WOMEN OF THE LONG ISLAND BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE BOARD OF MISSIONS.

We have had a great incentive to do great things. The story of woman's work for missions has gone round the world since that memorable day in Trinity Church, Boston, when we of the Auxiliary were privileged to offer to our Lord with our prayers one hundred and fifty thousand dollars.

And as missionary after missionary testified to other things accomplished, scholarships, hospitals, chapels, and teachers, woman after woman felt in her heart "I could have done more."

Then as those grand men told of what they needed in order to carry on God's work in even the simplest way, and as we thought of their tremendous sacrifices and the great scope of their work, woman after woman said to herself, "I will do more."

When the Woman's Auxiliary was founded it was fully recognized that it was another name for the Missionary Society to which every baptized woman belongs, and of which she is either an active or inactive member. As Diocesan Branches have been formed as channels for work between the parish and the field, delegates to the Diocesan Branches should be carefully chosen from the best material in the parish, in order that the work for the Master may be wisely directed and the messages intelligently and faithfully transmitted. And that these delegates should realize the importance of their commission they should be authorized to "act, act, in the living present, heart-within and God o'erhead" in pledge, subscription, voluntary contribution, or box orders,

thus making less correspondence and prompter replies to appeals, to that end this report will resolve itself into a reference book.

FOREIGN FIELD.

We have four pledges: A Long Island Scholarship for St. John's College at Shanghai for sixty dollars; the Mary E. Peck Scholarship in the Training School for Women at Shanghai for fifty dollars; a bed in the hospital at Nanking, where a western hospital has been adapted to eastern needs, fifty dollars; and a pledge for Bishop Ferguson's Girls' Industrial School at Clay Ashland, on the St. Paul's River, for twenty-five dollars.

One felt a positive thrill of admiration for this fine man who had earned the applause with which he was always greeted, at the missionary meetings during the Convention, and heard him tell of his schools, churches, priests and deacons, of native growth, from the Bishop down, and many gathered in by him from the heathen tribes, and of the contribution from Woman's Auxiliary of Africa to the united offering of eighty-seven dollars, which Bishop Ferguson declared was equal in point of self sacrifice to any large offering in America.

Last year we contributed to the building fund of St. John's Hospital, Shanghai, China.

And to the Bishop Ingle Memorial Fund, the blessed man of whom it was said that his prayer when dying for the missions and the church, bound the whole round world by golden chains around the feet of God."

We have also sent something to Miss Mahoney's work at Cape Mount, Africa, where she is making her medical knowledge felt (and taking up all the work in the absence of the Rev. Mr. Matthews, the first white clergyman we have sent to that field); and to the support of a bible reader in Japan.

We sent money to Brazil, where Bishop Kinsolving silenced the cry of "intrusion" by quoting Bishop Williams' memorable words when it was said that it was not the custom to do any work there. "Not the custom to do samaritan work for the nations south of us, and bid them stand up in the name of Christ; then the sooner we make it custom the better." If the effort first made in 1826 had not been neglected, the condition of the people of Brazil would be so different now, and thousands would not have died in darkness on the mountain side. The Woman's Auxiliary of Brazil is now sending help to new mission stations, and seven hundred people gave seven thousand, five hundred dollars for their own church maintenance last year.

We have sent money to pay the salary of Mrs. Perezi in the Calvary Mission of Jesus del Monte, Cuba, and to the Bunn Memorial Hospital at Wuchang. The Long Island Branch has the privilege of reporting the Anna M. Leverich Scholarship in St. Mary's School, Shanghai; the Marcus and Elizabeth Starr Scholarship in St. Mary's School, Shanghai, and the D. V. M. Johnson Scholarship at the boys' school at Cape Mount, Africa; and the Rosanna Covert Jones Scholarship at Clay Ashland School, Africa.

DOMESTIC MISSIONS.

Our domestic field has grown very large. In fact, it seems rather difficult to draw the line.

The pledges this year are to be: Bishop Grey's work in Southern Florida, fifty dollars; Bishop Wells' work in Spokane for education of a girl in the school at Walla Walla, fifty dollars; Bishop Nelson's work in Georgia, twenty-five dollars.

