REV. A. B. HUNTER, St. Augustine's School, Raleigh, N. C., presented Freedman work.

Twenty-third Annual Report.

To the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Long Island :

The year has gone, just as busy years are apt to go, and perhaps each one of us has a sense of failure and short coming, but if we have been honest and earnest and have devoted our energies to this work, we have a measure of cause for thanksgiving and encouragement. Thanksgiving for having been granted the privilege of sharing the grand missionary work which has been done, and encouragement, when we read and hear of Church schools built, and their influence widening, scholarships ripening their fields for the harvest, hospital stores replenished and hospitals built where there is sore need of them, in new countries where thousands of single men are leading hard and trying lives in the midst of constant danger and continual accidents; the families of missionaries made more comfortable by generous boxes; Chapels built in China, Africa and Mexico, as well as in the West and South of our own country. The hands of the men and women who are so bravely laboring in Diocesan, Domestic, Freedmen, Indian or Foreign fields, have been held up by our interest and material aid, and many have been brought into touch with the intellectual life, *we* do not half appreciate, by the Church Periodical Club.

In the Indian field we have again provided a lace teacher for Miss Carter's work in the Red Lake country; we made glad the red people of the Pine Ridge agency with our Christmas and Easter gifts, and we were able to forward the well planned projects of the Rev. Jules Prevost, who went back to his post away up the Yuocan River, in Alaska, in July.

The Long Island Branch gave him one of its own delegates as his bride, and a Long Island woman gave him the money with which to build his chapel. Other Dioceses contributed generously material assurance of their interest in God's work in that "great lone land," where the thermometer falls to sixty-five degrees below zero at Christmas, and now the greatest blessing of all has been given to Alaska, by the appointment of a bishop, the Rt. Rev. Roe, D.D.

In the Domestic field we have reached out as far as Bishop Grey in Florida and the Rev. Mr. Forrester in Mexico; the Rev. Mr. Applegate in Olympia and the Rev. Mr. Dickson in his Orcas Island parish, covering thousands of acres of land and water, island after island, at the farthest westerly point of our country, to Maine where Bishop Neely is working so hard, as well as to intermediate points, and been able to send good cheer and assistance. From everywhere received expressions of gratitude and assurance that the Church in the United States was surely lengthening her cords and strengthening her stakes. In our Freedman Department we have continued the sewing teacher's salary for St. Augustine's School, Raleigh, paid again the scholarship in King Hall, where negro men are trained to be earnest, manly priests of the Church, and assisted the other work throughout the South, which is trying to reach, lift up, and give Christian life to those 3,700,000 negro women and their 3,500,000 children.

We look over the Foreign field with sorrow, but by the brilliant, heart-burning address of the Rev. Yung Kiung Yen, last November, we are able to read of the recent troubles in China with a clearer brain and pronounce cooler judgment. We can certainly realize that creatures who commit lawless acts, whether coolies in China, or strikers, or lynchers in America, do not represent those whose hearts have been reached by a Christian spirit. Through the dark clouds the sun shines down upon the blessed work of Bishops Graves, McKim and Ferguson, with their brave assistants, and we feel that the precious seed sown and watered by the blood of martyrs, will surely flourish indeed.

Mrs. Brierly has laid down her work in Africa; her busy hands have been gently folded by those who loved her, and those for whom

she had sacrificed so much, and Miss Woodruff and Dr. Walrath are bravely "fighting the good fight" without her guidance. As an Indian Prince says of her, "The life of this noble woman of God among us goes to point out what true practical Christianity, is our souls grow warmer by her light." From Mexico we have had a direct message from the little girl, who is benefited by the Charlotte Annan Scholarship at the Hooker Orphanage, and the camera of the Rev. Mr. Forrester has made points of interest of which we have been told, and for which we have been working, more real.

Coming nearer home, we find that very few of the one hundred and forty-nine parishes of Long Island can feel that they have contributed their quota to the necessary support of our Diocesan institutions, and yet the Church Charity Foundation, St. Phebe's Mission, The Sheltering Arms Nursery, St. Giles and St. Martha's are willing to care for our sick, our old people, our orphans, our cripples, or visit the destitute in their miserable homes and alleviate their necessities. Let each parish ask itself, "What have we done to aid these institutions, of which we are so glad to avail ourselves when the occasion arises?" and those who have not as yet responded to appeals for help will surely be prompted to do so in the future—as we give so will our interest grow.

