Twenty-Eighth Annual Report.

To the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Long Island.

We pause a moment at the close of the Nineteenth Century to return thanks for the onward march of the Church, and her God given strength to fulfil what Milton calls "her great prerogative of teaching nations how to live," and we recall with grateful hearts that a large part of this has been accomplished by mission work and the sincerity and fervour of the missionaries. But the end is not with the century; the motto on every Christian banner is "forward." There is no resting in the present, no satisfaction in the past; we must "stand to our colors," and after all, the discords of this world's wild music will be attuned at last. There are still many who cast discredit upon missionary work, who always remember the failures and forget the successes, never asking themselves if God had ever found them failures and never recalling the fully proven fact that Christianity must come in to balance and modify political economy, and that we ought to measure acts and events, not by their outward magnitude but according to their spiritual proportions and results. God puts the ore into the ground silently, and man extracts it with great noise, manufactures machinery with great noise, which in its turn accomplishes results with great noise, and we are so accustomed to this method that we question success if silence ensues after action, forgetting the loving example of the great silences in Christ's life and death, which affected greater things than thundering Philippics could have done.

Those in the field realize and voice that the slow growth of missions among the heathen is due to the slow growth of missionary spirit among the Christians. The difference between parish work and missionary work is that in the latter we must create the feeling which is to be the motive. We must read missionary papers, listen to missionary addresses, in a word *study* missions, in this way receiving and imbibing so that we can create, and not make the mistake of thinking we can give out before we have taken in.

The heathen is God's child if he only knew it, and to make this felt Christians must speak with a loving heart for the people in darkness, not as officials established to lecture them into proprieties, but as one of the same flesh and blood vindicating a common humanity.

The trouble in China has almost made our hearts stand still with fear, but God's sun is shining still; and the "open door" will mean in the future something far greater than opportunities for trade. The Chinese will surely exchange measurable maxims for immeasurable principles, and the seed sown midst tribulation will bear glorious fruit some day. Those who know declare that the present terror is not to be compared with the constant suffering of teachers and converts all down the century. Bishop Graves' hand at the helm has been steady and wise, and the stories of the fidelity of the Christian Chinese are marvellous, many suffering martyrdom of the cruelest character rather than deny the faith. Not a step backward has been made which could be avoided. Schools and colleges have been closed with dignity for a "vacation," concentration of Christians in crowds has been avoided as affording a mark for the enemy, and the clergy and teachers have been withdrawn from their posts when discretion showed that their presence incited hatred and harm to their followers. But the members of the missionary forces are

watching events, "ready to take advantage of anything for their people, not knowing the word fear." Let us be ready with our gifts when the signal comes to them to return to their posts as the needs will be greater than ever before.

From Japan comes word of the high standing and progress of Christianity and the recognition of this by the people. Everywhere unusual opportunities are offered for work, and it rests with us to enable our missionaries to take advantage of each point granted by the building of a church, establishment of schools and hospitals or the sending out of Bible readers.

Bishop Ferguson continues to send good news from Africa regarding the consecration of churches, erection of school houses and other mission buildings, and the appointment of native teachers who have been educated in the school at Cape Palmas and are now passing on the benefit to others. Here and there a dark line shows where such a faithful soldier of Christ as the Rev. Mr. Gabler having fulfilled his mission on earth has left his people with sorrow in their hearts, or some misfortune at a mission station, but good work is going surely on and the thousands of little children being educated in the mission schools will be ten thousand of educated Christians before long.

From Mexico they are asking for more assistance. No one who saw at the Missionary Exhibit during the time of the Ecumenical Council last spring the evidences of the conditions existing there, can help desiring to aid this neglected people. The two bright Mexican girls being trained in Philadelphia show the material which can be saved from destruction.

We pay for our Charlotte Annan scholarship at the Hooker Orphanage, but can we not do more for the general work?

Those who have read Miss Emery's account in the spirit of missions of her visit among the Minnesota Indians will feel encouraged about the work among the red people and sympathize with the workers. The fact of a gold medal having been granted to the Indian women by the Paris Exposition for their lace work has gratified them, as much as it has astonished those who saw for the first time an evidence of their capability for fine work and artistic development in the beautiful laces exhibited, while stories of a desire for good citizenship and agricultural training are coming in from Indian men. Training schools will accomplish wonders among this people, showing them how to use their restless strength and marvellous power of concentration to good advantage—*that* will be civilization. The Oneidas have proven this theory to be practicable.

The work among the "poor whites" of the south is wonderfully responsive and satisfactory. They were left out of the march of progress seemingly, but now that it has turned their way they show a desire for knowledge and a thoughtful earnestness that will make them a power for good if they are taught properly.

The work among the negroes speaks for itself. Perhaps no one understands this race better than Booker T. Washington, when he says their hope for the future lies in teaching them to be industrious, self supporting, self respecting citizens of this great commonwealth, and we are certainly doing this at St. Augustine's, Raleigh, Lawrenceville, Bedford City, Va. and King Hall, Washington.

