REV. J. H. DARLINGTON, Archdeacon of Northern Brooklyn, presented Diocesan Missions.

REV. L. A. APPLEGATE, of Tacoma, Washington, presented Domestic Missions.



## Twenty-fourth Annual Report.

*To the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Long Island.*

Twenty-five years ago a committee, of which our beloved Bishop was the chairman, presented a resolution to the Board of Missions asking for the organization of a Woman's Auxiliary, and now at the end of a quarter of a century we are able to offer to the Board of Missions, our "Silver Jubilee" money as a thank-offering for the existence which has privileged us to do so much. No doubt but what each parish and each individual woman in her parish did their best to make the thank-offering of the Long Island Branch worthy of the cause. This is the twenty-fifth anniversary of the General Auxiliary, next year we will celebrate our own, and the offering at Cincinnati amounted to about \$6,000.00.

I beg that you will not confuse the thank-offering to be given to General Missions now, with the United Offering being collected for paying the salaries of women workers in the field, which is to be presented at the next Triennial Convention. We must remember that Bishop Coleman said that our United Offering in Minneapolis, "coming in its unique receptacles from every corner of the earth, has stirred and aroused many a man and woman to missionary giving." He urged us not to be satisfied with what we did then but strive to do better next time, that the word "satisfied" meant in this as in other things "Spiritual death, and perilous lethargy."

As we glance back over the past year, we find that mission work has been going steadily on, some places are widening their doors, other doors are opening, there is greater responsibility, enlarged labor and enlarged giving resulting from these additions to the expenditure, and it is borne in upon us with the retrospect that we can only hope to gain the day, overcome obstacles, and (to quote the telling expression of one of our thoughtful priests) to "withstand the temptation of home selfishness



and parochial selfishness, by more love for God and our fellow beings, and more real consecration of ourselves."

We have received messages and appeals from the Domestic field which have kept us in touch with the work being done by our brave stout-hearted missionaries, all of whom must have welcomed the good news of September first, that there is no deficiency this year in the Treasury of the Board of Missions, and that the sacrifice these Bishops, Priests and Deacons so nobly offered to make of a part of their *now* insufficient salaries would not be necessary. When we read of the self-abnegation of these men we are assured that the old leaven of the founders of our faith is still leavening the whole lump.

Bishop Wells gave us an opportunity to do something for S. Mary's School, Spokane, telling us of the great need of Christian education in the West. (That he often drove for a whole day without seeing a school.) He emphasized the good which could be accomplished through Church schools, and that each fifty dollars sent for a scholarship represented untold value, not only to the pupil but to the church.

Bishop Brooke asked us for men and money when he was with us last Anniversary Day. Mr. Jones, from the parish of Christ Church, E.D., went out to be of service to him, and we were able to send some money. We hope to do more for Oklahoma this year.

The misfortunes of the Rev. Mr. Applegate in losing by fire his newly erected hospital and school, made us realize how inevitable are the vicissitudes of our missionaries. He has rebuilt, but the insurance did not admit of replacing the furniture, for that he is dependent upon gifts. This noble man is doing a large work and positively needs more workers, having only ten men. He writes that he has over sixty new parishes; that they must have church schools in Olympia for the boys and girls of the ranchers, and that their hospitals are totally inadequate to accommodate the sufferers.

The steady growth of the work being done among



the mill hands in Maine by the Rev. Hudson Sawyer is not surprising to those who have followed the earnest well-directed movements of the man.

Everywhere we appreciate that men of the right stamp are carrying on the work, whether it be in Maine or in Florida, in the South or West or in the far Northwest, men of spiritual force able to overcome the intense evil around them with intenser good. Let us hold up their hands. I wonder if we realize what it means to allow this cry for workers, money, schools and hospitals to go unanswered or weakly responded to. The quieter virtues of human character are at a discount in the new parts of our great country. The tendency in them is to divorce religion from public education, because it is banished from public recognition in the administration of government, this is a symptom and a strong contributing cause of the ascendancy of this present world in the sympathies of the community, and the subordination of things spiritual and divine. It is the Church's charge to arrest this process by the antiseptic of her holy teaching.

