MINUTES.

The Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Lexington assembled in Trinity Church, Covington, at 10:30 A. M. Tuesday, June 3, the opening day of the seventh annual Council of the Diocese. The program was as follows:

10:30 A. M.—Holy Communion, with charge to the Woman's Auxiliary, by Rev. R. L. Harris, Rector of St. Paul's Church, Newport.

Offering for Woman's Auxiliary Work.

12:00 M.—Reports of Diocesan officers:

President of Woman's Auxiliary.

President of the Junior Branch.

President of the Babies' Branch.

1:00 P. M.—Luncheon.

2:30 P. M.—Reports from Parochial branches.

4:00 P. M.—Reports by women workers in the field.

A large congregation met at the morning service, Bishop Burton presiding, assisted by Rev. Mr. Patterson, missionary at Beattyville and Proctor. The Rev. Mr. Harris made a beautiful and inspiring charge to the women. The offering amounted to \$26.

After the service business was conducted in the Guild Hall of the Church. The meeting was called to order by Miss Mary E. Harrison, the Diocesan President. Bishop Burton offered prayer. The roll call showed the following Branches represented:

Miss Harrison read her address, in which she compared the work of preceding years, and urged more zeal for the future. Miss Harrison then read report of Contingent Fund, which for the first time was overdrawn.

Mrs. Rothier, President of the Junior Branch, read her report, and was grieved that so many had fallen behind in their work.

Mrs. Burton, President of the Babies' Branch, as usual, had a fine account to give of that department.

The meeting was then adjourned to partake of lunch.

At 2:30 P. M. the interrupted business was continued.

Rev. A. C. Hensley, of Versailles, offered prayer, Miss Harrison presiding. Report of Church Periodical Club was read by Mrs. A. E. Doisy, President. Miss Harrison asked that a secretary be appointed in each Branch of the Auxiliary to correspond with Mrs. Doisy, that more could be learned of this work, and urged a deeper interest to be taken in the same.

Miss Kate Scudder, President of Trinity Branch, Covington, offered the following resolutions, which were adopted by a rising vote:

"Since our last meeting, Mrs. Twing has been called to her reward.

Resolved, That this Council of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Lexington has heard with profound sorrow of the death of the 'mother of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions,' and desire to place on record our appreciation of one who gave the best of her life to this work.

Resolved, That we extend to her family our heartfelt sympathy.

Resolved, That these resolutions be spread upon the minutes of this Council, and published in the yearly report."

Miss Emma J. Morrell, the missionary at Altamont, gave a most interesting report of her work for the year, and made a strong appeal for a Kindergarten. Miss Harrison asked for a musical instrument for Miss Morrell's "model cottage."

Bishop Burton moved that very hearty thanks be tendered Miss Sybil Carter for her generosity in paying this missionary's salary for three years. This was seconded and received a unanimous vote.



Then followed reports from twelve Parish Branches of the Woman's Auxiliary and three Junior Branches.

Report of Beattyville High School was read by the Principal, Miss Minnie Hosner. Mrs. I. W. Thomson reported on the school work at Corbin. Miss Lillie Mahan read her report on industrial work at Proctor and Beattyville. These talks were most inspiring, and made the meeting helpful and delightful.

Miss Scudder moved that \$15 of the offering be given to General Missions, the remainder to Miss Morrell for her Kindergarten; carried. To the same Mrs. Burton pledged \$5 for the Cathedral Branch; Miss Selbert, \$2 for Junior Branch, Frankfort; \$1 was pledged for St. John's, Dayton; \$1 for St. Paul's, Newport; \$1 for Junior Branch, St. John's, Covington; \$1 from a member of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Miss Harrison read a letter from Miss Emery, of the Church Missions House, giving name of Missionary for whose family this Diocesan Branch was requested to send a box. The following Branches pledged their assistance: Cathedral, Newport, Middlesboro, Georgetown, Trinity, Covington, Dayton, Frankfort, and the Junior Branch, Trinity, Covington.

Rev. W. G. McCready, General Missionary, in a short address made especial appeal for scholarships for the Mission Schools. The meeting was then adjourned until Wednesday morning, June 4.

Wednesday morning, June 4, the Woman's Auxiliary met in the transept of the church. The meeting was called to order by the President, who opened with prayer.

Miss Emery's annual letter of greeting was read.

Miss Daingerfield read an interesting report of the "Gleaners" of Cathedral Parish. Miss Morrell told some additional facts in connection with her work, and requested Sunday-school literature and text cards.

Mrs. Thomson moved vote of thanks to the Trinity Branch and all members of the Parish for their most abounding and delightful hospitality; unanimously carried. Mrs. Burton moved that a donation be given the janitress with thanks for her services; carried.

