The Twenty-Eighth Anniversary

Was held in St. Ann's Church, Brooklyn, Thursday, November 8th, 1900, the very REV. DEAN COX, presiding.

LLOYD, D. D., General Secretary of the Board of Missions, and the REV. T. G. JACKSON, of Flatbush, Brooklyn, on Diocesan Missions.

The Twenty-Ninth Annual Report.

To the Woman's Auxiliary to the Diocese of Long Island:

We made strong resolutions at the beginning of this year, and we have taken our first step in the new century, as we make note of it; glancing back along the pathway we have come, we can see where we have gained—where we have failed.

On our lips daily, yes, in the morning, at noon-day, and before we laid ourselves down to rest at night, have been the words: *Thy Kingdom come, Thy will be done*; but have we prayed from the very heart, feeling it with strong resolve to do our part, as church women, as inheritors of the Kingdom of Heaven, as delegates, or have we only petitioned for *ourselves our souls, our bodies*, forgetting that we are dedicated to Christ at our baptism and that it is an accepted truth that we grow as we give, and we are of importance only as we are of consequence to others. Has our treasury been fuller? Is our box report stronger? Did we contribute *more* to the united offering than three years ago? Have we placed ourselves more closely in touch with the weaker parishes and missions in our own diocese and wherever the Church has been planted? Have we looked to the defences of the Church which afford protection to the weak, the aged, the sick, and the little ones in His name, or have we “offended these” and only looked to the forwarding of our own affairs? Only the higher notes of the answer may be heard, the lower tones are in our own hearts.

It is with sadness that we take up our work this autumn. Our bishop has gone from us and we are as “sheep without a shepherd.” Bishop Littlejohn was a leader among men, and thoroughly identified with the work of the Church. His counsels were wise, his foresight marvelous, his intellectuality superior, and yet in his kindly courteous consideration, little things were not trifles. He lived to see many of his well-

laid plans bear glorious fruit. The Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions was his thought expressed at the Triennial Convention in Baltimore more than a quarter of a century ago, and he established the first branch in his own diocese.

Some of our delegates have ceased from their labors: Mrs. Gracie, Mrs. Dixon and Mrs. Upjohn. *All* had rendered valuable service.

The whole world has been waiting with bated breath for news from China. And now the workers are taking up the "burden of life again," feeling that they will have more assistance in the bearing of it. Not that it "might have been," but "it shall be," is their cry. Surely the blood of the martyrs is the seed of the Church.

In China, in Africa, at Cape Palmas and Cape Mount, and in Japan they are depending upon us and we must not fail them. They are too far away to refute unkind accusations or reply to the uninformed ones who say they do not believe in Foreign Missions. We must do that for them and see that they are supported.

The Indian Bishops emphasize the necessity for establishing schools *in the midst* of the red people, thus taking civilization in its best form to them backed by chapels and hospitals. The Indian Church woman will practice the greatest self-denial in order to establish a little chapel, and yet not forget the church's teaching to do for others, as over \$10,000.00 was given by Indian women for missions last year, learning the lesson that to help others is civilizing.

The withdrawal of Government appropriations for rations and loss of scholarships through the death of patrons have caused great distress in the Indian field. The latter circumstance is a warning to us to keep younger blood constantly coming into the auxiliary work. These people are learning to help themselves, as is evidenced by their chapel building, their school attendance, confirmation classes, lace work, etc. When Bishop Hare was here last winter he said, "We are not considerate enough of people who do not think as we do. We are too proud of our

civilization, too over-bearing and disdainful, forgetting that gentlemen of whatever color, to have intercourse, must meet on a common platform." With the news of Bishop Whipple's death there came to our minds the wonderful record of that grand man. By their fruits shall ye know them.

The needs of the Freedmen or Colored work, as it is now called, grows in intensity, and only earnest effort can prevent the calamity, which thoughtful people who understand the question declare is approaching, if not anticipated.

By teaching women to be dressmakers, nurses, teachers and good housekeepers; teaching men to be clergymen, bricklayers, shoemakers, carpenters and printers; by the encouragement of our schools and hospitals already established, such as St. Augustine's, St. Paul's and Bedford City and Brunswick, and by the founding of more trade schools and hospitals; by the support of King Hall and building chapel, we can turn this mighty on-coming stream into a power for good.

Wherever the Church's influence is felt, there is a higher standard of morality among the negroes. More shame at wrong doing, more self-respect. Mrs. Hunter told of instances during the distress caused by a blizzard, where many refused assistance, where they could manage without it, in order to leave more for others less fortunate. Miss Buford's death in the midst of her self-sacrificing work was pathetic. She will never be forgotten.

The report of the visit of Bishop Doane to Mexico emphasizes what we have already appreciated, the excellent growth of the general work being done under the direction of the Rev. Mr. Forrester, as well as in the Hooker Orphanage, and the vital necessity for the same. The work in Mexico has certainly received an impetus.

