seemed fitting that they should be read at this Annual Meeting. All standing, the Secretary read the resolutions, after which prayer was offered for all who this year had entered into Life Eternal.

Dean Haines followed with the noon-day prayers and meditation.. His subject was "FRIENDSHIP," and he said that friendship was of two kinds, one motivated by self-interest and the other by Sacrifice, and used the Parable of the Good Shepherd to illustrate. He said the world was filled with selfish friendship, and that we must work toward the time when the Christian religion would establish a world-wide friendship, a friendship recognizing no class or race or nation—but a fellowship sharing the same hope and faith and love, bound together in one body—the Body of Christ. He said the hireling spirit is found even in the Church which stands for world-wide friendship. Each one personally must learn to say, "WHAT AM I GOING TO GIVE" rather than "WHAT AM I GOING TO GET?" If we are willing to give something out of our own lives—the dream will come true, and in the words of Edward

Markham: "All the world will be a light hearted company of friends. The coming of Christ's Kingdom depends on us." He closed with the noon-day prayers.

The meeting adjourned for luncheon.

Minutes—Afternoon Session

The afternoon session of the Annual Meeting reassembled in Dudley Memorial Hall at two o'clock. After the singing of Hymn 464, Mrs. Musson opened the meeting with prayer. The minutes of the morning meeting were read and approved.

The report of the Social Service Secretary, was read. She said she attended meetings of volunteer workers at City Hospital, also cooperated with the Christmas Exchange of the Family Service Bureau. That all parishes from whom she received reports were doing Social Service Work. Many had helped during the Flood by sheltering, feeding and clothing refugees. A number of women and girls are doing volunteer work at the City Hospital.

The report of the Director of the Church Periodical Club was read, in her absence, by Mrs. Lewis Gorin, and showed twenty-three parishes and missions organized with secretaries. One hundred twenty-nine periodicals are sent regularly. Prayer books and Hymnals, books, cards, etc., were distributed in large numbers to twenty-seven institutions in the Diocese and thirteen outside the Diocese. Contributions for the Library Fund amounted to \$84.41, an increase over last year. 1938 marks the fiftieth Anniversary of the Church Periodical Club and efforts are being made to complete an Endowment Fund of \$50,000.00 during the year.

Mrs. Robert Colgan, Jr. reported for the Committee on Race Relations—told of the all day meeting to be held at Dr. Little's Mission on Friday, February 11th. She urged all to attend. She said that serving on the Committee had been a revelation to her and she was fascinated at the amount of work that can be done for the Colored Race in our midst.

Mrs. C. V. Williams gave her report of the Leper Work showing that \$64.50 had been received from six branches. She said the Louisville Council to the American Mission to Lepers had recently been reorganized.

Mrs. Harry Maury's very interesting report of the Parish by Mail followed. She said she is preparing two adults for confirmation, with two others in prospect. She said it was interesting to note that during 1937, the Parish by Mail had spent twenty-three and one-half cents per person. This was for stationery, Easter and Christmas Cards, Forward Movement Booklets and Prayer Books.

Mrs. J. T. Beard told of the good that the Jennie Cas-seday Rest Cottage was doing for working girls, and reminded us of the Episcopal Room which was in need of refurnishing.

Mrs. W. H. Langley's motion that a message of love and greeting be sent to our President—telling her how much she was missed, was adopted with a rising vote.

Mrs. Musson called attention to the Contest offered again by the Provincial Woman's Auxiliary, to women and girls in the Province.

She then introduced the speaker, Mrs. Harper Sibley, of Rochester, N. Y. Mrs. Sibley's subject was "THE CHURCH MOVES FORWARD INTO A NEW DAY." She said that the Church is today faced with greater opportunities than ever before, and the test of our own life will be whether we are aware of that, and of the great movements of our day. She gave a word picture of the Oxford Conference to which she had been a delegate and she summarized the Conference's Opinion of Capitalism and Communism. She said the main question in the minds of those at Oxford was "WHETHER IT WAS NOT POSSIBLE IN ANY WAY FOR CHRISTENDOM TO UNITE THIS DIVIDED WORLD." She said that the Conference taught that Christian people must work together, study together and worship together, if they would hope to solve the problems of a world divided in so many ways.

About three hundred attended during the day, and the offering of \$80.61 was for the Bishop Lloyd Memorial Fund.

After closing prayers and benediction by the Bishop, the meeting adjourned.