Thus ended one of the pleasantest and most instructive meetings this Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary has ever known.

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ADDRESS OF THE PRESIDENT.

*Dear Friends of the Woman's Auxiliary:*

I am sure I but voice the feeling of each one when I say it is very good to be here, and that we rejoice in the opportunity of meeting face to face the friends to whom we are bound by very sacred ties. I am, however, deeply disappointed that every branch is not represented, for it is by these meetings alone we realize the union of sympathy and effort that binds us together. In looking over the records of the past year I find no great gain in the amount of our gifts. But I believe it has been a year of quickened life, and though the Auxiliary in our Diocese grows slowly, it is growing. In the hearts of some the love and comprehension of its best meaning has deepened; others hitherto indifferent have been stirred to earnest interest. One convincing evidence of growth is the improved character of our work. The increasing intelligence and love we bring to it, and the cheerful alacrity with which every call has been met. The loving care and thought bestowed upon the boxes sent to the families of missionaries alone speaks volumes. As usual, the larger proportion of our gifts have been to our own Diocesan work, we have given to it \$363.67, and the value of boxes \$298.60, \$10 of the money given for special work was from an Auxiliary man (I wish there were many more of them) of Middlesboro. To Domestic Missions in money \$13, \$11 of which was for the home for Bishop Rowe of Alaska; two boxes, one for Miss Roff's work, Oklahoma, value \$8.50, and our beautiful box for a missionary in West Virginia, contributed to by seven branches and valued at \$174, a total to Domestic Missions of \$195.50.

To Missions abroad the annual pledge of the Cathedral Branch of \$50 for the life insurance of a missionary in Japan, and \$50 given by six Branches for a building for St. Mary's School, Shanghai, a memorial to Mrs. Tuing. To General Missions, \$17. To the Triennial Offering we gave this year \$213.68; the total of our three years' effort for this fund was \$519.46.



I had hoped it would reach the thousand dollar mark. The total amount given this year for all purposes \$1,213.30.

That branch of our work, the Church Periodical Club, has been very active, having distributed a large number of books, papers, magazines and pictures. I would call attention to the fact that since September last we have given but \$7 to the Board of Missions, the Board counts its year from September. We forget in the pressure of duties nearer at hand that we are auxiliary to this Board. It is their right to look to us for a certain amount of support.

While I would have the Branches respond to every worthy call, doing with all their might whatever their hands may find to do for the cause, I must emphasize the fact that first of all, no matter how strong the appeal, we must not listen until we have discharged two binding obligations. First, to the Board of Missions—we came into existence as an organization to help this Board. Last year there was a large deficit in the Treasury, owing in part to greatly increased opportunities and demands. Much of the money given was for specials, and while these are most welcome, they do not assist the Board in paying its appropriations. The Auxiliary at large gave to the Board last year \$65,000. This year we are asked for \$100,000. I would suggest that a part at least of our offering to-day be given to this object, and urge that before September next each Parish Branch gives an offering for it.

Next, we must remember our Bishop's Missionary Fund. This is *not* the *Expectation Fund*, but is a pledge from the Woman's Auxiliary to put into the hands of the Bishop each year a sum to be used toward the salary of a missionary or other Diocesan work not provided for. To fail in this is to embarrass greatly the Bishop's plans. The work in our Diocese to-day has only to be known to fill us with an enthusiastic desire to help. Are we not proud of our Bishop—a leader who says not to us go but come? For is he not always at the front? Foremost in every spiritual enterprise, for the good of his people and the extension of the Church in the Diocese, and shall we not follow with our sympathy, our energies and our means? Let this year mark a new era with us, let our gifts be ungrudging and as God has blest us. I wish you could have been with me on my recent visit to three of our mountain schools, Altamont, Corbin and East Bernstadt, you would feel as I do, that no time, no thought, or money wasted that has been bestowed upon them.

I brought away memories of the patient, faithful, uplifting lives of our missionaries and teachers; of children and young people, bright, appreciative and loving, eagerly embracing the



opportunities the Church is offering them. If much fault has been found in the past with our brothers and sisters of the mountains, where lies the blame? Is it not ours that we have so long withheld that which was their right, and should have been our highest privilege to give? I saw in my visit a broader vision of what may be if we are but true, and I thought not only of these our nearest neighbors and kindred, but of those of every nation and clime who call to us for help. Thinking of all these things let us pledge ourselves anew to fresh and unfaltering service. Let no discouragements or disappointments shake our confidence or weaken our faith. And while we despise not the day of small things, let us not be content, but press on to greater, offering to God only our best.