As the tide of humanity rapidly reaches our outer borders, we must not close our ears to the appeals from the Domestic Field, from the north, east, south and west; yes, even to the uttermost parts. The Philippines, the Sandwich Islands,

Samoa, Cuba, Porto Rico, it is all the *Domestic* work of the Church, and the Church must occupy the ground, "while there is yet time" with schools, hospitals, churches and orphanages.

In our Diocesan work we have a tremendous problem to solve. The firm establishment of new missions in growing districts, the strengthening of those existing, so that their influence may be better felt. The uplifting of the thousands of foreigners who have to remain with us, the education of the young of all classes in the Church's doctrine, the freeing of all charitable institutions belonging to the Church of debt burdens which cripple their usefulness, and render impossible the very purpose for which they were created, and the inculcation of a missionary spirit by studying missions and reading the *Spirit of Missions*. One churchman gave his rector during the past year a sum of money to divide among missions or weak parishes. Wherever the tonic effect of that money was felt, they thanked God for the heart which prompted the gift.

The Church of the Nativity, Vanderveer Park, which is almost a child of the Woman's Auxiliary, having received our Silver Anniversary offering and another gift of \$500.00 from us, has laid its corner-stone. The parish is growing so well that the little Church promises to be well filled when finished.

The loss of the Rev. Mr. Snowden at St. Jude's, Blythebourne, will be certainly felt. Archdeacon Kinsolving paid a tribute to his memory, when he said that he had been one of the best missionaries in the Diocese.

The joyful news that the united offering at San Francisco exceeding \$104,000.00 was received with thankfulness. Services were held at the Cathedral and many churches throughout the Diocese, while an opportunity was given to all in Long Island by a united service at St. Luke's Church on October 3rd, at 10.30.

And before the flush of victory had passed away comes the sad intelligence of the death of the honored and Honorary Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary, Mary E. Twing. She lived to see the Auxiliary grow in thirty years beyond her expectations, and was its firm friend and advisor to the last. "Standing in the

presence of the King." "Her self-consecration has been accepted" and her influence will be felt for the years to come.

May the lessons of this year be of service in the future, either to encourage or warn us. Let us put away those childish expressions: I don't believe, I don't like, I don't care. Let our Creed be "I do believe"; our Charity, "I do like"; our humanity, "I do care," and never cease our endeavors for a day.

The great sorrow which fell upon the nation this year came at the close of the summer season, when the *prosperity* of the country had been reckoned by the accumulation of money, territory and power, (not because His will had been done, not because His kingdom had come) when many churches had been closed for weeks, and the thoughts of all had seemed turned towards pleasure and self. Perhaps this came to us: "Lest we forget."

Report of the Church Periodical Club.

The thirteenth year of the Church Periodical Club has exceeded all previous years in every particular except the financial branch. Its record is 1800 Current Magazines, 3,303 Books, 180 Prayer Books, 112 Hymnals, 46 Bibles, 40 Testaments, 4,212 Christmas and Easter Cards, 2,044 Christmas and Easter Carols, 1,000 Lesson Cards, 3,000 Pictures, 85 Catechisms, 1,850 Calendars, 195 Pieces of Music, and 48,550 Odd Numbers of Magazines and Periodicals, beside 25 barrels, of which the contents were uncounted.

Sometimes figures are an empty sound; but every one of these represent comfort to the sick; companionship to the lonely; instruction to the poor and ignorant; hope to the prisoner; fresh thought to the exhausted brain of the exiled Minister of Christ; and with and through it all, the inspiring thought that "Somebody cares."

Would that every soul present could have heard the address of Archdeacon Spurr, Chaplain of the Moundsville Penitentiary, West Va. He said, "If any man has cause to bless God for the work of this Club, I am that man." With 800 convicts in the prison, 600 patients in the Hospital, 100 children in his school and a Hotel visited by 5,000 men during the past year, and to every one of these has our Club assisted him to minister. On Christmas morning, a picture card with a box of candy was put at the plate of each convict. Not a man sat down until he had examined his card and then more than one laid his head on his arm and wept bitterly. Mr. Spurr makes a strong appeal for old Prayer books and Hymnals which he says are his best Tracts; and illustrates by telling of the condemned criminal led out to execution, the treasured books under his arm, and when forced

to relinquish them, asking that the Chaplain would hold them so that his last earthly sight might be of them. Are there not still hidden away in Parish closets some of these valued books, which might be doing the Master's work?

How often comes the question, "What can our boys do?" Let them make Scrap Books, Scrap Books of pictures for the sick children; Scrap Books of clippings for the older patients. Let every one contract the "Church Periodical Habit," which when once it has taken root, makes it an impossibility to destroy any printed matter, and for every least leaflet there is a place.