Last year we sent money to Honolulu, where Bishop Restarick is doing fine work among natives, whites and Chinese, creating good feeling and healing differences.

To the Bishop Wells' school in Walla Walla, Washington, and to his clergy fund we gladly contributed. He

advised us to do everything possible for church schools, as they sent out valuable women for the church. Bishop Wells said it was money well spent to assist in supporting the stipend of one of his clergy, as the people would always take care of their own parishes at the end of three years, so eagerly do they crave the church's services and sacraments.

A remembrance was sent to Southern Florida, where Bishop Grey is accomplishing great spiritual results; to Bishop Kendrick's work in New Mexico; the cry from the Phillipines was answered, and Miss Mason's work in Alaska, and Rev. A. R. Hoare's work in Alaska were aided.

To the Rev. Mr. Morena, at Bolondron, Cuba, we sent a drinking fountain, and money to Christ Church school at Arden, North Carolina, where the Rev. Thomas Wetmore told us the school was a vital necessity, as well as to Oregon, where the mission stations are always seventy miles apart, and sometimes one hundred and fifty miles without a church or school.

The scholarship in the school at Asheville seems small (only ten dollars), but it means a great deal to the little child of those North Carolina mountains, where we are told "a dollar is as big as the moon," and where children climb mountains, swim across streams, walk miles, and even go without food for the sake of education, and it means even more to those who realize the necessity of getting those mountain children into a twentieth century environment.

Oklahoma was not forgotten; neither was Bishop Brown's work in Arkansas, and a small sum was sent into the woods of Maine, where it was sadly needed. We did what we could for the work at Rio, Virginia, and for the Padcock Memorial Hospital, while our hearts were touched by the flood sufferers at St. Louis. The Domestic Contingent Fund, from which Miss Emery fills the neglected boxes, so that none may appeal in vain, should always be our care.

In addition we are allowed to report the Mary A. Alsop scholarship at Little Rock, Arkansas, and the Mary A.

Ludlow scholarship at the Shoshone Mission, Wyoming.

MISSIONS TO THE COLORED PEOPLE.

To St. Augustine's School, North Carolina, we are pledged for the sewing teacher's salary, \$200. And to St. Paul's School, Lawrenceville, \$100.

We also intend to further the interests of St. Micheal's Industrial School, Charlotte, North Carolina; Mrs. Buford's Hospital at Lawrenceville, the Bishop Payne Divinity School, the work at King Hall, and the building of St. Agnes' Hospital; St. Augustine's School, Raleigh, N. C.

Last year we not only paid the pledges which have made Long Island seem like a familiar friend at St. Augustine's and St. Paul's, but money was sent to St. Michael's School, Charlotte, North Carolina.

And to St. Athanasius School, at Brunswick, Georgia.

We also have the opportunity to report another John A. King scholarship at King Hall. I am loth to leave the colored work without a word regarding our "Good Friday offering," made a thank offering to colored work in memory of Simon Cyrene, to whom is given the credit of having carried our Saviour's cross. This yielded rich fruit last Good Friday for the cause of St. Paul's, Lawrenceville.

INDIAN MISSIONS.

The pledges are for Bishop Rowe's Indian work, fifty dollars, and for Miss Thackara's hospital at Fort Defiance, Arizona, fifty dollars.

We also have the salary of the lace teacher at Red Lake, Minnesota, not as a pledge, but as an appealing need, as spiritual guidance as well as lace teaching is given into Miss Stiles' care, and she reported that she was never warm once during the winter.

We sent to Boise aid for the Lemhi Indians, who are so poor that they have been driven to subsist on boiled grass.

From the five hundred Tuhkend Indians away up within the Arctic Circle comes a happy message. In their midst, at

Fort Yukon, will be built the memorial chapel to our late beloved President, Sarah A. Cox. Her interest in Alaska and the development of the church work there was constantly voiced while she was with us, the cross on the altar at Church Sitka being a constant witness to her remembrance of her visit there. It was felt after careful consideration that our loving memorial of her should be placed where her last thought had been. Bishop Rowe was touched and encouraged by this decision, as it enabled him to found a little chapel where five hundred souls were beginning for the ministrations of a priest. He wrote, "A chapel at this point (Fort Yukon, fifteen miles north of the Arctic Circle) will have a large community to use it, as one is most needed. The memorial chapel cannot but be for years the "House of God and gate of heaven" to many of these children of the Arctic wilds."