ADDRESS OF THE PRESIDENT

Women of the Auxiliary:

Once again we have come to our Annual Meeting to review the work of the past year and to plan for the future. There have been difficulties and discouragements during 1937 as there always will be, but there have also been many bright spots, one especially which I feel you should know. Calvary, St. Andrew's and St. Paul's made individual pledges and when those three became a merged parish, they and some of your officers were greatly concerned as to what this would mean to us financially, but we are most thankful to tell you that these pledges have been paid in full. We congratulate those women and trust that they may feel able to pledge as much for 1938, as they represented three of our largest and strongest groups. The Diocese of Kentucky has increased its pledge to the National Council for 1938 and we are hoping that the Auxiliary will carry a part of this increase.

You will hear the reports of 1937 from the various officers. I want to say very little about the past for that is behind us and is only valuable as we learn from it for the future—1938 is before us with great opportunities for service. Several of our branches are in process of re-organization along lines that have proven successful elsewhere. Change is not easy for some of us, but when it does seem wise, let us support our leaders whole-heartedly. Bishop Clingman feels very strongly that the unit or chapter plan is the solution of the problem for many of our parishes and I feel sure that our women have confidence enough in him and in our clergy to co-operate and give it a fair trial. We are also in the throes of writing a new constitution. The Constitution Committee and the Executive Board have given much time and prayerful thought to it. Copies of the new constitution and suggested changes will be given to the Branch presidents today who will be asked to study it with their branches. On Thursday, March 10, the Committee, the Executive Board and the Branch presidents will have an all day meeting to consider the re-action of the members. Then the revised constitution will be submitted to you at the Annual Meeting in 1939 when we trust it can be adopted without taking much time as every one will have had an opportunity to express an opinion through her Branch president. It seems a pity to discuss tech-

calities and details when we might be learning of the missionary work of the Church.

These two important changes in organization and constitution would seem to indicate that our watchword for the year should be "FELLOWSHIP"—fellowship is thought, in work, in prayer and at the Holy Communion, for if each of us practices true Christian fellowship with a proper regard for the other person's opinion and a willingness to accept the rule of the majority, there will be no difficulty about these changes. We are committed by our baptism and by our membership in the Auxiliary to making Christ known at home and unto the uttermost parts of the earth. We have His promise that if we will do this, He will be with us even unto the end of the world, but we can only make this witness effective as we love the brethren and have fellowship one with another as well as fellowship with the Father and with His Son, Jesus Christ. So let us go into 1938 determined to make it the best year the Auxiliary has ever had in Kentucky, each one doing her utmost in the spirit of fellowship because we are children of a common Father and fellow-workers in a mission which our Master committed to all who bear His name.

REPORT OF THE FIRST VICE-PRESIDENT

Being so newly organized, the Executive Council has as yet asked nothing of us as an Auxiliary, but urges that the Branches support the Field and other Departments as occasion shall arise, and particularly that the Auxiliary lend its best efforts to stressing the Church's Program and doing all in its power to increase the pledges for this and assist in raising the Parish Quota.

REPORT OF THE SECRETARY

The Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary during the past year has held five meetings, one a luncheon meeting at the home of the president, the other four in the Cathedral House, each preceded by a Corporate Communion. Miss Winston presided at all of them. At the meeting held on January 13, the Board together with the Constitution Committee, in an all day session, considered the newly drawn up constitution. The following motion was unanimously adopted. "That the constitution as amended by majority opinion at this meeting (Jan. 13) be presented to the Diocesan Board for their consideration.

On December 9th the Diocesan Board had a meeting with most of the branches represented.

Five United Lenten Meetings were held with an average attendance of 60. Total offerings amounted to \$106.78.

The Auxiliary of the Diocese had a full representation at the Triennial in Cincinnati. Miss Lockett, Miss Winston, Mrs. Clingman, Mrs. Rennenberg, and Mrs. Russell served as delegates. A Corporate Communion was held in Christ Church Cathedral on the morning of October 7th, the day and hour being that of the great United Thank Offering Service in Cincinnati.

The Semi-Annual Meeting was held on November 9th, in the Cathedral House. There were about 150 present. The meeting was given over entirely to reports from the General Convention.

Armistice Day, November 11th, was observed in the various parishes as a Day of Intercession for Peace.

Resolutions on the death of Mrs. Charles E. Woodcock were adopted at the Diocesan Board Meeting and copies sent to Bishop Woodcock and the Bishop's Letter.

The Auxiliary has a total enrollment of 880. There are twenty organized branches, and several groups contributing through the United Thank Offering. The total value of the year's work amounts to \$6,770.61.

The minutes of each meeting have been recorded and notes and notices sent out as requested.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE EDUCATIONAL SEC'Y

Some weeks ago, there came into my hands a pamphlet from the Church Missions House, entitled "Re-Thinking Religious Education." It contained the findings of the seminars held during the General Convention. There were so many things in it that thrilled me, that I heartily recommend its perusal to each of you, but probably the thing that thrilled me most was a paragraph in Dr. McGregor's opening address in which he said: "Some day we will have a churchly system of religious education. We will not call it education, for education is a dry and dusty word. We will call it the Life of the Church. It will be a system where every person, young and old, has a real part in the work of the Church, and where all the parts fit together to form the Living Temple of God."