The united offering, made in Minneapolis in October, by the Woman's Auxiliary of \$55,000.00 to which Long Island contributed \$1,276.05 (one poor sewing woman of Long Island carrying to Miss Emery her mite box with eleven dollars and twenty-two cents in it, her pennies of the last three years; a lesson to all of us), is an exemplification of what may be done by an effort.

It is with much feeling that we speak of the deaths of Mrs. Mather and Mrs. Guion during the past year, the latter one of the first delegates of the Long Island Branch. Her long and exemplary life, was spent in ceaseless and untiring devotion to the cause of Christ, and especially was that spirit manifested by her great interest in mission work.

Report of the Altar Society.

When the Long Island Altar Society was organized six years ago, it promised to be a valuable agent in Mission Work, as well as a Co-worker with parish branches in filling box orders. Again and again in these appeals would come "Please send me a Cassock or Surplice," or "I am in sore need of Altar linen," necessary additions to a clergyman's wants, but very often interfering with the immediate acceptance of these boxes.

From these necessities the Altar Society began its work, planned by two earnest, efficient workers, whose labors were interrupted by illness on the one hand, and overwork on the other. Several important members removed from our Diocese which reduced the already small numbers and compelled the appointed chairman, to pass unheeded many calls from Mission Stations. Our president has made a new appointment in Mrs. J. J. Leiser, and hopes her efforts to place the Long Island Altar Society again in the front ranks of usefulness may be successful. The plans is to have working members who shall sew as well as contribute fifty cents per year and subscribing members at one dollar per year. Any information will be gladly furnished and workers welcomed by Mrs. J. J. Leiser, 51 Eldert Street, Brooklyn.

Church Periodical Club.

The Church Periodical Club presents its Seventh Annual Report with the following record. Since last October, this Diocese has distributed, 175 new current magazines; 1383 books; 716 Prayer Books; 978 Hymnals; 64 Testaments; 8 Bibles; 359 pictures; 686 Easter cards; 138 Easter carols; 1094 Christmas cards; 1328 Christmas carols; 513 Sunday-school books; 14 pamphlets; 3 catechisms; 6 music books; 8 tracts; 26 sermons; 10250 cancelled stamps; 30 lesson papers and 230 Sunday-school leaflets sent weekly; 13 almanacs; 194 Sunday-school cards; 7 games; 3 scrap books; and 20388 odd magazines and periodicals.

One word in regard to the tabulated statement which is for the first time printed for inspection. No one knows better than your correspondent how imperfect and incomplete a record it is of the grand work of the Diocese, but those most interested will be lenient when they realize the difficulties of the undertaking. Out of the fifty blank reports sent out last December to the Librarians, only twenty-nine were returned filled out, and of these, one had no signature and so was impossible to locate. Next year, with their earnest co-operation, we trust that a more complete report may be presented.

Few persons, except those actually engaged in the work of the Church Periodical Club, can form any idea of its enormity; 1260 of the Clergy, are its grateful recipients; and each of these are allowed to name four needy parishioners to whom a magazine would be of benefit, while the Free Reading Rooms, universally acknowledged to be the Missionary clergyman's most efficient aid, are almost entirely supplied from this source. Then there are the Lay Missionaries, the hospitals, prisons, and a numberless army of the children of Christ's devoted ambassadors. Our secretary of the Central Office, says "When a clergyman writes that he is a University man and that he is *hungry* for the sight of a new book, it makes me heart-sick to be unable to accede to his request;" and adds, "had any of you seen the

eagerness with which a certain returned missionary handled the literature offered for his use, you would realize that literary hunger was almost as pathetic as physical starvation."

Incredible as it must appear to the initiated, there are those who oppose the work, but this has been invariably found to proceed from ignorance of its methods and of the needs of its beneficiaries. One rector acknowledged that he had opposed it, until ill-health sent him into the mountains of North Carolina, where he found people who thought that the Church Periodical Club was the Episcopal Church, that being the only evidence they had had of her ministrations. A letter, written last Thanksgiving Day, by a clergyman in one of the isolated island Parishes of Washington, reads, "As I sit counting up the blessings for which to-day I should thank my Heavenly Father, I find nothing that has conduced more to the happiness of myself and family, than the kind offices of the Church Periodical Club; and I am constrained at this moment to write my grateful acknowledgements to my distant benefactors." Such testimony could be multiplied indefinitely, but space does not permit. Has not sufficient been presented to inspire those Parishes which are not yet represented in the field, with a desire to participate in this gratitude, and to incite the most earnest of our workers to greater efforts.