We have two other scholarships in the Indian field—the Cornelia King Scholarship at Anvik, Alaska, and the Minnie Moore Scholarship at the Rosebud Agency, South Dakota.

MEXICO.

The pledge is the Charlotte Annan Scholarship at the Hooker Orphanage, Mexico, of eighty dollars. The Mexican girls educated there prove of incalculable benefit to the communities to which they return, either as teachers or as missionaries, in the home and neighborhood. Their persistency insures their progress. Mr. Forrester's death came after he had ministered to the Mexican people with great self sacrifice, and one can but regret that he could not have lived to hear the decision of the House of Bishops in Boston, to have a bishop in Mexico as well as in Cuba.

APPORTIONMENT.

It seems a little difficult for the average woman to understand that the Woman's Auxiliary of the American church has been asked to raise one hundred thousand dol-

lars apart from the apportionment to be raised by the churches. Our apportionment is \$2,050. Of this we gave, last year, \$994, all work which helps the Board of Missions being counted in favor of this fund.

CHURCH PERIODICAL CLUB.

The story is so well told by the Long Island correspondent elsewhere, that it is unnecessary to say more than that the Church Periodical Club has become such a valuable aid to missionary enterprise that the clergy as well as the laity in far-away corners are under great obligation to it, and the testimony of all is to the effect that if people only knew, not a current magazine, newspaper or book would be wasted or hidden away.

ALTAR SOCIETY.

Vestments have been sent to missionaries, altar linen embroidered for mission stations, cottas and cassocks passed on from church to chapel, and still more may be done if the parishes will bear the matter in mind.

DIOCESAN.

Pledges: Rev. Mr. McDuffie, \$50; Mrs. Gustine, at Free-town, \$25; salary of lay reader at Martense, \$75. Within the Diocese we have furthered the work being so valiantly carried on by the Rev. Mr. McDuffie among the colored people in Queens and Nassau. St. Philip's Colored Mission, Brooklyn, has been materially assisted, and St. Augustine's Colored Church helped in its brave efforts to earn a home, having to leave their former church, it having been condemned as unsafe, a certain sum of money has been promised if it succeeds in raising \$7,000. St. Augustine's, under its rector, the Rev. Mr. Miller, is an element for the best influence in our community, and certainly should not be allowed to be homeless.

To the Northern Archdeaconry some assistance was

sent, but many times the amount is sorely needed. One clergyman spoke of the work there as "Foreign Home Missions." We must anticipate conditions in that section or a serious problem will confront us.

We have pledged the salary of a lay reader at Martense. Archdeacon Wrigley says there is no better place in the Diocese where missionary money could be spent to greater advantage. St. Jude's, Blythbourne, is certainly energetic to have established a mission before she had ceased to be a mission herself.

THE UNITED OFFERING.

Mrs. Peterman, the chairman, is already making preparations for the next Triennial Oering, in Richmond, Va., in 1907. To that end she asks for a treasurer in each parish who will be active in placing the collection boxes and reporting to her, that she may keep in touch with their progress. We sent \$2,422.77 this year, but three years from now our offering should be more. The offering for 1907 will be a gain for Woman's Work, with the addition that \$10,000 is to be appropriated for a building preferably for woman's work.

Mrs. Gustine told her simple story of her work at Free-town among the Indians and negroes so well at our "out-of-town" meeting, at Islip, that she won everybody's interest and confidence. The memory of that beautiful twenty-fourth of May, in 1904, when the delegates to the Long Island Branch were bidden by the rector and ladies of St. Mark's parish, Islip, to an "out-of-town" meeting, will always remain. Through the courtesy of the Long Island Railroad, the fares were materially reduced, and the weather was all that could be desired. The short morning service, with its beautiful prayers for missions, the business meeting full of thought, fine report and good purpose for the future, the gracious hospitality, the missionary addresses in the afternoon, Archdeacon Wrigley presiding, the words of

cheer and report from Dr. Darlington, Miss Emery, the Rev. Mr. Perry, Miss Read and Archdeacon Holden, certainly convinced us all of the advisability of an "out-of-town" meeting each year.

