Twenty-sixth Annual Report.

To the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Long Island:

In preparing my report for 1897-98, I shall keep within the lines of the work accomplished by this Diocesan Branch during that time, leaving words of encouragement and suggestion to be drawn from the workers in the field to be with us at our anniversary, from the rich storehouse which has been filled to the pressed down and overflowing this Autumn from the report of the Honorary Secretary which will be sent into each parish of the Diocese and from the grand reports from the Missionary workers assembled in Washington.

The gleam from the brightness of our Silver Jubilee has seemed to have been reflected all through the year, making it a full and joyful one. Besides the special gifts we were able to devote \$476 as our offering last November to the building of a mission church for the Southern Archdeaconry, and to contribute the sum of \$2,600 to the Triennial United Offering at Trinity Church, Washington, where the Woman's Auxiliary made a holy offering, rich and rare, of over \$80,000 to be used for the needs of women workers in the field. God fits the body for the burden and it is our blessed privilege to assist in making the burden lighter. We have been encouraged each month by visits and words of counsel, and reports direct from the field. First came the Rev. Mr. Russell, from St. Paul's Church, Lawrenceville, where the Long Island Industrial Building has been erected by the generosity of a member of this Branch. Mrs. Hunter, came to tell us of the successes and needs for St. Augustines School, where the Benson Library and St. Agatha's Hospital are proving such benefits to both school and neighborhood work. Mr. Tunnell impressed upon us

the full value of the work at King Hall, where young colored men are being fitted for work among their own people, and certainly what he said ought to make us feel that \$150 expended in one scholarship is multiplied many times in its far reaching results in the future. The Rev. Mr. Pruden came with his account of the church school at Chatham, as well as his work among the poor whites of that part of Virginia.

Miss Carter, with her beautiful belief in the present earnestness and future uplifting of the Indian woman, added to the facts with which we are already conversant such strong words that we rejoice that we have had a part in her work through the \$360 salary for the lace teacher at Red Lake.

In February we had Bishop Hare with us. He had made his first address as Missionary Bishop before the Long Island Branch twenty-five years ago. Our hearts were glad as we arose to greet him as our friend, after those years of glorious work. At the Triennial Convention on October 11th, Bishop Whipple said of him, "that he had never been a sentimental apologist for Indian crimes but always a firm upholder of Indian rights, so earning the love and respect of the warlike Sioux that 6,000 souls testify to his spiritual guidance."

We all felt that this large hearted man was doing Christ's work for Christ's sake when, after being presented with the silver loving cup, he said, "I can only account for this conferred honor by sinking my identity and feeling that I am the representative of such men as Williams, Morris, Fergeson, Holly, and the men and women fellow helpers who have labored with me. While the Dome of the Capitol is the most prominent, the sub-structure is of the most importance. These people were with me in my trials and made me believe in myself. I would like to tell you before leaving the Indian work, a story told by Bishop Whipple. General Custer asked for thirty Christian scouts to accompany

him, he wrote 'I cannot permit these Indians to return without bearing testimony to their character, and not only have they good character but are good soldiers. I heard the 'Rock of Ages' ring out one morning, and inquired whence it came, as my cavalry were not given to singing hymns. These red men were the only ones keeping the Lord's Day holy.'" No mission work has borne such blessed fruit as the Indian.

It was our privilege to give assistance to the unfortunate people who suffered by the Quarantine regulations in Louisiana. The distress was very great—no work and no provisions, because of no communication with the outside world.

From Alaska the "Macedonian Cry" came strong and loud, on account of the sudden influx of population by the gold seekers. We rejoice that our much loved former Associate, Miss Cornelia King's name is blessed through a scholarship given by her neice. Bishop Rowe will tell his own story and bring us direct news from our brave friends, Mr. and Mrs. Prevost and Mrs. Demonet, Mr. and Mrs. Chapman and Mr. Driggs, and all the others.

Bishop Graves and Bishop McKim desire more women workers. Miss Dodson's Training School is still accomplishing grand results in its training of native women for mission work. The foreign Committee would have rejoiced at having established the Mary Emma Peck Scholarship in that school last year, and having the Long Island Scholarship in St. John's College, if they could have heard these Bishops speak so highly of the training of these women and children and the assistance already clearly proven. They emphasized this: "Train the women and educate the children and you gain the battle."

We have not forgotten Bishop Barker and the Fanny C. Paddock Hospital. In the minds of all the Bishops, educational, industrial institutions and hospitals have equal rights, and we hold up their hands by working in these channels.

The scheme of having the Christmas presents for the Indians sent to St. Ann's Church last Fall and packed proved a wise one and worthy of repetition. Letters came saying that the boxes arrived in time and were so generously filled that every one had a gift.

