THIRTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT.

A year has passed since we listened to the fervent exhortation of the Rev. Mr. Rainsford, to allow the personal element to predominate in our religious life: "By their fruits ye shall know them." As we report our year's work, shall we find that the seed fell on good ground? Have the twelve preceding years of association life prepared the way for a rich harvest? If not, why should our work continue to be done on the same lines? That we have grown from strength to strength is easily shown by statistics. On November 26, 1872, fifteen ladies, representing seven parishes in this diocese, met the Bishop in St. Peter's Chapel, to organize the first branch of the then feeble Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, under the name of the Woman's Missionary Association of the Diocese of Long Island. That year the total amount contributed was \$3,981.79. This year we report a grand total of \$12,818.57; and we number 191 delegates, representing 48 parishes, in all parts of our Island Diocese, and proudly call ourselves "The Long Island Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions." A body now strong in numbers, in zeal, and in results accomplished, having branches established in nearly every diocese in the country, five new ones having commenced work during the past year,—the bonds of united effort drawing close one to another the sisterhood of Christ's household the Church, separated by land and sea though it may be. By the wise counsel of the Honorary Secretary, the indefatigable Mrs. Twing, the different branches are opening personal correspondence, with mutual benefit already noticeable.

No better argument seems needed to prove our growth and to recommend the methods on which we work. That the personal interest has been very great we must all have felt. The existence of some friction is only further proof of this fact; for with many men there will always be many minds. Without friction, that is, diversity of opinion, but unity of intention and aim, stagnation would quickly ensue, rapidly followed by death.

Among the instrumentalities for creating personal interest in our work, we gladly note the series of instructions for Church-women, proposed and opened by the Bishop, and ably continued by several of the clergy, under the auspices of this Association. The large attendance testified to a long-felt need and thorough appreciation of his Episcopal supervision. We earnestly trust that the same privilege may be enjoyed during the coming winter.

Miss Carter, the authorized agent of the Board of Missions, by her own intense interest in and personal knowledge of mission work, was enabled to excite an enthusiasm for the different branches, that happily found expression in action.

Thanks to the strenuous endeavors of the Memorial Bed Committee, we are able to report the completion of the endowment in memory of our first President, and feel our hearts warm with the knowledge that her work, so long and faithfully discharged in our midst, is now adequately and practically commemorated in a distant land, by the relieving of the sick and afflicted.

At the suggestion of the Secretary of our Diocesan Mission Board, we have endeavored to care for the personal needs of a faithful man, exiled from his native land, ministering to the needs of his countrymen and preaching the Good Tidings to them in their native tongue. His labors are, of necessity, extremely arduous, and it seems only fitting that we, the women of his adopted Church Home, should render it possible for him to work with a mind free from the thought, "wherewithal shall I be clothed?"

St. Phebe's Mission, the special Diocesan work of this Association, is anxiously awaiting the completion of the spacious building that is to serve as a permanent memorial of its late lamented President. This work has grown so rapidly that the present limited quarters are quite inadequate, as is also the present Maintenance Fund. Increase and advance are here demanded.

Happy are we that death has passed us by and that no vacant places are seen in our ranks. Except for the removals incident to our city life, no changes have been felt. Some new faces we see, and heartily welcome are they, as testifying to the growth of interest in our work and to the nearer approach of that happy day when the Long Island Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary shall include every parish in the Diocese. During the past year five additional parishes have sent delegates: St. Luke's Chapel, St. Paul's

Church, and the Church of Our Saviour, Brooklyn ; St. John's Church, Fort Hamilton ; and St. John's Church, Cold Spring Harbor.

What shall our work be for the ensuing year ? Shall we build schools and churches for our Indian and colored brethren ? or hospitals for the sick, or homes for the destitute, or missions for the heathen in our midst ? Demands, for just such assistance, come from the north and the south, the east and the west ; while at our doors we hear the cry : "I was naked, and ye clothed me not." Since we may not be able to do all, how shall we choose ? Plain and imperative is the answer, "What thy hand findeth to do, do with thy might."