We had a very practical presentation of the Japanese work by the Rev. Mr. Dooman. He plead earnestly for the school at Nara, saying that valuable rights would be lost if action were not taken immediately. He said the time had not yet come for withdrawing our missionaries from Japan as the converts still needed protection, and that it was not to be deplored that it would take at least twenty years longer to christianize Japan enough to leave her to do the rest, as "if the Japanese changed too quickly from Buddhism they might change as quickly back again." We should feel encouraged about the Japan Missions when we read that the first convert was seen there in 1864; that there only twelve Christian were Japanese in 1872; that one of them died in prison because a portion of the bible was found in his possession, and the eleven others established the first Protestant Church in the Empire, that same year, and now, mark the pros-



pect, there are three hundred and sixty-five churches and forty thousand converts; the Judge of the Supreme Church is a Christian, so are some of the leaders of the strongest political parties, and in the Parliament there are many of the true faith.

There is a sad note just here in our song of triumph, Miss Mailles laid down her beautiful work among the native women and came home to die at her mother's house in Massachusetts on September 22. Since 1884 she had been a devoted missionary.

When Bishop Graves was here he said that church education would be the strongest factor in the conversion of the Chinese, that the Imperial Government was beginning to recognize this and taking steps to anticipate the Christians. He gave us a strong point to remember, "that the heathen were not longing for the Gospel, that they had to be taught to long for it." Reports from China tell us that the past five years have been years of exceptional trial, but that the increase in church membership has been exceptionally great. Our contributions to the Chinese work have been devoted to the Chinese scholarship at St. Mary's School, Shanghai, and St. John's College, Shanghai, and to the Foreign Life Insurance Fund.

Coming to Africa a memory of Bishop Ferguson and his promising little protege, Tommy Tobo Havens, arises in our minds, and as our Bishop said after the remarkable exhibition of the little fellow's intelligence, "the fruit of Cape Palmas was astounding." Bishop Ferguson's appeal for a school at Cape Palmas, in memory of Mrs. Brierly, was generously responded to.

He also asked for our interest in a church to be erected as a memorial to Bishop Brooks, saying that "nothing so taught reverence as to place a church in the midst of the people and impress upon them that the 'Lord is in His Holy Temple.'"

Mrs. Brierly's death was a sad blight for a time upon the work at Cape Mount. The contributions from her



personal friends partially ceased, as they had lost the influence of her magnetism. Dr. Walrath and Miss Woodruff have bravely gone on in Mrs. Brierly's pathway, and now Dr. Walrath has come back to tell us of their progress, and of the grave at Cape Mount with the simple cross upon it formed of little stones, one upon the other, an illustration of Mrs. Brierly's life,—one deed after another teaching the black people she so truly loved the comfort of the Cross.

The cry of the downtrodden ones in Armenia did not appeal to us in vain. Even those who declare their want of interest in foreign Missions realize that these people are Christian brethren and that they must be assisted in bearing their "share of the Cross."

We will now consider the Indian field. Again we have paid the lace teacher's salary in the Red Lake School in Minnesota, (of which we know so much and in which we are so thoroughly interested through Miss Carter's reports.) We assisted Bishop Brooke in his Indian Territory work, that part of the country which for seventy-five years has been neglected by the church and treated unjustly by the Government, and where no Bishop, Priest or Deacon had gone for fifty years.