Our hearts are heavy for Texas in her great Galveston sorrow, and in answering the appeal to the Church at large for assistance in restoring their places of worship and reestablishing their work, we will gladly accept the suggestion, "Let the Church's response be as full and speedy as the nation's."

From Alaska one hears of the hard work being done by the few workers and the need for more clergymen, more teachers, schools and hospitals. Bishop Rowe is overworked, with no time to rest.

Mission stations are being established in our new possessions and in Cuba. Everywhere is the cry "Go, let go, and help go," and if, as some one said at the last Convention, every man has either a *missionary* or an *omissionary* spirit let us take care that we are not on the wrong side.

From the Domestic field comes the echoes from the feet of advancing civilization, and we appreciate the necessities of the missionary jurisdiction for successful coping with the dangers of unpreparedness. Ungodliness if anticipated and met half way is more than half crushed. Churches, schools and hospitals—let us help them now, and these very people will soon be helping others in the evangelization of the world. The Bishops and Clergy who bring to our attention the stories of the needs point out this strong incentive for a great effort now. The past year has been very full of progress and of trials, of joyful tidings and of sad remembrances, of the death of that grand old leader, Bishop Gilbert, and of the appointment of several new Bishops, and the noon hour for prayer and the Quiet Days have been like the oases in the desert.

Our Diocesan work is pressing. We hear the appeals for money, while the pleas for personal needs and parish obligations come thick and part in response, reminding us of the excuses of those bidden to the feast. The Church Charity Foundation, the Sheltering Arms, the St. Giles Home for Cripple Children and the Home for the Blind are called upon to care for the aged, the orphans, the babies, and the sightless of the whole Diocese, and one wonders if the people of the Church realize, the sick who cannot be welcomed to the empty beds be-

cause of the "retrenchment" injunction, the little children returned to miserable surroundings after having been promised the care and protection of the Church through its authorized institutions, the overworking of the faithful few, who never rest and never murmur when their labors are increased for economy's sake. Does it not seem like withholding "the cup of cold water" and refusing the blessing? The Church of the Nativity, Vanderveer Park, has been a most satisfactory child, responding to every kind word and showing gratitude and growth for every assistance. St. Timothy's is still the brave, courageous parish it has always been, and its good work among the colored people was shown by the rapid outgrowth and dedication of St. Philip's Mission this spring. The work of St. Phebe's needs no commendation. The contributions have become a part of the year's work of each parish, its needs being so well emphasized by its tactful management.

The United Offering must receive our earnest attention this coming year. Long Island has done so well in her past, the annual offerings that she will probably keep to her laurels in the great opportunity offered this time to help every department of mission work, and if the parishes take up the matter systematically it will not interfere with other lines.

Our ranks have been thinned by the deaths of Miss Kearney, of the Church of the Holy Comforter, Mrs. Swentzel, of St. Luke's, and Miss Wager, of the Church of the Incarnation. There are two others who have met with us month after month and year after year—Mrs. Sayers, of Far Rockaway, Mrs. Wm. Nicoll, of Islip—one has removed from the Diocese, and one has entrusted the work she loves so well to other hands.

Let us be courageous and hopeful, and faith and prayer will prevail if we do our duty in that state of life which it has pleased God to place us. Browning in a lately published poem says:

Unanswered yet? the prayer your lips have pleaded
 In agony of heart these many years?
 Does faith begin to fail? is hope departing,
 And think you all in vain those falling tears?
 Say not the Father hath not heard your prayer:
 You shall have your desire sometime, somewhere.

Unanswered yet? nay, do not say ungranted.
 Perhaps your part is not yet wholly done;
 The work began when first your prayer was uttered,
 And God will finish what he has begun.
 If you will keep the incense burning there,
 His glory you will see, sometime, somewhere.

Unanswered yet? faith cannot be unanswered,
 Her feet were firmly planted on the rock;
 Amid the wildest storm she stands undaunted,
 Nor quails before the loudest thundershock.
 She knows Omnipotence has heard her prayer,
 And cries, "It shall be done sometime, somewhere!"

Report of the Church Periodical Club.

The twelfth year of the work of the Church Periodical Club closes with the following record: 1,700 new current Magazines, 2,279 Books, 277 Prayer Books, 186 Hymnals, 22 Bibles, 41 Testaments, 3,200 Sunday School Papers, 3,324 Christmas and Easter Cards, 2,847 Christmas and Easter Carols, 960 Sunday School Lesson Cards, 531 Pictures, 77 Catechisms, 1,539 Calendars, 724 Music and 47,655 odd numbers of Magazines and Periodicals.

A noble record this, representing generosity, patience and faithfulness; and in the light of the admonition, "Unto whomsoever much is given, of them shall be much required," we may rejoice that our hearts have been moved to give of our abundance. But while we have almost doubled the work of previous years, we have not begun to satisfy the demand. There is not a spare book, magazine or pamphlet in our homes for which there is not some hungry soul famishing, and what to us are merely household encumbrances would be a well spring of joy in the lonely hamlet and distant mountain ranch. One proof of how they are appreciated are the stamps occasionally sent to insure a few more numbers.