Owing to the unceasing care and thought of our faithful President, the different branches of Mission work were all in turn presented, the speakers being : Mr. Gardiner, of Japan ; Mrs. Twing; Rev. Mr. Haskins, the promoter of higher education of Indians; Miss Sybil Carter, the noble woman who has devoted her life to Missions ; Bishop Walker, of Northern Dakota, he who received his early training in this our city; and Mrs. Quinton, Secretary of the Indian Association.

May God bless the words of wise counsel and earnest uplifting that have been addressed to us, and increase in us true religion and all virtues.

REPORT.

In presenting the Third Annual Report of St. Phebe's Mission, our thoughts should turn first of all in grateful acknowledgement to Him who has strengthened us by the way, whose unfailing Providence enables us to report steady progress in the various activities carried on by our faithful workers, and a generous support from the many friends of the Mission ; as well as from the Church at large. Much has been done ; but greater liberality is urgently solicited for the coming year, to enable us to carry on the work, which is increasing and expanding continually, as our statistics show.

We desire to call attention to the requirements of the Mission : The maintenance of the Mission House is entirely separate from Mission *work*, which is provided for monthly by the churches, Guilds and associations, as well as by individual donations. The claims of the mission need no other enforcement, than by the statement of facts. Three thousand dollars (\$3,000) annually is the smallest amount possible to defray the current expenses, and great embarrassment is felt if pledges and subscriptions are not promptly paid to meet them. For the sake of our own spiritual life, as well as on account of those who need our assistance, and our care, we beg all churchmen to aid and sustain this beautiful work, consecrated by the prayers and labors of saints gone before, whose names we love and memories cherish; always remembering there must be those who commission, as well as those who are commissioned, and we hold the former relation to those who do our work, distribute our alms and speak our words of sympathy and encouragement to those fainting by the way. We must look to it, that our Mission House is maintained and the "basket" and the "purse" never empty.

Four associates are now resident in the Mission House, faithfully discharging their round of christian duty and love. Patient, never flagging, they give their time and strength to the work of helping the destitute, the sick, and the erring ; while the constant

and voluntary aid rendered the Mission in many ways, especially as regular visitor to one of the institutions, might almost enable us to count Miss J. A. S. Schapps as another associate. Sin, poverty and neglect send their children to be cared for, and the St. Phebe Associate can truly say: "I delivered the poor that cried, and the fatherless, and him that had none to help him ; the cause that I knew not, I searched not." To lift up the bowed head, even though bent in disgrace and shame ; to alleviate pain, to lighten the burdens of the weary and heavy laden ; to console the felon in his cell, and directing him to Christ, bid him "go and sin no more;" to rescue erring, and oft-times fallen sisters, and tenderly lead them to the conviction of their sinful life, is the loving work of these Christian women. Many have after urgent persuasion been taken by the associates into Reformatory Institutions ; on others loving Christian influence brought to bear against the moral darkness, and temptations to which they have been exposed, has succeeded in lifting them out of these sad beginnings, into a life of virtue, usefulness, and respectability. Much more could be done, and must necessarily be left undone, until the great need of a *chaplain* is supplied; one who can give his entire time and services to the many requirements at the Institutions, and among the out-door poor visited by the St. Phebe Associate, which she hesitates to ask of the city clergymen, knowing them to be fully occupied in their own parish work, while often time otherwise required is taken in finding a minister who can serve. The opportunity of holding Sunday services awaits us in two or three Institutions, had we a clergyman to undertake it. This necessity is demonstrated by the fact that during the past year, even while the Rev. Mr. Cooper gave his partial services as St. Phebe's chaplain ; and since his death in February, which we deeply deplore, the Rev. Mr. Twing has without remuneration supplied his place as much as possible, with frequent visits of the Rev. George B. Carter of New York to the several hospitals ; still *fourteen* other clergymen have responded to calls for clerical ministrations,

We feel the difficulty of giving illustrations of what we have generalized. Many cases have been brought to a successful issue, that have been of intense interest, and in detail even sensational ; we can look back over crooked paths made straight, and fruition crowning the daily work of the Mission ; but no adequate recog-

nition can be made of *all* the work, material and spiritual, of our St. Phebe Associates, as it is known only to the Searcher of Hearts.

