

To the
**Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions
Diocese of Long Island**

This Annual Report is the record of the Auxiliary year that is past. Its pledges are more than redeemed, its accounts are closed. But the list of delegates that appears on its pages is the enrolment of workers for the year which has already opened, and upon them rests the responsibility for the coming months of Auxiliary effort. For the reason that on this roll there is more than the usual number of new names, it is thought that a few words concerning this responsibility may lead to a clearer understanding of duties and result in greater practical efficiency.

There is first the dignity of appointment and appointment to a service. It requires that we make the parish an interested and responsive helper to the Auxiliary, and that we carry to the parish the large missionary spirit and impulse of the Auxiliary.

The service demands a definite portion of time and attention, which should be aranged for and cheerfully given. Fragments of occasional meetings will not fulfil the intention of the appointment. We are to use all occasions which will inform us about missions and the missionaries; their surroundings, their efforts, their difficulties, their encouragements. Then the story can be told to others. It is the simple facts of any devoted missionary life that attract attention, enlist sympathy, win friends for the cause, gifts for the mission treasury and inspire men and women to offer themselves for the most self-sacrificing of all Christian service. Knowledge of missions is one of the emphasized duties of members of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Some share, even though it may be a small one, in the pledges assumed by the Auxiliary should be taken by every parish. The gifts must needs be regulated by conditions, all are equally recognized and appreciated.

But beyond and above all else, is the high privilege and loving duty of prayer for missions; faithful, earnest prayer.

"It seems so strange," writes one to a missionary in China, "that the most effective of all spiritual forces and the most absorbing and illuminating of all spiritual gifts should be regarded more in the light of duty than as offering unique opportunities of serving God and hastening the advance of His Kingdom."

Are not all our Auxiliary duties to be held in our hearts as opportunities?

It is the Lord's work we are striving to do, it is His blessing we are seeking. May the coming year lead us to a more earnest and thorough service. Then shall there come to us results which will inspire and strengthen, even though they do not find a place on the printed page.

Thirty-sixth Annual Report

If the uphill may be escaped by never turning back, then should the path of this Auxiliary lie before it fair and smooth. There has certainly been no disposition to turn back, but rather a steady onward tendency shown in increased pledges and generous special gifts, all of which were complete when the financial year closed.

Our Thirty-fifth Anniversary Meeting was held, by invitation of the Rev. J. Howard Melish, in Holy Trinity Church, Clinton Street. A most hearty welcome was accorded us by the rector and ladies of the parish. Holy Communion was celebrated and followed by welcome news from the front, brought by the Rev. Reese F. Alsop, rector emeritus of St. Ann's Church, who had but recently returned from a tour to the far East and the Islands of the Sea. He assured us that our missionaries were men and women to be proud of, equals, if not the superiors of our home clergy, and the good influence of their heroic lives cannot be overestimated.

The short noon-day address was given by Bishop Paddock, then Bishop-elect of Oregon. He spoke to the Auxiliary as to personal friends, some of whom he had known all his life, and speaking thus intimately, his enthusiasm for his new work and his words of entreaty that we give all to the cause of the Master, left a singularly vivid impression. "If," he said, "*you* will set the example, show concretely what is needed, the whole world will be aroused, the Church will be heated to white heat, as it were, and fathers, mothers and children will come to offer themselves in the same way."

Afternoon addresses were given by Bishop Wells, of Spokane, Bishop Brattan of Mississippi, Bishop Moreland of Sacramento, and the Rev. George Wallace of Trinity College, Tokyo, Japan.

Our regular meetings have been made interesting by many visitors; some of whom, like Mrs. Mann and Mrs. Miller, brought a breath of the Western plains and mountains, and pictured to us the isolation and real deprivation borne most patiently by the Western missionary and his family.

Then our interests were focused on the Chinese, in their own land, and in San Francisco, by Miss Mitchell of Shanghai, and Deaconess Drant, whose work is now at the Golden Gate, but who became interested in these people at Honolulu.

The Rev. Mr. Bishop, Rev. Mr. Alston and Mrs. Hunter brought messages from the South, and lastly Archdeacon Stuck told graphically of the hardships and devotion of those few tried workers up near the Arctic Circle.