One year's work has ended and another has begun. To those who still hold back, to those who ask is it worth while, to those who still assert that they "do not believe in missions, while there is so much to be done at home," comes the testimony in no uncertain tones from missionaries, *Spirit of Missions*, church and secular papers, of the growth of Christ's kingdom.

The Bishop of Hereford's sermon on the "Brotherhood of man," was from two contrasting texts, "I am not my brother's keeper" and "Here am I, Lord send me." After a masterly presentation of the subject, he closed by asking, "When the last day comes, and you appear before the bar, after having fought the battle of life, in which camp are you willing to be enrolled? With the brand of Cain upon you, or with the badge of willing service for the Lord.

Report of the Church Periodical Club

The sixteenth annual report of the Church Periodical Club is as follows: 2,131 new current magazines sent regularly; 1,916 books, 125 bibles and testaments, 100 prayer books and hymnals, 5,496 tracts, 9 catechisms, 5,182 Easter and Christmas cards, 6, 962 Easter and Christmas Cards, 923 lesson cards, 4,022 calendars, 467 games, 200 pieces of music, 3,560 pictures, and 42,000 odd numbers of magazines and periodicals, with 32 barrels and 24 boxes, contents uncounted.

A missionary bishop has called the Church Periodical Club a fairy God-mother, because he has never asked for anything that it did not supply. Another has called it the very communion of saints, and to its efficacy as an aid to missionary work numberless grateful letters testify. One reads, "The many proofs that the C. P. C. is entitled to be considered one of the missionary agencies of the Church cannot be included in a brief report." Another, "It is silent missionary of the most effective kind, and we find results from such scattered literature that is scarcely dreamt of in Eastern Church circles."

The Diocese of Long Island has done noble work in the last sixteen years for the C. P. C., and noble work awaits her. In the Phillipines, Chaplain Swift asks for material of any kind that will supply his reading room, and lure our soldiers from the dens of iniquity surrounding them. In Alaska Mr. Knapp appeals for literature for the hospitals, where maimed miners spend weary months, and for very ennui, gamble away their hard-earned treasure. In China, Rev. Mr. Mosher reminds us that in their new mission he

and his wife are the only English-speaking people among 300,000 Chinese, and that a new magazine from home would indeed be a drop of water in a thirsty land. From the mountains of North Carolina, from the plains of Arizona, the wild wastes of Oregon, lonely ranches and isolated mining camps come never-ceasing appeal, and our response is only limited by our inclination and generosity; the supply is inexhaustible.

It is customary to smile at the economies of women, and it has been said that no one but a woman would have thought of the Church Periodical Club. It has also been said that the most economical nation will become the greatest nation, and surely there is no article so wasted as our printed matter. Our streets and vacant lots are made hideous with it, and its disposition is a civic problem. Should not, therefore, such a report as this be a matter of congratulation, representing not so much a monetary value, but pleasure, profit, solace, instruction, sympathy and gratitude, because we did but "Gather up the fragments, that nothing be lost."

It is with thoughtfulness and sense of encouragement that we can note in the above report a decided step forward in the "box" work of the past year, although we must not be elated, as we are still behind the amount accomplished in previous years.

Not only have more boxes been sent to the mission field, but some parishes who sent none at all last year, have come forward with an earnest desire to do their share in this most practical way of helping the families of our missionaries, and so materially supplementing their small and insufficient salaries.

It is the aim of the Auxiliary that every parish represented should send at least one "box" during the year (many send several) to either family, mission school or Christmas tree. We all know the great need of these boxes, and it has been emphasized at the meeting of the Auxiliary in Boston, this fall. It seems so essentially woman's province to take up this branch of the work,

that of carrying into the homes of those in the fore-front of field the cheering, helpful and encouraging stimulus of practical common-place aid; making them feel that some one else "cares." We cannot all do large things, but each one can do something to hold up the hands and cheer the hearts of the distant worker, steadfast at his isolated, perhaps difficult post, and bring smiles to the face of his faithful wife, weary and discouraged in the vain effort to make "both ends meet." We want the rector to stimulate the women of the parish to greater effort, and when no help of this kind has been given, to urge them to put themselves in communication with the corresponding secretary, who can always supply them with box orders of all kinds.