The Holy Rite of Confirmation was administered to thirteen men and women in the Alms House Chapel, Flatbush, Tuesday, May 12, 1885. A number of friends of St. Phebe's and several of the Board of Managers were present. It was a sight such as our Saviour loved when on earth, this band of outcasts forlorn and desolate, and poor, not only "in spirit." As they knelt to receive the Apostolic Right which made them rich beyond measure in the gift of the Holy Spirit, and assurance of everlasting life, we thought in bringing such as these to the foot of the cross do we show the best work of our Mission.

Donations specified as delicacies for the sick, food and clothing for the destitute, and money for all incidental expenses of the

Mission work, realize a cash value of \$2,285.02 an increase of \$227.68 over our report last year, which was for nearly eighteen (18) months.

St. Phebe's Guild, which is now in its third year, has aided greatly to promote the growth and efficiency of the Mission, and has given opportunity for increased usefulness in many ways. There are over three hundred (300) subscribers at ten cents (10 cts.) a month, realizing a sum which has paid for burials, medicines, and articles needed for the sick, the telephone rental, music for services at the Jail, etc., etc. It might be mentioned here, that through the efforts of two young ladies of the Guild, an organ for use in the hospitals, has been purchased with the proceeds of a "Bag and Apron" sale; and thanks are due Messrs. Taylor & Son, for procuring a very fine instrument with double manual, at a greatly reduced price.

The Jamaica Branch of St. Phebe's Guild has also done a noble work, not only sending money to the Guild but has also furnished twelve (12) boxes, containing fruits, vegetables, groceries, delicacies for the sick, clothing, books, papers, flowers, etc., to the value of about \$250. Homes in the country have also been provided for infants sent by the Mission, of whom this Branch of the Guild has a personal oversight.

St. Paul's Guild, Flatbush, has also rendered material aid and assistance, having sent twelve (12) boxes, of delicacies, and staples to the Mission; as well as money, the collective value of which is over \$200.

FESTIVALS.

By means of liberal donations of poultry, vegetables, fruit and money, the associates were enabled to send dinners to fourteen (14) destitute families on Thanksgiving Day and to twenty-five (25) families at Christmas. Besides these, through the agency of Miss Margaret Hall and others, a Christmas dinner was given to the patients in the two hospital wards of the Penitentiary, and to a dozen men and women on "long terms," who were friendless and out of health. A Christmas tree was also furnished for the Alms House children, by the infant class of the Sunday School of Holy Trinity, which provided toys for eighty (80) children, including some at the County Hospital, oranges and candies for the older children and nurses, while the old people who came in to see the

tree, (and there were about *three hundred!*) each received something. Twenty-eight children who had no other Christmas festivities gathered to enjoy the "first tree" at the Mission House, lighted on the evening of December 26th, the gift of Mrs. Doctor Hopkins. As there was a superabundance of toys, candies, etc., the associates re-decked the tree for the children at the "Brooklyn City Hospital," fourteen (14) in number, and small gifts were bestowed on all the patients in the hospital, who (with a few exceptions) were able to be present, some of them brought on their beds, or in chairs.

Another happy occasion for some of the proteges of St. Phebe's was furnished by a member of our board, in her annual "Robin Dinner" which nine (9) little waifs attended, under the care of an associate, and it was very touching to see the little band, black and white, return, each with a doll, and a bag of dainties for brothers and sisters at home.