The Committees took up their work hopefully, assuming some new pledges and in some instances increasing the old ones, which seemed most needful.

A new one assumed by the Diocesan Committee was that for Italian Missions. When it is considered that one hundred and fifty thousand Italians are in the diocese, the few weak Missions seem sadly inadequate to take care of even those who do not profess to belong to the Roman Church. The colored work in Queens and Nassau Counties has long had assistance from the Auxiliary, and each year some struggling Mission is remembered. The Diocese of Long Island is peculiar in that its eastern parishes are quite isolated, a fact which tends to weaken Church activities. For this reason the Diocesan Committee has a wide field and a difficult one. It was the recognition of this isolation that brought into being the out-of-town meeting.

The Domestic Committee with its field, which is almost world wide, embracing Alaska, the Philippines and Hawaii, finds it difficult to select from the many deserving objects, those which are most in need of assistance. It could not pass over the Diocese of Eastern Oregon—the recently elected Bishop being a son of our first President, and Sacramento still feels the effect of the great earthquake, so these two Western dioceses were placed on the list of pledges. Bishop Rowe's field of work is always

remembered and this year work for the mountaineers in the Diocese of Lexington was added also.

The Committee on Colored Work continues, from year to year, its pledge to St. Augustine's School at Raleigh and to St. Paul's School at Lawrenceville, Va., assisting also the Bishop Payne Divinity School which draws its students from both these institutions. An Indian pledge of long standing, that of a lace teacher's salary, has this year been paid from the United Offering, leaving the Indian Committee free to take up other work. After doubling the pledge for Rev. Wm. Loola's salary, it was decided to give to Bishop Gray's work among the Seminole Indians of Southern Florida. A hospital is greatly needed and the land has been secured.

The Foreign Committee continued its pledges to St. John's College and to the M. E. Peck Training School, both at Shanghai, to the hospital at Gankin, China, and to the Hooker Orphanage in Mexico. These are pledges long ago assumed by the Auxiliary and they cannot easily be dropped. Though they may not be taken up with the enthusiasm created by new objects, yet the good tidings from China should renew our interest in these and all other Chinese works.

The Junior reports have been most encouraging throughout the year. The amount of work done by that branch must be read in its special report to be appreciated. Surely the Auxiliary has cause to rejoice that its future members will come to it so well equipped with knowledge and experience.

Again let us rejoice in our latest branch—the Little Helpers—formed in December, 1907, on whose rolls are inscribed nearly one hundred and fifty names.

The Lenten Study Class has earned its right to permanence by its excellent work, the subject this year being the timely one, The Uplift of China.

The Church Periodical Club of this diocese is known far and wide; its literature goes with the sailor on his voyage, to the isolated homes of the West and far beyond the Arctic Circle. From every quarter come words of appreciation. How little it costs of time or money to make more livable these lonely lives!

The work of the Altar Society has gone quietly on, and its report on another page will prove interesting reading. The Annual Out-of-Town Meeting was held by invitation of Archdeacon Holden, at St. James' Church, St. James, on June 5th. The day was a perfect one in every respect, and the place of meeting one of great charm. Peace pervaded the hearts of all who attended and helped make the day a red-letter one.

After the morning communion the time before luncheon was profitably taken up by the Chairmen in presenting the work of the Committees. The afternoon was given to several speakers, Archdeacon Holden being the first, and following him the Rev. Mr. Bishop, who spoke on the Church Institute for Negroes, Rev. Mr. Humphrey and his wife, who told of the Seminole Indians, and lastly, Mr. Walker, on the Missionary Spirit. St. James is practically in the center of the Island and, though fifty miles from either extremity, the attendance was excellent, and the interest general.

Our ranks have again been broken, and a dearly-loved member removed from our midst. Mrs. Wm. B. Litchfield, who served with faithfulness and devotion as delegate and then as Chairman of the Diocesan Committee, has left a vacancy not easily filled. As chairman she endeared herself to officers and members alike, and has left a sweet and enduring memory. Another delegate of long standing has passed into life eternal, Mrs. S. W. Sayres, of Far Rockaway, at one time an active and willing worker.