We did not render Alaska any material assistance during the past year although just as much interested in its welfare, and that of its brave missionaries. The Dioceses on the Pacific Coast have adopted Alaska as a pet mission, making it possible for others to care for other needy and more adjacent fields. Letters from Bishop Rowe tell of his wonderful journey, part of the way on snow-shoes, of his meeting with the Rev. Dr. Prevost, Rev. Mr. Chapman, and Dr. Driggs, of the new mission work among the miners, and Dr. Glenton has arrived in New York to tell the rest of the news, including Miss Chapman's illness, and of the coming of the wee stranger to gladden the heart of Dr. and Mrs. Prevost at Port Adams. We also sent Christmas boxes to the Rev. Mr. Snively at Pine Ridge Agency, which were so generously



filled, that he wrote that every Indian child had a gift, and the men and women were not forgotten. A scholarship was sent to S. Margaret's School, Boise City, in memory of Mary A. Alsop, and the Minnie Moore scholarship was paid as usual to S. Mary, N. D.

Two Indian scholarships of one thousand dollars each, sent to benefit Bishop Talbot's Diocese, from the Missionary Society of S. Ann's Church, were loving endowed memorials of their former Rector, the Rev. Noah Hunt Schenck, and his wife, Anna Pendleton Schenck. The beneficiary of the Noah Hunt Schenck scholarship is a young man named John Jennings, son of a clergyman in Idaho,—being educated with the expectation that he will some day take Orders.

The beneficiary of the Anna Pendleton Schenck scholarship, is a little Indian girl eight years of age, a grand-daughter of the chief of the Shoshones.

This chief has given 10,000 acres of his reservation, to the agency, for the production of all the wheat they need.

This little girl came directly from the camp, wild as a little deer, but now is perfectly tractable and obedient, as are the other twenty children in the school.

In the Freedmen Department there has been a happy progress. S. Augustine's work grows larger and more interesting year by year. The new stone chapel, the new library, the branching out of the neighborhood work, bear testimony to the executive ability and earnestness of the Rev. and Mrs. Hunter, and to the generosity of those who have become interested in the practical work they are doing. We always feel glad to send the sewing teacher's salary, and that Long Island has been able to do so much more this past year. King Hall has appealed to us very strongly and our scholarship there is money well placed, for the education of young colored men to work among their own people.

The Rev. Mr. Russell came to us from Lawrenceville telling of the marvellous work which he is accomplishing and which ought to be encouraged at every step. He



showed the cultivation of a high order of courage and of great missionary zeal.

In Mexico we have continued our scholarship at the Hooker Orphanage in memory of Mrs. Charlotte Annan, who was so interested in that work when she was with us as a delegate, but our contribution to the general Mexican fund was not as much as it should have been, when we take in consideration the great work Mr. Forrester is doing down there and the difficulties he has to cope with.

Last, but by no means least, we have taken care of our Diocesan work. The assertion of Archdeacon Darlington startled every one of us, when he compared the east side of New York and the well organized work there, the east side of London with the leaven of Toynbee Hall and Spurgeon's work in its midst, with the state of things in the east side of Brooklyn, and said that there was more wickedness, and more danger, because their restraining influence. Since then the Archdeacon has succeeded in establishing a clergy house—Alpha House—and the Mission Church of the Holy Cross, both entirely free from debt, with the salaries of the clergy paid for a year.

S. Timothy's Church was encouraged by timely assistance, and the rector expresses the warmest gratitude to the Auxiliary, but sends us this message to think over. "The total amount of the indebtedness of S. Timothy's is \$2,250.00. During the year past the mortgage of \$2,900.00 was reduced to \$2,250.00. At the present time we have on hand the amount of \$70.00 for further reduction. The cancellation of this mortgage would give great joy to all concerned in the welfare of this Mission."

The Church Charity Foundation has added to its Hospital, Home for the Aged, Orphanage, Printing House, and Sisters' House, a Training School for Nurses on the Foundation, and a Home for the Blind at Maspeth.

St. Phebe's Mission is becoming more and more a factor



in the Mission work of the city, and the Sheltering Arms Nursery, S. Giles Home for Crippled Children, and S. Martha's Sanitarium, are doing good work.

We have not forgotten the Domestic Contingent Fund. Miss Emery told us again of the necessity for this money when she paid us her annual visit of encouragement in the spring, and left as a word of remembrance "subscribe for the spirit of Missions."