To Mexico we have sent our usual Charlotte Annan Scholarship at the Hooker Orphanage. The Rev. Mr. Forrester says: "I am proud of the church in Mexico. When I think of that band of devoted men and women lifting up the standard of Christianity in that Country, they are setting us an example we shall do well to emulate. We want your sympathy and interest in these people who are struggling for the light."

Our hearts were saddened this past year by the death of Mrs. Peck, of St. Matthew's parish. She had been so identified with the L. I. Branch for all its years, and in all its work that the consciousness of her having passed to the Eternal Father gave us a deep sense of our loss.

During the past year we have been called upon to sorrow with our Bishop in the death of Mrs. Littlejohn, who was for many years an officer of the Auxiliary, but of late an honorary not an active member.

For the twenty-six years of its existence the L. I. Branch has only had two treasurers, (faithful officers indeed.) The first one, Mrs. Edward De Selding, who died September 10th, 1883, was succeeded by Mrs. James W. Cromwell. It is hardly necessary to say a word in praise of Mrs. Cromwell, as her true worth has so impressed itself upon the parishes year after year. Removal to another Diocese made her resignation imperative, and confirmed a decision from which there was no appeal. We are fortunate in being able to turn with perfect confidence to Miss Mary Hunter, of St. James' Church, as Treasurer. She has been a member of the Auxiliary for over twelve years, and has already proven herself thoroughly efficient for the responsible post.

Our Diocesan work has progressed, and our church institutions have been aided by the parishes. The Church Charity Foundation has, through St. John's Hospital, been doing noble work for the sick soldiers, and the Board of Associates hope that the parishes throughout the Diocese will send of their store and come to the Foundation to gladden the hearts of the beneficiaries in Aged Home, Orphanage, Hospital, Printing House, Home for the Blind, and Sisters' House. We have assisted the Rev. Mr. Ackley at St. Andrew's in having the services of a parish visitor. St. Matthias' has bravely tried to do without our aid, but St. Timothy's has still needed us, and will again.

Church Periodical Club.

The Tenth Annual Report of the Church Periodical Club of the Diocese of Long Island presents the following record. During the past year it has distributed 1600 current Magazines; 1365 Books; 67 Games; 75 Booklets; 6 Sermons; 31 Testaments; 43 Bibles; 254 Hymnals; 302 Prayer Books; 161 Sunday-school Books; 1000 Sunday-school Papers; 89 Catechisms; 253 Tracts; 1708 Christmas Cards; 89 Christmas Carols; 1074 Easter Cards; 481 Easter Carols; 1116 Sunday-school Cards; 2099 Pictures, 676 Calendars; 217 Sunday-school Service Books; 489 Music, and 32,358 odd numbers of Magazines and Periodicals.

Again the statement must be made, that this is an inadequate record, as out of 53 blanks sent to Librarians, only 19 have been returned filled out; consequently many Parishes which have done excellent work are unrepresented.

“Gather up the fragments, that nothing be lost.” For ten years the Church Periodical Club has been labouring to obey this behest of the Master, and truly it is work that requires the spirit of our dear Lord. Its recipients are the Lord’s “Little Ones.” Its material, fragments. There is no glory or eclat in the doing, but patience, self-denial, love and sympathy are its necessary adjuncts. It is the “cup of cold water” given in His name; the appreciation and gratitude are out of all proportion to the labor bestowed. No more touching example can be given of the gratitude aroused, than the gift of \$22.50, sent by the convicts in the penitentiary at Moundsville, Va. Their Chaplain says, “this money was earned, a cent a day in overtime. Two men, dying in the hospital, gave their all, one fifty cents, one five cents.” The letter accompanying the gift was signed, “570 convicts.”

One of the most glowing letters of thanks is from a little mission station, where the papers are devoured by 25 families in turn, before they are deposited in the reading room of a neighboring station. The Superintendent of a colored Sunday-

school writes, that the children had a most happy Christmas. A suitable tree was cut from the woods and hung with Christmas cards sent by the Church Periodical Club, and each child received one. From Tacoma, a "Field Matron" writes, "The illustrated papers do double service. After being read and passed on, they serve to decorate poor barren homes, to the sick and "Shut Ins" they have brought hours and hours of comfort and forgetfulness of pain."

She says, "with a husband in bad health and seven children to support, you can readily understand that we have difficulty to get the necessities of life. I have taught in the Public School for the past twelve years, and it is not only for my own children that I plead, but for my pupils, many of whom have never read anything more interesting than a school reader and have never owned a doll."