This record would be incomplete should no mention be made of the loss of three strong workers to the Missionary world. Miss Sibyl Carter took up the cause of the Indian when that cause was most unpopular, and with a patience which was almost power, a perseverance almost prophetic, she carried to success her plan to help the Indian women, and demonstrated to the unbelieving world that they are not, as a race, or necessarily either, dull, dirty or idle.

The mountain whites of the Carolinas have cause to mourn a true friend, and the Church loses a strong and inspiring

Missionary in Archdeacon Hughson, whose name and work are familiar words with us. Archdeacon Pollard of South Carolina will also be sadly missed. Who will fill these vacant places?

Your thirty-sixth Annual Report closes with "regrets and recollections of things past." Yet, with confidence that as our future is the fruit of our past, there can be no failure in store for us, no work will be undertaken which shall not be well done.

Report of the Church Periodical Club

From October, 1907, to October, 1908.

The Church Periodical Club presents its Twentieth Annual Report as follows:

Two thousand five hundred and fifty new current magazines sent regularly. 40 Bibles and Testaments; 250 Prayer Books and Hymnals; 3,500 books; 300 tracts and catechisms; 4,500 calendars; 11,000 Christmas and Easter cards; 2,500 Christmas and Easter carols; 466 pieces of music; 5,500 pictures and games; 51,000 odd numbers and 69 boxes and barrels, contents uncounted.

In January of this year was celebrated the twentieth anniversary of the birth of the Church Periodical Club. Its beginning was one copy of the *Churchman* sent out from the home of its founder; to-day 15,682 current magazines are sent regularly each week or month; and its recipients number 1,463 clergy and 5,121 laity, besides innumerable reading rooms, hospitals, light houses, life saving stations, mining camps and ranches.

During the past year, the first travelling library has gone out from our diocese. This was sent into the wilds of Michigan, and hundreds of equally desolate places are waiting to be blessed by such a gift. They are delightful memorials, within the power of most of us; \$13.50 covers the cost, outside of the 60 books which are generally donated by a circle of friends, and the first expressage.

Somewhat more expensive is the clergyman's travelling library, composed of theological works and books of reference, which is now being prepared by a congregation of the diocese in memory of a much loved rector.

Long Island is still the banner diocese. In some items doing one quarter of the work of the whole club, but it could be increased many times. It is troublesome, but oh, it pays,

and when once the Church Periodical habit is formed, we cannot waste or destroy what means so much joy to our less favored brethren. Save every picture. Our houses are so full of them, that we cannot realize what they mean in those bare, desolate mountain homes. One missionary tells us of a poor, lonely hut, with a picture of the Saviour, the only relief to the blankness of its walls, and the owner pointing to it and saying: "We may not have enough to eat, we may not have enough to wear, but we have Him." Who would not envy the donor of that priceless possession; or the sender of *Churchman* to the churchwoman who has only been to one service in seven years, being 100 miles from a church, though she was reared with the privilege of a daily service.

But space fails to multiply such instances as we might many, many times; only let us in the coming year remember our abundance and the dear Saviour's injunction, "Freely ye have received, freely give."

Mission Study

The Diocesan Mission Study Class for the season of 1908 began work directly after Epiphany and met weekly until Lent. Twenty-one members were enrolled though several for unavoidable reasons were obliged to drop out. Fourteen parishes were represented, in some cases by several members, among these were three diocesan officers, as well as several presidents of Junior Auxiliary branches.

The part of the missionary field to be studied was China, and the text-book was the *Uplift of China*. But in addition the class used Richmond's *American Episcopal Church in China*, many leaflets from the Missions House, and a library of ten books on China, which were taken out weekly by members.

This set of books and a corresponding set on "The Islands of the South Seas" are the property of the Diocesan Branch and are at the service of any parish. They can be had from the assistant Junior Secretary, at 170 Clinton Street, Brooklyn. It is expected that members of a diocesan study class will conduct classes in their own parishes after completing the course, and last season very good work was done. At least ten parish classes were conducted by our members, usually numbering ten or twelve, and one member taught two classes, of eighteen and twelve members respectively.

Constitution and By-Laws
OF THE

Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions

CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE I.

This Association shall be called the LONG ISLAND BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE BOARD OF MISSIONS.

ARTICLE II.