"The Junior Auxiliary" throughout the Diocese has been doing good work. Many of the parish branches are represented at the regular meetings, and others report their work through the delegates to the Woman's Auxiliary. It is a great comfort to feel that these juniors are in training and will be ready to take our places as we fall out of the ranks, and so let the needed work go intelligently on.

Several changes will be noticed in the report of this year, Mrs. Willard, our former Vice-President, having determined to concentrate all her efforts upon the United Offering, declined re-nomination. Miss Leverich who had served so well and so faithfully the post of Assistant Secretary by appointment during the past year, owing to other plans, declined to be nominated to the newly created office of Corresponding Secretary, and we have to report the loss of our former efficient Chairman of the Diocesan Committee, Mrs. Hotchkiss, through her removal from Brooklyn. She had filled her position wisely and well.

Altogether the outlook is encouraging from all sides; here and there are things disheartening and depressing. Much has been done in the past, much more than is doing now awaits doing in the future. The Spirit of God has indeed been poured out abundantly from on high. We must never forget that all the work has been accomplished, "Not by might, nor power, but by My Spirit saith the Lord of Hosts."

## Church Periodical Club.

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The Church Periodical Club presents its Eighth Annual Report with the following figures. Since last October the Branch of the Diocese of Long Island has distributed, 157 new current Magazines; 1332 Books; 567 Sunday-school Books; 15 Testaments; 9 Bibles; 222 Prayer Books; 404 Hymnals; 46 Sermons; 4 Tracts; 10 Psalters; 1 Map; 152 Pamphlets; 20 Catechisms; 163 Calendars; 33 Games; 2 Scrap Books; 24 Sunday-school Cards; 1,516 Christmas Cards; 314 Christmas Carols; 491 Easter Cards; 195 Easter Carols; 133 pieces of Music; 28,525 cancelled Stamps, and 28,482 odd numbers of Magazines and Periodicals.

A noble record this, of the patience and devotion of the women of this Diocese. "Be not weary in well-doing, for in due season ye shall reap if ye faint not," says our blessed Guide; and surely no work yields a richer harvest of gratitude and appreciation. From North, East, South and West come letters, telling of God's ministers refreshed and encouraged; of sick beds brightened and lonely hours cheered. One clergyman writes from South Dakota, "It would not be too much for me to say, that I could not have had the success here that I have had, without the always kind, true sisterly help from so many members of your excellent Club."

A lady, a missionary in far distant Arizona, writes, "You will never know, in this world, the joy you have brought to the hearts of us, who are at the front of the battle against ignorance and paganism. God bless you all." And then from the lips of our Master come the gracious words of benediction, "Inasmuch as ye have



done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me."

The apparent discrepancy which may seem to exist in the Report is owing to the Church Periodical Club year and the Auxiliary year not coinciding. The first is from January to January; the second from October to June. Thus some of the Parishes which have done excellent work, that of St. Johns', Brooklyn, may be especially mentioned, do not so appear, because prior to January, 1896, they had no Librarian.

The amount of money contributed during the year was \$68.50, but in this generous sum only 24 Parishes were represented, and money is sorely needed. An urgent appeal to Long Island comes from the Central Office, for funds to enable them to secure an assistant. Some idea of the increased labor may be formed by a comparison in just one item. In 1889 the odd numbers sent out were 1,758; in 1895, the number was 131,388. An assistant is a positive necessity.

And now in conclusion. While we may congratulate ourselves on the past, we can do still better in the future. There are 22 Parishes of this Diocese, represented in the Woman's Auxiliary and still without Librarians, and it is sad to think of the precious material that must be going to waste and for which God's children are hungering. Let us remember that the same voice which is so gracious in commendation, may also be heard in the reproach, "Inasmuch as ye did it not unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye did it not unto me."

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS  
OF THE  
LONG ISLAND BRANCH  
OF THE  
Woman's Auxiliary <sup>TO</sup> Board <sup>OF</sup> Missions.

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CONSTITUTION.

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ARTICLE I.