As has been said by another, "has it ever occurred to you when you have felt a sudden impulse to do a kindly deed, that perhaps God is using you as His instrument to answer some one's prayers. He sends His angels on such missions, and to human hearts also, He permits this high honor of doing His will; therefore let us never check these impulses to lighten and brighten the lives of our less favored brethren, for be assured our Heavenly Father can find some one else to do His bidding; but we shall have lost a golden opportunity of serving Him."

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

OF THE

LONG ISLAND BRANCH

OF THE

Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions.

CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE I.

This Association shall be called the LONG ISLAND BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE BOARD OF MISSIONS.

ARTICLE II.

Its object shall be to work in connection with the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, the field being co-extensive with the Church, diocesan and general. The methods by which the ends of this organization can be promoted, are the raising of money for the support of Missionaries and teachers for the education of those who may be preparing for the work, and for other benevolent purposes connected with Missions; the making, collecting and transfer of clothing and other material aid, and the circulation of papers and leaflets that may serve to stir up a public interest in the Missions of the Church.

ARTICLE III.

The Association shall consist of all delegates representing parishes in the Diocese, said delegates being appointed by the rectors of such parishes, each delegate paying an annual due of one dollar. There shall be at least two, and not more than five delegates, from each parish.

ARTICLE IV.

The officers of this Association shall be a President, Vice-president, Secretary and Treasurer.

There shall be, moreover, an Advisory Board consisting of the above-named officers and five delegates, appointed by the President.

ARTICLE V.

It shall be the duty of the President to preside at the business meetings of the Association and of the Advisory Board, to call special meetings of the same when occasion shall arise, to countersign all drafts upon the Treasurer, and to obtain fresh information from Missions, to be read at the stated meetings of the Association.

ARTICLE VI.

It shall be the duty of the Vice-president to preside, in the absence of the President, over the meetings of the Association and of the Advisory Board.

ARTICLE VII.

It shall be the duty of the Secretary to conduct the correspondence of the Association, especially that with the Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary, to keep minutes of the proceedings of the Association and of the Board of Managers, to send out all notices of the stated and special meetings of the same, and to keep a fair record of all Missionary Box Reports; also to prepare an Annual Report.

ARTICLE VIII.

It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and keep account of all moneys contributed for the work of the Association and to pay all drafts upon the funds, when countersigned by the President, and to present an Annual Report.

ARTICLE IX.

Any parish in the Diocese too remote for representation, shall, on the annual payment of not less than two dollars, be entitled to report its work to this Association.

ARTICLE X.

The Constitution shall not be altered, except at an Annual Meeting of the Association—notice of the proposed change having been given at a stated meeting of the Association.

BY-LAWS.

I.

There shall be an annual meeting of the Association on the second Thursday of May, in each year, at such hour and place as the Advisory Board shall direct.

II.

The election of Officers shall take place at such meetings, and they shall continue in office for one year, or until their successors shall have been appointed.

The election of officers shall be by ballot; nominations to be made in writing and delivered to the Secretary by the delegates at the annual meeting. Only those persons so nominated shall be eligible for election, the two receiving the largest number of ballots to be the candidates.

III.

In case of the vacancy of any office, by the death or removal of its occupant, the same may be filled at a stated meeting of the Advisory Board and any one so appointed shall continue in office until the next annual meeting of the Association.

IV.

All persons contributing to the treasury, annually, at least the sum of one dollar, shall be members of the Association, but not entitled to a vote.

V.

The stated meetings of the Association shall be held on the second Thursday of each month, except that the November meeting shall take place on the first Thursday of the month, the second Thursday being the Anniversary. Place of meeting to be determined by Association.

There shall be no stated meetings in June, July, August, or September.

VI.

In all matters of importance, a resolution shall be brought before the Association to be deferred to the next meeting for decision, unless passed by a unanimous vote.

VII.

At a meeting of the Association any number of delegates present shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business; and at the annual meeting of the Association, a number of delegates equal to one-half of the number of parishes represented therein, shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

VIII.

At the monthly meetings of the Association the order of business shall be: 1. Devotional services. 2. Calling of the roll. 3. Minutes of the last meeting. 4. Treasurer's report. 5. Intermission. 6. Reports of Parishes and Committees. 7. Unfinished business. 8. Miscellaneous business.