I remember so well Bishop Gailor's saying: "Remember what education is—it is the growth of the soul by the assimilation of ideas which become the stuff of one's character."

It is by living and doing we oftener learn, than by reading a book.

I have a feeling that we learned more of social service during the flood last year than we would from reading any number of books on the subject.

Our 53rd Annual Meeting which was to have been held on January 26th had to be postponed on account of the flood until April 20th.

The World Day of Prayer, sponsored by the Church Women's Federation, which was scheduled for February 12th was called off, because there was still water in many of the downtown churches.

Our first United Lenten Meeting was held in the Choir-room of the Cathedral on February 19th. Dudley Hall was still being used as a Hospital for flood refugees. Bishop Clingman was the speaker. His theme "Carry On" was based on what the churches must do in spite of the recent flood disaster.

On February 26th the Rev. Robert S. Lambert of Cincinnati spoke on Mexico.

On March 5th the Rev. Edmund P. Dandridge of Nashville, spoke on the Church's Program.

On March 12th some of the faculty and students from Lincoln Institute gave us the opportunity of catching a glimpse of what a school, managed under God's guidance, can do for negro boys and girls.

On March 19th the Rev. William H. Langley spoke on "Our Kentucky Mountains."

The long delayed Annual Meeting took place in Christ Church Cathedral on April 20th.

Miss Mary Johnston, Glendale, Ohio, Chairman of the National Executive Board, spoke about plans for the Convention, giving some high lights of the program.

The Rev. Robert Fletcher of Birmingham told of his rapidly increasing work among the deaf in the Province of Sewanee.

Mrs. Fred Ramsey of Knoxville gave a comprehensive description of the Unit Plan of Organization which has been most successfully used in the Diocese of Tennessee.

Bishop Clingman gave the noon day meditation "I can do all things, through Christ, which strengtheneth me."

The Woman's Auxiliary co-operating in sending boys to Camp Woodcock and boys and girls to the Week End Conference at Kentucky Military Institute June 4, 5, 6th.

Attendance at the Sewanee Summer Training Schools were exceptionally good this year. There were eight registrations from the diocese of Kentucky.

Kentucky was particularly fortunate in having the General Convention this year in Cincinnati during the month of October. Dozens of our women availed themselves of the opportunity to attend.

The semi-annual meeting was held on November 9th. The purpose of this meeting was to bring back a picture of General Convention and the Triennial Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary.

The five delegates, the Custodian of the United Thank Offering and the representative of the Church Periodical Club, all brought back vivid pictures of what they had seen and heard.

The theme of the Triennial was "Fellowship in Faith and Work."

A United Christendom was the key note of all reports from the Oxford and Edinburg Conferences.

It was a delight to show our real sincerity by working in the School of Christian Living held in Louisville October 31st-November 3rd. It heralded a new day in co-operative Christianity.

With many parishes trying the Unit Plan our Speakers' Bureau has proven invaluable.

REPORT OF THE SOCIAL SERVICE SECRETARY

It is with pleasure and also some embarrassment that I make this report. Pleasure because such good reports came in so promptly from nearly every parish; embarrassment because I seem to have helped so little in the work. Nevertheless I was willing to do anything I could.

I have attended several meetings called by Dr. Leavell here at the Cathedral House and one at the City Hospital for volunteer workers; also a meeting called by the Christmas Exchange, after which meeting I sent letters to all the clergy asking their cooperation in the Christmas Exchange. \$2.50 which was sent to me direct, I turned over to this Exchange for a Christmas basket.

All parishes from which I had reports showed they were doing social service work. Of course the flood last year gave great opportunity for such service. Several churches which housed and fed refugees held services each morning which were well attended. One parish distributed milk to needy children for four months. One parish outside Louisville unites each year with another denomination in sharing the proceeds from a picture show and in this way are able to do a large piece of social service work. All parishes seem to be interested in one way or another with our church homes and city institutions and the Red Cross. Several women at the Home for the Aged and Infirm are sent cards frequently by ladies from one Auxiliary. Through this contact a friendship has grown up between these ladies and those less fortunate.

Many of the report showed that the branches of our Auxiliary were cooperating with other denominations in doing social service work. It is impossible to mention the work of each branch separately but I was most interested in reading the reports to see the splendid cooperation and work done during the flood in sheltering, feeding and clothing those who needed it, not only in large numbers in parish houses but as individuals.

A number of our church women and some young girls are doing volunteer work at the City Hospital. I hope before very long to be able to report some very definite piece of social service work.