This Association shall be called the LONG ISLAND BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE BOARD OF MISSIONS.

ARTICLE II.

Its object shall be to work in connection with the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, the field being co-extensive with the Church, diocesan and general. The methods by which the ends of this organization can be promoted, are the raising of money for the support of Missionaries and teachers, for the education of those who may be preparing for the work, and for other benevolent purposes connected with Missions; the making, collecting and transfer of clothing and other material aid, and the circulation of papers and leaflets that may serve to stir up a public interest in the Missions of the Church.

ARTICLE III.

The Association shall consist of all delegates representing parishes in the Diocese, said delegates being appointed by the rectors of such parishes, each delegate paying an annual due of one dollar. There shall be at least two, and not more than five delegates, from each parish.



## ARTICLE IV.

The officers of this Association shall be a President, a Vice-President, a Recording Secretary, a Corresponding Secretary and a Treasurer.

There shall be moreover, an Advisory Board, consisting of the above-named officers and five delegates, appointed by the President.

## ARTICLE V.

It shall be the duty of the President to preside at the business meetings of the Association and of the Advisory Board, to call special meetings of the same when occasion shall arise, to countersign all drafts upon the Treasurer, and to obtain fresh information from Missions, to be read at the stated meetings of the Association.

## ARTICLE VI.

It shall be the duty of the Vice-President to preside, in the absence of the President, over the meetings of the Association and of the Advisory Board.

## ARTICLE VII.

It shall be the duty of the Recording Secretary, to keep minutes of the proceedings of the Association and of the Board of Managers, to send out all notices of the stated and special meetings of the same, and to prepare an Annual Report.

## ARTICLE VIII.

It shall be the duty of the Corresponding Secretary to conduct the correspondence of the Association, especially that with the "General Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions," and to keep a fair record of all Missionary Box Reports.

## ARTICLE IX.

It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and keep account of all moneys contributed for the work of the Association, and to pay all drafts upon the funds, when countersigned by the President, and to present an Annual Report.

## ARTICLE X.

Any parish in the Diocese too remote for representation, shall, on the annual payment of not less than two dollars, be entitled to report its work to this Association.

## ARTICLE XI.

The Constitution shall not be altered, except at an Annual Meeting of the Association—notice of the proposed change having been given at a stated meeting of the Association.



## BY-LAWS.

## I.

There shall be an annual meeting of the Association on the second Thursday of May, in each year, at such hour and place as the Advisory Board shall direct.

## II.

The election of Officers shall take place at such meetings, and they shall continue in office for one year, or until their successors shall have been appointed.

The election of Officers shall be by ballot; nominations to be made in writing and delivered to the Recording Secretary by the delegates at the annual meeting. Only those persons so nominated shall be eligible for election; the two receiving the largest number of ballots to be the candidates.

## III.

In case of the vacancy of any office, by the death or removal of its occupant, the same may be filled at a stated meeting of the Advisory Board, and any one so appointed shall continue in office until the next annual meeting of the Association.

## IV.

All persons contributing to the treasury, annually, at least the sum of one dollar, shall be members of the Association, but not entitled to a vote.

## V.

The stated meetings of the Association shall be held on the second Thursday of each month, except that the November meeting shall take place on the first Thursday of the month, the second Thursday being the Anniversary. Place of meeting to be determined by Association.

There shall be no stated meetings in June, July, August, or September.

## VI.

In all matters of importance, a resolution shall be brought before the Association to be deferred to the next meeting for decision, unless passed by a unanimous vote.



## VII.

At a meeting of the Association any number of delegates present shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business; and at the annual meeting of the Association, a number of delegates equal to one-half of the number of parishes represented therein, shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

## VIII.

At the monthly meetings of the Association the order of business shall be: 1. Devotional services. 2. Calling of the roll. 3. Minutes of the last meeting. 4. Treasurer's report. 5. Intermission. 6. Reports of Parishes and Committees. 7. Unfinished business. 8. Miscellaneous business.