But while Hospitals, Prisons, Mining Camps, Free Reading Rooms, the lonely sailor and countless grateful individuals are ministered to, it is the missionary clergy for which we make our strongest appeal. For them the Club was first created and they are our first care. One of them writes: "I never could have realized the actual mental starvation there is for a village clergyman on a small pittance; I never even see a magazine. I only

wish you had a Review of Reviews, or some such periodical, wherein the best thoughts of the day appear." Needless to say he has been supplied, but hundreds of just such appeals are received constantly.

The amount of money contributed this year is \$83.23, but in this sum only twenty-four Parishes are represented, and money is sorely needed. At the Central Office, boxes stand packed ready for shipping, but no money to pay the expressage; can we not do better this coming year?

Five new Parishes have been added to our working list during the past twelve months, but twenty-five are still without Librarians; and consequently masses of precious material are being wasted. No Parish is too small to assist in this beautiful work; for its scope is so wide, that there is not one household in this Diocese from which acceptable offerings could not be made, and to every one of these the dear Master is saying, "Gather up the fragments, that nothing be lost."

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS
OF THE
LONG ISLAND BRANCH
OF THE
Woman's Auxiliary ^{TO} _{THE} Board ^{OF} Missions.

CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE I.

This Association shall be called the LONG ISLAND BRANCH OF THE
WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE BOARD OF MISSIONS.

ARTICLE II.

Its object shall be to work in connection with the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, the field being co-extensive with the Church, diocesan and general. The methods by which the ends of this organization can be promoted, are the raising of money for the support of Missionaries and teachers, for the education of those who may be preparing for the work, and for other benevolent purposes connected with Missions; the making, collecting and transfer of clothing and other material aid, and the circulation of papers and leaflets that may serve to stir up a public interest in the Missions of the Church.

ARTICLE III.

The Association shall consist of all delegates representing parishes in the Diocese, said delegates being appointed by the rector of such parishes, each delegate paying an annual due of one dollar. There shall be at least two, and not more than five delegates, from each parish.

ARTICLE IV.

The officers of the Association shall be a President, a Vice-President, a Recording Secretary, a Corresponding Secretary and a Treasurer.

There shall be moreover, an Advisory Board, consisting of the above-named officers and five delegates, appointed by the President.

ARTICLE V.

It shall be the duty of the President to preside at the business meetings of the Association and of the Advisory Board, to call special meetings of the same when occasion shall arise, to countersign all drafts upon the Treasurer, and to obtain fresh information from Missions, to be read at the stated meetings of the Association.

ARTICLE VI.

It shall be the duty of the Vice-President to preside, in the absence of the President, over the meetings of the Association and of the Advisory Board.

ARTICLE VII.

It shall be the duty of the Recording Secretary to keep minutes of the proceedings of the Association and of the Board of Managers, to send out all notices of the stated and special meetings of the same, and to prepare an Annual Report.

ARTICLE VIII.

It shall be the duty of the Corresponding Secretary to conduct the correspondence of the Association, especially that with the "General Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions," and to keep a fair record of all Missionary Box Reports.

ARTICLE IX.

It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and keep account of all moneys contributed for the work of the Association, and to pay all drafts upon the funds, when countersigned by the President, and to present an Annual Report.

ARTICLE X.

Any parish in the Diocese too remote for representation shall, on the annual payment of not less than two dollars, be entitled to report its work to this Association.

ARTICLE XI.

The Constitution shall not be altered, except at an Annual Meeting of the Association—notice of the proposed change having been giving at a stated meeting of the Association.

BY-LAWS.

I.

There shall be an annual meeting of the Association on the second Thursday of May, in each year, at such hour and place as the Advisory Board shall direct.

II.

The election of Officers shall take place at such meetings, and they shall continue in office for one year, or until their successors shall have been appointed.

The election of Officers shall be by ballot; nominations to be made in writing and delivered to the Recording Secretary by the delegates at the annual meeting. Only those persons so nominated shall be eligible for election; the two receiving the largest number of ballots to be the candidates.

III.

In case of the vacancy of any office, by the death or removal of its occupant, the same may be filled at a stated meeting of the Advisory Board, and any one so appointed shall continue in office until the next annual meeting of the Association.

IV.

All persons contributing to the treasury, annually, at least the sum of one dollar, shall be members of the Association, but not entitled to a vote.

V.

The stated meetings of the Association shall be held on the second Thursday of each month, except that the November meeting shall take place on the first Thursday of the month, the second Thursday being the Anniversary. Place of meeting to be determined by Association.

There shall be no stated meetings in June, July, August, or September.

VI.

In all matters of importance, a resolution shall be brought before the Association to be deferred to the next meeting for decision, unless passed by a unanimous vote.

VII.

At a meeting of the Association any number of delegates present shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business; and at the annual meeting of the Association, a number of delegates equal to one-half of the number of parishes represented therein, shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

VIII.

At the monthly meetings of the Association the order of business shall be: 1. Devotional services. 2. Minutes of the last meeting. 3. Treasurer's report. 4. Intermission. 5. Calling of the roll. 6. Reports of Parishes and Committees. 7. Unfinished business. 8. Miscellaneous business.