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

OF THE

LONG ISLAND BRANCH

OF THE

Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions.

CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE I.

This Association shall be called the "Long Island Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions."

ARTICLE II.

Its object shall be to work in connection with the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, the field being co-extensive with the Church, diocesan and general. The methods by which the ends of this organization can be promoted are the raising of money for the support of Missionaries and teachers, for the education of those who may be preparing for the work, and for other benevolent purposes connected with Missions; the making, collecting and transfer of clothing and other material aid, and the circulation of papers and leaflets that may serve to stir up a public interest in the Missions of the Church.

ARTICLE III.

The Association shall consist of all delegates representing parishes in the Diocese, said delegates being appointed by the rector of such parishes, each delegate paying an annual due of one dollar. There shall be at least two and not more than five delegates from each parish.

ARTICLE IV.

The officers of the Association shall be a President, a First Vice-President and a Second Vice-President, a Recording Secretary, a Corresponding Secretary, a Treasurer and an Assistant Treasurer.

There shall be, moreover, an Advisory Board, consisting of the above-named officers and five delegates, appointed by the President.

ARTICLE V.

It shall be the duty of the President to preside at the business meetings of the Association and of the Advisory Board, to call special meetings of the same when the occasion shall arise, to countersign all drafts upon the Treasurer, and to obtain fresh information from Missions, to be read at the stated meetings of the Association.

ARTICLE VI.

It shall be the duty of the Vice-President to preside, in the absence of the President, over the meetings of the Association and of the Advisory Board.

ARTICLE VII.

It shall be the duty of the Recording Secretary to keep minutes of the proceedings of the Association, to send out all notices of the stated and special meetings of the same, and to prepare an Annual Report.

ARTICLE VIII

It shall be the duty of the Corresponding Secretary to conduct the correspondence of the Association, especially that with the "General Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions," and to keep a fair record of all Missionary Box Reports.

ARTICLE IX.

It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and keep account of all moneys contributed for the work of the Association, and to pay all drafts upon the funds, when countersigned by the President, and to present an Annual Report.

ARTICLE X.

Any parish in the Diocese too remote for representation shall, on the annual payment of not less than two dollars, be entitled to report its work to this Association.

ARTICLE XI.

This Constitution shall not be altered, except at an Annual meeting of the Association—notice of the proposed change having been given at a stated meeting of the Association.

BY-LAWS.

I.

There shall be an annual meeting of the Association on the second Thursday of May, in each year, at such hour and place as the Advisory Board shall direct.

II.

The election of Officers shall take place at such meetings, and they shall continue in office for one year, or until their successors shall have been appointed.

The election of Officers shall be by ballot; nominations to be made in writing and delivered to the Recording Secretary by the Delegates at the annual meeting. Only those persons so nominated shall be eligible for election; the two receiving the largest number of ballots to be the candidates.

III.

In case of any vacancy of any office, by the death or removal of its occupant, the same may be filled at a stated meeting of the Advisory Board, and any one so appointed shall continue in office until the next annual meeting of the Association.

IV.

All persons contributing to the treasury, annually, at least the sum of one dollar, shall be members of the Association, but not entitled to vote.

V.

The stated meetings of the Association shall be held on the second Thursday of each month, except that the November meeting shall take place on the first Thursday of the month, the second Thursday being the Anniversary. Place of meeting to be determined by Association.

There shall be no stated meetings in June, July, August or September.

VI.

In all matters of importance a resolution shall be brought before the Association, to be deferred to the next meeting for decision, unless passed by a unanimous vote.

VII.

At a meeting of the Association any number of delegates present shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business; and at the annual meeting of the Association a number of delegates, equal to one-half of the number of parishes represented therein, shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

VIII.

At the monthly meetings of the Association the order of business shall be: 1. Devotional services. 2. Minutes of the last meeting. 3. Treasurer's report. 4. Intermission. 5. Calling of the roll. 6. Reports of Parishes and Committees. 7. Unfinished business. 8. Miscellaneous business.