Books for children and books for clergymen are two pressing necessities, to the calls for which there is no limit. Bishop Potter, in an address last winter, said he had been deeply pained at seeing the paucity of missionary clergymen's libraries. Many had not been able to add one volume since their University days; and he strongly advised that at least one modern theological work be included in every missionary box. Are there not Sunday-schools with discarded library books, that would open a fairy-land to desolate children's lives; and are there not clergymen with books which have long outgrown their usefulness to the owners, but which would be the fountain of water in a thirsty land, to their less fortunate brethren.

Scarcely less appreciated than the gift, is the sympathy which prompts it. To know that "somebody cares," will make the homesick, starved and tired heart sing for joy, the Master's work will receive fresh impetus, and through the benediction of his Grace, "a little one shall become a thousand."

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

OF THE

LONG ISLAND BRANCH

OF THE

Woman's Auxiliary ^{to} _{THE} Board ^{of} Missions.

CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE I.

This Association shall be called the LONG ISLAND BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE BOARD OF MISSIONS.

ARTICLE II.

Its object shall be to work in connection with the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, the field being co-extensive with the Church, diocesan and general. The methods by which the ends of this organization can be promoted, are the raising of money for the support of Missionaries and teachers, for the education of those who may be preparing for the work, and for other benevolent purposes connected with Missions; the making, collecting and transfer of clothing and other material aid, and the circulation of papers and leaflets that may serve to stir up a public interest in the Missions of the Church.

ARTICLE III.

The Association shall consist of all delegates representing parishes in the Diocese, said delegates being appointed by the rectors of such parishes, each delegate paying an annual due of one dollar. There shall be at least two, and not more than five delegates, from each parish.

ARTICLE IV.

The officers of the Association shall be a President, a Vice-President, a Recording Secretary, a Corresponding Secretary and a Treasurer.

There shall be moreover, an Advisory Board, consisting of the above-named officers and five delegates, appointed by the President.

ARTICLE V.

It shall be the duty of the President to preside at the business meetings of the Association and of the Advisory Board, to call special meetings of the same when occasion shall arise, to countersign all drafts upon the Treasurer, and to obtain fresh information from Missions, to be read at the stated meetings of the Association.

ARTICLE VI.

It shall be the duty of the Vice-President to preside, in the absence of the President, over the meetings of the Association and of the Advisory Board.

ARTICLE VII.

It shall be the duty of the Recording Secretary, to keep minutes of the proceedings of the Association and of the Board of Managers, to send out all notices of the stated and special meetings of the same, and to prepare an Annual Report.

ARTICLE VIII.

It shall be the duty of the Corresponding Secretary, to conduct the correspondence of the Association, especially that with the "General Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions," and to keep a fair record of all Missionary Box Reports.

ARTICLE IX.

It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and keep account of all moneys contributed for the work of the Association, and to pay all drafts upon the funds, when countersigned by the President, and to present an Annual Report.

ARTICLE X.

Any parish in the Diocese too remote for representation, shall, on the annual payment of not less than two dollars, be entitled to report its work to this Association.

ARTICLE XI.

The Constitution shall not be altered, except at an Annual Meeting of the Association—notice of the proposed change having been given at a stated meeting of the Association.

BY-LAWS.

I.

There shall be an annual meeting of the Association on the second Thursday of May, in each year, at such hour and place as the Advisory Board shall direct.

II.

The election of Officers shall take place at such meetings, and they shall continue in office for one year, or until their successors shall have been appointed.

The election of Officers shall be by ballot; nominations to be made in writing and delivered to the Recording Secretary by the delegates at the annual meeting. Only those persons so nominated shall be eligible for election; the two receiving the largest number of ballots to be the candidates.

III.

In case of the vacancy of any office, by the death or removal of its occupant, the same may be filled at a stated meeting of the Advisory Board, and any one so appointed shall continue in office until the next annual meeting of the Association.

IV.

All persons contributing to the treasury, annually, at least the sum of one dollar, shall be members of the Association, but not entitled to a vote.

V.

The stated meetings of the Association shall be held on the second Thursday of each month, except that the November meeting shall take place on the first Thursday of the month, the second Thursday being the Anniversary. Place of meeting to be determined by Association.

There shall be no stated meetings in June, July, August, or September.

VI.

In all matters of importance, a resolution shall be brought before the Association to be deferred to the next meeting for decision, unless passed by a unanimous vote.

VII.

At a meeting of the Association any number of delegates present shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business; and at the annual meeting of the Association, a number of delegates equal to one-half of the number of parishes represented therein, shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

VIII.

At the monthly meetings of the Association the order of business shall be: 1. Devotional services. 2. Calling of the roll. 3. Minutes of the last meeting. 4. Treasurer's report. 5. Intermission. 6. Reports of Parishes and Committees. 7. Unfinished business. 8. Miscellaneous business.