For our Missionary Clergy, as always, we make our strongest plea; and nothing during the past year has been more warmly welcomed by them than the Monday Sermon Supplement of one of our Brooklyn papers. The last, fresh thought of their more favored brother, is of inestimable value to the men who for twelve long months, and sometimes years, have seen nothing but a small, local sheet. Addresses have already been furnished for fifty of the Supplements, but three times that number could be advantageously placed.

And all this gratitude is for what? Simply the superfluities of our lives; the encumbrances of our homes. And yet for this work we may claim the Master's choicest blessings. "The small things of this world." "The cup of cold water." "Unto one of the least of these my brethren." "She hath done what she could," and it was he who commanded, "Gather up the fragments, that nothing be lost."

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

OF THE

LONG ISLAND BRANCH

OF THE

Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions.

CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE I.

This Association shall be called the LONG ISLAND BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE BOARD OF MISSIONS.

ARTICLE II.

Its object shall be to work in connection with the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, the field being co-extensive with the Church, diocesan and general. The methods by which the ends of this organization can be promoted are the raising of money for the support of Missionaries and teachers, for the education of those who may be preparing for the work, and for other benevolent purposes connected with Missions; the making, collecting and transfer of clothing and other material aid, and the circulation of papers and leaflets that may serve to stir up a public interest in the Missions of the Church.

ARTICLE III.

The Association shall consist of all delegates representing parishes in the Diocese, said delegates being appointed by the rector of such parishes, each delegate paying an annual due of one dollar. There shall be at least two, and not more than five, delegates from each parish.

ARTICLE IV.

The officers of the Association shall be a President, a Vice-President, a Recording Secretary, a Corresponding Secretary and a Treasurer.

There shall be, moreover, an Advisory Board, consisting of the above-named officers and five delegates, appointed by the President.

ARTICLE V.

It shall be the duty of the President to preside at the business meetings of the Association and of the Advisory Board, to call special meetings of the same when occasion shall arise, to countersign all drafts upon the Treasurer, and to obtain fresh information from Missions, to be read at the stated meetings of the Association.

ARTICLE VI.

It shall be the duty of the Vice-President to preside, in the absence of the President, over the meetings of the Association and of the Advisory Board.

ARTICLE VII.

It shall be the duty of the Recording Secretary to keep minutes of the proceedings of the Association and of the Board of Managers, to send out all notices of the stated and special meetings of the same, and to prepare an Annual Report.

ARTICLE VIII.

It shall be the duty of the Corresponding Secretary to conduct the correspondence of the Association, especially that with the "General Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions," and to keep a fair record of all Missionary Box Reports.

ARTICLE IX.

It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and keep account of all moneys contributed for the work of the Association, and to pay all drafts upon the funds, when countersigned by the President, and to present an Annual Report.

ARTICLE X.

Any parish in the Diocese too remote for representation shall, on the annual payment of not less than two dollars, be entitled to report its work to this Association.

ARTICLE XI.

The Constitution shall not be altered, except at an Annual Meeting of the Association—notice of the proposed change having been giving at a stated meeting of the Association.

BY-LAWS.

I.

There shall be an annual meeting of the Association on the second Thursday of May, in each year, at such hour and place as the Advisory Board shall direct.

II.

The election of Officers shall take place at such meetings, and they shall continue in office for one year, or until their successors shall have been appointed.

The election of Officers shall be by ballot; nominations to be made in writing and delivered to the Recording Secretary by the Delegates at the annual meeting. Only those persons so nominated shall be eligible for election; the two receiving the largest number of ballots to be the candidates.

III.

In case of the vacancy of any office, by the death or removal of its occupant, the same may be filled at a stated meeting of the Advisory Board, and any one so appointed shall continue in office until the next annual meeting of the Association.

IV.

All persons contributing to the treasury, annually, at least the sum of one dollar shall be members of the Association, but not entitled to a vote.

V.

The stated meetings of the Association shall be held on the second Thursday of each month, except that the November meeting shall take place on the first Thursday of the month, the second Thursday being the Anniversary. Place of meeting to be determined by Association.

There shall be no stated meetings in June, July, August, or September.

VI.

In all matters of importance, a resolution shall be brought before the Association to be deferred to the next meeting for decision, unless passed by a unanimous vote.

VII.

At a meeting of the Association any number of delegates present shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business; and at the annual meeting of the Association a number of delegates, equal to one-half of the number of parishes represented therein, shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

VIII.

At the monthly meetings of the Association the order of business shall be: 1. Devotional services. 2. Minutes of the last meeting. 3. Treasurer's report. 4. Intermission. 5. Calling of the roll. 6. Reports of Parishes and Committees. 7. Unfinished business. 8. Miscellaneous business.