Appropriate services were held at the Institutions at Easter, and about 1100 eggs were distributed at the County Alms House and Hospital, and 140 bouquets at the Long Island City Hospital.

One of the blessed results of past, and promise of future growth and progress, which gladdens our eyes, and stimulates our hearts, is the erection of our new Mission House, a memorial of one to whose untiring zeal we owe pre-eminently the concentration of the work of St. Phebe's Mission in a permanent home for the associates—a mission house from which emanates the spirit of christian charity, and to which all in need of comfort or succor freely come. The new building, substantial and commodious, admirably adapted for its intended purposes, will soon be ready for us, a father's loving tribute for her, in whose removal hence we sustain an irreparable loss. "May grace be given us all to follow her in those works wherein she followed Christ, that we with her may attain the rest of Paradise, and the bliss beyond."

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS
OF THE
*Long Island Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary
to the Board of Missions.*

CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE I.

This Association shall be called the LONG ISLAND BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE BOARD OF MISSIONS.

ARTICLE II.

Its object shall be to work in connection with the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, the field being co-extensive with the Church, Diocesan and General.

ARTICLE III.

The Association shall consist of all persons who shall contribute to the treasury thereof, annually, at least the sum of one dollar. Any one may be constituted a Life Member by the payment at one time of the sum of one hundred dollars.

ARTICLE IV.

The officers of this Association shall be a President, Vice-President, Secretary, and Treasurer.

There shall be at least two, and not more than five, delegates from each Parish to be represented in the Association.

There shall be, moreover, a Board of Managers, consisting of the above-named officers and of the delegates, whose duty it shall be to regulate its affairs, and under the supervision of their Rectors, to further the work of the Association in the Parishes to which they respectively belong. The methods by which the ends of this organization can be promoted are the raising of money for the support of Missionaries and Teachers, for the education of those who may be preparing for the work, and for other benevolent purposes connected with Missions; the making, collecting and transfer of clothing, and other material aid, and the circulation of papers and leaflets that may serve to stir up a public interest in the Missions of the Church.

ARTICLE V.

It shall be the duty of the President to preside at the business meetings of the Association, and of the Board of Managers, to call special meetings of the same when occasion shall arise, to countersign all drafts upon the Treasurer, and to obtain fresh information from Missions, to be read at the stated meetings of the Board.

ARTICLE VI.

It shall be the duty of the Secretary to conduct the correspondence of the Association, especially that with the Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary, to keep minutes of the proceedings of the Association and of the Board of Managers, to send out all notices of the stated and special meetings of the same, and to keep a fair record of all Missionary Box Reports ; also, to prepare an Annual Report.

ARTICLE VII.

It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and keep account of all moneys contributed for the work of the Association, to pay all drafts upon the funds when countersigned by the President, and to present an Annual Report.

ARTICLE VIII.

The Constitution shall not be altered, except at an annual meeting of the Association—notice of the proposed change having been given at a stated meeting of the Board of Managers.

BY-LAWS.

I.

There shall be an annual meeting of the Association on the second Thursday of June in each year, at such hour and place as the Secretary, with the advice of the President, shall indicate.

II.

The election of Officers and of the Board of Managers shall take place at such meetings, and they shall continue in office for one year, or until their successors shall have been appointed.

III.

In case of the vacancy of any office, by the death or removal of its occupant, the same may be filled at a stated meeting of the Board of Managers ; and any one so appointed shall continue in office until the next annual meeting of the Association.

IV.

The stated meetings of the Board of Managers shall be held on the second Thursday of each month, except that of the November meeting shall take place on the first Thursday of the month.

There shall be no stated meetings in July, August or September.

V.

In all matters of importance, a resolution shall be brought before the Association and the Board of Managers, to be deferred to the next meeting for decision, unless passed by a unanimous vote.

VI.

At a meeting of the Board of Managers, any number present shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business ; and, at the annual meeting of the Association, a number of delegates, equal to one-half of the number of Parishes represented therein, shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.