“May he give us grace to use faithfully such gifts as he has entrusted to us, that in the Great Day we may see with joy some whom our prayers, our means, our lives have helped to know the saving love of Christ.”

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### Report of the Babies' Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary.

After listening to the reports of the Woman's Auxiliary and of the Juniors, we are reminded of the statement and question of that disciple who said: "There is a lad here, which hath five barley loaves and two small fishes, but what are they among so many?" And yet it was from the little lad's store that the multitude was fed.

In the past year our Babies have accomplished nothing miraculous; but we have grown a little stronger; and we *have* worked and have earned the right to the title of "Little Helpers."

It is most gratifying to announce that new branches have been formed in Maysville, Nicholasville and Lawrenceburg. The unflagging efforts of the Director at Middlesborough, though absent the greater part of the year in Louisville, to keep her little ones interested, have been cheering. We have labored faithfully to establish ourselves in Georgetown; but she will have none of us. We have concluded that Georgetown is that Hamelin out of which the "Pied Piper" beguiled all the children. How they must be infested with rats!

At St. Paul's, Newport, greater interest has been awakened. They have a plan I should like to see adopted throughout the Diocese: all children under five years of age are placed upon their "Cradle Roll"; those over five are "Little Helpers," that sweetest name of the Babies' Branch.

From the Diocese of Western Missouri, I should like to borrow another idea: Holy Innocents' Day is the Babies' Branch day, and they observe it in every parish; each clergyman tries to have a bright, attractive, simple service, and the mothers are requested to bring even the tiniest baby to present unto the Lord. It would be most gratifying if our clergy would co-operate with us in this way.



I give just here the report of our most efficient Treasurer, Mrs. Sarah H. Allen, of Lexington.

(Treasurer's report follows this report.)

This witnesses that, if we are toddlers, yet are we crutches to the Bishop.

I wish, however, to emphasize the fact that our expenditures have been \$203.14 more than last year, while our receipts have been \$28.83 less. That we have been able to meet these demands is due to the fact that, for the first year or two of our existence, we were accumulating a fund upon which to draw. In the future we shall not be able to keep *one* teacher in the field, unless there is greater activity, greater interest displayed. I am not faint hearted, indeed, I am courageous enough to believe that, if the Bishop needs another teacher for his mountain work, the *children* could maintain her there, if they were the only element to be reckoned with. Why, last spring when the Church needed money for her missionary work, did not the children from all over the land come with their enthusiasm and hearty good will and raise for her more than \$100,000? In any enterprise they are the tugs that can move the mighty steamships.

A noted Southern general said of Pelham, that brilliant young Alabama artillery officer: "Had I but twenty Pelhams, I could conquer all Yankeedom." I am so proud of my babies, I can almost fancy the Bishop saying: "Give me but a larger Babies' Branch and Woman's Auxiliary, and I will grapple with any difficulty." What, after all, is the Babies' Branch but a training school for the Woman's Auxiliary? A school whose principal text-book is, "Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself."

Children need so little direction. A mother who will not take the two minutes on a Sunday to say the Babies' Branch prayer for or with her little one, needs, as I have previously stated, converting herself. Ah! truly the children's hands are willing enough. No man can measure the help those little hands can give, nor the sympathy and comfort those hands can convey, nor the blessings those hands can bestow.

How careless are we of our kingdoms! The great need of the Babies' Branch is that the mothers of us should rouse from our listlessness and indifference, and consider anything worth while that will foster a spirit of reverence, love and unselfishness in the minds of our children. I am learning that, if I can but gain the ear of the mother, I shall already have won the heart of her child.

Too many have the idea that it is the money we want; it is not that, not that, but the prayers—a prayer which, faithfully



said, will glorify this earth, and the sweet incense of which will rise to the "City Immortal."

This past Easter when a mother, whose child is in my own Circle, handed me fifty cents, saying, she gladly gave the money, but that her baby really had not put the pennies in the mite-box; that the child did not understand it; it was really of no significance, etc. I insisted upon returning the money to her, saying we could do without the money, but that we should cease to exist without the prayers.

No significance in this act! As I have said again and again, this is the foundation stone in character building. "Oh! mother, the character which you are constructing is not your own. It is the building material out of which other generations will quarry stones for the temple of life. See to it, therefore, that it be granite and not shale."

In thus bringing up our children, we are creating a new spirit within the Church and transforming our homes. If only patiently and prayerfully we guide these little feet, the world's redemption is largely solved. Neglect everything else, if you must, but don't neglect these little ones who, as Goethe says, are

"Half full of child's play,  
Half full of heaven."