Its object shall be to work in connection with the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, the field being co-extensive with the Church, diocesan and general. The methods by which the ends of this organization can be promoted are the raising of money for the support of Missionaries and teachers, for the education of those who may be preparing for the work, and for other benevolent purposes connected with Missions; the making, collecting and transfer of clothing and other material aid, and the circulation of papers and leaflets that may serve to stir up a public interest in the Missions of the Church.

ARTICLE III.

The Association shall consist of all delegates representing parishes in the Diocese, said delegates being appointed by the rector of such parishes, each delegate paying an annual due of one dollar. There shall be at least two and not more than five delegates from each parish.

ARTICLE IV.

The officers of the Association shall be a President, a First Vice-President and a Second Vice-President, a Recording Secretary, a Corresponding Secretary, a Treasurer and an Assistant Treasurer.

There shall be, moreover, an Advisory Board, consisting of the above-named officers and five delegates, appointed by the President.

ARTICLE V.

It shall be the duty of the President to preside at the business meetings of the Association and of the Advisory Board, to call special meetings of the same when the occasion shall arise, to countersign all drafts upon the Treasurer, and to obtain fresh information from Missions, to be read at the stated meetings of the Association.

ARTICLE VI.

It shall be the duty of the Vice-President to preside, in the absence of the President, over the meetings of the Association and of the Advisory Board.

ARTICLE VII.

It shall be the duty of the Recording Secretary to keep minutes of the proceedings of the Association, and to prepare the Annual Report.

ARTICLE VIII.

It shall be the duty of the Corresponding Secretary to conduct the correspondence of the Association, and to send out all notices of the stated and special meetings of the same.

ARTICLE IX.

It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and keep account of all moneys contributed for the work of the Association, and to pay all drafts upon the funds, when countersigned by the President, and to present an Annual Report.

ARTICLE X.

Any parish in the Diocese too remote for representation shall, on the annual payment of not less than two dollars, be entitled to report its work to this Association.

ARTICLE XI.

The Constitution shall not be altered, except at an annual meeting of the Association—notice of the proposed change having been given at a stated meeting of the Association.

By-Laws

I.

There shall be an annual meeting of the Association on the second Thursday of May, in each year, at such hour and place as the Advisory Board shall direct.

II.

The election of Officers shall take place at such meetings, and they shall continue in office for one year, or until their successors shall have been appointed.

A Nominating Committee shall be appointed by the President at the March business meeting, consisting of three delegates, none of whom shall be an officer. This Committee shall send to each delegate a slip containing the name of every office printed, and a place opposite each in which she may write the name of her choice for that office. From these slips, which should be filled out immediately and returned, a ticket shall be made out containing, if possible, two names for each office. Only those persons nominated in the preliminary ballot shall be eligible. This ticket shall be printed and given to every delegate on the day of the annual meeting in May. At this meeting each delegate shall indicate her choice by scratching the name she does not want, leaving but one candidate for each office. The ballot box shall be in charge of three delegates appointed by the President, whose duty it shall be to erase from the roll the name of each delegate as she casts her ballot, and to count and record the vote.

III.

In case of any vacancy of any office, by the death or removal of its occupant, the same may be filled at a stated meeting of the Advisory Board, and any one so appointed shall continue in office until the next annual meeting of the Association.

IV.

All persons contributing to the treasury, annually, at least the sum of one dollar, shall be members of the Association, but not entitled to vote.

V.

The stated meetings of the Association shall be held on the second Thursday of each month, except that the November meeting shall take place on the first Thursday of the month, the second Thursday being the Anniversary. Place of meeting to be determined by Association.

There shall be no stated meetings in June, July, August or September.

VI.

In all matters of importance a resolution shall be brought before the Association, to be deferred to the next meeting for decision, unless passed by a unanimous vote.

VII.

At a meeting of the Association any number of delegates present shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business; and at the annual meeting of the Association a number of delegates, equal to one-half of the number of parishes represented therein, shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

VIII.

At the monthly meetings of the Association the order of business shall be: 1. Devotional services. 2. Minutes of the last meeting. 3. Treasurer's report. 4. Intermission. 5. Calling of the roll. 6. Reports of Parishes and Committees. 7. Unfinished business. 8. Miscellaneous business.
